PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1900.

In offering a few remarks on this subject to the readers of *WISDEN'S ALMANAC*, I have as usual to return my thanks to all those who have helped me, boys and masters alike, with the notes, comments and statistics on which I have mainly to rely in writing this article, personal observation being in so many cases out of the question. Comparison is always difficult as well as odious, for it is practically impossible to estimate the strength of the foreign sides that oppose the various schools, the effect of luck, and in a larger degree the effect of weather and the condition of the ground. Some grounds are, as we know, all in the batsman's favour, others all against him, and this is a factor that may tell very heavily against visitors. But there is one department of the game which is very little affected by any of these conditions, and that is fielding. I had proposed to preach a little sermon on this text, but the captain of the Clifton eleven has taken the wind out of my sails, and has summed up the matter so splendidly that I can only quote his words, "We found in school matches that good fielding got people out just as well as good bowling."

Nor is it particularly easy to differentiate the merits of individuals, but few will disagree with me in giving Dillon (Rugby) the credit of being the best batsman of the year, as he has been tried, and tried high, in Kent county cricket and has covered himself with glory. Von Ernsthausen (Uppingham) quite failed under similar conditions when tried for Surrey. Longman (Eton) is a fine defensive bat, a really fine one, but rather lacks initiative, or rather adaptability, a point in which Dillon was very strong. White (Malvern), Bompas (Westminster), Smith (Haileybury), Harper (Rossall), N. C. Phillips (Marlborough), Yates (Winchester), Cookson (Harrow), Eglington (Sherborne), Hulton

(Charterhouse), Tod (Eton), Mann (Harrow)—these are all names which we may expect to hear of again. Good bowlers are as usual rare; Winchester had a really promising one in McDonell, who should turn out first-class. McCorquodale (Harrow) will make his mark hereafter, also Bernard of Eton, who recovered his "spin" as the season wore on; Von Ernsthausen, of Uppingham, was fast and straight; while other names that deserve record are those of Morrice (Brighton), Foster (Westminster), Renshaw (Charterhouse), Sell (Rossall), Greenhill (Sherborne), Osborne (Malvern), and Hunter (Winchester).

Between the elevens of the select three—Eton, Harrow and Winchester—there was little to choose. Taking Eton as the touch-stone, we find that they only just lost to Harrow and played a draw with Winchester, "which we should probably have won had the match been finished that evening, when Longman and Whateley were set; had it continued next day, there could really have been nothing in it." The Eton side was a little uncertain, but had a fine batsman and judicious captain in Longman, and plenty of scorers in Tod, Wormald, Cassavetti and Lord Dalmeny, who seems to play his very best when that "very best" is most required. The general fielding was good, Barber (absent from Lord's owing to illness) a really grand stumper, and the bowling moderate—Bernard good on his day, Payne-Gallwey useful, but a made and not a natural bowler, and Whately not to be despised. Harrow had improved vastly in fielding thanks to the pertinacity of their captain, and Crake, though soft of hand, had a real talent for wicket-keeping. Cookson is a fine all-round scorer, watching the ball well, and Mann would be in no whit inferior if he could develope some off-side strokes. Bewicke and Kaye could hit, but were a little indiscriminate, and indeed the Harrow side, like that of Eton, was good for runs all through, with a capital bowler in McCorquodale, a useful head-bowler in Wilson, and a "leg-breaker" in Burton. Cookson, further, was the most inspiring and energetic of captains. The Winchester side was a tough nut to crack, in fact only one side succeeded in doing it, for the boys won five of their fourteen matches, lost but one, and drew the other eight. Yates had a splendid average (47) thanks to his consistent scoring, McDonell (the captain) being second with 35, but McDonell's good bowling combined with his wise leading made him the best man in the team; his good-length leg-breakers had 37 wickets for 12.29 per wicket. Hunter again was a good hard-working cricketer, bowling medium pace and keeping a good "yorker." With good wicket-keeping, first-class fielding, and a general super-abundance of talent, Winchester put quite a hot side into the field.

