PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1901.

It seems but the other day that one was analysing, inspecting, and comparing the reports of various schools as to their failures or successes in 1900, yet almost before one knew where one was, the winter of that year passed, and the ensuing summer with all its pleasant associations slipped away like a nightly thief, so that the old theme has again to be resumed. Not the least pleasant part of the task, pleasant it is too in all its branches, is the welcome sight of the handwriting of old friends, most of them masters in the various schools, who send me their welcome notes on the cricket of the particular school that has the advantage of their supervision on the cricket ground as well as in the class-room. Printed words of thanks may seem formal, but in this case at any rate they are thoroughly sincere, so that I am anxious at the outset to express my warm sense of the valuable co-operation of those friends without whose aid this article would be as valueless as it would be vain. Further I should like to thank those Captains and Secretaries who have sent me the necessary statistics, most of them answering my appeal with a promptitude that was highly appreciated. If others were equally punctual it would greatly simplify a rather complex task, for it may chance that late arrival of a single paper blocks the whole line, as one is not so much concerned with the doings of a single school as with its performances regarded in their relations with those of others. At the present moment, three weeks and

four days from the time of writing, the position of many schools is still uncertain—one—three men short. I only hope they will turn up before this innings is over; if they do not, they must be scheduled as "absent."

With this brief preface we may as well plunge into the middle of the fray, adopting a similar order of classification to that of other years, which is not only sufficiently obvious but has also proved, I trust, satisfactory on other occasions, and consequently grouping together, as a start, the three ancient institutions of Eton, Harrow and Winchester. To place these three in the order of

merit which their figures would indicate, is as easy as eating pie, for Harrow beat Eton by 10 wickets, and Eton beat Winchester by 2 wickets, but we have to go behind the figures sometimes, as in this case, to remember that an accident deprived Winchester of the services of their Captain, McDonell, who is described by a highly competent critic as 'half the eleven.' I do not wish to be sceptical on this point, as I never saw McDonell play myself, and since he was absent from the eleven for something like three weeks in all, he had not the chances of his *confrères*. His figures show that he was third in the batting averages with 31·57, and second in the bowling averages with 23 wickets for 20 runs apiece, while he did nothing momentous when he was tried for Surrey. Hence, making all allowances for accidents and absence, one feels hardly justified in ranking him as half of the whole. I do think, however, that his presence at the Eton-Winchester match—a jolly good match too, and well won, as the game was played—would very likely have altered results, especially in view of the poor show that Eton made against Buxton's slow leg-breaks at Lord's, the style of bowling that McDonell too affects. Winchester was certainly unlucky in the matter of unavoidable absenteeism, and the side is summed up as 'a dangerous batting side, a good bowling side for a school, and a very doubtful fielding side.' At Eton, however, the side fielded very well after the first half-hour, the ground being exceedingly fast and some of the slopes treacherous, while the Eton two-wicket victory was to my mind not quite representative of the merits of the two sides, but then circumstances enabled me to see Eton often and Winchester but once, and then reft of McDonell. Wright, McDonell, Johnson (who got a century at Eton), and McArthur (a patient bat who made 79 against Trott and went through the innings), were all good players, and the bowling up to a good standard. Personally, I preferred the Eton batting, and thought Whateley of Eton the best bowler in the match (but ranked the general bowling as bad), and considered the fielding about equal, Eton for choice. I should certainly expect Eton to win three games out of five with McDonell away, and should have been interested to see what effect his presence would have had. Eton had some good batsmen. I fancied Marsham from the outset, as he starts coolly and carefully, and finishes well, making good use of his many inches. Mulholland might make a really fine batsman, but is a little too keen at the start. Hoare played very useful cricket, more useful than stylish, and the same remark applies to Whateley, both these two being excellently cool at a crisis, while in Lyttelton the Etonians have a hitter after my own heart. If he were coached to play the Lyons game he might be a very formidable man. Whateley is so useful that he might well get a 'blue' for all round excellence; he is a 'mixing' bowler, and recalls strangely his mentor, C. M. Wells. Fergusson was a useful batsman of the

