# PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1930.

Once again I have to thank many friends and correspondents without whose kindly assistance these notes could not have been written. Mention of several schools is prohibited by want of space, and the same consideration makes it impossible for the accounts sent from some schools to be published in full. The season was notable rather for the excellence of the all-round cricket and more especially of the fielding, than for any outstanding individual performances such as had marked the previous year. Atkinson-Clark, who will captain Eton this year, was not seen at his best in the earlier part of the season owing to a badly cut hand, but at Lord's he fully justified all that had been said about him, his footwork, timing and execution stamping him as a batsman of the highest promise. Comber, the Marlborough captain, who again appeared for the Schools against the Army, still further enhanced his reputation as the best wicket-keeper, equally brilliant on either side of the wicket, in a year in which good stumpers abounded. He will have still further opportunities of showing his capabilities at Cambridge. No outstanding bowler effective on any kind of wicket, like J. H. Nevinson of the previous year and R. D. F. Bland in 1928, came to light but Pelham, medium pace, faster off the pitch than through the air, with a good flight and excellent length, accomplished a wonderful performance at Lord's and stood, possibly, in a class by himself.

There were, however, more all-rounders of promise than usual, among them being J. H. Human (Repton), Surfleet (U.C.S.), Evans (Haileybury), Welch (Harrow), P. M. Nelson (Marlborough), R. P. Nelson (St. George's, Harpenden), Malcolm (Eastbourne) and Covington (Harrow). Tonbridge had, in Davies, a fine forcing bat, very strong on the leg side, inclined to over-confidence in his first few overs, and a useful change bowler. Among the wicket-keepers, Lloyd (Cheltenham) McLean (St. Paul's), Wolff (Haileybury) and Maxwell (Brighton) showed excellent form. Maxwell is also a brilliant but careless bat.

Bowling was best represented by Robinson (Rugby) who had considerable pace, kept a good length and turned occasionally from the off; Grimshaw (King William's I.O.M.), a left hander, Napper (Dover), an in-swinger, Ruffer (Cheltenham), leg breaks, and Cameron (Taunton), who frequently beat both batsman and wicket-keeper with his googlies.

For the second year in succession a Scottish schoolboy scored over 1,000 runs, K. W. Marshall, of Edinburgh Academy, recording this unusual performance, his highest innings being 161 (not out) against Fettes. The previous season J. F. Jones, of Fettes, who played in the Scottish XI which met the Australians in Edinburgh last August, accomplished a similar feat.

The weather was most disappointing for the annual fortnight at Lord's, rain falling more or less heavily on eleven of the twelve days; and only three of the six matches, in consequence, were brought to a definite conclusion. Little over two and a half hours' play was possible in the representative match—The Army v. The Public Schools. In these circumstances form was upset and many of the boys had no chance of showing what they could do.

"Lord's v. The Rest," the most important school match of the year, was completely spoilt by the rain, which seems to make a dead set at this annual fortnight at Lord's. Twenty-two of the most promising young players of the year, many of them not previously seen at headquarters, had been selected. Only five hours play took place in the two days, but there was one matter for congratulation, Mermagen, whose fielding had been a feature on the first day and who, in bringing off a truly remarkable catch on the edge of the square leg boundary, jumped to take the ball high up with the left hand, being selected for the representative match against the Army.

The Lord's Schools, after losing six wickets for 100, recovered well to make 253 and got rid of one of the Rest for five before the close of play. Surfleet, who turned the ball quickly from the off, took two wickets early but Evans, the left hander, stopped the rot and Davies played bright cricket. Six wickets were down for 100, but then the two left handers, Lawrence and B. O. Allen, treated Cornu very harshly, each hitting him for two sixes over the square leg boundary, which was very close to the wicket. This short boundary gave the Malvern spin bowler no chance; he should have been on at the other end. Robinson, when shaping very well, was badly run out, but Comber hit with great power. Only an hour and three quarters' play was possible the next day, in the course of which 76 runs were added for the loss of Human's wicket. The bowlers found it almost impossible to obtain a foothold, and Robinson on one occasion fell full length on the ground. Human hit with delightful freedom, his 50 out of 69 from the bat being the best innings of the match.

Little fault could be found with the selection of the team against the Army in which Robinson would doubtless have found a place had the conditions been suitable to his bowling. Bad weather permitted little more than half-an-hour's play on the opening day, rather less than on the corresponding day in the previous

year. This time, however, the Army went in on a not too easy wicket and made a poor start, Comber bringing off two catches at the wicket, and Human catching Major E. S. B. Williams in the slips off a ball from Pelham which got up straight and touched the thumb of his right glove. The fieldsman, himself, was not aware it was a catch when he held the ball. The wicket was very dead the next morning and gave no assistance to the bowlers, who found it difficult to get a foothold. Under such conditions no one had a real chance of distinguishing himself, but Comber who effected three catches behind the wicket had most satisfaction from the match. When rain finally stopped the game the Army had lost seven wickets for 166.

The selection Committee of the M.C.C. for the representative matches at Lord's, spared no pains to discover promising talent, and players from many of the lesser known Schools appeared for the Young Amateurs v. Young Professionals, more than one of whom made good. The Amateurs were strongly represented and won very easily against their less experienced opponents, the features of the match being a fine innings by Mason, the Bradfield Captain, the left hand bowling of Grimshaw of King William's (Isle of Man) and the all-round play of the left hander, Nelson, captain of Harpenden.

The physique of some of the boys in the under 16 match was remarkable, notably that of Bartlett, eligible to captain Dulwich for the next three years, and of Judge, who should prove an asset to St. Paul's next season. Both these matches ended early on the second day and a scratch game was arranged, each side batting for an hour and a half. Barnby, of Sedbergh, one of the smallest boys in the Colts match, played a chanceless second innings of 82 (not out), which did not prevent the Lord's XI from being beaten in an innings by Mr. Carleton-Tufnell's XI just before 3 o'clock on the second day. The scratch game started at a quarter past three and Barnby again going in completed a hundred in the 90 minutes, thus batting for four hours with a break for lunch, a wonderful feat for a boy not yet 16. Bartlett, a powerful left hander, who had scored 107 for the winning side on the previous day, hit four 4's and two 6's, in one over, in an endeavour to beat the previous score in the allotted time. Another very promising cricketer, who made his first appearance at Lord's in this match, was Ward of Hampton G.S. who took six wickets for 37 runs. A leg break bowler, a batsman with good defence and driving power and a clever slip field, he should do well.

The Young Amateurs of Surrey were favoured with delightful weather for their annual week at the Oval, some very good cricket being seen. The features of the opening match against Kent which the visitors won by 186 runs, were a very fine innings of 138 by Davies,

of Tonbridge, who reached his hundred before lunch on the first day; the batting of Torrens (Harrow) and the bowling of Grimshaw (King William's) and of Napper (Dover). Some steady batting by Jarchow (Brighton, 147) and Hadingham (St. Paul's), followed by a brilliant partnership between the two left handers, Bartlett (Dulwich) and Walker (K.C.S. Wimbledon), who put on 122 runs in forty-five minutes, enabled the home side to win the second match of the week against Essex by eight wickets. Thwaites (Canford) (right hand medium) and Sales (Dulwich) (leg breaks), both showed promise, and Hunt (Marlborough) played two very good innings for the losers.

Nearly 900 runs were scored on the last two days of the week, when Sussex, who had all the worst of the game, until the last three quarters of an hour on Saturday evening, not only saved themselves from defeat, but effected an honourable draw. They had followed on 161 runs in arrear, with four-hours to play, and at a quarter to six, with two wickets in hand, they were only 41 runs on, but Davis (Eastbourne), who had played an impressive first innings of 33 not out, the highest score on his side, was then joined by Page (Eton), and the score carried to 299. With no chance of a definite decision stumps were pulled up at 6.30—half an hour before the agreed upon time—the pair having added 97 runs. Throughout the week Maxwell (Brighton) kept wicket brilliantly for Surrey.

The Eton and Harrow match proved disappointing. There was much good cricket but the game left the impression that it should have been much better. The fielding, if at times brilliant, was unequal and though the extras assumed alarming proportions the wicket keepers were in no way to blame. Harrow won the toss for the first time for years, and made a disastrous start, three wickets being downfor 27. Lawrence and Welch looked like pulling the game round but it was left to Stow, one of the new "flannels," to play the innings of the side. The chief obstacle to Harrow's success was Pelham, who, swinging from the off, keeping a beautiful length, and varying pace and flight, hardly bowled a loose ball. He came out with the fine figures of seven wickets for 21 runs. Stow alone faced him with confidence and, last man out, played a brave innings of 64.

Eton had 89 up before a wicket fell but then Covington, a slow left hander, who flighted the ball cleverly, took three wickets quickly.

The next morning Covington, who might have been utilised more on the first day, opened the bowling, and with only six runs added, Atkinson-Clark was missed off him at deep extra cover-This had a disheartening effect on a young bowler and Atkinson. Clark hitting him for four consecutive boundaries proceeded to give Eton a lead. In fifty-five minutes 103 runs were put on for the remaining four wickets, of which Clark claimed 77, his brilliant 135,

which included twenty 4's, occupying only two hours and twenty-five minutes. This innings was reminiscent, in more ways than one, of Hale's century of the previous year.

