JOHN WISDEN'S CRICKETERS' ALMANACK FOR 1903

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PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1902.

Time skips on so rapidly that it seems but yesterday when I wrote my last annual article for Wisden's, attaching the date 1901 and it really does not seem to carry one much further back to recall the very first of the series-the first as far as I was concerned-which was written some six or seven years ago, time enough to convert some moderate school players into regular county, or even England, representatives. And in this connection it may be interesting to see what success the better players of the Public Schools in 1901 had in 1902. Naturally no one got a place in an International match ; such promotion comes to few, or none, in their first year ; nor did any one achieve "Gentlemen and Players," and that is not a surprise either. Oxford, however, found two recruits in W. H. B. Evans (Malvern), who played a really stylish and highly promising innings against Cambridge, and in R. W. Burn of Winchester, who, however, was not particularly successful as a University bowler. Buxton and McDonell, the leg-break bowlers of last year's Harrow and Winchester elevens, failed to secure a light blue cap, mainly from the fact that Cambridge was already well equipped in that direction, as E. R. Wilson was in good form, but an accident to McDonell helped to cut away his chances. K. R. B. Fry (Cheltenham) missed his blue likewise, even though he scored 127 against H. D.G. Leveson-Gower's eleven and came out third in the Cambridge averages; but so resolute a hitter, one who can keep wicket too, will hardly fail to gain his place in 1903. Brownlee, of Clifton, nearly secured his dark blue cap by his fine play against Kent, his score being 103, but though he was "in waiting" at Lord's the Oxford eleven was completed without him, while neither Raphael (Merchant Taylors'), nor Whately (Eton), nor M'Iver (Forest School), got the blue that many critics thought would fall to their share. Still they, with R. B. Heygate (Epsom and Sussex), did useful work in other matches for club or county and have a good chance of the immortality conferred by an appearance at Lord's in the Inter-University match. I make these remarks for the purpose of showing how good a player may be, and yet may fail to secure the Freshman's blue, one of the hardest things to acquire in the heat of modern competition.

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As regards the Public School cricket of this year one may say at once that it has not failed in quality though much reduced in quantity owing to the scratching, abandoning, and drawing of matches occasioned by our preposterous climate, while illness had a not infrequent "say" in the matter. It is impossible to declare what influence the weather really had on actual results, but it certainly tried captains "high" in such matters as closure, follow-on, and choice of innings, to say nothing of the proper use of the proper roller, heavy or light, according as circumstances demanded. The more important School-matches were happily decided under bright and fairly equal conditions, so that we oldsters who were enabled to see more than one of them, were able to form as good an estimate of their strength as it is possible to form from witnessing a single match, in which the best player may have the worst of luck, or be temporarily out of form. But one can only compare by the actual results which are the sole criterion one has, though it is but fair to leaven an opinion so hastily formed with the views of those who have had wider opportunities of knowledge afforded them. Hence it is to that class, the friends and supporters of various schools, that 1 have to tender my sincere thanks for the assistance rendered me in the form of critical notes on the general play of the schools with which they are connected. As I have said on another occasion, it would be impossible to write an article of this sort without such assistance; wherefore, to all who have assisted me-and they are many-my heartiest thanks !

Turning to strict business we will deal with Eton, Harrow and Winchester first, this being the arrangement of previous articles. The results of the matches between these three are identical with those of last year, as Harrow beat Eton, and Eton beat Winchester, both of which events occurred in 1901. I don't think, and didn't think, that Harrow were ahead of Eton by as much as eight wickets: five would have been nearer the mark, possibly four, for Eton lost the match in the first hour by collapsing for 72, though at the second try the light blue boys secured over 200. At the same time it is right to say that those who knew the Harrovians true form expected more from them than even 241. As the match was played. Eton had the best batsman in Nicholl, while Sandeman bowled as well as anybody, but the tail collapsed dreadfully and was distinctly longer than that of Harrow, which failed likewise. The Eton fielding was the better, but Baily of Harrow was quite superior as a wicket-keeper to Warburton of Eton. The Harrow side was a very useful one, with eight good batsmen, MacLaren the best, and three dangerous slashers in Carlisle, Bennett and Hopley. Hopley was a terror, quite a miniature Jessop, and made the Eton bowling look simple indeed, ciii.

