#### ETON V. HARROW.

Played at LORD'S, Friday, Saturday, July 8, 9.-It cannot be said that the Eton and Harrow match of 1892 presented any exceptional features or at all came up to the best of its predecessors. So far as could be judged by those who saw the schools for the first and only time during the season, two very ordinary elevens went into the field, and victory rested with the stronger, the margin of 64 runs in Harrow's favour at the finish perhaps representing pretty accurately the difference in merit between them. It struck us that the batting on both sides was below the average, but in excuse for some of the failures against moderate bowling, we believe we are correct in saying that the wicket, though hard and fast, was not so easy as it appeared. We need not follow the cricket in any close detail, but a few points may be touched upon. Enormous pro-gress was made on the opening day, three of the four innings being completed for an aggregate of 474 runs. Harrow, on winning the toss, stayed in from five minutes past eleven till just upon lunch time for a total of 214. This was in one sense a remarkable score, for the first two balls that were bowled in the innings took two wickets-those of Barlow, the captain, and J. T. Ferris. The way in which the boys played up after such a disastrous beginning was more than creditable. But for two mistakes in the field, however, the score would have been smaller, Philcox, who made 41, giving a chance at cover point when he had made 13, and Rome, after getting six out of his 27, being palpably let off in the long field by Forbes. These plunders naturally had a considerable effect on the game. Of the Eton bowlers Forbes struck everyone as being able to keep up his great pace with far less exertion than when he first appeared at Lord's. He proved that he could bowl a good yorker, but considering his great advantages in height and physique, there was nothing remarkable in his average of three wickets for 64. Eton's innings gave good promise up to a certain point, but there was a terrible breakdown at the finish, the last four wickets all falling at 144, which left the Light Blues 70 runs behind. Far and away the best batting in the innings, and to our thinking the best in the match, was shown by Bromley-Martin, who hit eleven 4's, two 3's, and five 2's, and in the course of an hour and a quarter scored 68. Up to the time he had made 50 no fault could be found with his cricket, but after that he was palpably missed at cover point, and gave a hard chance at slip. He has plenty of strokes, and plays forward in the attractive style which is the chief characteristic of Eton batting. Report had spoken highly of C. C. Pilkington, but he disappointed his friends. With a lead of 70 Harrow entered on their second innings under most encouraging circumstances, but they made a shocking start, losing four wickets for 19 runs, and having six down for 36. At this latter point the game was quite even again, and the Eton boys played up very keenly. Thanks mainly to the steady play of Bosworth-Smith, who was batting an hour and a quarter for his 31, the total was up to 75 for eight wickets. Rome and Torrens then came together, and the latter, before he had scored, was missed at third man—a very bad mistake, for which Eton had to pay a high price. In the course of twenty-five minutes the two batsmen put on 41 runs, and shortly before the time for drawing stumps the innings closed for 116, leaving Eton with 187 to get to win. This task did not seem by any means an impossible one, but in less than an hour on the Saturday morning the Eton eleven had lost all chance of success. Two wickets were thrown away by absolute want of judgment in running, and with six men out the score was only 26. With so much at stake the boys might have been expected to be rather over-cautious than otherwise, but all through the innings their running was marked by a curious recklessness. Three batsmen were run out during the innings, and with smarter fielding two others would have shared the same fate. We

