

PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1914.

It will, I think, be best this year if I plunge *in medias res* without much introduction. Public School cricket had in 1914 a most successful time; and with the exception of the last two School matches at Lord's, Rugby v. Marlborough and Cheltenham and Haileybury; and the two most important games: two Elevens of Public Schools and M.C.C. v. Public Schools, the season was over before the War cloud was bigger than a man's hand.

There were a number of good sides and some outstanding boy cricketers, as we shall see later on. I regret that owing to illness, I was prevented from seeing much Public School cricket this year, and I am therefore more than ever indebted for my information to masters and others who have kindly written about the sides. Some of them possibly are a little apt to "call their geese swans"; a larger number judge, perhaps, by a very high standard and are stern critics; but I hope in trying to select the best sides of the year I shall not be far wrong.

To select the best individual players is not now difficult. The devoted work of Mr. F. E. Lacey and Captain E. G. Wynyard in getting up the two matches at Lord's, and the full information they receive ensures that the best players are asked and nearly all of them play.

A feature of the season was the visit of Haverford College. Their first tour, if memory serves, was in 1896, and since then their periodical visits have been much looked forward to. I unfortunately had no opportunity of seeing them, but I was told by three famous cricketers who played against them at Silwood Park that though their batting was not very sound or strong, they had some bowling to reckon with, and their fielding was a sight for the gods, especially their throwing in, which was quite astonishingly good.

PUBLIC SCHOOL MATCHES AT LORD'S.

The system adopted this year was the same as in 1913—namely on the August Bank Holiday and Tuesday, Schools which played matches at Lord's—the Clifton and Tonbridge match increased the number to eight—v. The Rest, and on Wednesday and Thursday an Eleven selected from the two sides v. M.C.C.

The sides that played in the first match were as follows :—

The Rest—J. Howell (Repton), batsman ; D. G. Veitch (Westminster), batsman ; G. H. Heslop (Lancing), bat and bowler ; A. D. Denton (Wellingborough), batsman and lob bowler ; J. H. Strachan (Charterhouse), batsman ; G. B. Eden (Winchester), batsman ; R. A. Dallas Brooks (Dover), batsman and bowler ; A. E. R. Gilligan (Dulwich), fast bowler and bat ; R. A. T. Miller (Uppingham), bat and wicket-keep ; A. J. W. Pearson (St. Paul's), leg-break and googlie bowler ; and C. J. Capes (Malvern), batsman. Lord's Schools—G. W. E. Whitehead (Clifton), batsman and slow bowler ; J. L. Bryan (Rugby), batsman ; J. R. Barnes (Marlborough), batsman ; H. D. Hake (Hailbury), batsman and lob bowler ; G. P. B. Taylor (Cheltenham), batsman ; G. Wilson (Harrow), batsman ; J. A. Sanger (Cheltenham), batsman ; F. L. Johnstone (Eton), fast bowler and bat ; R. Sherwell (Tonbridge), left-handed batsman ; T. S. Hankey (Eton), bat and bowler ; S. B. Morgan (Clifton), medium to fast left-hand bowler.

A very fine match it proved. The Rest, after getting a lead of nearly 250 on the first innings, only won by two wickets. The Rest batted first and made 333 and all the four men who got most runs batted well. Howell (82) showed himself the soundest player in defence and back play in the game ; Denton's (79) off-side cricket was most attractive, as was Dallas Brooks', and Strachan played a most useful innings. The Lord's Schools in their first innings broke down utterly before really good bowling. Gilligan, fast, keeping a good length, and with dangerous yorkers at one end, and Pearson, slow medium leg-breaks with an occasional googlie at the other, were an excellent foil to each other. Each got his tail up, and the Lord's Schools collapsed for 91. Next day, however, they gave an entirely different exhibition. Bryan's 132 was a most painstaking and valuable innings, Wilson, and Sherwell both got runs, and Taylor played the most attractive innings perhaps of the match. He is left-handed with all the typical left-hander's strokes, and he drives beautifully. The score reached 419, and at one time the Rest looked as if they would lose the match. Morgan bowled well, and for a time Howell, who again batted with the utmost soundness, could not get any one to stay with him. Gilligan, who has a fine eye, hit bravely, however, and eventually the position was that, with five minutes to play, there were six runs to get, and four wickets to fall. Johnstone then caught Gilligan at slip one-handed and bowled Miller two runs later, but Howell made the winning hit on time. So ended a great match, in which many distinguished themselves, and the fielding and catching was as it should be, a feature of the game, being with few exceptions uniformly good. Miller kept wicket beautifully for the Rest.

M.C.C. v. The Schools was unfortunately quite spoilt by rain. No play at all on Wednesday, and only three hours on Thursday Mr. Crutchley to start with and Mr. Pegler and Walter Mead on a sticky wicket coming after a succession of dry ones, were a very high test for boys. Howell once again distinguished himself, getting 28 out of 95. The M.C.C. lost four for 138. The School's side was : Howell, Gilligan, Whitehead, Bryan, Denton, Hake, Taylor, Wilson, Miller, Morgan, and Pearson.

ETON, HARROW, WINCHESTER.

Eton beat Harrow after another exciting match, by four wickets, and Eton and Winchester drew in a game that was no less remarkable. Eton and Winchester were both very good batting sides, and there was very little probably to choose between them, and either, given equal conditions, were I think stronger than Harrow, though the latter were by no means bad, and certainly better than for some years past.

The Eton and Winchester match was played in New Field, Winchester, in two perfect days late in June, but very hot. It was a beautiful wicket and Eton going in first made 385. Eton's wonderful proclivity for batting all down the list and especially for scoring off tired bowling was well seen, and after 282 for eight, Hambro, who had got into the Eton side just before the match, mainly for his bowling, and Foster put on 76 for the ninth wicket. Winchester batted by no means badly, but after their long outing they were very tired, and things went amiss. Plucky hitting by Buck and Gordon Browne saved an absolute breakdown, and at the close of Friday's play the score was 140 for seven. On Saturday Eton made Winchester follow-on 203 behind. G. B. Eden, the Winchester captain, played a beautiful little innings of 28, but though most of the batsmen seemed comfortable with the bowling it was not until Buck and Gregson got together that there looked to be any hope of saving the match. These two added 72, and afterwards Buck hit out vigorously, but the score was only 251 when eight wickets were down. Then began a stand by Wells-Cole (no. 10) and Williams (no. 8), which put Winchester virtually out of danger. The Eton bowling as was only natural was tired, but both men batted really well, and in the end Winchester made their record score for these matches of 403. It was most gratifying to Wykehamists after a series of failures in batting in these matches. Eton were left with 201 to get in an hour and forty minutes. They gallantly went for the runs, and in trying to force the pace lost several wickets quickly. Gordon Browne bowled well, and Eden made two really good catches. Three men were out for 39 and four for 67.