Leaving Eton, Harrow and Winchester, that select and isolated trio, for a moment, we pass on to the next and bigger batch of big schools, whose matches to some extent intertwine, and help, by reflection, to give us some idea as to their relative merits generally. In previous years I have adopted this system of grouping, and have been able to make some way through the labyrinth, but for 1900 the clue is lost utterly, with one good effect—I may escape the minotaur of indignant criticism lurking in the cave at the end of the maze. To change the metaphor, we lose the scent at every turn; we find that Rugby beat Marlborough (the only match Rugby plays), and that Marlborough draws with Cheltenham (Cheltenham having the best of it, *on paper*), and that Haileybury and Clifton beat Cheltenham; yet the Cliftonians only won by three runs, and against Haileybury—writes my Cheltenham correspondent—"we had a chance of winning at lunch time, but after they had made some runs they put us in in a bad light, and we collapsed." It is in these close finishes, and these matches wherein luck plays a distinct part, that lies the difficulty of differentiation. Again, Haileybury beat Wellington, but so did Charterhouse, the victors of Westminster, while Wellington beat nobody—a curious thing for "Wellington" to do!—so that once again we are blocked, especially as Uppingham and Haileybury could not make a finish, any more than could Uppingham and Malvern. Hence, for reference sake, I give the results in a tabular form, so that those who list may read.

Having got the names into an order—an order of convenience for reference, and in no sense of the word an order of merit—it will simplify matters if I make a few remarks about the sides, founded on communications received from competent and intimate judges, and then those who have waded through the remarks without catching cold can make an order of merit for themselves; which process will have the advantage of pleasing everybody, as everybody will be convinced that he and his order are absolutely correct. As I wrote of Marlborough and Spooner last year, so I write of Rugby and Dillon this year, and affirm that Rugby *with* Dillon was a great side, *without* him only mediocre. One cannot over-estimate the value of a first-class batsman to a third-class side, as not only is he the cause of scoring in himself, but he is the cause of scoring in other men; he intimidates the bowlers, he makes runs himself and stops a number of balls which could have bowled his fellows out. Such an one was Dillon, and a left-hander to boot! He scored over 400 runs in 10 innings of first-class cricket, made his century, and stood about twelfth in the first-class averages, his own being 47 odd. Nice boy to meet, he must have been! Oxford is to have him next year. After Dillon the rest were nowhere, though the bowling was quite respectable, headed by Tapp and Anderson with Dillon third. My Rugby correspondent, by the way, is full of wit—he is painfully brief. Marlborough, beaten by Rugby, made 204 to Cheltenham's 205 and then lost five wickets for 62 runs; weather, however, had so much to say to the third innings that the figures may be misleading; at any rate in the brothers Phillips the Marlburians had two very good batsmen, N. C. with an average of 47, and E. C. with 35. The bowling averages pan out pretty well, especially McCaw's, but it seemed to me at Lord's that the bowling was poor, till I reflected that Dillon made fair trundling appear quite moderate stuff, and that the other batsmen made no conspicuous headway against it. The fielding too as seen at Lord's was not, I am assured, a fair sample of the side's real capabilities. The Cheltenham eleven lost five matches and drew seven, not having much luck in the latter batch. They played a great game with Clifton, only succumbing by three runs after a stubborn fight by the tail at a time when things seemed hopeless. I have already alluded to the Haileybury match and the finish thereof. K. R. B. Fry, who made a century against Marlborough, was a fine and consistent batsman, making runs when others failed, as they often did and for no very good reason. In Winterbotham the Cheltonians had a really good bowler, backed up by a good field that seldom missed catches, and were good "stoppers" if not brilliant "dashers." As Winterbotham has two more school seasons before him, he ought with this experience to turn out a fine bowler if he

