

## THE SCHOOLS

**Aldenham School**, for the third year in succession, went through the season unbeaten, winning seven matches and drawing the remaining four. The outstanding feature of the batting was the remarkable form of J. G. Dewes, the captain, who only once in ten innings failed to put together a substantial score. He hit not out centuries against M.C.C. and Malvern and wound up with another three-figure innings for The Rest at Lord's. J. A. Cockett and N. W. Jephcott were his best helpers. C. W. R. Marston, the chief bowler, achieved some excellent performances, and J. G. Dewes and J. O. Velton gave valuable support. D. R. MacKillop kept wicket smartly.

**Allhallows School**, captained by J. D. Shallow, experienced a lean time, beating only Exeter School and losing six of eight games. Chief weakness lay in the batting, the highest average being the 9.43 of A. P. Palmer. P. D. Midgley did best with the ball.

Improving steadily under the enthusiastic captaincy of K. W. Gray, the **Ampleforth College** eleven won with ease all three School matches. Batting formed the chief strength of the team, M. P. Hardy, Gray, P. H. Trafford and W. E. Vaughan always being reliable. G. A. Robertson bowled in first-rate form, but Lord Stafford, though affording good support, too often sacrificed length for speed.

**Bancroft's School** batting was too unstable to allow a promising set of bowlers much chance of taking the side to victory, and the eleven gained only three wins as against nine defeats. D. L. Smithson was again most successful in bowling; and B. E. Porter and the captain, W. J. Peal, accomplished occasional useful all-round work.

The **Beaumont College** record was moderate—five matches won, five lost, four drawn. In exciting finishes the team lost to Reading by two runs and, at Bradfield, won by means of a last-wicket partnership of 60, J. C. Mathew, the captain, hitting 84 not out—the highest score for Beaumont during the summer. The game with Oratory, transferred from Lord's to Reading, was spoiled by rain. C. B. Henning and P. A. de Zulueta, fast, and D. C. Kingsley, slow, not only carried off bowling honours but rendered excellent service as batsmen. Six old colours are staying on.

L. V. Dilley, a useful all-rounder, skilfully led a **Bedford Modern School** eleven somewhat younger than usual. Six of fourteen matches were won and five lost. L. Bambridge, medium-

fast bowler, displayed exceptional and persistent accuracy. Dilley and S. Danes were outstanding for quickness in the field, and R. Shreeves, behind the wicket, gave little away.

**Bedford School** won only one of fourteen fixtures and drew no fewer than ten. This record indicates the principal failing—inability to force home an advantage. D. N. L. Knopp, by far the best batsman, played several excellent innings, as also did the hard-hitting R. F. Hill. Main burden in bowling fell upon the sound captain, J. R. Fowles, with in-swingers, and J. A. Bacon, fast. R. D. Sawtell kept wicket extremely well.

**Berkhamsted School** played most of their matches on wet wickets and batting failures were frequent. The highest innings was 89 by J. S. Nicholson, the captain. In contrast to the uncertain batting, the bowling possessed steadiness and accuracy, and the fielding reached a high level. D. C. Morgan while taking six M.C.C. wickets for 30 runs performed the "hat-trick."

**Bishop's Stortford College**, though well equipped in bowling, showed woefully weak form in run-getting; the highest average was that of M. J. Mynott, 9.41. K. A. Manley, the captain, bowled splendidly and J. A. Page afforded able support. Owing to danger from flying-bombs, the chief match, with Berkhamsted at Lord's, was cancelled. P. W. Rowe, an excellent wicket-keeper, will captain a 1945 team expected to include at least seven old colours.

**Bloxham School** won seven and drew six of sixteen fixtures, thanks largely to three all-rounders, C. H. Mead, the captain, W. H. C. Walker and S. Hinton. Walker and Hinton batted left, and Walker bowled right-arm leg-breaks skilfully. J. R. Badham did excellent work as opening batsman.

**Blundell's School**, though faring indifferently against club sides, did specially well in School matches. A heavy defeat from Clifton, due to an epidemic of missed catches, was more than counterbalanced by convincing wins over Sherborne, Taunton in two matches, and Downside. The game with Dover College, housed at Exeter, ended in a draw. Captaincy and all-round play made R. J. Morris outstanding; an aggregate of 571 runs and 33 wickets afforded clear proof of his ability. F. T. Russell, a natural hitter, scored 116 in fifty minutes against Taunton. J. D. B. Hay, J. C. Newell-Price, Morris and P. Barnes, slow left-arm, formed a steady set of bowlers.

The absence of a reliable pair of opening bowlers was partly responsible for the disappointing season experienced by **Bradfield College**. G. G. Stephenson suggested good things when gaining control of length; P. D. Lowes, who flighted the ball a little, maintained more accuracy than anybody else. Though showing promise

at times, the batting never settled down. P. D. Hooper, M. R. K. Wilson and A. O. Kirby played some big innings, but a combination of timidity and recklessness resulted in many failures by the others. B. St. C. Kingsley, the captain, usually got himself out through taking liberties with the bowling before getting a proper sight of the ball.

