PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1896.

BEFORE plunging into the subject of this article, I should first like to thank the many friends who have furnished me with the necessary statistics, and with much valuable criticism of the various school elevens, for without the latter this article could hardly have been written, as personal observation has been unfortunately impossible. There is one point which has been brought somewhat prominently before my attention in several cases, and that is the strength of some second elevens. This seems to me to be a feature which is much neglected in school organisations, and yet to be one which must have a very important bearing in the first elevens of the future, as it is from the second elevens and twenty-twos of one year, that the next year's first eleven is generally recruited; and I cannot help thinking that a great impetus would be given to school cricket if second eleven matches were more frequently played—if, for instance, when Clifton meets Cheltenham at Clifton, the second elevens fought it out at Cheltenham. In some cases, e.g. the sacred Eton v. Harrow at Lord's, this would not be possible, but if such matches were regularly arranged, the competition for a second eleven cap would be as keen as for the school colours. Yet another suggestion I should like to make, inspired by the remark of a parent, a keen cricketer himself, of an equally keen youngster: said he: "I was so sorry to have "to send my boy to———(a famous public school) at Easter, because he "will lose so much of his cricket." Inquiry elicited the fact that the boy, aged about 14, had shown much promise last year, had been carefully coached, and would certainly under similar tuition have made great strides, whereas in the large world of a large school, his identity would be swamped, he would receive no coaching, he would have to practice on rough wickets with a superfluity of bowlers, and his games would be the ordinary half-holiday "pick-up," when he might or might not get a chance of distinguishing himself. This set me thinking whether it would be impossible for public school authorities to establish a sort of kindergarten for the young and promising, where good wickets would be provided as well as experienced teaching; for, to tell the truth, the ordinary professional bowler knows little or nothing about coaching. He bowls very well and is a very good fellow, but he has probably been bowling at the nets all his life, and has no practical knowledge of batting. He would generally, if it were possible, bowl himself out a great deal oftener than the boys he endeavours to coach. Such a nursery for colts would, I am

sure, be invaluable if the scheme could be properly organised and adequately supervised. What school will try it first? As far as I know, such an institution does not exist at present; yet it is between 14 and 16 that a boy's cricket is made, and if he is really full of cricket he ought to have a chance of getting his school colours at the latter age. Yet one word more; while you are coaching the batting, don't forget the bowling. Boys are allowed to pound away at the nets with never a hint from an old hand as to the subtleties of the art, and if they are to learn those subtleties, each bowler at a net-say two boys and a good professional-should bowl in overs—say four balls consecutively. As things are generally managed, A, B and C bowl a ball alternately, or according as the ball is thrown back to them, and there is no opportunity of experimenting as to the effects of a change of pace or pitch, or of finding out the weak point of a batsman. It is not surprising, that, with such a desultory system of bowling at practice, amateur bowlers of any merit, should be so scarce. But let A bowl four balls, coached by the professional as to what to do, or try to do, with each, while the batsman's weakness is pointed out to him, and let B and C follow in turn, and I will guarantee that both batsman and bowler will have a very profitable and interesting half-hour's practice, under, to some extent, match conditions. I had hardly written the last sentence when a letter reached me from an old "light-blue," a master at a famous cricketing school, imploring me to "fulminate, with all my power against the system of bowling at private schools, as nine out of ten promising young bowlers are spoilt there by having to bowl too much at the ages of 12, 13 and 14, just when they are most unfit, physically, to undergo any strain. My experience (he continues) is that I have never seen a youngster, who was reported to be a great bowler at his private school, produce any result afterwards. They ought to be made to bowl under-hand, and not try over-hand till they are 15 or 16." Without absolutely endorsing the last sentence, I cannot help thinking that there is something in it, agreeing also with my correspondent that a promising youngster is often dreadfully overworked, even when a small ball is used, as is now generally the case.