But then Eton set themselves to save the match, and Nugent played the right game exceptionally well, and at the close Eton had lost six wickets for 127. So ended a high scoring match between sides in which the batting on both sides was stronger than the bowling.

An account of Eton and Harrow appears elsewhere, so I will only refer to it briefly here. For those who like records it is interesting to note that Eton have not batted first in this match since 1902, though they have won the toss on two occasions. Harrow in their first innings on the Friday made 232, but it was an uneven display, Wilson the Harrow captain, who batted very well in both innings, and G. R. Jackson making 124 between them, and De Uphaug and Renton 77 of the rest. Eton started all right. Sixty-three was up for one, and then an over from Jessop, fast medium left-hand, changed the whole face of the game. He got out Vane Tempest, Crossmann and Johnstone without a run being added. From this disaster Eton never recovered and were all out for 146. Harrow then began their second innings with a lead of 86, but they proceeded to throw away their advantage. No one but Wilson (58) and McClintock and Makant did anything after four for 44—a disastrous start. Wilson and McClintock made a fine stand, and when the latter was fifth out, Harrow were 192 ahead, a fine position indeed. Makant helped Wilson to add 26, but then the remaining wickets, for no real reason, absolutely tumbled down, and Wilson last out had practically no chance of adding to his score. Eton were left with 231 to get and all the afternoon to play. In a school match, especially at Lord's, 231 is still a large last innings score. The general opinion in the pavilion was that it would be a close thing, but that Harrow, if they bowled as accurately as in the first innings would probably win. Eton always played confidently, if rather slowly, but there was plenty of time and no reason to run risks. The stand by Hambro and Crossman—the latter towards the end of his innings showed most attractive off-side strokes—took them well on the way, though with six for 188 it was anyone's match, but Hankey and Anson made no mistakes, and the score rose steadily. No other wicket fell before the runs were made.

So much then for the matches. Now for the sides.

The greatest strength of Eton lay in the fact that as in almost any of the last four or five years, they could bat all the way down. Indeed, with the exception of Letts, the wicket-keeper, they could well have gone in to bat in reverse order, and they had batsmen of all types. Hambro, after going in tenth at Winchester, was first wicket at Lord's, and Foster is very good to bat number nine. There were

several sound steady bats. The most attractive was, to my mind, Crossman, and his innings at Lord's showed him a cricketer of great promise, as is Hambro, who might become a first-class bat. Johnstone was dangerous though unsound. The value of a school side that can bat all through is undeniable. First it gives great confidence in the case of early failures, and then, where the body of the team are so strong, if the early batsmen do their work the later ones can and do punish tired bowling severely.

The chief want of the side—strangely enough it has been their one need for some years—was a good slow bowler, either left-hand or right (left-hand for choice), but none could be found. Otherwise, the bowling was by no means bad and there was plenty of it. Johnstone, fast right, was at times excellent, but he was rather handicapped by a strained back. Christy, right-hand, medium, often kept a very good length, and is most promising. The fielding was not quite up to the usual standard, but Rawstorne, the captain, was very good, and Letts was a distinctly useful wicket-keep.

As a whole, Eton this year were not quite so good as the great sides that have immediately preceded them, but they were little below that standard.

Winchester, as I have said, have against Eton failed in batting several times in recent matches, and a good many hard words have been thrown at the coaching quite unjustifiably and mainly by irresponsible critics. Those who have worked so hard, and often without good material to work on, had their reward this year in a fine performance—much needed and gratifying. The employment of Haigh, who promises to make his name as one of the few great professional coaches, was no doubt worth a great deal, but it is absurd to suppose that he alone worked wonders in two months, and the honour must go to those who have given their time and skill unsparingly through lean seasons. Winchester were undoubtedly strong in batting, but the lack of bowling of much class on good wickets prevented them winning any matches. In batting seven had averages of over 20. The best player of the side was undoubtedly the captain, G. B. Eden, who might easily become first-class. He is still young, and in ordinary circumstances would have been captain again next year, but I am told that he has received a commission. He plays very straight, has strong defence, and some fine shots. The eleven could bat all the way down. D. N. K. Gregson is a dangerous and determined batsman if he gets going, and can drive hard. G. Ashton is small at present, but he proved an excellent man to go in first and is most promising; S. J. Paget, who got 75 against a strong M.C.C. side, and J. M. A. Matheson, 112 v. Old Wyks, were both useful and D. S. Gordon Browne and

G. S. Buck—the latter got into the side last choice before the Eton match, and greatly distinguished himself—are players of the hitting type likely to get runs. P. R. V. Williams also is extremely promising. The most dependable bowler was N. S. Wells-Cole, medium left, with a swerve. Besides him there were N. W. Hill, fast medium right; J. F. Lascelles, fast medium left; and Gordon-Browne, slow medium right. The latter is a more than useful bowler on a difficult wicket, but is not very formidable otherwise, and as a whole on a fast wicket, there was not much in the bowling to be frightened of. The wicket-keeper, Williams, is by some way the best the school have had in recent years, and with ordinary luck and opportunity he will certainly be a “class” wicket-keeper.

Harrow were a disappointing side, who did better than they might have been expected to in big matches, if such a contradiction in terms is permissible. Though many of the side were capable of playing, and did play fine cricket at different times, the side seldom came off as a side. The material at the beginning of the year was not too promising to work on, and the fact that G. Wilson could not find anything like his true form in the early part of the season was most disappointing. After his brilliant innings against Eton in 1913 he was expected to make a lot of runs, even against good bowling and on Harrow wickets. He ran into form in the end, and showed himself in the Lord's match a player possessed of coolness and courage, as well as of many strokes. Had he started as he finished, the other Harrow batsmen would have gained a confidence in themselves which was sometimes painfully lacking. Individual efforts of merit, as has been said, were often shown. But perhaps the most striking difference between the Eton and Harrow batting might be summed up in this way: the Eton batsman, if he made 0 in one match, was convinced that he would make at least 50 in the next; whereas a Harrow batsman, after making runs in one match, would feel it probable that he would fail in the next. G. A. I. Dury is a strong player with fine forcing strokes, but he does not yet watch the ball with sufficient care, and is always apt to pick the wrong ball to hit in his eagerness to get runs quickly. W. K. McClintock is another good player at times; but he gives one the impression of a man playing against the clock, and often gets himself out when apparently just getting set. G. R. Jackson, a left-hander, with “a left-hander's luck” was very useful, though he never inspired full confidence. R. K. Makant needs greater confidence in himself, and more experience. He will often drive a good length ball perfectly, using his great reach to advantage; and, in the same over play back to a half-volley. G. F. Marsden-Smedley keeps a straight bat, but has not learnt to adapt himself to circumstances. N. A. Jessop has