is not overworked. His analysis works out at 54 wickets for 17·5 runs apiece. The Clifton eleven was of good average merit. There were no very brilliant batsmen, Brownlee being perhaps the most dependable, while the bowlers kept up a fair level. Twice in four days Jones succeeded in getting the last two wickets needed to win a match, in each case by three runs. These were the matches with Cheltenham and Haverford, and the strong point of the eleven seems to have been its steady level, and coolness of nerve. Fuller-Eberle is spoken of as a second Vernon Royle; as he goes to Oxford we may be able to judge for ourselves some day at Lord's. The two school matches naturally bred great excitement, especially that with Cheltenham, which was "teeming with incident, the game going first one way and then the other from start to finish." The ball used in the match was duly mounted and presented to Jones, the successful bowler. To one remark I should like again to call attention, as it points a big moral, "bowling was our weak point, but we found in school matches that *good fielding got people out just as well.*" Hear, hear! The Cliftonians ran out four Cheltonians, by the way, when they were well set. Haileybury can congratulate themselves on victories over Wellington and Cheltenham, and drawn games with Haverford and Uppingham. The win with Wellington was sensational, as the Haileyburians actually made in two hours the 332 runs required for success, 100 of these being scored in thirty-one minutes! Smith and Hodges were the smiters, the former "a very dashing yet sound bat" and good captain, the latter "a sound bat with good defence, scoring fast when once started." As nine of the eleven were trusted batsmen, as Little was a fast bowler with a good length, Burnaby a fair bowler, good on a sticky wicket, and as Long "bowled a good 'lob,' close to the ground, with just the right pace on it," the side was quite a formidable one, Bignell being also a very good batsman. Bowling was the really weak point, however, but its weakness was largely discounted by the frequent and judicious changes made by the captain, and by the all-round talent of the fieldsmen. The draw with Uppingham was very level, both sides scoring freely. Smith's average was 42, Bignell's 37, and that of Hodges 27.

Wellington having succumbed to Haileybury (as just narrated) and likewise to Charterhouse, both fairly handsome defeats, one is not surprised to learn that the eleven was weak, largely owing to the drain on the elder boys who were drafted off for army purposes. Henderson (average 32) was quite a good batsman, "good enough for any school side," and was a first-rate wicket-keeper as well, but after him the averages fall away rapidly, and though the fielding was good there was not much bowling. The chances for next year, when Henderson will be captain, are brighter, as

most of the promising cricketers are staying on. Further, F. H. B. Champain has joined the staff of masters and should soon teach as efficiently as he can demonstrate practically what smart batting and brilliant fielding are. I am disposed to think that Charterhouse was a pretty warm side, with two bowlers like Renshaw and Branston who took respectively 52 and 38 wickets for 14 and 15 runs apiece, with good fielding and a capital wicket-keeper (Whittle), and five batsmen with averages above 25, headed by Hulton (38·5), a son of the indefatigable old Lancashire batsman; he was followed by Eddis, the captain (33·7), and Gardner (31·6). "On the whole the season was the most successful Charterhouse has had for some years," writes my correspondent; Wellington was beaten by several wickets and Westminster by 86 runs, and, in all, six matches were won to four lost. At the same time I gather that there is a lack of enthusiasm in the lower strata of the school, which is to be deplored. I may as well deal here with the match between Westminster and Charterhouse, which was so affected by the weather that after each side had scored liberally (257 to 285) in the first innings, Charterhouse could only muster 94 in the second, and Westminster but 32 of the necessary 123. Well may the Westminster boys regard it as "a most disappointing match," for the Westminster batting was exceedingly good, especially that of Bompas, the captain (49), who was as good as any of his predecessors, "keeping" and captaining well to boot. Be it also recorded here that in the 'Varsity match no less than four old "pinks" were playing, viz., Moon, More, Blaker and Fisher; yet no "pink" had appeared in this match since Bray played in 1872. Bompas, who with many others goes to Cambridge, opened the year with two centuries, and scored regularly. He ought now to get a "blue" to contrast with his "pink." Foster and Harrison were also good, and it was a fine feat for boys to score 212 (eight wickets down) against an M.C.C. team that included Mead and Young. The season's results, however, were not wonderful, as the side got stale and the bowling was never strong. Uppingham beat Repton easily—87 runs,—but I hear that the Repton boys failed, quite unaccountably, in the fielding department, and had little luck. With Malvern Uppingham played a draw, adverse on paper, but "the Malvern second innings (158 for one) was not taken very seriously as there was no chance of finishing the match." Malvern says, however, "we were admittedly a better side than Uppingham." The draw with Haileybury was quite level. The batting was good throughout, Von Ernsthause, the captain, being a fine free hitter as well as a really good fast bowler of the Hugh Rotherham type, while the fielding and wicket-keeping were all right but for an epidemic that broke out in one match, and caused numerous

catches to be muffed. Franklin Smith was an excellent "keeper."

