PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1935.

The weather conditions in the early weeks of the 1935 season were less favourable than those of the two previous years. Rain interfered with practice, matches had to be abandoned, and the sides in consequence did not settle down so quickly. There was, however, a welcome tendency to take risks, not only in batting, but as regards declarations. Cricket, of recent years, had been getting on to the wrong lines, and, possibly due to the counter attractions of lawntennis and golf, losing its grip, but the "safety first" policy of the two-eyed stance was killing the game. Last season brought signs of improvement all round. The schools, at least in the trial matches, can afford to recapture the joys of the game. A great judge of cricket wrote: "If only bowlers would pitch the ball up and batsmen would hit the half volley, what a different game it would be."

No better instance of the truth of this assertion than the Eton and Harrow match could be adduced. For more than a quarter of a century, victory has eluded Harrow and when they appeared to possess a winning chance, a policy of "safety first" precluded a definite decision. Two years ago, J. H. Pawle's gallant innings in the concluding stages of the game electrified spectators who had sat through a day and a half of unenterprising cricket, but the declaration, unselfish as it was, could not be made early enough to give Harrow any hope of victory. Last July the case was different. Studd declared with a bare possibility of a win and quite a probability of defeat, in leaving Eton 105 minutes to get 156. What happened is history.

These innings of Pawle and Studd may have a far-reaching effect and there is no doubt that the tendency to let the ball hit the bat has been less in evidence of late.

It was only to be expected that Uppingham, who have taken such a prominent part in school cricket, should do their share towards bringing the true spirit of adventure into the game. Three years ago they lost only one match, the last of the season, and that because they went for a win against time. Last season they accepted a sporting challenge from Repton and, making 101 in forty-five minutes, won the match by eight wickets. Set 319 runs to win in just over three hours at Shrewsbury, they started disastrously, at one time actually gained on the clock, the last hour, thanks to Ormsby and McCosh, producing 147, and finished only 11 runs short of victory with two wickets in hand. A brave answer to a generous declaration.

There were numerous other instances of this kind. Hewan, the Marlborough captain, who had previously made 178 in just over three hours against Wellington and 205 against Free Foresters, gave a magnificent exhibition of driving in two big innings against Rugby at Lord's. Eager, who will again captain Cheltenham this year, was not far behind him in strokes all round the wicket, but lacked Hewan's driving power. When M.C.C. left Felsted 293 to make in three hours, D. M. Matthews and P. R. Cavalier scored 219 for the opening stand and the runs were obtained with three minutes to spare for the loss of five wickets.

Uppingham declared at 171 for seven, and the last wicket of the Crusaders fell at 129 to what in any event would have been the last ball. Maudsley and Greatbatch sent up 100 in an hour for the first wicket when Malvern went in to get 145 in ninety-five minutes against the Authentics, and they won by five wickets with six minutes remaining.

Sherborne declared at 182 for five wickets against the Dorset Rangers, who at the expiration of time had lost nine batsmen for 182. An extra over was played and the visitors obtained the necessary run, but could hardly consider they had won the match.

Brodhurst, the Malvern captain, played a great innings of 95 when things were going badly for his side against the Authentics, just failing to win the match for the school, who, with a wicket in hand, had equalled the visitors' score at the drawing of stumps. Baines hit up 62 in twenty minutes, including two 6's and eight 4's, for St. Peter's, York, against Durham. Play was not possible in Repton's match against Leicestershire Gentlemen until two o'clock. Montgomery declared the school innings closed at the tea total of 204 for four wickets, and Leicestershire Gentlemen, for whom M. Packe and C. S. Dempster hit fiercely, knocked off the runs with two minutes left for cricket.

Despite a freely-hit 57 by Gillett which occupied only twenty minutes, Rugby failed to get one run off the last ball and their game with the Butterflies was drawn. Such performances as these show clearly how the Schools went out for victory.

An old cricketer who followed one of the most successful schools in the North in all their matches, considers that the outstanding merit of the side was that it possessed bowlers "who attacked the wicket without bowling on the leg side at all." He concludes a most interesting letter thus: "It might be of general interest to say that fewer matches would have been finished had the wickets been as heavily marled as boys seem to expect in the South. The whole joy of cricket is removed if a bowler can never get any help from the wicket except under such conditions that a batsman cannot cope with the attack at all."

Averages have been termed the curse of the game and they certainly should not be allowed to influence Public School cricket. A healthier atmosphere pervaded last summer's batting and if no notable improvement occurred in the bowling, there was no falling off. More attention was paid to length—which should be the young bowler's chief ambition—though the fetish of swing and swerve brought with it far too many balls on the leg side. The fielding reached a high standard, with many competent wicket-keepers, but few really brilliant slip fielders. It must be remembered that both are born and not made, but can be improved enormously by practice. Bowling was the rock on which many schools foundered. The necessity for variety found no one, apparently, with the courage to practise lobs. Lobs, if judiciously used two overs, or three at the most, at a time, can be very effective, but the bowler must practise daily, paying special attention to length and trajectory. The difference of the point of delivery is apt to disconcert the batsman.

A team of Eastern Canadian Schools paid a round of visits, including in their tour Eton, Harrow, Winchester, Uppingham, Stowe, Felsted. The wickets did not favour the visitors, who are used to a moister surface, but these cheery sportsmen with their keenness in the field and the excellent wicket-keeping of F. O. Martin impressed very favourably. The standard of the batting was not high, but J. E. Croft, who made some beautiful off drives, played one really good innings of 92 against Winchester.

ETON V. HARROW.

The cricket in the Eton and Harrow match possessed a charm which has been absent for the last two years, except for that glorious ninety minutes when J. H. Pawle held the stage in 1934. Harrow were out to win; Eton appeared convinced of their own invincibility, and did not, until the start of the second innings give the impression of being on their mettle. The catching had been inexcusably bad in the first innings, the ground fielding lifeless, and the returns to the wicket inaccurate. The batting, though six of the side made over 30, was stolid and uninteresting, with the notable exception of Collins. Neither had Eton to contend with any bowler of the calibre of Rees-Davies, who kept up a great pace for a few overs and swung the new ball dangerously from the off. The honours rested with Harrow, who in each innings made a great recovery from a dangerous position. Studd's grand innings dwarfed all the other batting, but Joynson, who had previously experienced rather a disappointing season, played delightful cricket at a critical time, and Watson gave a foretaste of what may happen in the next two Eton and Harrow matches. Eton's fielding on the second day was close and keen, a great contrast to that of the first innings, but Harrow were good throughout the match, and the only real mistake, early on the second morning, more than possibly cost them victory.

Left with an hour and three-quarters to get 156, Eton lost half their wickets in fifty-five minutes for 48. The situation looked serious, but F. G. Mann was steadiness personified.

ETON V. WINCHESTER.

There was much enterprising cricket in the Eton and Winchester match, with outstanding batting by Foster and J. P. Mann, and wicket-keeping by Fisher, the Eton captain. Eton had the advantage of first innings on a beautiful wicket on Agar's Plough, but they made a sorry start, for in an hour five of the best batsmen were out for less than 60. Then Dickson and the younger Mann entirely altered the complexion of the game, and, each exceeding the century during one of the best partnerships of the Public School year, enabled Fisher to declare at 355 for 7 wickets and give the Wykehamists an uncomfortable hour and a half's batting before time.

Against the varied Eton attack, Winchester lost three wickets cheaply, but Faber and Eggar steadied the side and the score reached 212. In the follow-on, Foster played a delightful innings of 113 and, Faber and Eggar again rendering able assistance, there was never a chance of a definite decision.

RUGBY V. MARLBOROUGH.

The Rugby and Marlborough match produced heavy scoring, 997 runs being made in the two days. Hewan, the Marlborough captain, maintaining his earlier form, played another great innings of 176, his driving and forcing strokes off the back foot being very powerful, and he declared at 351 for 9 wickets. At 11 o'clock next morning Rugby were in quite a good position with 126 up for the loss of one wicket, Steel not out 58; in the next ten minutes three more wickets fell without addition. However, Elliott and Revnell faced a critical situation with the coolness of veterans and they added 168 for the fifth partnership. Reynell completed a truly brave hundred, Bridger, only just over 15, contributed 62, his late cutting being specially well timed, and Dagnall assisted Walford, a brother of the previous year's captain, to add 52 for the last wicket. With a draw practically assured, Hewan set about the bowling in such dashing style that when "last over" was called he had scored 92 out of 160 for two wickets. When it was a question whether he would equal Morice Bird's record of 100 and 137 for Harrow against Eton in 1907, Hewan hit the first ball for two, missed a six by a yard with a mighty on-drive from the next, and to everyone's regret, in jumping out to the fourth, was stumped.

CHELTENHAM V. HAILEYBURY.

Cheltenham, on top all through, gained a well-deserved victory over Haileybury by 189 runs. Some brilliant catches were brought off, notably by Bourne, for Cheltenham, high up above his head on the leg boundary, and by Mayhew, the Haileybury captain, at silly point. The Cheltenham batting all through was much the sounder, the bowling more varied, and Carter showed great promise behind the wicket. In Eagar they possessed one of the best school batsmen of the year, and in Foster an outstanding fast medium bowler. Mayhew, upon whom Haileybury depended so much, could not bowl fast. He strained his back and, unable to do himself justice with bat or ball, had to decline the invitation of the M.C.C. for the following week. The team, disorganised by an epidemic during the term, were young and inexperienced, and the eleventh hour absence through illness of R. M. Childs, their soundest bat, who will captain the side this year, came as an additional blow. Purdy, Annison, Troughton and Hildick-Smith showed promising form.