With the exception of a sound display by Covington, and a plucky stand by Yarrow, who again helped to add over 20 for the last wicket, there is little to say about Harrow's second innings and Eton thoroughly deserved their eight wickets' victory.

Pelham's bowling—he took eleven wickets for 44 runs—and Atkinson-Clark's batting dwarfed everything else in the match, but Welch did splendid service for Harrow all through and Covington may well develop into the match winner for whom Harrow have been

waiting so long.

A definite result was obtained in the Winchester and Eton match for the first time since 1924, Eton, never relaxing their grip on the game and after gaining a lead of 122 runs in the first innings, winning by seven wickets soon after half-past five on the second day. Thanks to a fine innings of 101 by Allen, which occupied him two hours and a half and a forcing 51 (not out) by Baerlein, the wicket-keeper, when the tide seemed to have rolled in Winchester's favour, the visitors, on a beautiful wicket which gave the bowlers no assistance, put together the useful total of 324. Page and Hanbury bowling at a considerable pace, Winchester made a deplorable start, Davies-Scourfield, Priestley and Winlaw, the three soundest bats on the side, being out for four runs. Townsend and Wright stopped the rot, and Tindall played a brave innings, but the follow-on could not be saved, and an equally tragic beginning marked the second innings, Page dismissing Davies-Scourfield, Winlaw and Townsend with only three runs scored. The cards were stacked too heavily against the home side but Priestley and Wright made a great stand adding 91 for the fourth wicket and Tindall, backed up by Young, scored 68 not out, a really fine performance.

The batting in the Clifton and Tonbridge match, except for the two partnerships between Kindersley and Northen for Clifton and Musson and Davies for Tonbridge, was disappointing. The wicket looked easy, and except for one or two overs of Davies, and some promising bowling by Wilshin for Clifton, the attack did not appear deadly. Thanks to the first mentioned pair, the Clifton total reached 266 but more than one batsman got himself out in trying to force the pace. Before rain finally stopped play at six o'clock, Tonbridge had replied with 125 for the loss of two wickets, Davies after a rather shaky start playing a delightful innings of 52. Thus there was nothing in it, but next morning the last eight Tonbridge wickets fell for 47 and Clifton held the useful lead of 94 runs. Clifton went in to get runs quickly but with 22 up for the loss of one wicket rain put an end to the game. Clifton had, as a side, batted so much below their form in the first innings that it was especially disappointing not to see them bat again. They certainly looked as if they might have won the match.

Very different conditions favoured the Rugby and Marlborough match in which bowlers until the end of the second day had matters all their own way. Marlborough won by nine wickets. Rugby were all out in an hour and ten minutes for 98, Comber changing his varied bowling with great judgment and bringing off two excellent catches at the wicket. Going in first, Foster alone played confidently. Seventh out, he stayed for over an hour and a half to score 32 out of 63. Marlborough had made use of only four bowlers, but Robinson found three all that was necessary to dismiss the Marlburians for 10 runs less. Bowling above fast medium and turning the ball occasionally from the off, Robinson himself came out with the fine analysis of eight wickets (six cleaned bowled) for 28 runs. In a strong batting side only Mole, Anderson and Crimp reached double figures. Robinson played a fine second innings, but Marlborough, set to get 81 to win, knocked off the runs for the loss of Seamer's wicket.

The Cheltenham and Haileybury match, the last of the week, produced some of the best cricket, and a thrilling finish, reminiscent of the match in 1894, when Cheltenham won by one run. On the first day, thanks to the leg breaks of Ruffer, some brilliant wicketkeeping by Lloyd, and a delightful forcing innings of 101 by Higson, Cheltenham gained a lead of 115. Haileybury were all out for 124, and with 191 up for 3 wickets, Cheltenham seemed in an unassailable position. Then Evans put on McCall, a slow left hander, who had consistently been unable to get a length all through the term. He found it at once, and taking five wickets for 18, allowed Cheltenham to add only 48 runs for the last seven wickets. Evans altered his order, and took in with him, Rogerson, who had played confidently at No. 8 in the first innings. Any chance of a Haileybury victory seemed largely discounted when Evans left at 12, but before stumps were drawn Rogerson and Borner put on 43 without further loss.

The next morning the pair set about putting Haileybury in a safe position, Borner defending stubbornly while Rogerson forced the game. After 154 runs had been added and Haileybury held a lead of 51, Borner was well caught in the slips for an invaluable innings of 45. Rogerson, who had reached his hundred in two hours, one of the most memorable centuries ever played in the match, left soon afterwards and Ruffer, with the assistance of Lloyd, again came into his own, the last seven wickets going down for 104

runs.

Wanting 150 runs to win Cheltenham made light of the bowling, Brettell hit with power and with seven wickets in hand and only 28 runs required, victory seemed assured. But McCall, who had bowled without success from the Nursery end, proved deadly for the second time in the match. Only 15 more runs were added, Haileybury gaining a sensational victory by 12 runs. McCall took five wickets for 24. Each school has now won eleven matches with twelve unfinished.

Eton had four of the 1929 side left-Hale, Atkinson-Clark, Allen and Baerlein, the wicket-keeper. All four were batsmen, and there seemed to be plenty of other run-getters available, but a lean year for bowling was anticipated. The side, however, which eventually played in the two School matches, came well above the average in bowling strength but rather disappointing in batting. Of the bowlers, only Pelham started the year with any reputation behind him. Medium paced, with excellent command of length, and an unusually vicious spin for one of his age, he looked a potential match winner from the first few games. The newcomers were Page, a very useful fast bowler, Baker, who bowled medium paced in-swingers with considerable life from the pitch, and Hanbury, a 15-year old, who, although somewhat lacking in length and direction, was probably the fastest Schoolboy bowler of the year. Hogg, also, took some wickets with innocuous-looking slow-medium swingers. The new batsmen were Hogg, Gosling and Sheepshanks—the first named a forcing player of great promise.

The defeat of both Winchester and Harrow in one season had not been accomplished since 1921. Allen, the most consistent batsman on the side, and Page, shared the chief honours at Winchester. the former with an excellent hundred and the latter with eight wickets for 81 in the two innings. At Lord's, Atkinson-Clark, who earlier had been prevented from producing his best form by a badly cut hand, played an innings of 135, which will live long in the memory of those who were fortunate enough to see it, and Pelham accomplished what was probably the finest bowling feat in this match since "Fowler's year." In forty-two overs on a good pitch he took eleven wickets, (seven clean bowled) for 44 runs, and sent down scarcely a single loose ball. Hale, although never able to find his true batting form, contrived, by his personal example, to raise the fielding to a high level. He managed his bowling excellently and his Captaincy was an important factor in the success of his side. Atkinson-Clark is captain for 1931 and he will have Allen, Hogg, Page, Baker, Hanbury, and the twelfth man, J. H. L. Aubrey-Fletcher and possibly two others.

Harrow were quite a fair side, though they had not the individual talent of the previous year. In Welch they possessed a greathearted player, and one of the best all-round cricketers of the year.

Covington, who will captain the side in 1931, is a left-hander of undoubted promise. The eleven were so well together that they might easily have overcome more talented opponents. The best performance was against Winchester who, beaten for the first time since 1922, lost a thrilling race against the clock by three wickets. The batting broke down against Charterhouse Ohlson and Yarrow gave Harrow a fighting chance by putting on 50 for the last wicket, but a fine innings of 100 by Middleton enabled Charterhouse to pass the score for the loss of five wickets. The match at Marlborough was a terrible disappointment. The first two home wickets fell quickly to fine catches by Welch, but Nelson played a great innings of 153, not out, and after losing five wickets for 19. Harrow were only saved from ignominy by some plucky batting by Welch and Torrens, who put on 76. Marlborough eventually won by 177 runs. On the whole the season was a disappointing one, as, on more than one occasion, notably against the Harrow Wanderers. M.C.C. and a strong Harlequins XI, the side had shown great promise in batting. It broke down against Quidnuncs and I.Z. There was variety in the bowling, but with the possible exception of Welch the attack contained no match winner. Lawrence started the term well but owing to illness fell away. Of the two left-handers, de las Casas kept a fine length and Covington flighted the ball well and should get many wickets this year. The ground fielding was a joy to watch, Lawrence himself setting a splendid example at cover, and Welch, Stow and Tawell being outstanding, but the catching did not come up to the same high standard. Covington succeeds Lawrence in the captaincy and de las Casas, Hackwood and Clive are also left.

