HARROW v. WINCHESTER

At Harrow, June 21. Winchester won by 90 runs. Consistent batting and effective bowling by D. A. A. Gray were responsible for a repetition of the previous year's success. H. A. Pawson, the Winchester captain, again excelled with the bat. Following an admirable start by E. M. P. Welman and R. J. Foster in a stand of 76, Pawson played a strong game and during two hours hit ten 4's in his 87 not out. His strokes all round the wicket were timed accurately and well placed. E. L. Ashton and Gray also gave useful help. Considering the strength of the batting D. C. H. McLean bowled in a manner worthy of high praise. In 22 overs he was hit for only 35 runs and took five wickets. Medium-paced to fast, with length and spin, he kept all the batsmen quiet for long spells. Gray, if a little more costly, proved a greater menace to Harrow, his left-arm medium deliveries causing definite trouble whenever he was on. T. C. N. Flynn gave a remarkable display of free scoring, but, though hitting a 6 and fourteen 4's while making 81 runs in about forty minutes, he never demoralised Gray. Flynn excelled in straight driving. After the dismissal of G. F. Anson and E. Crutchley the Harrow batsmen did not offer much steady resistance. A little more defence in support of Flynn might have staved off defeat, for the last two batsmen withstood the attack for twenty minutes and time had nearly expired when the match ended. Besides batting with high skill Pawson bowled finely, dismissing two men in twenty-one overs which cost only 32 runs; he also held two catches and so enjoyed a very large share of the practical work while leading his side to victory. The school coaches, E. Hendren and E. H. Bowley, umpired.

WINCHESTER v. ETON

At Winchester, June 29. Drawn. Winchester were unfortunate in not gaining a victory that would have broken a disappointing sequence lasting since 1920. Of the games subsequent to that year Eton have won four, the last in 1931, sixteen being drawn. This last match was the ninth unfinished in succession. H. A. Pawson carried off the honours with all-round performance of high merit. Going in when his side were faring badly, Pawson scored a brilliant century, ten 4's coming from his bat. P. A. Whitcombe and R. A. Chambers, both showing good form, helped Pawson to a position strong enough for a declaration—with five men out for 302. So well did Winchester bowl and field that they dismissed six opponents for 92. E. H. Spooner, son of R. H. Spooner, of Lancashire and England, and W. M. Pawson bowled slowly very cleverly. No fewer than 17 of his 32 overs were maidens and five wickets fell to him at the small cost of 45 runs. D. R. A. Gray gave his captain very valuable support and generally Winchester were the better side.

Ardingly had a very short list of matches and consequently had little opportunity of developing into a strong team. The batting lacked aggression, although Marriott, Palmer and Trotman lived up to their earlier promise. Much of the bowling lacked sting owing to loss of length, and the captain, R. V. Ramirez, might have bowled his slows more often. N. L. Palmer proved himself a sound wicket-keeper.

Beaumont. Of the twelve matches played five were won, six drawn and one lost. No school matches were lost and the one defeat suffered was at the hands of a strong Incogniti XI. J. A. Corbould again captained the side and was himself in splendid form with the bat, making 83 n.o., 86 and 80 n.o. in consecutive innings. The lion's share of the bowling was taken by D. L. Bruen who proved an exceedingly useful opening bowler. Perhaps the most impressive performance of the season was against St. Paul's. In this match the visitors were dismissed for 163 and Beaumont finished the day with 260 for 5, H. C. Holmes (96) and D. L. Bruen (107 not out) putting on 154 for the fourth wicket in a little over an hour. Needless to say the side owes much to the enthusiasm of their coach, Andrew Sandham (late Surrey and England) who will continue to act as coach throughout the coming season.

Bedford had only two old Colours remaining, C. R. Fielden and R. Evan-Jones, so that a large part of the team was made up of young and inexperienced players. Of the five school matches only two were won, Oundle being beaten by one run in a most exciting match, and against St. Paul's the team woke up and played with remarkable confidence. Haileybury and Stowe, both new fixtures which it is hoped will be permanent, were both far too strong, and the match against Dulwich was also lost, due in large part to excellent fielding by the opponents. R. Evan-Jones was the most outstanding batsman, and his not-out innings in the last match of the season against a team of County Cricketers was remarkable. This match gave the team invaluable practice and experience although they were, of course, outplayed. Of the regular bowlers, N. H. Birbeck and P. E. Reeve were most successful and could generally be relied on to maintain a length. C. R. Fielden obtained the most wickets but he was erratic and only against St. Paul's did he find his true form and become almost unplayable. The fielding was poor, but with eight of the team returning for 1941 it was hoped that far greater success would be achieved.

Berkhamsted School. This year Berkhamsted enjoyed a very successful season, winning six, losing three, and drawing one of the games played.

The improvement on last year's results was due to the excellent bowling and fielding, the brunt of the former falling on D. T. Bleakley, T. W. B. Matthews and T. F. B. Messum.

The batting on the whole was mediocre. Most of the side knew how to bat, but, through lack of confidence and determination, failed consistently to make runs. However, although the score was frequently less than 100 they had the satisfaction of having only two big scores made against them.

Bishop's Stortford. McLean's absence through illness was a great blow to the side. Brown replaced him as Captain and led the side well, batting confidently whenever the team faced a crisis. Smith, Medway and Adams often gave useful support, but the batting was usually inferior to the bowling. Here Barker was outstanding and his feat of taking all ten St. Edmund's wickets for sixty-four was a fine performance to watch.

Contrary to 1939 season the College played better against Club sides than against other schools. The best performance was against a strong M.C.C. side, in which they fought back to force a draw on at least equal terms.

Bloxham School. A. C. Bulford, A. M. Brassington, R. E. C. Dutton and on occasions, P. R. Dawkins, were the mainstay of the batting. Bulford played two really stylish innings during the season, while Brassington could nearly always be relied on to keep one end going. L. H. Battle, a late discovery, proved to have exceptional bowling talent. R. E. C. Dutton and L. Hinton also bowled very steadily.

The captain—S. G. Lester—though unlucky with the bat, bowled extremely well on many occasions and throughout the season set an inspiring example in the field. Mention should also be made of the valuable wicket-keeping of H. Godwin-Brown.

At **Bradfield Elgood** was the only one of the old Colours to come up to expectations, and he proved by a long way the best batsman in the side. Cain was inconsistent in batting, and Brocklehurst could not recapture his old brilliance, but he proved a capable captain, setting an excellent example in the field and making two particularly good catches in the match against Wellington. Of the newcomers, Francis was a watchful bat, very sound on the leg side, and Evans showed promise as a bowler.

Brentwood won seven matches, lost three and drew three. The team was a useful batting one, well captained by W. R. Hanworth, who was consistently good all round. On only three occasions was the bowling collared. The match with Forest School was won, that against Bancroft School was lost, while the Chigwell match ended in a draw.

Brighton's season was completely upset by war and weather, matches against St. Paul's, Westminster and Lancing having to be scratched, and the weather preventing any play in matches against

a Sussex XI and against Christ's Hospital. Only three old Colours were available, and only six matches could be played; that against Epsom College being won, and those against the more experienced Cranleigh, Dulwich and M.C.C. sides being lost by narrow margins. The bowlers, backed up by excellent wicket-keeping and fielding, usually managed to dismiss the opposition for reasonable scores, but reliability in the batting to add the few extra runs so often necessary for victory was lacking.

Bristol Grammar School. Owing to circumstances, the full programme of matches could not be completed. However, the team, which was built up round three of last season's regular players, showed great promise; winning four and drawing two of the six matches played. In the field, R. Douse and J. K. R. Graveney led the attack and were well backed up by K. Shaw and C. E. Hill, who proved very useful change bowlers. The fielding was of a high standard, following the example set by R. G. G. Taylor, who also showed sound judgment as captain. Batting was not as consistently good as it might have been, but most of the side were capable of making runs.

Bromsgrove, despite the lack of facilities at Llanwrtyd Wells, had a successful season, winning four matches and drawing two out of eight played. The season was characterised by low scoring, both aggregate and individual; only twice did a side score 150. H. N. Pickering-Clarke finished top of the batting averages; I. A. Jones, an able captain, could generally be relied upon to put together a presentable number of runs when the occasion demanded. J. M. H. Roberts and E. J. Lloyd showed promise for future years.

The bowling was always steady. T. E. Other was a distinct find, and bowled well all through the season. P. Wynne-Jones did well at times as a slow spin-bowler, and E. J. R. Fowler's performance, although still rather erratic, showed an improvement on last year's. The cricket was always interesting and keen, the most heartening feature being the out-cricket, R. Bellamy particularly distinguishing himself.

Canford had a most interesting season of School matches. For the first time a two-day match was played against Downside, and despite some brilliant play by H. E. Watts, the Downside captain, Canford won by five wickets. Their success was largely due to two timely and hurricane fifties by B. P. Elvy. Marlborough won by 6 runs in the last over, and the matches against Bruton, Dartmouth, and Taunton were drawn.

The side was difficult to get out, being able to bat all the way through. The captain, J. H. Covington, had a successful season, with a century against Dartmouth. The bowling was short of a good left-hander, but was otherwise well up to standard. The fielding was always sound and occasionally really good.

On the whole **Caterham** had a successful season despite some bad lapses. As usual, the bowling and fielding were stronger than the batting, which lacked steadiness. The team showed great keenness in the field and supported, to the full, the excellent bowling. The batsmen took too many risks in their efforts to be free scoring.

Cricket at **Charterhouse** was only slightly affected by the war. A few club fixtures were cancelled, but with the exception of Westminster all the usual School teams were met. Harrow were defeated in a one-day match, the other three matches being drawn. This welcome victory over Harrow, notable for the decisively rapid scoring of 231 for no wicket before lunch by Larking and Lovett, was the best performance of the season. The drawn match at Wellington was disappointing; some expensive mistakes in the field helped to ruin the Winchester match; and it was tantalising to be robbed of victory by one wicket at Eton.

Besides being an ideal captain, Larking was an experienced and sound number one. Peet was a stylish number three and Tanner, with an average of 80, was a tower of strength in the middle of the team. The rest of the batting was strong but not always consistent.

In the end a good bowling combination was built up: Griffiths and Donne, both fairly fast right-arm bowlers, were supported by Hoban, an in-swinging and Podmore, fast left-arm, and by Larking, Peet and Ferris, all three slow right-arm spin bowlers.

