

THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS, 1947

Nobody could claim 1947 as a vintage year for Public Schools cricket. The after effects of the war, during which good coaches were few and opposition from club sides weak, were probably more greatly felt than in the preceding years. The complaint of cricket masters generally was that few of the younger players had a sound groundwork to their game. That was undoubtedly one reason why the season could be regarded as only a moderate success.

Even Eton, whose team is generally a little ahead of all rivals, could not maintain their usual high standard. Extreme weakness in bowling was the main cause of their upset, a weakness which was aggravated by indifferent fielding. There were sound batsmen in the side, but none to compare with such outstanding players of recent years as the Hon. L. R. White and P. D. Blake. So for once Eton did not have a single player in the representative Schools

team against the Combined Services at Lord's.

The absence of an Etonian was certainly felt by that team, for year in and year out the Eton cricketers are more experienced than most others of similar age. They consistently play against better club sides, and they quickly become better fitted temperamentally to take the big game at Lord's in their stride. They do in fact usually provide a hard core of confidence and experience for the Schools side. Yet it was good to find the teams for the trial game between Southern Schools and The Rest more widely representative. Choosing these teams is indeed difficult, but I have thought in the past that some schools have been too strongly represented. No such complaint could be made in 1947. There were twenty-one schools represented in the trial game, and only Charterhouse provided two players. Both, incidentally, won through the trial and played in the representative match.

That was fitting, for, if their record was not remarkable, they were one of the leading sides of the year, though for solid team work producing really excellent results Marlborough have strong claims to be considered the best. Charterhouse certainly had the outstanding batsman. He was P. B. H. May, the mainstay of the batting and a good captain of a side which supported him well in all branches of the game. May first played at Lord's in 1945 as a youngster of fifteen, when he was clearly being too highly tried in the match between the Public Schools and a Lord's XI. His promise as a batsman then was obvious. The following year his early promise was in a fair way to being fulfilled, and that he was not again in the representative team was due not to his batting but rather to his fielding. Finally, in 1947, May was a batsman

quite up to the best school standard, the equal certainly of Blake in 1945. His class as a batsman and his ideal cricketing temperament were obvious from the start of his big innings at Lord's against the Combined Services. The first short ball bowled at him he hooked with complete assurance and impressive force to the Tavern boundary. Throughout that innings he looked a thoroughly good batsman. It was an innings of high class, played at a time when the other batsmen were failing badly. He had a wide range of strokes, and he was always looking for chances to use them.

In that match May stood out far above the other boys. Several batsmen among them had played well in the Southern Schools v. The Rest match against boy bowlers, and P. J. Whitcombe (R.G.S., Worcester) and J. B. Riley (Wellingborough) had scored centuries against an attack which included Ian Bedford (Woodhouse G.S., Finchley), who bowled his slow spinners with conspicuous success for Middlesex during the season. In the following match against men bowlers they and the others were nervously foot-tied. Whitcome, a neat little batsman and a useful stumper, did score 36 in the second innings, and that was enough to show the cricketing ability in him. He looked the most likely of the other batsmen, who also included Riley, D. S. Sheppard (Sherborne), J. C. Marshall (Rugby), and J. A. Tobin (Wrekin). They were clearly sound boy batsmen. They showed that in the trial game, but their limitations were obvious when they faced the Services bowlers.

Another sound boy cricketer was D. C. Kingsley (Beaumont), who has, like May, long been playing in these end-of-term matches at Lord's. Year after year Kingsley has had an outstanding record for his school, and finally in 1947 he scored 940 runs and took 66 wickets with his off-breaks. Yet Kingsley has not matched May's rate of development. There remains a roughness about his cricket which was noticeable in his first year at Lord's. He has probably needed better opposition than the opponents of Beaumont could offer. The impression to be gathered from his play is that he learned all he could from that class of cricket and has not since

made obvious headway.

The bowling of the Schools suffered from the absence of Bedford, who was kept out of the match against the Services by an injured hand. Without him there was a lack of thrust in the attack. As in the previous year, G. P. R. Esdale, of Malvern, was the most promising bowler. A leg-break and googly bowler, he was at his best in the trial game. In the big match he lost the rhythm of his run. He seemed to be approaching the wicket too fast for his bowling pace, and his length suffered. Nevertheless there were distinct possibilities about his spin bowling. At the time he was only sixteen—big for his age—and so had plenty of time in which to develop.

Three of the other bowlers, Kingsley, R. L. Whitby (Charterhouse) and A. O. Goddard (Winchester), played at Lord's the previous year. Whitby then looked like developing more than he actually did in the succeeding year. Both he and Goddard were hard-working seam bowlers, honest triers who yet lacked outstanding merit. That can also be said of M. T. Robinson (Shrewsbury), a bowler of similar type. Robinson and Sheppard were later tried by Sussex in county championship cricket, and that meant that too much was being asked from them. So much was clear to those who saw them play at Lord's. The Sussex idea of encouraging youngsters was admirable in conception, but the gap between the classes is far too large to be bridged by any but the most outstanding boy cricketers. It has been bridged by such as C. H. Taylor in the past and Bedford in the present, but for most schoolboys of promise the Club and Ground side or the county second eleven offer more suitable training-grounds.