steady, watching type, but Herbert—who once did well for Notts—was rather disappointing, and not particularly lucky. Harrow was certainly the pick of the trio, the batting being exceptionally strong, and the hitting, especially that of Hopley (the public school Heavy-Weight champion) being very powerful; indeed, the last six men more than once, notably against Eton, turned a losing into a winning game. Mann is a good player, and a good captain, but is apt to get in front of his wicket; MacLaren (top of the averages) is full of promise, and in K. M. Carlisle, Bewicke, and Hopley there was a lot of stinging hitting. Baily and R. M. Carlisle were second and third in the averages, only two men being below 25. To back up all this batting, and useful fielding and wicket-keeping—Baily following in his father's footsteps—was a useful fast slinger in Hopley, two good medium-pace bowlers in MacLaren and Lambert, and a slow leg-breaker in Buxton, who was very fatal against Eton. The Eton fellows made, I thought, a grave mistake in trying merely to tire him out by quiet play. Several of the batsmen, fast on their legs, were contented to get the ball on the full pitch and play it quietly along the ground. This leisurely style gives the bowler a chance of resting himself and of trying experiments, as 'fourers' are not the order of the day, but if under those conditions the batsman lashes at the ball, the mere instinct of self-preservation will help to shake the bowler's nerve, and with a shaken nerve inferior bowling may be expected. Harrow, as the Eton boys admitted, was their master, and was the best of the three schools. Of the other two I am not prepared to put one before the other; if McDonell had been present, Winchester might have won; but cricket is a funny game—this remark is not original—and, as I said before, I think that in his absence Eton was rather more than two wickets ahead of Winchester. The interested may decide for themselves which was the better of the two schools, and the verdict will be sure to give perfect satisfaction to—themselves.

Having seen Marlborough, Rugby, Cheltenham, and Haileybury play, I have no hesitation in saying that their cricket was not quite of the same class as that of the three schools criticised in the preceding paragraph. It was of course unfortunate that as far as batting was concerned several of the cracks of these schools, as of the others, failed to come off on the critical day, but that will always be and always has been the case, for the simple reason that luck is an intrinsic element of the game; indeed if every batsman and every bowler was always at his very best, where would the game be? However, in discussing these four, and the other schools which rank in the same group it will be more convenient to deal with their individual doings, and then deduce what

results we may. That the results of a single match are not decisive of the relative results of two sides is not merely an obvious truism, but is incontestably proved by the finish of the Westminster-Charterhouse match, wherein an admittedly weak side from Westminster won a fairly easy victory over a strong lot from Godalming, this being the only match in which Westminster was not defeated. Hence on the *ex uno disce omnes* principle it is not always accurate to infer that the victor was better than the vanquished, for the former may have had an 'on-day,' as opposed to the 'off-day' of the latter. However, from what I hear, and from what I saw, the victory of Marlborough over Rugby was no fluke, for the latter school was largely composed of young boys—they will grow out of that—who were more promising than successful. Next year, and the year after that, there is every chance of a really good side. Cartwright was a really good player, but lost his form as the season wore on; Bolton, Cruickshank, and Cozens-Hardy were useful school bats, without being geniuses, the last-named, with Snowden and Tripp, being promising bowlers. Parsons, the fast bowler, had plenty of pace, but not much direction or science, but the fielding, especially at Lord's, left something to be desired, and contrasted rather sharply with the excellent display given by Marlborough, who eventually knocked off the 240 runs, or thereabouts, required to win under the three hours left for play, the hitting, especially of N. C. Phillips and Watson, being really severe. The batting of Marlborough is not described as very great, but as 'up to the average'; the bowling was very respectable both in quantity and quality, Watson, E. S. Phillips and Napier being the best, though Napier was persistently dogged by ill luck. In this report, as confirmed too by observation, one may draw the moral as to the value of good fielding to an otherwise moderate side, though it may be observed that the three leading Marlborough bowlers all got their wickets at a less price than 20 apiece. Cheltenham, however, defeated Marlborough by a good margin, but it was rather a two-man win, Winterbotham rising to the occasion in extraordinary fashion and taking 6 wickets for 60, and 9 for 49, while Fry pulled out a century—he did the same thing last year—just when runs were most wanted. He, with Bridge, were the crack batsmen of the team, and were far ahead of others. Fry is a tremendous driver, especially on the on-side, and subsequently played for Sussex, while Bridge is a 'more refined player, but a little lacking in forcing shots'; as, however, Fry goes to Cambridge and Bridge to Oxford, we may yet see more of their cricket, perhaps as rival 'blues.' Apart from the three men mentioned, the Cheltenham eleven was not remarkable, and it had to bow before both Clifton and Haileybury, but only after a desperate struggle in each case, Clifton getting home by two and Haileybury by three wickets, the traditional close finish of the latter engagement being