**Bradford Grammar School**, winning seven and losing only one of twelve matches, enjoyed their best season since 1934. Chief credit for this belonged to J. Powell, fast, M. F. Holdsworth, slow left-arm, and D. F. Rhodes, medium in-swingers, a powerful combination of bowlers who dismissed six opposing teams for less than 100 runs apiece. If not brilliant, the batting was generally adequate, with R. S. Longbottom, the wicket-keeper, Powell, the left-handed B. H. Stott, A. T. Owen and Holdsworth, the captain, the best.

All the **Brighton College** fixtures ended in definite results, seven being won and five lost. R. W. Norton led the eleven skilfully and, if not touching such batting form as in 1943, played several good innings. D. W. Warran and G. M. Barnett were others who did well in a weak batting side. J. H. Hayton and R. E. Jones bowled admirably.

Returning from Wales, **Bromsgrove School** played their first war-time season at Charford, and improved conditions were at once reflected in the results, four matches being won, two lost and two drawn. T. F. Neales, though successful as captain, allowed the responsibility to affect his batting. B. F. D. Harrod fulfilled his all-round promise of the previous year, and D. A. J. Reid-Smith bowled admirably. Dai Davies, of Glamorgan, did good work as coach.

To **Bryanston School** the 1944 season brought better fortune, for if they won only three of ten engagements they reduced their defeats to two. P. Bramson, H. R. Macleod and H. M. Austin, the captain, were the chief batsmen, and R. H. Dodd, C. E. Townrow and R. C. J. Hunter the best bowlers.

**Campbell College, Belfast**, under the captaincy of A. J. Monk, attributed low batting and bowling averages largely to war-time wickets. S. A. Boyd, probable captain for 1945, displayed special ability as a fast-medium bowler capable of maintaining a length for long periods. Eight of twelve matches were won, one lost, and one ended in a tie.

Statistically the **Canford School** season was quite good, but far too much depended on a few players. In the early matches the captain, P. D. R. Smith, was the only batsman to settle down, and

he made 41, 69, 79 and 59 not out in successive School games. S. J. Symington did not play till June; then, besides hitting some good scores, he, with A. G. Robb, in opening the bowling, accomplished several fine feats. The pair dismissed Marlborough for 70, Downside for 72, Taunton for 30, and an Army Pay Corps XI for 7. Robb bowled right-arm fastish, and Symington right-arm medium. Poor at first, the fielding improved, I. P. Campbell performing well in his first season as wicket-keeper. Of the School matches, three were won and three lost.

That **Caterham School** earned an improved record was due chiefly to the all-round ability of A. P. Gibbs and A. Jessup, though K. L. Stafford also accomplished good things in both batting and bowling. T. D. Ross, the captain, showed much better batting form than in 1943. Of eleven matches, five were won and three lost.

Winning eight of fifteen matches, including those with Eton, Tonbridge, Bradfield and Cranleigh, **Charterhouse School** experienced an excellent season. Most credit for the success belonged to the accurate and effective bowling combination formed by J. B. R. Ashley, the captain, with leg-breaks, E. Day, fast, and A. J. Rimell, off-breaks. Of the batsmen, G. R. W. Carter, a No. 1 who played specially well on slow wickets, M. J. Rimell, the wicket-keeper, his younger brother, A. J., a left-hander, P. B. H. May, aged fourteen, and R. L. Whitby were all reliable run-getters. A. J. Rimell will lead the side in 1945, with bright prospects.

The **Cheltenham College** eleven would have been good without M. J. E. Swiney, the captain, and M. L. Jackson; with them they were very good indeed. They beat Shrewsbury, Felsted and Haileybury—in a match transferred from Lord's to Cheltenham—and lost an exciting struggle with Marlborough by 24 runs. Taking 70 wickets for less than eleven runs each, Jackson was by far the most successful bowler; he and Swiney, who easily headed the batting averages, fully justified their choice for the Lord's Schools XI and for the Public Schools XI. R. H. Pedlow, who hit two centuries, always batted well, and he should do even better in 1945. Next to Jackson, J. P. Davis did best in bowling, and P. H. Morley improved steadily as the summer advanced. B. A. R. Smith and I. C. H. Moody showed themselves reliable batsmen. Pedlow, Moody and I. H. Vetch stayed on.

A young **Chigwell School** eleven held out promise for the future, but against teams of greater experience they lost eight of eleven fixtures. B. R. Dowsing, again the most effective bowler, received able support from two other medium-pace bowlers, D. A. Spurgeon and R. S. Morgan. The batting was erratic.

**Dean Close School** won two and lost three of seven matches, but, as eight old colours were expected to remain, looked forward to better things in 1945. F. B. James, captain and wicket-keeper, headed the batting averages, and the twin brothers, P. S. and M. I. Smith, forceful but uncertain, followed. O. R. A. Stoney, left-arm, P. S. Smith, and A. E. Doonan formed an attack that usually commanded respect.

**Denstone College** won seven of eleven matches and lost only one—to a strong Derby Club and Ground team. In an uncertain batting side, G. S. Seaton stood out as by far the best stroke player and the most consistent run-getter. L. D. Ashcroft, a promising colt, played some extremely plucky innings and D. B. Alban did useful work. G. A. Sharp, the captain, and P. D. Gilbert bore the chief burden of the attack, with A. F. Hignell an all-rounder of ability.

