PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1921.

There have been famous 'vintage' years for cricket in the past, such as 1887, 1899, and 1911, but 1921 will remain as the annus mirabilis. From the beginning to the end of the season hardly a match was stopped by rain, and good dry, hot weather, and hard wickets are essentially the best conditions for Public School cricket. The Summer of 1921, providing as it did a succession of hard and almost perfect wickets-for there was enough water available to prevent the actual pitches from becoming so dried up that they were dangerously fiery-naturally produced an abnormal number of runs and high averages all over the country. The Public Schools were no exception to the general rule, and averages which in normal years would be considered proofs of exceptional ability and promise were quite common. Generally speaking, batsmen had only to play themselves in carefully and continue to watch the ball to make runs. Runs indeed came by themselves, and on the majority of grounds if the ball got through the fieldsmen it travelled to the boundary A really fast bowler or an accurate googley bowler could, of course, get wickets, as would the 'in-swinger' on certain days: but the swinging bowlers last year were robbed of much of their terror by the absence of wind and the stillness and lightness of the atmosphere on many days of cricket. Once more the value of the bowler who relies primarily on his length and a slight variation of pace was proved to the hilt. Batsmen accustomed to make runs at a pace far beyond that of the ordinary season became disappointed and fidgeting when they were kept playing at the ball, and frequently got themselves out from trying to score too quickly. Again, so unaccustomed to really good length bowling were some young batsmen—for the 'trick' bowlers trequently 'serve up fours on a plate' when their tricks did not come off—that when they met it they played it, in some cases, with even too much respect, thus reversing the usual order of things and playing the bowler in. In the Lord's Schools versus the Rest match, for instance, C. W. D. Tucker bowled without a man in the outfield. Tucker is a mediumpaced left-hand bowler, with a slow ball and a faster one that comes with his arm : he came up to Lord's with a reputation for keeping a good length and more than sustained it. But for a bowler of his pace to bowl without even a deep extra-cover, and yet pitch the

slow one well up on the off-side seemed extraordinary. The truth was that the match was of such extreme importance to all the players taking part in it that some of the batsmen handicapped themselves by not playing their pet strokes. In extenuation for the disappointing batting of the Lord's Schools it must be mentioned that they started badly in their first innings, and being a 'scratch' side never quite got over it.

In choosing the sides for the Lord's Schools v. the Rest this year the Selectors had indeed a difficult task. Several boys of whom one knew might have gained places in the match, as might others of whom rumour spoke very highly. That infinite pains were used to gather information from all sources and that the cricket of all the players at Lord's and many who do not play there was carefully watched is perfectly well known. Some objections were heard in that Eton and Harrow were so strongly represented for the Lord's Schools, especially as G. O. Allen would have undoubtedly and deservedly played also except for a sudden illness. Certainly one would have liked to see G. H. Seeley and H. J. Kittermaster included in the side, for both are players who are likely to become really first-class cricketers in the future.

The Lord's Schools won the toss against the Rest, and although the wicket was not perfect their batting strength was worth more than the 132 runs made. At the same time every credit must be given to the bowling of Tucker, Wright and Hewetson, all of whom bowled really well, the difference in their pace, style, and method helping each other considerably. Tucker bowled thirteen overs and one ball for 14 runs and that, as has been said, without a man out. Wright looks a very plain straightforward bowler, which makes him the more difficult: as a fact he frequently swerves from leg at the last moment, and comes unexpectedly fast off the pitch. He, like Tucker, bowls very few bad ones. Hewetson is really fast. He went off during the term, and was disappointing when compared with his 1920 form: at Lord's, however, he was almost too fast in the flight for the opposing batsmen, and he has an exceptionally good slow ball which he holds back without apparently changing the pace of the swing of the arm. C. T. Bennett was compelled to play and play and play without attempting to make strokes, and yet without making the bowling look too difficult. It was a most difficult innings for a young cricketer to play, and his cool 43 was of inestimable value to the side. L. G. Crawley hit merrily for his 36, and K. S. Duleepsinhji gave evidence of a wonderfully quick eye, which promises very many runs in future years. With the exception of these three none of the batsmen looked like making runs, though it must be remembered that R. Aird, who had made so many runs in the season, was suffering from a very bad cold, and was not really

well enough to play. The Rest opened none too well-or too luckily. J. L. Guise, a player whom everybody was anxious to see make runs, was out to a ball that went away so suddenly and unaccountably that the fact that he actually touched it proved him a firstclass player. W. W. Timms batted well-he has proved himself in first-class cricket, and should go very far. H. C. Partridge and C. A. Winter--in spite of a damaged hand--played good cricket for thirties, and E. P. Hewetson hit tremendously hard at the finish, one six on to the tavern being a terrific old-fashioned smite. But the best batting of the day was that of F. H. Barnard. His driving on the off-side was beautiful, his footwork, timing and wrist-play being perfect. Barnard is a player to whom all ball games come naturally, and he is blest by a high courage and a contempt of nerves which are invaluable. In the second innings the Lord's Schools did better, and should have done better still. After doing really well up to a point, however, Hewetson proved too fast for the later batsmen, taking the last four wickets cheaply. J. G. Pugh was top-scorer with 81 and he ought to have made a hundred. As a rule he is very severe to anything on the leg side, and he pushes the ball on the leg stump away cleverly and quite safely. In this innings he was weak, very weak, on the leg-side, but otherwise he more than justified his big reputation: had he been timing the leg balls, as he can it would have been hard to tell what to bowl at him. L. G. Crawley, who was unfortunately suffering from bruised feet, scored at a tremendous pace for his 65, making 36 off his first sixteen balls, and that though the outfield was well plastered with men. The Rest finally won by seven wickets, W. W. Timms, C. A. Winter, and P. N. Durlacher all batting really well. Guise made 19 very quickly and was out off a gorgeous stroke. Guise hooks balls, which most other people would be quite content to play, hard and high behind the square leg umpire: this stroke of his was known. however, and Aird shut the trap cleverly baited to catch him.

