ETON V. HARROW.

Played at LORD'S, Friday, Saturday, July 10, 11.—Those who saw the condition of Lord's ground after the storm of July 8 felt doubtful whether it would be possible to start the Eton and Harrow match on the following Friday, but in the meantime the weather underwent a change and the turf made an absolutely marvellous recovery. No one, seeing the ground on Friday morning, would have supposed that less than forty-eight hours before it had been practically under water. Having ruined the Gentlemen and Players' match the weather behaved kindly to the Schools, whose annual contest took place under the most satisfactory conditions. Not a drop of rain fell on either day, and the cricket proved thoroughly enjoyable. The turnstiles showed that 5,437 people paid for admission on the Friday, and 5,687 on the Saturday. These figures, however, as in the case of the Oxford and Cambridge match, give no idea of the numbers present. The attendance on the opening day was the more remarkable as the match had to contend against the counter attraction of the visit of the German Emperor to the City. Among the twenty-two players engaged in the game only ten had taken part in the match of 1890—Norman, Brewis, Studd, Hoare, Arkwright, and Forbes for Eton, and Pope, Anderson, Bevington, and Barlow for Harrow. Another old choice, who was available for Harrow, C. J. L. Rudd, stood down in favour of Ridgeway. The result of the game was a victory for Harrow by seven wickets, and there is little doubt that the winners were the better side. At the same time it is only fair to point out that the Eton team laboured under serious disadvantages. Their captain, R. C. Norman, was utterly unfit to take part in the game, having, through a collision with another player unht to take part in the game, naving, through a collision with another player in the match against Winchester during the previous week, sustained a slight concussion of the brain. Being captain of the eleven he was naturally very reluctant to stand out of the match, but he soon found that he could not do himself anything like justice, and when a doctor had seen him he was ordered home, the result being that Eton had to bat one man short in their second innings. As if this misfortune were not enough, H. A. Arkwright, another of the best men on the side, was very unwell and by no means fit to play cricket. We have not the slightest wish to rob the Harrow eleven of any of the credit that their victory brought them, but in looking at the issue of the game the facts we have mentioned should be taken into consideration.

Harrow won the toss for choice of innings, but the captain, or more probably his experienced advisers, judged that the wicket would improve as the day went

on, and it was therefore decided that Eton should bat first. Seldom has the policy of putting the other side in been more triumphantly justified, the result being that when an innings had been completed on each side Harrow had a lead of 116 runs. At one point it seemed as though a mistake had been made. Eton's score reaching 50 with only one wicket down, but after that everything went well with Harrow and those who had ccunselled a somewhat venturesome course of action were in a position to congratulate themselves on a very admirable piece of strategy. Commencing at five minutes past eleven Eton's first innings lasted two hours and twenty minutes, and was all over for a total of 125, the last five wickets going down for 33 runs. The one noteworthy feature of the innings was the exceptionally good batting of Brewis, who went in first and was the eighth man out, scoring in two hours and five minutes 70 runs out of 113. Considering that the ground was at its slowest while he was in, it was the general opinion that his score of 70 was as good as 100 would have been in the latter part of the day. He played a fine forcing game, making most of his runs in front of the wicket, and two or three of his square-leg hits reminded experienced spectators of the once famous Notts batsman, William Oscroft. Of the four Harrow bowlers, Pope (right hand, medium pace) came out with the best average, his four wickets costing only 22 runs. Harrow's innings began at a quarter to two and closed at a quarter to six, the result of three hours and a quarter's actual batting being a total of 241. Admitting that the ground was much faster and better than it had been during Eton's innings, this was a most creditable performance, but at one time a far bigger score seemed in prospect, the total when the fourth wicket went down having actually reached 224. Then came a complete collapse, the last six wickets falling for 17 runs. The first five men all did well, but incomparably the best cricket was shown by Bevington, who hit with great brilliancy and scored in an hour and twenty-five minutes 71 runs out of 110. His figures were eleven 4's, two 3's, six 2's, and only nine singles. It may be said here that in the opinion of most of the professionals who saw him play he was here that in the opinion of most of the professionals who saw him play he was decidedly the best bat in the match. After he left, Pope and Barlow scored at a great pace, putting on no fewer than 49 runs in half an hour. With Barlow and Anderson together, the run-getting was even faster, 41 runs being actually scored in eighteen minutes. Then at 224 Anderson was caught at cover slip, and from the time he left the batting went all to pieces. The Eton bowling did not seem at all strong, Lane-Fox (left hand, rather slow) keeping the best length. Forbes bowled at a great pace, but was far too inaccurate to be really formidable. At the close of the day Eton had fifty minutes' batting, and so well did Brewis and Studd play together that at the drawing of stumps 36 runs had been scored without the

