# PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1912.

The apology of a summer in 1912 is a painful topic to recall. It had its baneful influence on all cricket and on none more than the Public Schools'. For schoolboys in particular, good fast wickets are the truest test. Batting on a sticky wicket is, perhaps, the highest form of the art, but it is doubtful whether a succession of wet wickets is likely to have any good effect on the batting of the average boy. Moreover, it increases the difficulties of the captain a hundred-fold. In dry weather he has his first two bowlers, and others to follow, and as long as he keeps changing them sufficiently often, and does not fall into the too common mistake of going through the lot before coming back to his first pair, he can come to little harm. In a wet season he has to know his bowler for the wicket, and use him to the best advantage, and he may find his fast bowler, of whom at the start of the season he had high hopes, practically "a passenger." Then again, the task of those devoted masters who spend some of their time in teaching cricket is made more difficult—and it may be said that they get "most of the kicks and few of the ha'pence." They need no defence from any writer, but it must be said that nothing disgusts the real cricketer more than to hear utterly undeserved abuse thrown on them by irresponsible and incompetent critics. There are broadly speaking two schools of coaching: one that encourages chiefly the attacking forward style of play, and the off-side shots; the other that relies mostly on sound defence. In both cases the happy medium is generally struck, but there is a tendency to condemn one method as producing unsound players and the other as producing "no shots." This is only less unfair than the wholesale condemnation when a school happens to have a succession of weak sides. Irresponsible critics at once say "Oh, the coaching is bad." A few years follow when there is first-class material to work on, but the coaches are given little credit. Probably old boys in large measure do not realise the difficulties, and mistakes are inevitable. The writer well remembers the late Mr. E. H. Buckland who, in one way, certainly was the ideal coach, namely that he inspired absolute confidence and trust in his powers. telling him some years after he had left school, "Public school coaching is a thing that no one can be any good at until he has been at it for some years."

In writing of the capabilities of the various teams there are many difficulties. In the first place it is a commonplace that runs are far more easily come by at some schools, such as Malvern and Charterhouse for instance, than at Harrow or many of the Northern Schools, and then there is the variation in the strength of the opposition. Further, one sees a side on paper going to play a school and the school beats them. At once one is inclined to say "What a fine performance." But when one analyses the opposing side, it is found perhaps that several of the batsmen who now-a-days may be "June" cricketers have probably had little practice and the bowlers are great lights of other days, whose arms have got low or whose spin is a thing of the past.

As a whole, from information that has kindly been supplied me, I am inclined to think that the standard was high in 1912, and that there were many good sides. I do not propose to attempt the impossible and say which was best. Of those I saw or played against I should unhesitatingly plump for Eton, and if they had had a slow bowler of class either right-hand or left, they would have been a remarkable boyside.

The Public Schools match v. M.C.C. at Lord's has now become an interesting feature of the season, mainly owing to the devoted work of Capt. E. G. Wynyard. To be asked to play in it is a great compliment and it includes nearly all the best boy players of the year, while the side selected against it is chosen to be strong enough but not too strong, and indeed possibly the bowling is a little weak in quality though strong in experience.

The side which played was as follows:—D. J. Knight (Malvern) captain; E. C. Moses (Repton); G. W. E. Whitehead (Clifton); E. F. Campbell (Eton); W. E. Hazelton (Wellingborough); G. E. C. Wood (Charterhouse); W. G. Southwell (Elstow School, Bedford); G. B. Crole (Edinburgh Academy); G. A. Wright (Charterhouse); P. Havelock-Davies (Brighton); and C. G. Aston (University College School).

It is not to be said that this was the strongest possible side. One of two who were invited could not play—among them H. Critchley-Salmonson, of Winchester—and for anyone, even with the greatest knowledge of all concerned, to pick the best side over so wide a field, would be a very hard task where there are so many candidates with almost equal claims. Certain cricketers would no doubt be in everyone's best, but for the last four or five places there would always be divergences of opinion.

Still it was a side well equipped at all points, but it was not possible for all the bowlers to have a chance of distinguishing themselves.

Unfortunately, after an even and interesting first day's play, the arch-enemy, rain, interfered, and the little play that took place on the second day was in as unpleasant conditions as can be imagined.

The boys batted first and as a whole this innings was disappointing, Knight and Moses both batted soundly for a bit, but seven men were out for just over 100 on an easy paced wicket against bowling that was not deadly, though experienced. Wright, of Charterhouse, fairly saved the side by courageous hitting and he found a useful partner in Crole. A magnificent innings by Mr. R. E. Foster, which—as a real object lesson—the boys must have enjoyed thoroughly, gave the M.C.C. a lead of ten.

Most of the bowling was done by Moses, slow medium right, and Hazelton just above medium right. Both bowled well, and it looked that Hazelton on a lively wicket might be a bowler of real class. He comes off the pitch quickly, and he has an occasional googly. Havelock-Davies and Aston had a few overs. On the second day, Wood and Knight made 35 for no wicket and then further play was impossible.

Another match against a weaker M.C.C. side was played on the Wednesday, but here again the conditions were a hopeless mud-pie, and gave little indication of the real form.

In dealing with the cricket of the various schools, I shall adopt the plan of grouping together as far as possible those who play one another.

An account of Eton and Harrow appears in another part of Wisden, so not more than a few words are necessary here. The schools were lucky in getting two of the few fine hot days of the summer. It has become almost more than a tradition and nearly a certainty that the match will prove exciting, and this year was no exception. Harrow won the toss and batted rather feebly, several being out after getting set, and were out for 188, a poor score on the Eton replied with 332, and the strength of the wicket. body of the team was amply shown. Three of the best bats failed, but this produced no lack of confidence in the others. Harrow went in again against a lead of 144 and this innings will be long remembered. Blount and Dickinson got together, and from the chances of defeat they pulled the match round until a draw looked the probable result, and even a possibility of a win was not out of the question. The score stood at 266 for four, or 122 ahead at 4.15, with play possible till 7.30, when Dickinson was out. Then at 272 Blount's fine innings of 137 came to an end by a wild stroke and the last wickets tumbled down in no time. Eton were left with 144

to get in two hours. They had some anxious moments, but the batting was very strong, and Eton got the runs at twenty past seven. They were all round the better—much the better side, but Blount's and Dickinson's effort deserved the greatest praise. It may be said that Blount was foolish to risk his wicket by such a stroke: that he ought to have gone on steadily until the match was quite safe. On the other hand to give Harrow a chance of a win runs were wanted quickly and with six wickets in hand, and the bowling tired, there was no reason to foresee an utter collapse. The bowling on neither side had proved above the average, with the possible exception of Heathcote-Amory, fast. But Eton were exceptionally strong in batting with at least five real players. Much of the fielding was quite first-rate.