For what measure of success attended their efforts **Douai School** were indebted largely to three players. D. F. Gregory scored far more runs than anyone else and easily headed the batting averages; M. Stokes and J. A. Cuddon not only did a vast amount of bowling with capital results, but also showed to advantage on more than one occasion in batting. The full record was: won five, lost five, drawn one, tied one.

**Dover College**, still away from home, at Poltimore, lost six and won two of ten games. The weakness lay in batting. R. L. W. Nash proved himself the mainstay of the eleven. He scored more runs than any of his colleagues and, with flighted left-arm spin bowling, he carried off the bowling honours. R. E. Robertson, slow off-breaks, and A. N. Coulson, fast, completed a satisfactory attack. J. G. W. Stroud, the captain and a useful batsman, kept wicket well.

Though losing five and drawing four of thirteen matches, **Downside School** showed a great improvement upon their form of 1943. They claimed victory by ten wickets over Beaumont among their three wins in Schools games. W. B. H. Churchill, the best batsman, hit a century against An Army XI; D. M. Corbett, captain, C. P. Grogan, J. M. C. Thornton, E. W. Pigot and A. T. Martin gave him good support. If lacking a left-arm bowler, the attack was varied. B. E. Hunt, fast-medium in-swingers, proved the most consistent bowler, and Churchill, though not maintaining his promise of the previous year, was often dangerous with leg-breaks. Bowling without luck at first, P. F. Orchard, fast, came into his own in the match with Beaumont.

Nothing quite so sweeping as the accomplishments of **Dulwich College** has occurred for some years. Under the inspiring leadership of G. D. Evans, the eleven, without many star performers, displayed remarkable team-work that resulted in the winning of ten of eleven matches, eight with Schools. The one defeat came from a powerful M.C.C. side. R. D. Gill and J. A. C. Bentall, an efficient wicket-keeper, comprised a reliable opening pair, and I. D. F. Coutts made many useful runs; but the most improved batsman was R. M. Mumford, whose perfect footwork enabled him to drive and cut brilliantly. Generally relying upon in-swingers, O. J. Wait was outstanding in bowling; A. C. Hemming, with leg-breaks, D. C. Fuller, J. P. Slee and Evans completed an attack which owed much of its effectiveness to unusually fine fielding.

**Eastbourne College** won one and drew no fewer than six of nine matches. E. S. Overy was the best batsman, but D. A. Bell, an enterprising player blessed with good fortune, headed the averages. K. H. Watson, left-arm medium, and J. N. Balmford bowled well, though receiving indifferent backing. G. E. H. Wilson and Bell stayed on.

A promising season for **Eltham College** was curtailed by war-time conditions. The team, well-balanced and particularly strong in attack, won four matches and lost two. The captain, B. A. Thomas, and C. H. Barrow, both bowled admirably, and Thomas also proved a reliable batsman. With six of the team probably staying on, prospects for 1945 appeared good.

An inconsistent team, capable of almost brilliant play and guilty of mediocrity, **Epsom College** lost five and won two of ten fixtures. The captain, R. G. Nicholson, a left-handed all-rounder, worked hard to get the side together. He himself achieved considerable success, once performing the "hat-trick," and his fielding was first-rate. E. B. J. Carpenter, the wicket-keeper, often retrieved a bad start by courageous hitting not unmingled with good fortune. Six of the team were expected to stay on.

Strong in batting, **Eton College** won six and drew six of fourteen games, numbering among their victims Harrow, Wellington and Radley. Of School opponents, only Charterhouse lowered their colours. The Hon L. R. White stood out above all the other batsmen, and his performances at Lord's during the holidays—a century for Public Schools v. A Lord's XI and 70 for Middlesex and Essex against Kent and Surrey—suggested a big future. The captain, H. A. Hely-Hutchinson, though less reliable, proved one of the hardest hitting school batsmen seen for some years. Getting into the eleven at the age of fifteen, C. R. D. Rudd finished second

in the averages; P. F. Gardiner-Hill and P. D. S. Blake made a sound opening pair. As nobody of pace could be found, the bowling was much weaker than in the previous two years. J. D. I. Stewart-Gray was steady, but E. R. Flint and B. P. M. Keeling, both spin bowlers, were erratic, and it was well for the side that the fielding generally reached a high standard.

Considerable success attended the efforts of **Framlingham College**, who won nine and drew two of fourteen engagements. G. Mitchell, a newcomer to the team, scored far more runs than anybody else, and he also took 38 wickets. E. D. Rolfe, the wicket-keeper, and D. C. Seagrove gave the side many a good start, and A. W. Finch, with spinners, bowled effectively. R. G. Colman was a quietly efficient captain.

**Giggleswick School** achieved considerable success, winning five and losing one—to Leeds Grammar School—of eight matches. Most notable victory was that by four runs over Sedbergh, a performance in which H. B. Morley, with swinging deliveries, bore a leading part by taking seven wickets for 26 runs. For the second year, J. C. Maltby led the side skilfully; Morley, T. P. Hall and K. J. Bury, all of whom should be available in 1945, promised well as batsmen.