Malvern had an undoubtedly fine side, strong batting and quite good bowling. They knocked all the "go" out of Repton by scoring 218 in the first 80 minutes, and 527 in four hours, but one must write off something for the smallness of the ground, which makes "fourers" easy and catches "in the country," properly so called, unknown. The averages, partly from this cause, run very high, the first ten from 51 (B. A. White) to 15, with a team-average of 285. A collapse against Haverford spoiled the record, the said collapse being attributed to "over-confidence and a share of bad luck." Evans, next year's captain, had a bad season, but White, Sanderson and yet another Foster were all sound bats, Bird a most promising stumper, Evans, Canning and Osborne (29 for 14.5 each wicket) quite good bowlers, especially for that run-getting ground. The Repton team was "young, inexperienced, and often disappointing," indeed, only H. K. Hughes had an average of over 20, but Curgenvin is described as being not unlike Lionel Palairret in style, and Hughes as Al on the off-side, his brother T. H. being a first-class stumper. Army exams. sadly interfered with the side, and especially with the matches against Malvern and Uppingham, which both resulted in defeats. Curgenvin will be captain next year for the second time. Tonbridge, beaten by Dulwich, played a level draw with Clifton, which stamps the side as a good one, though it is suggested by Clifton that the terribly long journey told somewhat on their cricket. R. L. Hutchings had the fine average of 57, but Worthington, who followed, could only raise 26, Bannon coming third with 23. The bowling averages are not impressive, but the fielding was "very fair." Only two matches were won to seven lost, but Hutchings returns next year as captain. He is "one of the best bats the school ever had."

Leaving Eton and Winchester and Harrow for the moment, I find it hard to adjudicate on the merits of these Schools whom we have just discussed. Malvern were inferior to none, the Haileybury eleven was quite a good one, and so was that of Charterhouse. These three, with Rugby and Marlborough, may go into the 1st division of the 1st class. I rank Cheltenham, Clifton, Westminster and Uppingham in the 2nd division, and give 2nd classes to Wellington, Repton and Tonbridge. As to the other three schools, I am disposed to think that they were really the three best, and that there was very little difference between them, so in a paradoxical way I will give them a division higher than division 1, class 1, being driven to this inconsistency by the fact that I was still waiting for information from one of the three when this article was written.

With the schools that remain I must deal in alphabetical order, as the matches they play against each other cover such a wide area that it is impossible to connect results. *Bedford Grammar School* lost all its school matches—St. Paul's, Merchant Taylor's and Dulwich, yet the side did several good things as the season advanced, notably by scoring 200 against M.C.C. in 95 minutes, to win the match. Peel, who goes to Oxford, and Brooks were quite good batsmen, and the former can bowl as well. If results are not very showy, 4 wins to 7 losses, the side at any rate met strong teams and batted up bravely. *Bedford Modern* won two school matches against weak sides, lost to Epsom and drew (luckily) against Merchant Taylor's. In Oliver, a boy of 14, they found their best bowler, and a promising batsman, regarded as the best man they have had since the days of A. J. Turner. Howard, however, was quite the batsman of the year, and had the top average, 30.9. *Bradfield* was badly treated by Sherborne, who ran up 157 and 353 for 6, to 281 and 98, while Radley was also fairly severe on them, but the "Jubilee festivities at mid-term" (does this include the Greek Play?) are held to have interfered with training, so batsmen waxed wild and fieldsmen inaccurate. The batting was certainly weak and unsteady, but Hayward, though he bowls too much to leg, had the good average of 42 wickets for 666—ominous number!—runs in all. *Brighton College* beat Lancing, but went down before Dulwich and St. Paul's, though only 4 represented the latter's majority in a match of low scoring. Lancing, however, was handsomely whipped. Morice was the best man with both bat and ball, but though 19 is not a big average, 64 wickets for 11 runs apiece is very fine. He may be heard of again at Oxford. I fancy that *Dulwich* had a pretty useful side: they beat Brighton, Tonbridge and Bedford Grammar School easily, fell a prey to St. Paul's by 101 runs, but saved the game against M.C.C. and C.C.C. Oxford, thanks to Sherlock's good defence. Averages are not big, but when we remember the clinging clay of the Dulwich ground after wet, this is not so surprising as the fact that Nightingale had the fine average of 33.4. Knox—a brother, I assume, of the Oxonian, F. P. Knox—was second, but his average was but 14, a huge drop, but then he was top of the bowling averages too, and being only 16 years old is likely to develope. Whiteley, a fast bowler with a tricky slow ball, had 45 wickets for 10.7 runs each, and there was plenty more bowling elsewhere in the team, with decent fielding in support. *Eastbourne College* was disappointed of its match with Hurstpierpoint owing to illness: in Langdale the team had a good bat with a good average, who made his century against so strong a club as the South Saxons, and the bowling averages read well, viz.:—Andrews 30 wickets for 14.1 apiece; Barton 43 for 14.72. An