a really good eye, and he got quite a lot of runs without caring how, and, occasionally, perhaps, without quite knowing why. R. G. de Uphaug had a disappointing year, but played an invaluable innings of 49 in the first innings at Lord's. The bowling was the strength of the side. There was plenty of it, and Wilson, who showed sound judgment as a captain, could afford to change his bowling frequently. Jessop, a left-handed bowler with a good swinging action, is always dangerous for the first few overs; and, after a rest, he recovers all his confidence and pace. He is about the pace of J. T. Hearne at his best, and makes the ball swing in a lot from the off when the wind suits him. He is quite young and as he gets taller and stronger should develop into a really fine bowler, as he already has a command of the ball, and a very unpleasant dropping yorker. Gregson is medium right, with a puzzling flight, and his accident was an unlucky one for Harrow. Makant is a useful slow right hand bowler with a good fast ball: he looks as if he ought to get more wickets than he does. Dury and Wilson are useful change bowlers. Chancellor, slow left hand, can turn the ball, but his length is always problematical. Marsden-Smedley is an excellent house-match bowler, but does not make the ball do anything that should worry good batsmen. The fielding was excellent, and the side were obviously very keen. Mr. A. C. MacLaren was able to spare the time to give Harrow quite a lot of coaching, and it is expected that he will do the same again this year.

Our next group of schools includes

WESTMINSTER, CHARTERHOUSE, AND WELLINGTON.

Westminster had a fairly successful season. Three matches were won, five lost, and five drawn, most of them in favour of the school.

Of the two school matches that against Radley was drawn and should have been won, but for Westminster's mistakes in the field. Westminster made 232 of which D. G. Veitch, the captain, who was a tower of strength to the side all through the term, got 118. Radley, at the close of play had made 181 for eight. It was unfortunate in so dry a season that rain interfered with the Charterhouse match, and there was never any hope of a finish in a high-scoring game. Westminster made 318, of which A. N. Charlton got 83 and H. B. Thacker 51, and Charterhouse made 296.

The wins were against the Incogniti, after a most exciting finish—the visitors made 200, and Westminster got the runs, A. C. Feasey hitting well for 65 not out—Mr. L. A. M. Fevez's Eleven, and Christ Church, Oxford. Westminster, were beaten by I. Zingari, who had a tremendously strong side, captained by Mr. A. J. Webbe; Butterflies; Household Brigade, Authentics; and Old Westminsters.

The M.C.C., Foresters, and Eton Ramblers matches were drawn. Veitch besides his 100 at Radley got a century against the Foresters, and 81 against Butterflies, 78 v. Ramblers, and 71 v. Christ Church.

In most cases the sides which play at Westminster are very strong, and the record is by no means a bad one. There was a certain amount of sound batting on the side, and Veitch is a player of great possibilities, with some brilliant shots. He was in splendid form at the start of the year. One or two of the others are promising. Charlton and Thacker were both likely to get runs, but were not consistent. Feasey was the best bowler, and had very few off-days. Veitch and Furze were the two best fieldsmen in the side.

Charterhouse had quite a good season. They drew with Westminster, beat Wellington by six wickets, and had the worst of the draw in the Haverford match—Charterhouse made 174 and Haverford 158 for four.

In the Westminster match there was never a chance of a finish. The feature of the Charterhouse batting was H. E. Blumer's 96. Charterhouse put Wellington in and got them out for 161, and then after a bad start—they made a good many bad starts in the course of the year—got the runs easily. J. H. Strachan played a beautiful innings of 81, and he and Hinds, 66, won the match with the loss of only four wickets. Among other matches Charterhouse made a fine recovery against M.C.C. Mr. J. N. Buchanan got half the side out for under 20, but then the later batsmen played really well, and the total reached nearly 300, the match ending in a draw. The Old Carthusians were defeated (by five wickets) for the first time in many years, Strachan getting 100 in the match, but Charterhouse suffered heavy defeats from Mr. Dumes-Longworth's XI and the A. S. C. The match against Mr. Buchanan's XI ended in a draw.

As a whole the batting of the team lacked dependability. There were a good many who were fluky bats, and when they met a good bowler there was no one to rely on quite. J. H. Strachan was a very good player, but he is not one of those to pull a side round, as at the start of his innings he makes the bowling look very difficult. G. V. Hinds, the captain, was a courageous bat, and H. E. Blumer fairly dependable. As a side they might make heaps of runs or collapse. The bowling was weak. P. S. Hadley, with his absurdly awkward and laboured action, cannot ever be a good fast bowler, and must always be easily overbowled. G. C. S. B. Cooke bowled slow really well at times with great steadiness and a swing from the off. But there was no one very deadly. The side had a

good deal of promise in it, but did not come off quite up to expectations. Cooke, J. Pollock, J. C. Ritchie, and G. Cawston will be at Charterhouse next year. Cawston is promising as a left-hand bowler.

An editorial in the "Wellingtonian" after the Charterhouse match makes rather pessimistic reading as to the cricket of the school, but I am told that things in reality are not nearly so bad as this. A good cricketer and critic, who saw a lot of the side writes to me as follows:—"We were really rather unfortunate, as we lost two of our best players—one had an accident, another an operation, the latter being E. A. Simson, the captain, whose services were not ours till after half-term. We lost both the school matches—a case of dropped catches again. The match against Haileybury was very even on the first innings. We went in first at Haileybury and scored 126 on a mud wicket. They went in and got 155, of which Hake their captain made 90, though report said he was missed rather badly before he got 10. Meanwhile the wicket was drying easy: we got 198, and by that time the wicket was dead plumb—one of those nice easy wickets without life—so they had no difficulty, and knocked off the runs with a loss of only one wicket. The Haileybury fielding struck me as very good. We got well beaten by Charterhouse. We went in first and made a good start, making 80 odd for two wickets—then came rather a weak display and we were all out for 161. We got rid of the Charterhouse first three wickets for about 30, then their captain was missed badly in the slips, and our only dangerous bowler, G. F. Foley, who was bowling very well, strained his leg. Charterhouse had then no difficulty in winning."

"Although this tale of school matches is rather disappointing, yet in some of their other matches they really did very well, and I thought that Foley's very fast bowling was really rather exceptional at times, and throughout the school the general level of cricket is rising. The most useful bats were Badcock and C. P. Hancock—Badcock is a very promising cricketer, being a good field and good bowler as well—and Foley is quite a good bowler. We hope to have Badcock and Foley next summer."