Eton beat Winchester, who were without their captain, and far their best cricketer, Critchley-Salmonson, on Ridding Field, Winchester, by an innings and 46. Winchester batted first, and though the wicket, which was slow, gave the bowlers a bit of help, their batting broke down badly, and they were out for 48, the highest score being Morshead's 9. Chance bowled well, and got seven wickets. Eton lost three wickets quickly, including Wigan and Campbell, two of the best batsmen. Then Freeman-Thomas by fine forcing cricket, and Leggatt by the steadiest of defence put Eton ahead. But seven men were out for 86. Hough, however, who had bowled his slow medium with swing both ways admirably, was now tired and the last three Eton wickets by courageous batting put on over 100, and made the match practically safe. Winchester lost one wicket for 11 that night. Next day their batting again failed, and they were all out for 100.

In this match, too, Eton were much the better side—stronger and bigger, an important asset on a slow wicket, and better in batting all round. Freeman-Thomas's 46 was the best innings of the match. The Eton bowling was adequate, but nothing more. The one bright spot in the Winchester cricket was Hough's bowling. The fielding on both sides was very good and Amory caught a wonderful catch in Winchester's second innings. The ball went off Beart's bat low and hard to third man close in. Amory made ground to it and caught it an inch off the ground at arm's length. What difference Salmonson's presence would have made is impossible to calculate. Probably had he been there Eton would not have got 100 in their first innings, but such problematical discussions in these cases are unprofitable.

Eton were a very strong side: with a little more quality in the bowling they would have been a great school-boy side. At the beginning of the year the bowling and fielding looked

as if they would be considerably below the level of the batting, which was very strong from the start, but by the middle of June the side was strong all round, and capable of putting up a good match on any kind of wicket. Heathcote-Amory, fast right, was the best bowler, but he hardly had a fast wicket to bowl on before Lord's. Chance, medium right, was also useful, and he took thirty wickets for eight runs apiece. Wigan, the captain, medium right, and Llewellyn Davies, medium left, are both useful. The fielding as the season wore on was quite first-class. Burrows was a fine shortslip, and Campbell at cover-point, and Freeman-Thomas were very good in the field. But it was in batting that the greatest strength lay. There were several really good players and, moreover, the side could bat all down, a feature of Eton teams of recent years. The presence of strong hard-hitting batsmen from Nos. 6 to 10 is a great asset, and they proved it in both school matches. Wigan, the captain, did well throughout, and is a thoroughly sound player. Freeman-Thomas was possibly the best bat in the side, and might become quite first-class. He can drive with great power. He is qualified for Sussex and is quite good enough to play for them now. Campbell was not so successful as in 1911. He plays in the right way and has many beautiful strokes, particularly past the covers, but he is a little apt to be rash at present. Burrows and Rawstorn (still quite young), who played at Lord's with such success, but not at Winchester, are full of promise. Wigan made an excellent captain, and he has a fine record, having been on the winning side all three times he played against Harrow, and both times he played against Winchester. Heathcote-Amory is captain next year.

Inasmuch as they lost the match against Eton, Winchester had rather a disappointing season, but the loss of their captain, H. Critchley-Salmonson, before the game, was incalculable. Taken all round Salmonson was probably the best boy bowler of the year, and he had the gift of a fast bowler, who would make full use of a sticky wicket. He combined with his pace length and swerve, and he could also make the ball turn back, while it comes from a great height with a good action. He was a nasty customer to tackle on a bad wicket and most of the matches Winchester won were largely the result of his work. As a batsman he was rather disappointing. He has beautiful off-side strokes, but was far from sound. The other bowling was not strong. Hough, slow medium right, was a useful steady bowler with a swerve both ways, but beyond the first pair there was little strength, and against Eton, Hough had to bear the brunt alone. Hough did nothing in batting against Eton, but he was perhaps the most dangerous bat on the side, with many on-side scoring strokes. Morshead is a sound defensive player,

with good style and an excellent man to go in first, but he is not strong, and, indeed, as a whole Winchester were a small side, and this is a drawback in a wet year, when the ball has to be forced hard through the field to get runs. Middleditch is a promising player with good wrists, and Beart often got runs in unattractive style. Still the batting as a whole was not strong. The fielding was good, and Johnston was a fair wicket-keep. Hough is captain for 1913, and Morshead, Middleditch, Hamilton, and Cooper will also still be at school.

Harrow were not a strong side and they did not win a single match, but it must be remembered that the strength of opposing teams at Harrow is as strong, if not stronger, than anywhere else. The batting was not sound. Blount, the captain, had an average of 28, but he did little besides his remarkable century at Lord's. He is, however, strong, and is quite dangerous. Dickinson (average 28) was the steadiest player, and always a hard man to get out. Jackson (average 20) was brilliant with splendid wrists, but most unsound and excitable. C. S. Wilson was the best batsmen in the side. He has nice style and plenty of shots, but he was too often out, as at Lord's, in feeling for a wide ball. Of the others, G. Wilson is very small at present but is most promising.

The bowling was disappointing at Lord's, but on the whole was better than the batting. Trew, who got twenty wickets for 18, keeps a good length, with a swerve from leg, but he does not use his head, and his bowling lacks life. Wrighey (twenty for 23) bowls "fastish," but is inclined to overpitch the ball. Buller (twenty wickets for 25) bowls googlies, which were quite useful, though against men and especially batsmen quick on their feet they are too slow to be dangerous. Jackson bowls right-hand medium, with a big in-swing, of which, however, he has little control at present. Much had been hoped from Blount behind the wicket, but he hardly came up to expectations. The fielding was keen and good, and the throwing in the words of one who saw a great deal of Harrow cricket "as good as I have ever seen in a school side." Jackson was a really good cover-point. He will captain the side next year, and Buller, Trew, and G. Wilson will also be at Harrow. In the last two seasons, Harrow have had rather lean years. It is only due to lack of material, and not in any degree to lack of keenness among boys or coaches.

Charterhouse won their annual match against Westminster by an innings and 100: their game against Wellington was hopelessly ruined by rain. Against Westminster, who were in reality a strong side, they had all the best of the luck of the wicket. Rudd won the toss for

Westminster, and his side batted on a difficult wicket-it is easy to be wise after the event and say that he might have done better to put his opponents in. No one without knowledge of the ground could have foreseen that the ball would fly about all over the place, and the side were out for 77—six men caught in "the box." The wicket was rapidly recovering, and Charterhouse made 306. Westminster scored 20 for none overnight. Next day came the inevitable rain. No play was possible in the morning, and at four o'clock Rudd consented to play on a new wicket, when Westminster were out for 129, having had all the worst of the luck of the match. Charterhouse as a whole had a fairly successful season. A wet season as a rule does not suit Charterhouse batsmen, and the side suffered from the want of a really reliable bat to come off on plenty of occasions. Wright, the captain, is a keen all-round cricketer. As a bat he has not enough defence for a wet wicket. In a dry season his wrist and racquet shots would have brought him heaps of runs. Morrison has the makings of a fine batsman, but he has a habit of becoming rather reckless after getting into the twenties and thirties, and then tries to hit too many balls for six, and is apt to pick a "wrong un," and pay the penalty. Ford is the most useful allround cricketer, a batsman of merit, and a useful medium-pace right-hand bowler. Letten and Rucker both fast bowlers, were partially disabled at times and they had practically no wickets to suit them. Wright bowls medium right, and Stevens, slow, is a useful bowler who uses his head. The best part of the work lay in the fielding which was distinctly good on most occasions, Morrison in the country being particularly good.

