

PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1938

Once more it has to be reported that the batting at the Public Schools was considerably better than the bowling. This statement is supported by the great preponderance of drawn games over definite results and applies particularly to the first week of the Lord's fortnight.

The words of Lieut.-Col. Rait Kerr:—"If you can do something to encourage promising boys to think of accuracy instead of flight and swing bowling, I think bowling would show some improvement, even with present-day wickets," might well be taken to heart at the schools.

There were some really fine bats seen during 1938 and I would confidently pick out R. B. Proud (Winchester), R. A. A. Holt (Harrow), C. W. S. Lubbock (Charterhouse), A. C. Shirreff (Dulwich), C. J. H. Paget (Cheltenham), G. E. Fletcher (Marlborough), N. M. Mischler (St. Paul's), C. W. G. Walker (Magdalen College School), P. G. C. Wood (Tonbridge), P. J. Dickinson (K.C.S., Wimbledon) and C. L. Oakley (Bedford) as likely to make good in cricket of a higher class.

Proud had a wonderful week at Lord's and his 102 in 48 minutes for The Rest against Lord's Schools was a magnificent effort. That he was not a mere slogger he proved in his innings of 96 against The Army in which he showed very strong defence. Though not successful at Lord's, either against Eton or The Rest, Holt made a lot of runs and his hundred in each innings against Charterhouse was a great performance. Lubbock and Shirreff did excellent all-round work. Fletcher's 78 against Rugby and his 94 not out for Lord's Schools were grand and patient displays.

Paget played an innings of 140 of the highest class for Cheltenham against Haileybury; Walker produced some delightful cricket for The Rest and Dickinson, though not quite so successful as in the two previous years, gave promise of developing into a valuable all-rounder. Mischler and Oakley each made more than a thousand runs for his school and Mischler kept wicket reasonably well. Wood, despite an unlucky season at Tonbridge, played cricket at Lord's suggesting that in a few years he should become really good.

J. A. Crompton (Charterhouse), W. A. W. St. George (Haileybury), J. A. A. Morton (Highgate), D. G. Lacy-Scott

(Marlborough), D. H. Burrow (Denstone), C. P. Payne (Oundle), C. D. Earle (Stowe), P. B. K. Gracey (Wellington) and J. R. Bridger, A. Kershaw and L. G. H. Hingley, all of Rugby, did enough to suggest distinct possibilities. Hingley, in particular, who has two more seasons at Rugby, might become exceptionally good.

Lubbock and Shirreff were probably the best bowlers. A. T. G. Groves (Shrewsbury) took a lot of wickets. D. G. W. Yeats Brown, the Tonbridge captain, was very effective with slow leg-breaks against Clifton. Kershaw, slow left, showed skill, and the Rugby captain, Bridger, got wickets with his slow rights delivered with a peculiar action.

W. H. D. Dunnett, yet another Rugbeian, struck me as approaching high class—genuinely fast for a schoolboy and dangerous at the start of an innings. His 6 for 29 and 3 for 36 against Marlborough stood out as the best bowling seen at Lord's and it is a little difficult to understand why, in view of the paucity of bowlers, he was not selected against The Rest. I shall be surprised, if, next year, he is not one of the most difficult bowlers in the schools.

J. H. G. Deighton came up to Lord's from Denstone with some phenomenal bowling performances to his credit. Reasonably fast with an easy action, he did little, probably because of meeting batsmen of a higher class than hitherto. He played with some success for the Lancashire Second Eleven and might well develop.

A singular dearth of good wicket-keepers was relieved by N. T. Fiennes, of Eton, also a fair bat. The fielding hardly reached the high standard expected from the schools and bad mistakes discounted clear chances of victory, notably in the Cheltenham—Haileybury match when a player who eventually reached his century was dropped no fewer than seven times.

THE LORD'S FORTNIGHT

Only two of the six matches played during the Lord's fortnight, had a definite conclusion—Clifton v. Tonbridge and Young Amateurs v. Young Professionals.

Tonbridge won by eight wickets and there was never any question that they were the better of two moderate sides. The Clifton batting was deplorably unenterprising. Not one player attempted to go for a not very hostile attack. At the end of the first innings Tonbridge led by 34 runs—and any hope that Clifton would redeem themselves was soon dispelled. D. G. W. Yeats Brown, the Tonbridge captain, set fairly obvious leg-traps into

which the batsmen obligingly fell. Tonbridge treated lightly the job of getting 90, P. G. C. Wood and P. Pettman, who both did well in the first innings, hitting off the runs after two wickets had fallen cheaply.

Haileybury came up with the reputation of being a good fielding side but nullified their chance of victory over Cheltenham by missing many catches. D. C. Brooke-Taylor, 116, was dropped no fewer than seven times. Considering the perfect wicket, Cheltenham did well to get rid of Haileybury for 282; R. D. Jupp played a bright innings of 50. Cheltenham, thanks to errors in the field, were able to declare at 459 for 8, C. J. H. Paget playing delightful cricket for 140 and receiving able assistance from a most promising youngster, R. J. E. Mayers—65 not out. Haileybury knocked off the deficit of 177 with the loss of two wickets, W. A. St. George, 89, and W. J. H. Shephard, 54, both not out, getting right on top of the bowling.

A splendid 153 hit in about three hours by the Rugby captain, J. R. Bridger, and useful innings of 53 and 63 by L. G. H. Hingley and H. C. Munro, gave Rugby the respectable total of 347 against Marlborough and some very good fast bowling by W. H. D. Dunnett, who took 6 wickets for 29, got the Wiltshire school out for 207. A wonderfully patient innings of 78 by the Marlborough captain, G. E. Fletcher, saved his side from an innings defeat and Rugby were left to get 78 in forty minutes. They went bravely for the runs, but D. G. Lacy-Scott and G. J. Redfearn bowled so steadily and well that five wickets were down for 33 when time was up. One of the most remarkable fields ever set in a school match was seen in Marlborough's first innings when Dunnett had seven men on the leg-side, five of them crowding close to the batsman, and only two on the off.

CONTRASTS IN SCORING

The batting proved much too strong for the bowling in the Lord's Schools v. The Rest match. After free hitting by R. B. Proud (Winchester), C. W. G. Walker (Magdalen College School), P. J. Dickinson (K.C.S., Wimbledon), A. C. Shirreff (Dulwich) and C. W. A. Lubbock (Charterhouse), The Rest declared at 426 for 7. A very sound innings of 104 by P. G. C. Wood (Tonbridge) and plucky play by C. J. H. Paget (Cheltenham) and A. Kershaw (Rugby) gave Lord's Schools the respectable total of 305. The follow-on was not enforced and The Rest declared at 160 for 2, Proud making 102 in the almost incredible time of 49 minutes. He treated the bowling very severely, hooking and driving with terrific force. He hit four 6's, two of them right

out of the ground, and eleven 4's, his 102 being the large share of 136 added for the second wicket. Three men then fell for 26, but G. E. Fletcher (Marlborough) and C. J. H. Paget (Cheltenham) by very careful play helped Lord's Schools to a fairly creditable draw. Fletcher's 94 was, in the circumstances, a great innings.

Proud, Wood and Dickinson were almost entirely responsible for the Schools' 270 against a strong Army side. Proud played an unusually restrained innings of 94, in which he showed sound defence. R. E. H. Hudson, C. W. C. Packe and R. G. W. Melsome were the chief scorers in The Army's 315. Batting consistently, the Schools declared at 206 for 9, leaving The Army to get 162 runs in 85 minutes, a not impossible task, considering the strength of their batting, but they did not attempt to hit off the runs and time was up with the score 71 for 2.

The Young Amateurs v. Young Professionals match came as a somewhat dull affair after the bright cricket preceding it. The Amateurs, with the exception of C. J. Adams (Bishop's Stortford), could do very little with the spin bowling of Martin and Thompson and their own attack, apart from H. G. W. Shakespear (Malvern), presented no terrors to the young professors who, declaring their second innings, won easily by 224 runs. This side of young professionals would have held their own against the full strength of the Schools.

THE OVAL WEEK

In the Young Amateurs matches at the Oval, Surrey beat Kent by six wickets and drew in turn with Middlesex and Essex. P. J. Dickinson (K.C.S., Wimbledon) enjoyed a good week, scoring 114 against Kent, 109 against Middlesex and 63 against Essex. Surrey declared at 421 for 4 against Kent, G. I. D. Norton (Malvern), A. C. Shirreff (Dulwich) and A. F. Brown (Charterhouse) batting well, in addition to Dickinson. F. G. Berkeley (Aldenharn) took 6 wickets for 71 in Kent's second innings. H. C. Munro (Rugby), H. C. S. Armstrong (Repton), P. B. K. Gracey (Wellington) and M. J. W. Cassy (St. Dunstan's) did good work with the bat for Kent.