while he was by no means a bad fast bowler, though in bowling he had several superiors, especially in MacLaren, brother of "Archie," a capital slow-to-medium "mixer"; to support these were Macan (slow), Barnes (left-hand medium), and Phillips. (fast), with respectable fielding all through. No wonder then that the eleven is described as "useful." Had the weather been fine the sides would have scored largely, but under existing conditions the bowling naturally shows up better than the batting. I should add that MacLaren played in a couple of matches for Lancashire, but had no success, though his fielding was very good. Eton had a bad start, only four old choices, and those the last four, but practice and pains worked them up into a good average side, with a capital left-handed bowler, in Sandeman, and a fair fast bowler, good enough for any school eleven at any time, in Gregson-Ellis. Nicholl was, to my mind. and most people concurred, a really fine batsman, full of promise, and the best of the twenty-two who played at Lord's. His chief supporter was Buxton, who played, to my mind, rather laborious ericket, but he was sound and careful, and in the big match kept his head well when circumstances were anything but propitious. But the balance of the Eton batting was not really powerful, and so lugubrious was the procession to and from the wickets in the Harrow match that some wit wished to know whether the authorities had not sent up the "eight" instead of "eleven"! Of the Eton eleven it has been remarked that it was unlucky in winning the toss against Harrow, lucky in losing it against Winchester. The first statement I can conscientiously corroborate, but so small were the first-innings scores at Winchester, that there would seem to have been little value attached to the toss, Winchester (who won the spin) getting 54 to Eton's 63. but it was on the second day, when Eton had 90 to get and the wicket was plumb that it seemed that the Winchester captain could have done better to put in his adversaries. However it is easy to be wise after the advent, and I for one have never advocated the policy of giving the other side first show, simply because one cannot forecast what the wicket will be like tomorrow afternoon when the fourth innings has to be played. That fourth innings is often the terrible test, of nerve as much as of skill. Winchester had an uncertain side and for some reason or another the batsmen did not seem to have trained on from 1901; Johnston heads both lists of averages, his bowling average 54 for 12.2 apiece being excellent, even though the slow wickets were not very friendly to his leg-breaks. Wright is a really good player-he captains for the next two years-but was not in a run-getting humour, while Brown was a good hard player, and McConnel useful, with a steady and sound wicketkeeper in Sheringham, the captain. No less that four of the Winchester and as many of the Eton team will be at Oxford next season.

Of the Schools in the second group I have little doubt that Cheltenham was the best and that they would have put any of the first three on their mettle, in fact I think that in a match with Harrow the odds would not have been more than guineas to pounds on the Harrovians. Not that the Cheltonians were a faultless side, for their wicket-keeping was really poor and the fielding not above the average, and the batting, as a whole, did not impress me tremendously, but they had two, nay three. excellent bowlers of different kinds, and in School matches the side that has the best bowling generally wins. I should add, however, that those who had better opportunities of judging, rated the Cheltenham batting higher than I did, though they agreed that in the bowling lay the side's real power. Winterbotham bowls slow left-hand, with ample variety of pace and pitch, and not a little break and spin into the bargain. On a hard wicket he seemed to me to over-pitch the ball-an excellent failing, by the way-trusting to his fielders on the off-side; unluckily those fielders were not faultless, and the bowler suffered in consequence, for it is as useless to bowl " off theory" with an uncertain field as it is to try the same theory on weak batsmen; with either class the ball is missed. As a foil to Winterbotham, Clayton bowled fast overhand at the other end, really fast at times, but with an agreeable variety of pace as well as pitch, with a couple of fieldsmentoo who could hold "whizzers" in the slips. He brought the ball back nicely at times, and no better variety could have been arranged for a school side than Clayton and Winterbotham who have now been the mainstay of Cheltenham for three years. Winterbotham goes to Oxford, but business may keep Clayton out of cricket in the future, more's the pity ! Grose was the third bowler, but he paled somewhat by contrast, and further got few chances till the other two had failed to break up a stand : if Grose succeeded, he was rightly taken off and consequently never had a go at "rabbits"; naturally his figures suffer, but he was a good, dependable bowler for a' that. Marsden was regarded as the first batsman on the side, but bad health kept him out of the Haileybury match and he hardly did himself justice throughout, his luck being of the worst. Banks played a remarkable innings of 103, v. Haileybury. The pavilion critics were unanimous in calling it equal to any innings ever played by a boy at Lord's, his variety of strokes and his manipulation of his bat being quite Trumperesque. I fancied that he must be exceedingly strong in wrist and elbow. He had a happy knack too of coming off in school matches. Furze, Brookes and Harrington were also good

players, but the youthfulness of the team makes its excellence the more remarkable, three of the players being only sixteen years old and two being less than that. Cheltenham beat Marlborough and Haileybury handsomely, getting Marlborough out for 19 (!), and drew with Clifton, only ten runs being wanted with three Cheltenham wickets to fall. Haileybury again were quite a good side though overpowered by Cheltenham-that is, by the Cheltenham bowlers. Their fielding was good, bowling fair-up to a point-and batting good, indeed I was much impressed with the excellent way in which one and all played Winterbotham on the off-side, but on the whole the Haileyburians, who succumbed to Wellington by three wickets, had a bad season and not much luck, a victory over Uppingham, a weak side, being their only success. As a matter of fact it was a lively, fast-wicket eleven, and the fast wickets were rarely to hand, while illness helped to cut up the side. Spooner though young was a really fine player, but he had the misfortune to fail twice at Lord's, Hodges was a good player, so was Bevington, though a very slow scorer. Hodges could wicket-keep as well as bat, while Powell and Kinder were useful men. Apparently