CLIFTON V. TONBRIDGE.

In a thrilling finish Tonbridge, 95 behind on the first innings, beat Clifton by one wicket. On the first day the honours went to Clifton. Anderson and Eberle put on 134 for the third wicket, and Scott, having hit up 49 at a critical time, took, with his leg-breaks,

four wickets for eleven runs apiece. Anderson played a distinguished innings. Necessarily careful at first, he drove well and made several beautiful late cuts before being well taken low down at first slip. Next day, the position was reversed. Weston and Scott hit wholeheartedly, Rawsthorne played a sound innings, and Tonbridge were set 261 runs to win. Weston made one huge on-drive into the stand by the sight-screen, and Scott hit Gillett to square leg into the mound stand—a very big hit, as the wicket was pitched near the big scoring-board. Cobb, the Tonbridge captain, played a confident innings and set his side a fine example before being second out at 118, and then Clark and Hobbs added 86 for the third wicket. Then wickets fell fast, and amidst great excitement Brookes, the last man, made the winning hit.

LORD'S SCHOOLS V. THE REST.

The out cricket of both sides in the Lord's Schools v. Rest game reached a very high standard, the bowling comparing favourably with that of recent years. Rees-Davies produced real pace for the first few overs and, the conditions assisting, made the new ball swing disconcertingly late from the off. Cranston spun the ball either way and flighted it well, varying length and pace cleverly and never being afraid to "pitch 'em up." Murray-Wood and Holliman were considerably faster than most leg-break bowlers, and the former had the later batsmen at his mercy, turning the ball quickly downhill and keeping a fine length. Anderson showed promising form behind the wicket and Carris, Eagar and Studd, on the one side, and Langley, Lomas and Murray-Wood on the other, were noticeable for specially brilliant work. Langley, the Public Schools Golf Champion, who possessed a great variety of strokes and a sound defence, carried off the batting honours. Carris and Eagar, both played bright cricket. and Studd, Hewan, and Steel did capital work in the second innings, but a long "tail" again failed and the Rest won by five wickets.

THE ARMY V. PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

When the Army lost six wickets in their second imnings and were still 14 runs behind the Schools' first innings total, it seemed long odds that the boys would repeat their victory of 1933; but a great innings by J. W. A. Stephenson gave the Army a chance that they grasped with both hands. Rees-Davies in a sensational start, bowled at a great pace and the first four wickets fell to him in five overs for one run. Six Army batsmen were out for 38, and though Stephenson and R. G. W. Melsome put up a slight resistance, there came no real recovery.

Hewan with determined batting gave the schools an excellent start, and Eagar, specially good on the leg side, and Cranston showed impressive form. Next morning Studd declared with a lead of 144. The conditions were not so favourable to Rees-Davies when the Army batted again, but Murray-Wood kept such an excellent length and varied his deliveries so cleverly that six wickets fell before the arrears were cleared off. Then Melsome and C. J. Myburgh assisted Stephenson in two big stands and the Schools were set 167 runs to win. Hewan started confidently, but he was soon run out as the result of a great bit of fielding by N. L. Foster which possibly determined the result of the match. The early dismissal of their three best batsmen appeared to dishearten the side and against keen fielding and accurate bowling eight wickets were down for 67. Murray-Wood did a little hitting, but the end came twenty minutes from time with a victory for the Army by 63 runs.

Young Amateurs v. Professionals.

The Young Amateurs, several of whom had been scoring heavily during the term, failed to uphold their reputation and the Professionals carried off nearly all the honours. Only in fielding did the Amateurs more than hold their own. A. M. Ormsby (Uppingham), whose late cutting was a feature, and E. J. H. Dixon (St. Edward's) put on 70 for the Schools' second wicket and R. C. Walker (Sherborne) and J. W. Stead (St. Peter's, York) shaped well, but the rest did little. F. M. McL. Forster (Wellington), of whom much had been expected, was unlucky in being out to a ball that rose straight up. The four young bowlers-Compton, Nevell, Wood and Thursting-would have been too much for most school sides. D'Arcy, when the Professionals went in, completed a very steady hundred in three hours and a quarter, and Robertson made good strokes all round the wicket before being run out through a brilliant piece of fielding at mid-off by Forster, who throughout set a fine example. Thursting reaching a sound 50 next day, the Professionals gained a lead of 162. The first three Amateurs' wickets fell to Nevell with 20 runs on the board in the second innings and only Forster, who played a fine forcing innings of 50, and G. R. Abbs (Giggleswick) offered any resistance to the bowling, the Professionals winning deservedly in an innings. The game being over early, a time match was arranged, each side to bat 80 minutes. The Professionals were all out for 75 in a few minutes over the hour, and the Amateurs hit up 76 in twentythree minutes. C. H. R. M. Stuart (Oundle) showed his real form in a very quick 63 and Walker assisted with 29. Although the pace slackened, 194 runs were scored in the 80 minutes for the loss of five wickets, P. J. M. Nelson (Harpenden) making many good lefthander's strokes in a not out 38.

UNDER 16 AT LORD'S.

Mr. Carleton Tufnell's XI, which included J. R. Bridger (Rugby), P. P. Gawthorne and J. C. S. Doll (Westminster), who had already gained their colours in their school elevens, proved too strong all

round for the Lord's XI and won by an innings and 46 runs. Bridger, who scored 62 against Marlborough the previous week, played a sound innings of 84 and showed promising form with his spin bowling. D. L. Curling (Eton), making his third appearance in the match, showed considerable command of strokes, The bowling honours went to two Etonians—E. C. Garnier, who took four wickets for 7 runs in the first innings, and C. Luxmoore (10 for 45), both mediumpace right-handers. An early finish left time for a "pick-up" on the second day. In this, A. J. B. Marsham (Eton) and A. P. Mitchell (Ampleforth) were the successful batsmen for Lord's side, and Doll, R. Holt (Harrow), Luxmoore and Curling on the other. Bridger, who took seven wickets for 7 runs apiece kept an excellent length, and was too much for the opposition. R. G. A. Gow (Winchester) and P. S. D. Griffin (Sherborne), quiet and effective behind the wicket, should develop.

Young Amateurs at the Oval.

For the first time for many years, the Young Amateurs of Surrey won all three matches—against Essex, Kent and Middlesex. Rain fell frequently during the week and confined the Essex match to one day. No play took place until after lunch on Wednesday in the Middlesex fixture, and on Friday against Kent. In the previous week the Surrey boys drew with Richmond and the Surrey Club, P. J. Dickinson (K. C. S., Wimbledon) scoring 151 (not out) against Richmond and 96 at the Oval.

J. M. Lomas (Charterhouse) played two beautiful innings of 70 and 55 not out against Kent; scoring his last 30 runs in ten minutes he won the match with a minute to spare.

The Eton eleven of 1935 came within measurable distance of being an extremely good side. Their merit lay in the substance and quality of the batting, which extended far into the tail, their splendid fielding and catching and the brilliance of Fisher, their wicket-keeper and captain. They failed to achieve greatness since they lacked that other match-winning bowler who might have further developed the initial onslaught of Rees-Davies, one of the best school-boy fast bowlers of recent years. There was one other serious shortcomingthe inability of the earlier batsmen to lay the foundation of a big score. In the whole season, the highest first wicket stand was 27 and the partnerships for the second and third wickets were little more successful. In recent years the early Eton batsmen have been called upon to face bowling rather beyond the competence of a schoolboy cricketer, and partly to this may be attributed their persistent attitude of defence and their inability to turn that defence into defiance.

The finest innings of the season was Kerrison's 106 against the Butterflies. With an immaculately straight bat, he met and mastered G. O. Allen bowling somewhere near his fastest, but apart from this one display, he proved very unreliable. Two other splendid innings were those by J. P. Mann (127) and Dickson (118) in a great partnership against Winchester, after the first five wickets had fallen for some 60 runs. F. G. Mann, this year's captain, was a little disappointing, but he played a sound opening innings of 105 on a wintry afternoon at Charterhouse, and his style is so good and his eye so keen that he has little to fear. Jackson, too, fell below expectations, but fielded beautifully at slip, and Macindoe, Cassavetti, and Fisher did useful work. Kerrison, J. P. Mann, Dickson and Collins (who played a delightful innings at Lord's) may one day be heard of in far higher circles. Rees-Davies bowled well at the beginning of the season and magnificently at the end, and Macindoe and Wild gave steady help. J. P. Mann was erratic and expensive and F. G. Mann had too little match-practice. With F. G. Mann (captain), Wild, J. P. Mann, Macindoe, Kerrison, Jackson, Dickson, and M. W. Pragnell (12th man) left, the side, if another bowler can be found, should be very strong this year.