The Public Schools match versus the Army was played on a wicket which had been affected by rain and these conditions rather favoured the soldiers, whose greater experience enabled them to switch from a hard wicket to a comparatively soft one more readily than the boys could do. Captain Jamieson won the toss and after some deliberation decided to take first innings. Bennett, who was captain of the Schools, started with Tucker, an obvious choice, and Hewetson: Hewetson was able to stand and Bennett did entirely the right thing in beginning with a really fast bowler who was bound to make the ball fly if he could keep his feet. Hewetson was unlucky in that he had the batsmen feeling after the ball on the off-side, but not playing quite well enough to get themselves out. Tucker bowled with painful lack of judgment. It was a wicket on which a left-hand bowler should have had two men out. pitched the ball

up and spun it, for the ball could be made to turn sharply and was coming different paces off the pitch. Tucker preferred to bowl the fast bumping ball coming into the body with the arm. If, wrongly as one must think, he went half-way to an imitation of Mr. F. R. Foster, he should have followed the imitation to its legitimate conclusions, and had at least two short legs close in. Had Tucker been fortunate enough to have five minutes theory and practice at a net with Rhodes or Woolley before the match started, matters

might have been very different.

Wright was put on for Hewetson, got a wicket with his first ball. and continued to bowl steadily and well. At one time Captain M. B. Burrows and Captain R. T. Stanyforth had the Public School bowling collared, and at the end of the first day the Army had scored 310 for eight wickets. Captain Jamieson declared at the overnight total, and the Schools, on none too easy a wicket had a big task to avert the follow-on. They opened badly, Guise being bowled for 4 by a grand ball from Captain Burrows which broke back very sharply. C. T. Bennett played another dogged, but most valuable innings for 28, Timms showed University form for his 41, and P. A. Wright made a patient 28 not out. F. P. Hewetson hit at practically everything and got his 32 very quickly, and T. B. Raikes also took the long handle and rattled up the same number in quick time. Hill and Tucker each got a few and the final total of 196 was quite a respectable one and almost double what it appeared likely to become at one time.

In the second innings Bennett very wisely stuck to the same order. He started to play free cricket himself in the second innings -a contrast to his first-and runs came quickly while he and Guise were together. Guise was out to a foolish stroke when 14 but, though Pugh failed again, Bennett, Timms, and Enthoven all made useful runs and made them quickly and well. P. A. Wright played a forcing game in his second innings and besides playing fine cricket showed great knowledge in his running between the wickets, running even more keenly for his partner than himself. M. Ll. Hill, who has been rather a disappointing batsman this year, played the innings of a typical Etonian of the present day, batting with absolute fearlessness and confidence, and making 23 quite invaluable runs. When he went in the match seemed as good as over, but when he came out-still undefeated-the Schools had a chance to draw the match. In the ordinary way the strong Army side should have managed to make 82 runs in just under the hour: the light, however, was never good during their second innings and it got worse and worse, thick black clouds hanging low over the ground and threatening another thunderstorm at the finish. Hewetson, bowling at a great pace from the Pavilion end, was always difficult to see, and he thoroughly upset every batsman who played at him. At the other end Tucker was a different bowler from the day before, varying his bowling with real understanding and forcing the batsmen to play at him or be out. Between them these two got eight wickets for 51 runs off the bat, and though Tucker got five wickets to Hewetson's three it was the latter who was—with the help of the light—chiefly responsible for the collapse. Had the Army not made the Public Schools follow-on but gone in themselves and, after a spell of light-hearted cricket, declared, they would most probably have won: as it was the Public Schools almost brought off a most astonishing victory.

On the Public Schools side only Guise, Pugh and Barnard can be said to have failed, though Barnard got two useful wickets, it must be remembered. Both Guise and Pugh have another year at school. As a side it was an extremely strong one and when it is added that G. O. Allen and L. G. Crawley were only left out of the team on account of illness there can be little doubt that the strength of the Public Schools this last season was considerably above the average in every department of the game.

Eton were undoubtedly the best School side of the year. They beat both Winchester and Harrow comfortably in the end, winning both matches, as was said at the time, in the first hour of each match. They were first and foremost an all-round side and the failure of any particular batsman entirely failed to shake the nerves of the rest. The bowling was exceptionally well varied and, backed up as it was by keen and brilliant fielding, even on the perfect wickets of 1921 runs always had to be earned by good cricket. The record of the season's matches, won 3, drawn 7, lost 2, is quite misleading if only glanced at casually. The first match was lost, but the first match of the year seldom does a great deal to indicate the ultimate strength or weakness of a School, and as a matter of fact Liverpool, who won by 18 runs, were one of the weaker sides whom Eton met. "Of the seven draws," writes Mr. R. A. Young, "three were practically certain to be wins, two were much in our favour, one slightly in our favour, and one very open result." Eton played strong sides all the year through, some of them "batting down to double figures" as one expression has it. Good stands were made against them when the back of the batting should have been presumably broken or at least twisted, but this was not owing to lucky batting against disheartened bowling: the opposition was almost invariably so strong that some two or three were bound to come off on Eton wickets.

Eton had one particularly happy habit, that of starting well. A couple of wickets might fall cheaply, but wickets did not continue to fall. The styles of the different batsmen were so different that each batsman had to be studied afresh and the weak point of the last man out frequently proved to be the particular strength of the next