A fine innings of 166 by J. G. Mackeurtan (Eton) stood out in the Middlesex total of 356. Surrey replied with 317 for 7 and Middlesex followed with 133 for 4. Essex scored 302, H. A. Van Ammel (Bancroft's) 95 and J. G. Doubleday (Bedford) 66, being the chief batsmen. Surrey were out for 242, J. M. Leiper (Chigwell), six wickets for 59, bowling very well, and Essex got 73 for 3 in their second innings, before stumps were pulled up.

THE SCHOOLS

Aldenham won four of their matches, drew six and lost five. This was not so good a record as had been expected but, in view of the inexperience of most of the players, it was by no means a bad one.

J. A. Mence, F. G. Berkeley and T. G. Argile, all old colours, were responsible for a large proportion of the runs and made many useful scores. The two slow bowlers, R. A. Sprent and Berkeley, though getting little assistance from the wickets, bowled well throughout the season. The other bowlers, W. D. Welton, J. D. F. Williams and Argile, all of medium pace, gave good support and provided variety. On the whole, the fielding was sound and few reasonable chances went begging. Mence and C. W. Hickson were outstanding. J. M. Down kept wicket in a safe and stylish manner.

With nine old colours in the side, **Alley's** enjoyed a successful season, winning six matches, drawing four and losing two; two were abandoned. B. C. R. Smith came out with the fine average of 50.33 for an aggregate of 453 runs, E. D. Pennington was second with 35 and E. M. D. McCormick, third with 34. Smith, A. Allen and E. W. Thomas bore the burden of the bowling and did well, Smith taking 34 wickets for under 10 runs apiece, Allen 29 at 8, and Thomas 30 at 11 apiece. Smith, who will captain the side, L. F. Comber, McCormick, S. F. Jones, J. L. Alexander and J. E. Keech are returning for next season.

Owing to illness, **Allhallows** experienced a most disappointing season. On one occasion only was it possible to put a full team into the field. Often, a good start foreshadowed a large total but, time after time, a collapse ensued and the need for more determination and solidity in the middle of the batting order was felt.

Hill was a valuable and consistent opening bat and McKelvie showed promise of becoming a good all-rounder. The bowling improved on that of recent years and despite a sad lack of length and direction, Clarke did much good work. The fielding was generally smart; Emmerson specially good, Mountain safe behind the wicket. Weymouth and Exeter were both defeated in school matches but the games with Newton and Kelly were lost. Clarke, McKelvie and Harper are expected to return for 1939.

For **Ampleforth College** the season cannot be recorded as an altogether satisfactory one, and, in their most important match, that against Sedburgh, the side looked poor, but good cricket was shown against M.C.C., Yorkshire Gentlemen, Emeriti and

R.A.F. College, Cranwell. Every member of the eleven played at least one useful innings. The bowling was adequate and the fielding, always good, at times brilliant. M. A. Sutton will captain the 1939 eleven and will have with him G. V. Garbett, A. Mahoney, E. A. Smith and P. Liddell.

Beaumont had a side of more than average batting strength but the bowling was erratic, J. A. Corbould, slow left, being steadiest. P. Dudding, at the beginning of the season, was of great value and, in the last three matches, A. Crouch struck remarkable form. Corbould and K. M. Nixon were a reliable opening pair, and D. L. Bruen, with an average of 65.42, batted consistently well. P. J. Gompertz, with plenty of strokes, played several good innings but did not reach his best form until towards the end of the season.

A satisfactory standard of fielding was maintained, the ground work, in particular, being smart. The wicket-keeping of H. E. Cashin rose to a high level, with some of his stumping first-class. Of twelve matches played, an equal number were won, drawn and lost.

Bedford went through a fairly successful season, though hardly as good as expected from their early promise. In school matches they beat St. Paul's, drew with Leys and Oundle and were defeated by Dulwich.

C. L. Oakley, the captain, set up a record for Bedford by scoring more than 1,000 runs, including 203 not out against Leys, 183 not out against St. Paul's, 147 against the Butterflies, and 103 against Oxford University Authentics. Oakley could bowl, too, his slow rights proving effective against St. Paul's. J. G. Doubleday, A. E. Cook and E. H. Walshe were Oakley's stoutest supporters in batting. Bowling was the weak point. Cook did best with the ball, but, apart from Oakley, no one gave him a great deal of help.

Berkhamsted easily beat University College School and had all the better of a draw against Whitgift, but lost to St. Lawrence, Ramsgate, and were decisively beaten by Merchant Taylors. They should have defeated Christ's Hospital but the batsmen showed little enterprise.

The batting failed badly at times, only P. Isherwood being consistent. The bowling, on the other hand, was of high quality, Isherwood (medium) and G. Cribb (fast) doing particularly well and receiving good support from G. H. Campbell, R. Pennington and W. M. Taylor, all slow. To a very good fielding side, the captain, J. R. Edwards, set a fine example of keenness.

R. G. Simons kept wicket soundly. P. G. Petheridge will captain the 1939 side and old colours to support him are Isherwood, Pennington, Simons, Taylor, W. A. R. Daly, R. G. Seccombe and P. D. Sutton.

In a very good season **Blundell's** won eleven matches and lost only two. These two were, however, inter-school matches in which Sherborne and Downside, the latter very narrowly, were the victors.

Bowling was the strong point of the side, B. A. Miller, A. A. K. Gifford and the captain, P. P. Bloy, doing best. Miller had the fine record of 56 wickets for 7 runs apiece, Bloy 43 at 10 apiece, and 33 wickets rewarded Gifford's good work. Only two sides totalled more than 150 against Blundell's. A great performance was that against M.C.C. The school were out for 65 but disposed of a very useful headquarters side for 53. The batting was hardly up to the bowling standard but C. G. B. Gidley, though handicapped by illness, and D. G. Strickland made some good scores, while several of the others got runs at a pinch.

The only bright spot in the **Bradfield** season came in an excellent win over Stowe, but the matches with Lancing, St. Edward's and Wellington were lost. Record for the season—4 wins, 1 draw and 8 losses. The bowling, with M. Paine, A. G. B. Helm, a youngster of definite promise, and a good spinner of the ball in N. S. P. Evans, was quite good. The outstanding achievement was by Paine with 6 wickets for 12 in the victory over Stowe.

The trouble with the batting was that the best performers seldom came off together. The captain, J. R. B. Wright, Paine and D. J. Martin could all make runs and A. R. Archibald was an enterprising hitter. Including the wicket-keeping of J. B. Johnson, the fielding, with Evans and D. C. Potheary outstanding, was good. Martin will be next season's captain and, with five old colours to support him, Bradfield's prospects are hopeful.

Brentwood came out with the excellent record of 12 matches won, five drawn, one a tie and two lost. This is far and away Brentwood's best record for many years. The captain, B. P. Carter, excelled as a batsman, his average of 41 for 20 innings representing very good work. He was an inspiring captain, always ready to go for the runs. E. Nichols, with 53 wickets, and D. H. Langridge, with 40, were the mainstays of the bowling.

Brighton College lost to Cranleigh and Dulwich, beat Christ's Hospital and drew with St. Paul's and Lancing, rain saving the latter from a heavy defeat. Of the other matches played, two

were won, three drawn and the rest lost. Philips, the leading batsman, played some good innings. Grose, though very good at times, was inconsistent. Of the others, Colbourne showed most promise with the bat. The bowling lacked length and direction but Braybon, Clayden and Wilson did well occasionally. While the fielding was generally sound and some good catches were brought off, anticipation was rarely seen.

In a poor season, **Bromsgrove** could consider a redeeming feature the fact that the side were very young and that most of them will have the chance to improve. C. C. J. Forge showed promise. A slow left-handed bowler, he spins the ball well and can keep a length. The captain, E. J. H. Williams, who is returning for 1939, hit the ball hard in some useful scores but was unreliable. J. A. Hall may develop into a useful left-hand bowler. In addition to Williams, seven of the side are staying on.

With seven old colours with whom to start, **Canford** naturally hoped to do well but, somehow, things did not altogether answer expectations. School matches against Victoria College Jersey, King's (Bruton), Taunton and Weymouth, were lost and the only bright spots in a disappointing season were good wins over Liverpool, Eton Ramblers and R.N.C., Dartmouth. In a poor batting side, G. R. M. Stokes alone did himself proper justice; but the bowling, with J. H. Pennock, D. de W. Waller and R. D. French prominent, could not be blamed. French, who played for Young Amateurs against Young Professionals at Lord's, came out with the excellent analysis of 56 wickets at 12.9 each.

In their captain, C. W. S. Lubbock, **Charterhouse** possessed one of the outstanding school cricketers of the season. A good, fast scoring bat, he was also a bowler of real class but, in this department, he had too much to do. With another really good bowler to support Lubbock, Charterhouse would have been nearly the best of the schools. They beat Westminster and Eton, the latter in a high-scoring match, drew with Winchester and lost narrowly to Harrow and to Wellington. The match with Harrow was a magnificent example of sporting cricket. Charterhouse could have avoided defeat but they declared, and Harrow, with 214 for two wickets, wanted to get only 13 in half-an-hour but six wickets actually crumbled for four runs before the last pair won a most exciting struggle for Harrow.

