PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1907.

The season now past was a disheartening one for all cricketers, and to none more than to those associated with Public School cricket, for a wet summer term partakes of the nature of a tragedy. It ought to be one which will loom large in after memories. And certainly from one point of view the late summer will probably be remembered as the coldest and wettest almost within living memory, at all events within the memory of all who actually figured in school cricket in this year of grace. It was a time of sweaters and saw-dust par excellence. It is interesting to note how far all the endless variety of wicket has affected the form of schoolboy cricket, as judged by results. With regard to batting, I should say that the typically fine, free, upstanding player, who in most cases plays too much to the pitch of the ball, has been eclipsed both by the patient, watchful, and, it may be, more correct player, and by the unorthodox, happy-golucky hitter, who goes for home and glory at the fall of the sixth wicket or thereabouts. And this reversal of form may not be a bad thing in its way. Our sympathies are inclined to be too entirely with the first of these three types, and we are apt, in bewilderment at his many brilliant strokes, to forget that he may have much to learn from his dogged friend, who can keep up his end at a pinch, and, if victory is impossible, save his side from defeat. A strategic retreat, such as Haileybury carried out against Uppingham, is very often as brilliant a performance as a glorious victory. All honour then to the slow, careful, nerveless player who has come to the fore this season as he has not done for years past, and all honour, too, to the plucky hitter who has, time and again, saved his side from disgrace, when better players than he have failed by adopting more orthodox methods. What of the bowling? A glance at the bowling statistics of the various schools naturally shows an improvement on former years, but at the same time it must be admitted that very seldom in history has a Public School boy been found who could take full advantage of a wicket. It is all a matter of experience. And further, a wet slippery ball seems a greater handicap than it should be. This is probably due to the fact that modern cricket requires a diversity and trickiness of attack, which mean so many different grips of the ball that accuracy is at a discount. But no department of the game has been harder hit than the fielding. From almost all quarters I hear notes of disappointment at the patchy nature of this most essential part of the game. Nor is this a matter of wonder, when one remembers that for the greater part of the summer the ball was so often wet and heavy, the light extremely bad, sweaters a necessity, and in fact little pleasure could be derived from stopping a hard hit or holding a hot catch.

The task of comparison of merit is under any circumstances difficult enough for a writer who is condemned for the most part to ground his assumptions on hearsay evidence, whether derived from private correspondence or newspaper reports. To form a true estimate would entail a visit to every Public School in England and Scotland, and a personal study of the form of the rising generation, a task which would require not only the patience of Job but the winged feet of Mercury. Further I may preface that, owing to the eccentricities of the weather, even greater difficulties than those which have commonly beset the paths of his predecessors in office encompass the writer who attempts to deal with the school cricket of 1907. Whereas a mere collation of facts and figures is a comparatively simple matter, inference drawn from these sources may be absolutely valueless. For it by no means follows that the eleven which on paper seems to have attained the greatest measure of success in its engagements is thereby marked out as the best side of the year. Indeed, to compare great things with small, it is a moot point to-day whether our late visitors, the South Africans, might not under more equable conditions have proved themselves a better side than the unbeaten England Eleven which three times opposed them. Be this as it may, when one and the same side playing against identically the same bowling, and on each occasion winning the toss, makes in the first innings on one occasion upwards of 400 and on another a bare 70, the eccentricities of cricket and consequent difficulty of comparison based on paper evidence are sufficiently revealed. I do not therefore propose to adopt the course which previous writers of this article in Wisden have followed in former years, and attempt to classify the various sides in their order of merit. Such a course may be extremely interesting but for the reasons which I have endeavoured to explain is hardly convincing; indeed scarcely more convincing than the naïve contention of a certain school captain in last year's Wisden, that his team was surely the best school side of the year! But it is possible, without committing oneself at all, to classify the most prominent of the schools in various groups into which for geographical and other reasons they fall, and this makes extremely

interesting reading. Having done this much I will leave it to the unprejudiced reader to pick out the best or the two or three best sides of the year. If he can select the very best, he is a cleverer person than I am. Here are the groups with the results of their engagements:—

(1) Harrow beat Eton. Winchester beat Eton.

2) Rugby beat Marlborough.
Marlborough beat Cheltenham.
Cheltenham beat Clifton and Haileybury.

(3) Malvern beat Repton and Clifton.
Repton beat Uppingham.
Uppingham virtually beat Haileybury.

4) Charterhouse beat Westminster and Wellington.

(5) Bradfield beat Radley.

(6) Shrewsbury and Rossall failed to finish their school matches.

(7) Ley's School beat Mill Hill.
Mill Hill beat St. Paul's and City of London School.
St. Paul's beat Dulwich, Brighton, and Bedford Grammar School.
Dulwich beat Tonbridge and Brighton.
Tonbridge beat Sherborne.