In Tanner, Charterhouse had the best wicket-keeper since A. G. Powell.

Cheltenham. Captained as it was by the only experienced player, the XI could not expect an entirely successful season. The school matches were, on the whole, disappointing from this point of view. Against the clubs, however, which put up much stronger sides, the XI gave a very much better showing and the results were more cheering. As it was a youngish side the majority of this year's XI should be here for another year and, with many older players, a more successful season in 1941 was looked forward to.

Chigwell. Of the 12 matches played, 2 were won, 7 drawn and 3 lost. Matches against Bishop's Stortford College, Forest School, Bancroft's and Brentwood were drawn, while the match with Felsted resulted in a heavy defeat. Outstanding performances in bowling were B. C. Levett, 6 wickets for 26 against Bishop's Stortford, and D. E. A. Sherlock, 6 wickets for 43 against Essex Club and Ground. In batting, P. M. Clarke scored 58 against Forest and B. C. Levett 65 against Brentwood and 109 against Haileybury II. The side was young and promises well for next season, with seven old Colours left.

Christ's Hospital had the best team in their history, and an extremely successful season, four of the eight matches being won,

the rest drawn. St. John's, Leatherhead, Cranleigh, Dulwich and Eastbourne (the last three only after desperate struggles) were school matches won; the Whitgift match was drawn, and rain spoilt the game against Epsom. Pearson captained the side excellently, but rather failed in batting, and Bayley, Cox and Pinnock, all newcomers, took the batting honours. The bowling had variety, and the fielding was of a very high standard.

City of London School was, although devoid of any single player of outstanding merit, a better all-round team than the very successful XI of last year. There were no centuries, but the tail of the team consisted of only one man. The brunt of the bowling fell upon the fast-medium bowlers for there was no fast bowler and only one slow bowler worthy of the name.

In the first year of evacuation, six major matches were arranged. Only one of these was a clear win, but against Dauntsey's School, Marlborough College 2nd XI and Savernake C.C. very favourable draws were registered. The Masters match was lost by five runs after an impudent and imprudent declaration. The only serious defeat was against the K.R.R.C. 2nd Btn. A County bowler dismissed the team for 43. The School worked hard and four Army wickets were down for 25 runs. Two University and County batsmen soon took the score, however, to 143.

Clifton College. The XI had a successful season which was unfortunately cut short early in July, before the Cheltenham and Tonbridge matches, when the school broke up through enemy action.

N. Gibbs, bowling well throughout, proved an extremely good captain in the field, also managing frequently to make runs when most needed.

The bowling was strong, A. K. Rees tossing his leg breaks with considerable success; while E. R. Prentice and D. C. Jenkins were useful on a fast wicket. R. J. Potter and Rees, by consistent high scores, bore the brunt of the batting, which otherwise, apart from Gibbs, was rather weak; although R. H. Oats, J. G. Clarke, and T. J. O. Hickey played some useful innings. Fielding was well above the average.

The best performance was the defeat of a good M.C.C. side by 36 runs.

Cranbrook, whose fixture list was somewhat different from that of previous years owing to the evacuation of many of their usual opponents, had a successful season. As the weather was so good and the side strong in bowling, all ten matches reached a definite result, seven being won and three lost. Three of the inter-school matches resulted in victories, two against Sutton Valence and one against Whitgift while two defeats were suffered at the hands of Hurstpierpoint. The batting was rather uncertain and too much

depended upon D. R. O'R. Shearburn, an attacking left-hander, and F. J. G. Shearburn, the captain, a steady right-hander. Both brothers hit centuries against Sutton Valence, and though the side was rich in potential batsmen none of the others got going. The bowling was in the hands of F. J. G. Shearburn and R. S. O'R. Shearburn (fast medium right), D. R. O'R. Shearburn (medium left) and D. A. Cleland (slow left), a combination against which even on the plumb wickets which prevailed throughout the summer no side scored more than 174. The bowlers were greatly assisted by the consistent form of G. S. Stubbs, the best wicket-keeper the school has possessed for some years. Cleland, the new captain, expected the assistance of four other members of the 1940 XI.

Cranleigh. Six matches were won, 3 lost and 1 drawn. Victories being gained over Brighton and St. John's, Leatherhead, and defeats were suffered at the hands of Christ's Hospital and Epsom.

The batting was rather inconsistent but the bowling throughout the season was excellent—R. J. C. Higgins and C. M. Gravell being outstanding.

On the whole, **Dauntsey's** had a good eleven, playing nine matches of which six were won, two lost and one drawn. The batting and bowling were both sound, without producing any outstanding players. But steady bowling does not necessarily win matches, and the lack of really hostile bowlers was sometimes rather obvious. The fielding was adequate, although the season was remarkable for the few really hard catches accepted. Difficult chances must be missed occasionally, but time after time a hard catch was refused, and a good batsman went on to make a valuable score. Except for these criticisms, however, it was a very successful season.

Denstone College. Denstone played twelve matches, won five, lost two and drew five, scoring 1,635 runs for the loss of 65 wickets, an average of 25.11 runs a wicket, against their opponents 1,219 runs for the loss of 93 wickets, an average of 13.10 runs a wicket.

Of inter-school games, that against K.E.S. Birmingham was won easily, those against Lancing, Trent and Worksop were drawn, the first two very much in Denstone's favour and that against Wrekin was lost by 15 runs. Against Trent a record score for Denstone cricket was reached, 315 for 6 wickets. It was a young team, four of the best cricketers being under sixteen, and the prospects for the next two years looked bright. Richards, the captain, Cutty and Gilbert all batted consistently and Richards was outstanding in the field. Gilbert was the best bowler in an attack that was steady rather than dangerous.

Douai. Despite the fact that a number of matches were unavoidably cancelled the season was a successful one. Of the ten

matches played, six were won, including three of the four school games. This success was due primarily to smart fielding which kept down the runs and helped the bowlers considerably. The batting was weak apart from that of the captain, B. H. Richardson, and D. S. Scratton, who both fulfilled the promise of the previous season. The former was the most successful bowler, his 52 wickets in the ten games being a great achievement. T. A. Dunphy and B. Bland also bowled well.

Dover's first season in the West Country was very satisfactory. Out of the nine matches played four were won—against Blundell's, Highgate, R.N.C. Dartmouth, and an Army XI; three were drawn; and two, against Downside and Exeter C.C., were lost.

Individually the batting was not good. Far too much depended on Bloy, who, however, was in a class by himself and played several fine innings. For school matches he returned the excellent average of 63. Hill was a very useful opening bat, and played some good innings. Pearce, too, played one or two good forcing innings. Davy, Hawkes and Dixon were, however, very disappointing. Godfrey developed well and hit hard.

The bowling lacked sting, but at times was good. Davy and Farrar were both rather unlucky with the new ball. Hawkes was the steadiest of all the bowlers, but was better at keeping the runs down than getting wickets. Bloy was capable of bowling out any side, when he bowled a length, with his leg-breaks and googlies, but he nearly always bowled long-hops. Pearce did not have much luck with his left arm slows.

A refreshing feature of the season was the fielding, which several times was favourably commented on by our opponents, and it was a delight to watch Hawkes, Elliott, Bloy, Hill, Davy and Pearce on the field. McCrae was a more than satisfactory wicket-keeper.

On paper **Downside** did not enjoy a more than moderately successful season. Of the ten matches played four were won, five lost, and one left drawn. These results, however, were not truly indicative of the team's ability. At least three of the matches lost might well have gone the other way, and the drawn game was in the school's favour. The season was marked by the magnificent performance of H. E. Watts, the captain, who in nine completed innings scored over nine hundred runs, including five three-figure innings. His 187 not out against the Oratory, and his average for the season of 104.22 broke two school records, both previously held by M. J. Turnbull. Though inevitably overshadowed, the rest of the batting showed much solid quality. R. D. C. Bacon, M. G. Lockett, and P. J. Ezra all played useful innings, while V. Wylie, of Colts' age, more than justified expectations and showed great promise.

The bulk of the bowling fell to L. D. Carton-Kelly and H. M. C.

O'Driscoll, who kept the scores against the eleven down to very moderate figures. The slow spin bowling of H. E. Watts also met with success, especially in school fixtures; while R. D. C. Bacon took useful wickets. The fielding was keen and accurate throughout the season.

Durham had a disappointing season. Only nine matches could be played, and of these five were lost, two drawn, and two won. Orwin, the captain, failed to find his real form during the term, though he represented the County during the holidays. Perhaps the best match was against Ampleforth when Durham made 218 for 7, to which Ampleforth replied with 171 for 7.

The **Eastbourne XI** of 1940 was not so strong as its predecessors of 1938 and 1939, and enforced evacuation from the College in June did not improve matters.

Previous to leaving, the side had suffered defeat at the hands of Tonbridge, Lancing and Christ's Hospital, although the last-named match produced an excellent game with a close finish. The match v. M.C.C., however, proved to be the best match of the season, M.C.C. winning by only 18 runs.

After leaving the School was temporarily split in half, but the match v. Radley was played at Radley and resulted in a drawn game.

Ellesmere. Under the captaincy of J. K. Davies, the School XI had a most successful season. Liverpool College and Shrewsbury 2nd proved too good for them, but in the return game at Shrewsbury and against Merchant Taylor's, Crosby, they were victorious. A Lancing XI and several good club and regimental teams were also defeated. The batting and fielding were good, but the bowling was weaker than for some seasons past.

Eltham College. Although the results of matches were not impressive—seven being lost, four won—the team did develop into a very fine fielding side and were a pleasure to watch. E. D. Mullins, the captain, gave the team a fine example. G. S. Tilzey proved the outstanding all-rounder.

Epsom had a very successful season, partly because, with only two old colours, keenness and competition throughout the season was exceptionally high. N. O. Bennett captained the side very efficiently and scored a lot of runs. Prentice and Smith also batted well on many occasions. Hartley bowled very fast but was sometimes erratic, whereas Mitchell (J.) bowled very consistently the whole season.

Two matches were lost, six were won and three drawn. Amongst those beaten were Lancing, K.C.S., Leatherhead, O.Ep-sonians, Cranleigh and the Masters.

The fielding and especially the catching was once again excellent. N. O. Bennett will again captain the side in 1941, with H. F. Mitchell as the only old colour supporting him.