With eight old flannels and much promising material from the previous year's Colts at their disposal, great things were expected of Harrow. It may be said at once, that, after a disappointing start, these expectations were realised, though the long-delayed victory at Lord's just failed to materialise. As captain, Studd proved an able successor to J. H. Pawle, and set a fine example in the field. A great attacking batsman, he inspired confidence in his side with not out innings of 102 v. the Town, 103 v. M.C.C., and 154 v. Harrow Wanderers on the eve of the big match, but not until Lord's did Joynson and Stogdon fulfil the promise of 1934. Carris and Wilson were an undeniably good opening pair, and the former added many scoring strokes to his dour defence. There was batting of an aggressive character down to No. 10, but "it was scratchy and uncertain." Kaye bowled with great steadiness; Bond, out of luck at Lord's, and Duveen took many wickets; Carris was a useful change and Watson, who gave promise of becoming a very capable batsman, came in to provide leg-breaks. There could be no two opinions of the fielding. The "Harrow Record" tells us that "the school started as a very mediocre fielding side." That may be so, but when they came to Lord's their ground-work, catching, and, above all, throwing in, marked them as the best Public School fielding side seen at Lord's for some years. Whetherly, who has the making of a great wicket-keeper, was troubled by the unaccustomed pace and liveliness of the wicket. In Harrow's other school fixtures, Marlborough made a remarkable recovery when in an apparently hopeless position; the Winchester match was washed out; and

Charterhouse were beaten in an innings, Bond taking eleven wickets. Only Carris, who in his fourth year will captain the side, and Watson remain, but the second eleven had a very successful season and the Colts are said to be most promising.

Winchester made a most auspicious start by defeating New College by five wickets and Trinity, Oxford, by 53 runs, and altogether of fifteen matches played they won five, drew nine, and lost only one, against a very strong side of Old Wykehamists. In the school matches, Eton, batting first on a plumb wicket, had the better of a drawn game, the features of which were a brilliant innings of 113 by Foster, a great stand for the Eton sixth wicket by J. P. Mann and Dickson and the batting in both innings of Faber and Eggar. "Foster's hundred showed superb stroke play." The Harrow and Charterhouse matches were ruined by rain after little more than an hour's play; Marlborough, on their own ground, went down by four wickets, Linton taking four wickets for 29, and Foster (56), and Eggar (42 not out) heading the Winchester score. Left an hour and forty-five minutes to get 82 to beat the Canadian Schools, Faber, Bailey and Eggar scored rapidly, but efforts to force the pace by the later batsmen failed and the visitors won by 11 runs. Winchester were a distinctly strong batting side, with four good players in Foster, Holme, Faber and Eggar but with little bowling, apart from that of Wilson-exceedingly unlucky in the number of slip catches dropped off him. Eggar, who showed promise as a spin bowler, was a captain above the average and made the best of his resources. Holme, captain, Wilson, Linton, Bailey, Adams and Sinclair are left for this year, in addition to D. H. Garron, the twelfth man, so that Winchester should have another good side.

Younger and less experienced than usual, Rugby had an enjoyable season with several close finishes. Of the four school matches, three were drawn, those with Uppingham and Clifton being spoiled by rain. Repton won by 92 runs, the last three visiting batsmen between them putting on over 100. Despite the big total against Marlborough, the batting was not entirely dependable and the bowling not always so accurate or intelligent as in recent years. Steel, under the cares of captaincy, never found his most effective form, and Kettle, who looked like making a lot of runs, was unfortunately away much of the term. There remains some promising material, and R. D. Clark, who succeeds Steel in the captaincy, has five old members of the team available in MacLehose, Elliot, Bridger, a very promising batsman and spin bowler with two more years in the eleven, Walford, and D. G. Clark. Gillett gained his place against Marlborough owing to the indisposition of J. M. F. Dewar.

The batting of the captain, Hewan, who, if he maintains his form, should do big things at Cambridge, was the feature of the

Marlborough season. He finished up a wonderful term's cricket by just missing, to the general regret, a double century at Lord's against Marlborough, which would have been a record for the match. R. H. Spooner recorded 139 in 1898 and 198 in 1899 for Marlborough. The school enjoyed quite a successful campaign, defeating Cheltenham and Wellington, drawing with Harrow and Rugby and losing to Winchester by four wickets. Hewan had eight old colours, including all the previous year's bowlers, besides six of the second eleven to compete for the last three places. The batting failed against Winchester, but some great bowling by Whitehouse and Dickson nearly saved the match, and the game at Harrow was remarkable for the fine unbroken stand of Whitehouse and Fletcher, who took the score from 21 for 6 to 125 at the close. Cheltenham and Wellington were defeated comfortably. Hewan, who later exceeded the second century against the Foresters, played a great innings of 178 in just over three hours against Wellington and Dickson took five wickets for 24. The improvement in the scoring continued and in the Rugby match at Lord's the batsmen did everything asked of them; but the bowlers lost the control and life which they showed during the term, and by lunch time on the second day the result, thanks to the gallant batting of the later Rugbeians, was doomed to be a draw, and interest centred solely on Hewan's bid for a second century. Westwood, a spin bowler, succeeds Hewan in the captaincy and Anderson, Jelf, a reliable stumper, and Terry are again available.

Cheltenham's inprovement bore eloquent testimony to the coaching of Kennedy; and how much was owed to the captaincy and batting of Eagar it is hard to say. At the start of the season when no one else could get going, Eagar was the mainstay of the side as is manifested by the record of his first six innings-59, 119 (not out), 50, 44, 79, 82. His first failure occurred against Marlborough and the side were out for 67. In the follow-on 161 runs behind, three wickets fell for 11, but a magnificent 130 by the captain lent courage to the team and Marlborough were set 101 to make in two hours. They lost four men for 50, but, with four minutes to spare, won by five wickets. Clifton won by 81 runs, but Cheltenham beat Malvern by 36, and gained a convincing victory—the first since 1931—over Haileybury at Lord's by 189 runs. Eagar's splendid example bore good fruit, and though his own contributions were only 11 and 31, scores of 196 and 241 speak for the batting of the side. Throughout the season the bowling was steady. Foster, distinctly fast and liable to get a quick early wicket or two, swung dangerously from the off. He totalled 50 wickets for under 15 runs each, and Pope and Fryer, of somewhat similar type, backed him up well, the former taking 34 wickets and the latter 26 at 20 apiece. Geary, a youngster of 15, another real length bowler, and Eagar, himself, left hand, provided changes, and none bowled better at Lord's than

Geary. Eagar, who will captain the side again this year, is a beautiful field, and the fielding and throwing in were as good as anything seen at Lord's during the fortnight. In addition to Pope, Reynolds, Geary, Bocquet, Stevens and Bourne, who played at Lord's last year, Eagar can call on the services of A. C. Fryer and G. B. de Castle, who could not play in August owing to injury.

Haileybury, greatly handicapped by illness, experienced a lean season. To set against one win, four matches were drawn, and seven lost, including those with Wellington and Cheltenham, the only two school fixtures which could be played. Mayhew, was the best all-round cricketer, but probably because of the anxieties of captaincy, he, like all the rest of the old colours, did not live up to his reputation. Among the batsmen, no one was outstanding, Troughton, a newcomer, enjoying most success. The fielding maintained its high standard, being notably good in the losing game at Wellington. Childs, whose imnings at Lord's in 1933 and 1934 were the feature of the batting against Cheltenham, could not play last August. He succeeds Mayhew in the captaincy, and with Harrison, Marriott, Cornoch-Taylor, Hoare, Jupp and Hildick-Smith returning, the side should do well.

Clifton were an enterprising side. True, owing to rain, six of the matches, including that against Rugby, were drawn, but six of the other eight were won. Victories were gained over Cheltenham, in a low scoring game by 80 runs, the Clifton Club, Somerset Stragglers, Gloucestershire Gypsies, Bristol and District and The Masters. M.C.C. won on time after a sporting declaration by the school, who led on the first innings by four runs, and Tonbridge, making a splendid recovery on the second day, won a thrilling game at Lord's by one wicket. The strength of the team lay in the bowling. Scott and Weston, slow spinners and slow medium, bowled well all through the term and Perry, fast medium, had a wonderful spell for four matches in which he took 26 wickets for 111 runs. The fielding was generally good and Anderson, who captained the side with judgment, frequently showed brilliance behind the stumps. Anderson, who opened the innings against M.C.C. with 86, and Scott made a considerable advance, and Weston, who has no idea of letting the ball hit the bat, played some glorious innings, including 112 against Old Cliftonians, but the batting was definitely patchy. Scott will probably be this year's captain, and the other old colours will be Rawsthorne, Mutter, Eberle, Firth and Perry.

The **Tonbridge** eleven were disorganised by measles for the first six weeks of term, and the promise shown in the early matches was not realised at Sherborne, where a draw greatly favoured the home side. A most disappointing exhibition at Lancing brought due penalty—a heavy defeat—but there followed victory over

Dulwich and, after an uphill game at Lord's, a most exciting win over Clifton. Thompson, the most consistent batsman, finished the season with an average of 45. Cobb, the captain, played very well, and Clark, Hobbs and Lloyd-Morgan all had good patches, Brookes was very steady behind the stumps and the fielding was good. Peters, the most successful of the four bowlers, returned the excellent figures of 22 wickets for 13.6. Cobb, Thompson and Parsons (for the third year), and Peters, Lloyd-Morgan and Bousfield should be available again.