When I had got thus far with my remarks, it occurred to me that an expression of opinion from the captain of the Pennsylvania Eleven, as to the respective merits of the various school sides they encountered, would at least be academically interesting. In answer therefore to a letter of mine, he wrote as follows:—

"It so happened that both Hordern and Goodfellow were " staying with me at the time your letter arrived, so I got their " opinion as well as my brother's, and we four, all members of the " team, talked it over thoroughly and decided to rate the teams in "the following order, taking into consideration their batting, "bowling, and fielding as they played against us: (1) Malvern. "(2) Repton. (3) Harrow. (4) Marlborough. (5) Cheltenham. "(6) Winchester. (7) Charterhouse. Dulwich, Clifton, and "Tonbridge, these three seemed to be the weakest." He also adds: "As our matches with Rugby, Shrewsbury, Haileybury, and "St. Paul's were all stopped by rain, we thought that we had not "had enough opportunity to judge of their real strength, but "Rugby semed to be the strongest of these "four." As I have said, this is an interesting opinion, but is far from conclusive. The gist of the matter lies in those few words which Lothrop Lee italicised. In other words it is impossible to judge a side fairly from one view of it.

Winchester had all the elements of a sound, well-balanced side Their batting throughout was strong, their fielding was pretty good, but could rise to the occasion as in the Eton match, while seven of the side could bowl (and take wickets), two of them extremely well. I take leave therefore to doubt the position which the Pennsylvania captain has assigned to them. I should give them a very high position on the list. They won the Eton match handsomely by superior all-round play, or perhaps it would be truer to say by an ability to adapt themselves better to the condition of the wicket. The victory was all the more acceptable as it was the first time for ten years they had won the match away from home. Their worst performance was against the Pennsylvania Team, who beat them almost hopelessly, thanks to some wonderful all-round play by that fine cricketer Hordern, who not only made 70 runs but took ten wickets for 58 runs. Their three best men were Pawson, a really good stumper, Leslie (son of C.F.H.), a capital slow bowler with some work either way and a sensible head, and a hard-hitting batsman with sound defence, and Crommelin Brown, a powerful and watchful bat, and fine field. It would not be surprising if these three meet again at Lord's in the Varsity match before they are much older. Besides this trio they had in Ashton a swerving, fast bowler, who was on the top of his form in the Eton match, and a pocket prodigy in W. E. Parke, whose age is barely 16 and his height a matter of 62 inches. Going in first both innings against Eton, his first big match, he made 49 and 46 not out, a performance which alone will make his future career a matter of interest. Altogether Winchester had a side, which, if it did not quite reach tip-top form, would have taken a lot of beating by any other school side of the year. I omitted to say that in Evans they had another son of a famous cricketer, and that his short-slip catching in the Eton match was worth seeing. Harrow had a really good side with plenty of batting, fine fielding, and fortunately for them Their bowling, however, an excellent stumper in Lang. lacked skill and natural ability, and was undoubtedly their weakest department. Had it been otherwise they would have been a great side. They accomplished at least two remarkable performances. In the first place they were the only school side who defeated the redoubtable Pennsylvania Eleven, though in all fairness to the latter cheery sportsmen, it should be remarked that this was their first match, and, as they remarked to me, they had hardly lost their sea legs; and secondly, they won their great game at Lord's, and that after being in seemingly desperate straits at the end of the first day. It was a game which will go down to history, whether for the wonderful performance of the Harrow captain, or for the fine spirit of true sportsmanship