interesting fact is that their captain for 1899, who has been warring in South Africa, will be at Cambridge next summer—if Kitchener can spare him. *Lancing* had but a moderate season. Gill and Benningfield opened well, but fell off, while there was a distinct tail to the side. Gill, however, averaging 26, was a good bat last year, and returns next year as “skipper,” so he may yet make himself a name. Benningfield heads both lists of averages, but Read was the better bowler on the whole. *Merchant Taylors* played eleven other schools beating five and losing to two. The best performance was to defeat Bedford Grammar School; the most exciting, to beat Forest School by 1 run; the most dismal—well there was not a dismal one, especially as several of the draws were well in M.T.’s favour. Raphael had the fine average of 43, and several twenties follow. The bowlers’ averages were Raphael (top again!) 10.25, Robinson 11.61, Draper 11.86, White 15.16, none of these taking less than 38 wickets. Unless the opponents were weak, which I strongly suspect, there must be several Lohmanns or Spofforths latent at Merchant Taylors’. Raphael scored 963 runs, and made two centuries. *Radley*, promising at first, “did not train on except in fielding,” yet Le Blanc Smith was a good bat, averaging 35 per innings, and Worsley was tried with success for Berkshire. The best bowler unluckily broke his ankle in the middle of the season; however, they beat Bradfield easily, and if not a sensational side were at least up to the average. *Rossall* made a bad start, but finished very strongly: they lost to Loretto having had to bowl with a wet ball, but romped away from Shrewsbury, and played a good game with such strong sides as M.C.C. Liverpool, Preston, and Birkenhead Park. In Harper, whose average was 44, the School possessed an excellent captain and batsman, good enough to play for Surrey 2nd, and to score his century for it. In addition Roberts is a stylish batsman, full of promise, and a capital bowler—59 wickets for 773 runs. Sell’s leg-breaks were also invaluable. “The fielding was excellent—there is no other word for it. Very few catches were dropped; the ground-fielding was keen and sharp, and R. D. Beadle was above the average of school wicket-keepers.” Things look very well for next year at Rossall. *Sherborne* had such a splendid side that I wish they had been able to fly at higher game than St. Paul’s and Bradfield, both of whom they beat. Bradfield put up a good fight, heading them by 124 on the first innings; but Bond and Lush made 217 while together, and in the exciting finish there were two wickets to get and six balls to go: the first and sixth balls did all that was required of them. Five different fellows scored centuries during the season, and the top batsmen were Eglington (50.87), Lush (40.54), Rickman (34.47), Wilson (33.77), and Bond (30.27). Birks bowled capitally, doing

the hat-trick against St. Paul’s, and getting the two Bradfield wickets in the match already quoted. Rickman and Greenhill were also most useful with the ball. *Shrewsbury* won two matches and lost five, drawing with Haverford and losing to Rossall. Craig had a good batting average, Vernon and Morgan own good bowling averages. “The fielding improved towards the end of the season, Forman being a really fine point. The prospects for the next season are good.” So writes my correspondent, rather briefly, and add to it I cannot.

Judging from what I have heard, the gist of which is embodied in the above remarks, I can only say, and expect others to confirm my judgment, that Sherborne must have been exceedingly good, Rossall and Dulwich a little way behind them: one only wishes that these three, with Tonbridge, could extend their zone of action.