Among other matches Wellington beat quite a good side of Old Wellingtonians by 6 runs; and an average M.C.C. side, brought down by Mr. A. C. M. Croome, comfortably.

The *Rugby* Eleven would have been a strong one, but illness crippled the side. J. S. Poole, a good left-hand bowler, was unable to play against Marlborough; and R. T. Bryan, a googlie bowler of merit, was another absentee from the side. The match, however, was won, Marlborough playing indifferent cricket in the second innings against E. O. Champion's bowling. Champion

bowls very slow, and tosses the ball up very high. Against experienced batting this type of bowling is heavily punished, but in School matches it is often effective, as it gives nervous batsmen time to think on the stroke. J. L. Bryan is a batsman who should make a name. He is a left-hander who can wait and wait, and keep on waiting for a bad ball, and then score a run or two. By no means an interesting bat to watch, he is a heart-breaking man to bowl to, as his stubborn defence makes a bowler bowl bad ones in the hope that he will make some mistake. He was unlucky after a good start, but came out strong at the end of the season. He is too a grand field at cover. The number of left-handers on the side—when at full strength—made it an irritating eleven to bowl at. Though the averages did not run high, they were level. Against Clifton Rugby had the worst of the wicket and, though at full strength on this occasion, were beaten. Against the M.C.C., however—the big match in school matches—they had the best of a drawn game.

Marlborough had a quite useful Eleven, but things did not come off for them, and their season was on the whole not too successful. R. D. Busk, their captain, is a really useful all-round player, a good fast bowler and a dashing hitter. Boys who get into a school eleven as bowlers, however, and only develop their batting later, seldom make good captains while still at school. Busk would have had a far better year under another's captaincy than he did under his own. Worrying about changing the bowling undoubtedly affected his own success with the ball. His innings of 71 against Cheltenham was a plucky one, and would have saved the game if anything could. Against Rugby he bowled very well in the second innings, when he went on for the second time. R. C. Ashfield was the best and most consistent bat on the side. His innings of 130 against Rugby in the first innings was one of real class, his batting at times being brilliant. He plays confidently and runs his runs well, and altogether makes a perfect number one batsman. J. R. Barnes was rather disappointing. He batted well enough more than once to show himself a player above the average. He seemed to lose confidence in himself at times, though for no particular reason, and did not make the runs he was worth. He got wickets occasionally with his leg-breaks. E. K. M. Paul, S. H. Clarke, H. G. B. Jordan, and H. Cowan were new comers to the Eleven, and all really promising. Paul was perhaps the best bat of the four, but he suffered from nerves in the latter part of the season. Clarke is one of those useful batsmen who worry the other side, a left-hander who can keep up his end in his own way, to whom scoring runs seems to come as a subsidiary idea to sticking there. Cowan, when he settles down, has some beautiful strokes on the off-side, notably a slash-shot past cover. Jordan is a sound bat, but his

fielding is against him. H. A. S. Nisbet is a steady left-hand bowler with one very good ball which pitches wider on the off than it looks to, and often tempts the batsman to hit too hard and sky the ball. C. A. Heal, medium-right, bowled well at times, but never had much luck. The School started splendidly by getting 452 against a good Liverpool C.C. side, Ashfield, Barnes and Busk making hundreds. In their second match, against the Hampshire Hogs, they had a bad wicket to play on, and A. J. L. Hill and E. R. Wilson bowled them out for 47. Hill bowled very well indeed, and E. R. Wilson is probably the best amateur bowler of the day on a treacherous wicket, so the failure was excusable. The match against Cheltenham was lost by a large margin, Cheltenham being exceptionally strong this year. Still, Marlborough did not play wise cricket, treating the bowling with far too much respect in the second innings, in which only Barnes and Barrington did themselves anything like justice. Still they could call it "bad luck" with justice that they were just beaten with three minutes only to go. The M.C.C. were led by 21 on the first innings, but won the match eventually by 48 runs. The School were beaten by K. Woodroffe's XI, but did a splendid performance against a strong Free Foresters side, the Foresters being lucky to play out time. A big scoring match against the Marlborough Blues ended in a draw. Thanks to Ashfield's 130 Marlborough beat Rugby on the first innings at Lord's by 46. In the second innings, however, the whole side, with the exception of Ashfield, suffered from an acute attack of nerves, and they were all out for 82. Eventually Rugby won by five wickets.

Cheltenham had a great season and did not lose a single match. Marlborough were beaten rather easily, but the match with Haileybury was left drawn. Cheltenham had a lead of 102 on the first innings and made Haileybury follow-on. After getting three wickets cheaply, however, the bowling got tired, and Haileybury not only drew the match, but got almost on terms before rain put a finish to the game. The lack of a fast bowler was felt at times, notably against Haileybury; otherwise the side was as nearly perfect as any Cheltenham side has been for a long time. G. P. B. Taylor was probably rather worried by his cares as captain, and hardly played up to his real form, a sample of which he gave in his innings of 59 against Haileybury. That was a really good innings and showed his possibilities. A fine cover he raised the standard of fielding for the school by his keenness. H. L. H. Du Bouley, who ought to captain the School for the next two years, had the remarkable average of 56. For a boy of his age he is a batsman far above the ordinary, and it is not too much to say that, with ordinary luck, he might develop into a very great cricketer. J. A. Sanger is a fine hitter with any amount of strokes. Starting quickly and confidently, he is just the

man to go in at a pinch and knock a good bowler off his length. He played some invaluable innings and is just the sort of player that every captain wants on his side "for emergencies." G. S. Lightfoot and C. A. H. Hillier are two batsmen of rather the same type. Steady, painstaking players, relying on defence mostly, but able to take advantage of the bowling if it gets a little tired. Both played good cricket for the side. G. E. Libock, who can make runs in attractive style, kept wicket really well. C. B. Robertson got 61 wickets in the season, which stamps him as a bowler. He bowls right-hand medium, and keeps a splendid length, and "mixes them up," varying his flight and pace cleverly. N. Birtwhistle, a slow left-hand bowler who can make the ball turn if the wickets helps him at all, did some good performances. The bowlers were helped by having an off-side field on whom they could rely to hold the catches.