Winchester's record of two wins against four losses and seven draws afforded no criterion of the season's play. Of the seven unfinished games five ended decidedly in their favour, and it was no disgrace to lose to a strong eleven of Oxford Authentics and the Butterflies. Yet the fact remains that Winchester did not win an inter-school match, and lost the two they most wanted to win. Against Marlborough and Charterhouse their batsmen were seen at their best, asserting their supremacy over the attack most decisively. There is a sad irony in the fact that Winchester's three crack batsmen should have made only 74 runs (of which 48 was Priestley's second innings against Eton) in the Eton and Harrow matches, when against Marlborough and Charterhouse they scored between them 554! Priestley and Scourfield put on 244 against Charterhouse, a record opening partnership for the School. Of the three most promising batsmen Scourfield was the most dangerous, and powerful, but always a little liable to give his wicket away; Priestley the straightest and most orthodox; Winlaw the most watchful and

consistent. Tindall batted most attractively in his upstanding style against Eton; Wright, true to a fine family tradition, played three most courageous innings in the two disastrous School matches, and Townsend, who should be good next year, made up for some falling off in his bowling by steady improvement as a bat. The bowling lacked real consistency, but Lee and Legard both have considerable possibilities. Winlaw, a first class mid-off, set a fine example in the field, and, with Lee, Legard, Townsend and White staying on, has a valuable nucleus for this year's XI.

Rugby, with a team which contained five old colours, had a rather disappointing season. Robinson made an excellent Captain, his fast right-hand bowling, with an occasional quick break-back from the off, being the backbone of the attack. Jackson, a useful medium paced bowler, whose best performance was seven wickets for 13 runs against B.T.H, has a somewhat similar action to Robinson. Gemmill, a slow left-hander, kept a good length, when he did not try to bowl too fast and Gordon, right-hand medium and a fine slip field, was a useful change. The batting proved inconsistent, but Robinson was very steady, Fehr and Leader played some excellent innings and Foster made a good opening batsman. Many of the side lacked experience, but Smith and Dawson, two young players, should both do well this year. Robinson set a brilliant example in fielding, which, on the whole, was good. With Jackson, Bedford, Smith, Dawson, Foster and Gordon again available, the side ought to fare better this year.

Marlborough were a really good side all round, their strength consisting in variety in every department, and it is not often that a School has four good bowlers at its command. The fielding was sound as usual, and three smart slips and a wicket-keeper above the average, combined to give the bowlers great confidence. Comber used his bowlers very skilfully. If the tail-end batsmen were not, on paper, as good as usual, the others fitted in well. There were fast scorers, slow scorers, players with one precious stroke, players with every stroke, and always somebody to rise to the occasion. In the Cheltenham match the side was not at its best, but a second innings partnership between Comber and Seamer at a critical period enabled Marlborough to draw, and Wellington were beaten in a low scoring game by 68 runs. When Marlborough were forced to play for a draw at Winchester, Comber's batting was an important feature in attaining this object. In the one day match against Harrow, Nelson followed up a very fine innings of 153 by taking five wickets for 15 runs, and, despite a plucky stand between Welch and Torrens, the visitors were beaten by 183 runs. In all three games Comber played a conspicuous part, and although he failed to make runs against Rugby, he brought off a wonderful catch in the first innings and a brilliant piece of stumping in the second, which had a direct result in a low scoring match which Marlborough won for the first time since 1923. Anderson, who opened the innings, was the soundest batsman on the side, and after a slow start Nelson found his true form. Crimp had very good strokes on the off side and used his wrists well, while Seamer developed into a useful partner for Anderson. Macdonald and Mole, both fast medium, with Nelson, medium-right, bore the brunt of the bowling, with occasional relief from McNamara (left). Nelson will next season captain the side, with Seamer, McNamara, Mole and Crimp also available.

Cheltenham in 1930 did well, and with a little more determination might have had a really good year. Malvern and Radley were both defeated and Cheltenham had the best of a drawn game at Marlborough, where the bowlers failed to grasp the opportunity, the last two Marlburians being together when stumps were drawn and 83 runs required to tie. At Lord's, where Haileybury snatched a narrow victory, it was the batsmen who failed to rise to the occasion. There were four good bowlers, Ruffer's leg breaks being effective. He kept his head, and his length, when hit. Higson, the captain, bowled two styles, medium pace swinging from the off and fastish swinging away. Miller-Logan kept a length and turned the ball from the off, and on a wicket with any life in it Bazley made the ball rise over the top of the stumps at a fine pace. The batting was good at times, but neither Morton nor Meikle, undoubtedly excellent cricketers, realised expectations. Brettell showed great improvement in his attack, without weakening his defence, and O'Dwyer, who should be good this year, hit the ball hard. Higson displayed his best form at Lord's: his century was a delight to those who like to see good hitting. Lloyd kept wicket well, besides proving to be a difficult wicket to get. Higson set his team a good example in the field. It is expected that six of the side will be available this year.

Haileybury were seen at their worst at Uppingham, after which the team was reconstructed, drew with Wellington, and pulled a great game out of the fire against Cheltenham at Lord's. Some notably good batting performances were accomplished against Incogniti (after a very bad start), the Free Foresters and a weak team of the O.H's. In this latter game the School scored 412 in their first innings and, declaring at 149 for five, set the Old Boys 175 to win in seventy-five minutes, which, thanks to some fine hitting by B. G. Wennick, was accomplished with two minutes to spare. In all, four matches were won (including Cheltenham), six lost including Uppingham), and four drawn. In Evans, Haileybury possessed not only a brilliant but a very shrewd captain, with great knowledge of the game. He is a class left-hand bat with a variety of strokes, but his lack of inches may make it difficult for him

to be a quick scorer. So much depended on him that he had to use the utmost caution. His leg break and googly bowling did not develop to the extent expected as he was slow off the pitch. A safe catch and good field, he should do well in better class cricket. Bullmore was pretty when he came off, but a bad starter—he was bowled by exceptionally good balls in each innings against Uppingham. Allen, only 16, is most promising; he hits the ballhard and is a capable right hand medium pace bowler. McGaw (except at Lord's, where he used an off break), was only a medium left-hand bowler and was unreliable in his length. Unwin, a fast medium right hand bowler and bat, should gain prominence this year, as should Rogerson, great hearted but unorthodox and therefore not very sound. Borner, who played a great innings at Lord's, was a plucky but ungraceful bat. Wolff kept wicket very well and was a safe catch, but lacked confidence in batting. Partington, a useful bowler, who could turn the ball, was an entirely defensive batsman. Wolff, in his fifth year in the eleven, succeeds Evans in the captaincy and will have the assistance of Unwin, Allen and Rogerson.

The Clifton side was a really good one, with a sound opening pair and plenty of forcing batsmen, a variety of bowling, backed up by safe fieldsmen among whom Tovey, for the third year, was nearly always brilliant and brought off some amazing catches at extra cover. It was most unfortunate that the Cheltenham match could not be played, but Rugby were beaten by eight wickets, and Clifton stood in a strong position when rain stopped play in the Tonbridge match at Lord's. An outstanding example of fast scoring was given when, facing a total of 256 by a good eleven of the Foresters, Clifton knocked off the runs for the loss of two wickets in exactly two hours. Tovey (50), Keun (85) and Darlington (107 not out), each batted splendidly. Allen (left-hand), Nuttall the captain, Darlington, who has beautiful wrists, Tovey, who showed such promise two years before, and the two all-rounders, Keun and Kindersley, were the mainstays of the batting. Harrison, who may yet become the first-rate bowler he promised to be, when he can be sure of his length, Wilshire (fast medium), who came into the side late, Keun (slow medium) and Kindersley (slow) bore the brunt of the bowling; but there was always room for a left-hander. Nuttall, in his fourth year, is again captain, and the five other old colours include Tovey, also in his fourth, and Harrison and Kindersley, in their third year.

Judging from the number of matches won, Tonbridge had a poor season, but in view of the lack of experience of most of the members of the eleven one perhaps not without promise. The outstanding player was the captain, Davies, already a class batsman though, at present, rather too careless to be really brilliant. Apart from his batting he improved enormously in his fielding and made several wonderful

catches and took some valuable wickets. Half-way through the season the eleven were deprived, through illness, of the services of G. W. Orr, who seemed likely to become the match-winning bowler of the side, and this was a severe handicap. Haines was the most promising of the new comers; in his somewhat ungainly style he made runs consistently and was second only to Davies in fielding and catching. Leach succeeds Davies in the captaincy, and should be a very good number one if he can develop a less cramped style, as he has a fine off drive. He will have the assistance of Orr, Crouch, Haines, Davies and Albertini.

Repton had a weaker side than usual. Only two wins were recorded—the lowest number for ten years—but they were both, fortunately, in inter-school games. With the exception of the old colours, none of the batsmen showed much cricket-sense, or determination, though several of them had plenty of strokes. For runs the side depended on J. H. Human and J. F. Mendl, and, to their credit, these two seldom failed. There was plenty of bowling, but none of it deadly, Auster, Sutcliffe, both fast, and K. F. Mendl, medium, bore the brunt, but Westray did not fulfil his early promise, and Human was too busy in other departments to achieve much success. The season was a great personal triumph for Human, and he is to be congratulated on the finest individual record, at Repton, for many years. The burden of captaincy seemed to encourage rather than cramp him, and his total runs, including three centuries and four fifties, were obtained by brilliant cricket. J. Mendl giving fine support, the victories of the eleven were due, mainly, to the courage and skill of these two. Human will captain the side again this year, and will have Sutcliffe, Auster, Middleton (the wicket-keeper), and McBrayne to help him.