May might have had a measure of success in county cricket. He was not, however, put to the test, which was just as well. One schoolboy, Ian Bedford, was put to that test and fully proved his fitness for the promotion. In his case it was a valuable experience at the age of seventeen, but it might not have been that without the sympathetic handling he received from R. W. V. Robins. In any case this was not really an example of a boy being rudely pitchforked into county cricket. For the previous three years Bedford had been carefully nursed by the wise men at Lord's, among whom Archie Fowler, the chief coach, and G. O. Allen should be mentioned. From the time he played his first game at Lord's, against the Cross Arrows three years before, he was groomed for bigger things. By 1947 he was by skill and temperament, which was surprisingly equable in such a young boy, ready for the trial Middlesex gave him. I will say no more than that he was fully worthy of his success, which held out the very highest promise for the future. He has length, flight and spin; he has bowling brains, and I can see only one danger—that he will allow himself to be overworked before he is muscularly set.

The matches between individual schools at Lord's were generally disappointing. Quite the best was that in which Marlborough beat Malvern by five wickets to round off a very successful season. They finished in excellent form against a School deputising at Lord's for Rugby, who were in quarantine for infantile paralysis. Marlborough's success right through the season was achieved by team work, to which all contributed under the prompting of an able captain in R. H. Woodhouse

The Eton and Harrow match was a run-getting orgy against bowling so weak that only seventeen wickets fell in two long days. Clifton were much too good for Tonbridge, and Haileybury had a very easy match against Cheltenham, who suffered grievously from

having no competent guide for their young players. The latter were in fact the victims of a short-sighted policy.

Earlier I mentioned the effects of the war were one reason for a moderate season, but they were not the only reason. I am more than ever convinced that what I wrote last year about stereotyped methods of coaching was correct. More enterprising coaching with some departure from the orthodox really is needed. The present methods turn out too many players who look pretty in a net but whose deficiencies and limitations when faced with the realities of the middle are all too obvious. I will agree with the game; masters up to a point, namely, that what drop there has been in the standard as compared with pre-war School cricket is largely attributable to the war. Where I differ from many is in assessing the worth of the pre-war standard. In my opinion the Schools should aim at something higher, and it should not be difficult to attain, for there was room for improvement in those days also.

The deficiencies of the 1947 representative players were exposed at Lord's by J. N. Bartlett. Against his left-hand slows the footwork of most of the boys was quite inadequate. Only May played him well. All the others either lacked the confidence or the ability to use their feet against him. The previous year, when his general record in first-class cricket was moderate, the same bowler exposed the same deficiencies in the Cambridge batsmen, who were in the main pre-war products of Public School cricket. They were turned out of the same mould, drilled in the same thorough fashion to play the forward defensive stroke, which is a valuable basic shot but should not be regarded as the be all and end all of batting.

While in Australia the previous winter I played in a match against St. Peter's College, Adelaide, which is one of the two or three leading Australian schools. In that game we had a slow leg-break bowler who was roughly handled by a batsman aged fifteen. The youngster confidently walked yards down the wicket to meet the ball on the full pitch and to clout it firmly. Afterwards the cricket master showed me how he taught the boys to use their feet against slow bowling. He had converted an outdoor squash court to the purpose by knocking down the front wall to leave a concrete "net." At the batting end he had painted the positions of the feet as the batsman stood at the wicket and other footmarks to indicate the positions as he walked down the pitch. There the boys were trained in the methods to be employed against slow bowling, and the results of the "drilling" were proved excellent in the middle. That is one example of the enterprise in coaching which I have been suggesting. It might well be tried in this country, for timid footwork against slow bowling is one of the main batting weaknesses of the English Public School batsman.

In Australia, incidentally, there are no professional coaches

for the schools, but their cricket does not suffer by comparison. On the whole I should say that their school teams are of much the same quality as their English counterparts. The Australian schoolboy batsman may not be quite so groomed and elegant as the English boy, but he is generally bolder in his methods, and it seemed to me that the bowlers out there were rather more developed.

THE SCHOOLS

J. Sainsbury captained Aldenham School so successfully that, although there were only two old colours in the eleven, most opponents were dismissed for modest scores. Keen fielding supported the bowlers, but the batting was less sound. Sainsbury's fast-medium out-swingers were effective throughout the season, and A. Heywood-Jones (medium) also bowled well. T. J. Law headed the batting list, with G. C. Pennington a left-hander of promise.

A young and inexperienced Alleyn's School side, led by the single remaining colour, R. Voysey, met with varied fortune, but lost only one school game. With medium-paced right-arm outswingers, Voysey was the mainstay of the attack, and the slow left-arm deliveries of T. F. Pretlove gained success late in the season. C. W. Langford, P. A. Tomsett and M. J. Stewart all contributed useful batting performances.

The Allhallows School eleven fared distinctly better than in 1946, winning three school matches and giving encouraging displays against strong club opposition. Despite the keen example of the captain, J. M. Leveson, the fielding disappointed, and the batting proved weak in the middle, although the opening pair, M. Ray-Hills and K. G. Hutchings, did well and the tail-enders indulged in some brave hitting. D. J. Fulton was perhaps the most accurate of a set of bowlers inclined to pitch short.

Ampleforth College won five out of twelve matches, with four draws and three defeats, the eleven's greatest triumph being a victory over a strong M.C.C. side. G. A. Robertson, E. O. Kirwan and C. J. Kenny were the pick of moderate batsmen. The bowling proved unusually strong, C. J. Kenny and G. A. Robertson both being well above average and receiving effective support from Hon, E. T. Fitzherbert and N. H. Bruce.

The splendid all-round form and sound captaincy of D. C. Kingsley greatly helped Beaumont College in a successful season, during which only one school match was lost. Kingsley averaged 78 for 940 runs, hitting three centuries, and off-spin bowling brought him 66 wickets. He was selected for Southern Schools against The Rest, and for Public Schools against Combined Services. J. I. Cousins, slow left-arm, and B. Dillon, medium-paced right-arm, both bowled with considerable success, and the eleven fielded consistently well.