In addition to Lubbock, J. A. Crompton, D. A. N. Allen, G. L. Campbell, and J. G. Larking were prolific run-getters. Most of the side could help, P. W. Coggins, only once dismissed

Under the captaincy of A. Dawes, Dover enjoyed another satisfactory summer, winning seven matches, drawing three and losing two. The strength of the side lay in the bowling, A. March and D. R. Mott (right-hand fast medium), N. C. F. Bloy (leg-breaks) and P. J. D. Pearce (slow left) forming a varied and effective combination. The batting, apart from a breakdown against St. Lawrence, was adequate and on more than one occasion the tail came to the rescue. Both A. Dawes and Bloy are good schoolboy batsmen and they played particularly well when helping to gain a nine wickets win over King's, Canterbury.

As both Dawes, whose fifth season in the side it will be, Bloy and five others of the eleven remain, the prospects for the coming year are bright.

Downside could well be pleased with their results. Of eleven engagements, five were won, three drawn and three lost. Of the rival schools, Blundell's were beaten, after a desperately close finish, by 133 to 129, and so were King's (Bruton), but Sherborne won.

P. A. G. Rawlinson, S. R. D. Bell and A. C. L. Glass were the best batsmen. Rawlinson was specially successful, with an average of nearly 36 for an aggregate of 467. He played a very fine innings of 102 against Butterflies. Bell averaged over 28 and Glass 25. R. G. Sheridan proved himself above the average as a fast bowler. He took 40 wickets at 12.25 each, with a best performance of 8 for 34 against Emeriti. H. E. Watts, with his slow leg-breaks gave Sheridan the requisite support, taking 39 wickets for just under 15 each.

Dulwich College with a wealth of good batting, backed by useful bowling, must be ranked as one of the best school sides of the year. They won all their five inter-school matches—against Mill Hill, Brighton, Bedford, St. Paul's and Tonbridge—by substantial margins. A. C. Shirreff was a tower of strength. His 103, not out, against Bedford was a brilliant effort. Also the mainstay of the bowling, he was always likely to get any side out. B. E. Collingwood, J. A. Barnett and J. C. Bartlett all made centuries; P. C. B. Ashbrooke, D. V. Knight, H. L. Hammond and G. R. Turner were all capable of making runs. W. O. Thomas, slow left-hand with ability to spin the ball, was a good support to Shirreff in bowling and should become even more effective.

Durham lost only two of their eleven matches, winning five and drawing four. The schools, Giggleswick, Ampleforth, St. Peter's (York), and St. Bees, were all beaten; rain prevented play against Sedburgh. D. J. N. Hall, the captain, came out top

of the batting averages with 32 for an aggregate of 320. W. D. Orwin was a good all-rounder, with a batting average of 24.8 and a bowling record of 40 wickets for 9.6 apiece. D. R. Forster and W. Greensword were useful assistants.

Orwin will captain the side in 1939, with the support of six old colours, Burchall, Cunningham, Greensword, Shorter, Chicken and Bowles.

Eastbourne had an eleven above the average and their return of six matches won, seven drawn and only one lost, was excellent. In school matches, Lancing and King's, Canterbury, were beaten, the Radley match ended in a draw, as did that against Christ's Hospital, and the only defeat suffered was at the hands of St. Edward's, by one wicket. D. M. Man proved himself a fine bat at a crisis and an excellent wicket-keeper. The captain, D. P. Hepburn, played some good innings. M. A. Girling was a good all-rounder, as an opening bat and a medium-paced bowler, making the ball go away from the bat very late. A noticeable feature of the batting was the success of the tail-enders. The whole side went for the bowling whole-heartedly.

P. D. Holroyd set up a record for the school by taking 57 wickets and was chosen for The Rest against Lord's Schools. W. P. Bird, who bowled fast, showed good form. The fielding was really good, B. I. S. Gourlay, a stylish batsman, being brilliant in the gully and slips. Man will captain the side next summer and the only other old colour will be Gourlay. Girling has gone up to Oxford.

W. L. Page, the Emanuel captain, started the season with only one old colour, S. F. Gandar. As most of the 1937 second eleven also had left, considerable team building became necessary in finding an eleven of very young players. In school matches Reading and Eltham were beaten and the game against Haberdashers' drawn, but Ardingly, Cranbrook, Douai, St. Albans and Bedford Modern were victorious.

Page bowled well, taking 41 wickets for 16.6 apiece. Gandar, with an aggregate of 482, average of 43.8, was by far the most consistent batsman. Page stays on as captain. He may possibly have the assistance of Gandar and practically all the 1938 side, so that the prospects for the coming season are bright.

Epsom College played eleven matches, won two, drew two and lost seven. The victories were over other schools, Cranleigh and St. John's Leatherhead, the latter by one run—a great game. A draw against Whitgift was played at the Oval; K.C.S. Wimbledon, for whom P. J. Dickinson was very destructive, won. The Epsom

bowling and fielding touched a high standard. P. A. Soar's accurate swing bowling was very effective and R. C. Kimmerling, slow left, showed promise. A. P. Reid's fielding in the gully was nearly always brilliant and he was awarded the fielding cup.

The comparative weakness in the batting could be attributed to the want of a reliable opening pair causing a number of disastrous starts. A. S. Neilson and N. J. W. Leah were the most consistent batsmen. Both will be available for the coming season, under the captaincy of V. D. O. Smyth. Other old colours staying on are A. W. Tomlinson, an excellent wicket-keeper, Soar and J. R. Duncan, so that the prospects are favourable.

Eton failed to win one of their school matches and cannot be described as a good side. Beaten by Charterhouse at Eton, they fared moderately in draws with Harrow at Lord's, and at Winchester and finished fairly even with Haileybury and Marlborough. The good batsmen seldom came off together. J. F. Boughey, the captain, played a useful innings of 69 against Harrow and an excellent 95 against Haileybury but, on the whole, he hardly did himself justice. B. N. D. Clarke scored a brilliant 111 against Marlborough and a good 61 against Haileybury. J. G. Mackeurtan was expected to do great things and although failing at Lord's against Harrow, he played well against Marlborough and Winchester.

N. T. A. Fiennes was considered good enough to play in the representative Lord's matches as wicket-keeper—the only Etonian chosen. He proved himself no mean bat, either, his 106 against Charterhouse being a really fine effort. A. J. B. Marsham, D. L. Curling and P. H. Thomas made runs at times but there was, generally speaking, an absence of solidity in the batting. This, perhaps, would not have mattered so much had the bowling been adequate. M. H. Farebrother, left-handed with a good action, showed most possibilities. H. O. Huntington-Whiteley, of whom great things were expected, proved disappointing. H. E. Garnier did some good performances late in the term and Marsham's leg-breaks were occasionally effective but the attack was never strong enough to get opponents out for a reasonable score.

Very young and inexperienced, it was hardly surprising that the Forest eleven did not win a school match, but two good club sides were defeated. The prospects for the coming season are much brighter, as no fewer than nine of the side are expected back. G. H. A. Wellum, a most consistent opening bat, who averaged 47, though his highest score was 56, will be captain. A. B. Cowie, a medium-paced bowler, and C. M. Howell-Jones, a useful all-rounder, should do well this year.

Giggleswick were handicapped by rain but even so, their record was disappointing, four matches being won, two drawn and five lost. Of the schools, St. Bees were beaten, but Durham and St. Peter's, York won. Ainley, a good captain, managed his bowling with considerable skill. By far the best bat in the side, he set a fine example of efficiency and enthusiasm in the field. Among the bowling material, Wilson, slow left, was a most promising colt, and Raffan, with medium-paced off-spinners, was useful though he did not quite realise expectations. J. E. Galloway should take wickets in the future. The fielding, if generally good, was not quite up to the high standard of 1937. Wilson, Taylor, Galloway, Rusius and Barber will be available again.

Haileybury put in the field one of the best sides they have had for a long time. Of twelve matches three were won, six drawn and three lost. In the school matches, Wellington and Stowe were beaten and Haileybury were favourably placed in a drawn game with Eton; the Lord's match against Cheltenham ended in an even draw. The whole side were capable of getting runs. W. A. W. St. George, the most prolific scorer, hit up excellent centuries against the Googlies and Gentlemen of Herts and made a lot of runs against Cheltenham. R. D. Jupp, W. J. H. Shephard, P. Burridge and P. J. Barton always looked difficult to dislodge. The bowling did not quite come up to the batting standard. C. Y. Hildick-Smith, the captain, was the best bowler, notably at Lord's; Jupp dangerous with the new ball and J. H. Fairbairn able to keep a length.