displayed on both sides. Of Bird's phenomenal cricket on this occasion, columns have already been written, and no words of mine are likely to enhance its fame. He is undoubtedly a fine bat on good wickets, probably under such circumstances the best school bat of the year. Whether he will take his place among the giants of the game in the years to come remains to be seen. The reaction after the strain of school cricket is apt to be great, and there were few run-getting wickets in August, so that his moderate display for Lancashire should not be taken too seriously. But the school side was by no means a one horse affair. Cowley is a good and consistent bat, as his average of 37 with a highest score of 75 shows, and Anson was almost as useful. Falcon failed to reproduce the form he displayed at Lord's in 1906, and was disappointing, but in August he played some fine cricket for Norfolk, for which county he had an average of 80 in seven innings. Neither he nor Cowley will probably be overlooked at Cambridge next year. Lang came on wonderfully as a stumper, and, considering the comparatively weak attack, it was, I repeat, fortunate for his side that he did. Eight catches (some say nine!) at Lord's was a very fine performance, and his figures show that he was a very useful bat. The two best bowlers were Bird and Earle, the former of whom has excellent figures and the latter is full of promise. It is a pleasure to see the son of Vernon Royle, one of the finest cover-points in the history of the game, emulating his father's example with some success. Eton had by no means a good season, winning two only of their matches and losing both their big games. At Lord's, after to all appearance being in a winning position at the end of the first day, the weakness of their attack was shown up the next day, and Harrow set them an impossible task in their second innings. In the Winchester match their fortune was not of the best. It is true that they won the toss, but considering the condition of the wicket this was a doubtful blessing; indeed it proved to be a positive disaster, for they had to bat on a dead, slow wicket, which improved somewhat by the time their opponents wanted it, and during the following night down came a deluge of rain, and Eton had a repetition of their previous day's experience. It may be that the better side won, but the difference between them was not a matter of nine wickets As usual there was plenty of batting talent on the side. and the fielding was mostly good, except for those fatal dropped catches at Lord's but the bowling was very moderate. Benson was out and away their best batsman, strong in driving and cutting, and he should do great things for the school next year. when he will be captain. Mulholland, Gibson, and Naylor were all well up to Eton form, while in Curtis they had one of those rugged batsmen so useful to his side towards the tail of an

innings, as testified by his scores of 10 not out and 58 against Winchester and 64 not out and 23 against Harrow.

For the last few years Charterhouse have turned out a succession of excellent sides, but, in spite of several triumphs, it is doubtful whether this year's lot reached the high standard they have set themselves. They inflicted a crushing defeat on Westminster by no less than an innings and 157 runs, a result which, varying in its magnitude, has we fear, been an annual event since 1901. The partnership between Doll and Braddell realised 214 runs, 180 of which were hit in sixty minutes. The Wellington match was also won fairly comfortably, thanks to a fine innings by Evans. The Westminster match seems to have been altogether too much for Doll, for his subsequent performances were meagre, everything being sacrificed to sensational hitting. However, he comes out with a fine average, and, if he restrains himself, is undoubtedly a fine hitter. Braddell was easily the best all-round cricketer of the side, for not only did he prove himself a run-getter, but his bowling was most useful and he is a capital field. I trust that the Oxford authorities will not lose sight of him next year. The bowling was weak, and suffered from lack of variety. Braddell and Burrows were the best, the latter a moderate disciple of the Schwarz school. Wellington lost the match to Charterhouse by exactly 100 runs, a result which was a disappointment to the visiting side, for they were in many ways a capital eleven with plenty of good, sound batting, while their fielding was excellent. But, and this is a very big but when matches are to be won, their bowling was only moderate. This match is always confined to one day, surely an arrangement which serves materially to accentuate the luck of the game. In many of their other engagements the Wellington boys did extremely well, especially against the M.C.C., Old Wellingtonians, and Free Foresters. In the last named match their captain H. Brougham played a fine innings of 146, a performance which brought him out at the top of the batting list. He goes up to Oxford, and, as he is a brilliant field and a batsman likely to improve as he goes on, he should get a good trial for his "Blue." But besides their captain the side contained two other capable batsmen in Hull and Leese, particularly the former, and several others who on occasions showed up to advantage. Indeed the fact that nine of the eleven had averages of 18 and upwards shows a lot of batting merit, and, had they been better backed up by their bowling brigade, they would undoubtedly have been a strong side. Westminster had a young side, and were content with a solitary win out of eleven engagements. But there is some promising material, and, as seven of this year's lot will be at the disposal of the captain next year, things ought to look up, and their match with Charterhouse may not be the walk over for their opponents it was this year. In criticising Westminster cricket it should not be forgotten that their opponents in their various matches are probably as tough a lot as any school meets. Their bowling was lamentably weak with no one who could take advantage of a wet wicket, fielding fair, and their batting lacked dash and confidence. Turner was their best performer, a batsman of the steady, watchful type. Wood with a straight eye hits well, while Reed and Gow should be useful players next year.