Bedford School, who won seven and drew eight of seventeen games, possessed a most capable pair of opening batsmen in A. D. R. Dawes and G. D. Moulton, who several times shared in three-figure stands. B. E. Disbury found excellent form late in the season and made two centuries. Taking 61 wickets, the captain, G. McF. D. Fleming, did best in a strong attack, but a left-arm spin bowler would have been an asset. The side fielded admirably.

After a slow start, Berkhamsted School enjoyed a successful season, for which they owed much to the inspiring captaincy and all-round ability of the captain, D. C. Morgan. Seven games were won, four drawn and three lost. Best batting support for Morgan came from D. F. M. Pringle and S. H. Fothergill, while A. J. Birrell, at the age of 15, showed great promise. D. H. Mills and J. Barrett both showed good form with the ball and were expected to improve.

Stronger in bowling than batting, Bishop's Stortford College won four of their fourteen matches and lost five. P. H. Carruthers and M. Bennett, good opening bowlers, took most of the wickets, and received capable support in the field. Carruthers and D. A. Fothergill were the best of a moderate set of batsmen.

Bloxham School, who expected to have nine members of the team available in 1948, won four and lost five of ten matches. Both schools matches were won. J. W. Barton and P. C. Jones developed into steady opening batsmen, with P. E. Coombe, somewhat unorthodox, and D. C. Thomas also useful. Barton enjoyed success with slow off-breaks, and A. J. Lord proved an accurate opening bowler. Well captained by J. W. Butler, the side fielded keenly.

In a very enjoyable season Blundell's School experienced seven close finishes while winning six matches, losing six and drawing three. J. C. Newell-Price, the captain, bowled right-arm mediumpace particularly well, and J. P. Hallam and M. C. P. Tatton-Tatton, although not suited by the hard pitches, achieved excellent performances with slow off-breaks. J. M. Edes, a sound opening batsman, was well supported by C. R. H. Wells, D. A. Ferguson and J. H. D. Hay, who also kept wicket splendidly.

Victory rewarded Bradfield College in only one school match; yet in club games they improved on 1946 form. A promising all-rounder, H. W. Joynt, headed the batting averages and also took most wickets. A. P. C. Parkinson, too, showed all-round ability, but tended to be inconsistent. B. E. Murch led the side keenly and showed stolid defence as a left-hand batsman. D. I. Iliffe, medium left-arm, and D. J. Burton, a young fast bowler, did well at times, with J. Garfield a wicket-keeper of promise.

Four centuries were hit for **Brentwood School** in a successful season, perhaps the best being by C. Griffiths against Essex Club and Ground. Griffiths and R. C. Vowels, two good all-rounders, gave backbone to the side, and they received strong support from R. H. Hanworth, a sound run-getter, and P. A. Griffiths, a capable wicket-keeper-batsman.

A young Brighton College eleven lost all the important school matches, mostly through half-hearted batting. D. G. Owen, gradually rising in the batting order from number six to number one, saved the side several times, and J. D. Gardiner was the one batsman able to hit the ball hard. J. A. Ince, youngest member of the team, headed the bowling averages, with A. H. Farrar and P. Kemp other reliable bowlers. J. R. Barrington, the captain, handled the side well and kept wicket soundly.

Only two school matches were played by Bromsgrove School, many boys going into quarantine early in the season through an outbreak of illness. Nine members of the eleven remained for 1948.

Keen fielding and good bowling helped Bryanston School to a satisfactory season. Two fast bowlers, D. Wynne-Morgan (leftarm) and J. Oldfield, and J. R. Tustin with leg-breaks, all did well. The side steadily gained in batting confidence, J. Neads and A. G. Tomlin playing some useful innings.

All-round ability helped Caterham School to a successful season against schools, but they fared less well against club teams. M. J. Bishop proved himself the best cricketer in the eleven, a good stroke-player and a steady, intelligent bowler. J. D. Wildgoose, the captain, batted well, while R. D. Smith was a competent wicket-keeper, and D. B. Campbell, late in the season, showed much promise as a fast bowler.

The brilliant batting of P. B. H. May, also an excellent captain, was the dominating feature of Charterhouse School cricket. He made three centuries for the school, and played two splendid innings at Lord's in representative games. In off-driving, hooking and leg-gliding he was particularly accomplished. R. L. Whitby again bowled well, receiving good support from N. R. Burt, G. A. Meyer, S. E. A. Kimmins and P. G. Nathan, while the fielding was first rate. Most of the team showed competence with the bat.

Cheltenham College won only one game, but several players gave promise for the future. These included J. Lister and C. P. N. Swiney, a left-hander, two batsmen who headed the averages with identical records. The captain, P. C. Gautier-Smith, played some stubborn innings. The bowling lacked hostility, with J. D. F.

Alexander and Lister, both medium-paced, the most successful. H. E. Hammond, former Sussex all-rounder, was appointed coach for 1948.

Chigwell School won two of fifteen matches and drew five, a rather disappointing record. G. E. Malyon played several good innings, but was inconsistent. A. B. Brooker, a young opening batsman, displayed ability. A. J. Evans, slow leg-breaks, although sometimes expensive, headed the bowling figures, and M. L. Phillips did well with left-arm slow bowling.

Christ's Hospital possessed two useful all-rounders in J. A. Bailey and A. P. Jackson. Both medium-fast bowlers who could swerve the ball effectively, they also contributed a number of useful scores. P. F. Matthews, an aggressive right-hander, topped the batting list, and the captain, M. K. D. Gunton, greatly improved his wicket-keeping.