Malvern's actual results-two matches won, six lost, and one drawn-appear somewhat disappointing. The batting was not so sound as was expected, but the bowling, on the other hand, was above the average. Three matches which could easily have been drawn were lost; the Old Malvernians winning after a declaration, and Wolverhampton and Christ Church, when the School endeavoured to force a win. The best performances were against Repton and the Free Foresters, both beaten in an innings, Cornu taking thirteen and twelve wickets respectively. Moss, the captain, proved a tower of strength, and in almost every match made runs at critical periods, scoring two centuries and 95 against Repton. Also he set an excellent example in the field. Lister hardly revealed his true form with either bat or ball. Bird kept wicket very well, and, at times, brilliantly. Cornu, a slow spin bowler, with a peculiar run up to the wicket, had a remarkable season taking sixty-five wickets for just over 12 runs apiece. He had no chance at Lord's, when playing for the Rest,

being put on against two left hand hitters, with short leg boundary. Crabtree will captain the side, with Cornu, Smith, and Peake also left.

Westminster suffered from having a young and inexperienced side, only two of last season's eleven being available. The batting lacked confidence, but the performance of the captain, Evetts, who scored 532 in fourteen innings, was a fine one. In the circumstances the bowling had little chance of becoming deadly, but Milne, at times, sent down a useful leg break, and Johnson, a young left-hander with a nice action, who had shown promise the previous year, ought to do well if the catches are held. The fielding was generally sound, the captain setting a good example. Apart from the batting of Evetts, the best feature of the season was the wicket-keeping of Matthews. He will captain the side this year.

Charterhouse took some time to settle down, owing probably to the varying weather, and then developed into a strong side. Winchester, thanks to Davies-Scourfield and Priestlev, had the better of a drawn game, and there was nothing in it when stumps were drawn at Wellington, but the Harrow score was passed with five wickets in hand, and after Charterhouse at Vincent Square had declared at 333 for five wickets, Davidson took five for 43, and dismissed Westminster for 88. In these last two matches Middleton, the captain, a fine forcing batsman, was seen at his best in scores of 100 and 202 (not out). Through a misapprehension he did not accept the invitation of the M.C.C. to play for the Rest against Lord's Schools. Davidson, leg breaks, Tetley, fast medium, and Greening, an off spinner, were the most successful bowlers and Powell was sound behind the wicket. The eleven should be very strong this year, with Wreford-Brown as captain, and the following of last year's XI, Powell, Greening, Hollebone, Tetley, Davidson and Dyson,

Wellington College enjoyed a successful season and needed only a fast bowler to make them a formidable side. The batting was consistent, with James (captain), Freeland and Todd, chief rungetters. James going in first, played several fine forcing innings, notably 103 not out, against the Old Wellingtonians, and 115 against Haileybury. Freeland and Todd were, probably, the best batsmen on the side, Freeland, who watches the ball closely, playing particularly well for 84 against the Foresters, and Todd, a very stylish batsman, with fine strokes on the off, following up an attractive not out 60 against Haileybury, with 115 against Charterhouse. Freeland, who bore the brunt of the bowling, took six for 51 v. R.A.S.C. and five for 28 v. Charterhouse. He uses his head and swings and breaks the ball a little either way. Cousens, who has an extraordinary swerve, Prichard, a slow bowler, with a pronounced off break and Munro, a slow left-hander, who came into the side late, Sykes and Binny also

bowled with success at times. The ground fielding was excellent. In the School matches, the batting failed against Marlborough who won by 68 runs, Westminster were beaten easily, and the Hailey bury match, which resulted in a draw, was notable for an extraordinary action on the part of the Wellington captain, who declared on the second day, when 23 runs ahead with four wickets in hand, two batsmen well set, and scoring at something like 140 runs an hour. Laing, Hope and Munro are left from the side for this year.

Shrewsbury, if improving, had a moderate season in 1930, and were unlucky to be able to play only two of their four inter-school matches. They lost to Repton rather early in the season, having to travel there and back on the same day, owing to illness which prevented Repton coming to Shrewsbury, and beat Malvern, who were dismissed for 55. In this game Barlow took four wickets for 14, and Pratt five for 12. Other notable performances were a win over a moderate Free Foresters XI, and the best of a draw against a strong Old Salopian team. Snow, the captain, was the best batsman, a lefthander with good strokes on the on side and behind cover, and Mill a steady opening batsman played soundly. The bowling and fielding were better than the batting, Barlow, medium right hand, being well supported by Pratt, medium fast and Armistead, medium left. Barlow swings the ball from leg and can vary it with a break from the off. These three bowlers will be available this season, in addition to Sullivan, a promising batsman, with a good off drive, Hughes, Butterworth and Llewellyn, Barlow succeeds Snow in the captaincy.

Uppingham went through the season without drawing a match, three being won, five lost and a tie played with B.N.C. Of the School matches Haileybury were beaten by 193 runs, and defeats experienced at Rugby and Repton. The Shrewsbury match had to be cancelled. Too much depended on the batting of Walker. After him, there is a drop of nearly twenty-three points in the averages. Pattrick did not run into form in the early part of the term, but he has the makings of a really good bat. The bowling was definitely good, Parkinson being the most dependable, and Ibbotson, on occasions, effective with the new ball. The fielding improved considerably during the term, Gillespie always setting a sound example at cover. Lupton was untiring in any position and Titley proved a very capable wicket-keeper. Walker is captain this year and Parkinson, Ibbotson, Tulloch, Milman and Gillespie are likely to be available.

Moderate for the most part the Sherborne XI just missed being very good. The results of the school matches were level draws with Radley and Tonbridge, a draw caused by rain with Blundell's, adraw in Sherborne's favour with Downside, and an innings victory over Westminster. Mermagen, Brown and Carey were the mainstay

of the batting, Mermagen having the following record in these matches-166 and 32 v. Tonbridge, 156 v. Westminster, 82 v. Blundell's, 52 v. Downside and 31 and 5 v. Radley. Halliley started the season well and was making runs regularly, when he fell ill and did not play after the second week in June. The bowlers, Mermagen, fast medium, Lean, slow right, Snowden, medium, Evans, medium, and Morgan, slow left, proved useful, but were not adequately supported in the slips, Snowden, a little quicker off the pitch than the others being the principal sufferer. At Lord's, Mermagen at cover point gave a brilliant exhibition of fielding which gained him his place in the Public School XI. Morgan succeeds Mermagen in the captaincy, and Carey, Lean, Snowden, Evans and Fox are available.

Rossall had a stronger side than those in the two preceding seasons. It was unfortunate, therefore, that both Shrewsbury and Stonyhurst had to scratch. Of eleven matches started one was won, three lost, and seven unfinished. The larger stumps did not achieve their object to any great extent, due partly to the absence of sticky wickets, and the excellence of the groundman's work. Lowe stood out as the batsman of the side, and Lavery, the captain, was seen at his best in two good scores against the Old Rossallians. Of the remainder Coatsworth, Bury and Strachan, showed that they were capable of making runs when needed. Jones, a slow left hander, varied his pace well, and Riley generally kept an accurate length, but did not bowl at the wicket enough. Royal-Dawson showed the value of his slow leg breaks, and should be useful this year. The fielding was a delight to watch. Lavery set an excellent example at cover point, and Jones, at backward point, or in the long field, often achieved the seemingly impossible. Strachan has been elected captain, and will have Lowe, Riley, Coatsworth and Royal-Dawson to support him.

Radley had an interesting season but were handicapped by illness and had to play six matches without their captain, Van der Gucht, who kept wicket for the Rest against the Lord's Schools. In the School matches, Bradfield were beaten by 43 runs, Cheltenham won by 64, and Stowe by 111, and the Westminster match was saved by an heroic ninth wicket stand between Monks and Bruton, who stayed together for thirty-five minutes. The drawn game with Sherborne was the best of them all, Sherborne requiring 17 runs to win with two wickets to fall when stumps were drawn. Radley, who had a lead of 16 on the first innings, set them 150 to win in an hour and a half. The M.C.C. won in the last over after the School had declared. R.S. Machin's XI won by a wicket, after wanting 30 runs when the ninth fell, and Kershaw made the winning hit against the Foresters off the last ball of the match. Van der Gucht started the season well, until the injury to his knee, and Vestey invariably made runs-he has a good eye and no nerves. Dinwiddy, this year's captain, is a

much improved all round player, and may become a useful slow bowler. Kitching did not improve to the extent anticipated and Williams, who has a nice style, never gave himself a chance to settle down. Kershaw, right hand medium, bore the brunt of the bowling and Monks, a slow off spinner, kept a good length. Dinwiddy will have the assistance of Kershaw, Kitching, Williams, Guy, Monks and Worsley.