comer: and as all of them got runs at a good pace it was an expensive education to learn that the one man's poison was the next man's meat. R. Aird was the best, as he was the most graceful batsman on the side. He failed against Harrow when, we have reason to believe, he was not well, but his innings of 112 not out against Winchester was a masterly display. His biggest innings was 122 not out against the Authentics, an innings full of beautiful strokes and marked by great knowledge of running. T. C. Barber was second in the averages, thanks a good deal to one innings of 103 not out against Hampstead, and two other not out innings, but P. L. Lawrie, who scored 53 and 67 not out against Harrow, and 92 against Winchester, and gained a place on the Lord's Side against the Rest Schools was a more dangerous batsman. His temperament is a perfect one for cricket, and he never showed a trace of nervousness in a match. The Hon. D. F. Brand did not come on quite as much as a batsman as was hoped from his 1920 form. He did some good things so well-his 61 run out against the Household Brigade early on was a splendid venture—that he might reasonably have done them more often had he been a batsman pure and simple. But he was subordinate as a batsman to captain and bowler. He bowled more overs than anyone else on the side, and the effort of bowling, which was greatly increased by the anxiety of the captaincy, inevitably took a great deal out of him. G. O. Allen was the best of a strong bowling side. He came off in both school matches and his bowling in the first innings of the Eton and Harrow match was far better than his figures would seem to show. Well above the medium pace Allen can swing the ball late with a new ball and he varies the swinging ball with one that breaks back very sharply from the off and comes fast off the pitch. He broke down at the end of the 'half' but a medical examination showed that the fears that his future as a cricketer was doomed were, fortunately, found to be greatly exaggerated. Allen bowled really well for Middlesex at the finish of the season, though his figures indicate nothing remarkable. W. R. Bridgeman kept a fine length, was always difficult to score off, and when the wind suited him was a difficult bowler for any batsman to play confidently. G. K. Cox can swing the ball either way, but he has not control of the two swings: very few bowlers at school have. The wickets were too hard in the main to suit the Hon. J. B. Coventry, a slow left-hand bowler. He was expensive at Eton, but he came off at Lord's taking four wickets for 9 runs in the first innings and three for 79 in the second. H. D. Sheldon and R. Aird were useful change bowlers and Lord Dunglass was good enough to be classed as a good all-round cricketer. The Hon. D. F. Brand, G. O. Allen, R. Aird, and M. Ll. Hill are all at Cambridge. Blues there will be difficult to get, for many of the most brilliant players of the year have gone up there. All four, however, have a chance

of ultimately getting into the side. Hill struck everybody at Lord's both in the Eton and Harrow match and in the subsequent Public School matches, as a wicket keeper quite out of the common. He has a quiet unaffected style that is particularly pleasing, and he is particularly strong to fast bowling on the leg-side. P. E. Lawrie is up at Oxford, and the Hon. J. B. Coventry is expected to be up next Summer.

Harrow were a strong side—though a trifle weak in bowling all through the term, but nerves and the Eton bowling played the mischief with them in the first innings at Lord's, and they again failed to do themselves justice. That may be dealt with later on. Harrow won the toss against Winchester in a one-day match at Winchester and won comfortably. C. T. Bennett and H. J. Enthoven gave them a good start, and Enthoven batted really well for his 91. Harrow declared at 235 for eight wickets and got Winchester out for 121, of which J. L. Guise made 57 in his own beautiful style. Charterhouse won the toss at Harrow but were all out for 136, which was not a big enough score on that wicket. Upton, who bowled really well, took five wickets. Harrow won by four wickets, Enthoven again making runs, 57 to be precise. Later on I. G. Collins and R. H. Baucher made a good stand, Collins scoring 69 and Baucher 38 not out, and in the end the side scored 248 for nine wickets. In all their matches at Harrow the School only failed once, and that was against the Household Brigade on a very cold and miserable dayso miserable that one batsman went in during a hailstorm. The Household Brigade made 225 and got Harrow out for 97, Captain G. Barry bowling the in-swinger against a wind that exactly suited him well enough to get almost any school side out cheaply.

C. T. Bennett had the highest batting average on the side and was the best batsman at the school. Last year he took to batting in glasses, which undoubtedly had the effect of making him see the ball more quickly. He captained his side with great judgment throughout the year and got the best possible out of them. In the holidays he made a bagful of runs, doing particularly well for the Young Amateurs of Surrey. In addition to his batting Bennett is a particularly good short slip. This will be of great value to him at Cambridge-he went up in the winter term-where 'Blues' have been given, practically speaking, for fielding only before now, and doubtless will be again. H. J. Enthoven was the best all-round player in the School, averaging 43.99 with the bat, and taking 27 wickets for 14.4 runs a-piece. He has another year at school, and in 1922 should be a cricketer indeed. At Lord's he was easily the best of the bowlers, always keeping a length and doing something with the ball. His biggest innings of the year was 152 not out. L. G. Crawley was perhaps the most dangerous batsman on the side, for with his quickness on his feet, great strength and fine wrists,

he was liable to knock any bowler off his length. His innings of 103 against Eton will never be forgotten by any one who saw it. R. H. Baucher went in too late for so good a player, but he was kept as a safe player in case any of the hitters got going and could not find anyone to stay with them. Several times he was left not out when batting well. Baucher took 22 wickets and headed the bowling averages, his analysis bring a fraction lower than Enthoven. He captains Harrow this year. I. G. Collins was a thoroughly sound bat and a plucky one: this year, when he has filled out, he should make a lot of runs. P. H. Stewart-Brown, a wicket-keeper of really big possibilities, is also a batsman of sound promise. H. F. Bagnall did not show his best form at school, but he got a lot of runs later on, and his defence in the second innings at Lord's was invaluable. G. C. Kinahan was perhaps the best bowler at the school on his day, and he took 33 wickets for 14.79 runs: he was also a most dangerous hitter at any time, though always liable to hit across a plain halfvolley. C. T. Bennett, G. C. Kinahan and P. V. Upton, another useful all-round cricketer, are the only three leaving, so that Baucher starts the season with seven other old Flannels, and there are at least three good bowlers left. One of these is F. O. Griffiths Lloyd, a left-hander, who over-bowled himself at the nets last year and lost his sting in consequence towards the end of the season. Harrow cricket owed a very great deal to M. C. Bird, who coached the Sixth Form game with tireless patience, zeal, and knowledge,

The Eton and Harrow match, as has been said, was almost lost and won in the first hour's cricket, certainly before lunch on the first day. Harrow won the toss and wise men-after the eventconsidered that they ought to have put Eton in. This was quite absurd, of course. It is true that the wicket seemed to 'play funny' at times, but the real and only reason why such a strong batting side was out for only 64 runs-10 of which were extras-was to be found in the brilliant bowling of G. O. Allen at the start, and the fine captaincy of Brand, coupled with the good luck which so often follows a side who have started brilliantly. Three wickets fell cheaply, and afterwards it was almost a procession. To add a runout to the batting failures was almost the last straw. Coventry's analysis of ten overs, two balls, eight maidens, nine runs, and four wickets is an extraordinary one, and demoralised though the batting appeared, it can be said quite truly that he never bowled a bad ball.