From Westminster, apart from the failure against Charterhouse, come reports of a most successful year and great promise for the immediate future. They were luckier than most schools in their wickets. Seven matches were won, including I.Z., Old Westminsters, Eton Ramblers, Incogniti, and Old Wykehamists, and five lost, three of them at the hands of particularly good sides of Household Brigade, Free Foresters, and M.C.C. Rudd, the captain, Kann, and Cobbold are all good cricketers, and Cobbold, who got fifty-six wickets for 14, is a really good right-hand medium bowler. He and Rudd individually carried off the honours, and both did splendid work. Rudd had a batting average of 55, great work for such a season, and got twenty-nine wickets for 25 odd. As a batsman he does not possess the orthodox schoolboy style. He does not play forward at all well and is weak off his legs, but he drives and hooks with tremendous power, somewhat after the style of Hutchings. Seldom does a schoolboy drive harder or punish the short ball more freely on both sides of the wicket. He plays the cricket suited to his make and shape, and very excellent cricket it is, though apt to be underrated by the casual observer on account of his lack of style. As he is also a very useful fast medium bowler and an excellent catch in any position, as well as a first-rate wicket-keeper, his value to the side cannot be overestimated. Cobbold is a slow-medium bowler of the best type. His length is unimpeachable and he swings and turns the ball just that little amount that beats the batsman without missing the wicket. He can bowl all day and never loses heart when hit, and if Rudd could put on a little more pace these two should indeed prove a formidable pair next year. Kann is a fine free left-handed batsman; a bit lucky in the direction of the slips, as most left-handers seem to be, but is full of good shots and watches the ball well: is a fine field and has got a few wickets by throwing up a lazy-looking ball which has been known to google. As a whole the side were strong all round, and it is many years since Westminster had four such cricketers as Cobbold, Rudd, Kann, and Potter, a good and stylish bat, in an eleven at the same time. Indeed, it is said to be the strongest team they have had for a long time. Seven old colours, including Rudd, Kann, and Cobbold, and Veitch, who is promising, remain for next year.

From Wellington comes a melancholy tale. Practically every important match ruined by rain. Against Charterhouse at Wellington, Charterhouse lost two wickets for 43 and play was abandoned; against Haileybury one innings apiece was played, and Wellington finished off a few runs behind. The fielding of the side was good. The bowling fair, with Crofton quite a good left-hand bowler, and the batting weak. The side were really too young and inexperienced to do well in batting. Wellington cricket suffers almost more than any other school by men leaving young for the Army, etc., and a year or so at seventeen means a great difference. It is satisfactory to know that six of this year's side remain for 1913, including several of the more prominent cricketers.

Rugby had rather a disappointing year. In both their school matches against Clifton and against Marlborough their batting broke down and they suffered defeat. At Lord's against Marlborough the failure was on quite an easy wicket, and against bowling which if very useful was by no means deadly. Rugby did well in getting out Marlborough cheaply first time, and on the whole there was not much to choose between the batting of the sides. The best performance of the year was probably their win against Liverpool by one run in the early part of the season.

At the beginning of May there was considerable promise of a very fair side, but after the overwhelming collapse at Clifton they never recovered, and in fact they seemed to get worse. None of the old

colours came on as expected, with the result that there was never anyone good enough to pull the side together. There were four useful and steady bowlers, but none really difficult to play. Elliott, the captain, was the best. He bowls a very slow medium off-break with an occasional swing in from leg. Generally speaking the batting was lacking in defence. More than half the side were capable of hitting the ball hard and nicely all round the wicket, but no one with the possible exception of Clarke was capable of keeping an end up. Johnstone, a young cricketer, was the most promising bat on the side, and Bretherton, who is a good cutter, the most dangerous and attractive to watch, also a fine cover-point. I have heard it whispered that some of the Rugby players were fond of Lawn Tennis—a game not to be encouraged in term time, in any case for cricketers worthy of the name. The fielding generally speaking was satisfactory, but some expensive "sitters" were missed at times. A. de Selincourt is captain for 1913, and of the others Johnstone, Bickersteth, Brian, Poole, and Leslie will still be at Rugby.

Marlborough had had two very fine sides in 1910 and 1911, and each time had failed to beat Rugby at Lord's. Last year with a weaker one they were successful, for they won the match by eight wickets, and as they also beat Cheltenham by nine wickets they must be accounted to have had a successful season. In the school matches Busk, a fast medium right-hand bowler, met with great success. Against Cheltenham he got twelve wickets for 54 (eight in the second innings for 12, and the wicket hit each time), and at Lord's he took eleven for 76: in all therefore he got twenty-three for 130 in the two matches.

As a whole the side were not so strong as usual in batting. They were quite inexperienced—the three old colours were all bowlers but the bats were not very bad in that they at least tried to watch the ball and hit it hard. A number of those who played against Marlborough were most impressed with the potentialities of Oliver, who has an average of 46 for fourteen innings, a fine forcing left-handed batsman. He was undoubtedly lucky and, though not sound, yet shows the greatest promise. The chief strength lay in the bowling. Woodroffe, who played for Hants in August, fast, perhaps did not show much advance in his form of the two years before, but he and Busk were the mainstays, and they got many sides out cheaply. Woodroffe in the season got forty-four wickets for 17 odd and Busk forty-one for 15. And the changes were full of contrast. Case, fast, if erratic. Batson, slow-medium, and Vallance leg-breaks. The fielding improved enormously as time went on. Batson is captain for 1913.

Cheltenham lost to Marlborough and to Clifton, who beat them by 133, and to Haileybury who were victorious after a keen and exciting game, and a splendid finish by 12 runs. Haileybury batted first and made 163, Cheltenham headed this score by 12. Haileybury's second innings was marked by a fine second-wicket partnership by Lawrence and Marson, who put on 97, but Faviell bowled very well afterwards, and in the end Cheltenham were left with 231 to get. A fine stand by Wood and Taylor put on 75 for the second wicket. Then Haileybury got on top again. Faviell and Macfaydyen made a fine effort, but it did not last quite long enough, and Haileybury just brought off a fine win after a close match all through. It was on the whole a disappointing season, after a good start in May on hard wickets, but the batsmen did not learn to play on slow, and the bowlers, of whom there were several, but no star, were swingers and not breakers, and so unsuited to the wickets. Faviell on hard wickets might easily be really good. The fielding was safe and painstaking, but with no pretence to brilliance.

Wood is a really good bat, with good defence and great forcing power. Somehow he could not get going, well as he was playing. He kept wicket excellently, his main fault being that he lets too many byes on the leg-side. In the holidays he did very well as a bat, and in Shropshire he had the distinction of hitting Mr. H. C. McDonell for 28 in an over. Against Marlborough, Cheltenham lost four wickets off consecutive balls, and at the start of the first innings v. Clifton four men were out off the first balls they received (though another batsman played ten balls meanwhile). The side won their first two matches v. the Cryptics and "Incogs." comfortably, the third by a narrow margin; and then went to bits in batting on a succession of slow wickets.