Westminster showed want of enterprise as a team. Of the twelve matches played, two were drawn and ten lost, including Charterhouse, Radley, Sherborne and Wellington. Time saved the visitors from defeat at Stowe. There were four old Pinks left from 1934, but for various reasons the composition of the side was never completely settled, and this, to some extent, accounted for the poor scores. Only four new players earned Pinks, and of these the most successful batsman on the side was Sutton, scoring 411 runs, though unfortunately he did not come on until late in the season. Rayne now at Oxford, was the best all-round player and his departure during the term to take up a business appointment considerably weakened the eleven. Richardson, who will captain the side again, failed to find his form either as batsman or bowler and the batting lacked confidence. There were four medium paced bowlers, Richardson, left hand, and Scott, a spin bowler with possibilities. In the field the side were generally sound if not brilliant. With Richardson and Stocker, in their third year, Valli, Stock and Sutton again available, and some very promising young cricketers coming on, including Gawthorne, a Colt who played in the last three matches, Cunliffe and Sinclair, also tried, and Wilkinson, a really good wicket-keeper, the side should do much better this year.

The weather spoilt the first half of the season at **Charterhouse**—many matches were ruined and batsmen could not find their form. The Winchester game had to be abandoned soon after lunch, when Charterhouse had made 86 for three wickets; a great effort of 88 by Lomas in the second innings failed to save the visitors from a single innings defeat at Harrow, and rain robbed Eton, who declared at 243 for seven wickets, of a probable win. The first victory was registered against Westminster, for whom Sutton played an innings of 122. Lomas (104) and Weeks (58), followed by Reynolds (51 not out), enabled the home side to win by seven wickets. Five hundred and twenty-one runs were scored in the day in a drawn game against Wellington, when Forster played a great innings of 133 for the visitors and Lomas (51) and Crompton (86) put up a big stand for the Charterhouse second wicket. Lomas, in a class by himself as regards batting, fielded brilliantly at cover point, and was well

backed up by Crompton and Reynolds. Power, a fast bowler, was not suited by the wickets, but he bowled well against Westminster. Examinations kept him away from the Harrow match. Reynolds bowled a steady length and Wilson, slow left hand, did useful work. With Lomas, captain, Crompton, Dunbar, Weeks, Hughes, Palamountain, and probably Beane available, the side should do well this year.

Repton started with the handicap of having lost five of the previous year's bowlers, and until the middle of June, when Davenport and Gibson, both fast-medium right-hand, came into the side, the attack was unreliable. Consequently three of the early matches, including that with Uppingham, ended in defeat, but there came a marked improvement in the latter half of the season, and, although the school lost to a powerful Repton Pilgrim side, they scored a decisive win over Shrewsbury, chiefly owing to the bowling of Gibson, who took five for 34. Rain spoiled the Malvern match, but Repton wound up with a win over Rugby, bringing their total of wins to 4, with 4 losses and 5 draws. Of the batsmen Willatt was the most reliable, especially in school matches, getting 56 against Uppingham, 78 against Malvern and 66 against Rugby. A quick footed left-hander, with a sound defence, he should, with increasing strength and experience, become really good. Montgomery played some attractive innings and Hyde hit well early in the season. The fielding was usually sound and quite brilliant at times, with Murray particularly good at cover. Hyde impressed very favourably in the Young Surrey Amateurs matches at the Oval, and by his free hitting was responsible for the victory over Middlesex. Bagnall, who will be captain next season, was above the average as a wicket-keeper, and with seven old colours available there seems every prospect of a strong eleven.

Malvern, on the whole, failed to realise expectations. Brodhurst, the captain, who headed the batting averages, led his team well and received able support in bowling from Farnsworth, who captured 40 wickets at a cost of 16.57 each, and P. H. Willis-Dixon with 35 wickets for 16.60. In the holidays the latter impressed favourably at Lord's. Good wins were registered over Wolverhampton by eight wickets, Free Foresters, with four minutes to spare, by five wickets, and Authentics, in the last over, by two wickets. Malvern beat Shrewsbury by 15 runs, lost to Cheltenham by 36, and had the best of a drawn game with Repton. More matches would have been won had the batting reached the standard of which it was capable. Greatbatch will captain the side this year and will have the services of Farnsworth, Maudsley, Jacomb, Rogers, Maclean and Henson.

The Shrewsbury eleven started moderately, the attack being disappointing in the early part of term but, new bowlers having been found, developed into a useful team. Malvern won by 15 runs, Repton by 144 runs, and drawn games were played with Rossall and Uppingham. Shrewsbury had a lead of 82 against Uppingham and, after declaring at 236 for six wickets, set their old rivals 319 to win. One of the finest matches played on the ground finished with Uppingham requiring nine runs to win with two wickets in hand. Thornycroft, unable to play against Repton, and Best, a steady left hander, were the outstanding batsmen. Thornycroft played fine innings of 120 v. M.C.C., 79 v. Rossall, and 56 and 84 v. Uppingham. Best made 58 v. Malvern and 100 not out v. Free Foresters. Warman bowled his leg-breaks and googlies very well on occasion, taking 8 for 19 v. Rossall, and 5 for 52 v. Malvern, but was apt to be expensive. Blagg, captain for 1936, kept wicket finely throughout the season. Pooley and Groves, both promising bowlers, are also available. Pooley developed well as a fast medium bowler and ought to be good this year. These two towards the end of the summer received useful support from Groves and Studdert-Kennedy.

The Uppingham eleven, though they lost two matches, were well up to the high standard of recent years. B.N.C., with a strong side including four Blues, won by four wickets and the Notts Amateurs, after an exciting tussle, by 18 runs, the school being able to bat only ten men. This, the last match of term, was only the third defeat experienced by the school in five years! Six of the other ten matches ended in victory with four drawn. Repton, who made a most sporting declaration, lost by 8 wickets, the 92 runs necessary for victory being hit off in forty-three minutes. Oundle were beaten by four wickets, Ormsby playing a great innings of 83 at a critical time, and the Canadian Schools were outplayed, McCosh taking the first five wickets for nine runs. The Haileybury fixture was unfortunately cancelled; rain spoilt the Rugby match and a wonderful drawn game at Shrewsbury ended with honours even. After leading by 82 on the first innings, the home side declared at 236 for six wickets, and Uppingham, left 319 to get to win in three hours and ten minutes, stood only eleven runs short with two wickets in hand at the drawing of stumps. In Club matches victories were gained over the Crusaders, Leicester Gentlemen and the Old Boys, McCosh, against the Old Boys, having the rare distinction of taking four wickets in four balls. The most consistent batsmen were Bell and Hill. Ormsby had a fine record in school matches and Samuel was the only century-maker. McCosh and D. W. Gillespie bore the burden of the bowling. The fielding was splendid with the slip catching reliable and frequently brilliant.

Wellington College had a very successful season, thanks largely to the captaincy and form of Forster. He gained reward for his unfailing interest and cheerfulness by having a real "team" at his back. He always set a brilliant example in the field, and his batting record deserves special mention. In the five school matches, he scored 40 (not out) v. Marlborough, 45 (not out) v. Westminster, 44 v. Haileybury, 99 (not out) v. Bradfield, and 133 v. Charterhouse. In addition he made 139 v. Free Foresters and 50's against M.C.C. and Berkshire Gentlemen. Though his batting was outstanding, all the others down to No. 11 could make runs, but two reliable opening batsmen could not be found. Eddison, fast medium right, did most work in attack and bowled consistently well. taking 33 wickets in under 200 overs for 18 runs apiece. Parker, medium left hand, bowled effectively at times. He is young, over six feet, and promises well for this year. The fielding, inspired by the captain, was first class—clean and accurate. The only disaster was at Marlborough. Put in to bat on drying turf—the first wet wicket of term-Wellington were out for 122, and the home side, thanks to a fine innings by G. E. Hewan, the captain, passed this total with nine wickets in hand. Victories were registered over Westminster, Haileybury and Bradfield. Perhaps the best performance of the year was against Bradfield, where after a long daythe hottest of the year—in the field, Wellington, left to get 269 to win in less than three hours, succeeded with ten minutes to spare. The Charterhouse match was drawn, the home side replying with 225 for 5 to Wellington's declaration at 295 for 9. McCall, Dawson, Roberts, Hunter and Parker remain for this year.

After defeat by Blundell's in the first home school match of the term, Sherborne carried all before them. Rain interfered with the Tonbridge match, the visitors being dismissed for 161 and losing three wickets for 67, after Sherborne, for whom Eldridge made 104, declared at 251 for three. Downside were beaten by 112 runs and three wickets, Radley by four wickets, and Westminster by an innings and 22 runs, Harris and Hutton contributing 134 and 101 respectively. Eldridge and Llewellyn made a useful opening pair, and with Harris, Sherley-Price, Murray and Robinson in form, the batting generally proved reliable. The major work in attack fell upon J. S. Harris, Robinson, Murray and Hutton. Robinson was a good all-round cricketer, two of his best performances being 88 against Radley when five wickets had fallen cheaply, and four wickets for 13 in the lost match against Blundell's. Muriel, an efficient wicketkeeper (captain), Hutton, Robinson, and possibly J. S. Harris, will be available this year.