Bradfield—a useful side—won four and lost four of thirteen matches. Wellington and Stowe were dismissed cheaply and after Tucker had hit finely for 40 in each case, Mason (against Wellington) and Bathurst (against Stowe), made victory certain by bowling well. Other noteworthy performances were a score of 400 against Bradfield Waifs, and the dismissal of a strong M.C.C. side for 114. Mason, a most enthusiastic captain, was the pick of a good fielding side and by far the best batsman. He showed his ability at Lord's, by scoring 140 against the Young Professionals. The batting generally, however, proved unreliable. The bowling, on the other hand, was varied and tolerably steady. Wiener, slow left hand and Young (fast medium), Tarry (medium) and Nicholls (leg breaks), were all good school bowlers. Bathurst, who batted very well in the latter part of the season, will captain the eleven and W. J. Marshall (absent through injury last summer), Collis and Evans will also be available.

Oundle enjoyed a satisfactory cricket record, eight matches out of twelve being won, one lost, and three drawn. Among other excellent performances were a one wicket victory, against time, over the M.C.C., and another by three wickets over Hunts Gentlemen, who had declared at 296 for nine wickets. Leys were beaten by 150 runs after the School had declared at 254 for seven, and Bedford had lost eight wickets for 170 against 260 for five (declared) when time saved them. Dulwich had much the best of a drawn game, Oundle escaping defeat by the sturdy defence of the last pair, Cullen and Powell, who kept up their ends for half an hour. The only reverse was at the hands of a strong Crusaders XI. Beresford and Geen, the latter only sixteen, made a first rate opening pair, their best feat being against the Leicestershire Gentlemen, when they each scored a century. These two and Garrett averaged over 50 per innings. The bowling was strong, with Knox, Maw and Fyfe, fast medium, Allen, leg breaks, and Powell and Morton, as changes. Johnson kept wicket well, and the fielding was keen. Maw, who swings both ways, used his height (6ft. 2ins.), and kept a length.

Only two old colours—Chrestien and Spens—being left, Lancing had entirely to rebuild their Eleven. In these circumstances, the results were up to expectation. They beat Dulwich by 138 runs, McLagan taking seven wickets for 20 runs, lost to Tonbridge after leading by 63 on the first innings, and drew with Brighton,

Cranleigh, Eastbourne and Christ's Hospital. Spens and Chrestien with the two newcomers, Pearse and McLagan, provided the main batting strength, and the two last named, with Barker, were the most successful bowlers. McLagan played the highest innings of the season, 88 v. Eastbourne and Pearse headed the score against Dulwich with 53. Pearse succeeds Chrestien in the captaincy, and will have the assistance of McLagan, Barker and Quill.

St. Paul's hardly came up to expectations and won only two of their School matches. Dulwich and Stowe were defeated, time saved Leys, and Bedford and Felsted won narrowly by 10 and 7 runs respectively. Five centuries were credited to the school, Hadingham scoring four and Richards, the captain, one, and these two were well backed up by Shneerson and Maclean, but the rest of the batting with the exception of that of Killick, was rather spasmodic. Richards medium pace and Shneerson, who varied his deliveries considerably, opened the bowling with Sturton, left hand, as change and these three accounted for practically all the wickets during the season. Only on three occasions were more than 200 runs scored against the School. The fielding was good throughout the season. The side should be strong this year with Richards again captain and Hadingham, Shneerson, Layton and Readhead left.

Dulwich had a good season, all the more pleasing since the eleven were young and inexperienced. Frankford's captaincy was exceptionally sound. His fielding, always first class, proved a continual inspiration to the rest of the team, and his judgment in handling his bowling excellent. Bartlett, Griffith and Bennett were all under sixteen; Dickson, Sales and Watt were Colts of the season before. Three of the School matches-Lancing, St. Paul's and Mill Hill-were lost in most disappointing fashion, but the other three included two fine wins over Bedford and Brighton, and an exciting game against Oundle when Dulwich, who were well on top, just failed to get the last wicket of their opponents. There were many exciting finishes and some courageous recoveries. Frankford greatly improved his batting and excelled in the square cut and the hook. Reynolds, his first wicket partner, developing beautiful off drives and well timed cuts, became a thoroughly reliable player. His best scores were 117 (not out) v. Brighton, 110 v. Bedford and 106 v. M.C.C. Bartlett, a forcing left hander, is essentially a hitter and drives with great power. Both at Lord's, where he scored a very fine century in the Colts match, and at the Oval, in the Young Surrey Amateur matches, he made a great impression. Griffith, another Colt of possibilities, Bennett, in the responsible position of first wicket down, and Knowland were useful players. Staniforth kept up a good pace, and was well supported in the field, but Sales was the really dangerous bowler on the side. He maintained an admirable length

and spun the ball well from leg, but would be more effective with a slight increase in pace. Dickson showed promise behind the wicket. Bartlett succeeds to the captaincy and all the eleven are again available, with the exception of Frankford, Reynolds and Sellick.

Stowe had every reason to feel satisfied with the result of the season, seven matches being won, and five lost. Bennett and Kemp were a reliable opening pair and easily headed the batting averages, while de Havilland, a medium paced right hand bowler who played for the Rest against Lord's Schools, bore the brunt of the bowling and came out with very good figures. Bennett, who, it had been hoped, would have at least one more cricket term, is a stylish batsman. His 120 enabled the School to pass the M.C.C. score with seven wickets in hand, a fine innings of \$4\$ contributed largely to the defeat of Radley, while his 48 redeemed the innings against St. Paul's from disgrace. This year's captain is Kemp, with Lewis as Hon. Secretary, and Packe and Salamon, two all round players, also available.

Of twelve matches played Sedbergh won six, lost three, and drew three. This record—the side being young—may be considered satisfactory. Of the School matches a decisive victory in an innings was gained over Durham but the Stonyhurst match was spoilt by rain and abandoned, when Sedbergh needed 73 to win with eight wickets in hand. Walker, able to play either the forcing or the watchful game, was the only consistent batsman but Wilson, the captain, found better form and received useful support from Halliwell, Mitchell-Innes, Palmer and Leather. The most promising bowler was Dick, slow left hand, Greaves kept a fine length, Hyde and Mitchell-Innes, both fast medium, provided the swing bowling, and Walker, on his day, took wickets with a medium paced left arm ball, which went away. The old colours remaining are Walker, Dick, Mitchell-Innes, Halliwell, Palmer, Hyde and Leather.

Leys were an inconsistent side in 1930. Against strong opponents they, as a rule did well but failed badly once or twice against weaker sides. M.C.C. for the second year in succession, Bedford, Felsted and University College School were beaten, a drawn game was played with St. Paul's, and matches with Oundle and Mill Hill lost, the batting failing, in each case, after a good start. Whiston and Skinner the opening pair put up some fine performances but the rest of the batting, except for Plant's occasional brilliance, proved disappointing, although Bisseker made runs. Hocking was the mainstay of the bowling, Plant, Bisseker and Williams doing well on occasions. Plant set an inspiring example in fielding, Skinner in the slips and Whitaker, at cover, being outstanding, though some of the side fell from grace in the last match. Six old colours remain.

Mill Hill had a very fair season. They lost to Highgate but beat Leys, Dulwich and Aldenham, and had the best of drawn games with Merchant Taylors and Bedford Modern. They were young and inexperienced at first but towards the end of the term became a useful all round side. Aish, the captain, played some fine innings, including 76 (out of 113) against the Repton Pilgrims and 81 against Leys (after three wickets had fallen for 18 runs). Wotton and Wright showed great improvement and Morley, the other old colour, frequently assisted in big stands, notably with Aish, against Leys and with Wright against Dulwich. Of the new colours Dyer and Hurn a left hander, both very young, showed promise and Auty, also left handed, filled the vacancy behind the wicket with credit. The bowling was inconsistent but Wright, Heyman, who came into the team late, Aish, Wotton and Morley, all did well at times. Wright, the senior old colour, Morley, Dyer, Hurn, Auty, Saunders and Blackwell are available this year.

Blundell's record of one match won, five lost and five drawn, did not connote an unsatisfactory season. The fielding was throughout very good, particularly in stopping, picking up and returning. This was largely due to the example of the captain, Taylor, a keen all-round cricketer. The 200 mark was reached on six occasions, and the batting showed freedom, combined with solidity, down to the last man; but the bowling, with three of the best left from the previous year and two others to assist, proved disappointing. Of the games lost the first was a defeat by the Devon Dumplings, for the severity of which no excuse but that of bad cricket existed. The second loss against Taunton School was chiefly due to the bowling of Cameron, who has caused better sides to collapse. In the third defeat—against the Masters-age and experience triumphed for the third time in five years. The other two games were lost after the School had declared, an error of judgment possibly, but certainly an indication of the right spirit. Talbot, a brilliant field, forcing batsman and right hand medium paced bowler, who flights the ball well and makes it swing late, succeeds Taylor in the captaincy.

Durham with a weak and inexperienced side had a most disappointing season, beating St. Peter's and losing to Sedbergh and Ampleforth. Shawyer, a promising all-round cricketer, will captain the eleven for the second year in succession, and Potts, another all-rounder, Johnston and Thomas are again available.