the side did not get well together and failed in consequence. I assess the Haileyburians however as distinctly better than either Rugby or Marlborough, for though these two schools gave us a good match, they really gave us very little good cricket. The interest of the meeting lay in the hard fighting, for either side was once in hopeless difficulties, Rugby when they were six runs in arrears in their second innings and had lost three good men, Marlborough when they were called upon to score 191 in about three hours, a fairly stiff task for any school side but especially stiff for a side which, according to the description of the Marlborough eleven, had "no really good batsmen" in it. "Batting on the whole, too orthodox ; no dashers ; no originality." Gunner, Robinson and Colbeck were respectable players, and Church could hit as well as keep wicket, though Horsfall was the most promising player. Brooks was a really good bowler, fast, medium with variations, and bowled excellently against Cheltenham, and, in the first innings, against Rugby, but in the latter match he was none too well, and rapidly tired; in the first innings, when he was fresh, he dismissed eight Rugbeians for 27 runs. Harvey was the fast bowler of the side, but his value was badly discounted by the failure of the "slips" to hold catches; in fact the general fielding of the side was "patchy," and the combined results unsatisfactory. Church did some brawny hitting, of a wildish type at times. Nor was the Rugby team a great one: it possessed, I am told, some very fair players who possessed, in their turn, a knack of not "coming

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off," and of never " coming off " together. The best all-round players were Snowden and Cozens-Hardy, especially Snowden, who batted well and bowled his slow left-handed, deliveries with very fair success, but he was not accurate and bowled many leg-balls in the match with Marlborough: luckily the Marlborians missed most of them, but a leg-hitter of the A. J. Webbe type would have massacred him. Owen, who did not bowl much. had quite the best figures. Harrison was undoubtedly the safest and best batsman of the side, notwithstanding his lack of length : he has the patience of Alec Bannerman and like Barlow "takes a deal o' shifting," Tripp being a good on-side player but is distinctly weak on the other side of the wicket. Notwithstanding Bolton's good wicket-keeping, the fielding of the side is summed up in the words, "usually bad: Parsons was very good in the slips, but on the whole the catching and ground fielding were both bad."

Clifton, as aforesaid, played a drawn match with Cheltenbam after being 92 runs behind on the first innings, a very creditable result; indeed had Clifton lost the match outright the margin would have been a very small one. As I class the Cheltonians, among the very best of the year, this performance of Clifton was good, but it is discounted by a remark that has come my way. to the effect that " the Clifton fielding in the first innings lost all chances of victory." This is rather sad, as I remember that quite recently I was able to quote a remark made about the Clifton eleven, viz : that they "found that catching people out was just as efficacious as bowling them out." The mainstays of the batting were Carter, Sandover, Keigwin and Collins (the six-hundreder), with a highly promising player in Romulu, who was an excellent fieldsman to boot, but the general fielding was shaky, and M. Fanshawe, the wicket-keeper, was not so successful as in 1901; further, one regrets a special note that remarks "this slackness in fielding was noticeable throughout the whole school." Of the bowlers Keigwin, the captain, bowled at medium pace, with a good curl and the good judgment that breeds success; Meaking a leg-breaker, comes next. followed by Brown whose fast deliveries occasionally came off. Bad, or dubious fielding was the enemy of the Clifton side. The scoring against Cheltenham was most consistent and, curiously enough, only three Cliftonian wickets out of twenty fell to Clayton.

Now let us see what Wellington, who beat Haileybury, but succumbed to Charterhouse, has to say for itself. I cannot do better than quote my correspondent's *ipsissima verba*. "On the whole, up to the average in batting, and at times above it in bowling. Fielding sometimes excellent, always good ; wicket-keeping ditto. The team began badly and showed no confidence, but improved.

and played excellently against both schools. Charterhouse was very strong. Nine of our team could bowl ; everyone could bat, and the last wicket was almost as good as the first." This is rosv, to say the least of it, and I am not prepared to suggest that the colour is laid on too thickly, especially as the beaten Haileyburians were a good side, but the Wellington figures-I know the attributes of figures, so don't quote against me, pleasedo not suggest anything very remarkable, except the ourious coincidence that Walsh had a batting average of 17.54 and a bowling average of 17.53. In the school matches the scoring was quite free on both sides, and it was a good performance, attended by keen excitement, on the part of the Wellingtonians to get the 163 necessary for the subjugation of Haileybury, and to loose no more than seven wickets. Carter played well in this match, and also in the Charterhouse match, while Payne, Walsh and Muir were to the fore in one or another of them, but unluckily no personal details are to hand, so that I can only argue from the statistical sheet that Carter was a good bat and Walsh a good bowler; Poclington and Liebenrood are also well spoken of. Against Charterhouse, by the way, Wellington was minus two of its regular players. It is a pity however that only one day should be assigned to a match between two schools of such importance, especially as only one other school match is played by either. Are the respective headmasters quite obdurate? Charterhouse, having beaten Westminster by 153 runs, defeated Wellington a month later by 82, Norris, the captain, did good service on each occasion, getting as near to 100 as 99 at Wellington, but Branston got 76 against Wellington and took eight Westminster wickets in the second innings for but 26 runs. Besides Norris, both Curwen and Branston were good players, getting good aggregates-good, that is for 1902-and having really respectable averages. Branston was the pick of the bowlers, but Goodcliffe was persistently unlucky ; "fielding good throughout the season : L.S.F. Farquharson kept wicket well, letting very few byes." Westminster was actually beaten by 155, but had Charterhouse scored in the first innings as they did in the second, the Londoners wouldn't have had a second. Westminster, however, had a weak team to start with and the presistent rain and cold gave them but little opportunity to improve, especially in batting. Logan, however, heads the list of batsman with more than respectable figures, while Power was quite a good bowler; "his bowling was better than anyone else's batting." Logan by the way is captain for next year and promises to be a really good player ; Harrison picked up a fair number of runs and Greene a fair number of wickets, though he did not train on much as a bowler and fell off as a batsman ; yet he was a useful member of the side.