Harrow lost only two matches—against a strong M.C.C. side and Harlequins. As they beat Charterhouse, after a thrilling match, by one wicket, Harrow Wanderers, Household Brigade and Mr. D. F. Walker's eleven, had slightly the better of a draw with Winchester and were in a winning position against Eton at Lord's when rain interfered, they could well feel satisfied with the results of the season. They owed a great deal to their captain, R. A. A. Holt, who, with an aggregate of 910, averaged just over a hundred. His 152, not out, against Winchester and 184, not out, and 125 against Charterhouse were magnificent efforts. Apart from his batting, he was a most inspiring leader, his splendid work in the field setting an example to the side.

Holt received good support in the batting from W. S. P. Lithgow, who averaged over 41, A. O. Lithgow, a sound wicket-keeper and improving bat, R. C. Fenwick, who developed into an excellent opening batsman—doing very well at Lord's against Eton—and P. W. M. Dean, also good for starting the innings. F. C. Boulton was the most successful bowler, with 32 wickets at

in school matches, doing particularly well low down in the batting order. A. F. Brown distinguished himself by scoring a century in his first match, against Harrow. Apart from Lubbock, the bowlers lacked skill. P. Bennett was expected to do great things after taking six wickets cheaply against Winchester, but hardly fulfilled this promise.

With the material available, **Cheltenham** should have gone through a really good season. As it was, they won only two matches, one of them against Clifton, drew with Malvern and with Haileybury at Lord's and were beaten in an innings by Marlborough. The captain, P. G. Geary, a most effective bowler the previous season, was handicapped by a back injury and not nearly so dangerous as before. R. M. Phillips stood out as a good bowler and a useful bat and J. E. D. Mann could keep up an end. In a strong batting side were D. C. Brooke Taylor, who again scored a century in the Lord's match, P. B. C. Moore, responsible for a fighting century against Malvern, and C. J. H. Paget, who came into his own late in the season. His hundred against Haileybury at headquarters earned him a place in the Lord's side against The Rest. S. C. S. Farmer proved himself a most reliable wicket-keeper. There are great hopes of little R. J. E. Mayers, who showed stylish skill as a batsman and fielded really well at cover.

Christ's Hospital were stronger in batting than for many years. W. B. Pearson headed the figures with 45; N. L. Ilett and G. W. Cornish each averaged more than 35, all three scoring over 300 runs during the season. The bowling was not so good, only G. R. Mason, who took 24 wickets at 14.16 each, causing any consternation among the opposition, though Ilett and A. H. Davies did useful work. Of nine matches played, two were won, five drawn and two lost. With a little more bite in the bowling one or two of the drawn matches would have been won.

City of London played twelve matches, winning three, drawing four and losing five. In school matches, Imperial Service College and Forest were beaten, a draw in favour of City of London was played against Whitgift and defeat suffered from Hurstpierpoint.

The batting was not very strong, M. D. Dale, E. A. Welch and A. L. Garrett being the only ones to average over 20. R. A. Shaddick was easily the best bowler, his analysis of 51 wickets for 12.54 apiece representing fine work. Dale, the new captain, will have only Shaddick and D. G. Harman of the old colours to support him next season

Though, down to No. 10, all the **Clifton** side were capable of making runs, they for some reason or other seldom got really going but crumpled up in the most disappointing way, so that the season was not at all successful. The Rugby match was lost by an innings, Cheltenham won by seven wickets in a low scoring game, and Tonbridge triumphed at Lord's by eight wickets.

No player averaged better than just over 21 in batting. G. A. Gibbs, who came out top and made runs in a stolid way, was also a good wicket-keeper and always a hard worker. P. Kinnersley, a brother of the Somerset cricketer, showed promise without altogether fulfilling it. C. E. N. Hooper occasionally was enterprising but, on the whole, the side lacked individuality. There was a lot of bowling not quite of a match-winning quality. W. I. Cleghorn, right-hand fast medium, was the most dangerous and there are possibilities about N. Gibbs, a brother of the captain, who might also develop into a good bat. The Clifton headmaster's son, W. D. Whatley, occasionally did some good things.

With five matches won, six lost and two drawn, **Cranleigh** can be described as having a moderately satisfactory season. In two excellent performances, Brighton College were defeated for the first time, and M.C.C. vanquished by six wickets. The Grasshoppers and Old Cranleighans also were beaten. J. R. Tovey, the outstanding bat, opened the innings and was remarkably consistent throughout the season, his average of 32.46 for an aggregate of 422 runs representing really capable work. W. P. Sargent, equally prominent among the bowlers, tossed up his slow right-arm deliveries cleverly and was never afraid of being hit. With 27 wickets at 10.9 he often was responsible for the success of his side.

A great deal of the credit for **Denstone's** very successful season was due to the captain, D. H. Burrow and J. H. G. Deighton. Of fifteen games played, twelve were won and the rest drawn. St. Peter's (York), Bromsgrove, Trent, Worksop, K.E.S., Birmingham, and Wrekin, of the schools met, were beaten and the match against Rossall drawn.

Burrow, who scored centuries against Derbyshire Friars and St. Peter's, finished with an average of 77 and did some useful bowling. Deighton came out with the phenomenal bowling average of 83 wickets at under 5 apiece and a batting average of 43. R. M. Watson, R. L. Richards and C. P. Roberts also were valuable. Apart from Deighton's wonderful work there was not a great deal in the bowling. As Burrow and Deighton and seven other members of the side are staying on for next summer, Denstone should have another brilliant season.

just over 18 runs apiece and D. R. Hayward, who could make runs in an unorthodox manner, kept a steady length throughout. C. J. Sage disappointed as a bat but spun the ball well on occasions.

Of sixteen matches played, **Highgate** won four, drew nine and lost three. In a satisfactory season no school match was lost. King's (Canterbury), Aldenham and Cranleigh were beaten and favourable draws played with Felsted and Mill Hill. Highgate were beaten by Hampstead and Southgate after sporting declarations, and by M.C.C. A great deal of the success of the side was due to excellent fielding.

The batting was strong. J. A. A. Morton averaged 57 with an aggregate of nearly 700. D. C. Turquand, also a prolific scorer, made 153 against Cryptics in 65 minutes—a brilliant effort. The bowling, with M. H. Webb, H. S. Andrews and Morton each taking more than 25 wickets, met requirements.

King's School, Bruton played seventeen matches, won five, drew seven and lost five. Of schools, Canford were beaten by eight wickets, Monkton Combe and Bryanston each by nine. The matches against King's College (Taunton), Weymouth, Downside and Sherborne II were lost. Sandhurst Wanderers were beaten and drawn matches played with M.C.C., Men o' Mendip and Somerset Stragglers. D. H. D. Sladen, the foremost batsman, scored 800 runs with two centuries; E. N. Harries aggregated 500 runs; A. E. H. Sladen and R. G. Bateman played some good innings. J. H. Hooper, D. H. D. Sladen and C. N. Stansbury bore the burden of the bowling, taking 43, 38 and 39 wickets respectively.

Stansbury, I. E. Miller, A. E. H. Sladen, Bateman, P. H. Laycock, J. S. Robinson and R. A. Penrose stay on so that the prospects are good for the coming season.

King's School, Canterbury look back on a somewhat patchy season. They defeated the two strongest school sides they play, St. Lawrence and K.C.S., Wimbledon, the latter of whom had not been beaten by another school for four seasons. King's, Canterbury also fared favourably in four drawn games and lost narrowly to Eastbourne. As offsets they suffered heavy defeats from St. Edmund's (Canterbury), Dover and Highgate.

The captain, D. L. Hurford, was an efficient batsman and bowler; his feat of taking nine wickets for 25 against Eastbourne ranks as one of the best bowling performances of the season. With seven old colours to support Hurford this summer—Goudge, Donaldson, Carter, Dean, Corben, Gaastra and Lemon—there seems a successful time ahead, particularly when it is remembered

that King's will have the inestimable benefit of the coaching of Frank Woolley.

King's, Rochester played seven other schools. Beaten by St. Lawrence and Cranbrook, they defeated Maidstone Grammar and St. Edmund's (Canterbury), drew with Framlingham and Sevenoaks, while the match against Sutton Valence was abandoned owing to rain. Their complete record, five wins, five draws and four losses was fairly satisfactory. G. W. Lees, the most prominent member of the side, batted most consistently, aggregating 544, with an average of 49.45. He also bore chief part in the bowling, coming out with the good analysis of 38 wickets for 14.42 apiece.

After a disappointing start, **King's School, Taunton** did quite well. Only one school match was lost and wins were gained over West Buckland, Plymouth, Wellington (Somerset), Kelly and King's, Bruton. The captain, Leech, and Goldie, who received a trial for Somerset, did the chief run-getting and often received good support from various members of the side. Thompson, an effective, fast, accurate bowler, shared with Leech most of the wickets. King, a tall, left-hander, who always looked like taking wickets when called upon, was not utilised sufficiently. The fielding showed improvement on recent years with Goldie an efficient wicket-keeper. Five of last season's team will be back.