have good reason to believe that Eton had the weaker side of the two. but with a little coolness and care in the last innings they might certainly have made a much better fight. Their seventh wicket fell at 39, but then, when the game seemed all over, some very determined cricket was shown, Forbes, who had gone in with the score at 23 for four wickets, being joined by Bircham, and the two batsmen carrying the total in about half an hour to 81. It was at this point that the third run-out took place. Porter, the Harrow wicket-keeper, putting Bircham's wicket down in a singularly clever way. With Forbes and Lee together, runs came very fast, 40 being put on in five-and-twenty minutes. Lee was then out leg-before-wicket, and after he left, the match soon came to an end, the innings closing at one o'clock for 122, leaving Harrow victorious by 64 runs. Forbes, who togeth out his left for a source of the source of t who took out his bat for 60, played with immense resolution, and it was all the more regrettable that he should have so much discounted his fine hitting by want of judgment in running. The victory of Harrow was largely due to the bowling of Rudd and Rome, who between them took twelve of the twenty Eton wickets. Rudd is left-hand, fast, and Rome right-hand, medium pace. The match, despite the fact that it took place during the general election, fully maintained its social prestige, the official estimate placing the attendance on the Friday at about 15,000 and on Saturday at about 8,000. The numbers paying at the gates were 5,985 and 2,828. On the Saturday, with only an innings to play, there was, of course, no probability of the game lasting much more than three hours. On both days the weather was perfect. In the two elevens there were nine boys who had played in 1891-Forbes, Studd, Hoare, and Lane-Fox for Eton, and Barlow, Bosworth-Smith, Paine, Clayton, and Rome for Harrow. Rudd, who stood out of the match in 1891, played for Harrow in 1890.

Sixty-seven matches have been played, of which Eton have won twenty-seven, Harrow twenty-nine, and eleven have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857 for boys under twenty, which has been rejected. R. B. Hoare's 108 in 1888 was the ninth three-figure innings in the matches between the schools, the previous great scorers having been E. Bayley 152 in 1841; A. K. Watson 135 in 1885; A. W. Ridley 117 in 1871; C. P. Foley 114 in 1886; W. F. Forbes 113 in 1876; A. W. T. Daniel 112 not out in 1860; C. J. Ottaway 108 in 1869; and E. Crawley 100 in 1885.

#### RUGBY V. MARLBOROUGH.

Played at LORD'S, Wednesday, Thursday, July 27, 28.—The Rugby and Marlborough match of 1892 will be long remembered for the wonderful batting performance of W. Mortimer and P. R. Creed, two of the Marlborough boys, who put on no fewer than 263 runs during their partnership. Creed, who was an old choice, made 211, the only individual score of over 200 ever hit in a public school match at Lord's, though away from St. John's Wood G. O. Smith made 229 for Charterhouse against Westminster last July, and P. H. Latham, now of the Cambridge University eleven, 214 for Malvern against Rossall in 1891. Mortimer, who shared the honours of the first day with Creed, was new to the match, so that his achievement was the more remarkable. Altogether he was at the wickets for three hours and thirty-five minutes without making a real mistake, while Creed, who was batting four hours and twenty minutes for his 211, played admirably, though he undoubtedly gave four or five chances. Creed hit twenty-six 4's, twelve 3's, and fiteen 2's, and Mortimer fifteeu 4's, three 3's, and nine 2's. The doings of this pair overshadowed everything else done, and, of course, went a long way towards winning the match. When stumps were drawn on Wednesday Marlborough had completed an innings of 432, and the Rugby boys, who bore their long day's fielding very well, had scored 65 for the loss of five wickets. On the following day A. E. Slater, who had gone in first for Rugby, carried his bat through the innings for 66, receiving some valuable assistance from Dowson towards the close. The side, after starting badly, did well to score 221, but they had to follow on, and as their second total only reached 133, Marlborough gained a decisive victory by an innings and 78 runs.

WORGESTERSHIEF, BATTING AVERALISM AL

# PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN 1892.

WE are again indebted to Mr. O. R. Borrodaile for some general information as to the Public School cricket of the season. Mr. Borrodaile says that the dry weather had the effect of making the batting averages far higher than in the previous year. while at the same time it had a very unfavourable effect upon the bowling, which, on the whole, was below the average. Taken all round, Mr. Borrodaile thinks that the school teams were far stronger than they have been for some years, and he has no hesitation in pronouncing the season a highly successful one. Despite the fact that their match results were not very satisfactory, he thinks that for the second year in succession Winchester possessed the strongest side. Among the school batsmen of the year he gives the first place to G. O. Smith, of Charterhouse, though W. M. Hemingway, of Uppingham, J. R. Mason, of Winchester. aud G. J. Mordaunt, of Wellington, could boast higher averages. Other batsmen deserving particular mention were H. D. G. Leveson-Gower (Winchester), G. B. Raikes (Shrewsbury), J. Burrough (Shrewsbury), C. Champain (Cheltenham), and H. K. Foster (Malvern). Among a rather moderate array of bowlers, fine records were obtained by L. L. H. D'Aeth (Haileybury) and G. R. Bardswell (Uppingham), while others entitled to praise were W. C. D. Turner (Bedford Modern School), F. H. Todd (Fettes), and the two Westminster bowlers, J. S. Shearme and E. Berens. In fielding there would seem to have been an advance, though, to judge from the reports of matches that have been sent to Mr. Borrodaile, there is still plenty of room for improvement.