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Here I break off as in previous years for mere convenience sake, as these schools form a sort of group of their own which is only broken into by the match between Haileybury and Uppingham, of which more anon. Let us tabulate their matches first and see if we make much progress in estimating relative merit.

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This table does not at all help us to pick the winner, so to speak. Cheltenham and Charterhouse have undoubtedly the best records, but remembering the goodness of the Cheltenham bowlers —those bowlers are such important factors—I should back Cheltenham, though be it remembered that I didn't see Charterhouse play and have received rather sparse information about the side, my usual correspondent being abroad. Clifton played up so well to Cheltenham that they must have been close up, and I certainly liked the look of Haileybury, though two losses to one win is not a lovely record, and Wellington can fairly claim priority over them. I am bound to think that Rugby and Marlborough were inferior to all these, and that Westminster was a grade lower still. Let us put Cheltenham first and Westminster last—if the 'pinks' will forgive me—and let him who will, fill up the intermediate places as seems good in his own eyes.

Malvern was another school that had an excellent side; but this remark almost ought to be stereotyped now-a-days, as the genius loci seems to breed, or at least to train, fine cricketers. The Malvernians did not play Uppingham this year, owing to the Coronation arrangements, so that Repton was the only school they met, and on Repton, after being just headed in the first innings, they inflicted a pretty tough beating by 146 runs. Natural sympathy with Repton induces me to remark that Young, out and away the best batsman and also the wicketkeeper of the Repton side, could not play, and that his substitute behind the sticks made one or two costly mistakes. This by way of palliation rather than of excuse, especially as A. C. Bird and

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A. P. Day, the Malvern 'crack,' were also absentees, but as Day's light was extinguished for the whole season he doesn't exactly count. The side was powerful in batting, weak in bowling, good in fielding, and had a capital stumper in W. S. Bird, but its smartest performance was to score 232 in an hour and a half and thereby to defeat a very fair side of Eton Ramblers. Worsley, the captain, is a splendid hitter, one of the best, and his friends think he should get his dark-blue cap next year, but he seems to have spoilt his batting by over-bowling; his figures are certainly not impressive. Those of C. C. Page are good, his average being 53 with 106 as his top score, a fine record of consistency in such a season, even on the easy Malvern ground; against Repton he scored 71 and 54. Foster, Grundy, Campbell and Powell were also well up to the mark, Mellin too being so good a slasher to go in ninth against Repton and to hit up 96 not out from that unpromising position. Read and Powell were the best of the bowlers. No less than nine of the eleven are leaving, but as Day and Foster will be left-names of evil omen to their opponents these !-- there is a sound, if small, nucleus for 1903. The Uppingham eleven "was rather better than last year's side, but not a good one." One good element it possessed in Franklin-Smith, next year's captain, whose wicket-keeping was really splendid. Reiss, who heads the batting list, did one remarkable feat, and just at the right time too, for he scored 90 out of 203 and 112 out of 150 (!) against Haileybury, 28 being the next highest score, and the only other total above 17. His hitting is described as being really splendid. Yet Uppingham lost the match, for Spooner of Haileybury got 131, and Haileybury, 'declaring' the innings with seven wickets down, won with forty-five minutes to spare and 131 runs in hand, the crack Uppingham batsmen failing twice over. I gather, however, that the term 'crack' is misleading and that the general batting was weak, whereas the ground fielding, which was good, was discounted by indifferent catching. Reiss and Pigeon were really the most successful bowlers, Pigeon being in quite a high flight, but their figures were inferior to those of Leney and Swindells, who captured however fewer wickets, and after all it is the getting of wickets which, with a reservation, is the main point. Uppingham and Repton played a very level match, till the elements interposed and proclaimed a draw, but the Reptonians put a very respectable side into the field, a side that fielded capitally-Musker and W. H. Twigg being first-rate-and had a capital 'keeper' in Young. Young was also a very good bat, quiet at first, but more 'rowdy,' so to speak, as he went on, while Twigg was very interesting as an off-side hitter. These two were far ahead of the other batsmen. Twigg was also a good fast bowler