Although not quite so successful as in the two previous seasons, in each of which he exceeded 1,000 runs, P. J. Dickinson, the **K.C.S., Wimbledon** captain, was a great power in the side, both as batsman and bowler. He made 154 not out against St. John's, Leatherhead, 116 against Beaumont and several other substantial scores. Also the mainstay of the bowling, he often took six wickets or more in an innings. M. R. S. Downham supported him well with both bat and ball. Of sixteen matches played, six were won, four drawn and four lost. In school matches Epsom and St. John's (Leatherhead) were beaten, draws played against Berkhamsted, U. C. S. and Whitgift, the only loss being to King's, Canterbury, on which occasion Dickinson was unable to turn out.

Lancing won only one match, that with Bradfield, lost four and drew six. Defeats came from Tonbridge and Eastbourne and the game with Brighton was drawn. Only G. A. Wagner and M. W. T. Kidson, the first with an average of just over 30, and Kidson with one of 25, ever shaped with much confidence against even plain bowling. I. F. Guest, R. J. Wheeler, J. H. Barley and T. L. R. Hill were useful, if never devastating, in the bowling, which

indeed, was much better than the batting. G. R. Flood kept wicket really well, especially on the leg side. As Wagner, Kidson and Hill stay on and there are some promising youngsters in the offing, Lancing should do better this coming season.

Leeds Grammar School experienced a curious season. The matches which they won and two of those lost showed substantial margins. The complete record of five wins and three losses can be considered satisfactory. Leeds declared at 198 for 8 and then Lancaster R.G.S. were skittled out for 37. Ripon Grammar School were disposed of for 36 and the runs hit off for the loss of one wicket. Craven Gentlemen were beaten, for the first time for ten years, by 180 to 83. On the other hand, Bradford Grammar School got Leeds out for 26 on a perfect wicket. Leeds collapsed also against St. Peter's (York) and were out for 95 but St. Peter's only just got home by one wicket. D. Warburton, captain for the third year and easily the chief player on the side, headed both batting and bowling averages. F. J. Thornton, a useful bat, W. M. Holton, a good wicket-keeper, and promising batsman, and J. F. Daykin, bowling slow spinners, each did very useful work. The fielding reached a high standard.

Holton will captain the next side with B. C. Smith, A. Carter and Thornton other old colours.

Leys divided their fifteen matches evenly in wins, draws and losses. The batting was too dependent on D. M. Witherington. Throughout the season he failed only once and fine displays against St. Paul's, Felsted and Bedford among others justly earned him a place for The Rest against Lord's schools. The remainder of the batting was sketchy. J. Pepper, still a Colt, got two centuries; D. A. Skinner played a splendid innings against Oundle but failed otherwise, and the captain, W. N. White, though making runs, did not always use discretion.

A real opening bowler was needed to assist White, who developed his left-hand medium-paced deliveries to a stage of remarkable accuracy. Skinner, a leg-spinner, took 51 wickets and though inclined to be expensive, deserves credit for most valuable work. The fielding, always good, at times became brilliant with White an excellent captain. A. J. Witherington, A. T. Pepper, J. Pepper, D. G. Jones, D. H. Pettigrew, J. E. T. Middleditch and P. S. Ednie stay on. D. M. Witherington has gone to Cambridge.

Malvern were fairly successful with three wins, four draws and three losses. A bright event was the convincing defeat of Malvern's "hereditary foes," Repton, by 290 runs. The matches

against Cheltenham and Shrewsbury were drawn. Worcestershire Gentlemen and Liverpool C.C. were defeated and the school did well to score 321 in the first innings against Free Foresters. R. A. Young and the captain, G. I. D. Norton, averaged just over 36. H. G. W. Shakespear, after a shaky start owing to illness, settled down and batted admirably. W. R. S. Dods, a junior, showed promising form and should be very useful in the next few years.

Norton headed the bowling averages, taking 25 wickets at 14 runs apiece, with R. W. L. Cary, who was very effective against Repton, second with 23 wickets at 18 runs each. The fielding, particularly that of Shakespear and R. O. H. Porch, was very good indeed, though one or two critical catches were missed. There exist high prospects for the coming season, as seven of the side are expected to return, including A. G. Denton-Thompson the wicket-keeper, for his fourth season.

Marlborough went through a better season than it might seem, in view of the fact that they won only one inter-school match, Cheltenham being beaten in an innings, but their drawn matches with Eton, Wellington, Winchester and Rugby, at Lord's, were all good performances. In G. E. Fletcher, their captain, they had one of the best school cricketers of the year and his 78 against Rugby at Lord's received high praise. The batting was strong all the way down. D. G. Lacy-Scott, a really good all-rounder, got a lot of runs and his fast-medium bowling accounted for a number of wickets. D. Comyn showed readiness to force the game and he could give useful help with the ball. The bowling lacked variety, G. J. Redfearn and Lacy-Scott were most valuable. There are great possibilities about R. B. Bland—quite a boy. He was not afraid to pitch up his slow spinners, and punishment left him unperturbed.

Mill Hill fared better than for several seasons. In school matches, they defeated Cranleigh, Aldenham and Berkhamsted, were beaten by Dulwich, St. Paul's, Leys and Felsted and drew with Highgate. P. T. Parr, F. N. Rowell and D. E. Dowlen played some good innings and Rowell added to his value by excellent wicket-keeping. He was very safe on both sides of the wicket, but did not always avail himself of stumping opportunities. Adequate bowling was in the hands of P. Scarf, fast with considerable consistency, and K. D. Spivey, effective when the wicket suited his leg-breaks. A. H. P. Wilkinson did one excellent performance when he took six Aldenham wickets for 13.

Seven of the side stay on and so Mill Hill's prospects appear bright.

Newcastle Royal Grammar School won seven matches, drew two and lost four. The captain, Wood, was in a class by himself. Scoring two centuries, he averaged over 60 and easily headed the bowling. Otherwise, with the exception of E. Dowson, the batting was inconsistent and practically all the bowling was done by Wood and Salkeld. Wood will captain the side again. With him remain Salkeld and Seymour. Dowson has gone up to Cambridge.

Oakham won four matches, drew five and lost five. Trent were narrowly beaten by two runs; Bedford Modern beat Oakham, but the match against Wellingborough was drawn favourably. Good bowling and fielding marked the work of the side throughout the season but apart from Fisher, the captain, Bradfield and Briggs, the batting lacked stability. Pollard, Briggs, Grier, Donald, Noton and Read stay on for the coming season.

Oratory not only may feel proud about a very good season but can look forward with optimism to another, in view of the fact that M. C. Bodenham will captain the side and will have seven old colours to assist him. Bodenham headed the averages in 1937 but could play in only two matches last summer owing to injury. The chief performance of the season was the defeat of Beaumont, at Lord's, for the third year in succession. P. G. Hurford Jones, who captained the side well in all matches, played a great innings of 96 on the big occasion. He received capable support from an all-round eleven, whose fielding reached a high standard.

Oundle started the season with high hopes but the results proved a little disappointing. The batting, for the most part, was unreliable and the bowling lacked variety. The one school match won, that against Leys, balanced a defeat from Uppingham. Draws resulted against Bedford and Stowe. C. P. Payne, the captain, was far and away the best bat in the side. Beautiful timing characterised his play. His 81 in 45 minutes against Stowe was a classic effort. Left-handed E. R. Conradi was prominent; F. R. Wilson and J. M. Mills played some useful innings. D. F. Shaw and S. M. Gilbert bowled fairly steadily without realising hopes. Real excellence marked the fielding. In a side which gave away few runs Payne, Wilson and T. L. Waring, a brilliant cover-point, stood out.

Of the fourteen matches played **Radley** won two, drew five and lost seven—a disappointing return. Considerable excuse can be offered as an epidemic of scarlet fever disorganised affairs.

The batting was not dependable, only McIntosh and Ruck-Keene being at all consistent though Fergusson and Grosvenor showed good stroke play. Birks, potentially much the best player on the side, could not find his form and luck deserted him. Rarely did the team achieve a good start.

The attack could be described as adequate, though a leg-spinner would have improved it. Birks and Hughes-Cooper were dangerous with the new ball; Morris kept a fine length, McIntosh, left-hand, and Campbell, slow-medium, often got wanted wickets. In patchy fielding, Birks, Grosvenor and Morris were exceptionally good but, on the whole, movement to the ball was slow. Fergusson, Pearson, and possibly Morris, return, but Birks, Hughes-Cooper and Cantlay have gone to Oxford and Grosvenor to Sandhurst.

Repton went through a most unfortunate season, notwithstanding the presence of six old colours. The appointed captain, F. F. Fisher, could not play at all owing to a broken wrist. A. H. Barnett, elected for the vacancy, missed six matches and R. Sale, head of the previous season's averages, took some time to find his form. The Uppingham match was spoilt by rain, play was impossible with Rugby, while Malvern and Shrewsbury both won. Sale got going late in the season and played a beautiful 107 against Repton Pilgrims. Neither J. F. B. Laing nor J. C. Barber showed the advance expected, but E. L. Thwaites, who kept wicket well, played some useful innings. Bowlers performed better than batsmen, P. H. W. Clarke taking a lot of wickets and receiving good support from H. C. S. Armstrong and Barnett. Good, keen fielding saved many runs.