Eton College was unbeaten through the season and completed their success by defeating Harrow. The College was somewhat lucky in two of the school matches—against Winchester and Charterhouse—which were both drawn. B. B. H. Rodwell batted most consistently throughout the season making a century against Haileybury. D. W. J. Colman (captain) and A. F. S. Coats were also prominent in the scoring.

A. D. Gibbs was the most successful bowler, especially against Radley and Harrow. C. D. D. Gilmour continued to bowl his slows with moderate success. E. H. Spooner was wicket-keeper, and made some good catches and stumps. He was also an admirable opening bat.

Exeter School had a sound batting side, D. K. Mackay, A. C. T. Pellow and G. J. Jones being outstanding. The bowling was, however, rather weak, J. G. Goss being the only success. The fielding was again of a high standard. The School beat King's College (Taunton), Kelly College and Blundell's 2nd XI, and several matches were drawn. The side was again ably led by D. K. Mackay.

Felsted, through evacuation, lost all their scores and records so no report was available.

Although **Forest** did not win so many matches as was hoped, the cricket was always interesting to watch.

The batting of A. B. Cowie, the captain, was consistently good, and twice he and Weir put on 100 for the first wicket.

Their main trouble was that the best batsmen were also the best bowlers, with the result that the bowling suffered, as late batsmen did not make many runs. However, in the field nearly 50 catches were held.

Matches were drawn with Chigwell School and Wellingborough but lost to Brentwood, M.C.C., and Essex Club and Ground rather badly. There was an exciting match against Woodford Wells, where the school won by one run.

Framlingham. Owing to an evacuation to Repton during the middle of the term, some fixtures had to be cancelled; nevertheless before moving the Quilibets and Ipswich School were beaten by substantial margins; matches with Campsea Ashe and Norwich School were drawn; and against the Suffolk Ramblers and the Suffolk Club and Ground the school lost.

Worry as to who would be good enough to stay with P. J. H. Dobson, the captain, while he made the runs was soon dispelled, no less than four batsmen compiling very good 50's, while others did their bit in a smaller way. J. P. Davey and J. M. Ruffel were the best bowlers, but neither had full opportunity of showing his capabilities.

Haileybury, under the captaincy of A. B. Sheldon, supported by four old colours, had a side whose individual development should have led to greater success as a combined team.

The batting strength, though the whole side was capable of runs, lay mainly with the captain, who enjoyed a very successful season; L. K. Purkiss and J. S. Slater proved a consistent opening pair; A. Fairbairn, a left-hander, was the soundest batsman, while S. T. Theobald, who made a fine century in his first appearance at Lord's, proved himself full of runs on a hard wicket.

The school were lucky to have such a good pair of opening bowlers in Purkiss and A. J. Ross, and they both did excellently. A. J. Dickinson ably supported them with his off-spinners, and was an intelligent and accurate bowler. A. J. Hardy, who had earned a place in the 1939 Lord's Schools XI, quite failed to reproduce his form, which was very disappointing.

Of the 14 matches played, five were won, five drawn, and four lost. The Harrow game ended in a draw in favour of Harrow, in spite of a fine century by A. B. Sheldon; Bedford was easily beaten. Both the Leys and Wellington matches were ruined by rain; Eton was saved by the clock and early bad slips in the field, after Purkiss had taken 8 for 54; at Lord's, an excellent indecisive game was played against Marlborough.

The fielding was generally good, and at times brilliant with the captain generally setting a fine example on the off-side. Altogether the season gave the greatest encouragement for a really good team in 1941 with eight old colours available.

Harrow started the season with eight of the team that had beaten Eton in 1939 still available, and with A. O. L. Lithgow still in the captaincy. They looked, and were, a very strong team, but after a few weeks P. E. E. Prideaux-Brune and G. E. J. Rushbrooke were called up unexpectedly soon, and G. F. Anson was away for most of the matches. Rushbrooke was a newcomer to the side, but had established himself as a valuable opener, while Prideaux-Brune and Anson were two of the strongest of the middle batsmen, so that their loss upset the balance of the side, and their places were hard to fill.

Lithgow himself made runs in almost every match without perhaps showing quite the command that he had done the previous year, but he had to keep changing his place to suit the current needs of his team. D. F. Henley emerged as a forceful batsman as well as the steadiest bowler, but E. Crutchley struck an unlucky patch in the middle of the season, though he began and ended like the good bat that he obviously was. T. C. N. Flynn was the hitter of the side, and was successful and by no means wild. Apart from Henley, D. C. H. McLean and J. F. Godsell were the most effective bowlers, with J. L. Cowley providing variety with his leg-breaks.

The start was very successful with easy wins against two strong Oxford sides and the Town. M.C.C. had the better of a draw, and then came the first school match, that against Haileybury. In this Harrow had the upper hand in a drawn game, only a fine innings by their captain saving Haileybury from defeat. After this things began to go wrong with various players falling out. The Winchester match should have been drawn, but the middle batsmen took this too much for granted, and Winchester saw their chance and got Harrow all out. At Charterhouse apathy descended on the side, and Charterhouse were able to score 230 before lunch without loss. Afterwards Harrow roused themselves, and the innings was over within an hour. But it was too late, and Charterhouse won the match. The Harrow Wanderers were rained out, and so for the Eton match Harrow were short of coherent practice. After an even and uneventful Harrow innings, a single partnership looked like giving Eton an easy win. But, as at Charterhouse, Harrow at last woke up, and Henley brought about a sudden collapse. Three wickets fell for one run, and Eton still needed 6 runs when the last man came in. After an agonisingly long time they eventually made them, but this last half-hour had done much to make amends for all the things that had been happening since the start of the season which, as it turned out, had been too good to last.

Haverfordwest. All matches were against service units and clubs. The team was ably captained by S. K. Lucas, and was successful in the majority of its fixtures. L. G. James was the outstanding batsman, and his 104 not out created a new school record. W. J. L. Harries and W. L. Evans were a sound pair of opening bowlers. The wicket-keeping of M. Worthy and the fielding generally, reached a high standard.

Hereford Cathedral School. With a record of eight matches won, one lost and two drawn, the XI enjoyed a highly successful season. Owing to the war, the fixture card of necessity underwent some changes from the normal, but the team's performances against some strong sides give reason for thinking that it will bear comparison with the best elevens of the past. Seven matches were played against other schools, of which five were won—those against Llandoverly College; Royal Grammar School, Worcester; Hereford High School, and two against Five Ways School, Birmingham. The game with Christ's College, Brecon, was drawn, the missing of a simple catch at a critical stage depriving Hereford of victory, and in the match against Monmouth School a breakdown in the batting was responsible for the Cathedral School's defeat. Of the remaining matches three were against club teams, and in the fourth a powerful Old Herefordian side was beaten on the stroke of time after a declaration by the school.

The batting generally was satisfactory, every member of the

side being capable of getting runs. There were steady batsmen to open the innings, quick scorers to follow, and a tail that could wag—if indeed it could be called a tail. Certainly there were no "rabbits."

G. R. Deacon had a highly successful season and nearly always got runs; W. L. Griffiths could hit very hard, but was sometimes too eager to force the pace; and D. P. Lloyd was a polished and attractive batsman who with ordinary luck would have scored many more runs. The bowling was strong and varied. H. A. Rudge was a fast bowler of quite exceptional merit; W. L. Griffiths could make the new ball swing disconcertingly, and on several occasions took valuable quick wickets at the beginning of an innings. R. J. Lloyd and R. E. Curtis kept an admirable length and were usually difficult to score off. The fielding was probably the least satisfactory feature of the school's cricket; very good in some matches, it was indifferent in others.

Highgate, although considerably handicapped by evacuation, had an interesting though not outstanding season. Of the nine matches played, four were won, three drawn and two lost. The most exciting games of the season were against Exeter School, and an Incogniti XI. In the first, the eleventh man had to survive the last over in order to prevent defeat by nineteen runs. In the second, the School just managed to win by nine runs, with five minutes to spare.

The batting was the main weakness, and except for periodic flashes of true form by K. I. Thornton, S. S. Rogers and R. A. Clark, it was on the whole disappointing.

The bowling was good and varied. R. A. Stillman, fast-medium left hand, bowled very steadily throughout the season. S. S. Rogers slow off breaks, D. I. Allport slow leg breaks, J. D. Dean slow off breaks and R. G. Watson medium paced inswingers, together with a keen field, provided an effective attack, which dismissed most opponents for very moderate totals.

S. S. Rogers captained the side extremely well, and after the school season played for the British Empire XI and Lord's XI.

Hurstpierpoint turned out a young team which improved rapidly with experience. During the first month the school lost to Lancing and Whitgift, but, following this, there came a run of seven successive victories including Westminster, Cranbrook, Emanuel, Caterham, Ardingly, and an M.C.C. team. The eleven finished the season with eight wins, two draws out of fourteen matches played.

Imperial Service College. The season was tantalising in several respects. Brilliant weather came in May and June, but a slight outbreak of mumps meant that several matches had to be cancelled. Net facilities were better than ever before, although the turf had still to settle down, but owing to war-time economies,

coaching was not available. Individually the team was quite strong but, except in the first match, they were never in form as a team, and consequently lost matches which they might very well have won. It was the batting which failed most frequently, for no member of the side could be counted on to make runs with any consistency, although several good innings were played. The hesitancy and lack of determination which characterised last year's side were again evident, and as a result moderate bowling was made to appear good. The team contained three good bowlers, but after them the standard dropped considerably, and the attack lost its sting. The standard of fielding, however, was high and never became ragged.

The **King's School and St. Edmund's School, Canterbury.** Both schools had to evacuate from Canterbury at the end of May, and joined forces in Cornwall. Owing to the difficulties of evacuation, and the lack of a suitable ground, only three matches could be arranged. The most important of these was played against the Royal Naval College, Dartmouth, at Dartmouth, and the schools were somewhat unlucky to lose by 58 runs, the scores being Royal Naval College 260, King's School and St. Edmund's, Canterbury, 202. The side was ably captained by J. B. Goudge, and with more matches and practice would undoubtedly have had a good season.