thus maintained. As a matter of fact Cheltenham was quite out-played till the bitter end, when Haileybury had but 30 runs to get to win. The captain, however, probably thinking he had a 'soft thing' on hand, injudiciously altered his order of going in, a procedure that has often produced some startling results, and sent his later batsmen in first, the strangeness of their position and the excellent bowling of Robertson, who apparently found 'a spot' and frequently 'touched' it, causing the loss of 7 wickets for 17 runs, while I am also told that with one run added the ball hit the wicket without removing the bail. The match however terminated as above stated, Robinson having 5 wickets for 18 runs. I hear from Haileybury that the roughness of their 'Little-side' ground so enhances the success of the fast bowlers among the juniors that the development of slow bowlers is largely retarded, while on 'Big-side' the wickets are so good that fast bowlers have no great chance, unless they are much above the average; hence is produced a sort of *impasse*, though there is an obvious means of extrication. The general batting, though there was no great player, was powerful and lively from beginning to end, Reid, Hodges, and Spooner having the best averages, Spooner being only 15 years old and full of promise, while Powell was the best of a series of fast medium bowlers, there being no great variety. The fielding was quite good and occasionally brilliant, though the catching was spasmodic in its excellence, easy chances being often dropped, while hard ones were held: but at Lord's the fielders were in tip-top form, and their performance called forth much well-merited encomium. The match with Wellington was drawn, all in Wellington's favour, Haileybury wanting 120 to save the innings and having only 7 wickets to fall, when the rain descended and the floods beat upon the ground. The hero of the match was Hardman of Wellington, a fine hard-ground player, but a trifle inconsistent, who in this particular match made no less than 177 runs off his own bat. The most trustworthy player was Weston, who is hampered by lack of inches, and the most promising was Carter. Pocklington heads the bowling list, but was inclined to over-bowl himself, so that he fell off as time passed, but Badcock was useful and Nixon very fatal to the Haileyburians, the bowlers being supported by good and accurate fielding, which was above the mark rather than below it. The Wellington wickets, owing to the sandy soil, have been anything but perfect of late years, so that one is glad to hear that the matter is being taken seriously in hand, and the offending sand to be duly dosed with abundant clay, which it is to be hoped will be duly digested and assimilated. Wellington was hard hit indeed by Charterhouse, scoring but 91 on a good wicket and failing to send back more than 7 of their opponents, who amassed 343 for that number of wickets, but the Carthusians were a very formidable foe and will be more formidable next year with probably nine of the

force returning to the fighting line. The batting averages are tremendous, Norris's being 53, and Bruce-Pembroke's 47; then follow two of more than 30, and three that are higher than 20, so that opposing bowlers had a pretty task set them. The bowling is reported as lacking in 'devil' and savouring of sameness, but Branston's 40 wickets cost but 16·55 each, Curwin's 17 but 18·23, and Goodliffe's 26 only 20·07. Norris is a very careful batsman, and Pembroke a hard hitter and driver with plenty of time to become very good. The fielding and wicket-keeping left no cause for complaint, hence the defeat by Westminster is only explicable on the ground that the side lost its head, or, as has been hinted to me, its heart. To begin with, Charterhouse took a strong lead on the first innings, apparently a winning lead, but Cleveland-Stevens by his batting and bowling won the match almost single-handed for Westminster, though on no other occasion did he do anything of note. Such is luck, and the history of our great game! Westminster possessed good batsmen 'who seldom came off,' fairly good bowling with some variety, and fielding 'that was distinctly poor'; they played thirteen matches and lost twelve, but, as my correspondent appropriately adds in capital letters, 'BUT—we beat Charterhouse, and by 91 runs.' Blane was the best of the batsmen, and Stevens of the bowlers.

At this point it will be convenient to break off to compare results, etc., as only the level draw between Uppingham and Haileybury comes, so to speak, into this period and may therefore, for the time being, be discarded: but I must not omit to say a word about Clifton, which school 'cuts in' here, *via* the match with Cheltenham, which it won, as previously noted, by two wickets after a tremendous tussle, in which Clifton, 50 runs in arrears on the first innings, got Cheltenham out for 104, and just won by the stated margin. Miller was the destroying angel, as by a remarkable performance on a slow wicket (he is a fast bowler) he not only did the hat trick, dismissing in the process the two best Cheltenham bats, but actually had 9 wickets for 39 runs. In this innings both Fanshawe, the wicket-keeper, and Sainsbury made three good catches each, and Miller himself a wonderfully good one, so that as the whole side fielded splendidly it is clear to what the victory is due, and in this connection I will call attention to the Clifton report for the year 1900. Miller is a fast bowler with spin and 'swerve,' who promises to be of a very high class, while Sainsbury is a left-hander who depends on a sticky wicket: the former's analysis, 43 for 17·88, is very good in the eyes of those who know what the Clifton wickets are like. Collins, the holder of the record total, heads the batting list and is quite a fine player, as are Brownlee, who made a good score for Gloucester v. Somerset,

and Keigwin, this year's and next year's Captain. Raw, by the way, was a wonderfully effective and constant slogger. Four averages of over 30, and three of over 20, hall-mark the batting. We will now, as in former years, tabulate results and see what happens, though I rather fancy we may find ourselves in Queer Street. However, here is the table:—

On this table, if we choose to take mere figures, and to regard the draw between Haileybury and Wellington as a win for the latter school, as it morally was, we get by 'chain rule' the following order, which I give out of a pure love for paradox, as it puts Westminster at the top of the ladder, thus:—

Ergo, Westminster, confessedly a very weak side, is the best of the bunch, while Clifton, by defeating Cheltenham, has proved itself to be also the superiors of Rugby and Marlborough. These results I do not accept or expect others to accept, though they are sufficiently curious to be interesting, so that if I were compelled to write out an order of merit, I should do so with the utmost hesitation, believing, however, on information received, that Westminster is the worst of the lot, and in view of the in-and-out running of the others should be inclined to class them altogether as being good, average school elevens, which in a league series of matches between each other would have very close results to chronicle. I know that I should be very sorry to lay odds on any one of a given pair, but adhere to the statement previously made, that Eton, Harrow, and Winchester played a rather higher order of game.