The Hon. D. F. Brand and Lord Dunglass gave Eton a good start and the theory of the bad wicket-even taking into consideration the effect of the roller-was exploded. When, therefore, seven Eton wickets were down for 135 Harrow had still a chance of pulling the match out of the fire. P. E. Lawrie, however, took risks and got 53, and a fine stand between H. D. Sheldon and Hon. J. B. Coventry, with a generous addition from extras, caused the score to mount

finally to 238. Harrow started very differently in their second innings, though now they were facing the big deficit of 174 runs. Both Bennett and Enthoven settled down from the very beginning, and when 50 went up without the loss of a wicket it appeared as if Harrow might make a very big score indeed. At 67, however, Enthoven was well caught at cover off a ball that cocked up quite unexpectedly, and a little later Bennett followed a wide ball on the off, tried to hit it too hard, and was caught at third slip. How such a finished and cool player as Bennett usually is should be mesmerised into such a stroke at such a time was inexplicable. The Harrow order was altered, I. G. Collins going in for Bagnall, who had split his thumb. Collins was content to keep his end up, but L. G. Crawley is aggressive or nothing, and his 29 runs came quickly. At the finish of the day's play Harrow had lost two good wickets and were still 73 runs behind. Collins was soon out in the morning, a great blow to Harrow, who relied a good deal on his steady and orthodox batting to 'break the bowling.' Followed H. F. Bagnall, handicapped by a touch of sunstroke and a damaged hand. Perhaps these two drawbacks were really a blessing in disguise for Bagnall, at a critical moment of the game, had no time left to be nervous. At any rate he played brave defensive cricket and occasionally punished the loose ones, while L. G. Crawley carried on a brilliant offensive at the other end. Crawley played without a shade of nervousness from the start, and his driving both straight and past extra-cover was perfect. He made up his mind very quickly as to the right ball to hit, and when he did go for a ball he hit it tremendously hard. Bagnall was smartly stumped in the end for an invaluable 20, an innings which proved afterwards to have improved his cricket by 100 per cent. Stewart-Brown started confidently and with Crawley well set at the other end there was still a chance for Harrow. Crawley reached his hundred after batting about two and a half hours, but was out almost directly afterwards. He was caught at deep extra-cover by Sheldon from a hard clean drive: considering that the ball was swinging away from him and going at a great pace Sheldon must be congratulated on making a catch which may rank with some of the very best ever held in this match. It was also a most important one, for had the hit scored four runs-which it would have done to very many fielders-Crawley might have done almost anything. Kinahan hit out at everything and his quick 28 included two 6's. Stewart-Brown was out most unluckily just before lunch: he touched a ball which kept very low and, missing the wicket-keeper's gloves entirely, stuck in his pads. Lloyd was caught at short leg-though it appeared a bumpball to many-and the Harrow innings closed for 295 which saved disgrace, but was not quite good enough. Set to get 122 Eton started with 22 without the loss of a wicket and then Brand, Dunglass, and Aird were out in quick succession. Visions of another 1900 match, only with Eton batting this time, arose at this point. Unhappily for Harrow, however, there was no crumbled spot on this occasion. Lawrie and Cox batted with the utmost confidence, and Lewis was particularly aggressive. With the exception of Enthoven the Harrow bowling was weak in length, and too often in direction as well, and though Bennett mixed them up none of his other bowlers found their confidence or sting. Lawrie and Cox deserve every congratulation for, although Eton had no tail last year, a break down in the fourth innings of a match, especially after fatiguing fielding in a very hot sun on a hard ground, is always a possibility in a school match.

The Eton and Winchester match was played at Eton on Agar's Plough-Winchester had won in 1919 and 1920-and for the fifth time in the history of the match since the old days at Lord's, which ended in the 50's, they had a chance of winning three times in succession. They failed to do so, however, Eton gaining a handsome victory by seven wickets, after an interesting game, and one which will live in history because of J. L. Guise's wonderful second innings of 278 for Winchester. Though Winchester failed in the main object it will always be remembered as Guise's match. His score was a record for the whole series of matches between Eton, Harrow, and Winchester, being as a matter of fact nearly 100 more than the next best score of 183 made by D. C. Boles for Eton against Harrow in 1904, and it is probable that it will be many years before it is approached. His runs were made out of a total of 381, and of these 38 were extras, so that the remaining batsmen only made 65 between them—the next highest score being B. Pinney's 21 and the only other double-figure score 13 by A. R. V. Barker. Moreover 50 runs were put on for the last wicket, of which all scored off the bat were made by Guise. It was a great achievement, and it was hard that such a performance did not carry with it success in one of the chief objects of Winchester cricket, to beat Eton.

The game was played on a very fast wicket and in very hot weather. Winchester batted first and a terrible collapse ensued, the whole side being out for 57, R. C. Huband and D. H. Macpherson alone getting double-figures. The pace of the wicket—faster than anything they had seen on Ridding Field—and the glare no doubt had some effect on the Wykehamists batsmen, but it was a poor performance. Full credit, however, must be given to Eton for good bowling and fielding. G. O. Allen bowled specially well and took five wickets for 20, while H. D. Sheldon in three overs got three for 7. Eton then went in in a glorious position, but at first they did not do any too well. Raikes, the Winchester captain, bowled steadily and well, and the fielding was up to the best Wykehamist standard.

Three wickets were down before lunch for 28, and a fourth fell with the score at 53. Then P. E. Lawrie and G. K. Cox came together and a long stand followed, which put Eton definitely on top, for 144 runs were added before the next wicket fell, Cox being out for 64. He had played well and was especially strong on the off-side. After this there was no long stand, and the side were out for 255, leaving them with a lead of practically 200. Winchester had an hour and a half's batting before the close of the first day's play, and in that time they made 130 for three wickets, of which Guise, who had batted beautifully from the start had got 86 not out and had been helped in a useful stand for the second wicket by B. Pinney. Winchester thus left off 68 behind with seven wickets in hand. The rest of the Winchester innings on Saturday was Guise and practically nothing else. He hardly made a mistake during the whole innings and gave practically no chance, though one ball did go in the air through the slips, and he played all the bowling with mastery, and hit many balls for 4, which most school batsmen would be content to play. His great effort enabled Winchester to put Eton in with 184 to get to win-a toughish proposition even in these days of good wickets in a school match. But apart from Raikes the Winchester bowling was weak and Eton had good batting all through A fine return from cover-point ran out Cox with only one run scored. Then Aird joined Brand, and a good stand was made, and when Brand was out Lawrie and Aird made the result a certainty. Eventually Eton won by seven wickets. Aird's innings of 112 not out, though overshadowed by Guise's, being an exceptionally good one. That Eton were the better side there was little doubt. Their batting all through was sound and the bowling as a whole distinctly better than Winchester's. Winchester fielded up to the Wykehamist reputation and the wicket-keeping of Hill for Eton and of Huband for Winchester was particularly good.