Haileybury played twelve matches, won five, lost three, and drew four. They won the Cheltenham match by 12 runs, drew with Wellington, only an innings apiece being possible, and had the worst of the draw v. Uppingham. They beat the Masters, the Old Wykehamists, Incogniti and Mr. G. S. Pawle's eleven and were beaten by the M.C.C., the Butterflies, who always have a strong side in this match, and Free Foresters. The batting of the side as a whole lacked soundness. The bulk of the side could bat and get runs fairly quickly, and there were two or three useful hitters, about Nos. 8 and 9, who apparently did not suffer from nerves, but nearly all were rather uncertain and weak in defence. Lawrence, average 33, and Marson, 33, were the exceptions. Both are sound and promising players. Hake, the captain, also averaged 33. The bowling was above the average, and there was more of it than usual. McKenzie (fifty wickets for 15.02), who bowls

fast right with an occasional slow—not of the type that counts 4—and Hughes-Hallett (twenty-one wickets for 21.33), slow-right, with a high action, were the best. Thorne, slow medium, was good on slow wickets only. There was no left-hander. The fielding reached a high standard. Hake will again be captain in 1913 and Carstairs, Hughes-Hallett, Lawrence, Marson, and Baker are also left.

Clifton had a very successful season and were without doubt a fine side. They won their school match against Rugby very easily by an innings and 160, and beat Cheltenham by 123 in a low scoring match. One performance they did which will be long remembered. though they did not win the match. On one of the few perfect wickets of the year they made 531 against Liverpool, who are always in the school tour a side to be reckoned with. The first wicket put on 126, and the second wicket stand between Errington and Whitehead, 182. Errington got 130 and Whitehead in the end made 259 not out, a record for the school, beating the former highest by 31, and a great performance by any schoolboy. The total was also a record for the school in a foreign match. Farnell, the captain, was unfortunately out of form, and apart from an innings of 49 v. Cheltenham, and 36 not out v. Clifton Club, he did not do very much. He made a satisfactory captain, though he did not know enough about the game to be first-rate. Whitehead came out with a fine average for such a season. He was, of course, picked for the Public Schools' match at Lord's, but his batting there was a little disappointing. Errington was a good and attractive bat. He also kept wicket, but was not above the average. Bebb might have done better than he did, but possibly he was apt not to take quite the necessary trouble when once he had got his colours. Chitty was the best bowler Clifton have had for some years. He bowled slow to medium left-hand and both turned the ball and had a swerve. He seldom failed to get wickets. Wright bowled fast, but he was not suited by the slow wickets. He did, however, one splendid piece of bowling against Cheltenham. Grant was a useful hitter though without much defence: a useful field and a poor medium-pace bowler. Higgins is a batsman of most prepossessing style and a good Next year Whitehead, Grant, Higgins, Hughes-Games, and Mackay will still be at school.

Malvern played eleven matches, four won, four lost, and three drawn. As must have been the case with other schools, the wet summer did not give the boys a real chance. If the weather had been dry Malvern would have had as good a side as they have ever had, but typical Malvern batting does not come off on slow wickets as a rule. There were three really good bats, Knight, Pethick, and Cuming. Knight played all August for Surrey as he did in 1911,

not without success. He has a big reputation which he may or may not fulfil. His defence is very sound and he has far more knowledge of cricket than the ordinary school-boy, and his style is already absolutely formed. He will undoubtedly be very good, but very likely not great. He has modelled his batting too much on the professional style and it is most different, as different as anything can be, from the typical and beautiful Malvern style with the wealth of off-side shots: as exemplified by the Fosters, by Mr. W. H. B. Evans, or Mr. S. H. Dav. It was curious in the Public School match to see the typical amateur style of the greatest of past Malvern boys, Mr. R. E. Foster, and the utterly different thing of a present boy player. Knight is sound and good, but a glorious hour of the true amateur type of batting is worth many hours of the other style both in enjoyment to the player and spectator. Pethick is quite a good forcing bat, with some fine shots, also bad faults which with experience he will get over. Cuming is full of cricket, plays in beautiful style, and if he has the chance will go a long way. There was a distinct tail to the batting.

The bowling depended too much on Naumann and Grieve. The former a slow left-hander, very accurate but wanting in "devil." But he might easily get into a 'Varsity side. Grieve is fastish right-hand, a bit inaccurate, but he frequently bowls a very nasty one. The fielding was pretty fair, but might have been better. Here again the frequent wet ball and sloppy ground did not conduce to accuracy. White was one of the best of boy stumpers, certainly the best seen at Malvern, not excepting W. S. Bird, and it will be surprising if he doesn't play at Lord's some day for Oxford.

The match against Repton was a poor game, made so, in some degree, by the slowness of the Repton batting. Malvern narrowly escaped a beating, but their batting was better in style and potentially than Repton. Repton's bowler and captain, Moses, was better than any Malvern had, and their ground fielding very much better. Repton had some luck in catching two of Malvern's best bats off the stumper's foot! one at short slip and the other at close-in short leg! small incidents but they meant much. Mr. H. K. Foster brought a strong M.C.C. side, and there is every excuse for the boys getting out on a VERY sticky wicket against Thompson and Morton, the former at his very best. Cuming's innings of 55 not out in this match was probably the best played by any member of the XI during the term. Prospects for next year should be bright, with Knight back again, a stumper in Odling, little inferior to White, and Grieve and one or two others to bowl.

In the last ten years no school have had such a high level of side as Repton, and though that of 1912 will not compare with many of the

earlier ones of this century, it was no bad one. Their record is two wins, two losses, and five drawn games. The wins were against Derby Friars and the Aliens, while the school were beaten by Burton. and by Mr. H. S. Altham's XI. The draws included both school matches, Old Reptonians, Notts Amateurs, and Esher. Every match was played on a mud wicket, except the school match at Malvern. Five more minutes would have converted the draw with Notts Amateurs into a win, and the same remark applies to the Malvern match. The Uppingham match was played on a difficult wicket. Repton made a respectable score in the circumstances. and when the other side went in they were quite unable to deal with the slow bowling of Moses, who took seven wickets for 46. Repton were 220 on with five wickets in hand when rain put a stop to the match at lunch time on the second day, a very strong position. If these three matches had been won we should put it down as a really good season instead of summing it up as disappointing and spoilt by the rain. Repton had a batting side with very little tail. In fact, the last five wickets more than doubled the score oftener than not. Moses, the captain, who headed the averages in 1911, failed to find his form on the soft wickets, and the same remark applies to Palmer. But the rest all did as well as could be expected, considering the conditions. As one would expect, the averages are on the low side, but they are a level lot. The bowling averages are correspondingly low. Moses was far and away the best. He bowls slow off-breaks with any amount of spin on the ball, and he has a really good fast one that goes with his arm. Parsons was the fast bowler of the team, and was not suited by the conditions as he frequently could not get a foothold. He bowled very well at times, and had the misfortune to strain his side in the Malvern match. The others were not very good. In a dry season Repton would probably have been very strong in batting, and weak in bowling. In this very wet season they had quite strong batting, and with Moses on the side the attack was always formidable. The fielding was quite safe and at times reached a very high level. Several brilliant catches were made and no real sitters dropped.