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with a marked 'swerve'; I've seen it myself. To back him he had his younger brother and Crawford, the latter a brother, and a very promising brother, of the Surrey and Leicestershire performers. As seven of the eleven, besides a member of the 1901 team, are staying on, my old school may make things cheerful for Uppingham and Malvern next year, and I tell my readers in confidence, so as not to take them unawares, that W.L. Murdoch's son is at Repton, so that if heredity goes for anything, there may be another fine batsman in the school incubator. The Shrewsbury eleven had a good season, the batting panning out well and the bowling too, though there were few change bowlers to take the weight off the shoulders of Hirsch and Humphreys, but the former's results are particularly good, and taken with his batting powers indicate a sound, resourceful player, who may be found useful at Cambridge. Shrewsbury had however to lower its colours to Rossall, though there is a salve for the wound in the fact that their captain was incapacitated early in the game. The fielding and Craig's wicket-keeping were admirable, while the return of six 'caps' argues well for 1903. Childe-Freeman was the most consistent batsman of the side. It was no disgrace to be beaten by Rossall, as the sea-side school had a good eleven, with two sound, scoring batsmen in Fabel and Peshall, two good bowlers in Mugliston and Fabel, and a capital captain in Hincks who enforced strict discipline and insisted on plenty of fielding practice, with the usual result-emphatic improvement. The Rossallians won their two school matches without perturbing themselves, the other victim in addition to Shrewsbury being Loretto, the third school in the Scottish championship; this match was won by 91 runs on a dead wicket, Mugliston having twelve wickets for 38 runs. "There are a lot of promising cricketers in the school, and altogether cricket at Rossall seems to be in a good way." Peshall by the way was a safe wicket-keeper, though not brilliant.

Tonbridge had a very fine player in K. L. Hutchings. The school plays strong sides with plenty of bowling, but even against weak sides and poor bowling an average of 63 is remarkable in 1902; in 1901 Hutchings averaged 47, and in 1900 57, so that for three years he must have been a cheerful opponent to any side that came short of bowling. With a long gap, Langdale comes next, though his figures suffer only by comparison, and then there is a bigger gap still, though poor figures did not argue poor batting, as Horsfull, Piggott and Lethbridge could all play well. Weak bowling was the weak point; Dunell, however, has the makings of a good fast bowler. The match with Dulwich was closured by the rain, and again the bitter cry arises, "We sadly want another School match!" I've heard that cry before, but cannot come to the rescue. Could Westminster help? The 'pinks' only play

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one school match. The strength of the Sherborne eleven seems to have consisted in its future, as 1902 brought but little success to a side which suffered so severely from rain and tempest that the first month of the term was practically lost time. Marsh, the captain, was the best bowler and a batsman full of promise, but being young he found it difficult to manage himself, and to know when to go on and when to go off-not an easy job for an oldster. He has two more years before him, a fact that is all in his favour. Lang, Gordon and Ollivier are promising, especially the latter, "a defensive player with 64ft. of length, generally accompanied to the wicket by 4ft. 9in. of Jesson, smallest, straightest, and stickiest of batsmen, a coming Abel." Sherborne was badly beaten-ten wickets-by Bradfield, and the St. Paul's match was scratched-rain! In connection with the annual match between St. Paul's and Sherborne I was recently overhauled by an Old Pauline for having declared, as he alleged, that Sherborne ought to fly at higher game than his old school, whereas the latter had the best of recent contests, or at at any rate had amply held its own. I was rather staggered, being under the belief that rash generalities are things that I manage, or at least try, to avoid; and found on investigation that the remarks in question obviously applied to the one year, 1900, in which the Sherborne eleven was singularly strong; hence my O.P. friend was duly convicted of the heinous sin, as I pointed out to him, of generalising from the special. However, the Paulines had a good side in 1902, only losing a single match in all, and defeating Dulwich and Brighton handsomely, though Bedford Grammar School had quite the best of a drawn game. To good bowling, the performers being Tooth and Mills, with occasional help from Cowper, the Paulines attribute their success, and who would gainsay them? The first-named bowls fast medium, with plenty of control over the ball, and as he has yet got another year at school is naturally expected to develop into something extraspecial. Bromage and Palmer were the best batsmen, the latter being a fearless hitter, who took too many risks. Cowper could bat as well as bowl, and a good wicket-keeper in Woolf helped to neutralise some want of balance in the fielding. Dulwich played a very tight match with Bedford Grammar school, winning an eventful game by 19 runs, mainly through the good, very good, bowling of Knox and the fine batting start made by Yeo and Mold. Yet the Dulwich side was disappointing, as though it contained many promising and good players, it failed to win matches; most disappointing of all was the loss of the Brighton match owing to a premature 'declaration,' which enabled the spirited batting of the Brightonians to pull off the game. Gullick, of whom much was expected with the bat, incontinently failed, and his failure is considered to have unnerved the side as a side, so that Y eo headed the averages, but was unfortunately kept out of several matches by illness. The other figures are poor, but Knox bowled consistently well, fast with a change of pace, cleverly concealed, and Gullick sent up some useful slows, backed by a deceptive 'swerve.' "Fielding fair, but the bowling the best feature of the side."