The **King's School, Macclesfield.** had on the whole a successful season. Of the seventeen matches played they won five, lost four and drew eight; against other schools they won four, lost two and drew six. E. Fairhurst captained a young, keen, and well-balanced side, though the batting depended rather too much upon Goodwin, a sound and powerful bat, Heaton, a very promising left-hander, and the captain himself, an erratic starter but a fine bat when he settled down. The bowling was above the average. Hargreaves, fast medium, kept a good length and pace for long spells, Goodwin's leg-breaks, though less consistent in length than in previous seasons, were very effective, and Carmichael and Bennett, both slow spin bowlers, gave useful support. Fairhurst set a fine example in the field, and the fielding was generally good.

R. N. Heaton, captain for 1941, expected three others of this side with him, and some very promising youngsters.

The **King's School, Peterborough,** had another successful season, especially in inter-school matches, and very few matches were lost. Good victories were won over Kings' Ely, King's Grantham, and the Old Boys, who included two County players. The games with Oundle 2nd and Downing College, Cambridge, were drawn, quite creditably, and the only bad defeat was against the Rev. Laurence Smith's XI, which included some of the Lincolnshire side. Generally the old colours did well, especially D. J. W. Bridge and K. A. Hall, who both kept wicket well and played some useful innings.

King's School, Rochester, were another side upset by evacuation. They had to make two moves, the second to Taunton School, where they now are, and this allowed only six matches to be played. Of these two were won, three lost and one drawn, the only school match being against Maidstone. The bowling was promising, and at full strength had plenty of variety. B. W. W. Amos, who is to be captain for 1941, took most wickets, bowling medium left-hand, and he was well supported by F. G. Rayner-Sharpe, M. J. Loder, and J. S. R. Shave. Both batting and fielding were improving rapidly.

King's, Taunton, began the season with five old colours in P. M. Phillips, D. B. Delany, H. W. Wood, P. W. F. Lamb, and W. L. Rhys. It was most unfortunate that epidemics in other schools caused the cancellation of such matches as those versus Sherborne, Allhallows, Wellington, Clayesmore while Kelly College had to cancel the game there owing to a saturated wicket. As for the last few seasons, the success of the team was due rather to team play than to outstanding performances by any individual. D. B. Delany showed fine batting form, often showing a thinly veiled contempt for some bowling that would have done credit to an aged performer. H. W. Wood usually batted nicely and his footwork was good, though he seemed unable to overcome a weakness on the leg side, also playing his shots a fraction too early and seemingly over-studiously. The bowling though steady was rather lacking in variety and aggressiveness. The attack was mainly in the hands of W. L. Rhys and H. W. Wood, who had a thankless task on the season's batsman's wickets. The former perhaps takes too long a run, unless the psychological effect on the batsman is thought to be worth while, but he kept it up for surprisingly long spells. Wood, with a much smoother action, bowled more loose stuff than he used to. The standard of fielding was particularly encouraging, the ground fielding always being sound and few chances were missed.

King's College School, Wimbledon, had a most disappointing season, winning only one match out of 10, and losing 7. Their solitary success was against Incogniti, when Llewellyn and Bonn put on 203 for the first wicket. For the most part the batting was very poor, but Llewellyn had a good season and showed immense improvement. Cotton was quite off form in bowling, but Rubin was steady and Duvall's leg-breaks were sometimes dangerous. Bonn, as captain, had an unenviable task, which he fulfilled with determination and cheerfulness. Six old colours remain in 1941 to assist L. T. Cotton.

Kings' School, Ely, had a mediocre season, but this is explained by the fact that only one colour (P. H. Flear) remained. Flear was the most dependable bat and a good wicket-keeper. R. J. Joyce met with some long-handled success and two young batsmen in

J. O. Walker and G. M. Mudford showed promise. These two were very good fielders, too, Walker being extraordinarily lively in the slips.

The bowling was fairly good. D. R. T. Beard kept up a fine pace for long spells, and his length was commendable. E. G. T. Sharpe's off-spinners were effective, while R. J. Joyce may develop into a good left-handed slow bowler, though he was apt to bowl too many full pitches. W. H. B. Wood bowled fast and might have been given more to do.

Two matches were won against Service sides, and in all four were wins, six were lost and three drawn. The most exciting game was against Perse School, Cambridge, which was lost by Ely by three runs.

Lancing had at last a team well above the average. Won four, lost two, drawn one, was indeed an excellent start to any season, and then unfortunately came the exodus to Ludlow. The improvement was due more to the excellence of the fielding than anything else, and two victories, the first against Hurstpierpoint and the second against the M.C.C. were gained because every catch was held. In school matches Hurstpierpoint and Eastbourne were beaten. Westminster was drawn and matches against Epsom and Tonbridge were lost. One of the most remarkable matches ever played at Lancing was the game against Westminster; 5 wickets were down for 2 runs, 7 for 17, and all out for 250!

A. A. McIntyre and A. C. Burnett were two outstanding batsmen—both were fine stroke players and therefore were always interesting to watch. R. F. Young, left-hand, and A. A. McIntyre who swung the ball away, were two good bowlers, but too much depended on their ability to get the opponents out.

Leeds Grammar School. A very young side played no school matches, owing to evacuation difficulties. Of ten matches played, five were won, four drawn, and one lost. J. W. Sanderland proved an excellent wicket-keeper, and J. Slater did remarkably well as a slow left-handed bowler. The batting of Walton and Ivey was sound and was assisted by two masters, whose names have not been included in the averages.

Leighton Park School, Reading. R. R. Relf appeared as coach for the first time and undoubtedly his help and advice did much for the school cricket. Eight school matches were played, six were won, one drawn, and one lost. Possibly the best victory was that against K. F. Nicholson's Eleven, when quite a strong club team was defeated by two wickets. B. R. Garlick bowled well throughout the season as his impressive figures show. In the batting R. G. Salmon again had a successful season; he was also a good and thoughtful captain who did much for his side by his

example in the field. The fielding throughout was of a high standard and every member of the side made runs on occasion. This somewhat curtailed season was one of the best of recent years.

The inevitable cancellation of many of **The Leys'** regular fixtures led to a number of early games against scratch sides which were generally too strong for the school. However, towards the end of term matches were won against Wellingborough and Kingswood. The batting lacked solidity though at times Pepper in his studious and pleasant style, and Vick, a strong hitter of the ball and a consistent if lucky performer, added distinction to an innings. Lambert, too, had his moments as an opening batsman and White who scored in sixes or singles was unreliably successful.

The bowling was never more than ordinary. The opening pair, White and Dunkerley, often looked impressive but were a shade unlucky and if the former seldom lasted well the latter showed promise of becoming a real force. The fielding was never the weak spot, and real keenness often made it fine to watch.

Liverpool College had a quite successful season, winning four matches, drawing five, and losing one. The feature of the season was the batting of Osbaldeston and Jennings who made an exceptionally good opening pair, their best partnerships being 146, 135, 72 and 70. Good wins were obtained in school matches. At Ellesmere the College declared at 183 for 9 and dismissed Ellesmere for 98, Neale taking 4 for 35. Merchant Taylors', Crosby, were dismissed for 102 (Neale four for 13), and the College made 259 for 2 (Osbaldeston 145 not out). Birkenhead School, after having the better of a drawn game early in the term, were defeated in the return match by 18 runs, Kitchin finishing off their innings by taking three wickets in one over.

A good victory was obtained over a Liverpool University "A" XI, who declared at 158 for 9. A century by Jennings enabled the College to pass this total with three wickets down. The only defeat was at the hands of the Old Boys, whose fast bowler, Woodier, was chiefly responsible for the lowest score of the season, 55.

Maidstone Grammar School. It was very unfortunate that one of the best school elevens for years had its activities curtailed by circumstances. In place of the usual School fixtures, matches were played against local teams, many of them weakened by Service calls on their members. Twelve games were played, of which six were won, five drawn, and one lost. Fine weather was responsible for the large number of drawn games. For the second season R. J. C. Harris captained the team, which benefited from his experience as leader. J. S. Ancomb showed himself again to be a good all-rounder, although scoring less runs than in the previous season. His forcing tactics were not always profitable. D. T. Parker and T. Hampshire played well both in attack and defence and were

a promising opening pair. K. M. Gauld should, with more experience, establish himself as a good left-hander, possessing technique and physique. G. E. Wood, who took J. S. Anscomb's place as wicket-keeper, proved to be well worth his place as a sound, forcing bat. The bowling suffered from lack of a good fast bowler, although there was plenty of contrast of style in Anscomb, Stroud, Stevens and Burdge. Fielding, although good, never reached a high standard, the throwing in being weak. Next season the eleven will suffer the loss of four colours, but this should serve as a stimulus to those who have for some time been on the fringe of the school eleven.

Malvern. By kind permission of His Grace the Duke of Marlborough, Malvern had the use of the beautiful ground at Blenheim Palace for the 1940 season. The weather throughout the term was glorious and the setting for the game perfect—facts which did much to mitigate our sadness at missing a season on the ideal, fast-scoring "Senior Turf" at Malvern.

The XI, apart from disastrous defeats at Rugby and St. Edmunds', Oxford, gave a very good account of itself, beating Repton, Cheltenham and Bradfield. The Shrewsbury match was drawn.

Perhaps the most encouraging aspect of the season's play was the way in which the XI played together as a team, under the keen, understanding captaincy of R. A. Young. The batting was uniformly adequate. R. A. Young, P. H. Walker, W. R. S. Dods, and A. H. Dammers batted consistently well and proved the mainstay of the side, while several useful scores were contributed by S. P. T. Houldsworth and H. M. Sells. R. A. Young continued to play his fine off-drive and scored freely; P. H. Walker was perhaps the most reliable bat, and it was a pleasure, in the Bradfield match, to see W. R. S. Dods and P. H. Walker add yet one more big opening partnership to their already large total.

The bowling improved considerably as the season progressed, and though it could hardly be called brilliant, our opponents were frequently dismissed for moderate totals. The brunt of the attack was borne by A. M. Button, S. P. T. Houldsworth, and G. H. Chesterton, all of whom bowled really well at times.

Manchester Grammar School. In spite of war and transport difficulties, more matches were played than in most summers. Only three colours were left at the beginning of the season but there was quite good material available and the results were by no means unsatisfactory. Played 21; won 5; Lost 8; drawn 8; The batting was somewhat uneven and there was a tendency for the side to get rattled if two or three wickets fell cheaply. Sawyer played some good innings and was easily the most attractive batsman. Calvert was rather disappointing, though he played a

good innings against Hulme G.S. Of the others, Morrison shaped well and Robertson hit merrily if he survived the first few balls.