The Brighton season was divided into two halves. In the first, when the team looked a poor one, four of the seven matches were lost, but of the last seven fixtures four were won and the School had the best of drawn games in the other three. The side was at its worst against Dulwich who won easily. Seven boys averaging over 20, the batting was strong, Jarchow and Maxwell, who each scored well

over 500 runs, being head and shoulders above the rest. At first the bowling was really bad, but it improved greatly towards the end of the term. Cooper, who could swing the new ball and kept a length, was the steadiest and most reliable. Jarchow captained the side with judgment and, brilliant himself, set a fine example in the field. Maxwell, a delightfully wristy batsman and one of the best wicket-keepers of the year, succeeds him in the captaincy, and there also remain Forster, Sayers, Foster, Green and Benham.

Bedjord, with only three old colours left from the previous year, were a young inexperienced side, who had a lean year, only one of the four School matches being won. The victory by 10 runs on St. Paul's ground was a good performance. The St. Paul's last wicket added nearly 40 runs, and Bedford won only three minutes from time. The batting depended too much on Wise who, despite his responsibility, played brilliantly. G. M. Moll was an inspiration in fielding—the best part of the cricket. Wise is the new captain and Traill Cocks, Edwards, Noble, Burrows and possibly Gilbert will be back.

Christ's Hospital did not have a very successful season, although they beat the M.C.C. for the first time since the War. Too much rested on the captain, Letts, a very promising all-round athlete, whose career at Oxford will be followed with interest. Heading the batting averages easily, he took twenty-five wickets with his fast medium deliveries, and set a fine example to the side in the field. He was backed up well in the batting by Dove, Kemp and Middleton, and Jones a fast swinger took thirty-two wickets for less than 12 runs apiece. Fleming, a slow left hand bowler, obtained thirty-five wickets and bowled over 200 overs. Kemp succeeds Letts, with Middleton as his vice-captain.

Dover were disappointing—the bowling was good, the fielding only average, and the batting uncertain. Low, who has gone up to Jesus College, Cambridge, had a wonderful season, being quite the best all-round player Dover has had for many years. Napper the captain, fast medium right hand, promises to be a very dangerous bowler. Collier's bowling also met with success. Fyers, who gained his colours in his first year, may become a really fast bowler. Slater is the new captain and he will have the assistance of Pearce and Fyers.

King's, Canterbury, had a very satisfactory year, the only School match lost being that against Eastbourne, while Highgate, Dover, St. Lawrence (Ramsgate), K.C.S. Wimbledon, St. Edmund's (Canterbury), and Sutton Valence were beaten, and the School had the best of a draw with Merchant Taylors. Most of the team made useful scores at times but, at the beginning of the term, no one could be relied upon except Paris, the captain, who seldom failed

to give the side a good start, and made 91 against Merchant Taylors and 104 against the Old Boys. The fielding was consistently smart and the bowling reliable. Haines a slow left hander could be really dangerous. Williams is the new captain, and Booty, Jeffery, Wetherall, Whittall, Lovatt, Robinson and Wheeler, are also left.

Epsom had a most successful season being unbeaten in their School matches, and losing only to a strong Incogniti side and the R.A.S.C., Aldershot. Their final record was won ten, drawn three, lost two. As may be judged from the fact that no side scored 200 runs against them, one of the chief features in their success was the opening pair of bowlers—the brothers G. S. and R. H. Bentley—who took sixty-five wickets for an average of 11.26 and sixty-one for 8.11 respectively. Both were right hand, the former fast medium and the latter slow medium with a deceptive flight and break. Hodges, the captain, who opened the batting with Heasman, a left hander, adapted himself to varying conditions with considerable effect and set a good standard in fielding which was generally maintained by the team throughout the term. These two with Hunton provided the main batting strength. Hunton was the best batsman on the side and deservedly headed the averages, scoring nearly 700 runs. He succeeds Hodges in the captaincy and James and Phillips, the latter a fast medium bowler, are available.

"A patchy season in which some good cricket was mixed up with some very poor stuff" sums up the doings of Felsted. There were some really promising bats in the team who should have made many runs but frequently, when well set, they threw their wickets away. Powell has the makings of a fine bat when he stiffens his defence; Pringle came on rapidly, finishing up as the most reliable scorer on the side. The bowling depended on Skelton and Carr-Archer. The former bowled really well but without luck and the latter was often uncertain in his length. C. E. W. Wyatt, a last year's colour, was unfortunately prevented by illness from playing at all and, consequently, the best all-round cricketer was lost to the eleven. Wyatt will probably captain this year and Goold, who improved as a wicket-keeper, Phelps, Carr-Archer and Lowe are remaining.

Highqute, left with only two old colours, took a long time to settle down, but a victory over Cranleigh gave them encouragement and during the second half of the term they were quite an average side, though the all-round cricket of W. H. Webster could not fail to be missed. Mill Hill were beaten and a drawn game played with Felsted. Whitaker, who easily topped the tables has at least another year in the eleven and may become a first rate batsman. Bemister, who is also young, showed great promise. Crane and

Hayles were both useful length slow left handers who will be missed.

Mackie, a very promising stumper, is the new captain and he will have
Bemister, Ellis, Whitaker and Herbert to assist him.

Leeds Grammar School, with eight matches won and only two lost, had every reason to feel satisfied with their performances. They benefited greatly from the lessons learnt in the opening match against Sutcliffe's XI, which consisted of the majority of the County players. Of the School matches, Hymers, Bootham, Wakefield G. S. Lancaster R.G.S. and Pocklington G. S. were beaten, and the two lost were against Manchester G. S. and Giggleswick, the latter after an excellent game between two well matched sides. The outstanding batsmen were Holderness, who averaged just under 50, Phillipson and Potter. Verity, who took forty-three wickets at nine runs apiece and Holderness (thirty-four for 7.50), bore the brunt of the bowling. Holderness (captain), Mawer, Milner, Potter and Phillipson are available for this year.

Merchant Taylors had the unique experience of playing tie matches with the Nomads and Dover College. It was a young inexperienced side and met with success only against R.M.C. 2nd XI, but two of the drawn games were in their favour. Writer, who scored a century against King's School, Canterbury, was the only consistent batsman, the others having flashes of brilliance, but never inspiring confidence. Huskisson and Wildash, the captain, both medium paced right handers, bore the brunt of the bowling, the latter opening the season well by taking seven of the Nomads wickets for 16, and enabling the School, who had been dismissed for 35, to tie the match. Huskisson was top scorer with 47 against Dover, and took six wickets for 52. He is the only colour left.

Winning ten, losing six and drawing three matches, the Oratory School had quite a good season. Of the four School matches Douai and the Imperial Service College were won, that against Epsom lost, and a delayed declaration on the part of the opposing captain saved the School from defeat by Beaumont at Lord's. The batting was inconsistent, but Crichton scored two centuries in succession, and Cameron hit well at times. Caruana, a medium paced right hander, was the most successful bowler, and Dobson showed promise as a left hander. Sykes, Caruana, Burns and Dobson are available this year.

With only two old colours left and very moderate material to work upon, Cranleigh anticipated and experienced a lean year. No matches were won, but the School had the best of a draw with Mill Hill, when Carmichael scored 112 (not out) and Hart 93, an even draw with Lancing, and lucky draws with Christ's Hospital and Old Cranleighans. With the luck against them they were decisively

beaten by Highgate. The batting depended too much on Goodall and Hart, and it must be said that these two rarely failed. The bowling was lacking in variety and sting, and there was no one who looked like taking good Club wickets. It was too early for the effects of the coaching of W. G. Quaife and G. R. Preece to be felt, but better things are hoped for this year, with some promising Colts coming on, and the following six old colours left—Jarvis, Glover, Carmichael, Watson, Greenwood and Vesev.

Downside had a moderate season defeating King's Bruton, and drawing with Blundell's and Sherborne. O'Connor was the outstanding batsman, scoring nearly 500 runs, including a fine innings of 93 against Blundell's, and 111 not out against Bruton. Radcliffe bore the brunt of the bowling, and was well supported by O'Connor and Innes. O'Connor will captain the side this year, and will have the assistance of Arnold, Marsden, Gibson and Innes.

Taunton, who play many of the neighbouring clubs, had a most successful season, winning eleven matches, losing three and drawing one, results largely due to the slow spin bowling of Cameron, who took ninety-one wickets for under seven runs apiece. In the two School matches, against Blundell's and Kingswood, he obtained seven wickets for 57 and nine for 23 respectively and was responsible for the defeat of the M.C.C. by 74 runs, his share being seven wickets for 47. He was indebted for many of his wickets to the vigilance behind the stumps of King, who later impressed favourably in the Colts match at Lord's. Row, who opened the innings, and scored 62 against the M.C.C., and Gerrard were the outstanding batsmen, Cameron, who went in late, also shaping well. Of last year's coloursmen, Watts, Cameron, Row and Robinson will probably be back, in addition to King.