To beat either of these three we should have to pass to the next group, which is only rated as third as a matter of convenience, though I fancy that this year they were all, with the exception of

Malvern, inferior to the schools which have been previously enumerated. I doubt whether Malvern had any superior, and am sure that they would have made any of the three 'select' work uncommonly hard, and play its very best all through if it was to be gazetted the winner. The Worcestershire school beat Repton by 252 runs and 3 wickets, though pushed a little on the first innings, and Uppingham by 7 wickets and 101 runs, these being the only school matches played. The batting averages varied from 51 to 16, nine of the men having scored over 50 in an innings, and four having made their century. If the known easiness of the Malvern ground is brought up to explain these figures and discount their value, I can only point to the bowling averages as a counterblast—Evans 53 wickets for 14·2, Wright 21 for 17·5, and Osborne 57 for 18·4. The two sets of figures are quite remarkable and justify the award of one of the very highest places to the Malvern eleven. Evans has of course shown his mettle by making a century for Worcestershire, and is a good bowler as well as a batter, though he has his moments of carelessness when at the wickets. Orr, Alison, Worsley, Rogers, and Balfour-Melville were well up to school form, and in the familiar names of Day and Foster we recognize the rising generation. Osborne was a capital bowler, supported by good fielding and first-rate 'keeper' in W. S. Bird, and the side lost but two matches, one against a really powerful eleven of Warwickshire players, headed by H. W. Bainbridge. Uppingham had quite a bad season, and did not win a single match, though they lost five out of seven; the best thing done by the side, which was young and will reassemble eight of its members, was to play a tough team of Quidnuncs to a single wicket, and to make a good, level draw with Haileybury. Malvern beat them easily, but illness caused the Repton match to be scratched. Only Broad (34) and Ross (21) had decent averages, and Reiss's 27 wickets for 28 was the best of the bowling; the fielding was respectable, and the wicket-keeping of Franklin-Smith of a very high class. I hear of the batting, that it was sadly on the slow side and very monotonous to watch. Repton was distinctly better than it has been for some time, though there were many new hands; worsted by Malvern, they beat Shrewsbury with some dexterity, and were disappointed at not having a chance of measuring bats with Uppingham, their ancient foe. Curgenvan was a useful batsman and bowler, recalling in style, I am told, no less a person than Lionel Palairat; in support he had W. H. Twigg, who bowled with a good curve from leg and hit freely, and a tremendous hitter in the person of Musker, described as 'the hardest boy hitter ever seen.' This makes some of us feel jealous, but if he learns to play as well as hit he should be useful in the future. Altogether Repton cricket, rather under a cloud of late, seems to be looking up: Smith—a fast bowler—got his wickets for 14 runs each; Twigg's cost 17, and Curgenvan's 21. Rossall was very weak in

bowling, as figures prove, while the side also suffered from inexperience, but not to the extent of losing to Loretto, who were vanquished by eight wickets, but Loretto was only fourth in the Scotch School Competition. Illness stopped the Shrewsbury match. Fabel had a good batting average (31), Robertson and Mollison coming out with 26 and 25 respectively, while as to the fielding, assiduous practice turned a bad lot into a good lot, wherein lurks another yet an obvious moral. I have alluded to the defeat, only by 41 runs, of Shrewsbury by Repton, and learn further that the side possessed a really capital bat in Craig, and a capital bowler, on occasion, in Coxon, Craig being an excellent stumper to boot. The bowling however, was as uneven as the fielding, and it is to grave deficiencies in the latter department that the defeat by Repton is partly attributable. Craig goes to Oxford, so he may be heard of again. Sherborne, like other schools, missed its school matches owing to measles 'made in Germany,' but they had a fine batsmen in Wilson, 'a dashing young cricketer,' and two pretty good ones in Lewis and Marsh, who is also a bowler. There is nothing very stupendous in any of the figures, except in Wilson's average of 41, but high words of praise are given to the fielding and catching, especially to that of P. Smith. I quote with pleasure from *The Sherburnian*, that 'We can fairly say that we beat last year's eleven in fielding. Smith stands out prominently, whilst Leigh Clare, Ross, Wilson, Greville and Lewis are also particularly good, and there is not a bad fielder in the whole team.' The praise is high-pitched, but I hear from other sources that it really is not over-pitched. From Tonbridge once more comes the bitter cry of the desire for another school match. A year or two ago Clifton came to the rescue, but found that Tonbridge, situated on a notorious line of railway, was too inaccessible; hence the match fell through. With the exception of Dulwich, who beat Tonbridge by ten wickets, there are no big schools south of London which are quite up to the Tonbridge mark, and disciplinary reasons naturally interfere with and prohibit long migrations. The eleven was not in great form this year, however, but the strength of its opponents being remembered, the figures of the leading players are good. Thus Hutchings, 'a tower of strength,' averaged over 47, and Blaudy over 40, all of the batting being either good or promising, though the bowling was 'painfully weak'; some counterpoise to this is found in the fact that 'the side generally fielded excellently and in this respect was fully up to the standard.'