Of all the jobs I ever tackled, I never came across a harder one than the task of finding out to which school may be assigned the honour of being, probably, the best school of the year. The "in-and-out-running" has been extraordinary, and the way strong sides showed their worst form, and weak sides their best form in inter-school matches, provides a riddle which might puzzle an Œdipus. For example, Harrow was apparently stronger than Eton, but developing an inability to play some lobs which did not look very ferocious, had the worst of the encounter. Westminister had a capital side, but was unmercifully beaten by the Charterhouse eleven, which a good judge describes as decidedly mediocre. Cheltenham had a beautiful eleven, and easily disposed of Clifton and Marlborough, though the second innings against Clifton was anything but glorious; yet Haileybury, only a moderate side, played a drawn game with them at Lord's, which either side might have won. Yet Wellington defeated Haileybury with consummate ease, and if this result was accurate, Wellington was one of the strongest schools, though judging from figures, i.e., results and averages, it was nothing out of the way. The most glowing reports came from Cheltenham and Uppingham, and as many good judges have told me what powerful sides they were, I cannot help thinking that in a "League Competition" they would have headed the list. Both schools have beautiful grounds which lend themselves to high scoring—the Uppingham average per innings working out at about 350, and the Cheltenham at about 330, but the Midland school has the better bowling average. Both beat Haverford (U.S.A.) pretty easily. Cheltenham had the more consistent side in batting, with five averages between 34 and 52; Uppingham two most brilliant averages of 84 and 71, with a 49 to follow. Under these conditions, I am just inclined, if I must give a verdict, to back steadiness against brilliancy, and support Cheltenham. Tarry a moment; there is something else. Cheltenham had nothing the best of the draw with Haileybury, and Uppingham beat that learned school by seven wickets. If this line is a true one, Uppingham must have the verdict, and to Uppingham I assign the first place, and with the shortest of intervals, Cheltenham. Neither school lost a match; Uppingham had a wicket-keeper (Taylor) described as invaluable; while Cheltenham's (Best) was first-rate. What a pity the two schools did not meet on a perfect wicket! Eton, Harrow, Rugby and Winchester seem to be the next batch of examinees. - Winchester beat Eton handsomely, and Eton had the best of the draw with Harrow, which facts seem to simplify matters—but they don't! Eton's severe defeat was due to the big first innings of the Wykehamists, whom the Eton captain sent in to bat first, a policy which I, for one, regard as more suicidal in a school match than in any other, because the question of nerve is never more important. Apart from this, however, the Winchester figures are much better than Eton's as far as batting is concerned, and much inferior with regard to bowling, the result of the splendid Winchester wickets, described to me as so good that you may take 30 per cent. off the scores, and a bit, I presume, off the bowlers' analysis, in their favour. Haverford again gives no line, so Winchester may fairly go third, and Eton shall be bracketed with Harrow in Wisden's as at Lord's, for the Harrow boys were not beaten in the great match, have a very good record all round, and a very handsome list of averages. If they had only been able to play lobs—and this inability is rare in Harrow boys—they would hardly have had the worst of the match in the end. The Rugby team were so slow in showing their true form, that they must be placed behind this trio, and be content with the sixth place, though they came with a rush at the finish and gave poor Marlborough a merciless drubbing. Their earlier matches by the way were marked by some very eccentric catching. or rather missing—the improvement in this department seems to have been the turning point in their fortunes. Clifton may fairly claim to be equal with Rugby, though if their match with Cheltenham, and the Cheltenham-Marlborough, and Rugby-Marlborough games be collated, Rugby has the best of the deal. In Noton the Clifton boys had a superb wicket keeper, and a sound batsman, while Steinthall had an average of over 70, backed by seven others of more than 20; uncertain fielding weakened the team, and the Cheltenham match was lost through dropped catches. I bracket them with Rugby, and Rugby need not blush for their compeers. For the eighth place there is an alarming number of competitors, but I give it, as last year, to Marlborough, for the team was thoroughly useful and did some good performances, though Rugby, as my

correspondent writes, "humiliated them;" yet a side which plays good matches, and has seven men with averages varying from 29.86 to 20.1, with three more double figures to follow, must have had some batting, and Lewis was undoubtedly a good bowler. Now for No. 9; Wellington beat Charterhouse: Charterhouse beat Westminster; ergo-No, the syllogism does not hold good with regard to cricket. Westminster had three sound bats, two excellent and successful bowlers, and a good wicket-keeper, besides some useful stuff in the tail, and I cannot believe that the hammering they got from Charterhouse-a medium team, at the best-was true form. With a new ground-man and a much improved ground, Westminster cricket has made a new and improved start, and their eleven is hereby bracketed with Malvern and Wellington, and is not improbably the best of the three. Good fielding, and brilliant catching gave the Wellingtonians a fine record, and it does a cricketer's heart good to hear of marked brilliancy in this department; but, with the exception of Elliot who made a century against Haileybury, the batting was not remarkable. Malvern had two good bats in White and Short, two very good bats in Day and Foster, besides a capital team of four bowlers; they beat Haverford and "made hares" of Repton, but in view of their other performances and the news I have of the team I cannot rank them any higher, though Foster, I am told, is sure to follow in the steps of his brother H. K., and get his "blue" at Oxford. The Haileybury side was good, and like the guinea-pig, tail-less; yet as Wellington and Uppingham beat them easily, and Haverford (U.S.A.) had quite the best of a drawn game, I cannot help thinking that the draw with Cheltenham was a little bit of a fluke, especially as tight fits are getting proverbial in this match. Charterhouse must not be offended at being put as low as thirteenth. Their new captain writes that "they have lost their score book" (this is a fairly common epidemic), so that there are no figures forthcoming to guide one, and I gather from other sources that they prefer "pleasant punching to assiduous drudgery," during the hours of practice; yet weak as the side was it had two excellent batsmen in Wreford-Brown and Barrington.