One who is well qualified to judge of the *Clifton* Eleven writes: "There were two members of the eleven of quite outstanding ability, G. W. E. Whitehead and S. B. Morgan. Of the rest, with the exception of A. A. Leslie (who was unfortunately absent from all the school matches except Rugby), it may be said that no one achieved very much. D. C. James was a very fair bat, and Hodgkinson bowled steadily without any particular peculiarities. Mackay was very disappointing, though it would appear that his failure was due to lack of nerve rather than lack of ability. Bickmore is very young, and has a good defence—he should be good in years to come. The fielding was good as a general rule. The wicket-keeping was much criticised, but none of the critics had kept to Morgan's bowling—it may safely be said that few school wicket-keepers could have done it well. Last year Leslie showed promise, and was beginning to do it credit, and the loss to the eleven caused by his illness cannot be exaggerated. Whitehead's batting was as invaluable as ever, and it is interesting that he completed his 2,000 runs for the School at Lord's. The value of his careful innings would have been far greater, had the rest of the eleven been good enough to take advantage of the effect which his batting had upon the bowling of the opposing side. On him, too, fell a large share of the bowling: the googly had disappeared, but his leg-breaks and even the fast ball on occasion—as for instance the one which took Sherwell's wicket at Lord's—proved invaluable. Of Morgan's bowling much may be said: on a sticky wicket, such as the one he found against Rugby at Clifton, he made the ball turn very quickly, and he varied this ball with the faster one swinging on to the leg-stump. On such wickets he was a slow-medium bowler, but it was on the faster or very fast wickets that he was most dangerous—comparatively speaking or in comparison with other bowlers: under such conditions

he bowls fast medium, and while the ball is new he comes across at a tremendous pace, trying the wicket-keeper to the utmost. A first-class wicket-keeper would have added fifty per cent to his value; in fact at Cheltenham it made the difference of the match. Of other bowlers, Gardiner can make the ball swing when new, but was quite straight forward at other times. Hodgkinson—medium pace—was better than he looked.

Haileybury had a really good batting side, sound all through, but rather weak in bowling, and unequal in the field. H. D. Hake, who was captain for the third year, had a tremendous lot to do with the making of the side. He never made the mistake of frightening his younger players, and even when things were going badly kept the eleven together by his unflinching cheerfulness. Strong personality. He did not do so well as he should have done in ordinary matches, but he practically won the match against Wellington, making 90 not out and 109 not out, both brilliant knocks. His resolute batting in the second innings against Cheltenham—combined with Thorne's stolid defence—saved the match for the School. Haileybury were lucky to get out of the Uppingham match with a draw, for Uppingham had all the best of the game, and were able to declare twice. The Haverford match was a good one, and the School won by four wickets, Hake pulling the match round when Haverford were on top. E. F. Bolton is a left-hand bat of great promise. He averaged 33 for the year, with 61 for his highest score. With added strength and experience he should go very far. G. C. Thorne played two absolutely invaluable innings against Cheltenham, scoring 59 and 64 not out. W. J. Malden has the cricket temperament. He was sent in first—a great trial for a boy of 15—and batted consistently and well. He has heaps of shots, and when he learns to apply them, will make any amount of runs. It is only a question of time and experience. D. H. Dibdin looks a plain, straight forward bowler, but there must be something in his flight that is deceptive to account for his bowling average of 12.71 for 31 wickets. H. B. Vincent, who swerves with a new ball, was the most hard-worked bowler on the side, and was moderately successful. He bowled without much luck, but always stuck to his work well. C. D. N. Lawson was fast for a few overs, but very erratic. A word must be said of Hake's fielding. He is worthy to rank with the very best Public School fields of fame. He can field anywhere, and no day can tire him, and no "stand" depress him.

Malvern, though they had no player of D. J. Knight's class in 1913, were a more than useful side, and had a good season: winning seven matches, losing four, and drawing one. The batting was strong against any but the very best of bowling, and five members of the side got hundreds in the season, a very big percentage. The

bowling was not quite strong enough for perfect wickets, though there were three really good bowlers on the side, and W. C. M. Berridge, who was captain, used them with much judgment.

The School won their match against Repton by 25 runs, a fair margin on a slow wicket, which at times was difficult. The trouble was to get rid of J. Howell, who made 27 in the first innings and 63 in the second. While he was in during the second innings Repton always had a good chance of winning, but after he was bowled by a really good ball from C. J. Capes, the match was safe for Malvern. The School beat Haverford in an innings, the last Haverford wicket falling to the last possible ball of the day.

P. R. Asprey headed the batting average with 42.3. He is a hard-hitting batsman, and, if slightly unorthodox, he has a good eye, is quick on his feet, and can make runs at a great pace when set. His two innings of 62 and 29 against Repton were quite invaluable. W. C. M. Berridge averaged nearly 35, and is a very sound player. He headed the bowling averages, taking 38 wickets for just over 15 runs apiece, and is a good field : altogether an all-round cricketer well above the ordinary. W. E. Chetwynd-Stapylton was perhaps, the safest bat on the side, watching the ball carefully and playing very straight. C. C. Naumann played one splendid innings of 100 not out, but otherwise did not make as many runs as he should have done : he ought to get a lot of runs, as he is staying on. S. L. Bibby, who is captain this year, played the best innings of the year, 109, against a very strong M.C.C. side. He is a very promising player, and has plenty of strokes, though he still needs a little more confidence when he first goes in. In C. J. Capes, Malvern have a boy who ought to become a first-class bowler. He is a slow-medium left-hand bowler, who can make the ball do quite a lot. At present he is apt to become unnerved if punished, but he is only 16, and will grow out of a very natural failing. He took eleven wickets for 138 in the Repton match, and bowled J. Howell in both innings, a fine double performance. In the season he took 51 wickets. W. C. M. Berridge bowls slow-medium, and bowls with his head. B. Muir, medium right hand, uses his height well, and has a nice length. For a few overs he is liable to get wickets, but he tires rather easily. The fielding all through was keen, and above that of the average public school. The prospects for this year are distinctly good, as, beside the old choices, there are a good many promising young players coming on.

Repton again had a useful side, with one really fine cricketer, but they fell off a little towards the end of the season. The results of matches were : three won, three lost, and four drawn. In school matches, Repton beat Uppingham by an innings, lost to Malvern,

after a very good game and a close finish, and drew with Haverford. on the last day of the term. I rather fancy that my informant from Repton, who has done so much for the cricket of the school, is apt to be rather a stern critic. He certainly does not call his geese swans. In John Howell they had certainly the outstanding school cricketer. As a batsman, and in cricket knowledge, he is as matured as was Knight in 1913, and his performances in the matches at Lord's, and in school matches show that he was as a whole very dependable, and not in the least perturbed by a crisis. Defence and back play are his strongest points, but though he is a little dull at times, he can score in a good many ways, and he is a very hard man indeed to get out. The strokes of a MacLaren, the grace of a Palaret, will never be his, but given the opportunity there is no doubt that as a sound and run-getting batsman he must surely take a high place in first-class cricket.