Bedford Modern did well in their school matches, winning three -including that with Wellingborough Grammar School-and drawing the other two, a sixth being 'scratched,' reason unknown. Chase, Lough and Oliver were the pick of the batsmen, Oliver heading both the batsmen and bowlers, with especially good figures in the trundling department. The school played a desperate match with a good team of the M.C.C., which it only just lost after a tie at the fall of the ninth Marylebone wicket. Radley had a fairly good side, with more bowling than usual, and more variety in it, while sound fielding-sound, rather than brilliant-was achieved by the captain's righteous insistence on frequent practice. S. le Blanc Smith, the captain, who goes to Oxford has made his mark already in good outside cricket, and in H. H. K. Worsley there was, is, and will be for three years, an excellent player, who "hits terrible hard and has a sound, Mac-Laren-like method " and plenty of confidence. He is also a good bowler, though a trifle behind Birch, a very fair left-hander. The weak point of the side was the batting 'tail,' which, however, may wag stronger as it waxes older. The Radleians lost to Bradfield, but only by 28 runs; with Law, the Warwickshire player, as next year's coach a good season is anticipated. I should have added that Raikes proved a very useful batsman. Bradfield defeated Sherborne easily, besides beating Radley, and for these results "good stands for the last wicket, after an indifferent start, were responsible." This argues good nerve and not a little promise, while once more, plenty of practice produced good fielding. I may digress for a moment to say what good reading it is to an old crick-ter to hear that the keenness about fielding and the appreciation of its value, are so largely on the increase. As long as duffers are not tolerated, so long will duffers cease to get their colours ; while duffers, pure and simple, need never exist if boys-and men-will take the trouble to practice. No one needs to be a bad fielder if he has any aptitude for any department of cricket, and though the extra-good men may be rare birds, no one need despair of being sound and safe-if he will only take the necessary pains. Returning to the Bradfield side, one notes the excellence of Hunter's bowling-fifty-five wickets for nine runs apiece-and the weakness of the batting, attributable largely to the mud wickets that prevailed. Alderson, however, could show very good figures. Wellingborough Grammar School

had an eleven that "fell far below expectations" and lost three out of four school matches, though on two occasions only six and eleven runs represented their arrears, while the Mill Hill success over them was a purely one-man victory, Auty, the M.H. captain, scoring 197 out of 306 (22 extras) and bagging five wickets as well. His play is described as being remarkably fine. Of the Wellingburians, Manning is head and shoulders above all others, scoring largely and invariably, and being a very good wicketkeeper. Garne, the captain, was handicapped by bad health, and though he played a few good innings was not in the form that he showed in the two previous seasons. He is a good player however, a capital fieldsman as well as batsman, and is going to Cambridge, as does Manning, where it is hoped they may both make their mark. "Indifferent fielding" wrecked the Wellingborough side.

Merchant Taylors' was weak in bowling and had a chequered season in consequence, the results of the six school matches being equally apportioned to wins, draws, and losses. The fielding however, atoned to some extent for moderate bowling, and Trick's batting was invaluable; indeed in a bowler's year he was as successful, relatively, as was Raphael in a batsman's year, and twice scored a century in school matches, besides bowling well. Against Epsom he hit up 157, including a six, two five's and twentyseven four's. This must have been pretty smacking! Epsom College had a weak side, the Heygates having left, and only a moderate season, Cooper's bowling and Neild's wicket-keeping being the only redeeming features, though the fielding was always respectable, if a little deficient in catching powers. Brighton College is naturally a little 'perky' at its success over Dulwich, after the latter had 'declared,' leaving the Brightonians to score 202 in two hours; however, hundred-and-ten minutes sufficed. They also played well against an M.C.C. side that included Mead and G. G. Hearne, but the general cricket was not regarded as good, though Belcher, Rose and de Smidt are young players of promise. Hoffmeister and Billinghurst were successful batsmen. The drawn match with Lancing was all in Brighton's favour, Billinghurst having batted exceedingly well for 72. My Lancing correspondent has not 'let himself go' to any extent, but figures argue an eleven of good merit, with a batsman in Cole who had an average of 41 for thirteen innings, and a bowler in Campbell who took forty-two wickets for 14 runs 'and a bittock' apiece. Candler and Campbell also batted with consistency, so that the Lancing eleven won three out of four school matches, and drew the fourth, against Brighton College. Cole must have been a good player as he made 142 not out against Leatherhead school, and 115 against St. John's. Hurstpierpoint. Hurst however. "collapsing unaccountably, did the worst performance of the