Uppingham. Out of eight matches played, five were won and three drawn. This successful record was achieved by good all-round play, but it was the bowling which will be most remembered as exceptional. The Repton match ended in a draw in favour of Repton. A fine century by Wilshin, good batting by Mayhew, and excellent bowling by Morris and Stephen gave Uppingham the best of the draw with Haileybury. An innings victory over Shrewsbury, with a fine century by Newton, and good bowling by Stephen, wound up the season, and another victory was over the Old Boys, who were beaten after a fine match by 16 runs. In batting

Wilshin, Barn, and Wynne were consistently good, while in the bowling Trubshaw, Morris, and Stephen contributed a most formidable attack. The fielding on the whole was good, Wilshin being very conspicuous at cover; but the running between the wickets with a few exceptions left a good deal to be desired. Four old colours remain for 1913, Wynne, Miller (who for the last two seasons has kept wicket exceptionally well), Stephen, and Newton.

Shrewsbury were probably a better side than the results of their matches would show, especially their school matches against Rossall and Uppingham, which were both lost by an innings, but the want of a good fast bowler was severely felt. In bowling, neither of the old bowlers, A. E. P. Grant and R. T. Miller quite fulfilled expectations, the former, while bowling very well against the Foresters, having lost something of his length and steadiness, and the latter being inclined to sacrifice too much to pace. Of new performers M. C. Dempsey (left-hand) is very promising, but at present rather too slow against batsmen of some experience: he can turn the ball a lot, and has an occasional dangerous ball going the other way. He got thirty-five wickets for 21 odd runs apiece. G. E. Raven came out at the top of the averages. with fourteen for 16 and was hardly made enough use of. The same may be said of R. B. Stones, not by any means an unsuccessful bowler in 1911. The wicket-keeping of P. Dempsey was very fair; sometimes decidedly smart and not a great number of extras given away. In batting, R. B. Stones (average 35) and the captain, D. Boumphrey (34.1) were the principal scorers throughout the season, and both are delightful batsmen to watch. R. T. Miller and R. Bridges came on a lot and made runs late in the season, but unfortunately had not found their form at the time of the school matches. Grant, a very straight bat but rather stiff and wanting in variety, played excellent cricket at times, but never looked safe for a long score. M. C. Dempsey proved a valuable addition. All were capable of making runs on occasions, and in favourable circumstances. D. Boumphrey had the soundest and best defence. The fielding was pretty good: but there were one or two conspicuously uncertain catchers. R. T. Miller was a fine catch in the outfield.

Against Rossall, at Rossall, Shrewsbury had the misfortune to drop a catch which would have dismissed for under 20 an opponent who reached his century. Going in against 223 at the end of the first day they made 64 for four, not enough on the wicket as it was then, and after heavy rain in the night, which necessitated a change of wicket, followed by a blazing sun, they were quite unequal to saving the "follow" or the match, and were beaten in an innings by 39 runs. Uppingham came to Shrewsbury and won by an innings and 121 runs. The home-team was quite outplayed at all points

of the game, the visitors being exceptionally strong. M. C. Dempsey alone batted up to his reputation for the Shrewsbury team. Of other matches the School with a fast bowler should have won that against Shrewsbury C.C., their first match; scoring 202 against their opponents' 128 for eight wickets. Fine batting was shown by D. Boumphrey (92 and 112) and R. B. Stones (103 and 94) in the matches against Shropshire Gentlemen and Aliens C.C., by Stones and R. T. Miller in both innings against the Old Salopians and by Bridges and Boumphrey in the Foresters match. In this match Grant's bowling, which helped to get rid of the visitors for 158 in their first attempt, was remarkably good, but in the second innings the Foresters mastered the school bowling and reached a total of 394 for seven wickets. The match was drawn: Free Foresters, 158 and 394 for seven. School, 316. P. Dempsey is captain for 1913 and M. Dempsey, B. H. Ellis, and W. R. Bridges are also available.

Rossall won both their School matches, beating Shrewsbury in an innings and Loretto by five wickets; and as they have eight or nine old colours left the prospects of the school are very bright for next year. The outstanding feature of the season was the all-round cricket of G. B. Davies, the captain. His batting at times was brilliant and especially so against Shrewsbury and Liverpool, when he got 100's both times. He has a number of good sound strokes on both sides of the wicket. He bowls slow medium, can turn the ball both ways and varies his pace well. He is also a fine short slip. He averaged in batting 33.42 in fourteen innings, and got forty-one wickets for 14.75. He played for Essex all August, and he is now at Selwyn College, Cambridge. J. L. Wood, who will probably be captain in 1913, played some good innings in steady style but he lacks enterprise. G. S. B. Cliffe bowled slow leg-breaks well, especially against Shrewsbury in their second innings when he got five for 18. The fielding was good, especially Davies (short slip), C. R. Disney (extra-cover), D. T. Figgis (cover), G. C. G. Macaulay, and F. Brundritt, third man and deep. T. L. Ellis, the wicket-keep, was quite average, but nothing more. Disney and F. B. Cameron were useful change bowlers, medium to fast medium right. A left-hander was wanted badly. J. L. Wood, G. L. Ellis. C. R. Disney, G. S. Cliffe, F. Brundritt, F. B. Cameron, R. E. Boncher. A. Harrison, and possibly D. T. Figgis will be at Rossall in 1913.

Tonbridge played eleven matches of which two—Old Tonbridgians and Incogniti were won. They were beaten by Tonbridge Town, Bluemantles (for whom Mr. N. F. Druce played one of his many fine innings of the year), M.C.C., and Free Foresters; and drew with B.B., Harlequins, Sherborne, Blackheath. No play was possible in the match against I.Z. owing to rain. Though the results are disappointing,

the school team was an average side. The only school match was against Sherborne—here Tonbridge had the better of the game, but want of time prevented a finish—this is so often the case in this match that it is a moot point whether it should be a one day instead of a two day match. Against the Band of Brothers and Blackheath, Tonbridge might well have won had time permitted. The batting was distinctly of a higher class than the bowling, which was only moderate in quality. Curry, a somewhat erratic leg-break bowler. was unfortunately prevented from playing much. In batting, Coates, who is now at Cambridge, batted consistently well. He is a free left-handed bat with good strokes. Gass, who heads the averages, started splendidly, but was taken ill with appendicitis, and thus lost for most of the season. Musson is a fine forcing bat, and as he is also a very good wicket-keeper is the best cricketer of the side. He is captain next year and much is expected of him. The rest of the side, with one exception, could all make runs. The fielding was always good, Barrow and Musson being particularly so; it is very gratifying to note their improvement in this important branch of the game. Tonbridge is one of the school grounds which are a batsman's paradise. The wicket in fine weather is just the right pace, the ball does not get up and on one side it is a short four, so naturally averages are high. Gass averaged 53, but he only played three innings. Coates got 458 runs with an average of 41, and Musson averaged 34, and Hilary also over 30. Hilary got twenty-six wickets for 18.