Bradfield were a young side and acquitted themselves well with five victories, six draws, and three defeats. Rain interfered

with the matches with Radley and Stowe, Lancing were beaten by 90 runs and a splendid game which produced 540 runs in the day resulted in a victory for Wellington just on time. The most successful batsmen were Templer, an excellent wicket-keeper. Heathcote, the captain, and C. Wilson, all of whom have another year at school. Tucker and Henshaw, who showed very promising form, doing particularly well at Lancing with 70 and 82 respectively, will be available for two more years. There were two good bowlers in Shuttleworth, slow spinners, who has gone to Sandhurst, and Fraser, fast medium. If Heathcote can discover bowlers, the team should

be a really good one.

With five matches won, five lost, and seven drawn, St. Paul's had a good record, remarkable for the number of astonishingly close finishes. The last ball of the day brought about the defeat of the Cryptics; Free Foresters and Harrow Wanderers were both beaten by one run, and Eton Ramblers won by two runs. Only one century-by Boswood against the Cryptics-was scored. The newcomers. Vivian, Rahman, Commings and Reynders, revealed excellent batting form. Unfortunately Street, the captain, was away for the greater part of the term. Feldman, who bowled his leg-breaks and occasional googlies splendidly at times, stood in a class by himself. There should be seven old colours left, including Reynders, who impressed very favourably in the Young Surrey Amateurs matches at the Oval in September, and for the Richmond Public Schools XI.

Dulwich disappointed, seven matches being lost and only one won. There were too many changes in the team, no fewer than twenty players being tried, and the side never really settled down. In the five school matches Dulwich lost to Mill Hill, Brighton, St. Paul's and Tonbridge and were saved from defeat at Bedford by a second wicket stand between Havcock (70) and Denby (43). The bowling was patchy, there being no fast bowler, and neither Holliman nor Silkin was as reliable as had been expected. Denby, a promising left hander, and Haycock were the mainstays of the batting. and Shirreff, Staniforth, and Gray should do better this season. Darby kept wicket remarkably well, but too many catches were dropped. Silkin, who bowled slow spinners cleverly for the Young Amateurs of Surrey at the Oval in September, will captain the side this year.

Though Leys failed to win a match, this is hardly a fair representation of the quality of the eleven, for they drew most of the matches and generally held their own. Lauder captained the eleven extremely well, but he could call upon only two real bowlers-West and Callow-and he had to rest them by making batsmen join in the attack. The side, always together, fielded best when things were going badly. The following colours remain: -Bate, Brown, Callow, Kelshall, Newsholme, an exceptionally good wicket-keeper, and Witherington.

Lancing lacked consistency, losing by 93 runs to Bradfield, drawing with Brighton and Eastbourne, and beating Tonbridge, after declaring at 205 for 5, by an innings and 41 runs. They possessed a sound opening pair in Wedgwood and Knight, the former of whom played through the innings for 65 against Sussex C. & G., and a very good all-round cricketer in the captain, Manners, who scored 299 runs and took 29 wickets for 13.5 each, including 14 for 43 against Tonbridge. This year's captain is Haycock and he will have the assistance of West, Peppercorn, Underwood and Large.

Though Biundell's lost five matches, drew four, and won only two, there existed no reason for dissatisfaction with the results, for the side were young. They gained a splendid victory at Sherborne by 70 runs, lost to Downside at Tiverton by eleven runs and Taunton by just one run. Beach, a very reliable all-rounder, and Peirce were the mainstays of the side and should do well this year. Against Downside they made between them 87 of the total of 111. Beach took four wickets cheaply at Sherborne and Williams played an excellent innings of 50. With Williams, B. A. Smith, Sutcliffe, McGregor, Peirce and Beach available, the outlook for 1936 is promising.

Rossali were a poor side, for of their thirteen matches they lost eight and drew the other five. The chief weakness lay in the outcricket. The fielding fell below the usual standard, and with the exception of Heaton, a promising young left-hander, the bowling was weak. Walker made the most of his team, but his own batting became very cramped. Sharp, the most consistent run-getter, showed a delightful variety of strokes. He and Maconchy brought about a fine recovery in the second innings against Shrewsbury. The prospects for this summer are brighter, for seven old colours are staying, and the Colts did not suffer a defeat last season.

Mainly because of the wet weather, Radley had a disappointing season. As soon as the warm sun came at the end of June, they put up several good performances which included convincing victories over Westminster and a strong Free Foresters team. Rain ruined the Lancing and Bradfield matches; the school had the better of a drawn match against Stowe and lost at Sherborne by five wickets. A young side, they should have gained experience. Willcocks, a good wicket-keeper, will have the following old colours to help him this year:—Birks and Falkiner, both of whom show great promise, Stavert, Wilson and Cranston.

Although there were seven old colours left, **Stowe** did not do as well as expected. A succession of wet wickets caused loss of strokes and confidence. Clive again showed himself a useful opening

batsman; Mallett scored a brilliant century in the first match but was strangely unsuccessful afterwards and Krabbé made a couple of fast hundreds. Langley was the mainstay of the side, and though he constantly had to bat with things going badly, he always scored quickly and revealed a number of wristy strokes, including a beautiful drive in front of the covers. The team lacked steadiness in the centre of the batting and the loss of form of Buchanan and Goldschmidt was a tragedy. Mallett managed the steady bowling well. Robinson was successful to start with, Stevens, a late discovery, proved a real find; he could make the ball do something either way, Walter, Buchanan, Goldschmidt and Lynch-Staunton all had their days. The real strength of the eleven lay in the field, with Spencer a most efficient, and at times brilliant, wicket-keeper. Clive a dependable slip, and Langley, Goldschmidt and Krabbé first-class anywhere. Langley, Lynch-Staunton, Spencer and Walter (colours) and Stevens, Robinson and Sherrard will probably be available this year.

Oundle had every reason to feel satisfied with their season's cricket, three of the four school matches being won. Leys were defeated by 220 runs, Bedford by 56, and Stowe by 29, the last-named after a most exciting two days at the Oval. A low-scoring match with Uppingham resulted in defeat by four wickets. Stuart, the captain, was the best all-round cricketer Oundle have had for many years. He scored 820 runs and took 44 wickets at a cost of 15 apiece. Cowen, and Ling, a useful hitter, were the other chief run-getters, with Llewellyn, fast medium, Adkins and Martin the most successful bowlers. Marment was the best wicket-keeper turned out by the school for some time, with Maw outstanding in a brilliant fielding side. Llewellyn is captain this year, and Cowen, Butler and Martin are also staying on.

St. Edwards had an eminently successful season, winning 11 of the 17 matches played, including all the school matches against Bromsgrove, Eastbourne, Campbell College and Canadian Schools. For the second year Dixon, the captain, and Reid opened the innings, and to that partnership, which averaged between 50 and 60, belonged much of the success. Three new bowlers in Henderson, mediumright, Godley, fast-right, and Farrar, slow-left, were discovered. Greaves, Little, Henderson and Godley of last season's colours, remain for 1936.

Sedbergh won nine of their thirteen matches, drew two—very much in their favour—and lost two, both owing to the presence of a first-class bowler in the other side. The best victory was, undoubtedly, that over the Authentics, who brought three Blues, including N. S. Mitchell-Innes, and went down by five wickets.

Sedbergh beat Ampleforth by nine wickets, Durham by 80 runs, Rossall by 113 runs, and drew with Stonyhurst, who, with one wicket to fall, required 76 to win. The great strength of the side lay in the four bowlers, who attacked the wicket without bowling on the leg side at all. Balfour Paul (31 wickets for 10.3 each) was the most accurate, but Cockcroft, Eyre and Grieve all did their share, and the fact that between them they took 122 wickets, with averages varying from 10 to 16, speaks for itself. A very dry May contributed largely to the improvement in the batting. Watson, who headed the averages, is still very young, and his batting shows the highest promise. He was supported by a good many sound players who are learning to attack the bowling, particularly on the off-side. Seven of the eleven remain for this year, when Balfour Paul will be captain. The others staying on are Macpherson, Kininmonth, Watson, Scott, Eyre and Cowdy.

Mill Hill enjoyed great success and, without suffering a reverse, won nine of their twelve matches, beating Felsted, Berkhamsted, Highgate, Dulwich, Aldenham, Cranleigh and Leys and sharing in a drawn game with St. Paul's. Murray-Wood, the captain, had most to do with the success, and received able support from the rest of the team, Gotch in particular playing some very fine innings, including a century against Dulwich, on which occasion Murray-Wood took eight wickets for 21. Murray-Wood, a spin bowler, also distinguished himself against the Army at Lord's. He finished the school season with the remarkable record of 61 wickets at an average cost of just over 9, and scored 582 runs, including two centuries. There will be five old colours left for this year—Young (captain), Dean, Fracis, Knight and Kirk.

Felsted were a good side, winning nine matches, drawing three and losing only to Mill Hill School and Notts Amateurs. For this they had to thank D. M. Matthews, the captain, one of the best all-round school cricketers of the year. He scored 895 runs, including four centuries, for an average of 73.50, the highest yet recorded at the school, was a very useful medium pace change bowler-he took seven wickets for 44 against Mill Hill—and a brilliant fieldsman. Unfortunately he could not accept the invitation of the M.C.C. to play at Lord's. He scored 168 against Highgate School and 110 not out against Old Felstedians, but his best performance was 127 when with Cavalier (115) he put on over 200 for the first wicket against M.C.C.'s 292 for four declared and enabled the school to win by five wickets. Apart from the batting of Matthews, the school owed much to the consistent bowling of Bullough and May, who between them took over 50 wickets at an average cost of just over 11 runs. Sugden will captain the eleven this season and probably three other colours, including Cavalier, will be left.