year" in this match, the only school match which that society played to a finish. Turner however, was a very fine player who should with increase of years and strength turn out first-class, as he bowls as well as he bats, though Bird runs him close as far as figures go, in mere batting. Eastbourne College had the satisfaction of beating King's School, Canterbury, very handsomely, though rain saved them from a not improbable defeat at the hands of Hurstpierpoint. Young was head and shoulders above the rest of the side, both as batsman and bowler : "the fielding was very good, and Lippert was a good wicket-keeper." Bedford Grammar School had a strong batting side, but a weakness in the bowling line prevented them from winning many matches outright, and though they defeated Merchant Taylors' and played a draw with St. Paul's, they had to succumb to Dulwich. Against the Old Bedfordonians however, they totalled 625 for the loss of but eight wickets-F. G. Brooks 165, F. B. Brooks 153, G. R. Home 107, and the brothers Milton scores of over 50. The Brooks were both good batsmen, F. G.-captain of the eleventhe better of the two; but the weakness of the bowling is shown by the results of matches-2 won, 6 lost, 7 drawn. Forest School was, last year, a two-man side, with M'Iver, of Essex and Oxford, to bat and Henley to bowl: with M'Iver away, and as I conceive, not much new talent, Henley could not pull the side through, but I leave my correspondent to tell the tale, as he is far more capable of doing so than I am. Here is what he writes :--

"After the good side of 1901, it was a great disappointment to have such a bad season as the last. Seven matches lost, with only one win, was the state of the card at the end of the season. Wet weather and lack of confidence were chiefly responsible for this, but that the batting was weak nobody can deny. To atone for this the fielding was quite good, missed catches being unusually few. The bowling also was quite above the average, so that, though defeated, the eleven nearly always succeeded in getting rid of their opponents. Henley, the captain, is a good fast right-hand bowler, and a grand field, and Bury is a useful slow left-hander with a swerve. It was on these two that the brunt of the attack fell. Bonsey and Guy were the most useful bats; the former is a good bat, but had no luck; Guy is a stubborn bat, who requires some beating. In the course of the season, Henley secured 75 wickets, at an average cost of 10.49, and Bury took 39."

Finally, we invite the Scotch schools to fall in on the parade ground and march past us. The result of their inter-school competition shows that Fettes College and Merchiston Castle have each two *plus* marks to their credit, but as Merchiston lost

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one match, and Fettes were unbeaten, the championship goes, I understand, to the latter, who won two games and drew two, the fifth being abandoned owing to rain, as was also the contest between Merchiston and Blair Lodge. Blair Lodge came third, and was unlucky in having to write 'abandoned' against two of its school matches, but Loretto tied for this place with one loss, and two each of wins and draws : Glenalmond was fifth, and Edinburgh Academy, unlucky enough to lose all five matches, brought up the rear. The nature of the weather is broadly hinted at by the fact that of fifteen matches set down on the championship programme, only ten were played out, but, after all, this is not worse than our English percentage. Fettes, the champions, beat Merchiston and Edinburgh Academy with ease, had the best of the draw with Loretto, and the worst of a similar game with Glenalmond, but though the batting was up to the usual standardwith Lawrie, Jamieson, and Turner to head it-it was the bowling of Lyle, Jamieson, and McLeod that carried the day, and in conjunction with good fielding and wicket-keeping, raised Fettes to an altitude that it has not occupied for some years. Many congratulations to the Fettesians, on whose ground I played a very pleasant game some ten or twelve years ago. Merchiston Castle lost to Fettes, which helps to assign the championship, but defeated Loretto, Glenalmond, and Edinburgh Academy. Fraser was the champion player of the side, with a batting average of 26, and a bowling average of 11, with 64 wickets to his credit. His chief supporters with the bat were Ainslie and Simson, both good players, and with the ball Bisset, though the latter got fewer wickets than Frazer, at a similar cost. The fielding was safe, but lacked dash, and the wicket-keeper, Simson, was above the average. Loretto and Blair Lodge, who tied for third place, had identical figures, but it was hard on Blair Lodge that two matches out of five should not have been played ; "hard lines," chiefly for the loss of the fun and excitement, inasmuch as winning is not everything, but fun is. The catching and wicket-keeping of the latter school were very sound to begin with. but slacked off, which was a pity. Thorburn was a very useful player with ball and bat alike, Townsend, Walter, and Russell deserving well of their country too. From Loretto I hear that the batting lacked confidence; that the bowling was good and steady, but not brilliant; that the fielding, especially that of Ure in the long field, was exceptionally fine; that the wicketkeeping was very smart towards the end of the season, and that Kidston's bowling was on several occasions of the very best. As Kidston headed the batting averages too, he must have enjoyed his season. Glenalmond attributes an unsatisfactory year to unsatisfactory fielding, which-in a sense-is satisfactory reading, as no team, least of all a school team, deserves a ha'porth of

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sympathy for failures due to bad out-cricket. The batting, judging from the figures, must have been quite good, when one remembers the weather, for Clark with 34, Jenkinson with 24, and Matheson with 23, have nothing to be ashamed of. Robinson and McKillop bowled successfully, but "many catches were dropped " is a hint to next year's captain, which, I hope, he will take. Edinburgh Academy had a bad season, owing to the youth and inexperience of the majority of its players, some of whom, however, were very good fielders. Falconer was the best all-round player, but the Academicians ought to look forward to the 'good time coming,' when their present side, or what is left of it, will be classified as 'old and experienced,' and will win matches, and, perhaps, championships. So mote it be !