With six old colours available, **Haileybury and Imperial Service College** looked forward to a good season, but the hope was not fulfilled, three school matches being lost and two drawn. The reason was not difficult to trace: too much depended upon the first few batsmen, and a match-winning bowler could not be found. I. L. Scott-Clarke, a sound batsman, at times also did well with leg-break bowling. A. S. Nunn showed promise in run-getting. T. W. Tyrwhitt-Drake, the captain, put together a number of useful scores, but his wicket-keeping fell away; remaining as captain for 1945, he expected to have at least four old colours under him.

The strength of the **Harrow School** team depended upon the success of five old Flannels. Of these, M. N. Garnett, though inclined to be slow, and M. H. Withers usually gave the School a good start, and the captain, T. G. H. Jackson, made the middle of the batting order stronger. A. McCorquodale did some lively hitting lower down, and J. F. Leaf returned to form in time to play, once more, the best innings against Eton. The bowling rested chiefly in the hands of McCorquodale, with uncertain support at the other end. Jackson won the cups for batting and fielding, those for bowling and the best catch going to McCorquodale. Harrow won two matches and lost three, the remaining six being drawn.

Inexperience accentuated the weakness of **Highgate School**. The batting depended upon J. S. Maclure, the captain, F. P. Neill and M. L. Laws, a fine wicket-keeper, and shone or faded with their fortunes. The lack of a fast bowler reflected itself in the doings of the team on dry wickets. P. Dean, who headed the bowling figures, developed an effective swerve, and Maclure, with slow off-breaks, achieved marked success on sticky turf.

Under the captaincy of J. M. Caffyn, **Hurstpierpoint College** won six and lost two of ten matches. J. H. Neal and J. B. Davies, who batted left and bowled right, were the best batsmen, M. B. Devine, though putting great power into his strokes, seldom staying long. Davies also did excellent work with his slow bowling, and G. P. Christie possessed a deceptive swerve.

Deteriorating after a fair start, **King Edward's School, Birmingham**, finished with a dismal record—they won two, lost eight, drew four matches. With the exception of J. C. Dark, J. H. Poole, the captain, and G. A. Pell, the batting was unreliable; Dark and A. J. Lippitt, fast, and Pell, who spun the ball, did most work in bowling. Better things are hoped for in 1945, as most of the team will be available again.

Weakness in batting resulted in a poor season for **King Edward's School, Stourbridge**, six of eight matches ending in defeat. The team were better off in bowling, P. G. Norton, fast, M. C. Penn and R. C. J. Edwards, fast-medium, working hard and well.

Showing improved form under the leadership of G. I. Mouatt, **King's College School, Wimbledon**, did better than in 1943, though their batting could not be relied upon. C. E. Winn, by far the most competent run-getter, received best help from D. A. Oakley and J. T. Rham. Mouatt, A. Murray and F. J. L. Skeens comprised an attack of little variety.

Following a good start, **King's School, Bruton**, fell away, the batting failing with the advent of wet weather. None of the batsmen showed real consistency, though D. P. Oliver, G. W. Wilson, the captain, G. G. Daniel and J. K. Coleridge played some valuable innings. The bowling, too, though varied, did not possess sufficient sting. R. L. M. Oliver, a slow left-hander who changed pace cleverly, was the best. Four of nine matches were won and four lost.

The **King's School, Canterbury**, eleven, at St. Austell, were composed of colts of 1943. G. L. Ackers, the captain, of medium pace and able to make the ball move either way, the left-handers R. A. Greenslade and J. H. Bloomberg, and A. R. Stuart, right-

arm spin, were a more than useful set of bowlers. Bloomberg and R. S. Brealy, a fast scorer, with Stuart formed the backbone of the batting.

Well above the average in bowling and fielding, the **Kingswood School, Bath**, eleven displayed marked weakness in batting, for which shortage of practice was partly responsible. A. Hatton slow-medium, bore with credit the chief burden in bowling, good assistance coming from P. A. Bailey and H. L. Seccombe, the captain. Five of ten matches were won and four lost.

If their record was unimpressive—won one, drawn five, lost five—**Lancing College** took heart from the form shown by some players on the indifferent pitches at Ludlow. J. M. Whitehead, P. N. Ford, the captain, F. E. Quin and R. D. S. Glascodine played more than one splendid innings under difficult conditions, but never came off at the same time. Quin, with out-swingers, bowled very well, but the other members of the attack were not convincing, though A. S. Hall and T. M. D. Robertshaw maintained steady improvement.

**Leeds Grammar School** owed most of their eight victories in thirteen engagements to strength in bowling. K. B. Hicks did grand work and, in addition, played a number of valuable innings; G. M. Aber and J. H. Coates were never easily mastered. C. P. Aber was by far the heaviest scorer. H. M. Morley, captain and good wicket-keeper, disappointed as a batsman.

**Leighton Park School, Reading**, were stronger in batting than in bowling. G. I. Sherborne, in his first season in the eleven, headed the averages, while A. E. Timaeus, R. S. Webb, D. F. Sharp and J. F. Randall, the captain, all proved reliable run-getters. Bowlers to achieve most were Webb, Sharp and I. E. C. Harris. Of ten matches played, six were won and two lost.