Fettes, Blair Lodge and Merchiston Castle are the only Scotch schools that have turned a sympathetic ear to my wail for information. Of these, as far as inter-school matches go, Merchiston with three wins and one loss has done best; Blair Lodge has a win, a draw and a loss to its credit, two matches being abandoned through rain, while Fettes has but one win to balance two losses. These figures refer to the full series of five matches: in three matches, I gather indirectly, that Edinburgh Academy drew all three, that Loretto had a win, a loss and an “abandon,” (Loretto by the way just beat Rossall, which stamps them as pretty good), that Glenalmond had a draw, a loss and an “abandon.” The table shows too that no school could have done better than Merchiston, so that they are entitled to the name of “champion,” or at least of “co-champion.” Duncan, of this school, was recognised as the best boy-bat in Scotland; his aggregate was 862 runs, his batting average 51, and his bowling analysis gives 6 wickets, costing 10.34 runs apiece. It would be hard to better this record. Rutherford also with 64 wickets had an average of 9.68, and was really the finer bowler. These two were the pillars of the team, but neither comes to an English University. The fielding was good, and the throwing “powerful and accurate.” Duncan bowled one sensational over. With the sixth ball he got a wicket. “The umpire forgot to call ‘over.’ and Duncan went on bowling, and to the silent wonder of the scorers sent down another six balls.” This took place in the Blair Lodge match which Merchiston lost by 11 runs, the immediate cause being two miraculous catches in the long-field made by Holzmann. There was nothing very remarkable about the Blair Lodge batting, Kirkwood and Thorburn being the best, Thorburn, Scott and Jones being the best bowlers, and with remarkable averages, but I fancy that Scotch bowling is

largely made by Scotch weather and Scotch wickets. The Blair-lodge season was quite a success, though somewhat marred by bad judgment in running. Merchiston, by the way, won 9 matches and lost 3, while "cricket at Merchiston steadily improves both in quality and popularity." Good! My Fettes correspondent sums up the school eleven very laconically: "the fielding was weak, the batting and bowling only moderate;" however, they beat Blair Lodge very handsomely. Burton (Capt. for 1900 & 1901) was the best batsman, closely run by Thomson and Sievright; Lindsay and Schulze headed the bowling averages. Since the above was written I have belated news of Edinburgh Academy, and find that they share with Merchiston the championship honours, winning two matches and drawing three: this score, by the way, would put the Academy top if the calculations were made on the system in vogue for the County Championship, and my correspondent claims honours for the Academy as an unbeaten team. Hole, captain, has the fine batting average of 63.5, and a bowling average of 8.5 per wicket, but how many wickets fell to his mixed break from leg and off, deponent sayeth not. "A great secret to the success of the season was the keenness of the fielding." So mote it be!

The following will probably be in residence at Oxford or Cambridge next season. Oxford will be strongly reinforced from Winchester, and Cambridge from Westminster:—

Late information comes at the last moment from *St. Paul's*, which had a moderate team and a moderate record, but a capital bat, with strokes all round the wicket, in Culon. His average was 26, and as he was the best bowler and the only one that was trustworthy, it is not surprising to hear that the victories over Bedford and Dulwich were mainly due to his play. Halse and Keigwin were also useful in batting, while Ward and Keigwin picked up some wickets at reasonable expense. So too I hear from *Felstead*, that the school had a record season, the strength lying in the bowling as executed by Wiltshire (56 for 10.69), Prior (26 for 12.65) and Douglas (34 for 17.55). Douglas was also a thorough good bat, getting runs all round the wicket, and making himself an average of 43.46 in 16 innings. Merchant Taylors' however, with the best of the luck, defeated the Essex School.

ETON v. HARROW.