Rugby were at best not more than a fair team, whose early performances would hardly seem to warrant success in their big match at Lord's. They had one or two men who were capable of something big, but the greater part of the side were of more or less mediocre quality, and it is a matter of doubt whether they were as strong a lot all round as Marlborough. To Watson, Cole, and in a smaller measure to Tylden, must be ascribed the main credit of the victory. It was that fine stand of Watson and Tylden at the end of the first day which gave the side their chance, and with characteristic grit they took advantage of it next day. Marlborough authorities must be glad to see the last of Watson, for he has an average of 71 against them in six innings. This year he just maintained his average with modest efforts of 49 and 108. He has the chance of turning out a fine cricketer, being a natural batsman with no nerves and a wonderful eve, but, be it said, he is withal somewhat casual. Cole, a fast right-hander, bowled admirably at Lord's, and was clearly the most dangerous bowler on the side. Cunningham is a nervous starter, but he is a fine bat when he gets going, and may do great things next year. Marlborough gained a comparatively easy victory over Cheltenham, their two bowlers, Lagden and Jenkins, dismissing their opponents in the second innings for 69. It was natural therefore that they should look forward to their match at Lord's with some confidence. But somehow after a good start, by which they passed the Rugby first innings with only one wicket down, they went to pieces. Their tail collapsed, and their weak attack on the evening of the first day enabled the Rugbeians to run up a big score, with the result that the latter won a very sporting game by 84 runs. This was disappointing to Marlborough, for they were a side capable of great things. They gave Pennsylvania a good run for their money, losing the match by three wickets only. The weakness in the eleven lav in a want of balance. necessary, exercise plenty of self-restraint, and always played well within himself. I doubt whether he has any superior among school batsmen this year, and his average is wonderfully good. If some of his confrères had shown the same restraint, and their bowlers a little more brain work in their attack, the Marlborough side would have been a difficult nut to crack. The Cheltenham boys ended up "all square" on the four school matches, easily beating Haileybury and Clifton, and being almost as easily beaten by Marlborough and Pennsylvania. Their best game was against Liverpool whom they defeated for the first time since 1872, thanks to an admirable piece of bowling by Dickinson who secured 13 victims for 54 runs. The side were too dependent on three or four "cracks," and the tail wagged very dismally on occasions. Dickinson, a slow left hand bowler, was in fine form on the slow wickets, and I doubt whether his performance was eclipsed by any other school bowler this year. To obtain 61 wickets for 11 runs apiece stamps him as a bowler of no mean order, and, young as he is, it is unfortunate for his school that he will not be there another season. The best batsman on the side was Piggott, who took a long time to get going, but in July played some fine cricket. With two extremely useful all-round players in Beauchamp and Buist and a successful, if reckless, hitter in White, the Cheltenham eleven were apt to be a dangerous side to tackle. The experiences of Haileybury in their school fixtures were unfortunate. They were easily beaten by Cheltenham and only saved the Uppingham game by as fine a piece of dogged pluck as one would wish to see. The Pennsylvania match was hardly begun before it was stopped by rain. But, apart from these all-important contests, they showed up well in many of their other games, when they had opponents of no mean order. They overthrew strong sides of Butterflies, Old Wykehamists, and Old Haileyburians, and came within a little of accounting for a Free Forester lot, which included a strong bowling contingent. Altogether, despite the school matches, Haileybury have no reason to be despondent. Frisby, their most successful batsman, with a long reach has plenty of punishing power against fast bowling, but he likes it fast, and Hammond. who should have two or three more school seasons, is described as the most promising player they have had for many years; certainly from his performances one would judge that this remark is not undeserved. Hedderwick, who scored a century against the County Club and Ground, Stafford and Dickinson were also useful batsmen, and, as the last named comes out top of the bowling figures, he may fairly be considered the most useful member of the side. If they can unearth another good bowler next year they ought to be able to give a good account of themselves.

Of the Malvern eleven I can speak with tolerable certainty. They started the season with every promise of turning out a fine side, and in many ways they fulfilled expectations. They began their list of fixtures under most disheartening conditions, but later on, when they got going, they were quite a good team with a lot of batting strength, good fielding, one good bowler, and an excellent stumper in Cuthbertson. Mann and Robertson-Rodger were the two best batsmen, though the former never struck his real form, and had to be content with a moderate record. The latter was the most useful member of the side, a fine field. useful change bowler, a batsman full of promise, and every ounce of him a "trier." M. K. Foster, the penultimate member of a famous family, hit well on many occasions, but at present he is not up to the family standard, and Prest played some capital cricket, especially in school matches. Hughes has plenty of style and promises well, and Cuthbertson is a sound, left-hand batsman of the defensive type. Tuff was out and away the best bowler, but his work was patchy, and his record suffered from his having to bowl so often with a wet ball. They defeated Repton by eight wickets, and Clifton by an innings and upwards of 100 runs, but succumbed to Pennsylvania after rather a curious game. Worcestershire Club and Ground, with Bowley and Pearson inter alios, again proved their victims, and they had a capital game with a strong side of Free Foresters, who, having to make 120 runs in their second innings, only got home with one wicket to spare. thanks to four dropped catches in the last ten minutes of the game. Repton had a very successful season, and they deserved their success, for they were a really good side. I cannot, however, agree with the contention that they were a better team than they were two or three years ago with J. N. Crawford and R. A. Young. They may have been a more level lot this year, but they cannot have been so invincible; and yet the fact remains that they only lost one match—against their old school rivals Malvern. It was a capital game, restricted to one fine day after a singularly wet one when no cricket was possible. It would be unfair to detract from the performance of Malvern, who beat their opponents fairly and squarely after having none the best of the wicket, and having moreover the onus of making runs in the fourth innings after a long day's exciting cricket; but still it is impossible to suppose that there was a difference of eight wickets between the two sides. It is safer to say that Malvern came off, and Repton did not, for the first and only time in the season, and that furthermore, owing to a strain, Repton were practically deprived of the services of Vidler, one of their best bowlers. The fact that they beat, or morally beat, strong sides of Notts Amateurs, Derbyshire Club and