There is not much question that after having had two fine sides in 1919 and 1920 Winchester were the weakest of the three schools. In Guise, as we have seen, they had an exceptional batsman who will captain the team next season and should be a tower of strength, while Raikes, the captain, was a thoroughly good schoolboy bowle and useful batsman. He is over medium-pace and as a whole he bowls a good length and he has a nasty swerve. He did one exceptional performance in the year against Charterhouse when Winchester won a very easy victory. He got 93 runs and eight wickets for 17, and not a single run was scored off him from the time he got his first wicket to the time he got his last.

Huband was a useful bat beside being a thoroughly good wicketkeeper, and Pinney and Barker were useful bats, Barker having good wrists. In addition to their victory over Charterhouse, Winchester beat Marlborough. Before 1915 it was fairly easy to divide the various Public Schools into different groups; but between 1914 and 1919 all School matches at Lord's were discontinued and instead of the big two-day matches one-day home and home matches were in some cases substituted. More schools met each other and in many cases these one-day contests have been continued, and though the old traditions are as jealously cherished as ever in certain schools, certain barriers have been swept away and 'groups' are no longer finite. Thus, though it must seem annoying to the reader to find the names of schools with whose doings he might well have imagined he had finished turning up again unexpectedly, it cannot be avoided without

giving undue prominence to some at the expense of others. Charterhouse had a disappointing season, for there were possibilities in the side, which were only too rarely shown. F. H. Barnard was undoubtedly a player of very high-class and on a strong side his record for the season would have been an even better one than it looks on paper. A brilliant hitter, on the off-side particularly, Barnard had to so nurse the rest of the side that he seldom dared to take the shadow of a risk. T. A. Bourne was a reliable bat with a good defence though not many strokes. He averaged 43.4, and besides playing one big innings of 139 not out against the Incogniti, could almost always be trusted to at least get into double figures and keep up an end. P. M. Anderson is a good player to watch when he gets going, but he has a weak stroke on the off-side, which often finishes in a catch in the slips. C. G. Varcoe only requires confidence to develop into a really good batsman and he is a better bowler than he looks; he should be invaluable to the side this year. I. A. W. Gilliat improved in his wicket-keeping, though, owing to the hard wickets, he had trouble with his hands. As a batsman he was unlucky, striking a bad patch from which he hardly recovered. After his big innings against Westminster in 1920 great hopes were built on Gilliat's batting last year, but they were not realised. In bowling, as in batting, Barnard was easily the best man on the side. He took in all nineteen wickets for an average of just under 15 apiece, which on the Charterhouse ground was a really good analysis. A. J. P. Parker bowled consistently through the term without much luck, sometimes beating bat and wicket together with really good balls. F. L. Barker, who has another year, is a fastish, rather erratic bowler, but one who may easily improve into a real bowler this year, and W. H. Lambert, who will also be at Charterhouse in 1922, is a medium-paced bowler who keeps a fair length and sometimes swerves. C. G. Varcoe had a great match against the M.C.C., making 97 runs and then taking the last four M.C.C. wickets for eight runs, and so just winning the game for the School; this, however, was his only real performance as a bowler. Charterhouse won only one of their School matches, beating Welling-

ton in a very small scoring match by 30 runs, but losing to Harrow, Winchester, and Westminster. Charterhouse won the toss against Wellington, and were all out for only 112, a poor score on a beautiful Charterhouse wicket. The runs proved to be more than enough, however, for with the exception of P. N. Durlacher, none of the Wellington batsmen could do anything with Barnard's bowling. Durlacher made 51 in fine style, but after he had been well caught in the slips Barnard finished off the innings in a couple of overs, taking the last four wickets for 4 runs. Wellington were all out for 84, Barnard taking seven wickets for 31 runs. Charterhouse also won the toss against Westminster, but in spite of a fair start, a good 59 from P. M. Anderson and twenties from Barnard and Gilliat, the side were out for 178. C. H. Taylor bowled exceptionally well for Westminster, keeping a good length with his googlies and making the ball turn a lot; his seven wickets for 49 was the result of really high-class bowling. When Westminster went in Charterhouse lost what turned out to be their last hope of winning, by failing to run Taylor out from the first ball sent down. J. D. Percival, the Westminster captain, and Taylor took the score to 61 before the latter was caught at the wicket. H. R. Munt played forcing cricket from the start of his innings and he and Percival made the match safe. Percival was finally bowled for a steady 58, which took him just over two hours to make. At the finish Westminster won easily by eight wickets, with Munt not out 70 and R. G. H. Lowe not out 15. The matches with Harrow and Winchester have been alluded to above. F. H. Barnard and I. A. W. Gilliat are up at Oxford, and P. N. Anderson and T. A. Bourne at Cambridge. C. G. Varcoe, F. L. Barker, W. H. Lambert, S. F. Peel-a left-handed player who may grow into a really good hard wicket bat-and C. J. Quiney will be at Charterhouse in 1922.

Wellington had a fairly successful season, and out of ten matches won three, drew two and lost five; in School matches they won three and lost two, and they can only have been said to have really failed in the match against Charterhouse in which, it has been said, Barnard bowled too well for any of them except P. N. Durlacher. The match against Marlborough was magnificent as a match, but neither side quite did themselves justice. Wellington won the toss but lost Hirst, Durlacher and White for 40 runs. J. G. D. Chaytor and C. E. Dixon took the score to 100 by bright cricket, but then Chaytor hit a beautiful full-pitch straight to mid-off and Dixon played a very long hop on to his wicket. E. H. Deacon made a useful 24, but the two bad balls made into good ones seemed to have taken the sting out of the Wellington batting and the innings closed for 177. This total at one time appeared to be a winning one, for six good Marlborough wickets were down for 76 runs. Then G. G. C. Streatfield, R. Leach, J. Young and R. C. R. Kirkpatrick played brave cricket and gradually the prospect of a win grew nearer. When the last batsman, A. J. Hawthorne joined Young, Marlborough still needed 13 runs to win. Byes accounted for four most valuable runs, and finally, mostly in singles, the runs were knocked off and Marlborough won by one wicket. Wellington beat Bradfield very easily by an innings, dismissing Bradfield in their first innings for 88, of which T. B. Parker made 41 by plucky cricket. Wellington knocked up 277, of which Durlacher made a brilliant 124, and then bowled Bradfield out again for 88. Their finest effort was against Westminster. Going in first Wellington made 354 for six wickets and then declared. The feature of the batting was J. D. G. Chaytor's big innings of 151 not out, a really brilliant one considering the strength of the Westminster bowling. Westminster only scored 94.