Unreliable batting, erratic bowling and fielding which lacked aggression resulted in a disappointing time for Clifton College. Fortunately the eleven showed their true capabilities at Lord's, beating Tonbridge in an innings. D. C. Dickinson's slow-medium bowling proved an exception to the general rule, and he well earned the best average. D. B. Bird and P. M. V. Crawford displayed most reliability with the bat.

Winning six school matches and drawing the other, Cranbrook School did particularly well, their full record being eight won, four drawn and two lost. M. G. Madan-Mayers made most runs in a side strong in batting. Two right-arm bowlers, the captain, G. S. F. Wilkin (fast-medium), and J. M. Cochrane (slow offbreaks), bore chief part in the attack. In three school matches they bowled unchanged.

Cranleigh School gained a creditable record of four wins, five draws and two losses. In a reliable batting side the captain, J. K. McClure, and G. S. de Clive-Lowe proved the most consistent. The attack, generally rather weak, relied considerably on the medium-paced in-swingers of W. A. Fuller, whose batting suffered as a result. Although handicapped by injury, M. R. Fairbarns did well, and the wicket-keeping of I. M. Langmead steadily improved.

Culford School, ably led by R. A. Leeming, won two, lost one, and drew five of eight school matches. In almost all the earlier games the batting was far too cautious and the bowling, while accurate, lacked sting. Most effective of the bowlers were the vice-captain, I. G. Hall, and J. R. Warrell, both of whom contributed largely to the success against clubs.

The Dean Close School season was one of promise rather than fulfilment, six games being drawn and five lost. With more judicious handling of the bowlers at least two matches might have been won. The eleven played best against the strongest opposition, an encouraging augury for 1948. P. J. Leech headed the batting averages, with N. K. D. Rosser, occasionally very good, the most successful bowler.

Denstone College were another school who failed to win a match, drawing six and losing two, but in two games rain stopped play when a win appeared likely. L. D. Ashcroft, the captain, did best in a useful batting side, but the bowling proved weak, and the lack of a pace bowler was felt severely. C. T. McInerney, mediumpace off-spin, and B. Inions, slow left-arm, showed to advantage in their first season, but were somewhat overworked.

Lack of coaching during the war years was evident in the batting of Downside School, who lost seven games, won one, and drew one. M. W. Hussey, P. R. Baker and E. G. Willett showed promise, but lacked sufficient confidence for consistent scoring. The attack was up to standard and the fielding excellent. I. D. F. Chisholm, with a little luck, would have gained more wickets with consistent medium-pace bowling. W. H. Waddon-Martyn (medium) and J. J. Doyle (slow), two left-arm bowlers, did well. P. J. Denvir, a colt who played in the last two matches, took the last five Taunton wickets in eight balls, including a "hat-trick," with well-flighted slow spinning deliveries.

Losing ten of eleven matches and drawing the other, **Dover** College experienced a disastrous time. After a bad start they seemed to lose heart and could do little right. Fortunately, one or two young players promised well for the future.

For the good season enjoyed by Dulwich College much credit is due to the excellent captaincy of J. A. C. Bentall, who added to his reputation as wicket-keeper and opening batsman. Eight matches were won, five lost and one drawn. Another important factor was the return to form of W. M. Mitchell, vice-captain, whose leg-break bowling proved decisive in several games. M. H. Bushby's batting developed rapidly, and among bowlers enjoying success were J. B. Evans (medium) and J. C. Bailey (left-arm slow).

That talented all-rounder, R. W. Smithson, did not dominate the Durham School cricket so completely as in 1946, but, nevertheless, enjoyed another good season, and led the side with spirit. A left-handed batsman with particularly good off-side strokes, Smithson also showed skill with right-arm spin bowling, and fielded brilliantly at mid-off. M. W. Bell scored well as opening

batsman, with J. U. Sidgwick hitting hard at times. C. W. Thompson, who headed the bowling list, showed the right temperament for a leg-break exponent, and E. C. Craven's fast deliveries improved.

With the bowling showing distinct promise and the fielding much improved, Eastbourne College enjoyed a more encouraging season than indicated by the results, which showed two wins against six losses in eleven games. The captain, R. B. Harrison, and R. T. V. Brown, who batted left-hand and bowled right-arm medium pace, were two valuable all-rounders, and in J. Lock the side possessed a skilful left-arm slow bowler. Six old colours remained for 1948.

Once again Epsom College batsmen failed to make many runs, and none of the nine games was won. H. C. Levack, the captain, kept wicket ably, but was less successful with the bat than in the previous season. P. Bunday, a left-hander, displayed promising form, and M. B. Heywood-Waddington, an energetic bowler, earned good figures.

Suffering from extreme poverty of bowling on the prevailing hard wickets, Eton College won two, drew five and lost four matches. P. Lindsay, of whom much was expected, suffered a series of strains, and no dangerous bowler was discovered. The fielding, too, fell below the usual standard. The side batted soundly, although lacking a satisfactory opening pair, and T. Hare, A. L. Lutyens and C. A. Impey all did well.

Good, keen fielding by the Giggleswick School eleven greatly helped the four chief bowlers, M. S. Davidson, E. Mitchell, P. S. Leneghan and M. Scales, the last-named a left-hander. The batting was open to criticism, only Mitchell, Leneghan and G. B. Nicholson recording half-centuries. Nicholson, unfortunately, missed several games through an injured ankle.