Again I decline any attempt at order-making, as would most reasonable folk, though no one will gainsay me if I put Malvern right at the top of this group, and of the second group, and well into the first group, with the mere remark that a match between the

Malvernians and any of the sacred three would have been full of interest, and how it would have ended who can say? The remaining schools I am going to take in haphazard order, hoping that a few defaulters may have sent in their reports before this goes into the compositor's hands. Dulwich, as already observed, beat Tonbridge easily, though the batting figures are not appalling, McCloughin 26, Sherlock 18, and Knox 15. The bowlers, however, have a say in the matter, Knox's average being 10, Gullick's 11·90, and Howlett's 15·16, a collation of the facts suggesting, even if one had not heard it before, that the Dulwich ground is not a batsman's paradise when the sun waxeth warm. Moderate batting, strong bowling, and fielding that was 'always poor, notwithstanding much practice,' sums up the side which beat Brighton, lost to St. Paul's, and drew with Bedford Grammar School. Bedford Modern School was not strong, though eight old hands were left over from 1900, and Read had a decent average, as well as Lowe and the other bowlers. Baddish fielding may account for this, but after all 4 wins to 4 losses is not a bad record, though perhaps below expectations. Lowe's 8 wickets for 56 v. M.C.C. was a very good bit of bowling. Eastbourne College had a fair season and a fair side, their first three batsmen all averaging 25 and a fraction, while their bowlers, Young and Lambert, had 39 for 13·33, and 56 for 18·55 respectively; further, they won their most important match by beating Hurst with 21 runs to spare. Fortunately for them, 'very poor fielding' does not seem to have exacted the usual penalty. Felsted—this is the school orthography, though the postal renders '*Felstead*'—had a good four-man side with a seven of tail; thus Wiltshire had an average of 69—total 207, and highest 149,—Douglas of 64 and Mathews of 41. This is pretty hot, even if the bowling encountered was but moderate, and one can sympathise with the regret of the Felstedian Secretary that owing to measles—where made, deponent sayeth not—only one school match (v. K. S. Canterbury, beaten by 112 runs) was played. The bowlers had not much fielding to help them, but three men, Wiltshire, Mathews, and Ashcroft, managed notwithstanding to get a wicket average of 14·5, 15·05, and 16·20. These figures are so very good that I fear one must assume some weakness in the opposition. Lancing lost to Brighton College 'owing to atrocious fielding'; one is pained to add, 'Serves 'em right,' but so it must be, especially as the fielding was always very poor. Read was quite a good and deadly bowler, if a little expensive, and Beningfield (51), Gill (41), and Mertens (34) must have been respectable scorers. Lancing, however, played a good uphill game with Merchant Taylor's, the match being drawn. Bradfield reports 'batting very strong all through, the tail often came to the rescue; bowling, including a lob-bowler, rather weak; fielding really awfully good, as we have systematic practice three times a week,

and everyone is wonderfully keen on fielding, very few catches were dropped, and some clinkers held; we practically beat Radley by fielding.' This is admirable reading, and almost dims Ling's batting average of 52, Hayward's of 41, Young's of 32, and Randell's of 30; indeed some of our crack schools might take a hint *in re* the regular practice and the results to be thereby attained. After Radley had made 276 it was a fine performance to score 280 for six wickets, about half the runs coming from Hayward's bat. I cannot refrain from adding 'Well done, Bradfield!' The fallaciousness of figures is rather well exemplified in connection with Epsom College, whose Captain, R. B. Heygate, won the average bat for the fourth time with 85, while his brother succeeded with 72, and four bowlers had averages of under 20 and took at least 16 wickets apiece. Yet with all this talent they were beaten by Cranleigh, and had the worst of the draw with Merchant Taylor's, though they beat Forest School very easily. Against Cranleigh however the fielding, generally good, was at its worst, which may account for the result. The meeting with Merchant Taylor's was in a sense an engagement of giants, for the two Heygates of Epsom, and Raphael and Dennis of Merchant Taylor's, had between them scored no less than 15 centuries. Raphael eventually made 1397 runs (a school record) and seven centuries, with an average of 69, Dennis being contented with 1073 runs, five centuries and 46 for average, while in addition to fair fielding Draper took 91 wickets for 12·91 each, and Raphael 76 for 14·09. These figures, allowing for weakish opponents, are very good, but when Raphael shows his form at Oxford we shall be able to form a better estimate of their real value. Of the school matches, six were won and four drawn, but no very 'hot' side was encountered. St. Paul's claim to have had no sensational batsman, but to have maintained a level average through the side, which in fielding 'was probably better than any we have ever had.' The bowlers were not phenomenal, but are all staying in for next year. St. Paul's was badly beaten by Bedford Grammar School, but massacred Brighton and won well from Dulwich. Brighton College indeed does not claim to have been more than moderate, as they only just beat Lancing, and went down badly before Dulwich and St. Paul's; the side was fairly rich in bowling, Denham and White the best, but the batting was only 'so so' and the fielding did not get licked into shape till the season was old, though Williams was a good wicket-keeper. Forest Hill had rather a remarkable side; in McIver, the Captain, they had a batsman who scored 1003 in 15 innings, and who, only being defeated ten times, had an average of 100! My memory does not definitely recall any other instance of such an average, though V. F. S. Crawford may have run to three figures, and possibly W. H. Game in about 1872 at Sherborne. McIver is spoken of as having got his runs by sterling cricket, but we shall be able to judge of his