Dulwich played thirteen matches, of which eight were won, four lost, and one drawn; but the matches against other schools were lost, and the season is always judged by what happens then. Also the team were for several games considerably weakened by the absence of E. G. Loudoun-Shand, the captain. With regard to school matches, those against Bedford and Tonbridge were unfortunately scratched, but the other two against St. Paul's and Brighton College were both lost. On a difficult wicket Havelock-Davies and Murdoch for Brighton ran through the Dulwich XI and dismissed them for 55. Their total was 147. St. Paul's beat them by 103 to 83. The most creditable win of the year was against the M.C.C., the school gaining an excellent victory by nine runs: scores 164-155. In this game Waite by taking six for 53 and Nunes and F. W. Gilligan by making 79 and 33 respectively won Dulwich the game. Another creditable win was against the Old Wykehamists. The Old Wykehamists batted first and made 78, Waite bowling finely and taking five wickets for 14. Dulwich replied with 120 for nine wickets, for whom A. E. R. Gilligan played a fine innings of 34. The chief strength of Dulwich was the bowling and fielding, while the weakness lay in the batting. R. K. Nunes, however, a left-hander, might

easily become first-class, for he has sound defence, though he is a little weak against fast bowling, and plenty of strokes. He averaged 40 for the season, getting 480 runs with a highest score of 103. Gilligan took thirty-one wickets for 11.42. Loudoun-Shand was enormously strong, and could hit the ball a very long way, but he was apt to pick a "wrong un." For 1913, A. E. R. Gilligan is captain, and he and two other bowlers who have been in the side two years already are left, as is F. W. Gilligan, an improving wicket-keeper.

Brighton did not start the season with particularly good prospects but any gloomy anticipations were not fulfilled. Fourteen matches were played, nine were won, four lost, and one against M.C.C. drawn. In School matches Brighton beat Lancing by an innings and St. Paul's, Dulwich, and Merchant Taylors by handsome margins. They were beaten by Christ's Hospital, who were a strong side. Their successful season was due chiefly to two cricketers, P. Havelock-Davies, who was chosen to play at Lord's, and A. J. Murdoch, who both in batting and bowling shared the brunt of the work. Havelock-Davies was a good bowler in 1911, a better one in 1912, when he has also developed his batting. His action does not make him look so formidable as he really is. Only once did opponents of Brighton make over 200, and eight times sides were got out for under 100-a feat even in a wet year. In batting Davies and Murdoch have carried off the honours, but several others did useful work. These two are the best all-round men Brighton have had for many years, and both might be heard of in other cricket. In batting Davies averaged 31, and got 413 runs and Murdoch 31 for a total of 503. Davies got the great amount of seventy-eight wickets in 271 overs-that is a wicket in roughly every twenty balls-for 10 runs apiece, and Murdoch, a large number, eighty-two for 12 runs each. Of 199 wickets got for the school this pair took 160.

Sherborne had not a very successful season. One match was won, four drawn, and three lost. In School matches there was a draw with Tonbridge and Sherborne beat Radley by five wickets. The side much improved as time went on. At first the batting was unreliable, partly due to the youth and inexperience of the team; but in the last three matches they did well. Only Hodgson averaged over twenty, but Bramall (19) was the soundest player on the side, with plenty of strokes and good defence. The fielding in the latter part of the year was good. Gray, the captain, was rather disappointing as a bat, and would have been a better bowler if he had bowled slow and not medium-pace. He captained a young side with patience and keenness. As a whole, although the eleven was not a strong one, it was better than results show. Hodgson, Crosby, Dixon, Cornish, and Webb will be at Sherborne in 1913.

Bradfield finished few matches, partly owing to rain, and partly to the wickets. The new ground apparently never becomes difficult. even after wet, and has turned out a paradise for batsmen, which is not entirely an advantage. Only two matches were won, but the side were unusually strong in batting, and had useful bowlingindeed it is probably the best side Bradfield have had for some time. Gordon, a left-handed bat is only sixteen years of age, and shows the greatest promise. He has sound defence and punishing powers easily applied. He was a most consistent scorer and an average of 50 on any ground is great work for so young a batsman. Postlethwaite (average 23), Bradshaw (average 27), Dixon, Readell, and Jones all did their share in batting. The bowling was steady and varied, but the wickets are so good that only really first-rate bowlers can make an impression on batsmen of class. The fielding was good with the exception of one bad day and sometimes brilliant on a ground where it is not easy to gather the ball cleanly. Postlethwaite captained with the utmost keenness, and set a splendid example to the team. The Radley match was ruined by rain: Bradfield made 192 for five declared—the declaration was too long deferred, and Radley 47 for one wicket. Gordon, Jones, Cox, Hissey, Stocken, and Roberts are left for 1913.

Radley, who lost to Sherborne, and drew with Bradfield were weak in batting. They depended too much on Gibbons and Hine, and with the others failing so often these two had heavy responsibility. The unreliability of the batting was unfortunate as some of those who got runs occasionally showed they might be capable players. The attack proved better than expected, and the outcricket generally was good, but at least two players were bad catchers, and as so often happens the catches frequently "found them," and the side suffered heavily in consequence. Hind, the captain, a solid and effective batsman always hard to get out, was not a great tactician in the field, but he had the knack of getting the best out of the eleven. O. A. Reid is captain for 1913, and of the others T. P. Gibbons, R. C. Keller, and L. B. Hardy are expected to be at Radley.

Forest School played twelve matches, four won, four drawn, and four lost. They had an exceptionally good bat in F. W. H. Nicholas who played a bit for Essex in August, two good all-round cricketers in Martyn and Thompson, and four others of some ability, so that the actual record is a little disappointing. The matches against St. John's, Leatherhead, and Merchant Taylors' were drawn. Nicholas played many fine innings, possibly, however, the best was his 49 against M.C.C., but when he and Martyn, a very steady player, failed there was often trouble in store. The bowling turned out better

than anticipated, largely owing to Thompson. Martyn might do better if he bowled slower. The fielding, too, especially the groundwork, was satisfactory. Nicholas's average is quite remarkable: twelve innings, three not outs, 875 runs, 210 not out highest, average 97. His defence and on-side play have improved without losing his fine off-side shots. Martyn averaged 55 and Thompson got forty wickets for 14.17.