Haileybury were beaten on the first innings by 33 runs, and, by some arrangement rather difficult to follow, this was put down as a win to Wellington in spite of the match being a two-day fixture. Wellington's performance was particularly good as they were without Chaytor. J. D. G. Chaytor, though he was a disappointment as a bowler and far below his 1920 form, batted particularly well in the later part of the season and headed the averages with 48.85 P. N. Durlacher, however, was the best batsman on the side and made the biggest aggregate of runs. His 171 not out against the M.C.C. stamped him as a brilliant run-getter, even if the opposition bowling was not over-strong. He played for the Rest Schools and later for Middlesex. Against the real professional bowling he will have to watch the ball more closely than he did last year. His average was 42.7 for the College. T. A. W. White made 92 against Haileybury and 53 against Westminster, two very useful school innings. E. H. Deacon was a good consistent bat, his 80 not out against the Free Foresters being a more than useful innings. He was a batsman to trust and averaged nearly 40. F. J. P. Shaw only played six innings, but he may train on into a good bat. was easily the best bowler on the side. He is an in-swinger who swings very late and when the wind is just right for him can get quite a lot of wickets cheaply, that is if the catches are held. He took more than twice as many wickets as any other bowler, 36 for 14.86 apiece. E. R. Hanley bowled well at times and against Bradfield took seven wickets for 13 runs, including a hat-trick. C. E. Dixon and E. H. Deacon were both useful at times. P. N. Durlacher, J. D. G. Chaytor, and E. H. Deacon are up at Cambridge. C. E. Dixon and W. G. D. Ray, who is a useful wicket-keeper, have gone to Sandhurst.

Cheltenham had the best eleven they have had for quite a number of years, an eleven too, which consistently came off after the first match. In that they were beaten by Liverpool C.C., playing XII

a-side, in a two-day's match, by seven wickets. Here, however, they were in good company, for Eton also lost their first match of the year to Liverpool. The defeat was followed by a brilliant win at Cheltenham over Marlborough by an innings and 103 runs. Marlborough started well and had 80 up for one wicket. Then E. A. Dearman, whose running had been erratic all through, was run out for 49. K.S. Duleepsinjhi came on with his very high slow leg-breaks and Marlborough proceeded to show just how such bowling should not be played. Even G. H. Seeley, a class batsman well set, played a thoughtless stroke and was caught and bowled. Duleepsinghi's analysis in an innings of 166 was seven wickets for 35 runs. A. C. Heyman, who is a fine wicket-keeper to any bowling, stumped two and caught two in the innings. When Cheltenham went in H. S. Swain and A. L. S. Jackson played beautifully from the start, and 50 went up in twenty-five minutes. Swain's 60 was perhaps his best innings of the year, which is saying a good deal. Jackson had a few mis-hits in his 74 but it was a good innings. Later on Duleepsinghi played astonishing cricket for a boy of his years, his cutting and placing on the leg-side delighting even the Marlburians. He got out when 76 because he was too tired to go on. Cheltenham were 399 for nine wickets overnight and declared in the morning. There had been just enough rain to make the ball kick aggressively and Smyth, who uses all of his big height, was a most unpleasant bowler to face. He took five wickets for 22 runs and in spite of a plucky stand by R. H. Smith and J. Young, Marlborough were all out for 130. The match with Cheltenham Town was drawn, greatly in favour of the College. In a two-day match the Old Cheltonians were beaten by ten wickets, A. C. Heyman scoring 128 out of a total of 386. A by no means weak M.C.C. team were beaten in a two-day's match by eight wickets, A. L. S. Jackson making a rare hundred before being run out. The school bowling was well tested in this match and stood the test very creditably. The Clifton Club were just beaten by 19 runs and the match was another triumph for Duleepsinghi, who made 51 out of 165 and took six wickets. The Free Foresters were beaten by an innings and 42 runs and this the last match before the meeting with Haileybury at Lord's was just what Cheltenham needed. In it H. S. Swain made 118 and H. S. Smyth took five wickets in the first innings for 41. Some account of the match with Haileybury will be found in the notes on that College.

H. S. Swain headed both the batting and bowling averages. He proved himself a thoroughly dependable left-hand batsman all through the term and has the real left-hander's off-drive through the covers and a beautiful square cut. He averaged 43.6. As a bowler he was disappointing, for his length was very uncertain. He came off both in batting and bowling, however, against Haileybury at

times when runs and wickets were badly wanted. He was one of the unlucky ones in not getting a place for the Lord's Schools. A. C. Heyman had the strongest defence on the side and watched the ball on to the bat as few School-boy wicket-keepers have done. He averaged 36.9 with a top score of 121 to which innings reference has been made. K. S. Duleepsinjhi we have seen excelled both as batsman and bowler; it should be added that he is a very fine shortslip indeed. A. L. S. Jackson plays straight and hits hard, especially the short pitched ball, and may become an even better player than his brother, J. A. S., the Cambridge and Somerset cricketer. R. O. Phillips had a disappointing season as to personal performances, he subordinated his private feelings to his captaincy and as a captain no School could hope for a better. H. S. Smyth coming from a great height—he is well over six feet in height and uses every inch of it-was always liable to get wickets. Well over the medium pace he sometimes broke back quite sharply, and so kept the batsman playing at him. He got a lot of batsmen caught in the slips or at the wicket with the one that went straight on and come quickly off the pitch. R. G. Hopkins did not get as many wickets as he should have done, but a bowler with his beautiful action is bound to be a really good one in time. The fielding of the team was extremely good all through, and some really brilliant catches were brought off. R. O. Phillips and H. S. Smyth are up at Oxford. K. S. Duleepsinjhi, A. L. S. Jackson, R. N. Foster, C. J. King-Turner, C. R. Harman, and R. G. Hopkins will be at Cheltenham this year and should form the nucleus of another really strong school side.