The bowling was good but lacked variety. Gilmour was always accurate and bowled really well; Parry was erratic but had some good spells. Robertson and Holden gave good support. The fielding generally was excellent and in this respect Parry set a good example to his team.

Marlborough beat Cheltenham by an innings and Canford by 6 runs after a most exciting game, as were also those against Wellington and St. Edward's, Oxford, which were lost by two wickets and 7 runs respectively. Eton and Harrow were not played this year, and the match against Winchester was left drawn. At Lord's a new fixture with Haileybury was highly successful, and though the result was a draw, was always full of interest. In J. R. Sale they had perhaps the best batsman in the Public Schools and his captaincy was worth as much as his runs. C. J. Studdert-Kennedy had an off season and though G. E. S. Woodhouse was always steady, the rest of the batsmen were rather unreliable. B. R. Bland's leg-spinners were deadly when he was in form and W. R. Jukes, H. L. T. Radice, and H. E. S. Woodhouse all proved their worth as bowlers. The fielding was always good, while the wicket-keeping of P. M. B. Sutcliffe improved steadily and was particularly conspicuous at Lord's. C. J. Studdert-Kennedy, the new captain, expected to have with him four old colours.

Merchant Taylors'. The 1940 season was undoubtedly a great success. Of the eight wins, four were over schools, U.C.S. (6 wkts.), Berkhamsted (130 runs), Aldenham (5 wkts.), and I.S.C. (9 wkts.); the others were over the Gentlemen of Herts (7 wkts.), Bushey C.C. (8 wkts.), St. Thomas's Hospital (4 wkts.) and the M.C.C. (5 wkts.). Three matches were drawn, those against R.A.F. Depot, Uxbridge, Mr. H. P. Elderton's XI, and Whitgift School, the last two being in our opponents' favour.

Most of the matches were won by good batting. A hundred an hour was the side's usual rate of scoring and this they sometimes exceeded; against I.S.C. 159 was made in barely eighty minutes. Much was owed to the opening pair, Marriott and Stephens, for many solid foundations to the innings, notably 142 against Berkhamsted. Sloley was the most carefree and the most rapid scorer. Harold, Weston, and Drayton also contributed good scores. Robins was the mainstay of the attack and Hawkey bowled untiringly for many long periods whilst Drayton proved a useful fast bowler.

Mill Hill had an enjoyable season in new surroundings. Evacuated to St. Bees, Cumberland, they were fortunate in finding a decent ground, good wickets and congenial opponents. In the school games Mill Hill beat Newcastle R.G.S. and St. Bees, lost

to Sedbergh, had a thrilling tie in a two-day match with Stoneyhurst, and played a favourable draw with Rossall. Against club sides they won 2 games and lost 3.

Wilkinson captained the team very well, and was himself the chief strength of the batting and bowling. He is one of the best bowlers that the school has produced in recent years, and his figures do not do him justice. The other bowling was strong, with Taylor, a leg-break bowler, outstanding with 29 wickets, including a hat-trick, for only 10 runs a-piece, a very good feat for any slow bowler.

The batting was unreliable though Henderson played some good innings when set, and McFarlane and Sears hit with great effect on occasion. McFarlane's 88 against Sedbergh nearly won the match, the last wicket putting on 70 runs. Kinnersley, the wicket-keeper, had several good performances to his credit, and his stumping was particularly neat. The fielding was always sound and at times excellent. Whitehorn, the new captain, hoped to have five other old colours to support him.

Monkton Combe again had a very good season, winning five, and losing only one of their ten matches. Many games, however, had to be cancelled owing to transport difficulties. Dale was the outstanding batsman, and was well supported as far down the order as No. 7. The rest were seldom required, and the team was only once all out. Carter was the mainstay of the attack, but Scott-Martin created a record by performing the hat-trick twice in one season. Next season (1941) three old colours will be available in Dale, Chambers, and Creese-Parsons, with Dale as captain. Chambers, it may be added, kept wicket efficiently and unostentatiously throughout the season. The fielding was always of a high standard.

Mount St. Mary's. Early promise of a good season never matured. Individual achievements, such as J. B. Campbell's nine wickets for 37 runs against Mr. Conroy's XI and J. C. Collingwood's 90 against Sheffield Collegiate, were sometimes seen, but the side never pulled its weight together. The standard of fielding was high and was usually keen and snappy, even when the visiting batsmen had the measure of the home bowling, but the bowling was seldom really dangerous. The loss of J. B. Campbell half-way through the season was a further handicap. Worksop won the inter-school match handsomely, Mount St. Mary's beat Ratcliffe College by 4 wickets, but were only able to draw the match with King Edwards School, Sheffield.

Oakham had one of their most successful seasons for many years. To a large extent this was due to the excellent performances of the captain, A. R. Grier. He was remarkably consistent with the

bat and played a magnificent innings of 212 not out against Trent College. In batting he was well backed up by R. S. Atkins (who had the distinction of scoring two centuries in successive innings), P. J. P. Read, E. D. Palmer, W. S. Walker and R. F. Wagstaff. The result was that many large scores were made. A. R. Grier was also the mainstay of the bowling and took 45 wickets. Victories were gained against Ratcliffe College, Trent College, Kingswood School, The Forty Club and Northants Amateurs. T. S. Atkins (captain), E. D. Palmer, W. S. Walker, J. A. Good, N. T. Smith and D. C. Sansom remain for the 1941 season.

The Oratory School. The Oratory had a good season defeating Whitgift School, St. John's (Leatherhead), Douai School and St. Paul's School, and in all winning twelve matches. The matches against Downside School (at Downside) and Beaumont College at Lord's were drawn. In the Lord's match rain stopped play at 5.30 when Oratory were in a very strong position and would undoubtedly have won for the fifth year in succession. The Oratory 167, Beaumont 79 for 6.

M. C. Bodenham for the second year captained the XI with judgement and was the outstanding bat of the side. He received support from R. A. Slater, F. E. Thornycroft, N. J. Neville and R. H. Smith, all of whom made 50 in school matches. The success of the team was largely due to their field-work. The bowling of Slater and Neville, with a variety of change bowlers in J. Longueville, A. Stillwell and R. H. Smith, backed by superb fielding carried all before it. The Oratory sent one of the best fielding sides they have ever sent to Lord's where their work in the field brought them much praise and favourable comment.

Oundle reached a result in all their fourteen matches, a fact which suggests that "sitting on the splice" was not one of the faults of the team. The team was capable of playing very well, but the batting was not consistent enough to make use of the undoubted strength of the bowling. J. M. Mills was a very successful bowler who took 46 wickets with his leg-breaks and googlies. Mills and G. A. Wilson were the mainstays of the batting, but J. H. Rhodes, P. M. Smith, and others gave valuable support at times. The fielding was good and in Wilson the side had a brilliant fielder near the wicket. Mills proved an experienced captain, and D. S. Lake was improving all the time as wicket-keeper.

Perse won three matches, lost eight and drew one. Of the schools met, Kings', Ely, King's, Peterborough, and Leys II were beaten, the first-named by 3 runs; and defeat suffered from Kings', Ely and St. Edmund's College, Ware, the latter by 5 runs.

The batting of the side was weak, but the bowling steady and well-varied, and the fielding was generally good. Five old colours remain, including last year's captain and vice-captain.

Peter Symonds' School, Winchester, were unable, through evacuation, to play any school matches in 1940, but were better situated for 1941.

Plymouth College. The unusually dry summer of 1940 gave more cricketing hours than are normally enjoyed in the south-west. On balance the number of matches won equalled those lost, and only three were drawn; no fixture was scratched. High scores were recorded against local Service sides, the best being 228 for 3 (dec.) against the R. N. Barracks (Officers). The XI lost to Truro School by an odd run, beat Kelly College by four wickets and drew with Newton College after an excellent game, somewhat marred by unavoidable war-time interruptions. R. G. Atkey captained the side with skill, and though he did not find his form till late in the season, his century in the last match revealed his competence as a bat. K. J. Nicholls fully deserved the success that came to him for his patient and methodical approach to the game over many seasons; he is a graceful bat with fast scoring shots all round the wicket. The brunt of the bowling was taken by two boys, A. J. Gilbert and R. H. Ewens. Gilbert is fast and indefatigable; Ewens might have had more success had he varied his pace; both boys have a useful "in-swinging." In the field, the College XI more than maintained its reputation for clean, keen fielding: all catches were held, and very few runs were given away throughout the season.

The 1940 **Radley** season was an extremely interesting one, and considering the many difficulties that had to be faced, it was not unsuccessful. Of the fifteen matches played five were won, including those against Sherborne and St. Edwards; four were lost, including Eton (by 10 runs), five were drawn, those against Stowe, Bradfield and Eastbourne strongly in Radley's favour, whilst that against Wellington was lost.

Had the bowling possessed a little more devil during the last hour, three more school matches would have been won, and the season would then have been an exceptionally good one. The batting collapsed against Eton and Wellington, but otherwise was consistently good, as the averages would suggest. O. F. O. Womack and T. M. B. Sessions invariably gave the side a good start. M. D. Corke and Sessions both scored over 500 runs each in their first year in the XI. H. R. Taylor was a magnificent driver and Darwin played some admirable innings: Womack always looked a class player, but developed an unfortunate habit of getting out when well set.

The bowling was varied and reasonably steady, but it just lacked the necessary "punch" to dismiss sides cheaply. Darwin bowled very accurately for a bowler of his pace. Hayward, with a variation of "away swingers" and "off spinners" was uncertain

in length. Cornish with his curious flight always wanted watching on a fast wicket. J. P. W. Sawtell was most promising; he never bowled badly and possessed lift and length.

G. T. Pearson kept wicket splendidly and captained the side sensibly and with determination. Darwin, Sessions, Parker and Sawtell remain for 1941.

Reading School. The 1940 side was very young, and this, coupled with indifferent fielding and a lack of enterprise in batting, produced very moderate results. Fourteen matches were played, of which two were won and one drawn. Better results were looked for in 1941 when several of the team would still be available.

Repton started the season with three old colours, all of whom were bowlers, and as a result found the lack of experienced batsmen a great handicap. The side bowled and fielded well and seldom had any difficulty in dismissing its opponents, but, apart from R. J. Norton, none of the side batted consistently.

The matches against Uppingham, Shrewsbury and Malvern were lost, and the match with Rugby ended in a tie.