With five old colours available, it was disappointing that Haileybury and Imperial Service College did not gain a better record than four wins and four draws against seven defeats. R. F. B. Letts, the captain, headed both batting and bowling figures. He scored one century, and took 57 wickets with legbreaks and googlies. J. C. B. Letts, S. S. M. Monteath, A. J. Beard and C. N. C. Haslam gave most support in batting, and A. A. Parkes, P. R. Jackson and J. J. Putnam with the ball.

Ten out of sixteen Harrow School fixtures were drawn, with four victories and two defeats from strong clubs. Because of inconsistent batting, the side seldom scored heavily. T. J. M.

Skinner fully earned the best batting average, while R. La T. Colthurst showed pleasing aggression and R. H. Thompson promise for the future. In his first season in the side, R. A. Jacques proved the most successful of a steady set of bowlers, and the fielding was keen and adequate if not inspired. G. C. Hoyer-Millar, captain and wicket-keeper, was among six of the eleven available in 1948.

A young Highgate School team won five, lost five and drew three matches, a big improvement on the previous year. The strong point was in fielding, under the determined captaincy of J. Houghton, who also did well with the bat and with off-spin bowling. D. H. K. Rata (left-arm) again topped the bowling figures, and J. F. Copeland (off-breaks) completed a useful trio of spin bowlers. Best among the batsmen were R. D. Owen, the 1948 captain, and W. H. Cooper, who both revealed good style and punishing ability.

The Hurstpierpoint College record of three victories and six defeats in twelve matches was better than it appears, for in four games there were extremely close finishes. The eleven was not strong in batting, A. J. Lyne and K. R. Jenkin being the most consistent, though G. M. Pitcher improved during the season. P. K. Ephraimson maintained promise as a medium-pace spin bowler, and Pitcher developed into a useful wicket-keeper.

After a fortnight's coaching by L. E. G. Ames and C. Lewis, King's School, Rochester, enjoyed their best season in school matches for many years. With easy victories at Sutton Valence and narrow wins against Dover and St. Edmund's, they gained five victories and suffered two losses. The bowling of B. J. H. Kennett, slow left-arm, B. A. Cook, medium right-arm, and J. M. Cook was well supported by A. Levick at the wicket. P. G. Bradley, Levick and J. M. Cook again headed the batting averages. P. G. Bradley, a very keen captain, managed his bowling splendidly. He was expected to have at least five of the eleven to help him in 1948.

Losing only two matches against school sides, King Edward's School, Birmingham, enjoyed the most successful season for several years. The fast bowling of P. T. Richardson, the captain, brought him fifty wickets at under eight runs apiece, and he received sound support from T. R. Reese, J. M. Barson and D. J. G. Sells, all medium-pace. The side batted steadily, with J. G. Harrison, M. G. H. Spencer and Sells most successful.

In such a dry season the wretched form of King's College School, Wimbledon, was disheartening. None of the thirteen matches was won and eight resulted in defeat. The batting sadly

lacked confidence, players repeatedly making poor strokes which hastened their own downfall. The bowling, although varied, was erratic. D. L. Priston, the captain, an attacking batsman and legbreak bowler, enjoyed some success. R. E. Dawson played a few stylish innings. T. E. Humphreys showed occasional good form with left-arm fast bowling, but suffered from dropped catches.

The King's School, Bruton, eleven lacked experience and went through a rather disappointing season. J. M. Bordass showed all-round skill, averaging over 40 in batting and taking 33 wickets, the same number as G. Gale, a left-arm bowler. J. D. M. Bowen, the captain, batted well, and E. A. Bristow was useful as change bowler.

T. P. J. Dyke, a fast-medium bowler 6 feet 4 inches in height, and C. A. R. Dennis, the only old colours in the King's School, Ely, side, took a big proportion of the wickets. D. H. Morgan headed the batting averages, but the side lacked a player able to hit out. Of eleven games, six were won and two drawn.

Under the fine leadership of D. C. Linahan, Kingswood School won six and drew two of nine matches. As in 1946, R. Wilkinson and N. H. Bellis finished top of the batting and bowling averages respectively. Each, like Linahan, displayed all-round ability. Most of the team were again available for 1948.

The cricket at Lancing College again showed improvement, the eleven recovering from a poor start and accomplishing some good performances. P. M. H. Robinson, the captain, played several fast-scoring and attractive innings and bowled away swingers of steady length. He topped both sets of averages. D. A. Swales, a sound wicket-keeper, proved valuable as a defensive batsman. F. D. C. Ford, an in-swing bowler, gained capital figures.

An injury to R. N. Lewis, the captain and a most capable batsman, proved serious for Leeds Grammar School. Lewis was unable to play for more than half the season, and a young side did not find its feet. A clear-cut victory over St. Peter's, York, provided some consolation for a disappointing season.

Strong bowling for Leighton Park School was not backed up by equally sound batting, and, although opposing sides were often dismissed cheaply, only two of eleven games were won. C. M. Oxton, the captain, T. S. Meux, E. I. Spencer and W. R. A. Morford bore the main burden of attack. Oxton also did well in run-getting, with D. W. Lister, a left-hander, and T. W. Greeves improving their batting considerably.

Batsmen who failed to find their best form handicapped The Leys School. G. M. Stannard proved particularly disappointing, although his spin bowling and that of J. L. Davies gained considerable success. The side's pace bowlers failed to take advantage of fast pitches. J. M. Childs was an enthusiastic and able captain.

With more steady bowling, Liverpool College might have done better than win four games, draw two and lose two. Strong batting resulted in several high scores being recorded, and R. M. Hughes, the captain, M. E. Williams and A. C. Chadwick all did well. Chadwick bowled slow off-breaks intelligently, while Williams, J. W. Power and P. L. Ellis enjoyed success at times, but nobody could be relied upon to maintain a good length.