**The Leys School**, still at Pitlochry, depended too much for runs upon their captain, R. G. Dunning, whose aggregate far exceeded that of any of his colleagues. A. M. Lees bowled well without becoming a real menace to batsmen, and R. N. Barratt did occasional good work with slow leg-breaks, but G. M. Rawlinson failed to fulfil the promise of the previous two summers. Dunning anticipated the help of three old colours in 1945.

A rather weak **Liverpool College** team relied almost entirely upon P. L. Johnson, the captain. A fine all-rounder, he played many grand innings, was always dangerous as a bowler, and set a splendid example in the field. He fully deserved the honour of

being chosen to play for The Rest at Lord's. R. M. Hughes and A. C. Chadwick, two young players, showed batting promise but put little power into their strokes. Johnson, was fast-medium; J. B. D. Ward and C. R. Maddock, slow left, also bowled well at times, but were somewhat expensive.

With five old colours available, H. I. Jory, the **Malvern College** wicket-keeper and captain, must have anticipated a good season; but lack of consistency in batting and of penetrative power in bowling resulted in only three of nine matches being won as against four defeats. Jory and T. P. Hughes-Morgan were the principal run-getters. R. M. S. George, slow, headed the bowling averages and S. H. Wright did well on occasion.

**Marlborough College** could look upon the season with reasonable satisfaction, for it brought more success than came in most of recent years, four matches being won, four drawn and four lost. In School games they beat Canford and Cheltenham, lost to Rugby—met at Marlborough instead of at Lord's owing to flying-bomb danger—and drew with Winchester. J. C. Hoskyns, the captain, a left-hander of style, was the outstanding batsman, but difficult situations often hustled and rather hampered him. The batting of the remainder was remarkable for its uncertainty. R. C. Champion looked as if he could stay for a long time but rarely did; M. S. Robinson appeared unlikely to survive an over and frequently stayed for many. A. L. Robinson, a beautiful natural bat, too often failed to get his foot out to slow bowling, and P. K. Ledger was patchy. A. L. Robinson and M. W. Jeffreys, the best pair of opening bowlers at the School for some time, could, given helpful conditions, be devastating.

**Merchant Taylors' School** drew all but one of ten matches, the sole victory being over Berkhamsted. G. W. Weston, the captain, and G. K. L. Johnson, the only old colours available, did most of the run-getting. Weston hit a faultless century against M.C.C. and developed into one of the best batsmen at the School for several seasons. R. A. Ellis, B. F. Mellors and P. R. Gibb bowled steadily, and received excellent assistance from G. Parke, the wicket-keeper.

**Mill Hill School**, at St. Bees, fell away after an encouraging start. Essentially strong in batting, the team several times failed badly on wet wickets. T. Aye Mounq, the captain, headed both batting and bowling averages, though he could not find his form of the previous summer. J. G. Meggitt with five old colours, expected to lead the eleven in 1945.

With a young team, **Mount St. Mary's College** fared moderately, winning three and losing four of eleven engagements. What success came their way was due largely to the splendid bowling of S. A. Greiff, the captain, and K. G. Lissenden. Greiff, H. A. Harding and E. M. Conroy, a forcing batsman, scored most of the runs.

Apart from W. D. Cockburn, the **Newcastle Royal Grammar School** batsmen were unreliable. E. I. Waugh, the captain, did not attain to his form of 1943, but brought off some capital bowling performances, notably eight wickets for 11 runs against Lancaster.

Young and inexperienced, the **Oakham School** side lost seven of eleven matches, won one, and played a "tie" at 111 runs each with Trent College. N. L. Palmer, captain as in 1943, again an outstanding batsman, played a series of good innings, notably 112 not out against Stamford School. A. M. Dilks bowled well throughout the summer.

**Oundle School**, happy in the possession of three such fluent and attractive batsmen as the captain, R. A. E. Franklin, G. N. Thornton and D. H. Clarke, won eight and drew four of thirteen fixtures. These players excepted, the batting was undependable. Considering their limitations, the bowlers did extraordinarily well, with M. Bowman the steadiest and A. G. Milligan often destructive with leg-breaks and googlies. E. A. St. J. Salt, fast-medium, did not maintain his early form.

**Perse School** won four matches, lost six and drew one. A disappointing feature of the season was nervous batting in school games, whereas in other matches the run-getting was consistent. The bowling lacked pace and variety. J. B. Denson was a promising batsman, and K. B. Naylor, the captain, and A. MacB. Stranks bowled steadily and would have taken many more wickets but for a succession of hard pitches.

**Plymouth College** played no fewer than twenty-two matches, of which they won twelve and lost seven. With seven old colours available, team-building presented few problems. I. M. Clarke, the captain, proved a forceful and reliable opening batsman; G. A. Heywood, a left-hander, improved steadily, and J. A. Wynton retained his elegance and sure timing. R. L. Turner, a successful wicket-keeper, made match-winning runs when required. J. R. Hamley, with 67 wickets to his credit, bowled magnificently, and with J. S. D. Miles was responsible for chief work in attack. Most of the eleven stayed on.