After making 100 in the Surrey trial match, in May, he quite failed to get going in the early part of the term. He only got 127 in seven innings, including a 56 to start with. He then settled down, and finished with an average of 52.76. In 1913 he put up a record at Repton by making two hundreds in a match. This year he made 200 against Uppingham and 200 against the Old Reptonians. No one had made 200 at Repton before, though J. N. Crawford got 196. Next to Howell, Pallett was the most striking bat. He goes for the bowling and hits the ball a long way, but he has not a great defence. Several of the others were by no means bad players.

As to bowling : Becher bowled well up to half-term, but was then useless for the rest of the season. Jenkyns bowled with a certain amount of devil to start with but lost it as the season advanced. Briggs came into the team rather late, and was a useful steady bowler and bat. But the best bowler was Wales. Unfortunately, owing to a strained heart, he could only play in three matches ; in these he bowled very well, getting sixteen wickets at an average cost of 13. It was rather bad luck not having him for the first part of the season, and also finding him crooked for the Haverford match. The fielding was quite good, with one or two exceptions ; and about half-way through the term there was discovered quite a good wicket-keeper in Bickford.

The Uppingham match was played on a plumb wicket. Repton got 469 (Howell 202, Pallett 97). Uppingham got 115 and 279. There was no doubt about which was best side from the start. The Malvern match was very different. Malvern won the toss on a wet wicket, the start being delayed by rain. Malvern made 199, the wicket getting difficult as time went on. Repton lost four

wickets for 49 overnight by very slow cricket, but on a really difficult wicket next day added 77 in thirty-five minutes for the remaining seven wickets. Then Malvern made 117 by cricket even more slow than that of Repton on the previous evening. Repton were left the very difficult task, considering the wicket, of getting 186. They got 161, which was a good performance, but not quite good enough to win the match. It was a really good game.

The Haverford match was played on the last day of term, when boys were thinking more about holidays than anything else. Haverford won the toss and got 185, and Repton looked like collapsing six being out for 79 and seven for 101. Then, however, two of them, one a substitute playing instead of Wales, stuck in and were not out at the end when the total was 148.

Uppingham lost two school matches against strong sides, Repton and Shrewsbury, and drew the third against Haileybury. As a whole considering that there was a good deal of material and that the bowling was up to the average, they hardly did themselves justice. I am told that the reason was unsound batting and that several of the batsmen were too prone to throw their wickets away through over anxiety to score fast. In several schools a few years back there was a tendency the other way and possibly too little attention was paid to attack. But the other extreme is more disastrous. Sound defence and a straight bat must be the foundation of a side's batting, and wild hitting before a batsman is set at all must in nine cases out of ten end in disaster. Further the value of the quick scoring batsman at No. 6 or 7 is so much enhanced if the earlier men have done their work quietly and patiently, and broken the bowling.

The fielding of the side was in and out. There were some bright spots, but there was some lack of certainty. As batsmen, R. A. T. Miller, the captain, and G. Limmer both were dangerous with plenty of shots and possibilities, but neither was sound. These two and Wicke, who headed the averages with 30.6 alone averaged over 20 in a season of hard wickets. Wicke started the season very well, but was rather disappointing afterwards. There was plenty of bowling and of varied type. Most work fell on J. L. Horridge, medium right, and K. P. Bell, left-hand. The latter bowls an admirable length, but is inclined to bowl too much at the wicket. Limmer, G. G. M. Jones, and F. A. Waldoek were useful changes.

Rossall were badly beaten by Shrewsbury, collapsing in both innings, and I am told it was the most severe defeat the school had suffered for many years. But Shrewsbury were a good side. Haverford only made 119, and Rossall ought to have got the runs but again they batted badly, and were all out for 90.

These two matches showed Rossall far from their best, for they were capable of better things. Somehow the side never struck form *all* together. The best innings played was Roupell's 86 against the M.C.C.—it was a good effort. The outstanding feature of the season was E. G. F. Fripp's bowling. Considering that he had very little support at the other end, 48 wickets for 14.12 each was a fine performance. The fielding of the side was a good average—F. Hall at third man and deep being excellent. F. W. Budd was also excellent behind the wickets.

Shrewsbury had a splendid season. They played 12 matches, won 5 of them, drew 6, and lost only 1: this was against the Foresters. In School matches they beat Rossall most decisively, beat Uppingham by five wickets after a low scoring match, in which there was some poor batting; and drew with Sedbergh. Shrewsbury made a disastrous start in this match, being all out for 103. But they showed the strength of their batting in their second innings by a fine recovery. After Sedbergh had made 308, they scored 359 for seven, and so easily saved the match. Among other games they gained a decisive victory over the Old Salopians, and also over Haverford. As a whole Shrewsbury must be put down as one of the sides if not *the* side of the year. In their School Magazine it is said that they were the strongest Shrewsbury side since 1898 and that they had better batting than in that year, though no bowler of the class of F. H. Humphrys. I remember more than one good batsman in the Shrewsbury side of '98, but this year no doubt the combined strength was greater. Humphrys was an exceptional boy bowler and must have made his mark in Varsity cricket if he had not unfortunately damaged his leg.

I am told that this year Shrewsbury were a thoroughly sound batting side, and could bat down to no. 8. When batsmen failed, either the tail wagged or two or three of the good batsmen saved the side and there was undoubtedly much reserve strength. M. Dempsey, who is qualified for Sussex, and might easily become first-class, was the soundest player, but not quite as punishing as he ought to be, and he was too fond of driving off the right leg, with consequent loss of power. He is also a useful bowler, and captained the side judiciously and well. R. M. Phillips, W. B. Blaxland, and C. Boumphey, who are expected to be at Shrewsbury next year, are all promising. Phillips, who I believe is a brother of two such good cricketers as F. A. Phillips and E. S. Phillips, played for Monmouthshire in August. B. H. Ellis was a most valuable steady bat; and Rhys and Twist were also no mean batsmen. The averages are rather remarkable. Twist was head with 16 innings, 510 runs, the large number of 8 times not out, and an average of 63.75.

Dempsey, 662 runs, average 44; and Phillips, 680, average 42, are even better figures. Five men altogether averaged over 30, and seven over 20.

The bowling was not equal to the batting. There was no one of outstanding merit by any means, but there was plenty of variety. W. R. Higgins, who played for the young amateurs of Middlesex, bowls fast left-hand, and he was the most dangerous on his day, and T. Onslow, with leg-breaks, who will be in the 1915 side, was the most promising. The fielding improved as the team went on, but no wicket-keeper of real merit was discovered.