Despite difficulties, Malvern College performed creditably in the first season at home after six years. In addition to the usual school fixtures, Malvern took the place of Rugby at Lord's in an emergency, losing to Marlborough in extra time. G. P. R. Esdale, a capable captain, enjoyed all-round success, and G. C. Francis was the best batsman. The fielding reached a high standard.

In their most successful season for many years, Marlborough College won six games, tied one, drew four and lost one. R. H. Woodhouse, the captain, showed excellent control of his mediumpace swerve bowling, and received able support from J. A. Burnett and T. G. Abell, slow spin bowlers. The batting strength lay mostly in the opening pair, C. P. Wroth (right-hand) and I. P. Skeet (left-hand). This pair were wicket-keepers of about equal ability, but Skeet kept in all matches except one.

Some close and exciting cricket was enjoyed by Merchant Taylors' School, who won two games, drew five and lost five. The captain, T. D. R. Hockaday, a sound opening batsman, and D. I. S. Hinton, a promising left-hander, were best in a useful batting side. R. M. Barclay, medium-fast right-arm, gained considerable bowling success, and his opening partner and 1948 captain, D. G. S. Baker, consistently improved his left-arm deliveries, although his batting fell off.

The Mill Hill School eleven failed to fulfil expectations, ten of twelve matches being lost, with one victory. J. A. Smith, the captain, and A. W. Fenn were the backbone of the batting, Smith also taking most wickets. The bowling in general lacked sting, but D. B. M. Phillips and J. Roberts (left-arm) did well at times.

Newcastle Royal Grammar School experienced a satisfactory season, winning six, drawing one, and losing four matches. Unreliable batting was a weakness, only P. B. Reeve being at all

consistent. The bowling reached a much higher standard, J. D. Hodgson being specially effective. D. Gibbin, again captain in 1948, set a good example of keenness in the field.

Displaying weakness in batting, Oakham School lost ten games, with three won and one drawn. W. J. S. Wright, an able captain, bowled steadily, taking 47 wickets for 13.46 runs each. Seven of the eleven remained for 1948.

After a bad start, the Oundle School eleven performed creditably several times, although never becoming really formidable. J. A. Holroyd batted soundly and M. J. Hardy with enterprise, while C. J. Swan, besides doing well with the bat, was the most successful bowler, combining accuracy with a late out-swinger. A. J. W. Gordon, medium-pace, and J. B. Haggas, a promising left-arm spin bowler, gave good support. Always steady, the fielding at times achieved brilliance.

Perse School won five matches, lost seven and drew one, a record which might well have been better had not appendicitis deprived them of W. D. L. Morris, the captain, before half-term. Thereafter the side depended too much upon the opening batsmen for runs and carried no bowler of pace. D. J. Cottrell and W. H. Percival were reliable batsmen, and P. W. Gooden, medium-pace left-arm, a promising bowler. These three and five old colours were returning in 1948.

In B. J. Gosling, who, at fourteen, took 26 wickets for 11.42 runs each, Plymouth College discovered a left-arm bowler of unusual promise. With P. M. Dunkley, the captain, and D. E. G. Perry, Gosling played for Devon "Colts." Young and inexperienced, the side showed natural ability, six games out of sixteen being won and four drawn. Keen cricket interest in the school augured well for future elevens.

A keen, lively side, Radley College fielded particularly well. A. E. F. Cornwell, a good captain, kept a length and showed determination with right-hand medium-pace bowling. M. J. D. Bower, besides taking many wickets with slow-medium off-breaks, batted attractively, and D. R. W. Lawrence, who headed the batting averages, hit with power.

The Reading School captain, G. D. Draper, lost the toss ten times in twelve matches. Nevertheless his left-arm bowling, with able support from A. G. Piper, usually dismissed opponents reasonably, but the batsmen enjoyed little success. A. E. Bartlett and W. K. C. Morgan were the only two who showed reliability. Four games were won and six lost.

G. W. Hall, a good captain, batted well for Repton School, but other batsmen were inconsistent. R. D. Bailey, who headed the bowling averages, was really fast for a schoolboy, while D. G. Weir bowled out-swingers well, and D. A. S. Wesson maintained commendable accuracy with off-breaks. In a keen fielding side, Wesson was particularly good.

A very competent Rugby School side, which possessed reliable batting and a variety of accurate bowling, lost none of the school matches. The opening bowlers, T. M. B. Guy and J. E. Robinson, both moved the ball away, and received splendid backing from the excellent slip catching of D. S. Gordon and D. R. Wright. The captain, J. C. Marshall, batted stylishly, while Guy and W. R. Mason, a capable opening pair, shared in a partnership of 169 against Repton. Illness prevented the team from going to Lord's for the match with Marlborough.

A young Rydal School eleven improved as the season advanced, developing into the best side for several years. D. Stewart achieved most of a sound set of batsmen, with P. Ibbitson, a colt, showing much promise. J. M. Howarth, a sound wicket-keeper, also played some useful innings. J. M. Duckworth, fast-medium, again did chief work in the bowling, but D. S. Robertson, off-breaks, proved the most dangerous.

St. Albans School won five and drew three of eleven matches against other schools, but fared badly against club sides. R. W. Smith, a splendid wicket-keeper, batted consistently well, with M. G. Smith a left-hander of promise. R. E. Ashworth, the captain, played some good innings and took most wickets with fast-medium bowling, though, like G. A. W. Hayes, medium-paced, he was sometimes erratic. F. J. Josling, slow left-arm, flighted the ball quite well.