The failure of C. S. Cheshire to fulfil the promise he showed when heading the averages in 1943 appeared to have an unsettling effect upon the remainder of the **Radley College** batsmen, most of whom were very young. M. C. Robinson, the most successful, would, with a little more patience, have scored many runs. R. C. Wheeler-Bennett frequently saved the side with timely innings, and he also displayed marked improvement in bowling. D. E. Mathews not only led the side skilfully, but bowled his swingers admirably at greater pace than in 1943. Four of thirteen matches were won and five lost.

Above the 1943 standard, **Reading School** won six and lost eight of seventeen matches. L. A. Sears, the captain, and J. V. Martin bowled with consistent skill and accuracy; Sears distinguished himself by taking all ten Oratory School wickets for twelve runs. The batting was not specially strong, but P. Lincoln-Gordon could generally be relied upon for runs.

Without reaching the standard of the previous team, **Repton School** developed into a very useful side. The batting was rather unreliable, depending too much on D. B. Carr, the captain. Fortunately Carr showed marked consistency, so that the batting failed badly on only some occasions. One was on a wet wicket against Rugby, the match, for the first time for ten years, being lost. The main strength of the eleven lay in the bowling of P. A. Kelland, fast-medium right-arm, and Carr, slow left-arm, supported by first-rate fielding. These two bowled splendidly, and few teams totalled over 100 against them. Carr did specially well against Uppingham, his five wickets for 15 runs, followed by a quiet, stylish innings, being chiefly responsible for victory by eight wickets. He captained The Rest at Lord's and also led the Public Schools XI. Five old colours were likely to stay on.

**Rossall School** celebrated its centenary year with a highly successful season, being unbeaten in fourteen matches, eight of which were won. All four School games resulted in handsome victories, and other good performances were wins over Manchester University and Preston and creditable draws with strong M.C.C. and R.A.F. teams. G. N. Peters, captain and outstanding player, took with medium-paced bowling 63 wickets for just over seven runs each. His chief feats were nine for 14 against Alleyn's and eleven for 34 against Mill Hill. A. A. Carter, a clever and accurate slow left-hander, and R. E. Bull, a young fast bowler, completed a formidable trio. The batting was less stable, too much responsibility resting upon four batsmen, of whom C. G. W. Looms, a newcomer, showed most consistency. B. B. Anderson, P. M. Rhodes and Peters all made several good scores, but the later batsmen did not shine on soft pitches.

At their best a good team, **Rugby School** displayed uneven form. J. H. H. Anton, the captain, batted admirably, M. D. Rutnam proved a sound opening partner, and C. G. Bellamy, a newcomer, also made runs consistently. Other capable players lacked stability in a crisis. The bowling, if varied, was erratic. M. M. Morton took most wickets, but W. S. Wardill was generally steadiest. Of the five victories, those at Repton, beaten for the first time, and at Marlborough—the annual match transferred from Lord's—afforded special gratification. Wardill, with an innings of 70 not out and a full analysis of eight wickets for 38 runs, bore a big share in the overthrow of Marlborough.

The young **Rydal School** eleven did none too well because the batting let them down badly on occasions. W. H. H. Sutcliffe, son of Herbert Sutcliffe, of Yorkshire and England, played some splendid innings, but was often dogged by bad luck; and although M. H. Stevenson, who hit a glorious 104 not out against Wallasey Grammar School, generally looked a class batsman, he failed more often than he should have done. E. D. Lewis and H. K. Snape proved in more than one match their value as run-getters. Lewis, fast-medium, showed fire and spirit and kept a good length; Stevenson, slow left-arm, and Sutcliffe, the captain, with somewhat erratic leg-breaks, lent variety to the bowling. Stevenson, the new captain, expected the help of four old colours in 1945.

**St. Dunstan's College** could feel justifiably pleased with their performance in winning eight and drawing one of eleven matches. First-rate bowling was backed by safe fielding, with A. H. Waller in grand form behind the wicket. C. M. Butler led the side well and achieved success with fast-medium swing bowling and as a defensive batsman. J. C. Chapman, with flighted leg-breaks, J. A. F. Crawford, medium-pace, N. Bamford, off-breaks, all did able work in attack. R. W. H. Johnston and J. W. Newton played some valuable innings.

More strongly represented than for many years, **St. Edward's School, Oxford**, won seven and drew five of fourteen fixtures. In School matches they gained fairly easy victories over Bradfield, Cheltenham, Radley, Stowe and Bromsgrove and drew with Eastbourne. Only two schools succeeded in putting together three-figure totals against them. D. Henderson, captain and best all-rounder, and M. T. D. Womersley took main honours in bowling; C. H. Hossell, who, against Radley, hit the first century obtained for St. Edward's in a School match since 1938, headed the batting averages.

Had the **St. John's School, Leatherhead**, batting reached the same level as the bowling, the team would have gained a better

record than won five, lost three, drawn one. R. R. Ll. Morgan bowled his leg-spinners with increasing confidence as the season advanced; P. Hyndson and P. W. B. Jewell supported him well. Upon C. H. P. Silk, the captain, fell the task of restoring the situation when the batting frequently broke down. Hyndson, a hitter, D. Wetli and D. M. West played some useful innings.