J. R. R. Holmes was captain-elect for 1941.

Rossall were greatly handicapped in their exile by a much curtailed fixture list, a lack of practice and playing facilities, and the absence on military service of the regular cricket master and the professional. Accordingly, it was decided to build up an unusually young team with an eye on the future, with the result that most of the team, though promising, were too inexperienced. Even so, Newcastle and Carlisle Grammar Schools were soundly beaten. The team went down narrowly to St. Bees in a match that certainly ought to have been won. The Mill Hill match was spoiled by rain, and only against Sedbergh was a really heavy defeat suffered.

The bowling was strong and varied, never losing length, but the batting was unreliable. There were several useful batsmen, but not one with a really dependable defence. Easily the outstanding player was Pocock, whose all-round abilities must in a full season have made him one of the best school cricketers of the year.

Staying on for 1941 were D. A. R. Johnson, J. R. Cowell, J. Bagnall, M. G. Johnson and N. D. Howard, but the team will still be a young one.

Of **Rugby's** three defeats, two were sustained in the absence of L. G. H. Hingley, who was not only the outstanding batsman but proved to be an inspiring leader.

The side played aggressive and attractive cricket and won seven of the remaining twelve games, most of them by wide margins. R. M. Holman again opened the innings with Hingley, and the

batting of this pair was of a very high class; their confidence and smart running added to the value of their many long partnerships.

They were followed by J. A. Boyes, G. M. Toplas and A. J. Pickard, who all made runs quickly and well, so the batting seldom failed to appear formidable. Wickets were shared by eight bowlers, of whom easily the best was W. Q. Dewar, an accurate fastish in-swinging: E. M. L. Robertson showed promise as a leg-spinner, but was often costly. The fielding occasionally faltered, though it could be brilliant; Pickard was prominent in any position and C. D. E. Burney became an excellent wicket-keeper.

The side was at its best in the sunny days of June, and during that month decisively defeated Oundle, Uppingham and Malvern. The other school match produced a thrilling finish, only one run being required for a four wickets' victory over Repton.

Six individual scores of over 100 were compiled, Hingley making 105 against an R.A.F. XI, 175 not out against Malvern, and a brilliant 143 not out in 100 minutes against the Old Rugbeians.

Rydal had a fair season. They played ten matches, won three, lost four and drew the other three. They beat Merchant Taylors, Crosby, by 126 runs and Wallasey Grammar School by seven wickets. The match with Liverpool College was given up through rain after little more than an hour's play. The batting was rather uncertain.

Harrison and Hirst were a sound opening pair and generally gave the side a good start, but apart from Jones-Evans, the captain, and a batsman of real class, none of the others could really be relied on. The bowling was not good. Jones-Evans bowled his spinners with much success, but none of the others looked really capable of getting wickets though on the whole they bowled a fairly steady length. The fielding was reasonably good. Hirst was captain-elect for 1941 and Amos, Crook and Williams were also expected to be available.

St. Albans, under the inspiring leadership of G. F. Pellant, enjoyed one of its most successful seasons, winning seven matches, drawing two, and losing only two. Of the eight inter-school matches, six were won and the other two drawn. In the bowling of Pellant (fast right-hand) and F. Shepherd (slow left) lay the team's main strength, and only in one school match—that against Watford Grammar School, which they were very lucky not to lose—was this attack mastered. W. Fenton, not called upon to bowl so much as the previous season, developed into a sound opening batsman and headed the averages. F. E. Arnold, potentially by far the best bat in the side, apart from two very fine innings, failed to find his true form. P. R. Addington batted more consistently and confidently than before, and Shepherd played a number of

useful, hard-hitting innings. Pellant himself, though rather unsound, hit well at times, especially in the match against Bancroft's School, which was a personal triumph for him. T. H. Furlong kept wicket very well, and the fielding of the whole side improved consistently throughout the term, reaching a very high standard in the last few games.

St. Edmund's School, Canterbury, started the season poorly against a St. Laurence Club side, but before any further games could be played the School was evacuated to Cornwall. There a team from St. Edmund's and King's School, Canterbury, played two or three games of a fairly light-hearted kind. The combined team was beaten narrowly in a high scoring game by Dartmouth Naval College. In this game M. I. Weaver made an admirable 49, and he was obviously the most promising player of the season. A full programme was arranged for 1941.

At the start of the season it seemed certain that St. Edward's, Oxford, would have a side that could bowl but that runs might be at a premium. This proved only too true as only C. F. Deacon proved reliable and batted consistently throughout the season; a left-hander, he was especially good on the leg side. The bowling did not reach expectations, but J. W. Halliday, fast left-hand, bowled well throughout the season, and M. B. Rogerson, slow off-breaks, had his day especially against Marlborough. M. W. Henderson was a sensible captain, who managed his field and his bowlers well. Of the school matches, Marlborough was narrowly beaten in a very exciting game; Malvern was easily beaten, and we lost to Radley easily, and to Bradfield by 1 wicket. The matches against Stowe and Eastbourne were spoilt by rain. C. F. Deacon, the new captain, expected J. W. Halliday and J. E. Hopkinson to assist him.

St. George's, Harpenden, in 1940 was not a strong side; but it was being built up for the season of 1941 with great care and patience by the games-master, the late R. P. Nelson. It suffered slightly from lack of confidence, having lost succession of the prolific run-scorers that the XI has had for so many years. The scoring in matches though low was steady and the side was by no means easy to dismiss. Its best displays were against the Gentlemen of Herts and St. Edmund's, Ware.

With restricted opportunities for practice in 1941 the cricket will not reach a high standard; but the XI hoped for many enjoyable games, the fixture list being the same as in previous years.

St. John's Leatherhead, were a disappointing side. Of their thirteen matches, ten were lost outright, one was drawn, two wins were registered against K.C.S. and Leatherhead. The real weakness lay in the inconsistency of the batting. Only Stoneham of the regular batsmen was reliable, though F. W. Stallibrass and

D. L. Stevenson, the captain, made some good scores. In Dodd and McKinney the school had two very dangerous opening bowlers and the left-hander Jackson was very steady. It was a great pity that against this attack the opposition never had a formidable score to make. The fielding was excellent with Stevenson and Harper, the 1941 captain, outstanding.

St. Paul's School. Of seven matches played, one was won, four lost and two drawn. Having been evacuated from West Kensington, the school's fixtures were mainly new ones. Oratory was played twice, the result being one victory each; Beaumont and Wellington both defeated St. Paul's. Bedford, met on the O.P.'s ground at Thames Ditton, were also successful; the Cryptics and Old Pauline matches were drawn. A poor record compared with pre-war days, but St. Paul's now have no ground of their own and no professional coaches. H. W. Arnold was captain, but his batting was disappointing. Of the old colours A. H. J. N. Walker showed good form, but left soon after the term started to take a job. D. A. Dailey was the best bowler, and was supported by F. P. Darling (slow left) and J. A. Stokes (slow right). T. P. Joaquim and R. A. Rahman made a few runs, and successful newcomers were R. P. Joaquim and L. J. Bunford. The most successful feature was the wicket-keeping of S. B. Piper, which was well up to the best standard of St. Paul's.

St. Peter's School, York. The team was again captained by R. C. Lynch, who had toured Canada with the Public Schools team. There were four old colour men back but even so it appeared that the team would lack experience. However, last year's Colts filled the breach admirably, and after a start which indicated lack of self-confidence, the team had a good season. F. N. Buckler, a young player, showed distinct promise as a bat and should develop into the best the school has produced since Yardley. The batting, apart from Buckler, was unreliable, but Lynch played some fine innings. J. R. Frost, the Colts' captain, bowled really well on occasion, his performance against Giggleswick being outstanding. The bowling was not the team's strong point, rarely being any better than steady. The fielding improved steadily throughout the season.

Out of nine matches played, the school won four and lost five.

Sedbergh had a good season and the side was above the average. If it had possessed an opening bowler of real class and attack it would have been very good indeed, and it would not have lost at Ampleforth if R. W. W. Watson, on whom the change bowling depended far too much at that time, had not suddenly lost the length and devil that had made him an outstanding bowler in the first half of the year. Later he was reinforced by the return to form of L. Bruce Lockhart and the improvement of G. M. Brearley. The fielding was a good deal better than last year, Watson setting a fine example, but it did not touch the heights.

Undoubtedly the strength of the side lay in its batting, where there was more experience and ability than usual. At least eight were capable of making their fifty runs against good bowling, and most of them did so. The most consistent and attractive player was D. E. Mount, the most violent C. J. R. Whittle, and the most orthodox A. V. H. Wardle. Only once did the batting as a whole fail, at Ampleforth, where the home side scored their second consecutive victory. The other defeat was by the Masters, who were greatly indebted to an innings of 126 by J. M. Coldham.

Rossall, Mill Hill, Durham and Stonyhurst were all beaten. The O.C.T.U. from Catterick suffered their first defeat when they visited Sedbergh; but everybody was sorry that bad weather prevented a proper trial of strength against Shrewsbury. Of the ten matches played six were won, two lost and two drawn.

Finally, the very fine weather meant a very enjoyable season and it was pleasant to see much keen cricket of good quality being played by many of the other elevens.

A peaceful September would have seen six old colours returning to **Sevenoaks**, but as it was this number was reduced to three. An almost new side had to be built up. The weather helped; wickets were fast and true.

The results are clear in the scores and results appearing elsewhere in this number. The Eleven was thrice defeated, once through inexperience on a rather tricky wicket at Caterham; by the Vine, and by the Head Master's Eleven, which contained three Authentics and two County Caps as well as other first-class School and Club talent. In other matches the Eleven saved the game quite heroically or won it. Sagar's captaincy was naturally good all through and steadily improved with experience.

Shaftesbury Grammar School had a pleasant and successful season in which they did not lose a match. The batting was sound if not spectacular, and every man could be relied upon to add his quota of runs. A. J. Sharman was consistent and collected his runs from all round the wicket. R. B. Burrows and J. G. Pearson bore the brunt of the attack, the former relying on his speed and accuracy and the latter on flight and swerve. The fielding was fair but lacked snap.

Sherborne had a fair season. Of the eight matches played only one was lost, that against Radley, while victories were secured over Downside, the Cryptics, and Sherborne Town; drawn games were played with Clifton, Tonbridge, Blundell's and Sherborne Town.