Rossall's record of three matches won, five drawn and four lost, hardly reflected the true strength of the side in a season remarkable for the number of close finishes. The match against Shrewsbury was lost by two runs, after Rossall had been within nine of victory with only four wickets down; Yorkshire Gentlemen won by one run; against Birkenhead Park, the last Rossall man was in with three runs to make when time expired. Sedbergh were disposed of for 57. The very useful eleven included two good spin bowlers in P. G. Spry and J. A. Heaton. C. C. P. Pocock, who will captain the side in 1939, bowled fast medium with effect against Sedbergh and Shrewsbury, he can also bat a bit. G. D. M. Pocock, a younger brother, and three other old colours stay on.

Rugby should have a very good side this coming season, as most of the eleven remain and, though actual results were a little disappointing, the cricket played last summer revealed a

lot of good material. Clifton were overwhelmed in an innings, A. Kershaw enjoying a great personal triumph, with a brilliant century and many wickets. The Uppingham match was drawn after an exciting finish and Rugby were strongly placed at Lord's against Marlborough. The only other victory recorded was at the expense of a good M.C.C. side when L. G. H. Hingley, who will have two more years in the eleven, hit up a splendid century and Kershaw, with left-hand slows, took seven wickets for 27. The captain, J. R. Bridger, put on runs readily and his slow leg-breaks found many victims. H. C. Munro, M. A. C. Beaman, A. J. Pickard and A. K. Markland made runs in good style.

Great possibilities marked the fast bowling of W. H. D. Dunnett—most dangerous at the start of an innings. Dunnett, a good attacking bat, might well develop into a fine cricketer. The fielding was always bright and keen.

Rydal failed to win a match but, as they lost only four of thirteen games played, and were in a good position in several of the nine drawn, the season was not so dismal as might appear from the results.

The bowling was good, Daniels and Kingston, medium to fast right-hand, could both swing the ball and keep a length. Tattersall, slow left, also was steady and could be effective if the wicket gave him any help in turning the ball from leg. Blackburn, slow leg-breaks, and Walter, slow to medium off-breaks, completed a well varied attack. Blackburn usually made runs, but generally the batting was disappointing, though Daniels played one or two solid innings.

Of school matches, that against Merchant Taylors', Crosby, was lost by two wickets, that with Liverpool College was drawn and that with Birkenhead ruined by rain. Blackburn will again captain the side this coming season and Jones-Evans, Daniels, Walter and Hacking will also be available.

St. Edward's, Oxford could feel satisfied with their season if only for the reason that they won all four school matches. That against Eastbourne was a near thing, St. Edward's just getting home by 161 to 156, thanks chiefly to the batting of R. George and J. L. Churcher and the bowling of T. C. Henderson. When Bradfield were beaten convincingly, A. N. E. Waldron bowled admirably. Bromsgrove also were defeated heavily and Campbell College, Belfast, went under by three wickets. George was a consistent bat and Waldron an excellent all-rounder. Henderson, the best bowler, received good support from Waldron, George and Churcher.

The record of St. John's, Leatherhead—two wins, a draw and four losses—hardly did them justice. For instance, St. John's made a sporting declaration at 188 for 6 wickets and Imperial Service College just won with the last man in. Honours were practically even with Epsom who won a thrilling match by one run. A. W. Jackson was the outstanding player, both as batsman and bowler. He aggregated one short of 400 runs, played a fine century innings against Whitgift and took 41 wickets. His best supporter was J. D. Hughes in batting and P. G. C. Forbes in bowling.

St. Lawrence, Ramsgate did very well, winning seven of their thirteen matches, drawing three and losing three. In school matches, Dover, King's, Rochester, Whitgift, Berkhamsted and St. Edmund's, Canterbury, were beaten; the match with Sutton Valence was drawn and that with King's, Canterbury, lost after a game in which St. Lawrence were in poor form. The captain, H. B. C. Gardner, showing splendid all-round ability, scored 776 runs with an average of just under 60 and took 50 wickets at 9 runs apiece. R. Q. Drayson, at one time, made four fifties in succession but subsequently was inconsistent. Apart from these two, the batting was unimpressive, though T. C. Larsen and D. G. Perry each played a few good innings. In a strong bowling side Gardner, Drayson, Davis, Larsen and Bridge were all successful on various occasions. Gardner will again captain the eleven during the coming season and others to return are Perry, Bradley, who kept wicket, Miller, Christmas and Reeve. Drayson has gone up to Cambridge.

The doings of the rest of the St. Paul's side were dwarfed by the excellent cricket shown by the captain and wicket-keeper, N. M. Mischler, who, in sixteen innings, aggregated 1,218 runs with an average of 87. He scored 98 against Wanderers, 221 not out against Jesus College, Cambridge, 107 against I Zingari, 160 not out against Mill Hill, 85 against Incogniti, 94 against Felsted and 142 against Brighton College. M. A. T. Burke and H. W. Arnold gave him best support. The bowling was not so good, D. S. A. Pearce doing best with J. B. Behr, J. G. Liverman and D. Smith useful at times.

Of sixteen matches played, three were won, nine drawn and four lost. Of the schools, Mill Hill and Felsted were beaten, but Bedford and Dulwich were successful and the matches against Leys and Brighton drawn.

Sedbergh experienced bad luck in the weather, five of their fourteen fixtures being abandoned. Four matches were won,

four lost and one drawn. The batting broke down badly against Rossall but Ampleforth were beaten decisively. Defeats were suffered from the Masters and Yorkshire Gentlemen, victories gained over Old Sedberghians and Catterick Garrison, while the match against Oxford University Authentics ended in a moral victory for the school. The captain, D. J. F. Watson, an inspiring leader and brilliant field, was by far the best batsman. Although a little inclined to attack the bowling before playing himself in, he averaged over 50. In a well varied attack, R. H. Edwards bowled leg-breaks effectively.

Considering that **Sevenoaks School** started with only four old colours, they did not have a bad season. Of ten matches played they won three, drew three and lost four. The forcing batsmen were not reliable and those considered uncertain could not score at any pace. Consequently if the reliable bats got out, there was, more or less, a scramble for runs and the match lost; if they stayed in the match was a draw. The bowling was generally steady and never bad. The captain, R. B. Godfray, showed sound defence, R. W. Ward was a good all-rounder, like J. D. Lloyd, whose fast bowling with an easy action showed distinct promise. J. H. Knowles, if unorthodox, proved himself a dangerous batsman.

Sherborne lost only one of their six school engagements, Radley narrowly winning by two wickets. Blundell's, Tonbridge, Westminster and Downside were beaten and the Clifton match resulted in a draw. The side batted consistently, the only failure being when they were dismissed for 39 by Old Shirburnians. They gave a particularly good show against Tonbridge and also against Westminster, whom they beat by an innings and 171 runs.

R. F. S. Chignell, the captain, was a tower of strength in batting and also did useful bowling. A. L. A. Tasker, F. R. Coombe and S. F. St. M. Williams each got a lot of runs. H. J. C. Bashford, right-hand medium, the most successful bowler, was well supported by P. H. Humphreys, M. R. Earls-Davis, Tasker, Williams and Chignell.

Shrewsbury suffered only one defeat—from a strong side of Free Foresters. Of the schools, Rossall, Repton and Uppingham were beaten and the Malvern match ended in a draw greatly in favour of Shrewsbury. These performances were all the more creditable because there was no really outstanding cricketer in the side. A good level standard was maintained in all departments of the game, and Shrewsbury played together like a real team. The whole eleven could bat, M. L. Ainsworth, D. G. G. Baird and A. F. Kingsford doing best with the exception of D. W. M.

Gay who, though he generally went in last, came out top of the averages. The bowling was excellent, the captain, A. T. G. Groves, taking 57 wickets at 11 runs apiece, Gay 58 for just over 11 each, and J. D. Sayer 25 for under 14.

Stonyhurst's poor record of seven drawn matches and seven losses was due largely to illness, which caused the cancellation of all the school matches. Continual bad weather ruined other games.

The batting was weak, E. L. Corbet and M. A. Lacayo alone doing much on sticky wickets. A. H. Whitehouse played with great pluck and proved himself an efficient wicket-keeper, letting only twenty-one byes in twelve matches. The bowling was better than the batting. Lacayo kept a consistent length and P. T. Baines was really promising, though kept out of the side for most of the term through sickness. Corbet did one brilliant performance when he captured four wickets in four balls against Preston.