With seven old colours staying on, **Downside** might have been expected to do well, but the results were indifferent. They won two of the three school matches, but the breakdown against the powerful Sherborne eleven was most disappointing. In batting, only Turnbull justified expectations, but much is expected of Pollen, a left-hander, and Addington, both of whom impressed so favourably at Lord's two years ago. In bowling the eleven was distinctly good after the admirable coaching of Jack Mercer. Turnbull was the most successful of the five, but Bell and Smith, the opening pair, always cleared the way. Hemming maintained the tradition of wicket-keeping at Downside and very good fielding provided great encouragement to the bowlers. Addington, Masters, Pollen Turnbull and Hemming are available for this summer.

Canford's record, if not so impressive as in 1934, was quite satisfactory, all the school matches being won, with the eight wickets victory over Taunton the best performance. Phillips made an excellent captain, but Yeomans and Whelon did best work in batting. The main share of the attack fell upon Savage, a medium-paced right-hander, and Yorke-Long, a colt, showed promise. Black worried many opening batsmen with his pace and Taylor, though expensive, got some wickets with leg-breaks. Whelon was an efficient wicket-keeper. The outlook for this year must be considered bright, as Yeomans (captain), Whelon, Black, Savage, Yorke-Long, Murphy and Steed, a left-hand batsman, remain.

Brighton, with seven matches lost, 4 drawn, and only 2 won, experienced their worst season for some years. The side were young and the main weakness lay in the bowling, but as most of the bowlers will be available for 1936, the prospects are brighter. In school matches Dulwich were beaten, and drawn games played with Lancing and St. Paul's, while Epsom and Christ's Hospital won by narrow margins. Of the batsmen, Hobson, was the most consistent, possessing an adequate defence and never being afraid to hit a half-volley. His highest score of 92 was made against Sussex Club and Ground, whose bowlers included Wensley and Pearce. He was the best bowler, too, and Braybon and Wallace-Cox, left-hand, showed promise. The fielding was always good, and on occasions brilliant; Ward's wicket-keeping, at its best, reached the high standard set by W. H. Levett and C. R. Maxwell.

The start of the **Bedford** season was depressing, the first four matches being lost owing to deplorably had bowling, but Emmer, right hand medium, rose to the occasion and he took 59 wickets for $17\frac{1}{2}$ runs each. The batting depended largely on the steadiness of August, who opened the innings, and the solidity of Panton, the captain. August, in a class by himself, scored nearly 700 runs,

including centuries against the Butterflies and Dulwich. P. H. Cook, this year's captain, lost his form after half term; the remainder of the side all did well at times. The St. Paul's and Leys matches ended in decisive wins, Dulwich just managed to avoid defeat and Oundle won by 55 runs. In these four matches Emmer took 22 wickets for 227 runs. He received support from A. E. Cook, a colt, who should develop into a good spin bowler. The fielding was in and out, but Panton set a fine example, Holladay kept wicket really well, and Donovan held some brilliant catches in the slips. In addition to P. H. Cook, there remain August and his opening partner, Donovan, A. E. Cook, Milman, Holladay and Blackburn.

Merchant Taylors, in common with so many schools nowadays, had to rely on a young eleven and had a poor season. The batting was uncertain, but the failures were largely due to the inexperience of the players, many of whom have at least one more season at school. The bowling was probably better than it has been for some years, and the fielding at times very good, the Taylors usually being able to dismiss their opponents cheaply. Kettle will be captain this year and Roper is the only other colour remaining, but several who played for the eleven are available.

With an exceptionally young and inexperienced side, **Cranlzigh** lost eight and won only one of their fourteen matches, but as seven of the team are staying on, they should do better this year. They showed good promise against the Old Boys, whom they dismissed for 147, H. R. Heard and Stevens putting on 60 for the sixth wicket. Hill and Skinner both bowled well and Jeans and Brinjes enabled the school to win by one wicket. Epsom won an exciting struggle by eight runs. Brinjes (captain), Hill, Skinner, Ward, Daniel, Turner and Hughes remain for 1936.

The season at **Epsom** was, as far as results went, not too good. Of the five school matches, those with Brighton, Cranleigh and Merchant Taylors ended in victories and those against K. C. S., Wimbledon and Leatherhead resulted in defeats. The fixture list included a number of strong sides and none of these games were won. The bowling, though steady, lacked variety, real pace being badly needed. The fielding was excellent; the batting most erratic. Evans, the most successful run-getter, put together a century against the R.A.S.C., and played through the innings. The colours remaining are Darbyshire (captain), McVail, Hubble and Thompson. Johnstone is also available.

Bromsgrove, with seven of the most promising players left from the previous year, hardly fulfilled expectations, there being a

definite weakness in bowling while the batting was never consistent. Two inter-school matches were won, and three lost. Brazier made several useful scores, but otherwise no batsman could claim any particular merit. T. L. G. Jones, who will captain the side, is a slow spin bowler who should do well this summer. Kay, Green, Hake, and Hewitt are also returning.

Durham had a poor season, losing seven matches, including four against schools, drawing three and winning only two. The failure of Scott, the captain, and Bailey, the wicket-keeper, to reproduce, in the earlier matches, the batting form shown the previous year, resulted in a bad start from which the team never recovered. The best performance of the term was a victory over a strong scratch side brought by C. L. Townsend and including D. C. H. Townsend. Thanks to Buttle (8 for 26) the visitors were dismissed on a drying wicket for 63, and the school scored 141 for two wickets, Scott, Buttle and Bailey batting confidently. With Bailey, who played a good innings of 70 against the Old Dunelmians, Buttle, a very promising all-round cricketer, and Hall remaining, the side should do better this year.

King Edward's, Birmingham, were unfortunate, for, with the exception of Seymour, none of the batsmen succeeded in touching their form of 1934. Early failures doubtless accounted for a general lack of confidence, accentuated by the weather conditions, but there was too much concentration on defence and a consequent lack of stroke-play. The bowling never rose above a moderate standard, and, like the batting, was deficient in enterprise and attacking power. This season's captain will be Twiss, who will have the services of Ansell, Downes and Freeman.

Berkhamsted lost the three cricketers, Pennington, Woodford and Campbell, who had been the mainstay of the side for the two preceding years, and started last summer without great hopes. The results at the beginning of term were not very encouraging, but as the eleven gained confidence and experience, the standard of play advanced and at the end gave promise of success in 1936, when the following eight colours will be available: Dix (captain), Salter, Bell, Peper, Emery, Hart, Campbell and Dixon. Only ten colours were awarded last year.

In winning six of their seven school matches, **Beaumont** may be said to have enjoyed a good season. They beat Imperial Service College, K. C. S., Wimbledon, Leatherhead, Douai, Reading and Oratory; rain prevented a decision in the match against Eton Upper Club. The average rate of run-getting in inter-school games was never less than a hundred an hour. The bowling of Cooper-Key

formed the feature of the season. In the six completed school games, he took 34 wickets for less than 5 runs apiece—including 7 for 33 against Leatherhead and 6 for 17 at Lord's against Oratory. McNiven, the captain and the most finished batsman, was ably supported by Girkins and by Cussen, a hard-hitting batsman of 15 years. The fielding was good and Seward kept wicket well. Chamberlain, captain, Cussen, Burden and Goldsmith, old colours, in addition to Brown, Pace and Hetreed, are returning.

Oratory suffered because of lack of experience, but they have nine old colours left for 1936. They won five matches but lost eight and did well to beat strong sides in the Bachelors and the Old Boys. After a heavy day in the field, the batting broke down at Lord's in the annual match against Beaumont. Botting, who headed the averages, was the only batsman to show real confidence, though Warren-Codrington, the captain, struck his form in a fine century against the Old Boys and bowled very well throughout the term, capturing 46 wickets for under 18 runs apiece, Comnaughton, a slow spinner, should do really well this year. Botting will captain the side and can call upon Coulston, Hamel-Smith, Hurford-Jones, Bodenham. ffennell-Smith, Connaughton, Reynolds and Pettit.

St. Peter's season started in wintry weather, the opening match at York and that against Worksop being abandoned in hail and rain. Of the 14 matches played, four were won, five drawn, and five lost. The side performed best against Ampleforth and Durham. Lockwood played a fine innings of 70 in the Ampleforth game and Baines hit up 62 in twenty minutes against Durham. Baines, who did some big hitting and scored over 500 runs, Lockwood, a left-hander, Stead, who played for the Young Amateurs at Lord's, Newman, the captain, and Tyson all played good innings, and Stephenson was the most successful bowler. The Jubilee bat presented by the famous old Peterite, the late Frank Mitchell, to the player showing most improvement was won by Lockwood. Smart kept wicket consistently throughout the season.

Those competent to judge consider the 1935 eleven to be perhaps the strongest **Giggleswick** has ever turned out. Eight matches were won, two drawn, and two lost—one to St. Bees by three runs. Victories were gained over Durham, St. Peter's, Leeds, and Skipton and the school also beat the Craven Gentlemen in an exciting finish. Getting over 200 runs in 150 minutes, they won a minute before time by three wickets. Abbs, Rowland and Marshall all batted very well indeed. Abbs, the mainstay of the bowling, fully merited his place in the Young Amateurs side at Lord's. Prospects for this year are very bright, as eight of the eleven are available, including Abbs and Marshall, and Foster, a promising bat and fast bowler.