Rugby were a really good side, but very unlucky. Up to the Uppingham match they were strong in bowling besides being a run-getting side all through. Then H. J. Kittermaster, who had developed into an unexpectedly fast bowler for his length of run, strained his thigh. This threw the attack all out of gear and perhaps accounts for the fact that Marlborough were able to draw their match with Rugby at Lord's. Kittermaster made 131 in that match and made them extremely well, but his bowling was even more missed than his innings might have been. He is up at Oxford and, if he is perfectly sound again, has a chance of getting into the eleven before he comes down. C. W. Walker was another very pretty bat, who made his runs like a cricketer. He is also at Oxford, we understand, but not quite up to University form at present. J. G. Pugh, who scored 1,034 runs for the school with an average of 73.86 was, of course, the great player of the side. He has been mentioned before and will have very much more said about him in this his last year at school. D. W. Hogg and L. C. Woodhouse bowled stubbornly through the year and never gave runs away; with a stronger fielding side they would have been better still.

D. Mackessack bowled really well against Marlborough at Lord's without having much luck. The Rugby and Uppingham match was drawn, Uppingham declaring with 393 for eight wickets; they never looked like getting Rugby out. J. G. Pugh made 93 and was unlucky not to get a hundred. Clifton were beaten rather easily, Kittermaster bowling extremely well in the first innings and taking the two important wickets in the second. Pugh made over 200 for once out and, had more runs been needed, would almost certainly have scored a hundred in each innings. Rugby have it to their credit that they were not beaten by Liverpool as other good Schools were. By the way A. J. H. Cassels will one day be a batsman worthy of the highest Rugby traditions.

Marlborough have come into these notes on several occasions already. They were a useful side, but had a bad break-down in a most important fortnight, and during that time lost to Cheltenham and Winchester. G. H. Seeley was a class batsman, a useful bowler and a fine field. He is not going up to either University we understand, a matter for regret. J. I. Outram captained the side with discretion and had the great satisfaction of making 111 against Rugby in the first innings and coming off again in the second when otherwise the batting was thoroughly disappointing. He is up at Cambridge. R. C. R. Kirkpatrick was a useful bowler at times, but he failed to 'last,' his pace going off after a few overs. He occasionally hit hard and got some useful runs at the tail end. He will be welcomed in College cricket at Oxford this year.

Westminster had a good season with a useful side, who, however, depended a little too much on four players, J. D. Percival, C. H. Taylor, H. R. Munt and R. G. H. Lowe. J. D. Percival captained the side extremely well and subdued his personality-he likes to hit the ball-to solidify the side. He is now at Oxford and has great possibilities as a batsman in time. Munt was one of the schoolboys who has learned to use his height both as a batsman and a bowler, and was one of the few tall fast bowlers who has not also been a pure hitter. Taylor is a googley bowler of the South African School who frankly prefers a fast wicket to bowl on. He has another year, and should his knee trouble-which has been more serious than it was expected to become-leave him, he is a bowler who may do very big things. As a batsman he watches the ball and is not afraid to hit the bad one. It is to be hoped that he will go up to one of the Universities later on. Lowe is a player with distinct possibilities as an all-round cricketer.

Hadleybury were a good side who, unfortunately, did not do as well as they should have done. They were beaten, and well beaten, by Uppingham, who batted extremely well in the second innings.

They were beaten also in their big match—that at Lord's against Cheltenham. Here neither side was quite up to form, but the wicket was entirely different to anything the boys had been accustomed to, and to run down the batting would be to snatch honour from some good bowling and keen fielding. R. E. H. Hudson showed batting form of real class, and has a future. He must, however, remember that there are at least ten ways of getting out at cricket, and so play every ball on its merits irrespective of the bowler. V. A. Arnold, the captain, is a good wicket-keeper and can get runs. The bowling was too much of a muchness, for P. Adams, the fast bowler, was out of form practically from the start of the season. R. T. O. Meyer is a good batsman who may become a great public school player. He was perhaps the best of the bowlers on the side, bowling a length even when the side was in difficulties. W. K. Seabrooke and W. F. G. Bayley could both make the ball turn, but the season was hard for bowlers of their pace. Haileybury are lucky in that that very fine all-round player, Mr. H. D. Hake, has now joined the staff.

From Clifton comes a most interesting account, which we are sorry not to be able to give in its entirety. The match against Tonbridge was a great disappointment to the school and the result only rested on H. C. A. Guant's big innings. "The Clifton Eleven was disappointing: it promised exceedingly well, with three left-hand batsmen (in Weeks, Lyons, and Rutherford), Bonham-Carter a natural hitter and Hampton a stylish steady batsman. King. who was top of the averages, was a very good batsman when set, but invariably gave chances in the slips at the beginning of an innings: he was lucky to be missed there so often. The wicket-keeper and captain, J. T. Webster, was brilliant as a wicket-keeper but not a lucky captain. He had so many bowlers, he didn't know what to do on occasions. J. J. Lyons should have been a real class lefthander: he usually began very confidently and got himself out carelessly when well set, as in the first innings against Tonbridge. We were defeated both by Rugby and Tonbridge by a one-man performance. Hampton was the best bat in the early part of the year, but did not come off in the last month. He is really, I think, the best player for future years. He is captain in 1922. J. T. Webster, J. G. Lyons, and O. H. Bonham-Carter have gone to Cambridge. Bonham-Carter could be a fine cricketer if he could les rn to restrain himself. The "Times" said King was the best player on the Clifton side. I totally disagree with that statement. For 1922 we shall still have W. M. Hampton, V. B. Powell, C. S. Barlow, D. D. Homan, and J. G. Coates, the last four of whom are bowlers. The fielding was good especially that of V. B. Powell at cover. The bowling was varied and none of it bad. Powell, quite fast; Barlow, fast medium, not very good yet, but he is very young, just 17; Homan, medium—a nice easy action with a little swing; Coates, slow tosh—very useful at times, left hand with a left-hander's leg break; Bonham-Carter, Weeks, King, and Hampton could all bowl a good length; Lyons, a slow left-hander—naturally a good bowler, but pitched too short."