The one defeat of **Stowe** in school matches was at the hands of Haileybury, who got home by two wickets. Radley and Westminster were beaten decisively. When Westminster were beaten in an innings M. B. Scholfield bowled admirably, taking ten wickets for 62 runs. Stowe had the better of a draw with Tonbridge and the match against Oundle, at Kennington Oval, ended with honours fairly even.

Perhaps the best performance of the season was the defeat of a strong Free Foresters side when the Stowe captain, C. D. Earle, played a magnificent innings of 157. Earle batted consistently throughout the season, as did J. D. W. Stobart, who made 103 not out against Radley. J. E. C. Nicholl and J. P. Phillips also did good work with the bat. Scholfield achieved most with the ball; Earle and Phillips gave him valuable support. The wicket-keeping of P. R. H. Hastings was excellent.

With seven old colours, **Taunton** expected a great season, but they fared moderately, for while they won five matches, six were drawn and three lost. Taunton were beaten twice by Blundell's, just scraped home v. Kingswood and won well against Canford. None of the batsmen really did himself credit. R. A. Robison made runs but hardly fulfilled his high promise. J. E. D. Wilcox scored a good century against the old boys and the captain, P. M. Bennett, played an excellent innings against Knowle; but, on the whole, the batting was disappointing.

D. L. Walmsley excelled as a really good bowler, his analysis coming out at 69 wickets at 8.3 apiece. The fielding was very good indeed, Bennett setting a fine example and Wilcox showing up brilliantly at cover.

Tonbridge during an in-and-out season were inconsistent with the bat. A feature was the steady bowling of the captain, D. G. W. Yeats Brown, who took 59 wickets, used the googly as well as the leg-break and was invariably good.

Victories were gained over Old Wykehamists, Old Tonbridgians, T. C. Cobb's XI, Lancing and Clifton. At Lord's, Yeats Brown got a crop of Clifton wickets. Draws were played against Band of Brothers, Bluemantles, M.C.C. and Stowe; defeats were suffered from Tonbridge Town, West Kent, Blackheath, Sherborne and Dulwich.

C. L. Welford headed the batting averages with over 32; but P. G. C. Wood, although not finding his real form until late in the season, was the best bat on the side, as proved by his 91 for once out against Clifton and his brilliant century for Lord's Schools against The Rest. Yeats Brown scored more than 300 runs. P. Pettman did well at Lord's. The bowling, with Rose-Price, Graham and Yeats Brown in form, was well above the average; the ground fielding and throwing, particularly of Welford and Wood, was very good indeed.

Although **University College School** won only one match they had quite a satisfactory season, most of the draws being in their favour. The eleven were regarded generally as the best U.C.S. side for ten years. The batting was sound down to No. 10 and there was plenty of variety about the bowling, which, however, lacked snap. The captain, N. Freeman, led a willing side well. Old colours staying on are J. Metcalf, P. D. Record, D. V. Hall, P. M. Woollen and J. B. Reid.

Bad weather interfered greatly with cricket at **Uppingham**. On two occasions only could the school find an opportunity to play on a decent wicket. Oundle were beaten; the matches against Haileybury, Rugby and Repton resulted in draws and Shrewsbury were victorious. Hard-hitting marked the efforts of some members of the side but the batting lacked soundness and the back-play for the most part was weak. A. T. W. Taylor came out at the head of the batting averages with 29.27 for an aggregate of 322, and R. E. Crighton second with 21.15.

W. J. N. Carter with slow spinners reaped a harvest of wickets, his 37 averaging 11.64 runs apiece. K. R. T. Mackenzie and N. M. Clark also did good work with the ball. Apart from the want of a safe slip, the fielding was good and keen.

Wellingborough went through a moderately successful season, winning two of their nine matches, drawing four and losing three. The comparative failure of the side was due to most of the batsmen being slow on their feet, a fault that made them unreliable. An

exception, P. H. C. Charnock, came out with the well deserved average of 30.12. R. D. H. Reddy, the captain, also played some good innings and averaged over 26. D. E. Freeman, J. E. Lloyd Price and J. L. Scott showed promise for young players.

G. B. Sharman, as well as being able to bat, was easily the best bowler in the eleven; always attacking, he retained his length even when being hit. His 42 wickets cost only 13.11 each. In a very good fielding side Charnock again excelled; he was awarded both the "Jackson" cup for batting and the "Challen" cup for fielding. Sharman won the "Robinson" shield for bowling.

Wellington, one of the best sides of the year, accepted defeat only from Haileybury. Westminster, Bradfield and Charterhouse were beaten. The match against Marlborough was a thrilling affair. Marlborough declared at 322 for 4 and Wellington, going all out for the runs, only just failed, time being called with their score at 311 for 5. Their win over Charterhouse, one of the strongest schools, was a really fine performance. The most prominent batsman, P. B. K. Gracey, was particularly effective against other schools, his scores including 125 against Westminster. R. M. Hill batted brilliantly for 102 not out against Bradfield; G. L. R. Daniels, B. R. Baylay and C. G. Munro all made plenty of runs. Among a lot of useful bowlers C. G. Munro was best, with J. A. Loveless, K. M. Goodall, Daniels and Gracey excellent assistants. H. L. Sherbrooke proved a sound wicket-keeper.

P. Gawthorne, the **Westminster** captain, found himself with only two other colours to start the season, and the side did not really settle down until late in the summer when they accomplished some excellent performances. The matches against Stowe, Charterhouse, Sherborne and Wellington were lost but a good win was gained over Radley. Of thirteen matches played, four were won, one drawn and eight lost.

Gawthorne, although he failed to come up to expectations, scored 79 against Wellington and 85 against Old Westminsters; apart from his valuable batting, he was an excellent captain and set a fine example in the field. Goatly, who hit 121 against Old Westminsters, was always willing to attack the bowling, but although Wilkinson, Lewis, Neal and Borradaile all made runs at some time or another, the batting lacked consistency. Eyre, Calway and Taylor were the chief bowlers; the first-named was always accurate and lively. The fielding, on the whole, reached a good standard and in wicket-keeping Goatly in every way gave satisfaction. Calway, Goatly, Greenish, Wilkinson, Taylor and Borradaile remain for next season.

The young Weymouth side enjoyed a good season. Victoria College, Jersey, Canford and King's Bruton were defeated; the matches against Monkton Combe and Bryanston drawn; All-hallows won by one wicket. B. G. Cangle, only fifteen and a half years of age, was the outstanding bat, averaging 61.8 for 12 innings. A. N. Young came out with the excellent bowling analysis of 31 wickets at 7 apiece; R. S. Rowland took 28 at 13.2 and E. P. Wright 24 at 12 each.

J. A. Lemon, who will captain the side, Young, Gaster, Cangle, W. E. K. Hopkins, T. R. Stones and Wright are returning.

In an unfortunate season Whitgift won only one match. Bird, again the mainstay of the batting in his fourth year, was well supported by Urwin, who, if a little slow, was always difficult to dislodge. Christie, Cook and Corry scored their fifties at different times. The bowling was erratic. Christie and Foster, both slow, took most wickets, but Turner—a late discovery—was of great assistance with his fast bowling. The fielding fell regrettably below the average and several matches might have ended differently if it had been better. Old colours staying on—Christie, Foster and Woodfield.

Winchester cannot be said to have had an altogether satisfactory season, for though they suffered no more than one reverse, only two matches were won, and nine, including all the school matches, drawn. Charterhouse had much the better of the game; a good recovery was made against Harrow, the state of affairs being fairly even at the close. Winchester should have beaten Eton, for they were in a strong position, but one or two fielding mistakes just prevented them forcing a victory.

The captain, R. B. Proud, who distinguished himself at Lord's in the Schools matches, headed the Winchester batting averages with just over 44; his 81 against Eton was a brilliant effort. J. Stanning played finely in his 123 against Eton, but, otherwise, hardly did himself justice.

The best bowler, G. E. Dixon, took 34 wickets for 15.2. He was not afraid of pitching up his slow leg-breaks and, with added strength and experience, should become high class. H. A. Pawson will captain next season's side and will have R. A. Henley, F. M. J. Goddard, A. R. Taylor and Viscount French in support.

Workshop with a young and inexperienced team gave promise of doing well next season as eight of the eleven remain. A. L. Evans is most likely to captain the side. He will have both his opening bowlers, P. E. F. Rhodes and J. R. M. Tomkins. Of the other colours J. G. Dudley, J. C. Wandell, T. G. Royle and G. C. Buchanan are all promising bats and useful change bowlers.

A comment on Worksop's play in 1938 was "disappointing in batting but a good bowling side." A. L. Evans kept wicket for Young Amateurs v. Young Professionals at Lord's.

Wrekin in a very satisfactory season won ten matches, drew two and lost five. Bromsgrove and Ellesmere were beaten easily but the Denstone match was lost. Fulton, Smith and the captain, Pelmore, bore the burden of the bowling and came out with good figures. Wilford, Denham and Grace, consistent batsmen, will return, Denham being the new captain. Pelmore goes to Cambridge and Fulton to Sandhurst.