Ground, Northern Nomads, and old Reptonians, shews the quality of their cricket. A victory over that hot side of Old Boys would have been a brilliant performance, and they very nearly succeeded in bringing it off, while they might fairly congratulate themselves on having the best of the game with Pennsylvania. Their batting was sound and consistent (though at times wanting in dash) with Altham, Turner, and Cardew the pick of the bunch, and their bowling was excellent with plenty of variety; indeed Vidler and Greswell were undoubtedly the best pair of school bowlers of the year. The former in particular is a bowler of high class, who, if his strain does not affect him permanently, will make his mark some day. If it is added that the fielding was about as good as you want to see in any company, it may readily be seen that they were a side of whom any school might be proud. Their one weakness was that their stumper was hardly up to form. Uppingham had a very moderate season, winning none of their eight engagements; though in all fairness it should be added that at least three of their drawn games were moral victories. They proved victims to Repton by 200 runs after an even first innings apiece, the bowling of Squire being altogether too much for them in their second venture. Fortune did not favour them in their encounter with Haileybury as, after making as many runs as they liked, and declaring, they just failed to secure a single innings victory. Ramsbotham watches the ball, and is a batsman who can adapt himself to any wicket. His figures are excellent and speak for themselves. Inman is a good player on fast wickets only, and so his chances of distinction were limited. Trubshaw is a promising leg-break bowler who proved a very thorn in the side of Repton. There seems something radically (but we trust only temporarily) wrong with Clifton cricket nowadays. They appear to have lost not only their batting style, but also all confidence in themselves, with the result that for the last two or three years they have not turned out the formidable sides they used to do. Now that Tunnicliffe has been engaged to look after the cricket generally, there is every chance of more success in the future. At the same time I cannot help expressing the opinion that the authorities would be wise in not entirely discarding amateur coaching. This year they were a distinctly weak side, and, though they met with some success in their earlier games, they came badly to grief in both their school matches. Their batting was unsound, wanting in style, and too much given to crooked hitting, while there was no real sting in their bowling. The most promising pair on the side were Brownlee and Cullinan, the former of whom seemed to me to have capabilities of a high order, but at present he is far too careless. Altogether a disappointing record for a school which in the past has turned out so many fine cricketers.

Dulwich won three out of their four school matches, among their victories being Tonbridge, a win which was all the more welcome as it was the first time they had beaten that school for some years. They lost to St. Paul's, thanks to a fine effort by Cooper, who was responsible for 98 out of a total of 147. The Allevnians were a stronger lot than usual, the majority being able to make runs, and the fielding was on the whole good, but here again, as with the majority of schools, the bowling was only moderate. McCormack and Betham, both of whom are leaving. were their best performers, particularly the former, who was a batsman considerably above the average. As eight of this year's lot will be there for another year, they should have no difficulty in turning out an efficient side next summer. The Tonbridge eleven had a satisfactory season, thanks largely to the strength of their attack. Six matches were placed to their credit and five were lost. but the former included such redoubtable opponents as Blue Mantles, Oxford Harlequins, B.B.'s, West Kent, Bickley Park, and Sherborne. The Dulwich match was lost, but it was played on the first fast wicket of the season, and the batsmen failed to time the ball, with the result that no less than eight of them were clean bowled. It does seem a pity that such an important game should be decided on one innings apiece. The spin of the coin is so important a feature in a single day's cricket that it may well decide the fate of the match before a ball is bowled. Pigg captained the side extremely well, and he goes up to Cambridge with the reputation of a fearless hitter and a useful fast bowler. Bannister's bowling figures of 55 wickets for 10 runs apiece point to a very fine performance, and the success of the side in winning matches was mainly due to his services. But the feature of the term's cricket, I am told, was Barley's wicket-keeping, and it is very probable that more will be heard of him in the future. Sherborne had an excellent all-round player in May. His wicket-keeping is described as quite first-class, and he headed the batting averages with, all things considered, very creditable figures. It seems a pity that, after all, he cannot go up to Cambridge. Besides him, Popham scored very consistently, and Dow compiled a capital century at the expense of the M.C.C. bowlers. They were indeed unfortunate in having to meet Tonbridge without their crack bowler Hornidge, whose presence in a low scoring game might have just made the difference, for, if they had held a lead in the first innings, their batsmen in the second encounter might have displayed more nerve than they did. It is pleasant to hear that the school fielding was uniformly good and keen. So mote it be always.