University College School had a very successful time, winning thirteen matches, losing four and drawing one. This was mainly due, for the second year in succession, to the captain, Surfleet, one of the best all-round cricketers of the year. He held the side together wonderfully, and is the finest cricketer the School has had since G.T. S. Stevens, whose record for the greatest number of runs, and that of R. E. Crewe for the most wickets, he has broken. A very safe field, he combines a strong defence with a number of strokes, and is particularly strong on the on side. A medium pace bowler he turns the ball quickly from the off, varying this with an occasional googly. No other member of the XI stood out specially, except Whitteridge, a fast medium bowler, with a quick break back, and a steady batsman, who played some good innings. He will captain the side this year, and there also remain Wilson, Tiracchini and Polack.

The most satisfactory feature of the Wellingborough season was the fielding. The whole side were "on their toes," safe in

ground work and catching, and quick in their returns. A young team they took some little time to settle down, Holdaway, the captain, not running into form until the latter end of the season. The most successful and consistent bat was Adams, who combined a peculiar defence with strong forcing strokes all round the wicket, and Tait and Garne did well on occasions. The bowling was plentiful, but unreliable.

St. John's, Leatherhead, could be well satisfied, three of the School matches being won, two lost and two drawn. Farnfield, captain for the second time, proved the mainstay in batting and bowling, scoring 548 runs, with an average of 54, and taking forty-six wickets for under 12 runs apiece. Henderson was also a useful allrounder and Sharp and Lucas, of the batsmen, and Ormsby and Bryan, of the bowlers did well. Five old colours remain for this year, Sharp, who will be captain, Lucas, Bryan, Ormsby and Jennings.

The Eastbourne season may be termed successful in every sense of the word. Two of the three School matches were won, and the third drawn. Apart from this, there were several outstanding players, Malcolm, who played for the Public Schools v. The Army, was the best all-rounder; a bowler of great promise, and a really good bat. Davis, who goes up to Cambridge next October, has great possibilities as a fast bowler. Johnston headed the batting averages, his 87 (not out) v. Lancing being a perfect innings and saving the match. Duncanson captained the side admirably and bowled well on many occasions. He is again in charge, and has with him as old colours Hampton, Johnston, Evans and Mason. Duncanson played two very good innings for the Young Amateurs of Kent at the Oval in September.

St. Peter's, York, started by winning five matches in succession, but then struck a bad patch, and after appearing to have the game in their hands, lost to Durham by a wicket, and suffered a heavy defeat from Ampleforth. They made a good recovery against the M.C.C., and after putting together 230 against the bowling of Covell and Waghorn, dismissed the Club for 192. Draffan, who played for the Young Amateurs against the Young Professionals at Lord's, a forcing batsman, with a wide range of strokes, was consistent all through the season, and Avery, a slow left hand bowler, who took fifty-one wickets for under 15 runs apiece, bore the brunt of the attack. Allport, captain, set a fine example at cover point and Draffan kept wicket well. Allport will captain the side again and will have the assistance of Avery, whose fourth year it will be, Daintry and Scott.

Only two old colours were left at Whitgift at the beginning of last season, and the newcomers failed to come up to expectations,

though a good performance was put up against the M.C.C. Emanuel were beaten by one run, but defeats came from Bedford Modern, City of London, K.C.S. Wimbledon, Ardingly and Hurstpierpoint. Christophers is the only old colour left for this year.

Rydal had a successful year losing three matches, drawing six and winning ten. The batting was consistent all through and though no one reached a century Bibby, Ferguson, Wooller and Rouston all played several good innings, the side seldom being dismissed cheaply. Elson, slow left hand, with a deceptive flight, and Wooller, fast medium right hand, were a good pair of bowlers, each taking over fifty wickets for under 12 runs apiece. Bibby is the new captain, and will have the assistance of seven old colours, including Elson and Wooller.

Ampleforth of the eleven matches played won three, lost three and drew five. Owing to sickness the matches with Bootham and Stonyhurst could not be played, but the other two School matches, against Durham and St. Peter's, York, were both won. Neither of these sides scored 100 runs against them, and the necessary runs were obtained for the loss of either one or two wickets. Bean, who distinguished himself later at Lord's, Grieve and Waddilove were the chief scorers, but all the side showed themselves capable of making runs. The ground fielding was good, but the catching uncertain and the bowling moderate. This season there will be four colours in Bean, Grieve, Waddilove and Ainscough, and four others who have played regularly.

Bromsgrove played sixteen matches, of which eight were won, four lost and four drawn, three of them in the School's favour. The success was largely due to the captaincy and batting of Hemmingway, who with Padfield seldom failed to give the side an encouraging start. A pleasing feature was the ability of the later batsmen to make runs when they were required. Baron and Padfield who took 112 wickets between them, those of the former costing under 10 runs apiece, were rarely collared.

Although at times disappointing, St. Lawrence, Ramsgate, showed considerable improvement towards the end of the term. Of the batsmen, Slade, Toop and A. G. W. Hill all made runs, whilst Hardie, Ross, Ferguson and Needham played useful innings. Amongst the bowlers Myburgh again proved valuable, and at times bowled really well; he was, however, handicapped by injury. Slade and B. J. W. Hill were responsible for many wickets, and should both develop into really capable bowlers. As a captain Hardie showed excellent judgment.

St. Edwards had a uniformly good season, six matches being won, five lost and three drawn. In the two School matches—Bromsgrove and Imperial Service College—the batting broke down for no apparent reason. Veitch made nearly twice as many runs as any other batsman and, taking twenty-eight wickets for under 19 runs apiece, bore, with Berry, the brunt of the bowling. Barnes, who proved an excellent captain is succeeded by Veitch, and Hudson, Gibb, Northcote, Green, Berry, Cranmer, Woodroffe and Beal are again available.

Bishop's Stortford, with six old colours left, fared by no means badly, two of the School matches being won, two lost and one left unfinished. The batsmen seldom did themselves justice, but Seal and Knight had a fairly successful summer, and Bonnar played one particularly fine innings. Knight, a promising all-round player, and Sandovearna bore the brunt of the bowling. Knight is the new captain, and he will have the assistance of five old colours.

Loretto, who went through their games unbeaten, were the best Scottish School team of the year, defeating George Watson's, Edinburgh Academy and Glenalmond, and drawing with Merchiston and Fettes. The principal School matches in Scotland are the two day fixtures between Edinburgh Academy and Merchiston—first played in 1858—and between Fettes and Loretto, and Loretto and Merchiston. The first of these was cancelled this year owing to illness, and the other two drawn. Loretto beat Edinburgh Academy by eight wickets, Massey taking seven for 24. This was one of the few occasions when Marshall failed the Academy. He and Oliphant were the mainstays of the batting as the following scores will show:—

Marshall v. Fettes 161 not out; v. George Watson's 35; v. Glenalmond 54.

Oliphant v. Fettes 80; v. George Watson's 98; v. Glenalmond 72 not out.

In each case the batsman scored 250 runs for twice out. Against Glenalmond, Oliphant hit 72 in forty minutes, including five 6's, three off successive balls. The Academy started the season brilliantly, making over 300 runs against George Watson's and Fettes, and winning both matches easily. Then came the defeat by Loretto, and an easy victory over Glenalmond, who had a promising bat and wicket-keeper in Dundas. No fewer than three centuries were made in the drawn match between Fettes and Loretto—Luxmoore 125 and Waterhouse, the captain, 119 (not out) for Loretto, and Anson 155 for Fettes.

#### ETON v. HARROW.

Played at LORD's, Friday, Saturday, July 11, 12. — Including in their ranks the most dangerous batsman and by far the best bowler on either side, Eton won their hundred and first match with Harrow by eight wickets. The Etonians gained some advantage on the opening day when they left off only 18 runs behind with four wickets to fall and, thanks to Atkinson-Clark, they established a lead of 85. Still at lunch time on Saturday Harrow had to some extent retrieved the position for, with eight wickets standing, they stood no more than 27 runs in arrear. Those eight wickets, however, went down afterwards for the addition of 72 runs and so the Light Blues found themselves set the lightest of tasks.

In gaining so substantial a victory, Eton owed nearly everything to Pelham and Atkinson-Clark. A right-handed medium-pace bowler, Pelham all through the match sent down scarcely a single bad ball and with his variations of pace and spin and his immaculate length demanded continual watchfulness from his opponents. Of such exceptional quality was his work which resulted in eleven wickets being taken in forty-two overs and a ball at a cost of exactly four runs apiece that it is scarcely too much to say that his performance must

rank with the greatest achievements in the history of the match.

Atkinson-Clark enjoyed the distinction of putting together the twenty-seventh three-figure innings obtained in games between Eton and Harrow. Soon after he went in on Friday wickets began to tumble down so cheaply that Eton, despite the good start given them, stood in some danger of a bad collapse. He settled down in such fine form, however, that at the drawing of stumps he was not out and had 58 runs to his credit. Early on Saturday he experienced a great piece of luck in being missed from an easy chance but to such splendid use did he turn his good fortune that in less than an hour he obtained 77 out of 103 added to the Eton total on the second day and so not only brought his score to 135 but had the big share in giving Eton their substantial advantage.