T. F. Weston, the **St. Paul's School** captain, and the three other old colours, C. R. I. Estridge, wicket-keeper, J. M. Palmer and D. G. Johnson, formed the backbone of the team, who won three and lost five of twelve games. Weston, a reliable batsman with sound defence and ability to punish the loose ball, easily headed the averages. J. W. Runacres displayed promise as an opening batsman. Johnson, slow-medium, and Palmer, fast-medium, were the best bowlers. W. J. Whittington, though expensive because of nervousness, impressed onlookers as the best leg-break bowler at the School during the war years. Johnson joined H.M. Forces some time before the end of term.

**Sedbergh School** suffered severely from abnormally bad weather, which restricted both opportunities for match-play and net-practice. Apart from some uncertainty in the slips, the fielding formed the best feature of the cricket. A. R. Pryde, on wickets that did not suit him, bowled remarkably well besides leading his side with judgment. G. P. Hirst and L. C. Slater did not reap a reward of runs in proportion to their batting skill.

Again without old colours, the **Sevenoaks School** team, captained by R. Knight, won one match and lost six. The bowling, in the hands of J. R. S. Lark and G. B. Wraight, was adequate, but the batting failed repeatedly.

Winning three and losing four of ten matches, the **Sherborne School** team did not rise above a moderate standard. Though not strong, the bowling proved good enough on most occasions. P. W. R. Coate, if inconsistent, was really dangerous on his day, and C. E. N. Arkell and J. M. S. Broadley worked hard. The chief weakness lay in batting. R. W. Forbes and Arkell were promising but unreliable, E. B. A. Edwards, Broadley and A. H. Blandford did well at times, but no one seemed capable of making a stand if the early batsmen failed.

**Shrewsbury School** were not an impressive team, being unreliable in batting and unsteady as regards change bowling. J. B. Pugh, the best all-rounder, frequently batted admirably and, with fast-medium out-swingers, proved the backbone of the bowling. He topped both sets of averages. J. S. Cochrane, H. R. S. Rhys and N. B. Clark played useful innings, and the batting of the

captain, J. G. Mouldsdale, was of greater value than his figures suggest. P. N. D. Green-Price, handicapped by illness, did not do himself justice. Chief support for Pugh in attack came from D. F. Graham-Evans, fast, and R. A. Bell, left-arm spinners.

W. R. M. Horton, captain for a second season, was outstanding in the **Solihull School** eleven. He well deserved his 308 runs and 57 wickets. The weakness of the batting generally was due to the poor state of the pitches. Both Horton and S. N. Sanders would normally have gained higher averages. L. D. E. Willmott, slow, and C. C. Bishop, fast, completed a capable attack. Seven of sixteen matches were won and five lost. P. J. Hill, S. A. Lea, a sound wicket-keeper, J. P. Shepherdson, G. A. Hunt, J. R. Meek, Bishop and Willmott were likely to be available for 1945.

J. H. Lambert, captain and only old colour, carried off top honours in both batting and bowling for **Stamford School**. A. Burgoin, who scored the one century, and J. M. Guffick were other capable all-rounders. Of twelve matches, three were won and four lost.

Weak batting in the main accounted for the modest record of **Stowe School**—won three, lost nine, drawn three. Only J. V. Bartlett batted consistently; if he failed, disaster frequently followed. Of the out-cricket a different tale could be told. If lacking variety, the bowling, backed by fine wicket-keeping on the part of E. M. Arnold and first-class fielding, rarely was mastered. B. B. Croom-Johnson, I. H. Robinson, A. F. Cottier and the captain, C. Dansie, all did well.

Apart from that of the captain, C. H. Sloan, and M. H. Pym, the batting of **Sutton Valence School** disappointed. That seven matches were won was due to the untiring bowling of D. Russell and M. G. A. Ford, who received excellent support in the field. The remaining six fixtures ended in defeat.

Though **Taunton School** numbered victories over Sherborne and Downside among their four wins in eleven matches, inconsistent batting several times cost the side the game. B. S. Hobson, the captain, bowled steadily throughout the season; D. M. Robinson, J. A. Teakle and J. F. Kidd formed the mainstay of the batting.

**Tonbridge School** had to rest content with a solitary victory, over Malvern, but the eleven played enterprising cricket, an instance being that at Bradfield, where, set to get 195 runs in less than two hours, they failed by only one run with two wickets in hand. P. J. Roche, M. R. Smith, R. M. H. Marriott and G. B. Taylor formed the backbone of the batting; Smith, using his height with advantage, and Roche, with leg-breaks, also bowled skilfully. D. H. O. Allen handled with credit the difficult task of captaincy.

Under the leadership of J. A. Eldridge, **University College School** played good, lively cricket and developed into a stronger team than the results—six matches lost and four drawn—might indicate. P. B. Townsend set a fine example in batting and bowling, and J. G. Dunlop bowled with marked accuracy.

Two failures apart, the season brought satisfaction to **Uppingham School**, including as it did victory at Rugby and a win over Oundle. B. Boobyer and G. J. Allen generally gave a good start to a team who batted all through. A. R. Reeves and D. D. Carter, supported by excellent fielding, were a consistently dangerous pair of bowlers. Five of the eleven staying on made prospects encouraging.