I have a dismal tale from Radley with regard to weather, only one match being played without rain. No wonder, then, to find

that the batting averages, with one exception, are poor reading. Fulcher was the exception, and, all things considered, his performance was not a bad one. Stuckey, I see, played a valuable innings against Bradfield, and saved his side from utter disaster. But the batting, with all due allowance for the weather, was weak. On the other hand, Fulcher and Hillcocks did capital service with the ball, and as the former is also a fine field, he is undoubtedly an extremely useful member of his side. The match with Bradfield was lost by about 50 runs, but it must be urged in favour of the Radley boys, who were a young and inexperienced side, that it was the first firm wicket they had seen during the term. As ten of this year's lot stay on for another season, and I hear there is plenty of other promising material, there seems to be no fear for Radley cricket in the near future. Bradfield could only manage to win a couple of their fixtures, and, though they won their school match against Radley, their season's performance must be described as tame. I read a grumble from one who should know, that net practice was not too careful, and that the fielding of the side was indifferent. Come, come, Bradfield!

Shrewsbury did not have a very successful season, winning but two games out of eleven, and drawing (not too creditably) their school match against Rossall. I imagine that, owing to the heavy nature of the soil, the development of a cricket side at this school in a wet season is a matter of greater difficulty than with most schools. With the exception of Bardsley, who played consistently and well, the batting was featureless, while the bowling, which by the way received little help from the wicket-keeping, calls for no particular comment. It is a pleasure to see the son of one who was once so fine a judge of boy cricket captaining his school side. All good fortune to him at Cambridge. No less than six matches were drawn at Rossall, mainly owing to bad weather, among them being their two school matches against Shrewsbury and Loretto The latter game could barely be begun, but, if the rain had held off, they had a very fair chance of defeating the Salopians, thanks to a capital innings by Ling. Their batting on a whole was but moderate, nor can they have had very much real class among their bowlers, though Squance on occasions was effective, especially against the M.C.C., when he accounted for five wickets for 14 runs, an excellent performance when it is remembered that the side contained Tyldesley, Tarrant, and other cricketers of note. They are a young side and the prospects for next year are most encouraging. As I have now got so far north, I may as well go a step further to Sedbergh, and try to discover whether the boys there have been able to play cricket at all. This is a wet part of the world, and when it rains there is seldom any mistake about it. I am credibly informed that twenty inches of rain fell in the months of May and June! And yet, mud-larking or not, the eleven had a successful season and had seven wins to their credit as against two losses. They had two pretty useful players in Scholfield and Turner, who were first and second in both batting and bowling averages, and Lockhart is described as a promising batsman.

Nothing of much note is to be gleaned from the doings of the Lancing boys. The Brighton match was left drawn in an interesting state, 57 runs being required for the win by Brighton with three wickets to go and one man well set with 67 to his credit. There was some level batting with no very outstanding merit, but their bowling must have been very weak, judging from the figures I have before me. Eight of this year's lot are staying on, so the hopes of Lancing will soar high next year. The Eastbourne side was patchy, and depended for runs mainly on Tudor, Bourk, and Coxhead, who came out with creditable figures. Their bowling must have been weak and their fielding not up to the usual standard. A tie match with the M.C.C. at 126 all was the most remarkable feature of their cricket. No event of much importance is to be recorded of the Brighton boys. Their batting seems to have been weakish, with Castle and Malleson as their best performers. None of the four school matches went their way, Dulwich and St. Paul's both beating them, but in both cases after good games and exciting finishes, while the matches with Lancing and Merchant Taylors were drawn. They had some very fair bowling talent, but the fielding is described as only moderate. Three victories and one defeat was the result of St. Paul's inter-school matches. I am told that the side were about up to the average, with no one of remarkable merit in any department of the game. A last-wicket stand for 174 runs against Mill Hill School is worth mentioning, as in its way it must almost constitute a record in school matches. Mill Hill played no less than six other schools but could only manage to account for a brace of them, and that in spite of the services of D. L. Morgan, whose record would suggest that he is a player of some merit. His performance of going in first and carrying out his bat for 159, in the face of a total of 278 by St. Paul's School, argues not only skill but pluck. He has already appeared for Gloucestershire, and is not likely to be lost sight of. I am told with reference to Bedford Grammar School that "they were a bad side all round, and, worse still, they knew it." It is to be hoped that this is too pessimistic an account of their performances. "Quite the weakest and most unlucky team we have had for ten years "is another comment. Work for Army examinations seems to have played havor with the side, and (but