WINCHESTER certainly had a very good eleven, but, unfortunately for them, half their matches were drawn. Altogether they entered into fourteen engagements, of which they won three, lost four, and left seven unfinished. The brilliant victory over Eton, however, afforded ample compensation for many disappointments. The school were fortunate in possessing three players of remarkable ability—J. R. Mason, H. D. G. Leveson-Gower, and the wicket-keeper, R. P. Lewis. Mason did great things for the eleven, scoring 147 and 71 against Eton, and making in all 777 runs, with an average of 48. Considering that he was not helped by a single not-out innings, this average is even finer than would at first sight appear. Mason is also a bowler of some promise, though his average of 18 runs a wicket is not anything remarkable. Leveson Gower was a good second to Mason in batting, averaging 37 for fourteen innings. Lewis had the honour of being chosen on two occasions to keep wicket for Surrey-a sufficient proof of the high opinion formed of his abilities. Unfortunately, in the first match he received an injury to his hand, which compelled him to retire early from the game. Mr. Borrodaile was not favoured with any information from HARROW, and in speaking of the eleven we can only judge from what we saw in the match at Lord's against Eton. The 64-runs victory on that occasion was well earned, but it struck us that the Harrow team was rather an ordinary one, perhaps the best feature of the cricket being the steady and effective bowling of Rudd (left-hand fast) and Rome (right-hand medium pace). Between them these two bowlers took twelve of the twenty Eton wickets. None of the batsmen seemed to us to possess more than average abilities, but Mr. I. D. Walker, who should certainly have the best means of knowing, expressed his belief that two or three of the boys were sure to be heard of again. Inasmuch as they were beaten by both Winchester and Harrow, ETON certainly had a disappointing season. Their general results, however, come out fairly well, four matches having been won, four lost, and one left drawn. V. R. Hoare proved himself the best all-round man in the team, heading the batting averages with 29, and taking twentytwo wickets for less than 15 runs each. D. H. Forbes, the captain, whose exceptional physique enables him to bowl at a pace seldom seen in school matches, took thirty-two wickets at a cost of something under 14 runs each. G. E. Bromley-Martin, who played a capital innings at Lord's against Harrow, came out second in the batting averages, and R. A. Studd-the last of a famous line of Eton cricketers-also rendered useful service. MARLBOROUGH'S record, curiously enough, was exactly the same as that of Etonfour wins, four defeats, and one drawn game. The extraordinary performance against Rugby at Lord's, however, would alone have been sufficient to redeem a far less successful season. Thanks to the batting of P. R. Creed and W. Mortimer, who scored, respectively, 211 and 106, they beat Rugby by an innings and 78 runs. Creed would seem to have saved all his batting for the big match, for even with his score of 211 to help him his batting average for the season was only 25. Marlborough had an effective bowler in Marley, their captain-left-hand, medium pace-who took during the season fifty-one wickets. It cannot be said that RUGBY had a very successful season, as out of twelve matches they won only two, two of the others being lost. and no fewer than eight left unfinished. P. F. Warner, the