The batting of the side was usually reliable, though it broke down against Radley. D. P. T. Deshon had a most successful season and batted really well and consistently, with scores of 124

v. Clifton, 78 and 53 v. Tonbridge, 70 v. Radley, and 68 v. Cryptics. Of the others N. W. Heale (85 not out v. Sherborne Town and 83 v. Downside) and H. L. Watson were the most consistent. D. S. Hawkins made an invaluable 78 in the second innings at Radley, and H. E. S. Farrer scored 56 v. Downside.

The bowling was not strong. R. C. Holman did well in the few matches in which he played, but was handicapped by illness. Of the regular bowlers R. H. Leslie-Jones and T. L. Brayne were the most successful. Taken as a whole, however, the bowling lacked variety except when Holman was playing, and there was no really dangerous bowler. The fielding was usually sound, but dropped catches cost the side dear on one or two occasions.

Shrewsbury School had a successful season, although a good many matches were spoilt by rain early in the season, which accounted for the number of drawn games. Played eleven, won three, drawn six, lost two. In the inter-school matches they beat Cheltenham by an innings at Shrewsbury and Repton by 7 wickets at Repton, drawing with Malvern, Sedbergh and Felsted.

J. D. Matthews (captain), a left-hander, and M. W. Y. Ainsworth were the best batsmen, but K. A. Shearwood helped by several not-out innings, headed the averages, and played some fine forcing cricket. All these three were most successful in the important inter-school matches. M. L. Ainsworth was selected to play at Lord's and made top score against K. Farnes. M. E. Lock headed the bowling averages, and did well against the schools. He bowled fast, medium in-swingers, and received useful support from James Mackinnon, slow right-hand off-breaks, O. B. Howl and John Mackinnon, out-swingers. D. Hughes, a steady left-hander, and M. L. Ainsworth, leg-breaks, also bowled well on occasions. Shearwood kept wicket well, and the fielding and catching were generally of a high standard. Ainsworth remained as new captain with four other old colours, D. L. Hughes, James Mackinnon, A. C. W. Lee and D. Cox.

Stanford School. It was unfortunate that the temporary evacuation to Wales early in the summer caused a sudden cessation of the 1st XI fixtures at a point when the side was gaining confidence, form, and shaping like a team. Its chief strength, as last year, lay in its bowling and on only one occasion did the opposition ever really get control of a keen attack launched by Kettle, Aldred, and Waltherne, an attack always supported by fielding of an exceptionally high standard with Kettle, Tarratt, and Smith especially conspicuous, Fountain being an extremely efficient wicket-keeper. One serious weakness in the team which was apparent on one or two occasions, was the lack of a really skilful slow bowler. Kettle and Tarratt undoubtedly had the most success with the bat, both of them developed an invaluable match tempera-

ment and blended vigilance and stolid defence with aggression most judiciously. Of the four inter-school games played, those against Ratcliffe College and Kingswood School were favourably drawn, while those against Uppingham and Wyggeston were lost after some very enjoyable cricket.

Stockport Grammar School had an unsuccessful season, winning only one game, drawing one and losing four. The team suffered from youth and inexperience, and the fielding was very unequal. W. E. Carr, a free-hitting batsman, was again the most successful scorer, but apart from him and F. K. Dawson, the captain, there was no reliability in run-getting. Though Dawson again kept wicket brilliantly, the bowling, except for that of J. Wrigley, lacked the fire and accuracy necessary to win matches.

At **Stonyhurst** the results of the matches and the batting of the XI in general were disappointing. The two brightest features of the season were the bowling and the fielding. These were both consistently good. With the exception of Sedbergh no large scores were made against the team, and even in this match the bowling was of a high standard. The usefulness of Thornton and Alderson as an opening pair was well proved. It is to the slow bowlers, Keenan and McCaffry, that most of the credit must be given, however. Seldom did either of them bowl badly. They control the spin of the ball well, and at the same time bowl a good length.

There were several close and exciting finishes to matches, most of which ended in favour of the other side. The two-day match with Mill Hill ended in a tie.

The batting was often nervous and timid. They were unfortunate in losing Whitehouse after the first four matches of the season. His batting was greatly missed, and Brigstocke, who succeeded him as captain, did his job well and was often the mainstay of the batting. McCaffry, too, is a stylish batsman who will certainly make runs. Chisholm was a great success behind the wicket.

Stowe. Matches were won against Bedford, Westminster, and the XL Club.

The match against Radley was drawn, and that against St. Edward's was abandoned.

The School was beaten by the M.C.C., Bradford, Oundle, and the Authentics.

The **Taunton** eleven improved steadily and the season may be judged a satisfactory one. Blundell's were beaten twice, but the matches with Canford, Dover, and the R.N.C. were all drawn. M. A. James scored nearly 350 runs and was well supported by the captain, C. H. V. Robinson, M. F. Robinson, R. B. Price, and P. T. H. Young. A. W. Dodds was the most consistent of the bowlers—his 4 for 36 against Blundell's was a fine performance. P. C. L. Payne and J. R. Antoine also had successful days with the

ball. The fielding was patchy, though C. H. V. Robinson at cover was outstanding. Payne was chosen as new captain.

Trent had a poor season, winning only two and drawing two of the eight matches played. In school matches they defeated K.E.S. Birmingham, but lost to Worksop, Oakham and Repton "A." The Denstone and Nottingham H.S. games were drawn. J. C. L. Leigh was the best all-rounder, but the batting of the rest of the side, with the exception of J. B. Way, was variable and never came up to expectations. G. P. A. Bleasdel (captain) and J. C. L. Leigh had most of the bowling, and N. G. W. Edwardes proved a useful change. The side was young and the majority of them will be available for 1941, when, with the experience of last year, they should show increased confidence and ability.

University College School. The season had more than average success. Although a strong batting side was promised, the paper strength failed to develop and it was the bowling which won matches. On their day, as in the Whitgift match, the bowlers could run through any side. The fielding was always steady and on occasion excellent. Four old colours, M. F. W. Dunlop, B. M. W. Trapnell, M. B. Carroll, and D. G. P. Evans, remained.

Uppingham. At Uppingham only three school matches could be played, all of which had to be single innings games. Repton and Oundle were defeated, but Rugby won an interesting game by five wickets. Unfortunately, the matches against Haileybury and Shrewsbury, as well as other long-standing fixtures, had to be cancelled. Good performances by the school were victories over the Cryptics and Leicester Gentlemen. The side was better equipped, though perhaps not more effective, than during the past few years. There was a good variety of bowling, well managed by the captain, and on the whole very steady. In the field the standard was certainly lower than that of previous years, the catching being uncertain and the ground fielding slow. The batting of the side did not come up to expectation, but there were some good performances, both by individuals and the side. Considering the difficult conditions the season was fairly satisfactory.

Wallasey Grammar School. The XI, captained for the third year by C. S. Coleman, had a successful season. Fifteen matches were played, of which nine were won, three lost and three drawn. The only school match lost was against Rydal School and two of the side's best victories were gained against Birkenhead School and Merchant Taylors' School.

The standard of batting was inferior to the bowling and fielding, although C. S. Coleman and F. Steadman were a steady opening pair. The fast bowling of T. A. M. Reynolds was very effective, and one of the youngest members of the XI, M. Payne, a slow left-

arm bowler with a fine action, showed great promise. The all-round play of N. Wilkinson and the competent wicket-keeping of K. Coolil also contributed to the team's success.

Although only three games were won out of eleven that were played, **Wellingborough's** season as a whole was very satisfactory. Successes were obtained against a strong Army eleven, Bloxham School and Wellingborough Town. Two matches, against Leicester Gentlemen and Sir Julien Cahn's eleven, were abandoned through rain.

The school were perhaps seen at their best against Bloxham when, after dismissing their opponents for 82, they went on to score 220 for 3. It was perhaps the lack of variety in the bowling which caused the school side to fail to obtain more successes after they themselves had put on a good score. Among the batsmen, J. H. Gaster was the most consistent and was a tower of strength to the side as an opening batsman. His colleague, J. E. Lloyd Price (captain), showed himself to be a much improved bat, with a greater variety of strokes. As a captain he displayed much ingenuity in the handling of his bowling. Amongst other batsmen who did good work in the XI were D. M. Young and J. H. Charnock. The bowling was rather disappointing; P. Marlow and J. E. Lloyd-Price alone commanded a consistent length over any period. The fielding, as in former years, was up to a high standard. J. H. Gaster won the Batting Cup, J. E. Lloyd-Price the Bowling Shield, and J. H. Charnock won the Fielding Cup. Of Old Colours only P. Marlow and D. M. Young remained for the coming season.

Wellington had an excellent side and an unbeaten season. Marlborough, Bradfield and St. Paul's were beaten. The matches against Charterhouse, Winchester and Haileybury were drawn; against Charterhouse Wellington made 237 and Charterhouse made 219 for 8. The Winchester match was very level. Unfortunately the Haileybury match was spoilt by rain.

P. B. K. Gracey captained the side brilliantly and proved himself a fine all-rounder. He made centuries against Marlborough and the M.C.C. and also took thirteen wickets in the two matches. During the season he made 632 runs and took 55 wickets.

Two other all-rounders who contributed largely to the side's success were J. R. Williams and R. M. Hill. The former bowled consistently well and proved a sound bat. The latter showed himself a promising wicket-keeper and a fine bat. J. R. A. Stuart developed into an effective fast bowler and J. L. H. Gordon by his excellent fielding and steady batting always gave reliable support when needed.

Whitgift made a very successful start to the season, winning their first six matches in a row. After that they did not have so

much success, winning one, drawing three, and losing three of the remaining matches.

The batting was, except in the last few matches, very good. The bowling was consistently good, and was used very well by M. F. Turner, who was the best captain and all-round cricketer the school has had for many years.

Winning five of their matches outright and losing none, **Winchester** can look back on a very successful season. Prospects did not seem too bright at the beginning of the season, for there was an obvious dearth of bowlers, and there did not seem to be the usual wealth of batting talent. The fine weather of May, however, and assiduous practice worked wonders, and by the end of June sound batting down to No. 9, steady if not always very hostile bowling, and reasonably safe catching, especially in the slip area, made Winchester a side that most schools would have found hard to defeat. The strength of the batting may be gauged from the fact that in only two matches did the whole side bat and Pawson was able to make a declaration in four out of the five school matches.