this is the merest whisper!) I should gather that with them the prestige of football outweighs that of cricket. Can this not be rectified? The statistics of the eleven call for no comment. There was evidently no real "fiver" among them. Leys School had a formidable fixture list of nineteen matches, of which number they won eight and lost five, their victories including Mill Hill and Bedford Grammar School. No score of 300 is recorded either for or against them, a fact which would seem to argue no great scoring capabilities but some reliable bowling by the school side. Quibell, with slow leg-breaks, captured eighty-one wickets for 14 runs apiece, and the captain—Holloway—a stylish and sound bat, scored over 700 runs with a capital average of 35. Oundle were unfortunate in having their one school match scratched owing to mumps, which I am informed "took a firm grip of the school." Their fixture list is a meagre one, no one appearing more than seven times at the wickets, while the bowlers only accounted for forty-nine wickets between them. Berkhamsted gained a meritorious win over City of London School, but the scoring in all their matches was low, only one innings of over 200 appearing on their score sheet for or against. West had an average of 30 with a highest score of 77, a sound performance; but the other batsmen do not appear to have been a very formidable lot. They had a useful fastish bowler in Lyster, whose figures read well. Epsom had a very fairly successful season with six wins as against two losses, and produced some highly satisfactory batting figures headed by Walker, Upton, and Beale, who all took "centuries." Of their five school matches three were won, and two drawn owing to rain. Felsted were only able to bring off one school match in which they narrowly escaped defeat from Merchant Taylors. They had two useful batsmen in Jewell and Page, but their bowling was very weak, and they were only able to win two games out of a card of eleven. Forest School began the term with nine old colours and had on the whole a successful season. They were an unbeaten side so far as inter-school matches go, though their game with Merchant Taylors was a near thing. The batting was level, but not startling, while the bowling was distinctly on the weak side. Bradshaw-Smith was their fast bowler, and, as the report has it, as dangerous to one side as the other!

Now that Blair Lodge has dropped out, the competition among the Scotch schools is confined to Loretto, Fettes, Merchiston, Glenalmond, Edinburgh Academy, and Watson's College, and the championship this year rested with the last named, we believe, for the first time. But the series of matches did not produce any cricket of outstanding merit. The wonder is that any cricket at all was possible in Scotland during the early months of this

disastrous summer. The conditions were bad enough in all conscience in the South of England, but what they must have been north of the Tweed, goodness only knows! It is a fact, I believe, that none of the Scotch schools has produced in recent years any cricketer who has distinguished himself much after leaving school. I am open to correction, and would gladly have the lie thrust down my throat, but is it not a fact that M. R. Jardine is the last University player they have turned out? If my surmise is correct, can any approximate reason be given for their failure? That it is want of enthusiasm and vigour no one would believe. It may be that the usual climatic conditions of the early summer months do not give the cricketer a fair chance, and it may be that that most insidious of all games, golf, has more to say to it. Be this as it may, the day has yet to come when a Scotch school turns out a side to compare favourably with the best of the English school teams of the same year. But let me retrace my wandering steps. Watson's could not be called a good side, but they were a useful lot, and were undefeated in their school encounters. They had a promising bowler in Watt, and Stuart Pearson and Bowie did them good service. Edinburgh Academy ought somehow to have done better. The ability to do so appeared to be there, but they seemed to fail just at the wrong time. They had two goodish bowlers in Anderson and Alexander. Fettes had a very poor season, losing two of the three school matches played, and drawing badly with Merchiston, and this in spite of their having in Ward a cricketer of real merit, whose batting figures, all things considered, are remarkably good. Like Fettes, the Merchiston side were too much dependent on their captain. Tennant, who is described by one who knows as the best Scotch school bat of the year. But unfortunately his golf is as good as his cricket, and there is a fear that the national game may in his favour oust the Southron. The most prominent player at Loretto was Steinthal, whose results, however, were hardly up to expectations based on his form. That school also must have had a pretty useful player in Clay, who was second in the batting averages and took 45 wickets for nine runs apiece. They beat Fettes decisively, but their defeat by the Academy was fully as decisive. The Glenalmond boys did better than was anticipated, and their best performance was in beating the Academy and that at a time when the latter were in the running for "Cock House."