class by watching his performances at Oxford next year. In Henley, too, the Forestians had a good fast bowler, with a break back and a useful change of pace, his record being 61 wickets for 11·39, and his best performance 7 for 43, v. M.C.C. Forest School won two rather minor school matches, drew with Merchant Taylors' rather luckily, and were quite smothered by Epsom, yet apart from McIver, whose biggest score was 161, Bonsey made 112 v. M.C.C., and Guy made an innings of 90, as also did Farmer, though their aggregates and averages were quite moderate; hence I judge that the efforts of the team were rather spasmotic, and that the bulk of the work, or at any rate of the results, depended on Henley and McIver. A very remarkable record came from Wellingborough Grammar School, who lost never a match, and only failed once to score, for ten wickets, over 200 runs, and on that solitary occasion made 196. They got a passable M.C.C. side out for 196, and scored themselves, against Martin and Richardson, 174 for nine wickets. The first eleven beat Bedford County School twice, and Bedford Modern once; the second eleven doing exactly the same thing to the second elevens of the same rivals. The best batting averages are Garne 53, Yeo 48, and Manning 38, while Monckton had 43 wickets for 13·9, and Rollo 35 for 15·1. The figures, whatever has to be written off them for weak opponents—and the opponents were not weak—point to a very good side, 'the best we ever put in the field.' Hurst College does not report a very prosperous season, as of their five purely school matches they lost four and drew one, but two of the losses were by quite a narrow margin. 'A young and inexperienced team,' they improved steadily, especially, thanks to assiduous practice, in fielding. G. Smith is described as a 'really good bat,' and Bird and Verrall as dangerous. W. Smith seems to be a bowler 'of parts'; but Turner 'should have a future before him, as he keeps a beautiful length and breaks both ways'; he got 47 wickets for 13 runs each, Smith's analysis reading 40 for 15. Radley also tells the same tale of the common enemy, youth, which breaks up an eleven during a trying day, and there were plenty of trying days last summer. But Birch, with a nice, easy action, is a promising left-hand bowler, with Smith and Worsley, young and good batsmen, to put on runs. The fielding, 'rank bad to start with,' improved steadily, so that with plenty of 'old choices' returning, Radley has grounds for hoping for a better season next year.

The six leading Scotch Schools, it will be remembered, play a series of League Matches among themselves, with the result in 1901 that Blair Lodge, by winning all its matches, easily takes the pride of place, while Edinburgh Academy, by losing all five, is at the other end of the rope. Intermediate to these come Fettes and

Merchiston Castle, equal for second place, Loretto fourth and Glenalmond fifth. Merchiston and Fettes, who are bracketed equal, did not meet, as rain had an important say in the matter; as the figures show, this is unfortunate, for the match would, under present lights, have been full of interest. The inspection of the figures sent shows that the batsman were, as usual, overmastered by the bowlers, only Burton (Fettes) with Kirkwood and Thorburn of Blair Lodge, having averages that top 30, and only six others can beat 20. At Blair Lodge were the two batsmen above mentioned, described as 'first rate,' with a *posse* of seven good bowlers to conduct the attack, and fielding which was generally good, but at times slack. Their closest match was with Fettes, who were only 19 runs behind, while Merchiston Castle, full of hopes for success, admit that Blair Lodge deserved their win owing to their powerful and superior attack; indeed the Blair Lodge bowlers show such figures as Thorburn 9·88, Scott 10·19, Townsend 10·22. The Merchiston batting was well distributed, Fraser averaging 27, Villiers 24, and Pringle 19, but 'the bowling was of very uncertain quality,' though the fielding was generally good. Fettes had bad luck in being beaten by Blair Lodge, as Burton and Lang, their two best batsmen, who averaged 31 and 23 apiece, were absent, and might well have got the requisite 19 runs between them, but they had a satisfactory season on the whole, all the more satisfactory because it was a season of steady improvement and included a victory over their old-time rivals, Loretto. Jamieson had 70 wickets for 8·15 apiece, and Lyle's leg-breaks 73 for 11·31—very good figures both, but were the wickets always hard and plumb? My own experience, all too brief, of Scotch cricket, recalls a good deal of swampiness. Glenalmond had a good and improved fielding side, and in Ogilvie a bowler who took 17 wickets in purely school matches and had but 111 knocked off him; as his batting average, 26, heads the list, he must have been the mainstay of the side. From Loretto only figures have reached me, so that I cannot record more than that Connell alone averaged over 20 per innings, and that Kideton got 67 wickets for 647 runs in all, having in Ross, Gunn, and Ramsay, three coadjutors who all got more than 25 wickets, all at a less expense than 14 runs each, but again I recall that the saucer-like ground of Loretto is not in the batsman's favour. Sad to relate, figures prove uncontestedly the claim of Edinburgh Academy to the wooden spoon, for their three best batsmen could only claim averages of 18, 17, and 13, while none of their bowlers could get wickets at a less cost than 15·85, which is a high price in Scotland, though low in England. They were however handicapped by the illness of their best bowler, in addition to which the fielding was at times good but not sure, and in some matches very poor. From these reports it would be vain work to generalise or moralise, and as none of the best players are coming South, at least not to