St. Bees had a satisfactory season, for which much of the credit must be given to Smith (G. C.) the new coach. The side found their true form in June, gaining decisive victories over Giggleswick, Old St. Beghians, Workington and a strong Craven Gentlemen side. Akam. who headed the bowling table, gave consistently good displays throughout the term, and Pickavance and Henderson bowled well on occasion. Cowen, the most successful batsman, scored over 400 runs for an average of 33—a fine performance on the slow Cumberland wickets. It is hoped to strengthen the fixture-list this year, as the standard of cricket throughout the school now justifies the change. Cowen, Akam, Kempston and Pickavance should form the nucleus of a good side.

The **Stonyhurst** Eleven fell below expectation, but they were young and inexperienced. The school should do better this year. The bowling was good and the medium-paced off-spinners of Coupland—one of the features of the term's cricket—accounted for 53 wickets at an average of 10.13. St. Lawrence was outstanding and, scoring 463 runs, proved himself an ideal opening batsman, twice playing through the innings. Edridge also did good work. Rossall were beaten, thanks to a fine bowling performance by Coupland, who took seven wickets for 13 runs, and drawn games played with Sedbergh and Giggleswick. Murphy, captain, is the only full colour left, but Moreton, Kershaw, McQuaid, Storey and Holt, half-colours, should be useful.

Wrekin won six matches, drew five, and lost five, and so had cause for satisfaction. Dove, Crabtree (captain), Wood and Brown were the most successful rungetters and Blythe enjoyed a very good first season as opening batsman. Brown and Milnes bore the burden of a not very formidable attack; the fielding was good, Dove again setting a brilliant example at cover point. Unfortunately not a ball could be bowled in the Free Foresters match. Brown will captain the side this year and the only other old colour will be Wood. Ramsden, who played several times and has great possibilities as a spin-bowler, is also available.

Leatherhead could look with pleasure upon their record, for they beat Epsom, Imperial Service College and Whitgift, had the best of a draw with K. C. S., Wimbledon and lost only to Beaumont. The feature of the season was the spin bowling of J. L. C. Jones, who beat his own school record of the previous year by taking 61 wickets at 13.44 apiece. He received admirable support from Saunders, who always kept the batsmen playing. Senst and Chalmers, the captain, proved a steady opening pair and Coles and Southgate could usually be relied upon to score quickly. The school played sporting cricket and always tried to obtain a definite result, only

three matches being drawn. Saunders will captain the side but Mitchell is the only other colour left, though Hughes and Whitehead, who played a good deal, still remain.

Oakham won five of their twelve matches and lost three. Taylor, the captain, headed the batting figures with an aggregate of 451 at an average of 50. During five years in the eleven, he has scored nearly 2,000 runs. Fast-medium right, he, with Dunn, a late discovery, as a slow spinner, did most work in bowling. Baggaley kept wicket soundly and played several useful innings. Pope, who should make many runs, and Castello, another promising batsman, are the only old colours left.

The hopes that the young Rydal eleven of 1934 would develop into a real team in 1935 were amply fulfilled, five matches being won seven drawn, and only one—the last—lost. Burton, Griffiths, Littler, Howarth and Wooller were all well above the average as batsmen, so that few of the rest had to play many serious innings and often threw away their wickets in an endeavour to score quickly. Parker looked the most dangerous bowler. Above medium pace, he swung the ball either way and Costain and Littler gave him excellent support, Jenkinson, leg-breaks, providing a useful change. Downes, the captain, was first-class behind the wicket and the fielding excellent all round. He will captain the side again, and Costain, Wooller, Howarth, Radcliffe and Parsons are also available.

With seven old colours left and bright prospects, University College School were dogged by misfortune. Captain for the second year, Wreford, upon whom so much depended, could play only three times but with luck most of the defeats might have been turned into victories. The bowling showed a great improvement, Drury, who still has a tendency to over bowl when being hit, finishing a very successful season with an average of just over 10. The batting did not rise to expectations and lacked Wreford's influence. Campbell again kept wicket well and Suttill improved vastly in all departments. Wreford is expected to lead the side for the third year and will have the assistance of Beverley, Drakeford, Warnock, Rees, and possibly Drury.

Trent experienced a moderate season, winning two and losing two of the four school matches. The batting was quite good but poor bowling and weak fielding continually let the school down. Several members made good scores, notably Clark, 72 (not out) v. Repton 2nd XI, and 57 (not out) v. Derbyshire Friars; Richards, 81 (not out) v. Worksop, and Sellers, 62 v. Old Tridents. Sellers, a beautiful field and very good bat, was the outstanding player and Pallett, a capital all-rounder. The best players remaining are R. M. Whitty, P. J. Whitty and Griffiths.

Wellingborough had only two old colours and took some time to find the best available team. Fourteen matches were played, three being won—those against Trent College, M.C.C., and Leicestershire Gentlemen—six lost, and five drawn. Cherrington was easily the best batsman, but Turnbull, the captain, failed to find his form until the very end of the season. The six regular bowlers, all of whom could keep a length, were backed up by good, and at times brilliant fielding.

Whitgift disappointed, although, in actual figures, the results—won six, drawn four, lost four—reached the average. On the only occasion upon which the eleven showed their true form, they gained a decisive victory over Christ's Hospital. Bangs proved the most consistent bowler, but there were no outstanding batting performances. The problem of finding a wicket-keeper remained unsolved to the end of the season. The only colours left are Bangs and Dubois.

Worksop enjoyed a highly successful season, defeating Wellingborough, Mount St. Mary's and Oakham and playing an even drawn game with Trent. They also beat Yorkshire Gentlemen by 20 runs, and Notts Amateurs by seven wickets. Against Yorkshire Gentlemen, Rennie, the captain, played a great innings of 181. He also made a century against Sheffield Collegiate College and scored 790 runs in all. He bore the burden of the bowling and took 36 wickets for 17.63 runs apiece. Martyn will captain the side this year and Dudley, Harvey, Coleman and McConnell are also returning.

Bromsgrove, with seven of the most promising players left from the previous year, scarcely fulfilled expectations, there being definite weakness in bowling while the batting lacked consistency. Two inter-school matches were won and three lost. Brazier made several useful scores, but otherwise no batsman possessed any particular merit. T. L. Gethin-Jones, who will captain the side, is a promising slow spin bowler and should do well this season. Key, Green, Hake, and Hewitt will also be available.

Dover played thirteen matches, winning four, drawing two and losing seven. Only Parsons and Barrett remained from the previous season and not until the third week in June did the eleven strike form. Two of the school matches were won, those with King's Canterbury and Cranbrook, two lost, and one, against St. Edward's, drawn. Among batsmen who did consistently well were the opening pair, Dawes, who for a boy of 14, showed concentration and coolness beyond his years, and Howard, a player with a good eye for a lose ball and a fine pair of wrists. Parsons (left hand) and Wass we the chief bowlers, March, a slow spinner, and Marley, left hand, providing useful changes. Only March and Dyke have left and Parsons will have eight other old colours at his command this year.

King's, Canterbury, with five matches won, four drawn, and four lost, might be well satisfied with the result of the season, for two of the defeats were by narrow margins at the hands of club sides. There were only three old colours left and the feature of the term was the consistent batting of Gower, the captain, who also developed into a sound wicket-keeper. He scored four centuries and three fifties. The weakness of the team was in bowling, which entirely depended on Lovelace and Hayes, both of whom proved reliable. Armstrong became a steady opening batsman and Townsend also strongthened the side. Prospects for this year are bright, as Gower probably will be staying to lead the side again and he will have the support of Armstrong, Hayes, Townsend, Pemberton, Beale, Fletcher, and several promising members of the second eleven.

The season at St. Lawrence proved much more successful than had at first been expected. Six matches were won, five lost, and one drawn. Of the schools, Douai, Berkhamsted and Sutton Valence were beaten and the eleven lost narrowly to King's Canterbury, and St. Edmund's. Towards the end of term, Monk, Vicary, Melville-Jackson and Sharpe batted consistently. Monk, a very able wicket-keeper and a sound captain, often managed his bowling astutely. In Colley and Gardner, the school possessed two reliable bowlers, and as they both have two more years at school, they should form the foundation of good sides. Colley (captain), Vicary, Gardner, Melville-Jackson, Clarke, Gilbert and Cornish are left for this year.

D. E. Young, who will captain K. C. S., Wimbledon for the third year, was largely responsible for what success came the way of the eleven. He made his share of runs, including 90 against Incogniti, took, with his slow spinners, 38 wickets for under 14 runs apiece, and was easily the best fieldsman on the side. Gaining a travelling scholarship, he left for Italy at the end of June, and so missed the later matches. Dickinson, a promising wicket-keeper who distinguished himself for the Young Surrey Amateurs in the holidays, and should have two more years in the eleven, headed the averages and was the most consistent batsman. S. G. Wise scored over 400 runs and took 21 wickets with his fast-medium bowling. Of the sixteen matches, five, including Epsom and King's Canterbury, were won, seven drawn, and four lost, that with Berkhamsted by nine wickets. In addition to Young, the old colours remaining are Camp, D. A. Wise, Ionsdale, Allaire, Dickinson and Dann.