Repton, Rossall, Sherborne and Tonbridge may be considered next. Repton, with only two old choices, were a very young lot full of promise, and the season opened hopefully, but the team fell to pieces and suffered disastrously at the hands of Malvern, Haverford, and Uppingham; still the young hands will be old hands next year, and there is every hope that some new Frys and Palairets may come to the fore. Rossall beat Shrewsbury with ease, and drew with Loretto, but the side was not strong, save for the powers of Wilson the captain, who not only handled his forces well, but headed both bowling and batting averages, having excellent figures in each. Sherborne too had a very decent side, containing two good bats and a good bowler, but, while defeating Bradfield, they fell before St. Paul's, which school by the way must be added to this group, having one first-rate bat in Littlejohn, and defeating Lancing and Bedford Grammar School as well as Sherborne. The bitter cry of Tonbridge is that they can get none of the better schools to play them, which is to be deplored, as the Tonbridge cricket has been of a very good class lately, and in their non-school matches they play really strong sides, and generally render a good account of themselves. It is so hard to differentiate among the schools of this class that I give up the task and place them in a bunch, as they seem to have been pretty much of a muchness, and at the same time inferior to the former batch.

Bedford Grammar School had a useful side, Twiss, with an average of 67, being a more than average bat, and Palmer an equally successful bowler. Consequently the season was a satisfactory one for them while from the Modern School of the same town comes news of a really sound bat in Richmond, of whom good judges speak very highly. The record of inter-school matches, however, seems to show that there was a limited number of Richmonds in the field. Nothing very awe-inspiring comes from Bradfield, and losses predominated over wins, but the bowling figures worked out pretty well; it is rather hard, however, to judge of a school side that only plays one two-day match. It is hard under these conditions to recover from a bad start. Brighton College played an equal number of wins and losses, defeating St. Paul's and Lancing, but falling a prey to Dulwich. Smith was their best bat and their second best bowler, but Macleod had a very happy knack of "coming off" in the school matches. Dulwich strikes my fancy as being the best of this group, and should perhaps have been promoted to the previous one, as they beat St. Paul's and Brighton, and had the best of the draw with Tonbridge, scoring 190 before the first wicket fell; still the averages rule low, though Gibson was a bowler of more than ordinary merit. In the Lancing eleven were, apparently, three good bats and one good bowler, but the side had to succumb both to Brighton and St. Paul's, and of its other engagements no news has arrived. Merchant Taylor's School had to put up with a good many defeats in their school engagements, but had a nice little side for all that; it was, however, rather a "two-man" side, as Crawford and Hosken headed both batting and bowling averages, and were a long way ahead of their comrades. Crawford, a left-hander, is spoken of very highly in all departments of the game, and ought to be very valuable to his school next year. From Radley comes news of a weak side, especially in batting, though useful fielding helped to pull them through, but Portman, who, as I know from experience, is quite a good cricketer, was head and shoulders above the rest of the side, and his bowling is really excellent. The same applies to Crawford (V.F.S.), of Whitgift, whose name is so well known in cricket côteries. With so powerful a chieftain to lead them, Whitgift had a very successful year, Heinman, Sheppard and Humble giving Crawford plenty of useful support. I leave these schools in alphabetical order.