J. D. Heaton, captain of St. Bees School, not only easily headed the batting and bowling averages, but succeeded in producing a keen if inexperienced eleven. With weak batting, the side seldom made enough runs to allow Heaton to experiment with his attack, so that B. J. T. Brothers, a promising slow bowler, got few opportunities. E. A. Linton gave most support with both bat and ball.

Winning three and drawing four of their schools matches, St. Dunstan's College were strong in bowling and fielding, and the batting improved during the term. D. G. Belsten (medium-fast), D. R. M. Tune (medium), and J. A. Pierce (left-arm slow-medium) all gained bowling successes, and the captain, F. W. Hankins, kept wicket well.

The cricket at St. Edward's School, Oxford, was definitely below pre-war standard. Only two of fifteen matches were won, with ten lost and three drawn. Fortunately, some younger players gave promise of improvement in the future.

Although not highly successful—four matches were won out of eighteen—the St. Paul's School season was most enjoyable, and there were signs that the pre-war standard of cricket may soon be reached again. J. I. C. Murray proved himself a fine opening batsman, but captaincy cares seemed to affect the left-hand batting of T. Q. Abell. The brothers K. L. M. and D. T. Mills took chief bowling honours.

Although a bowling weakness was apparent at times, St. Peter's School, York, won matches against Durham, Worksop, Ampleforth and Bradford, but lost to Leeds, Manchester and Bootham. M. Speight, captain for 1948, took 50 wickets for 10.76 runs each, but some of the other bowlers disappointed. J. C. M. Rayson, the captain, made one century and headed the batting figures, but was not as consistent as anticipated.

Unlucky with the weather, which allowed little practice, the **Sedbergh School** eleven lacked experienced players and fell below expectations. Aggression and stroke-play was noticeably absent from the batting, and the fielding was generally poor. J. C. Ratcliff, above average as a captain, also bowled leg-breaks skilfully. The bowling, accurate and hostile, proved the best phase of the school's cricket.

Sevenoaks School showed improvement on recent lean years, though winning only two of eleven matches. The team was very young, and it was hoped that 1948 would see a return to pre-war form. M. J. Kennell scored over 300 runs with an average of nearly 30, and J. R. Ogley took most wickets.

A strong bowling side which was not quite so good in batting, Sherborne School won eight and drew three of fourteen matches. P. H. Wakeley and D. M. Turner (medium); the captain, J. S. W. Lush (left-arm), and D. C. P. R. Jowett (off-spin) all did well, but suffered from dropped catches. D. S. Sheppard far outstripped the other batsmen. Very mature for a schoolboy cricketer, he made 786 runs for an average of 78.60 and hit four centuries.

Shrewsbury School, a very useful side, produced a highly promising right-arm medium-pace bowler in M. T. Robinson, who played in Public School representative games at Lord's and also for Sussex. He took 49 wickets for just over 11 runs each, and

shared the burden of the bowling with the captain, G. M. Cochrane. S. A. Barr and Robinson, two left-handers, C. W. Sanger and D. L. Shaw, the 1948 captain, each played good innings.

Solihull School, starting poorly, settled down into a useful team. The bowling was much stronger than the batting, B. W. Balls, C. D. Piggins and J. E. Sreeves all being very successful. D. E. Verrier was a much improved batsman, but A. E. Bannister could not reproduce his form of the previous year.

Fine all-round form by L. A. Simms featured the **Stamford School** season, in which only two of fourteen games were lost and five won. Simms took 45 wickets at 7.64 runs apiece, and averaged nearly 30 in batting. M. J. K. Smith, who scored 437 runs with an average of 48.55, headed the batting figures.

Although Stonyhurst College won but once against four defeats in thirteen games, their side was the best for some time. With several bowlers of pace available, they were unlucky in playing on slow wickets, but C. E. Shepherd, flighting the ball well to a good length, enjoyed deserved success. P. A. Kelly, the captain, batted soundly, and J. G. Hurst hit hard.

The Stowe School eleven developed steadily, and exceeded anticipations by winning seven matches. Much credit was due to the excellent leadership of M. E. J. Fitzgerald, who, however, batted disappointingly. J. F. Conington, a left-hander, and D. E. Conington made most runs, but much of the side's success was due to consistent bowling by M. D. Cobham and D. A. Connell. High-class fielding and good catching were pleasing features of the cricket.

Early season experience against strong club sides stood Taunton School in good stead. They won three of the school matches, drew three, and lost only to Canford. The opening pair, V. J. Lawrence, the captain, and L. K. Lewis, did best among the batsmen, with J. D. Hughes, medium-pace, and P. R. Best, slow left-arm, the most successful bowlers. The side fielded most efficiently.

The Tonbridge School eleven, despite good wins over Christ's Hospital and Lancing, disappointed mainly because the batsmen, with the exception of A. J. Turk, D. S. Kemp and M. C. Cowdrey, did not watch the ball long enough. The fielding lacked sparkle, but the bowling was above average, with M. J. Bickmore and Cowdrey the most successful.

Poor batting resulted in Trent College losing five games, with six drawn and four won. The bowling was above average, with S. B. Fielding, fast right-arm, and B. Nicholson, medium-pace spin and swerve, a very good opening pair. The batting broke down badly in early matches and never became consistent, although F. Smit and J. F. Singleton did well at times.

Strong in bowling, but distinctly weak in batting, University College School won four and lost five matches. E. Clarke and B. J. Caston, both medium-paced, took a big proportion of the wickets. J. K. E. Slack, a patient opening batsman, was the only player who could be relied on for runs, others being either overreckless or too cautious.