An account of some extraordinary cricket, as played in the House-matches at Charterhouse, has reached me, and I think a record of it may be interesting, though everyone who has been at a public school knows that in that class of cricket there are many minnows in every eleven, and that the Tritons have good times. Few Tritons have fared better than did Branston, of the 'Girdlestonites,' in the House-match series. His House-he was captain-played and won four matches, and never went more than once to the wickets in the same match ; all of which is not surprising, as it scored 665, 496, 568, and 480, Branston's private efforts being limited to 184, 146, 213, and 147! Curwen, one of his allies, made 141, 31, 98, and 125, and Goodliffe, another of the gang, 105, 69, 75 not out, and 29. Useful scoring this, and amusing for the juniors who had to 'scout,' presumably ! Branston, by the way, not content with nearly 700 runs, elected to take wickets as well-43 for 6.8 runs apiece. It is quite clear that J. F. Mounsey, the old Yorkshire professional, has taught some of his alumni how to punish weak bowling, for it is not unfair to assume that weak bowling was, as is usual, accountable for big scoring. 1 should add that the opponents of the Girdlestonians—a much nicer word, I think, than Girdlestonites—only made 768 runs in eight innings. I offer a parallel story of a House-match played at Repton, the two sides being under 16 years of age. When the first two men-save the mark !- of one side had scored about 350, they offered to let the other fellows go in, the closure not having been invented, and, if it had been invented, not being applicable. One of the youths had just passed his 200, the other his 100. Their kindly offer was accepted, and the other side went in to bat, only to be dismissed by the same pair for two totals, neither of which reached double figures! The names of 'the pair' were F. G. J. Ford and J. H. Kelsev.

ETON v. HARROW.

Played at LORD'S, Friday, Saturday, July 11, 12.—As in 1901, Harrow had an all-round team of remarkable strength, and soon after lunch on the second afternoon they gained an easy victory by eight wickets. They practically won the match when, in less than two hours, they got Eton out for 72. It was a misfortune for Eton to win the toss, for, while they could scarcely have ventured to put their opponents in, they certainly suffered by batting first themselves, the wicket, which was somewhat slow at starting, becoming quite fast as the opening day advanced. So complete was the breakdown in the batting in this inglorious first innings that the last seven wickets fell in fifty minutes, Phelips, who made the ball go a good deal with his arm, bowling with great effect. This young cricketer, it may be mentioned, is a grandson of Sir Spencer Ponsonby-Fane. Going in against a score of 72, the Harrow eleven naturally played a confident game, but despite some excellent batting by MacLaren—a brother of the Lancashire captain —five wickets were down for 113. At this point Hopley, a South African cricketer, went in, and by his tremendous hitting put Harrow far a head. In forty minutes he actually scored 74 runs out of 96, driving and pulling with enormous power. Very different in character, but excellent in its way, was the batting of Bennett, who began steadily, but hit with considerable freedom after Hopley was out. Of the five bowlers who went on for Eton, Ellis struck one as showing the most promise, but Sandeman (left-hand, slow) proved the most effective. Harrow's innings ended for 241, and Eton, scon after half-past five, had the thankless task of going in against a balance of 169. They set to work in great style, however, and at the drawing of stumps had scored 96 for one wicket. Nicholl scored 50 runs out of 70, and showed perhaps the finest batting in the match, his off-driving being very powerful and beautifully kept down. Possessing great advantages of height and reach he ought, with ordinary luck, to have an exce

M.C.C. Matches.

On the second morning, Buxton and Murray, the not outs, carried the overnight score to 157, Eton, with nine wickets in hand, being then only twelve runs behind. There seemed every prospect of a full day's cricket, but, after a catch at mid-off had so trid of Buxton, the batting went to pieces, the last eight wickets falling for 71 runs. Not often has Eton sent a team up to Lord's with such a long tail to the batting. Buxton played admirably for nearly two hours and a half, his only mistake being a very hard chance of being caught and bowled when 59. Harrow only had 60 to get to win, and this task naturally caused them no anxiety. There may not have been any exceptional cricketers in the Harrow eleven, but a better balanced school side is not often seen. It may be mentioned that Harrow had five old choices available—Eyre (the captain), M. M. Carlisle, MacLaren, Baily, and Hopley—and Eton four—Ellis (the captain), Murray, Egerton-Warburton, and Sandeman.

Seventy-seven matches have been played, of which Eton have won twentyeight, Harrow thirty-three, and sixteen have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857, for boys under twenty, which has been rejected. T. G. O. Cole's 142, in 1897, was the thirteenth three-figure innings in the matches between the schools, and the highest but one in the whole series. The previous great scores were E. Bailey, 152 in 1841; A. K. Watson, 135 in 1885; A. W. Ridley, 117 in 1871; C. P. Foley, 114 in 1886; W. F. Forbes, 113 in 1876; A. W. T. Daniel, 112 not out in 1860; C. J. Ottaway, 108 in 1867; E. Crawley, 100 in 1885; R. B. Hoare, 108 in 1888; J. H. Stogden, 124 in 1895; and H. C. Pilkington, 101, and B. J. T. Bosanquet, 120, both in 1896.