There have been few greater judges of schoolboy cricket than Mr. C. Toppin, and his judgment on the 1921 side appears, of course, as he wrote it. It is, possible, however, that he is a little severe, with that severity which is the greatest kindness for the future.

Malvern. It could not be pronounced as other than a weak sideweaker possibly than the year before. The weakness lav mainly in the attack, for there was no bowler on the side of any real merit. and the stumper was only moderate—with the result that when a strong batting side encountered them on the typical Malvern rungetting wicket, scoring was apt to be high. There were three or four quite good school batsmen among them. G. B. Partridge, hit extraordinarily hard on the off-side and made some surprising strokes, but he was unsound, especially in the slips. He is also a fine field. Jagger played some very promising innings of the true upstanding type and he promises well. Legge, too, shows distinct promise, and so does young Holmes-under 16 years old. The constant succession of hard poppy wickets militated strongly against development of batting, especially among the youngsters. We have three or four very promising young and inexperienced cricketers, but owing to the unvarying condition of the wickets they did not improve as they should have done. It is impossible to teach boys either strokes or confidence when nearly every ball comes very fast off the ground. and very often knuckle high. Under ordinary conditions of weather they could have done very much better, and I am looking forward to next season, when we may hope to have more congenial conditions. Altogether, the eleven cricket was disappointing, but I am very hopeful of the future. None of this year's eleven are at either Oxford or Cambridge.

Shrewsbury had a moderate season in 1921 as far as results were concerned. They beat Repton, M.C.C., Cryptics, Old Salopians, and Shrewsbury Town, and were beaten by Rossall, Wolverhampton, Staffordshire Gents, Shropshire Gents and R. Sale's XI. The match with Uppingham was drawn in favour of Uppingham. The Eleven ought to have been strong in bowling, with very fair batting strength and a high standard of fielding. Unfortunately their fast bowler, E. P. Hewetson, who bowled successfully at Lord's this year and last, only began to find his real form at the end of the season. All the last four matches were won. J. S. Stephenson, who is captain next year, stood out as easily the best and most successful batsman on the side. If he improves, as he should, and

steadies down at the beginning of his innings, he ought to be really first-class. J. M. Peterson (captain) played very well in all the school matches, but he is a bad starter.

Uppingham had a fine batting side, but were a trifle weak in bowling. Against Shrewsbury they were able to declare with six wickets down for 437, Hewetson on this occasion presenting no terrors. Shrewsbury, however, managed to draw the match. They were beaten by Repton after just leading on the first innings, the Repton batting in the second innings being something approaching the heroic. Haileybury were beaten easily. J. W. Richardson, who captains the school this year, had an average of 69 without making a century, which was an astonishing performance. F. R. Terras bowled well all through the term, though he had too much work thrust on him and was palpably stale at the finish.

Rossall were a really good school side and won their big match at Shrewsbury by ten wickets. Tucker has been dealt with as a bowler and he was the most important player on the side. Goodwin topped the batting averages and was a really good player, even as was predicted in 1920. Gregory scored three centuries, I see, and Holland was more than useful. Unfortunately our information from Rossall—as from some other schools—must have miscarried in the post.

Many schools may well consider that they have been neglected this season, both in results and personalities. In defence the writers can only put up the negative one that, except for the kindness of Mr. H. S. Altham and the invaluable 'cuttings' and help lent by Mr. A. Podmore, these reflections would be even more meagre than they are.

ETON v. HARROW.

Played at Lord's, Friday, Saturday, July 8, 9.-It was in 1908 that Harrow last beat Eton at Lord's, and since the drawn game of the following year defeat has always been their portion. Their friends hoped last summer that they would manage to break the spell, and their general form at home was so good as to suggest that this might not be beyond their power. As things turned out, however, the atmosphere of Lord's and the recollection of many disasters proved too much for them. They practically lost the match when on batting first they were out in a little over an hour and a half for a wretched score of 64. It was urged in excuse for their deplorable failure that the wicket had been too recently watered, but this was indignantly denied by the groundkeeper. One must therefore attribute the collapse to nervousness, and to the demoralising effect of the pace at which Allen bowled at the start of the innings. In the later stages of the game Harrow proved that their batting had not been over-rated, but nothing could make up for the lamentable beginning. Eton, by scoring 238, secured a very substantial lead on the first innings, but the general form fell below the pre-war standard of the school. Aird, who had played so finely against Winchester, failed, and the honours fell to Lawrie, a free batsman who had the asset of supreme confidence. Seven wickets were down for 135, but Allen and Sheldon added 52 runs together in thirty-five minutes. At the end of the afternoon Harrow scored 107 for two wickets, but well as they played they owed something to dropped catches.

On the Saturday morning Harrow's batting up to a point was seen at its best, and when 250 went up with only five men out a keen finish seemed quite probable. However, the innings was all over for 295. Crawley played a beautiful innings, hitting on the off-side with real brilliancy. He was at the wickets about two hours and a half for his 103, among his figures being fifteen 4's, most of them powerful strokes in front of cover point. His only mistake, so far as could be seen, was a chance at mid-off, just before the drawing of stumps on Friday, when he had made 27. Bagnall, who helped Crawley to put on 60 for the fourth wicket, played finely in face of great disadvantages. He was suffering from a bad hand and from a touch of sunstroke. Eton required only 122 to wim—a very light task on such a pitch—but there were thrills of excitement when the first and second wickets fell at 25 and the third at 27. Lawrie and Cox, however, were in no way perturbed, and proceeded to hit off the runs with consummate ease. The match was won in less than an hour and a half from the start of Eton's innings. Lawrie followed up his previous success with another fine display, hitting ten 4's in his 67 not out. Enthoven was obviously very tired, and Harrow's change bowlers had no power to check the run-getting.

Ninety-two matches have been played, of which Eton have won thirty-nine, Harrow thirty-five, and eighteen have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857 which has been rejected.

The one-day matches between the two schools during the War were not counted as belonging to the regular series.