Successes in school matches provided recompense to Uppingham School for failures in club games. J. R. G. Seward and G. B. Davies, a left-hander, batted attractively, while D. D. Carter, the captain, proved himself a quick scorer. Carter and E. J. Wimperis, the opening bowlers, often did good work, and were well supported by the steady medium-paced bowling of T. A. Hall and C. M. Dennis.

Against particularly keen out-cricket by Wellingborough School, ably captained by J. B. Riley, only one opposing team scored over 150 runs. Six matches were won, one tied, two drawn and four lost. Two left-arm bowlers, R. K. Stoner and E. J. Belton, aided by catching of high standard, took most wickets. Although liable to be upset by spin bowling, much of the batting was sound, Riley, Belton, T. B. Lee and H. M. Denton playing some splendid innings.

Wellington College were very strong in batting, possessing in P. A. S. Wollocombe and M. I. Webb-Bowen two players capable of big scores and showing concentration rare in schoolboy cricketers. T. M. Patterson also batted soundly, and M. A. Bardsley, an admirable captain, developed during the season. P. R. Ingram-Johnson and I. T. S. Evers bowled accurately, but the side lacked a bowler of pace.

Uncertain catching and a dearth of slow bowlers contributed to the poor record of Westminster School, who won one of ten games. G. Ll. Law, a good captain, improved as a left-handed batsman, but his bowling fell away. S. L. H. Clarke and D. J. P. Wade, two useful medium-pace bowlers, suffered from lack of support in the field.

Illness prevented Winchester College from fulfilling the first post-war two-days fixture with Eton. Nevertheless the eleven, competently led by A. O. Goddard, developed into an evenly

balanced team, and other school matches provided keen and close cricket. Goddard took most wickets and also played sound innings when the opening batsmen failed. D. R. Childs displayed defensive powers; J. D. F. M. Thornton and I. P. E. Gay were other resolute batsmen. Successful bowlers were D. R. Peppiatt. who did well against early batsmen, and P. M. Welsh, who flighted leg-breaks ably.

P. J. Whitcombe, captain of Worcester Royal Grammar School, welded an ordinary side into a quite formidable one. His batting, which gained an average of nearly 53, and wicket-keeping were both excellent, and he played in representative games at Lord's. R. Baylis and J. Pritchard (left-arm) did most bowling with much success.

Successful in-swing bowling by P. C. A. Garbutt, the captain, was the feature of the Worksop College season. He took 55 wickets at just over 9 runs each. Unfortunately, the batting was rather weak and the fielding unsatisfactory. W. H. Gibson, a left-hander, and C. M. Wilson did best in batting.

Undefeated in school matches, Wrekin College altogether won eight games, drew four and lost four. J. A. Tobin batted splendidly, scoring 812 runs for an average of 67.66 and earning selection for the two representative games at Lord's. G. F. Salt, a captain of good judgment, enjoyed all-round success, particularly in bowling, taking 52 wickets for 10 runs each. J. B. Nichols and J. W. Braithwaite were other capable batsmen, and D. R. G. Baker and M. J. Rowe bowled well.

The bowling of Wyggeston Grammar School, Leicester, reached a high level, only two teams making over 100 against it. Yet the side's batting, despite the presence of five left-handers, was so weak that five games were lost against four won, with three drawn. J. B. Ashton, the captain, a left-handed all-rounder, headed both batting and bowling averages.

SCOTTISH SCHOOLS

The all-round skill and keen captaincy of I. A. H. Syme helped greatly to a big improvement in the Edinburgh Academy cricket. The side was strongest in the field, where Syme's bowling was ably assisted by two left-handers, J. M. Allan and M. Magnusson. Syme remained captain for 1948, for which season G. L. Willatt, former Cambridge University captain, was to be coach.

Lack of coaching during the war years made itself felt at Fettes College. Two out of six school matches were won. The

batting lacked confidence, and the bowlers could not take advantage of prevailing slow wickets. A. T. H. Ferguson, although unorthodox, headed the batting list and kept wicket capably. The captain, R. J. C. Mallinson, did well as an all-rounder, with I. A. S. Biggart a successful opening bowler.

With only four 1946 players available, Loretto School made splendid progress under the able leadership of J. C. Oscroft, and maintained an unbeaten record in school games. Oscroft and A. C. Barr did best of a set of batsmen who lacked consistency and scoring strokes. The bowling reached a good standard, H. F. Neilson, medium-fast left-arm, showing determination, accuracy and hostility in taking 74 wickets for 5.64 runs apiece.

For the second consecutive year, Merchiston Castle School were unbeaten in school games. N. G. R. Maii, the captain, a left-hander, and J. T. Nisbet did not prove such able run-getters as in 1946, but others did well, particularly J. E. Aitchison and J. K. Mearns. A. J. Simpson, medium-pace, and I. G. Forman, medium-fast left-arm, were the pick of the bowlers.

The Trinity College, Glenalmond, eleven should have done much better than it did, especially in school matches. C. E. McIntyre, the captain, played some determined innings and received good support from D. M. Thomson, but other batsmen were uncertain. Sometimes erratic, the bowling was well varied, with R. M. Russell, slow-medium, and I. C. Burnett, medium, both able to produce a dangerous ball.

Two players dominated the cricket of George Watson's College, who won six matches, lost six, and drew two. J. W. Everett averaged 48 for 432 runs, and W. M. Ross took 43 wickets for 6.27 runs each. J. F. Cowan, the captain, proved a useful all-rounder, and G. L. Walker bowled well.