Fortunate to have the help of six old colours, **Wellingborough School** won eight and lost only one of ten fixtures. In School games, W. B. Sheret, the captain, and E. White, a player of excellent style, distinguished themselves with some capital innings. At Oakham they shared in a second-wicket stand of 144, Sheret hitting 100. Sheret and W. H. Garland accomplished splendid work in bowling.

Much credit for the success enjoyed by **Wellington College**, who won six and drew four of eleven matches, belonged to T. I. F. Tod, by far the best batsman, and to N. C. Nicholls, whose spin bowling brought him 42 wickets. Against an R.A.S.C. XI, Tod scored 103 not out in just over an hour. P. N. S. Frazer, the captain, kept wicket smartly and played more than one useful innings.

**Westminster School**, expected to return to London in 1945, placed in the field a young team who should have gained valuable experience from the nine matches played last summer. The batting was weak in the extreme, R. C. Low, with 8.83, topping the averages. The bowling was a little better, W. J. Gerrish and K. J. Bruckman, both fast-medium, achieving most success.

Despite youth and inexperience, the **Winchester College** team developed by the end of June into a dangerous if not very sound batting side. The absence of variety in bowling accounted for inability to press home an advantage against both Eton and Marlborough. In the Marlborough match, too, the usually safe fielding was at fault. A. O. J. Cockshutt and P. R. A. Mansfield showed solidity as opening batsmen, setting up a record for the match when making 177 together from the Eton bowling. Especially on slow wickets, Cockshutt scored many runs by fine square cuts and hooks. Less attractive, Mansfield possessed sound defence and strength on the on-side. H. E. Webb, the captain, J. V. Bardsley,

a punishing batsman, and R. M. Macpherson were other consistent run-getters. R. K. Studd, fast-medium, and M. D. Butler, fast, bore the burden of the bowling; G. H. J. Myrtle, off-breaks, and A. P. Doggart, both medium, occasionally did useful work. As about six of the team were expected to stay on, prospects for 1945 appeared bright.

Bad weather accounted for several of the seven drawn games played by **Worksop College**. The remaining two fixtures ended in defeat. This record did not do justice to a fairly well-balanced team in which J. E. Townend, the captain, played an inspiring part. Under the coaching of George Gunn, the batting steadily improved, and much was expected in 1945 of P. G. Clark, a late discovery.

**Worcester Royal Grammar School** started the season with only three old colours, but the new eleven quickly settled down and won seven of fifteen matches, losing five. Most of the success was due to the good, steady bowling of J. B. Gee, slow, and P. Wilson, medium. R. V. Kings, the captain, and J. P. Whitcombe, an excellent wicket-keeper, again proved the mainstay of the batting.

**Wrekin College** fulfilled a heavy programme with credit, winning nine matches, drawing three and losing five. The bowling of B. S. Jones formed an outstanding feature of their cricket. Taking 70 wickets at an average cost of 5.95, Jones set up a new individual record for the School in a season. R. T. Peacock, the captain, headed the batting averages and also bowled well. P. J. Timmis displayed great improvement behind the wicket, and J. Kenyon of the younger players held out promise.

The **Wyggeston Grammar School** captain, I. Sutherland, strove hard to obtain a decision in all the fourteen matches and it was not his fault that eight ended in draws. Five were won. Sutherland outstanding all-rounder, and J. K. Shepherd did best as run-getters.

## SCOTTISH SCHOOLS

**Edinburgh Academy** could feel satisfied with the season's performances, for they won three of six School matches and lost two by narrow margins—to Royal High School by two runs and to George Watson's College by six runs. T. D. G. White, the captain, not only bowled extremely well, but played some good, forceful innings. W. R. Allan, the best batsman, did not do himself justice. P. E. Malone bowled steadily throughout, and R. A. Forsyth kept wicket surely.

In D. M. McPherson, Fettes College possessed a remarkably good all-rounder. He headed the batting averages and, with fifty wickets for less than seven runs each, also finished top of the bowling. W. Martin and J. A. Murray were other valuable batsmen, and P. Wragg worked hard and successfully in an attack well managed by W. L. K. Cowie.

The Glasgow Academy batting was poor and unreliable, but P. J. Craig, the captain, and J. Hepworth bowled splendidly throughout the season. Thanks to them and to first-rate fielding the School, after a shaky start, wound up with five successive victories.

The failure of their captain, W. L. Sleigh, as batsman considerably weakened the run-getting powers of (Trinity College) Glenalmond. Sleigh slightly improved his bowling average, though chief honours in attack went to R. C. B. Gourlay and A. I. McIntyre.

Loretto School owed a great deal to the ability of W. A. Williamson. Not only did Williamson score 442 runs, but he took 63 wickets at an average cost of 7.62. A. M. C. Wotherspoon, the captain, was his best helper in batting, and D. G. Lachlan and D. J. Cairns in bowling.

After an uncertain start, George Watson's College emerged at the top of the Championship list for the first time since 1926. I. C. W. Bigland, an inspiring captain, proved himself clearly the best schoolboy bowler in Scotland in 1944, taking 52 wickets for 4.67 runs each. J. S. Sutherland was prominent as an all-rounder; A. M. Brown played some capable innings, and the colt, J. F. Cowan, showed great promise.