With these somewhat desultory remarks we may glance at some of the individual performers of the year. Batsmen naturally had a fine time, and we find eight averages of over 50, fifteen of over 40, nineteen above 30, and seventy-two between 20 and 30; there has clearly been plenty of leather hunting this year. The top average (84.6) falls to Taylor of Uppingham, his schoolmate, Parkes, and Steinthall of Clifton running up with 71. Twiss, of Bedford Grammar School, averaged 67, and Kingston, of Blair Lodge, 64. These are the actual biggest, but to say who was the crack bat of the year would be hard. Barratt and Champain, both of Cheltenham, not only did well at school, but also for Hants and Gloucestershire respectively. Vibart, of Harrow, is also spoken of as a first-rate bat, and of course Crawford's—the Whitgift Crawford's—claims to the premiership are very high. Gibson (Winchester) has a fine average (55.6) and was un-

doubtedly a splendid school bat, but he failed when he was tried for Leicestershire; and one might go on with this list for some time, as both Malvern and Westminster had two men apiece who are spoken of as first-rate. But the test to be applied in all these cases is—what sort of bowling have the batsmen had to meet, and on what kind of wickets have they played? Bearing this in mind I should be tempted to group Barrett, Vibart, Taylor and Parkes as the pick of the basket; with Champain, Foster (Malvern), Crawford (Whitgift), and Steinthall to follow, refusing to pry more curiously into the question.

The bowlers have not such good figures, as is natural in a year of high scoring, but figures in this case are very misleading, as the large and wellknown schools are always visited by a higher class of batsmen than the others. Crawford of Whitgift, for instance, secured 80 wickets for 74 runs a-piece, but there was seldom any really good batting against him, and had he played against Uppingham or Cheltenham a different tale might have been told, though it is equally possible the batsmen's averages might have suffered. I regard the performance of Ward of Eton (11.05) as distinctly better; likewise those of the Uppingham boys, Hind (49 for 13.63) and Wilson (55 for 13.65), and it is a real treat to hear that the latter is a lob-bowler with most of his fields on the on-side. Dowson (Harrow) had not trained much, owing to ill-health, but his schoolfellow Cole is very well spoken of, as are Fisher and More of Westminster, Lewis of Marlborough, Du Bouley of Cheltenham, Wright of Malvern, and especially Spencer of Rugby. These are probably the best bowlers of the year, but it is impossible to give more than a general verdict. Of the fielding, good reports arrive, but there seems to have been some shaky catching, due no doubt to the hardness of the hitting on the fast wickets. Wicket-keepers deserve a word, as they have had many a hard knock this year. Noton (Clifton) is spoken of as admirable; also Best (Cheltenham), Singh (Rugby), Henley (Harrow), and Taylor (Uppingham). I have heard such glowing accounts of Noton, Best and Taylor that they are probably not merely the best of the year, but also a long way above the usual school standard.

Of the Scotch schools Loretto proved the champion, but their success over Blair Lodge-probably the better school-was lucky. Loretto had 11 runs to the good on the first innings; Blair Lodge forced the pace at the second attempt, closed their innings with one wicket down for 73, and had nine of the enemy out for 43 when time was called. Though the result of the game lost Blair Lodge the championship—the luck being against them all through the match-it is very pleasant to hear them speak highly of the chivalrous way in which Loretto played the game. The Loretto batting does not seem strong on paper but the bowling was good and Orr's average-86 wickets for 7.4-is really remarkable, and he had some useful coadjutors. Blair Lodge had two especially excellent batsmen in Kingston and Elborough, their averages being 64 and 50 respectively, and they made runs in almost every match and made them well. Kingston being a capital bowler into the bargain. Merchiston comes third, Fasson (who goes to Cambridge) being a good defensive bat, and Jones and Duncan good bowlers, the former variable, but on his day very difficult. Fettes takes the fourth place, and with four batsmen who have averages of over 25 and a couple of good bowlers in Lindsay and Lumsden

might well have expected to be higher. Mitford is spoken of as a really fine bat, though inclined to be impatient, and Turner was a useful defensive player. Edinburgh Academy beat Glenalmond, but succumbed to the other four schools, and as their best batsman had not a higher average than 161 and there was nothing remarkable in the bowling, fifth is probably their right place. They do not seem to play as many matches as the other schools. As happened last year, no answer has been sent me from Glenalmond; since however, they lost all their games for the championship, they may have reflected on the golden quality that belongs to silence.

ETON v. HARROW.