For nearly two hours on the Saturday morning there seemed every prospect of a full day's cricket and a good finish to the game, but this early promise was by no means fulfilled, and by half-past four in the afternoon the match was all over. So long as Studd and Brewis stayed together Eton's prospects looked very favourable, the overnight score of 36 being increased to 75 before the two batsmen were parted. Studd was the first to go, his admirable innings of 40 having lasted altogether an hour and twenty minutes. Studd is the youngest member of the famous family, and to judge from his performance in this match there would seem no reason why he should not do credit to his name. Brewis, after an innings of 41, which was quite worthy of comparison with his excellent display on the opening day, was caught at mid-on at 89. For some little time longer the batting was fairly good, and with only three wickets down the balance of 116 runs on the first innings was hit off at twenty minutes to one. The general public were unaware of the fact that Norman would not be able to bat, and everyone was naturally looking forward to a first-rate afternoon's cricket. A sad error of judgment in running, however, lost Crabtree his wicket with the score at 122, and at 154 France-Hayhurst was splendidly caught by Bevington in the long field. After that there was nothing noteworthy in the batting and by twenty minutes to two the innings was all over for 187. This

left Harrow with only 72 runs to win the game, and it was not until after lunch that they entered on their light task. Bevington was easily caught and bowled at 15, and Paine clean bowled at 18. The number of runs required, however, being so small, the Eton eleven, even after this good start, had no hope of saving the game. The finish was very quiet, the Harrow boys, with the match in their hands, playing an absolutely safe game, and running no risks. Barlow was bowled at 49, and then, as the result of three-quarters of an hour's careful batting, Bosworth-Smith and Pope hit off the remaining 32 runs, Harrow winning at half-past four by seven wickets.

Sixty-six matches have been 'played, of which Eton have won twenty-seven. Harrow twenty-eight, and eleven have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857 for boys under twenty which has been rejected. R. B. Hoare's 108 in 1888 was the ninth three-figure innings in the matches between the schools, the previous great scorers having been E. Bayley 152 in 1841; A. K. Watson 135 in 1885; A. W. Ridley 117 in 1871; C. P. Foley 114 in 1886; W. F. Forbes 113 in 1876; A. W. T. Daniel 112 not out in 18°0; C. J. Ottaway 108 in 1869; and E. Crawley 100 in 1885.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN 1891.

For the fourth year in succession we are indebted to Mr. O. R. Borrodaile for some remarks on the subject of Public School cricket. Mr. Borrodaile writes that as boys, like men, play better cricket on hard wickets than on soft ones, it would not have been surprising if the batting averages among the public schools in 1891 had fallen below the standard of former years. Such, however, is not the case, the figures being quite as good as usual. Mr. Borrodaile regrets that he could not get any account of the Eton, Clifton, Cheltenham, and Malvern teams, more particularly as in P. H. Latham Malvern possessed one of the best school bats of the sea-on. Among the most prominent batsmen was G. O. Smith, of Charterhouse, who, for sixt en innings, can show the splendid average of 57. This young cricketer is also a good bowler, and it is a fortunate thing for Charterhouse that he will be staying at school for another year. Another very successful run-getter was C. B Fry, of Repton, who was considered good enough to be tried for Surrey, and is now in residence at Oxford University. His average for Repton was over 49 runs per innings. High averages were also obtained by G. B. Raikes, of Shrewsbury; S. Kennington, Tonbridge; and H. D. G. Leveson-Gower and the Hon. E. S. Scott, both of Winchester. Other good batsmen were J. C. Bevington, of Harrow; G. R. Brewis, of Eton; R H. Raphael, of Wellington, and P. C. and A. M. Bury, of Forest School. Bevington did not do much in Harrow's home matches, but he played a magnificent innings against Eton at Lord's, and was afterwards tried in the Essex county eleven. Considering the quantity of rain that fell during the season Mr. Borrodaile does not think that the bowling averages come out so well as they should have done, but there were several good records obtained notably those of R. B. Pearson, of Lore to; R. L. Sinclair of Repton; J. M. Marshall, of Tonbridge; F. W. Potter, of Bedford Modern School; G. F. Scott, of Fettes; and G. R. Bardswell of Uppingham. With regard to field ng, the reports from most of the schools speak of a welcome improvement. Mr. Bor odaile says that it is always a difficult question to determine which is the best public school team of the year, but he does not think he will be far wrong in saying that the distinction of having the best side in 1891 belonged to Winchester. In comparing the merits of different schools the important thing is the quality of the opposing elevens, and in giving the palm to Winchester this point has been fully taken into consideration.