Apart from Atkinson-Clark, none of the Eton batsmen except Allen displayed form out of the ordinary. Of the bowlers outside Pelham, Page at times made the ball swing appreciably and, if meeting with little success in the first innings, rendered valuable service in the second. Hanbury maintained a capital pace for a boy of 15 and, if erratic, held out distinct promise. Baerlein, con-

sidering the difficulties presented by some of the bowling he had to take, kept wicket creditably. The fielding generally while fairly sound for a time never attained to special excellence and fell off rather badly late in Harrow's first innings. Hale and Welch the rival captains, led their teams with considerable ability.

Welch, Lawrence, Stow and Covington showed most promise among the Harrow batsmen. Welch and Lawrence made a useful stand after a disastrous start on Friday and Welch afterwards found an invaluable partner in Stow who not only helped his captain to retrieve further ground but went on to put together the best innings for his side. Welch, with Harrow always in an anxious position, seemed rather to lack strokes but he shaped well and made some nice late cuts. Lawrence, if achieving nothing of special note, created a favourable impression. Out to a brilliant catch on Friday, Covington, in the second innings, defended stoutly. Welch bowled steadily, getting on a little off-break at times and Covington, a left-hander, suggested considerable ability but while of average merit the Harrow attack, as was not surprising, fell off in face of Atkinson-Clark's onslaught. Harrow's fielding, like that of their opponents, was fairly good yet never rose to brilliancy.

Winning the toss, Harrow took first innings but despite the exercise of considerable caution by the early batsmen, the excellence of Pelham's bowling soon told its tale and three wickets were down for 27. There ensued the two stands in which Welch figured, the first with Lawrence producing 38 runs and the second with Stow 59. The cricket during these partnerships was quite bright but seven wickets had fallen for 146 at lunch time and although Stow showed plenty of enterprise afterwards, Pelham proved too clever for the other batsmen and Harrow were all out for 199. Investing his batting with plenty of variety, Stow hit nine 4's during a stay of rather more than two hours. Pelham for this innings had the wonderful record of seven wickets in twenty-one

overs for three runs apiece.

Allen and Sheepshanks, on going in to bat for Eton, withstood the Harrow attack for an hour and a half of actual play, their partnership being broken by the tea interval and also by a heavy shower which at five o'clock delayed matters for nearly half an hour. Against a steady attack in which Welch and Covington were the most prominent, they raised the score to 89 but while Allen drove well and brought off nice forcing strokes, Sheepshanks missed numerous chances of run-getting on the leg-side. Welch broke up the stand by bowling Allen off his legs and thenceforward Atkinson-Clark alone of the Eton batsmen achieved anything of note. While, however, his colleagues failed him, especially in dealing with Covington, Atkinson-Clark played such a great game that Harrow were prevented from gaining the upper hand. Atkinson-Clark, indeed, secured an advantage for Eton, the total with four batsmen to be dismissed, reaching 181 before the drawing of stumps. Still the margin in favour of the Light Blues was decidedly narrow and might very possibly have amounted to little or nothing at the end of the Innings.

Fortune, however, declared itself in favour of Eton next morning for very soon there came that mistake in the field—the dropping of a simple catch at deep extra-cover—that gave Atkinson-Clark the opportunity of turning the game strongly in favour of Eton. At that particular moment Atkinson-Clark had added only six runs to his overnight score of 58 but he promptly utilised his luck in brilliant fashion. From Covington in the over following that in which he had been missed off that bowler, he sent the ball to the boundary four times and proceeded to hit away with such refreshing power and variety that when at last dismissed he had in two hours and twenty-five minutes made 135 out of 192 with twenty 4's included in his score. Now and then some of his strokes appeared rather dangerous but there was always a delightrul spirit of enterprise about his cricket and beyond all question his batting called for the highest praise.

Entering upon their second innings, Harrow again began badly, Stewart-Brown and Hazlewood both being out by the time the score reached 14 but, with Stow sent in to join Covington, so much success attended this departure that at the luncheon interval there were 58 runs on the board and eight wickets to go down. For the moment Harrow—only 27 runs in arrear—looked to possess

no small chance of averting defeat. On resuming, however, Pelham dismissed Covington at 72 and next over Page bowled Stow leg stump. and Lawrence have made a stand. Harrow might yet have escaped disaster but at 89 a splendid ball from Pelham that broke back and came very fast off the pitch bowled Welch.

From this point the Harrow batting collapsed so badly before Pelham and Page that the last five wickets fell in fifty minutes for the addition of only 41 runs, the innings being all over in less than three hours for 130. Page, more fortunate than on the previous day, had four wickets for 28, so sharing on this occasion the honours with Pelham whose four wickets cost 23 runs.

Eton had only 46 to make to win and although a break-back from Welch speedily disposed of Allen Atkinson-Clark hit up 31 out of 35 in twenty minutes

and the game was all over by a quarter to five.

Of the 101 matches played, Eton have won 41, Harrow 35, and 25 have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857 which has been rejected.

The one day matches between the two schools during the War are not reckoned as belonging to the regular series.

#### CLIFTON v. TONBRIDGE.

Played at LORD's, Monday, Tuesday, July 28, 29.—Following upon an even day's cricket on Monday when Tonbridge replied to a Clifton total of 266 by scoring 125 for the loss of two batsmen, the Clifton team on Tuesday established a considerable advantage but heavy rain set in and caused the game to be abandoned as a draw. Kinnersley and Northern made a great stand for Cliffton's second wicket, withstanding the Tonbridge attack for rather more than two hours and putting on 163 runs. Kinnersley turned the ball cleverly on the leg side and made many neat strokes through the slips, whereas Northern depended upon the drive for the large proportion of his runs. After those two were separated Crouch and Davis bowled to such purpose that the last eight wickets fell for 92 runs. Tonbridge lost Leach at 25 but Davies, who had put together a three figure score in the corresponding match of the previous season, drove and cut so well that he made 52 in less than an hour. Leaving off 141 behind with eight wickets standing, Tonbridge next morning failed so badly that these eight wickets produced only 47 runs. Wilshin, a fast bowler, dismissed four batsmen and was well supported by Keun and Kinnersley. Clifton, when the match ended, stood 116 ahead with nine wickets in hand—a position curiously similar to that they had occupied at the close of the first day in the match of 1929. On that occasion Tonbridge won by one wicket.

#### RUGBY v. MARLBOROUGH.

Played at Lord's, Wednesday, Thursday, July 30, 31. — Distinctly unfortunate in having to play both their linnings on a pitch much affected by rain and sunshine while the ground, when Marlborough went in to get the runs, rolled out quite easy, Rugby suffered defeat by nine wickets. Despite the downpour which, saturating Lord's on the previous day, had brought the Clifton and Tonbridge match to a summary conclusion, play proved practicable soon after half-past eleven. Under the influence of a strong sun the pitch gave bowlers so much help that Foster alone of the Rugby batsmen offered any prolonged resistance to the Marlborough attack. Nelson bowled in-swingers and Molo off-spinners to great effect and MacDonald, turning the ball more than anyone

else, obtained three wickets for five runs apiece. Marlborough had lost two batsmen for 16 when rain put an end to the day's play. Next morning Robinson, the Rugby captain, who came off the pitch at a great pace, proved so deadly that there were seven Marlborough wickets down for 28. Some catches in the slips being missed, the total reached 68. Robinson took eight wickets—six clean bowled—for 27 runs. Left with a lead of 10, Rugby at their second attempt came so badly to grief against Mole that half the side were out for 13, four wickets falling at that score. Robinson playing up manfully, the total reached 70. The wicket, after the third rolling, being in capital order, Marlborough hit off the 81 runs required for victory in seventy minutes for the loss of one batsman. In so doing they gained their first win ever Rugby since 1923.

CHELTENHAM V. HAILEYBURY.

Played at Lord's, Friday, Saturday, August 1, 2. - Truly sensational was the game between Cheltenham and Haileybury, Cheltenham getting to within 28 of victory before their fourth wicket went down and yet suffering defeat by 12 runs. In bringing about this startling issue to the encounter, the big share belonged to McCall, a left-handed bowler. Tried late in the first innings of Cheltenham, McCall obtained four wickets for 18 runs and when Cheltenham went in for the second time he proved so destructive at the pinch of the game that he disposed of five batsmen for 24 runs. Thus in the end this young player came out with the remarkable record of nine wickets for less than five runs apiece. Halleybury at their first attempt could, apart from Evans, do so little with the slow bowling of Ruffer that they were all out before lunch for 124. Higson and Lloyd put on 147 for Cheltenham's second wicket in an hour and a half. Higson, a left-hander who bats in glasses, drove so well through the covers that, with seventeen 4's among his strokes, he reached his hundred in ninety-five minutes. The last eight wickets fell for 80 runs and Haileybury, 115 in arrear, lost one wicket for 55 before play ceased. Next day Rogerson and Borner, who had come together at 12, raised the score to 166, their two hours' partnership thus producing 154 runs. Rogerson, making most of his score by drives and cuts, gave no chance. After he left Ruffer again bowled effectively. Cheltenham, wanting 150 for victory, had 122 on the board when the fourth wicket fell and so looked assured of a win but then came such remarkable work from McCall that the other six wickets produced only 15 runs.