IN SCOTLAND

Edinburgh Academy once more had only a moderate side. It was apparent, before the season started, that there would be weakness in bowling but several batsmen of whom good things were expected failed to fulfil their promise. The fielding was almost uniformly good, sometimes even brilliant, with S. H. Cosh, captain for the second year, an efficient wicket-keeper. In school matches, George Watson's were beaten and Merchiston Castle held to a draw but Fettes, Loretto and Glenalmond won by wide margins. J. A. Eadie will be back to captain the side during the coming season with four other old colours, J. B. Lyell, an opening batsman, D. A. Roberts, brilliant in the field, and two bowlers, T. Walker and V. M. Shaw.

It is a long time since Fettes put such a strong team in the field and it was, therefore, all the greater pity that the inter-school matches against Merchiston Castle and George Watson's had to be scratched. In their other school matches Fettes handsomely defeated Glenalmond, Loretto and Edinburgh Academy. Fettes collapsed in the first innings against Loretto, but in the second innings the tail asserted itself and the last pair, Wood and Crawford, put up a record stand of 138. Turner and Goldie-Scot made a record opening partnership of 261 against Glenalmond.

D. D. Mitchell, captaining the side for the second year, was not so successful with the bat but did most work in bowling, and managed his attack well. Turner, best of the old colours, played some fine innings in school matches. I. G. G. Mitchell and Haddon were disappointing but Smith played two aggressive innings in school matches. Wood and Goldie-Scot were best of the others. Wood bowled steadily with good length and Goldie-Scot did well as opening bat. The fielding was sound but never brilliant.

Goldie-Scot, I. G. G. Mitchell, D. R. Murray, M. S. McKerrow, I. Crawford and A. D. Herriot stay on; Goldie-Scot will be captain.

Loretto did not have a good season, ten of eighteen matches being lost, three drawn and only five won. Three of the victories were against other schools, George Watson's, Glenalmond and Edinburgh Academy. The match with Merchiston Castle ended in a fairly even draw; Fettes won decisively. S. A. Simpson played some good innings, his 107 not out against George Watson's being particularly praiseworthy. W. D. S. Bow, D. J. C. Cunningham and J. M. Harper backed him up well at times. Simpson was also a useful bowler and J. Ure excelled with the ball, his 8 for 29 in the first innings against Fettes being easily the best bowling performance of the Loretto season. Simpson will be the new captain with other old colours, A. R. McInroy, Ure, J. M. Harper and A. C. D. Rankin, in support.

Merchiston Castle played sixteen matches of which six were won, eight drawn and two lost. Of the schools, Glenalmond and George Watson's were beaten and draws played with Loretto and Edinburgh Academy. D. Yellowlees, who averaged 69 in school matches, remains as captain and should be very good during the coming season. J. L. Blackwood, the most successful bowler in the side, will also return.

Much rain in the early part of the season curtailed practice at Trinity College, Glenalmond, and the record was rather disappointing, four matches being won, six drawn and seven lost. Much was expected of the batting but only late in the season did any solidity appear. R. S. Colquhoun and P. A. McDowall—always prepared to go for the bowling—batted well, and H. A. Gordon, watching the ball carefully, played some useful innings.

In rather weak bowling, J. Rios was steady and Gordon a hard worker. K. P. Walker, slow leg-breaks, had two good matches. The fielding improved as the season went on, Rios, A. L. Carnegie and D. G. Allan being very smart. Both Colquhoun and I. W. V. Browne were useful behind the stumps. In school matches, Glenalmond beat George Watson's and Edinburgh Academy but lost to Merchiston, Fettes and Loretto. Rios will captain the 1939 side with other old colours Allan, Colquhoun, McDowall, Walker and J. H. S. Scott.

ETON v. HARROW

At Lord's, July 8, 9. Drawn. Misfortune clung to Harrow in the annual match with Eton. When on the Saturday Harrow could feel really hopeful of winning for the first time since 1908, heavy rain prevented any cricket after quarter past five. This final blow to the aspiration of Holt, the Harrow captain, came after it seemed likely that his bold policy of making Eton bat on a drying pitch would gain an advantage.

Play was impossible on the opening day before one o'clock and the expectation that the sun would dry the pitch quickly was not fulfilled. Instead, drizzling rain, a chilly East wind and showers that caused two interruptions were all against bowlers and fieldsmen. Under such conditions, dropped catches in the slips were almost excusable but two escapes enjoyed by Clarke, before scoring and when 24, probably saved Eton from defeat. Clarke stayed until the total reached 101 and but for his plucky play after the second ball of the match proved fatal to Mackeurtan the side might have been all out before the showers eased the pitch. As it was, the ball often lifted to an extent difficult to control.

Fiennes played soundly and made good off-side strokes in a stand for 62 with Clarke. When the bowlers lost their length with the wet ball, Thomas gave a fine display of hard, clean driving and hooking. He hit ten 4's in the highest innings of the day and, after he helped Marsham add 61, Huntington-Whiteley made runs readily on the leg side. Sage, slow left-hand, Boulton, fairly fast, and Hayward, slow right with good mixed spin, all deserved better reward.

Going in when the light was poor, Harrow lost Dean for 26 runs, and on Saturday, between eleven o'clock and half past one, Fenwick received such moderate help that at the interval eight wickets had fallen for 189. Fenwick played with skill and patience for two hours fifty minutes and, hitting eight 4's, he made the best score of the match. A long reach enabled him to go safely forward to the pitch of the good length ball; his back play was strong and he used many means of scoring with effect until, trying to pull, he gave an easy catch. He cut, drove, hit to leg and hooked so well that his first error in the last over before lunch was very unfortunate.

The Eton eleven showed their delight when Holt, after heavy scoring in most matches during the season, and a grand century a year before at Lord's, blundered through eagerness to score fast and this rashness—pardonable when victory was desired so keenly—accounted for the cheap dismissal of several of the Harrow eleven; the rising ball could not be punished before a batsman became accustomed to the faster pace of the pitch. Marsham bowled slow right with clever flight and varied spin, Garnier mixed his medium deliveries, and Farebrother, fairly fast left-hand, always required watching.

When Eton lost two wickets for four runs Harrow were heading for success and, except when Clarke and Boughey put on 53, little opposition was offered. Boughey batted extremely well but, after scoring quite briskly, he was out to a slow full-pitch which apparently swung in the wind, for he did not attempt to play it. Strong in driving and cutting, Boughey showed admirable form. After tea, Hayward rounded off a capital performance by taking the last two wickets. Boulton kept up a good pace and by dismissing some of the most dangerous opponents he helped materially in making a Harrow triumph appear possible.

Wanting 149 runs to win Harrow went in at five minutes past five. They at once lost Dean to a catch so close to the ground that the umpires consulted before deciding against the batsman. Then Fenwick and Holt, despite a stoppage by rain, batted with easy confidence until a heavy downpour caused the abandonment of a very interesting struggle which might have produced a splendid finish.

Of the 109 matches played, Eton have won 43, Harrow 35, and 31 have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857 which has been rejected.

The one-day matches between the two schools during the War are not reckoned as belonging to the regular series.

They owed nearly everything to Hamilton and Hudson who, in a capital third wicket partnership, added 164. Hitting confidently all round the wicket, Hamilton, apart from a chance when 54, batted faultlessly; he included among his strokes a 6 and twenty-one 4's. The Engineers, set to score 316 in three and threequarter hours, collapsed badly before steady bowling and keen fielding. Hardy (slow) bowled admirably. Nicholson, of the Engineers, earned high praise for his excellent wicket-keeping.

At Lord's, July 25, 26. Tonbridge won by eight wickets. Few batsmen did themselves justice in a comparatively low-scoring match. Only a dogged innings by G. A. Gibbs, the captain, who drove and cut soundly, saved Clifton from complete collapse. Half the side fell for 48 before Gibbs and Hooper added 48. Although Pettman and Wood put on 76 for the second wicket, Tonbridge were not always happy against the leg-break bowling of N. Gibbs, and Cleghorn also caused them considerable trouble. A lead of 34 proved invaluable to Tonbridge, whose captain, Yeats Brown, bewildered the opposition to such an extent that he took altogether nine wickets for 78 runs. During a fifth wicket partnership of 116 by Paget and Mayers, Cheltenham passed their opponents' score and big hitting followed from Phillips. Consequently when Geary declared, Haileybury faced a task of getting 177 to avoid an innings defeat, but they made light work of it. Burridge punished Geary for 16 in the first over and though the opening pair were dismissed by the time the total reached 71, St. George and Shephard completely mastered the bowling in an unfinished stand of 137.

Walker, mainly by well-timed drives and leg hits, made fourteen 4's before falling to a brilliant catch but the outstanding performer was Proud, who, in each innings, gave a dazzling display. Hitting three 6's and seven 4's he scored 84 in ninety minutes and when batting a second time eclipsed everyone by completing a century in forty-nine minutes.