Played at Lord's, Friday, Saturday, July 13, 14.—Never has there been a finer finish to the Schools' match than that seen last season, Harrow winning just after seven o'clock on the Saturday evening by one wicket. Up to half-past three in the afternoon there did not seem even a remote chance of playing the game out, the bat having so far maintained an easy mastery over the ball. Eton started their second innings against a majority of 94 runs, but so fine was their batting that they did not seem in any danger of defeat. The arrears were nearly all hit off for the loss of two wickets, and then Todd, who had started the innings with Longman, found such an admirable partner in Wormald that while the two batsmen stayed together 90 runs were put on. Wormald left at 182, Eton being then 88 runs ahead with seven wickets in hand. They could not have hoped to be in a more favourable position after being so much behind on the first innings, but at this point their batting suddenly went to pieces. Carlisle was put on to bowl at the Pavilion end, and such a complete change came over the cricket that in an hour the innings was finished off for 218, seven wickets going down after the change for 36 runs. Todd, who had the satisfaction of making the highest score in the match, was batting two hours for his 96, and so far as could be seen only gave one chance, being missed at mid-on in the same over in which he was out. Carlisle (right-hand slow), did a sensational piece of bowling, taking five wickets at a cost of only fifteen runs. With only 125 wanted to win Harrow had on paper a simple task, but the collapse of Eton's batting suggested that something had gone wrong with the wicket, and those who had been closely following the game were quite prepared for startling developments. It transpired afterwards that the pitch at each end had been cut up by the bowlers, the wicket, which had up to a certain point been perfect, being thus seriously damaged. It was about ten minutes to five when Harrow went in, and as it had been agreed to go on if necessary until a quarter past seven, there was no fear of the match being left unfinished. Mann and Cookson started the innings in capital form scoring 36 in twenty minutes, and apparently putting Harrow on the high road to victory. Soon, however, there came a marvellous change. With the score at 36 Cookson was bowled by Bernard, and in the following over Whately (right-hand slow) performed the "hat trick," having Mann taken at mid-off, bowling Kaye, and getting Bewicke out lbw. In this way the score was altered from 36 with no one out to 36 for four wickets. Encouraged by the success of their bowlers the Eton eleven played up with great energy, but were not quite so sure in their fielding as they might have been. Eyre played on with the score at 55, seventy runs being then required with only five wickets to fall. At this point Wilson joined Carlisle, and very well in their different ways these two batsmen played, Wilson being as free and confident as Carlisle was cautious. In twenty-five minutes 34 runs were added, and then, having put his side in a favourable position again, Wilson was run out for 24. For the remainder of the game the spectators were kept at the highest tension. McCorquodale was out lbw at 97 and at 104 a fine catch at point sent back Lyon, Harrow then wanting 21 to win with two wickets in hand. At this crucial point Carlisle, who was patiently keeping up his wicket, was joined by Crake. Whately, who from the start of the innings had bowled wonderfully well, kept up his form, but unfortunately for Eton, Bernard—not so certain of his length—dropped one ball too short and another too far up. Crake hit them both to the boundary and the score was up to 118, or only seven to win, when a successful appeal for leg before wicket brought Carlisle's invaluable innings to a close. Buxton was the last man, and friends and foes alike must have sympathised with him in having to face such a position. Happily for Harrow, however, he kept his nerves steady and the end soon came. A single, a four to Crake off a full pitch, and another single, given away by faulty fielding, took the score to a tie, and then a four to square-leg by Crake finished the match, Harrow winning at a few minutes before seven o'clock by one wicket. The cream of the match came, of course, in the closing stages, but in the first innings of each side the play was also full of interest. By some fearless hitting Lord Dalmeny retrieved Eton's position after five wickets

had fallen for 189, and the Harrow batting was in most respects admirable, Cookson in particular playing a beautiful innings of 88, and Wilson, though he did not hit very hard, showing most business-like form for his 79. Wilson and Crake on Saturday morning brought off desperate things in the way of short runs, and were greatly favoured by fortune, the ball being fumbled time after time when there was a good chance of a run out.

Seventy-five matches have been played, of which Eton have won twenty-eight, Harrow thirty-one, and sixteen have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857 for boys under twenty, which has been rejected. T. G. O. Cole's 142 in 1897 was the thirteenth three-figure innings in the matches between the schools and the highest but one in the whole series. The previous great scores were E. Bayley 152 in 1841; A. K. Watson 135 in 1885; A. W. Ridley 117 in 1871; C. P. Foley 114 in 1886; W. F. Forbes 113 in 1876; A. W. T. Daniel 112 not out in 1860; C. J. Ottaway 108 in 1867; E. Crawley 100 in 1885; R. B. Hoare 108 in 1888; J. H. Stogdon 124 in 1895; and H. C. Pilkington 101 and B. J. T. Bosanquet 120, both in 1896.