Played at LORD'S, Friday, Saturday, July 10, 11.—For the third year in succession and for the seventh time in the last 15 years, the Eton and Harrow match at Lord's had to be left unfinished. It is a thousand pities that a game so eagerly looked forward to at both schools, should so frequently be drawn, but the only remedy is to allot three days to the game instead of two, and to this there seems to be some insuperable objection. The change, however, if practicable, would be in every way an improvement, the boys under present arrangements being subjected to a strain to which mature players would never consent. Cricket from eleven o'clock in the morning until seven in the evening, with the boys at high tension all the time, is really too much of a good thing. The game so far as it went, was by no means in accordance with expectation. Inasmuch as Harrow possessed six old choices and Eton only two, the chances at the start of play were thought to be considerably in Harrow's favour, especially as Eton had only a fortnight before, suffered a severe defeat at the hands of Winchester. As it turned out, the Eton eleven had the best of the match from start to finish, the Harrow boys having on the second afternoon to fight desperately hard to avoid being beaten in a single innings. Though Eton gained such a great advantage however, it is not likely that there was much to choose between the two sides, the Harrow team being such an even lot in batting that nearly every one of them could with some confidence be looked to for runs. With the good luck to win the toss on a true and very fast wicket, Eton gave a remarkable display of batting, staying in from just after eleven o'clock on the first day until ten minutes past five, and running up the huge score—in a school match—of 386. Lubbock and Pilkington put on 141 for the second wicket in one hour and 40 minutes, and by mastering the Harrow bowling laid the foundation of the big total. Both batted in true Eton form, depending almost entirely on their beautiful forward play. Pilkington, it may be mentioned, is a younger brother of the Eton captain of 1895, and Lubbock is a son of the once-famous Eton batsman, Mr. Alfred Lubbock. For the second time in the history of the match—the previous occasion being in 1885—two individual hundreds were hit in the same innings. Pilkington making 101 and Bosanquet 120. In point of method there was a very marked difference between the two batsmen, Bosanquet, though a fine natural hitter, having no grace of style to recommend him. Pilkington

was at the wickets about two hours and 50 minutes, and Bosanquet half an hour less. At the close of the first day's play Harrow had lost four wickets for 64, and thus on the Saturday had an altogether thankless task before them. They had no chance of winning the game and every probability of losing it. Thanks to the fine hitting of Wyld and the steady defence of Dowson, 101 runs were put on for the ninth wicket, but for all that Harrow's first innings was finished off by quarter to two for 218. The chief cause of this breakdown was the bowling of Mitchell, who had the truly remarkable average, with lobs, of six wickets for 44 runs. He bowled with great judgment and was never afraid to pitch up. Harrow followed on after luncheon against a balance of 168, and when just before four o clock, there were four wickets down for 65, a victory for Eton seemed pretty certain. However, Vibart and Studd made an invaluable stand at the critical moment. Restraining every tendency to hit, they took an hour and a half to put on 58 runs, and, by their stubborn defence, went far towards saving the game. After they were separated, Rattigan, by brilliant hitting, scored 72 in little more than as many minutes, and at the drawing of stumps Harrow were 87 runs ahead with two wickets to go down. Vibart had never before done himself justice at Lord's, and his success was very welcome.

Seventy-one matches have been played, of which Eton have won twenty-eight, Harrow twenty-nine, and fourteen have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857 for boys under twenty, which has been rejected. H. C. Pilkington's 101 and B. J. T. Bosanquet's 120 in 1896 were the eleventh and twelfth three-figure innings in the matches between the schools, the previous great scorers having been E. Bayley 152 in 1841; A. K. Watson 135 in 1885; A. W. Ridley 117 in 1871; C. P. Foley 114 in 1886; W. F. Forbes 113 in 1876; A. W. T. Daniel 112 not out in 1860; C. J. Ottaway 108 in 1869; E. Crawley 100 in 1885; R. B. Hoare 108 in 1888; and J. H. Stogdon 124 in 1895.

THE HAVERFORD COLLEGE TOUR.

THE Haverford College team came over to England towards the end of June, and in the course of a five weeks' tour took part in fifteen matches. They met all the chief schools, and of the fifteen games they won four, drew four, and left seven unfinished. The trip—largely undertaken with the idea of comparing American school cricket with that of England—was in all respects pleasant and successful. Far and away the best feature of Haverford's cricket was the batting of the captain, J. A. Lester, who in 14 completed innings scored 1185 runs, with the splendid average of 84. On his return home this young batsman played in one of the three matches between America and the Australians. Bowling was not the strong point of the Haverford team, E. H. Adams, who was the most successful, averaging nearly 20 runs a wicket.