captain, failed sadly against Marlborough at Lord's, but in other matches he did very well, his batting average being 28. Speaking generally, the batting was very weak, but the team could boast a couple of steady bowlers in S. Slater and T. N. Sample. UPPINGHAM had the great distinction of going through the season unbeaten. Out of the eight matches that made up their programme they won five and had three drawn. All round, the eleven seem to have been pretty strong, W. M. Hemingway and G. R. Bardswell being the particular stars. Hemingway had the splendid batting average of 57, while Bardswell took 66 wickets for a little over 11 runs each. Hemingway is described as a fine hitter all round, his cutting being especially good. He has also the advantage of being an exceptionally fine field. CHARTER-HOUSE could boast a remarkable cricketer in G. O. Smith, who, for the third year in succession, captained the team with excellent judgment. In point both of hitting and defence he is a splendid bat, and, in addition to being a very good field, he is a useful change bowler. He has now gone up to Oxford, and the supporters of Charterhouse cricket will be sadly disappointed if he is not heard of to advantage at the University. It may be mentioned here that against Westminster he scored 229, which is possibly a record innings in Public School matches. The best bowler in the team was W. B. Baker, who took 43 wickets. Out of fourteen matches Charterhouse won five, lost only two, and drew seven. The CHELTENHAM eleven cannot be congratulated on the result of their doings. They lost five matches, drew five, and had to be content with a solitary victory. For all their ill success, however, the eleven possessed an excellent batsman in C. Champain, who for seventeen innings averaged 39. Another good batsman was Quinton, whose average was 28. At WELLINGTON COLLEGE G. J. Mordaunt was for the third time captain of the eleven, and the value of his batting is perhaps best proved by his average-45 for fourteen innings. Raphael is a hard hitter with little defence, but he managed to obtain an average of 30 runs per innings. HAILEYBURY had a very even lot of batsmen, there being four averages of over 20 an innings. The strength of the eleven, however, lay chiefly in the bowling of L. L. H. D'Aeth, whose 63 wickets cost little more than 10 runs each. SHREWSBURY SCHOOL played eleven matches, of which three were won, one lost, and the remaining seven left drawn. Though not otherwise remarkable, the side included two capital batsmen in G. B. Raikes and J. Burrough, who obtained very high averages and carried off all the honours of the season. WESTMINSTER had a much better team than usual, and it was hard luck for them that after they

had started well by beating the Incogniti, the school had to break up for a fortnight on account of scarlet fever. This interruption of their practice handicapped the eleven, but they came out with a very fair record, winning four matches and losing five. Their batting was weak and their fielding uncertain, the strength of the side lying in the bowling of J. S. Shearme and E. Berens. MALVERN had certainly one of the best teams of the year, and it was a great pity that they could not be tried against one or two of the larger schools. Mr. Borrodaile says he is certain they would have made a good fight. In C. K. Foster they possessed a capital bat, and C. H. Ransome and W. L. Foster on several occasions did good work. The bowling rested on G. H. Nevile and W. W. Lowe, each of whom obtained a good record. TONBRIDGE did well, winning five of their nine matches, losing three, and playing one draw. C. S. Wood proved himself an excellent all-round player, averaging 32 in batting, and taking 31 wickets. Rossall had a weak eleven, and could not show a satisfactory result for their season's work. A. W. Roberts bowled with considerable effect, but the batting was very moderate, J. E. Fellows being at the top of the list with 21. At BRIGHTON COLLEGE S. W. S. Collins was far and away the best man. His batting and fielding were admirable, and he captained the side with excellent judgment. Apart from him, however, the batting was very weak. Out of eleven matches the team won only three, lost seven, and drew one. C. G. Smith bowled with marked effect. LANCING, like Brighton, had a very poor eleven, and against eight defeats they had only the set off of a solitary success. BEDFORD MODERN SCHOOL had not so good a side as in 1891, but nevertheless managed to win six out of fourteen matches. The bowling of the team was far better than the batting, W. C. D. Turner and R. E. Mounsey taking their wickets at a very low cost. Of the two Scotch schools, Loretto and Fettes, a few words may be said in conclusion. For Loretto D. McLachlan was the best bat, and Cowan and Swanston the best bowlers. The latter took more wickets than his colleague, but Cowan had rather the better average. At Fettes E. P. Thomson proved very useful in batting, his average being 33. He is a very steady sound player, particularly strong on the leg side. Far and away the best bowler was Todd, whose 36 wickets cost less than 10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> runs each.

Mason's first innings was, for a school batsman, an extraordinary display. Going in first he was the eighth man out, the total when he left standing at 223.