WINCHESTER played fourteen matches, of which they won six, lost six, and drew two. Batting was the strong point of the side, the bowling being not quite so good as in the two previous years. H. D. G. Leveson-Gower can show the splendid average of 42, and is closely followed by the Hon. E. S. Scott with 41. C. Wigram, the captain of the team, was very successful both in batting and bowling, averaging 30, and taking thirtyeight wickets at a cost of 16 runs each. Inasmuch as HARROW won the big match at Lord's by seven wickets, the great object of their season was achieved, but their record altogether was not a very good one, seven matches out of eleven being lost. C. G. Pope, the captain, did excellent work for his side, particularly with the ball, and B. N. Boswo th Smith can show a batting average of 23. Of Bevington's batting mention has already been made. Of ETON, Mr. Borrodaile can say nothing, but we happen to know that Mr. R. A. H. Mitchell thought the eleven at their best were a pretty good side. At Lord's they were seriously handicapped, Norman, the captain, being compelled to retire from the match through illness, and Arkwright being in no condition to do himself justice. Brewis showed himself a very good bat, and A. R. Studd-the youngest member of the famous family-proved by no means unworthy of his name. RUGBY had a better team than was generally supposed, and it was a great pity that the match with Marlborough at Lord's should have been so utterly ruined by the weather. E. J. Whitting did not bear out the hopes that had been entertained of him, but P. F. Warner, though sadly handicapped by the effects of accidents at football, proved himself a very valuable batsman. Warner, by the way, will captain the team in 1892. The good results of the veteran Tom Emmett's coaching were seen in the fielding of the side, which at times was really brill ant. MARLBOROUH COLLEGE only possessed three of the 1890 eleven, and certainly did not have a successful season, winning only one match, losing four, and leaving three unfinished N. F. Druce came out at the head of the averages, and is certainly a promising player. He stays on at school, and should be very useful in 1892. L. E. Corbett, who took twenty-one wickets for less than 10 runs each, is a left-handed bowler of whom something may be expected. CHARTERHOUSE SCHOOL were fortunate in having the services of G. O. Smith, who batted with brilliant success. He is described as a fine hitter all round, his cutting being especially good. E. H. Bray, another good bat, also rendered useful service to the team as a wicket-