Highgate School had a very disappointing season. The batting was very weak. Heaton-Ellis, the captain, only came off once (75 v. King's School, Canterbury), and owed his position at top in the averages to this alone. W. L. Burton and G. D. Loup, a left-hander. were good, but uncertain, but both had bad luck in being run out. The season will always be remembered for Buxton's splendid achievement v. M.C.C., taking all ten wickets for 69 on a good wicket out of a total of 220. He, however, varied between very good and very bad. Windover was steady, but very expensive; Loup still more expensive. Bowling, however, usually sufficed, but batting often lost a match, i.e., all out for 64 v. Merchant Taylors; all out for 52 v. Hampstead, losing five wickets without a run. Highgate won two school matches out of three played, the others being scratched. W. L. Buxton and G. D. Loup are the only two who remain for 1913. but, as they are the two best men in the eleven, and as six or seven of the pick of the second eleven remain, the season of 1913 should be successful.

Owing to illness, Dover College played no school matches, so all their games, of which six were won, six lost, one drawn, and one abandoned, were against men. The state of the Dover College ground after April's drought was not favourable to the batsmen, as it needed rain to overcome the effect of football and hockey in winter. This accounts partly for the low level of batting averages. as when the eleven began to improve, wet wickets came which made scoring difficult again. The batting undoubtedly improved as the season went on. Brooks, Woodroffe, Nevill, and Moore playing good innings at times, especially the former, who showed much promise in his first season. The bowling was fairly good, though better suited by fast wickets on the whole than slow. Stewart. who bore the brunt of the work, took forty-five wickets for 15.1 runs per wicket. Brooks and Walton gave useful assistance. Harrison, one of the best all-round players in the team, was unfortunately away through illness, for the greater part of the term. and was much missed in all departments of the game. The two games at end of term with I.Z. and Free Foresters produced the best cricket which the XI showed, though rain spoiled the match with I.Z. a good deal. Prospects for next year are good as most of this year's

XI will be here still, though Stewart and Woodroffe, L. M. Kerr and Harrison will be missed. Brooks and Nevill should get a good many runs next year on their form. The latter hardly did himself justice this season. Promising players outside the eleven are not wanting, especially among those under 16. The nets wickets are to be relaid this winter.

Eastbourne played seventeen matches, won three, drew two, and lost twelve. The side was only occasionally up to its full strength owing to the absence of Thompson, the captain, and Bryan Brown, a promising all-round player. On the whole the batting of the side was very fair, but there was a great lack of bowlers and the fielding was not quite as good as it might have been. Hake is captain for 1913, and Bryan, Brown, Wingfield, and Eagleton will also be at school.

Christ's Hospital had a most successful year. They won eight matches, lost one, and drew five, two of which looked like victories if time permitted. The wins were against M.C.C., Lancing, Eastbourne, Cranleigh, City of London School, Brighton College, and Horley. Cullen was the steadiest bat, and most consistent with an average of 70, and the large number of 700 runs, including four centuries, in thirteen innings. Tyndale (average 44) was the most attractive player, and he puts any amount of power behind his strokes. T. Wright and Bridel bore the brunt of the attack. The former, a slow left-hander, got fifty-two wickets for 11 runs apiece, and bowled particularly well against Lancing, Brighton, and Eastbourne. Bridel is fast right. Four old choices remain: Cullen, who will be captain, Woods, Tengue and D. Wright.

I much regret that I did not have the chance of seeing the Wellingborough Grammar School side play. They had a wonderful season, and from all accounts they were not only the best eleven the school has ever had, but many think they would challenge comparison with any school team of the year. First as to their record. They played twelve matches, winning ten, including all the school matches, losing one, to Lord Lilford's side at Lilford; and drawing one: the return with Lord Lilford's at home. Their victories-many of them routs-included: Elstow School twice, Bedford Modern School, Nottingham School, City of London School, and Bedfordshire Club and Ground. Only against Bedford Modern School did they look at all likely to be defeated. The batting collapsed, and the side were out for 68, but then J. White and Hazelton got their opponents out for 51. Wellingborough scored one innings of over 400, and five of over 300. On only three occasions did the side lose all ten wickets, and their opponents completed every innings and only three times topped the century. The leading averages were: Batting—K. White, 641 runs, highest 208, average 53.41; D. C. C. Sewell, 617 runs, average 47; Hazelton, average 43. In bowling: J. White, sixty-one wickets for 5.91; Hazelton, thirty-eight wickets for 9.44.

So much then for records—obviously, whatever the opposition—wonderfully good.

The side, I am informed, were really good all round, the fielding was excellent. The batting was strong and sound all through, with K. White and D. C. C. Sewell the star batsmen. White is very highly spoken of as a player of brilliance, with all the strokes on the board, and Sewell a fine natural hitter. But it was rather the bowling of the first pair of bowlers, J. White and Hazelton, that was remarkable, and it is claimed for them that they were the best pair of the year. Never did both fail and they ran through side after side. White is fast right hand with a swing and Hazelton medium right hand, with a deceptive slow ball. The latter I saw at Lord's and he proved very successful. But, I must admit, though it is never fair to judge quickly after one has heard a great deal of eulogy, that I was just a little disappointed. The wicket was no doubt not to his liking, being too dead. He is a fine boy bowler no doubt, and may go far, but he did not look quite as difficult as I expected. But he and White must indeed have been a formidable pair for a school. Their future careers will be watched with interest. The change bowling, too, was quite fair. The two Whites, Hazelton, the best all-rounder, Sewell and Carter were the five best cricketers of a team of which the school may well be proud.

Bedford School had rather a lean year, and I am told that the cricket suffers from lack of coaches for lower games and poor pitches for juniors. Field was a hard man to get out, but had not much style: Chatterton has many strokes and good style, but little heart. Morse was a good bat and dangerous, and Farrer a promising wicket-keep and hitter.

Bedford Modern School won four matches, drew three, and lost two. The bowling of the team was as good as the school has ever had. There were three or four useful bats, but a distinct tail. The eleven had less than 100 runs scored against them in most of their matches.

St. Paul's Schools played eleven matches, won four, lost six, and drew one. In School matches they beat Dulwich, and lost to Brighton. Their other wins were against Old Wykehamists, Merton College, and

Old Paulines. Their defeats, besides Brighton, were from Eton Ramblers, M.C.C., I.Z., Oxford Authentics, and Incogniti, but many of these sides had strong elevens. Wainwright, the captain, who will again be at St. Paul's in 1913, was a good wicket-keep, a forcing bat, and a change bowler. Skeet was the best bat of the team, and a fine out-field. In bowling Pearson was the mainstay of the side, though he was very hard worked; Schacht bowled well at the beginning of the year, but rather lost his sting later on.

Of the Scotch Schools, I am afraid I have little information. Edinburgh Academy lost to Fettes after a good game in which each side made over 200 and beat Watson's easily. The other school matches were spoilt by rain. They were a good fielding side, and a good batting side on hard wickets, but not on slow. The bowling was disappointing. G. B. Crole, the captain (average 50) was a good bat, but rather uncertain, and a fair bowler. He played at Lord's, and made a magnificent catch in the outfield.