It was unfortunate that *Tonbridge*, who have had several good sides of recent years, were not so strong this year when for the first time they appeared at Lord's against Clifton. To play at Lord's is a severe test, and the *Tonbridge* batting broke down badly in the first innings. R. Sherwell, who is a really good left-handed batsman, failed both times—he was unlucky in getting two good balls—and though *Tonbridge* batted most pluckily against odds in the second innings they could not get on terms. They beat *Sherborne* in their other School match. *Sherwell* is a really good player with plenty of strokes, and the side depended a great deal on him, though C. K. Tester and some of the others could bat quite well, but there was not much in the bowling that was formidable. *Clarke* was a useful left-hand bowler and a painstaking captain.

Dulwich played 14 matches, of which 7 were won, 5 lost, and 2 drawn. In School matches the games with Brighton, Bedford, and *Sherborne* were won, and that against St. Paul's was lost. On the whole *Dulwich* were not at all a bad side. The fielding was generally very good, and A. E. R. Gilligan, the captain, was a model of keenness in working for the out-cricketer. Gilligan himself was the mainstay of the side. He is a really promising fast bowler with an easy action and good run up, and he has a deadly yorker. So much work fell on him that he got no doubt slightly played out by the end of the term, but his bowling at Lord's in the Schools' match showed his possibilities. He is also a dangerous bat of the dashing type; a little liable to get himself out unnecessarily before he has a sight of the ball, but likely to get runs very quickly when he is set. Gilligan broke a School record by getting 78 wickets for 8.8 apiece, and his brother A. H. Gilligan, also a good player, made the highest individual score ever made for the School, 190, against Bedford Grammar School. The batting of the side as a whole lacked soundness. A. H. Gilligan is captain for next year, and A. L. Paton, J. K. Rowbotham, and M. L. Griffin will also be at *Dulwich*.

Wellingborough had a very strong side, perhaps the strongest the School has ever produced. Twelve matches were played, of

which seven were won, two were lost, and three were drawn. The matches lost were to a strong *Northampton* Second Eleven, and to *Lord Lilford's* Eleven; in the latter match Mr. S. G. Smith, on a treacherous wicket, proved a little too good for the School. There were three really class batsmen on the side, K. White, R. D. Denton, and G. T. Carter. White did not do himself full justice in School matches, being rather burdened by his captaincy. Still, he averaged 39, and, for the Masters did brilliantly, averaging 72. A. D. Denton averaged 48 for the School and 68 for the Masters. His defence is very sound, and he is one of those thoroughly observant cricketers who grow into first-class players on any wicket. He played for *Northampton* after term was over. G. T. Carter is a batsman of nerve, who watches the ball both ways: that is to say, while watching out for the good ball, he is ready to take advantage of a loose one. He hits bad bowling brilliantly. S. T. Askham is another very useful bat, if not quite in the class of the others. He is also a good fast-medium bowler, who swings from leg. He played for *Northamptonshire* last year as an all-round player. B. Wright is a bowler who ought to do very well. He has a high easy action, and makes the ball come quickly off the pitch. Some of his bowling was more than good for a boy at school. A. D. Denton got some useful wickets with lobbs; and S. Vergette kept a good length, and occasionally turned the ball appreciably from leg. It is not easy to speak with great certainty of the bowling of those of the team not already referred to. There should have been a lot of runs among the rest, but they, owing to the brilliancy of the others, scarcely got a fair chance to play themselves steadily in, and settle down to make runs at their own pace.

The School did a good performance in making 297 runs against an M.C.C. side, which included J. T. Hearne and Astill: they did very well too to dismiss the M.C.C. for 276, though Capt. H. S. Poyntz, who scored 174, made the bowling look simple at times. The best win of the year, however, was in the second match against *Lord Lilford's* team, the School scoring 249 for five wickets, and dismissing *Lord Lilford's* Eleven, which included A. Hearne, J. H. King, and Tomblin, for 49.

The *Radley* season was, I am told, disappointing, chiefly through the lack of bowling. The want of change bowling and uncertain catching prevented them from developing into a match-winning side. The bad catching was unfortunate as many of the side had before this year shown themselves to be safe catchers. There was a good deal of batting talent, and more than once they recovered from disastrous starts, but unfortunately in the *Bradfield* match, when they showed almost their best out-cricketer, the batting broke down. Of the three school matches that against *Bradfield* was lost by 86 runs, and those

with Westminster and Sherborne were drawn. For the first time the Old Radlesian match was extended to two days. This also ended in a draw. At present all of last year's eleven except T. N. C. Irwin are at Radley, and though of course it is uncertain how many will stay on, the prospects are promising.

Bradfield did extremely well all the year and won their three big matches, those against Radley, Beaumont College, and the M.C.C. quite easily. The success of the side was mainly due to A. Gordon and C. L. D. Fawcus. Both are left-handed batsmen, and form a strong contrast to each other. A. Gordon uses his reach well and can punish loose bowling unmercifully; his cutting, when in form, is brilliant. He captained the side and did it wonderfully well, keeping the boys well together, both off and on the field. Bradfield were a young side on the whole, but Gordon inspired them with confidence, and was careful never to over-work his bowlers. C. L. D. Fawcus should go very far. He was only 15½ years old at the commencement of the year, and had the big average of 53 for 12 innings at the finish. He plays beautifully straight, watches the ball carefully, and has a lot of safe scoring strokes for a boy of his age. He is also a left-hand bowler of promise. The bowling was not really dangerous against strong batting, but it was well-managed, and, supported by keen fielding, the side never got into a real tangle.

The M.C.C. scored 185 against the School, but Bradfield did really well to score 218 for five wickets, even if the Club bowling was not quite as strong as it generally is. Beaumont College were dismissed for 73, L. Clifford and J. Hickey being the only two batsmen to get into double figures. Against this Bradfield scored 216, J. G. Stevenson hitting brilliantly at the finish. Radley won the toss in the chief School match and batted first. They were all out for 96, and it says more than a little for Gordon's sense of judgment that he used five bowlers in getting his opposition out so cheaply. Fawcus played a magnificent innings, in the circumstances, making 74 out of 182 by really good, sound, and above all, confident cricket.