Of fifteen matches on the card, Eastbourne won four, lost four, drew five, and had two abandoned on account of rain. In school matches, they beat Christ's Hospital by five runs and drew with Lancing and King's Canterbury. They lacked effective bowling, but Sewell showed good form with the bat all through the season, and

Jackson also did very well. This year the side will be led by Craib, with four other old colours to help him.

The Highgate season was on the whole satisfactory. Four of the sixteen matches ended successfully, five were lost, and seven drawn. There were two outstanding features—consistently fine fielding and the batting of Tucker and Webb, who went in first together on thirteen occasions and put up over 100 four times, their average stand for the first wicket being 64. Barlow headed the bowling averages with 44 wickets at a cost of less than 14 runs each. In school matches Highgate beat Cranleigh, lost to Mill Hill and drew with Aldenham, Felsted, and King's Canterbury. This year's captain is Tucker and the other remaining colours will be Webb, Monk, Scott and Middleton, and possibly Ellerm.

Left with only three old colours King's, Bruton took some time to settle down. The batting, never consistent, improved all through the team as the term went on. Trestrail and Hebden, upon whom most of the bowling fell, were steady throughout, but they received little help. With the following eight old colours left, they should do better this season: Hebden (captain), McMorland, Strickland, Holland, Sladen, Crutwell, Gyles and Lindsay.

Though heavily defeated by Beaumont, the Imperial Service College, again a young side, did fairly well. They lost to Leatherhead by 22 runs, Holland (48) and Petre putting on 58 in a gallant last wicket stand; rain robbed them of a win against M.C.C., Buckland playing a good innings of 58, and a sound 95 by Havers enabled them to force a good draw with Brav. The following eight colours are left: Holmes (captain), Ford, Holland, Havers, Evelegh, Bass, Scott and Collier.

Kingswood, who owed much to their bowling, played eleven matches, winning eight, losing two, and drawing one. The captain, G. S. Parker, headed the batting averages, and Saunders, the vice-captain was a useful all-rounder. D. K. Parker, who took thirty wickets for 4.46 apiece, including six for 10 against the Wiltshire Regiment, and Lund, a sound batsmen, are again available; the former will captain the side.

King's Rochester, had their best season since 1927, winning seven games, drawing four, and losing three. J. A. Glay, a slashing left-hand bat and somewhat erratic fast bowler, dangerous with the new ball, headed both sets of averages, but the success of the side was due to the eleven as a whole rather than to any individual. Nine of the best eleven averaged double figures, and four bowlers each took 23 wickets or more, Wright topping the list with 41 at a cost of less than 12 runs apiece. Clay took 23 for under 11, Thomas

26 for 12.38 and England 23 for 12.48. One secret of the success was that the side went all out for victory.

The Ampleforth eleven were strong in bowling, good in the field, but seriously deficient in batting which, however, improved towards the end of term. The outstanding performances were the defeat of Yorkshire Gentlemen in an innings and a victory over Durham School by three runs—a result brought about by a fine display of determined bowling and fielding. Walter, who ably carried out the duties of captain, was an ideal opening batsman, sound in defence, with an eye for a loose ball. Dalglish, this year's captain and D. K. Wells, were the most successful bowlers, both gluttons for work, and Fairhurst trained into an efficient wicket-keeper. Redfern and Mitchell, the latter of whom might develop into a hard-hitting left-hand batsman and fast bowler, played several times, but did not get their colours.

Douai, with only four of the 1934 eleven and few of the second eleven available, developed into a really excellent side. Pooley, the captain, played some remarkably good forcing innings, and Cooper, McNair and O'Brien could generally be relied upon. Player, very young, gave evidence of a promising future in his few appearances. Cooper and Walsh were the chief bowlers, and Pooley a useful change. Cooper with his good length and cleverly flighted off-breaks, and Walsh, with slow left hand leg-spinners, generally dismissed opponents for small scores. With the following eight members again available, it is hoped to see one of the strongest teams the school has produced: McNair (captain), Cooper, Walsh, Sweeney, Gartrell, Nicoll, Player and Devitt.

Undefeated in School matches and losing only to M.C.C., Edinburgh Academy did splendidly. Much of their success was due to the all round ability of the captain, Bruce-Lockhart, who played for Warwickshire 2nd XI in the holidays. He scored over 800 runs and captured 57 wickets. In batting he received most support from Norman, a sound wicket-keeper, and Bonner, but most of the eleven could make runs. The bowling, though rather limited, achieved some remarkable successes, particularly against Glenalmond. In addition to Glenalmond, the Academy beat Fettes, Loretto and Watson's, and played a draw with Merchiston. Bonner will captain the side this year and Cosh, Kerr, Swan, Bell-Scott and Henderson are returning.

Merchiston Castle, a steady all-round team, were fortunate in having, in Harper, a fine captain and wicket-keeper. W. W. Yellowlees, D. Yellowlees and Farnie were the mainstays of the batting and Cowley and Herd bowled successfully throughout the season. Herd will captain the 1936 eleven and W. W. Yellowlees

and Farnie (full colour), Forster, D. Yellowlees and Ballantyne (half colours) will be with him.

ETON V. HARROW.

Played at Lord's, Friday, Saturday, July 12, 13.—Although Eton and Harrow, in turn, each looked like bringing about a definite result, the match was left drawn. Chief honours went to Harrow, who after effecting a praiseworthy recovery, thanks almost entirely to a hundred by their captain, P.M. Studd, made a valiant bid for victory and were clearly on top when stumps were finally pulled up. Indeed, Eton finished fighting hard to avoid defeat.

The unhappy record of not having lowered Eton's colours for 27 years may have weighed heavily on the minds of the Harrow players when the match commenced, for on winning the toss they lost three men for 20 runs, but after Wilson and Stogdon had checked the threatened collapse, Joynson came to the rescue with a most confident and enterprising innings. At the outset the pitch appeared to be on the slow side, but Rees-Davies, the fast bowler, whose easy action looked smilar to that of another Etonian in G.O. Allen of Middlesex, maintained a very quick pace and received fine support from his colleagues whose catching reached quite a high standard.

The total stood at 16 when Harrow's first wicket fell, a ball which scarcely rose from the pitch accounting for Carris, and off the next Turnbull was caught at first slip. With four runs added, Studd was taken by surprise when a ball, pitched outside the off broke and removed the middle stump. In the course of next eighty minutes the fortunes of Harrow changed and Wilson and Stogdon added 90, but despite their valuable work seven wickets were down for 134 at lunch time. After the interval Joynson and Duveen mastered the bowling, increasing the score by 71 runs. Of fine physique, Joynson used his long reach to get to the pitch of the ball and he hit hard in front of the wicket. One stroke for six cleared the ring on the Tavern side and when ninth to leave he had made 68 out of 109 in an hour and three-quarters and hit eight 4's. The last pair, Bond and Whetherly, also drove freely. After lunch, Rees-Davies lost his length, but, nevertheless, had the good record of five wickets for just over 13 runs apiece.

Going in shortly after half past four, Eton lost F. G. Mann and Jackson for 23, but like Harrow they atoned for a poor start, Dickson and Macindoe defying the attack for eighty-five minutes in a stand which realised 76. Their separation was unfortunate, for in attempting to run a bye they met and hesitated in the middle of the pitch and Macindoe, under the impression that he was out, made his way towards the pavilion. He was recalled and Dickson was given out. Following this incident, J. P. Mann batted steadily for three-quarters of an hour and when stumps were pulled up at seven o'clock the total had reached 138 for five wickets.

The next day, Kerrison and Cassavetti revealed considerable freedom in a sixth wicket stand of 73, and Collins and Fisher both batting well, Eton gained

a lead of 49 runs. When Harrow went in again Rees-Davics maintained an excellent pace and caused the ball to rise awkwardly, but though three wickets fell for 25 runs, Harrow faced a crisis with boldness. Studd took the chief honours for a praiseworthy recovery. Just after the deficit had been cleared off he might have been caught at square leg and he enjoyed narrow escapes of stumping and run-out, but otherwise his innings was admirable. By vigorous off-driving and leg-hitting, which brought him the majority of his sixteen 4's, he scored 100 in two hours fifty minutes and having achieved this feat he promptly declared.

Studd set Eton to get 156 in 105 minutes. As Eton had not lost for 27 years a lot of people considered they should have risked defeat and gone wholeheartedly for the runs. They preferred instead to play for safety, but though the pitch showed no more than the normal wear, they lost half their wickets in an hour for 48 runs. All the while F. G. Mann defended stubbornly, and Cassavetti, missed at the wicket while the position was still critical, helped him to place Eton out of any danger. Mann's dismissal provided another strange incident. He played a ball from Duveen just in front of him, and when it came to rest tapped it back to save the wicket-keeper the trouble of fetching it. The wicket-keeper, however, did not take the ball which hit the stumps and on appeal, Mann was given out. Collins stayed with Cassavetti until the end. Harrow bowled and fielded with the utmost keenness and Kaye, who bowling medium pace, took nine wickets in the match, made the new ball swing and also imparted an off-break.

Of the 106 matches played, Eton have won 42, Harrow 35, and 29 have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857 which has been rejected.

The one-day matches between the two schools during the War are not reckoned as belonging to the regular series.