Oxford or Cambridge, we do not know how many latent Jardines, McLachlans, Don Wauchopes, Stevensons, Balfour-Melviles, and Carricks there may be among them. It is sufficient to know that the good game thrives and flourishes, exciting the same keenness of interest in the North as in the South.

After all these general remarks one must, I suppose, pass to the more invidious task of specialising, though it is to be noted that though the hot dry summer was all in the batsmen's favour, yet there is not a plethora of huge averages; eleven have got an average of more than 50; between 40 and 50 are fifteen, and between 30 and 40 thirty-one. But the test which ought to be applied, and which consequently one wishes to apply, cannot be applied, *i.e.*, a similarity of the conditions under which the runs are made. Certain schools, especially the more famous public schools which have a large connection of old cricketers, and are readily accessible from London, are often tried exceedingly high by teams that would make a show even against a fair county, whether they be teams of amateurs, or mixed elevens. To get an average of 30 in a series of matches of this class is of course a greater test of excellence than an average of 70 or 80 made by, perhaps, a really good batsman who finds himself, owing to circumstances, head and shoulders above his adversaries and his comrades, while his comrades often reap the advantage of his mastery over their opponents. Thus McIver (Forest), the Heygate brothers (Epsom), Raphael (Merchant Taylors'), Wiltshire and Douglas (Felsted), all average over 60 runs per innings, but it is impossible to regard their figures as superior to the 51 of Evans (Malvern), the 53 of Norris (Charterhouse), or to the averages of MacLaren and Carlisle of Harrow, of Marsham of Eton, of McArthur of Winchester, of Hutchings and Blandy of Tonbridge, of Henderson of Wellington, and of Orr of Malvern, for all the schools cited play against such high-class sides that these averages, all between 40 and 50, imply very good and consistent scoring. And again, passing into the 30-40 class we find the names of Cartwright (Rugby), Baily (Harrow), Alison and Rogers (Malvern), Fry and Bridge (Cheltenham), Collins, Keigwin and Brownlee (Clifton), McDonell and Wright (Winchester), Hoare, Whateley and Mulholland (Eton). All these players have had to work for their runs against cricketers who were individually their equals or superiors, and though I do not forget that the making of a century implies really good batting, whatever the bowling may be, still there is always a certain relation between the batting and bowling that cannot be disregarded for good or for bad. In this connection it will be interesting to note how those school cricketers have fared who have had a trial in county matches. Evans (Malvern and Worcester) has already made his

century, besides getting a 53, so that he is duly hall-marked. Douglas (Felsted and Essex) had several unproductive innings, but eventually made 61 not out against Derbyshire, so that he has passed the ordeal with credit, as has Brownlee (Clifton and Gloucester), who got 66 v. Somerset. Herbert of Eton played very nicely for Notts. v. M.C.C. at the very beginning of the season, making 65 against Trott and the two Hearnies, Jack and Alec, but he had no notable success either for Eton or for his county during August, while Cartwright of Rugby was tried for the same county but could only get 32 runs in five innings. McDonell (Winchester) made 14 and 32 for Surrey, but failed as a bowler, but a bowler's *début* is often a period of greater nervousness than that of the batsman. K. R. B. Fry of Cheltenham, played for Sussex, scoring 8 and 13 for his two innings. Evans, by the way, made his 107 against Gloucestershire, scoring in all 217 runs in seven completed innings. Having thus noted the names of those who seem to be the most promising of the batsmen, we may leave the future to show how far that promise is to be fulfilled, and pass on to the bowlers.