Glenalmond played fourteen, won three, drew four, lost seven. They were not a good side, but on the whole did well in School matches. After an excellent game Loretto beat them by 37 runs (Glenalmond 209, Loretto 246). Glenalmond started well v. Edinburgh Academy, getting 112 for four wickets, when rain stopped play. An excellent match with Merchiston resulted in a draw (Glenalmond 182 for eight wickets, Merchiston 156 for seven wickets). An extraordinary match v. Fettes resulted in a win for them by 26 runs (Glenalmond 137, Fettes 163). Fettes had 150 for four, but were all out for 163; Glenalmond lost seven for 17 (!), but the last three wickets put on 120, of which 80 were supplied by the last wicket: Brander, the last man, making an excellent 50 and Alexander carrying his bat through the innings for 38! A long way the best all-round player on the side was Alexander, who headed both the batting and bowling averages with the foll wing figures: batting-15 innings, 2 not outs, 313 total, 60 highest, 24.08 average; bowling-forty-six wickets at the cost of 12.69 runs each. J. C. Colquhoun, the captain, had an average of 18.86, and got two good scores: 78 v. Loretto and 70 v. Merchiston; he did excellently, also, behind the stumps. Six old colours are expected to be back next year, viz.: G. W. A. Alexander, J. Findlay, J. L. R. Thomson, G. A. A. McGregor, M. E. J. Moore, W. E. Petrie.

Before concluding it may be well to put on paper a list of a few of those Public School cricketers of the year, who from general information, seem to have been most successful, or to have the most cricket in them.

I have said that I do not intend to attempt to say which was the best side. The standard of cricket varies at different Schools. But I think that any side would have had a very hard task to beat Eton and Clifton, Uppingham and Wellingborough were obviously on results and potentiality very good, while Westminster, Malvern, and Repton not at all to be despised.

It may be interesting to choose two sides, one from Butterfly Schools: Eton, Harrow, Winchester, Rugby, Charterhouse, and Westminster, and one from the Rest. My selections would be:—

In my Butterfly side I have very strong batting. Wigan and Dickinson steady players, with Campbell, Freeman-Thomas, Hough, Rudd, Blount, Wright, and Critchley-Salmonson all dangerous, and many of them good bats to follow, with Cobbold and Heathcote-Amory who can both bat a bit to bring up the rear. Blount would keep wicket with Rudd in reserve if anything happened. The bowling would be in the hands of Salmonson, whom I regard as the best boy bowler of the year in ability, if not in temperament, fast medium to fast right; Cobbold, slow medium to medium right; Heathcote-Amory, fairly fast right; Hough, slow right, with Freeman-Thomas, left, G. Wright, medium right, and Rudd fast right, as changes if necessary. In the Rest side I have as bats Knight, Whitehead, Wood, Ni holas, Davies, Crole or K. White, Havelock-Davies, Moses, with Hazelton. Chitty, and Woodroffe (or J. White), to bring up the rear. Wood is the wicket-keeper. For this position alone there might have been other candidates, but Wood is a good wicket-keeper, and his batting must give him the place. The bowling would be very strong. Moses slow medium right, and Hazelton fast medium right, the pair who started at Lord's; White or Woodroofe, fast right; Chitty left, Havelock-Davies right, and other changes.

In conclusion I must thank sincerely all those masters and others, who have so kindly given me information on the various schools. Without their help no article embracing so wide a scope as Public School cricket to-day, could be of any value.

#### ETON v. HARROW.

Played at Lord's, Friday, Saturday, July 12, 13.—The Eton and Harrow match proved an agreeable surprise. In point of all-round strength there was no comparison between the two sides, Eton being vastly superior, but so well did Harrow play up, after being quite outclassed on the first day, that the end was not reached until eighteen minutes past seven on the Saturday evening—only twelve minutes from the time agreed upon for drawing stumps. Eton won by six wickets, but it is safe to say that three times out of four they would have gained an easier victory. They had an exceptionally good eleven—rich in run-getters down to the last man—whereas Harrow, on the admission of their supporters and judged on the form shown at home, were a good deal below the average. Eton's all-round strength was the more remarkable, as of their excellent team of 1911 only three were left—D. G. Wigan, the captain, E. F. Campbell and the Hon. G. Freeman-Thomas. Harrow had five old choices—Blount, the captain, C. S. Wilson, Jackson, Buller, and Trew. Favoured with real July weather the match as usual attracted big crowds, about 15,000 people being present each day.

Friday's cricket suggested a very one-sided game. Harrow had the advantage of batting first on one of the best wickets prepared at Lord's during the season but, with forty extras to help them, they only managed to score 188. In response to this very modest total Eton did not make a good start, losing three of their best wickets for 60, but thenceforward the batting asserted itself to such purpose that at the call of time the total with a wicket in hand had reached 332. Wigan played very finely, and towards the end of the afternoon Rawstorne hit with refreshing vigour. Harrow paid dearly for a blunder, Eton's left-handed batsman, Davies, giving a palpable chance of stumping when he had made a single.

Everyone expected an easy win for Eton on the second day, but a great surprise was in store. Going in against a balance of 152 Harrow got on so well that up till half-past four they seemed certain to save the game. Just before that time they were a hundred runs to the good with seven wickets to fall, defeat looking to be out of the question. If Blount had steadied himself for a quarter of an hour or so Eton could not have had time to win the match. Rendered overconfident by success, however, or perhaps hoping to win the match after all, Blount hit out at everything, and after he left at 266 the last six Harrow wickets fell in forty minutes for 29 runs. As regards pluck and determination, Blount's 137—the fourth highest score in the whole series of Eton and Harrow matches—was a great effort, but one could not fairly describe it as a great innings. The batsman repeatedly snicked the ball, but whenever he made a mistake fortune was on his side—So far as could be seen he gave no actual chance of being caught,

but he should have been easily stumped with his score at 62. He was batting for a trifle over three hours, Altogether different in character was the play of Dickinson, a left-handed batsman, who showed such inexhaustible patience that in getting his 59 he was at the wickets for three hours and a half. While he and Blount were together, 129 runs were put on. When he had made ten Dickinson was badly missed in the slips—an error that had an enormous effect on the match. From the moment Blount was out Eton played a winning game in great style, some fine bowling by Chance and Amory being followed by brilliant hitting when the side went in to get 144 in just under two hours.

Eighty-seven matches have been played, of which Eton have won thirty-four, Harrow thirty-five, and eighteen have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857, for boys under twenty, which has been rejected. The result of a match in 1800, won by Eton, has recently been discovered and some other matches are known to have been played but no records of them have yet been found.

#### RUGBY v. MARLBOROUGH.

However, the captains were anxious to play, and two hours' cricket proved sufficient for Rugby to make 107, and Marlborough to obtain a single run without loss. Marlborough on Thursday secured a valuable lead of 48, and dismissing their opponents for 145 secured the necessary 98 runs with only two batsmen out, so that they won by eight wickets. On a pitch always difficult, the batsmen for the most part were not seen to advantage, most of them hitting out recklessly, but an exception must be made in favour of Oliver. The best performance in the match was that of Busk, who took eleven wickets for 76 runs. It was Marlborough's eighteenth victory against Rugby's twenty-eight in fifty-four matches.