The victory over Harrow for the second successive year was the best performance of the season. The matches against Marlborough, Charterhouse and Wellington were all drawn. The last-named was a new war-time fixture and provided an excellent game with Winchester only slightly on top at the close of play. In the Marlborough and Charterhouse matches the game was running strongly in favour of Winchester when stumps were drawn. Owing to the war the match against Eton was reduced to one day and provided to Wykehamical supporters one of the most tantalizing exhibitions of cricket that can possibly be imagined. Pawson won the toss—as he did with unflinching regularity in school matches—and thanks mainly to a fine not-out century from his own bat, was able to declare with a score at 302 for 5 wickets. Eton lost wickets at fairly regular intervals and when the eighth wicket fell at 107 with an hour left to play it seemed that Winchester was at last about to register the victory over Eton which has so often seemed within her grasp only to escape from it. But it took another valuable twenty-five minutes to secure the ninth wicket, and then the miraculous happened. Duckham and Gibbs, to the astonishment of friend and enemy, managed to play out the remaining thirty-five minutes. Winchester were so clearly much the better side that it seemed a pity that another draw had to be added to the already over-long list in this engagement. But great credit must be given to Duckham, whose bravery and resource were well rewarded.

Winchester's main strength lay, of course, in the captain, Pawson. Possessed of considerable experience in school cricket, a sound batsman in defence, a magnificent runner between the

wickets, and a useful slow bowler who comes a little quicker off the pitch than one expects, he was obviously a tower of strength to the side. At present he lacks the ability to punish the bowler in front of the wicket, and he relies mainly on cutting, gliding, and hooking to get his runs. He will need to learn to drive the slightly over-pitched ball if he is to make runs in the highest class cricket. But with his quickness of eye and neatness of footwork he is a difficult batsman for a schoolboy bowler to dislodge and his not-out century against Eton was a fitting climax to a fine school cricketing record. In batting he was well supported by Welman, whose century against Wellington at the end of June showed what a greatly improved player he had become since the previous year. Goddard was an attractive batsman, full of strokes and dash, and the same may be said of Chambers, who hit splendidly against Charterhouse and Eton, whilst Foster's patience as an opener was often valuable.

There was no bowler calculated to go through a side, but Whitcombe, Eddy and Gray all learnt to bowl steadily and sensibly to their field, whilst Pawson often got a needed wicket by sheer cricket sense. The fielding was active and keen, with some good catching in the slips, but the wicket-keeping was weak.

Worcester Royal Grammar School lost four of the fifteen matches played, winning ten and drawing one. Two school matches were lost, that against Hereford by three wickets, and that against Warwick by 25 runs. Cheltenham, Solihull, Crypt School, Gloucester, Stourbridge (twice) were beaten.

The side had to be entirely reconstructed, as J. G. J. Davies, the captain, was the only colour remaining, and the only regular member of the 1939 side. However, G. F. Drake, E. F. Lerry, D. S. Bray, W. H. B. Key, C. T. Waters, M. J. W. Tingey, earned their colours during the season.

The season stands out especially for the free-scoring performances of its members, though the way had often been paved by a steady start given by the opening batsmen. Probably the best scoring feat ever seen on the school ground was that when Stourbridge were defeated. In less than an hour 141 runs were scored, the 100 going up after only 25 minutes. G. F. Drake (66 not out) and D. S. Bray (43) were mostly responsible.

A steady and varied attack completed an interesting and successful side.

Worksop, with seven of their 1939 XI available, had a great season, winning all their regular school matches with the exception of a drawn game against Denstone, due to rain. The outstanding performance was the defeat of Ampleforth by 126 runs after a declaration, but St. Peter's, York, were beaten by 8 wickets. Trent

by 47 runs after a declaration, and Mount St. Mary's by 9 wickets. A. L. Evans, the captain and wicket-keeper, who later in the season captained the North P.S. XI at Richmond, had an outstanding season with the bat, particularly in school matches in which his record was: *v.* Denstone, 84 not out; *v.* Ampleforth, 73; *v.* St. Peter's, York, 76 not out; *v.* Trent, 109. The batting of the whole side was, however, very strong as is shown by the fact that the first five in the averages were all over 20, A. L. Evans heading the list with 75.50, and R. W. J. Naismith being second with 40.28.

The bowling was sound, P. T. Francis being in particularly good form *v.* Ampleforth, while H. L. S. Coulthurst was consistent throughout the season.

Wrekin had quite a good season. Of the ten matches played six were won, two lost and two drawn. The only school match played was against Denstone, and this was won by fifteen runs. Wilford and Darrah were the most successful batsmen, and both had good averages. Grace (captain) did not quite come up to expectations as a batsman but was a greatly improved bowler. Jacks and Webb also did well in this department. The general standard of fielding was good and here Wilford and Aylward were always conspicuous. Prospects for 1941 were quite good. Davies, the wicket-keeper, the new captain, hoped for the assistance of Jacks and Darrah.

When war came, **Wycliffe** had to move, and were deposited in Cardiganshire, a county lacking the cricketing traditions of Gloucestershire. The cultivation of 13 acres of gardens and other war-time services also distracted attention from cricket, but matches were arranged with Bromsgrove and University College, London (both also in exile in Wales), Brecon and Llandoverly, St. David's College, Lampeter, Trinity College, Carmarthen, and an R.A.F. XI. Bromsgrove won a good game by four wickets, and with Llandoverly and Brecon honours were easy. A decisive eight-wickets win was achieved against University College.

Wyggeston had another successful season, winning six and only losing one of the thirteen matches played. The dominating feature was the inspiring leadership of D. J. Morris, who, in his second year as captain, scored more runs than ever before. He hit three centuries—against Uppingham II, Stamford and Oundle II, the one against Oundle being his third in successive matches against that school. Strong as the team undoubtedly was in batting, it possessed some very capable bowlers, and the fielding was generally of a very high standard.

SCOTTISH SCHOOLS

The **Edinburgh Academy** had a fairly successful season but depended too much in batting upon the captain, D. A. Roberts, who made over 500 runs, and led the side well. J. B. Williamson, chosen to captain the 1941 side, played often useful innings. The strength of the side lay in its two left-arm bowlers, T. Walker and G. C. Davidson, each of whom took nearly 50 wickets. R. St. C. Cunningham also bowled well. In school matches "two-day" games against Loretto and Merchiston Castle were won comfortably, and the Glenalmond match ended in a fairly even draw, but poor batting led to defeats by Fettes and George Watson's.

Fettes had a good year on the whole. They drew with Merchiston and Loretto, and beat Glenalmond, Watson's, and the Edinburgh Academy. They were an all-round team, both bowling and batting being sound and the fielding improved as the year went by.

C. D. Lawrie headed the batting averages, his highest score being against Merchiston, when he made 54 in the first innings and 77 not out in the second.

J. R. C. McGlashan was top of the bowling averages. His best performance was against Loretto, where he took 6 for 9. Unfortunately rain stopped play. He was closely followed by P. F. Smith, whose best performances were 5 for 22 against the President's XI and 3 for 13 against Merchiston (2nd innings). C. D. Lawrie had 6 for 30 against the M.T.E. at Rosyth.

C. D. Lawrie captained the side and he only had one old colour back to support him, D. C. Rounthwaite. However, as so often happens, a side founded under criticisms showed itself to be very useful. Lawrie set an excellent example in the field.

Loretto. A potentially good all-round side which did not fulfil expectations in the majority of its school matches. Home Guard duties upset the usual hours of practice all too frequently. Edinburgh Academy, Watson's and Glenalmond defeated Loretto, but Merchiston only just managed to avoid a heavy reverse after some hours lost through rain. Fettes had an advantage when rain brought play to a premature close.

The fielding of the side, ably captained by Harper, was quite excellent. Wilkie and McLay (till he left at mid-term) were the opening bowlers, the latter showing much promise. Rankin proved himself to be the best of the change bowlers, Watson's slow leg-breaks being too often erratic. Harper, Rankin, Rolland, Dallas and Hardy each made good scores. King and McInroy as hitters had their occasions, too.

Nine of the XI were staying on for another season.

Merchiston Castle had a poor season; of the thirteen matches played two were won, six lost, and five drawn. In school matches Glenalmond were beaten by 38 runs, the match against Edinburgh Academy was lost by 5 wickets, against Fettes and Loretto the games were drawn, whilst the match against Watson's College had to be abandoned. The batting of the side was erratic but on the other hand the bowling was quite steady. I. D. M. Considine, who topped both the batting and bowling averages, will be next year's captain; J. G. March, who figured both as a batsman and a bowler, is also returning for next season, and about half the side, in addition, will be back to support Considine and March.

Trinity College, Glenalmond, had their usual programme of matches much curtailed; nine matches were played, of which four were won and three lost, the other two being drawn with the scores much in the College's favour. The batting was never consistent, for although M. du V. Allix started with three consecutive scores of over 50, he failed towards the end of the season. It was then that two of the later batsmen, P. W. Rochford and A. H. Campbell, did much to support the steady batting of the captain and secretary, P. A. McDowall and O. R. Arend. McDowall improved greatly as a bowler, he and Campbell taking most of the wickets. These two bowlers were both fast medium, and the lack of a good slow bowler was one of the team's weaknesses. The college beat Loretto, and with several wickets still to fall just failed to reach Edinburgh Academy's total. The matches with Fettes, George Watson's, and Merchiston were lost. P. A. McDowall was captain again in 1941 and A. H. Campbell, R. E. Arend, M. du V. Allix, J. M. Rankin, and C. A. Lyall also remained.

George Watson's had a very successful season, in which features were excellent fielding and the team-work, by which in every match it was a different player who distinguished himself. P. D. M. Blackhall's 8 for 48 against Glenalmond was the greatest feat, and I. J. M. Lumsden's 66 against Fettes the best innings, but J. B. Smith's 57 against Loretto, scored after he had gone in last, was the most remarkable. It is several years since eight school matches out of nine were won, and nearly twenty years since the match at Glenalmond was won.

Hay was the best schoolboy wicket-keeper in Scotland and this contributed to the real hostility of the fielding which earned praise from every opposition. The bowling was very steady and well varied, from S. N. Wilson's fast stuff, which won the match against Edinburgh Academy, after he had made 50, through Smith's medium and J. B. Swan's off-spinners to Blackhall's slow left hand. In all a powerful and reliable quartet.