Let me briefly summarise. The best batsmen of the year were, I consider, Benson (Eton), Bird and Cowley (Harrow), Ireland (Marlborough), Brougham (Wellington), Turner (Repton), Morgan (Mill Hill), and perhaps Leslie (Winchester), Piggott (Cheltenham), and Falcon (Harrow); the pick of the bowlers were, Bannister

(Tonbridge), Dickinson (Cheltenham), Vidler and Greswell (Repton), Leslie (Winchester), and Tuff (Malvern); the best wicket-keepers, May (Sherborne), Cuthbertson (Malvern), Pawson (Winchester), Barley (Tonbridge). If I were asked to select a representative eleven of the combined schools, my side would be, Bird, Benson, Ireland, Brougham, Bannister, Dickinson, Vidler, Cuthbertson, Leslie, Robertson-Rodger (Malvern), and the last place I should give to Watson (Rugby). I doubt whether this is as good a side as one could select most years, but given conditions which did not place too high a premium on experience, I should like to see them pitted against any second class county side. Nay, I would back them in guineas to sovereigns against more than one of the inner circle.

My task is now done; be it satisfactory or otherwise the parade is over, and I salute with every expression of gratitude my many kind correspondents, many of them old friends and many others personally unknown to me, without whose generous assistance in matters of detail this article would have been impossible. should like to have had a grumble on one or two points affecting school cricket, e.g., the prevalence of reckless hitting, the absence of accuracy in bowling, and the apparent inability of counties to get hold of and encourage rising amateur talent, but space forbids, and this article has already run to greater length than I ever anticipated.

ETON v. HARROW.

Played at Lord's, Friday, Saturday, July 12, 13.—The Eton and Harrow match of 1907 was one of the most memorable contests between the two schools, M. C. Bird, the Harrow captain, accomplishing the great feat, never before performed for either side, of making two separate hundreds-100 not out and 131. The bowling he had to face was, it must be confessed, very moderate in quality, but as to the excellence of his batting there could not be two opinions. As was truly said in one of the reports, no batsman had stood out by himself to quite the same extent in the match since Walter Forbes scored his 113 in 1876. Tall and powerfully built he, like Forbes, seemed to be a man playing among boys. He scored his 100 not out in an hour and three-quarters, hitting thirteen 4's, three 3's, and eight 2's, and for his 131, obtained out of 212, he was at the wickets two hours and a quarter. Forcing the pace so as to be able to declare, he made his last 31 runs in a quarter of an hour. This time his chief hits were fourteen 4's, one 3, and thirteen 2's. Essentially a forward player in style, he was greatly helped by a splendid wicket. At no time was the bowling strong enough to tax his defence Though his great performance dwarfed everything else in the match he did not have all the batting honours for Harrow to himself, Cowley, a watchful player with remarkable facility on the offside, playing two admirable innings, and Anson scoring an invaluable 73 not out on the second day. Among several good Eton batsmen Benson was easily the best. He played in more finished style than anyone, else in the two elevens, and his cutting was quite remarkable in its cleanness and power.

Harrow won the match after a wonderfully interesting fight by 79 runs, the end not being reached until twenty minutes past seven on the Saturday evening. At the drawing of stumps on the first day a very different result seemed in prospect, Eton looking to have the game in their hands. They led on the first innings by 69 runs, and Harrow, on going in for the second time, lost three wickets for 26. Scoring his 74 out of 102 in an hour and a half Benson hit ten 4's. Curtis's batting was not of the same class, but he played with refreshing vigour. On Saturday morning Harrow promptly retrieved their position, Cowley and Adair, the not outs, taking the score to 120. Altogether their partnership produced 103 runs, Bird went in fourth wicket down, and by his splendid batting relieved his side from all anxiety as to defeat. He and Anson put on 164 runs for the sixth wicket in an hour and three-quarters. With the total at 382 for eight wickets Bird declared the innings closed, Eton being left with 314 to get to win. It was ten minutes past four when the last innings of the match commenced, and though it had been agreed to go on if necessary until half-past seven, the chance of making the runs in three hours and twenty minutes was, of course, remote in the extreme. Still, Eton, risking everything for the possibility of a victory, did not attempt to play steadily for a draw, the batsmen following their ordinary methods. At twentyfive minutes past six half the side were out for 163, and then followed fifty-five minutes of most stimulating cricket. Eton ought to have saved the game, but at five minutes to seven Curtis's wicket was thrown away in a mad attempt at a short run. For this deplorable blunder there was no forgiveness. Lang, the Harrow wicket-keeper, brought off three catches in succession-two of them standing back—and finished off the innings for 234. It was a great match played in a thoroughly sporting spirit by both sides. Eton were very weak in bowling and were further handicapped by faulty fielding in the slips.

Bighty-two matches have been played, of which Eton have won thirty-one, Harrow thirty-four, and seventeen have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857, for boys under twenty, which has been rejected.