St. Paul's had a more than useful side, and in a very satisfactory season played twelve matches, winning eight, losing three and drawing one. They won all three School matches decisively. Brighton were beaten with the greatest ease, being dismissed for 19 and 38, after *St. Paul's* had scored 301 for seven wickets. Bedford Grammar School only made 77 against 148. But the best performance of the year was against Dulwich. Dulwich showed themselves a good side through the year, strong in batting and bowling: against *St. Paul's*, however, they scored only 67 while the latter scored 188. The match against the M.C.C. was thrown away. *St. Paul's* led by

71 on the first innings, and after making 45 for three wickets in the second, declared, leaving the M.C.C. just time to get the runs by big hitting. C. H. L. Skeet, the captain, was a very consistent batsman. A painstaking, careful player, he very seldom scores at a great pace: but he watches the ball all the way, uses his feet well, and makes up his mind which stroke to play very quickly. He averaged 57 for the year, and the School played strong sides rather than weak ones. A fast bowler, with a free slinging action, he took 33 wickets for less than eleven runs apiece. As he is also a brilliant outfielder, he is obviously a young player who has a career in front of him. W. A. Roberts is an excellent all-round player. He had a batting average of 28 with a highest score of 53 not out, which argues consistency. A fast-medium left-hand bowler he did some fine performances, though his length is apt to be doubtful at the start. A. J. W. Pearson was one of the best School-boy bowlers of the year. He bowls leg-breaks with a lowish action, is fairly fast in the air, comes off the wicket fast, and turns the ball quite a lot. He also bowls the googlie, disguises it well, and keeps a good length with it. Added to that he has an awkward, puzzling run, which is apt to upset any batsman at all troubled with nerves. E. I. G. Gibb is a player of possibilities, and was given a well-merited trial for Surrey Second at the end of the year. The fielding had bad spots in it, and Skeet was never able to find reliable slips, which weakened the side considerably.

Brighton had a disappointing season for the second year in succession. In games with Schools, they defeated Merchant Taylors pretty easily, and had much the best of a drawn game with Christ's Hospital, but were badly beaten by *St. Paul's*, Dulwich, and Lancing. To a certain extent Brighton were unlucky, as illness kept the captain, M. Smith, and one or two other useful players out of the field for practically the whole season. Smith only played in about three matches altogether. But under the best of circumstances the team could never have been a strong one. The bowling was weak all through. G. Nutt was head and shoulders above the rest, but he isn't dependable yet and his really good ball comes too seldom. The need of a respectable fast bowler was much felt. The batting ought to have been better than it was. The wickets were good all the season, and often there was nothing very great in the way of bowling against the team, but individual scores of 50 and over were few and far between. A. H. Isaac was quite a good bat at the nets, and ought to have got runs, but was disappointing in games. Of the rest no one can be called a real batsman yet. The best point about the team was the fielding, which showed consistent improvement all through the season, and was generally speaking good.

Of the many other schools I am afraid I have no space left to speak this year. Dover and Lancing had two fine cricketers in

R. A. Dallas-Brooks and G. H. Heslop, and there were several other good sides. Public School cricketers have nobly answered the country's call, and the great majority of these who were going to the Universities are serving. In the circumstances, the usual list of those going to the Universities would be quite misleading.

In conclusion, I think that while several schools had good sides and good seasons none could be quite singled out as *the* side of the year. Eton, Rugby, Cheltenham, Shrewsbury, Malvern, Repton, Wellingborough, St. Paul's, and possibly Winchester, though they did not win a match, were all more than useful.

I had hoped to get from the captain of the Haverford team his idea of the strength of the schools they met, but at the time of writing it has not arrived.

However, when Winchester followed their innings on Saturday—a day of almost tropical heat—Eton allowed all their advantage to slip away. The bowlers were soon tired out and the fieldsmen could not hold the catches. The result was that Winchester scored 403, Williams and Wells-Cole putting on 143 runs for the ninth wicket. Left with 201 to get in about an hour and a half, Eton rashly attempted an impossible task. Five wickets were down for 57, but with defeat threatening the batsmen steadied themselves. Only one more wicket fell, the match ending quietly in a draw.

ETON v. HARROW.

Played at LORD'S, Friday, Saturday, July 10, 11.—Whatever might have been wrong with the University match the game between Eton and Harrow more than upheld its reputation. A sterner fight has not often been seen, and as an attraction to the public the match beat all records. In the course of the two days over 23,000 people paid for admission, the full attendances being estimated at over 38,000. As the weather from start to finish was perfect there was nothing to interfere with the enjoyment of the cricket. Eton, though not so good as in 1913, were no doubt the stronger side, but falling behind to the extent of 86 runs on the first innings, they had to work desperately hard to win in the end by four wickets. Play lasted till six o'clock on the Saturday, and at no time during the match was there a dull moment. Each side had four old choices available—Rawstorne, Johnstone, Nugent, and Foster for Eton, and Wilson, Makant, Dury, and de Uphaugh for Harrow. Harrow won the toss, but discounted their good fortune in getting first innings on a beautiful pitch by losing two wickets for 19 runs. De Uphaugh and Jackson made amends for this bad start, putting on 90 runs for the third wicket. Wilson, the hero of the 1913 match, felt his responsibility, and was at great pains to play himself in. Whence once set he showed splendid cricket, hitting brilliantly on the off side. Out at last to a catch at mid-on he scored his 65 in an hour and fifty minutes. Harrow's innings ended for 232. Johnstone, who kept up a fine pace and sent down now and then a deadly yorker, took seven wickets for 66 runs. The pitch being so good Eton seemed to have no cause for anxiety, but they reckoned without Jessopp, a very young left-handed bowler of exceptional promise. Thanks to Vane-Tempest and Hambro the score was up to 50 with only one man out but, Jessopp taking three wickets in four balls, the score for four wickets was only 63. From these disasters Eton did not recover, and though Hambro played with great skill for an hour and a half, the innings ended, just as seven o'clock struck, for 146.

Leading by 86 runs, Harrow entered upon Saturday's cricket with high hopes, but they soon lost their advantage, four wickets falling in three-quarters of an hour for 42 runs. Wilson, missed in the slips when 34, made a great effort for his side, he and McClintock putting on 64 runs for the fifth wicket, but some startling bowling by Foster finished off the innings for 144. Going in after luncheon Eton, with 231 to get, had a fairly heavy task, but were free from all worry on the subject of time. With all the afternoon before them the batsmen naturally set themselves to play a steady game. Hambro, who got his colours as a bowler, played wonderfully good cricket for two hours and a half. He came down with a perfectly straight bat on all the good balls and seldom failed to punish the loose ones, his innings including eleven 4's. In first wicket down at 32, he was out sixth at 188. When he left the game hung in the balance, 43 runs being still required, but Hankey and Anson, batting with perfect coolness, finished the game, Eton winning for the fifth year in succession.

Eighty-nine matches have been played, of which Eton have won thirty-six, Harrow thirty-five, and eighteen have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857, for boys under twenty, which has been rejected.