keeper. Repton School had a really capital season, winning six matches out of ten, losing two, and leaving two unfinished. For this highly satisfactory result the eleven were largely indebted to the batting of C. B. Fry, and the bowling of R. L. Sinclair. SHREWSBURY SCHOOL played ten matches, of which they won four. lost one, and drew five-a very creditable record. G. B. Raikes. the crack bat of the team, was well supported by G. Burrough, who met with success both as batsman and bowler. TONBRIDGE SCHOOL had one of the best public school teams of the year, and perhaps one of the strongest they have ever had. They played thirteen matches, of which they won six, lost three, and drew four. S. Kennington heads the averages, having played very fine cricket all through the season. J. M. Marshall was the chief bowler of the team, and good batting was shown by D. Ronald, M. O'C. Tandy, and R. S. H. Baiss. The fielding of the team in almost every match was very good. UPPINGHAM, like Tonbridge, had a most successful year, winning seven matches, losing only one, and drawing two. The school won their match against Haileybury, and played a draw with Repton. The batting of the side was marked rather by general effectiveness than by any individual brilliancy, and the strength of the side certainly lay in the bowling of G. R. Bardswell and S. A. Sharp. Welling-TON COLLEGE enjoyed a more successful season than in any previous year. They easily beat Charterhouse, and were also victorious against Haileybury, while the match with Repton was left drawn No fewer than nine members of the team have a double figure batting average, six of the averages being over 20. O. C. and R. H. Raphael head the list, followed very closely by M. D. F. Wood, who played an innings of 171 not out against WESTMINSTER SCHOOL had certainly a better Charterhouse team than in 1890, and gained victories over the M.C.C. and Ground, Kens ngton Park, and Upper Tooting. A very poor show, however, was made agains Charterhouse, the importance of the occasion seeming to make the boys nervous. C. T. Agar, who always went in first, played very stradily, and E. Berens, J. S. Shearme, and G. T. Powell were the most successful bowlers. It cannot be said that BRIGHTON COLLEGE had a successful season, for out of twelve matches the team won only two, lost nine, and left one unfinished. W. H. Pic on proved himself a good bat, and improved as the summer advanced. He was also a painstaking captain. The best all-rund man in the eleven was H. H. Jupp, who deserved better support than he received. At DULWICH COLLEGE, C. We ls, the captain, played creditably in one or two matches, but certainly die not come up to expectations. The great weakness of the Dulwich team was

the fielding, which was very slovenly. The bowling too was very poor. F. Gillingham was the most consistent batsmen, though S. Douglas had a better average. HAILEYBURY COLLEGE suffered like a good many other schools from the wet weather, and considering that seven old choices were available, the cricket certainly did not come up to anticipation. The team were only able to win two matches, the want of a good fast bowler being sadly felt. The fielding, however, was excellent. LANCING COLLEGE had a fairly successful year, winning four matches, losing five, and drawing two. H. Hallward, the captain, was decidedly the best bat in the team. RADLEY SCHOOL did very well indeed, only losing four matches out of fourteen. Nothing exceptional was done, but E. Y. Orlebar proved very useful both as batsman and bowler. B. H. D. Oxenden also bowled well. Rossall SCHOOL, on the other hand, did very badly, failing to win a single match during the season. The ill-success was attributed in a considerable degree to bad fielding, the eleven taking no pains to perfect thems-lves in this important part of the game. There were two or three fairly good batsmen on the side, but the averages were in no way remarkable.

ETON V. WINCHESTER.

The game was delayed on the first day by several showers of rain, but the Etonians, who won the toss and went in first, made poor use of their opportunity. Though having to bowl and field with a wet ball, the Wykehamists got rid of their opponents in about two hours for 145. Arkwright, who was probably the best all-round cricketer on the side, hit finely for 59, but Studd and France-Hayhurst were the only other batsmen to offer any resistance. Morres, who was included in the Winchester team in the place of J. R. Mason indisposed, bowled very well and took four wickets for 57 runs. At the drawing of stumps Winchester had scored 155 for six wickets, and thus left off with a considerable advantage. Rostron, a left-handed batsman, played capital cricket for 41, and Micklem C. Wigram, and Scott hit well. On Saturday, Jackson batted in vigorous style and the total reached 209. Hoare took four wickets for 49 runs. Going in a second time in a m nority of 64, Eton commenced by losing four wickets for 18 runs, and then a brilliant stand was made by Arkwright and Hoare. In fifty minutes the two batsmen added 85 runs before Hoare was smartly run out. Afterwards the Winchester bowlers held the upper hand, and dismissed their opponents for a total of 160. Hoare's dashing 56 only occupied seventy minutes, while Arkwright played very well for 44. In the whole game Arkwright scored 103 runs and took four wickets, and he was unfortunate after ccomplishing so much to be on the losing side. Winchester required 97 runs to win, and thanks to the excellent batting of Case and Micklem the result was never in doubt, the winning hit being made twenty minutes before time. A noteworthy feature of the match was the fine wicket-keeping for Winchester by Lewis, who, for a school-boy, showed exceptional ability.