Taking 16 wickets as the qualifying number, I was surprised at the large number of bowlers who had taken at least that number of wickets for less than 20 runs apiece, for, excluding the Scotch schools as playing under different conditions of weather and wicket, we have exactly 50 who have done that feat, and of these fifteen got their wickets at a less cost than 15 runs apiece, while the average of twenty-six others was between 20 and 25. Again, taking the class of matches played into consideration, and the number of wickets captured, Evans of Malvern, with 53 wickets for 14·2, has certainly done as well as anybody; Draper of Merchant Taylors' shows 91 for 12·91, which is very 'hot,' and Clayton of Cheltenham did well—38 for 13·63—also Lambert of Harrow—24 for 14·79. Miller (Clifton), Powell (Haileybury), and Winterbotham (Cheltenham) had almost identical figures, 43 for a fraction under 18, while Osborne (Malvern), Branston (Charterhouse), Marsh and Birke (Sherborne) got wickets freely for less runs than 20. Buxton, of Harrow, shows 24 at 20·54; McDonell, of Winchester, 23 at 20·04; Udal, also of Winchester, 31 at 22; Whateley, of Eton, had an average of 21·73, and is to my mind, very promising, while Napier and Phillips, of Marlborough, had 19·7 and 17·00 as their averages. As with the batsmen, so with the bowlers: only time can decide: the good men will infallibly come to the front, while the others will find their level in cricket which, if less prominent, is infinitely more amusing. Of the fielding, notice has been taken in the references to individual schools, so that more need not here be said.

ETON v. HARROW.

Played at Lord's, Friday, Saturday, July 12, 13.—Harrow followed up their narrow win in 1900 with a very easy victory, the match ending in their favour, shortly after half-past five on the Saturday afternoon, by ten wickets. As the game was played they were clearly much the better side all round, but while they were seen at quite their best, the Eton eleven certainly did not do themselves justice. There was nothing in the position of the match at the end of the first day, Harrow having, in face of a score of 239, lost six wickets for 181. On the second day, however, Harrow outplayed their opponents, and carried the match to a triumphant end in a fashion that was really brilliant. The turning point came in the morning, Bewicke hitting up 48 runs out of 69 in thirty-seven minutes, and Lambert then finding such an excellent partner in Bailey that in something under an hour and a half 90 runs were added for the eighth wicket. Lambert made the top score in the match and played very well, but in point of style he could not compare with Mann, whose 69 on the first evening was a fine and attractive innings. Going in before lunch for the second time, against a majority of 137, Eton had a heavy task, and any hope they might have had of saving the game soon disappeared, five wickets being down at a quarter to four for 53. In their first innings, curiously enough, they fared just as badly, losing five wickets for 52. Herbert and Whately did their best, and so long as they stayed together there was just a remote chance of avoiding defeat. Fifty-eight runs having been added, however, Herbert was bowled. After he left very little was done, the innings being quickly finished off for 140. Whately, who struck everyone as being the best all-round cricketer in the two elevens, made a great effort for his side, staying in for nearly an hour and a half. He bowled admirably in the first part of Harrow's innings, but was ineffective on the Saturday morning and received poor support. He is a right-handed slow bowler, very like C. M. Wells in style, and has a good off-break. The cheap dismissal of Eton was mainly brought about by the skilful leg-break bowling of Buxton. He did admirable work, and found the benefit of pitching more on the wicket than he had done in the first innings, but the batsmen flattered him by playing with such extreme caution. Nothing was done to put him off his pitch. Harrow only wanted four runs to win, but all the usual preliminaries were solemnly gone through, even the heavy roller being put on the wicket. One ball sufficed to finish the game, Hapley driving Whately to the boundary. There was a scene of great enthusiasm after the game, the Harrow eleven being cheered for the best part of half-an-hour. A word is due to Marsham and Egerton-Warburton for the way in which they played towards the close of Eton's first innings. They put on 77 runs for the ninth wicket. The old choices in the match were Mann, Eyre, K. M. Carlisle, Bewicke and Buxton, for Harrow, and Whately and Lyttelton for Eton. Bailey, the Harrow wicket-keeper, is a son of F. P. Bailey, who kept wicket for Cambridge in 1872. He had the misfortune to dislocate one of his fingers on the first day, but happily the injury did not interfere much with his cricket on the Saturday.

Seventy-six matches have been played, of which Eton have won twenty-eight, Harrow thirty-two, and sixteen have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1855 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857 for boys under twenty, which has been rejected. T. G. O. Cole's 142 in 1897 was the thirteenth three-figure innings in the matches between the schools, and the highest but one in the whole series. The previous great scores were E. Bayley 152 in 1841; A. K. Watson 135 in 1885; A. W. Ridley 117 in 1871; C. P. Foley 114 in 1886; W. F. Forbes 118 in 1876; A. W. T. Daniel 112 not out in 1860; C. J. Ottaway 108 in 1867; E. Crawley 100 in 1885; R. B. Hoare 108 in 1888; J. H. Stogdon 124 in 1895; and H. C. Pilkington 101 and B. J. T. Bosanquet 120, both in 1896.
