

THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN 1949

There was a distinct lightening in 1949 of the gloom which has enveloped Public School cricket ever more darkly in recent seasons. It is a fair surmise that we touched bottom in 1948 and that the patient is now on the mend. There is, however, still no justification for complacency. Much of the play was still unworthy, and what I have written in past seasons about out-moded, stereotyped coaching remains obviously applicable in places. Yet the signs were decidedly more encouraging that a recovery is on the way. It is to be hoped that none will be satisfied with recovery to the pre-war level, but will strive for something higher. Considering the opportunities for learning cricket at the Public Schools, the pre-war standard was not really as good as it could have been.

The most noticeable change in School cricket in 1949 was the improved spirit in which it was played by some individuals and some of the teams. The previous year a spineless, defensive attitude towards the game was all too general. Now a spirit of aggression was to be noted. Most of those who played in the representative matches tackled the game as though they had ideas about winning, whereas many of their predecessors gave the impression that they entered a game vaguely hoping to avoid being

beaten too badly.

Moreover, there was certainly one really good School side among several whose standard was better than in the previous season. Marlborough, who had been quite inept in 1948, were that team. The transformation was remarkable, and J. R. Thompson has every reason to consider his second summer as cricket master an unqualified success. He and the coach guided them to a peak for their match at Lord's. It was not so much that Marlborough had exceptional players, though P. F. Worlidge, the captain, was an obviously accomplished batsman deservedly successful, J. A. Tyzack was effective with his robust methods, and J. M. C. Coates, a very promising stumper, personified the new spirit by his energy and zest at the wicket. The true merit of the side rather lay in their team work. Here was a well-led XI working solidly together. They were keen, well drilled and purposeful.

I have so often watched School sides in which the coaching emphasis has obviously been almost exclusively on those things which can be taught in a net that it was most refreshing to see this Marlborough XI. They had been taught more widely about the arts of cricket. They did not have fielders stationed where they were virtually useless or where they were liable to impede each other. They were, indeed, well placed, and their team work

was shown by the manner in which they covered each other. Particularly pleasing also was their sane and purposeful running between wickets. In fact, as I saw Marlborough at Lord's they were on a comparative skill-for-age basis at least as good as any side I saw during the year.

Earlier Marlborough had been beaten by Winchester and Sherborne, and these two should regard their successes with much satisfaction. Winchester were perhaps the most successful side in inter-School matches, though less effective against club teams. They could be a still greater force in 1950. Among others they were expecting back their two leading batsmen, M. R. Coulman, who was often brilliant, and D. W. R. Bedford, a less spectacular but more dependable player. Sherborne were a strong School side;

and in the north Rossall were specially successful.

Unfortunately Marlborough met no sort of opposition at Lord's. Rugby's cricket is at a very low ebb. Their team had only a sketchy knowledge of the game, and there was no evidence that they were being developed on the right lines. So Marlborough, like the other two Lord's Schools from the West, Clifton and Cheltenham, won with an innings to spare. With their efficient team Clifton made short work of Tonbridge, who consisted of M. C. Cowdrey and little else, and Cheltenham caused Haileybury's resistance after a promising beginning to collapse inexplicably about midway through the first day. The spirit seemed to go out of Haileybury, who proceeded to contribute to their own downfall by timid play. Cheltenham themselves were another excellent side, for Jim Hammond, formerly of Sussex, continued the splendid work he began the previous year in his first season as the School coach.

These three hollow victories followed the Eton and Harrow match, which was more sternly contested, but in which the standard of play was still lower than is expected from these two schools. So there were no really good two-day inter-School matches at Lord's in 1949. The one-day game between Beaumont and Oratory, in which the cricket is not expected to be so high, was the most enthralling struggle. It ended in a win for Beaumont by one run when the last Oratory batsman refused a safe single called by his younger brother, who was run out as a result, and Beaumont won in school-story-book fashion. Nevertheless, if the two-day games disappointed, they were more satisfying than those of the previous year. They indicated that Public School cricket was improving, and the final matches between picked sides strengthened this impression.

There was no doubt that the representative team was altogether better than the one overwhelmed by the Combined Services the previous year. It is true the Services new side was much younger and less experienced. On paper it was clearly not so powerful, but it is questionable if it was appreciably less efficient on the

field. Whatever the merits of the opposition, the change in the spirit in which the boys tackled the game was obvious. It was clear, too, that among the twenty-two who played in the Southern Schools v. The Rest match a considerably higher proportion had been trained intelligently.

The selectors went further afield than usual for their players. I personally cannot recall Brentwood, Alleyn's, Pangbourne or Llandovery being represented before. They were in 1949, and the cricket of their players will surely encourage the selectors to search as widely in future years. Two of the four, C. J. Griffiths of Brentwood and M. J. Stewart of Alleyn's, played so well that they easily

won selection for the representative eleven.

Griffiths, an excellent attacking batsman, was perhaps a trifle faulty in some technical respects, but he had the great merit of recognising the ball which could be hit and then of clouting it emphatically. He was certainly among the three or four leading School batsmen of the year, and he was also a useful medium-paced bowler. Stewart was a quieter player, a neat batsman who yet suffered from a stance at the wicket which largely cut out legside play. No batsman when turned so much towards the off can swing himself round quickly enough to the ball on the leg. A good off-break bowler may eventually persuade Stewart to change to a more natural position. He was not fully tested by such a bowler at Lord's, and his sound off-side play brought him success in both matches, and his fielding at cover was very good.

The Pangbourne representative, I. St. G. Lindsay, was not successful as an opening bowler, but his action was as good as that of anyone in the Trial and he looked as if he ought to be taking wickets. The fourth, P. M. Davies of Llandovery, which is more famed for Rugger than for cricket, batted long enough in each innings to show that he possessed good-looking strokes. Unfortunately, he frequently elected to use the wrong stroke. Had his judgment been sounder he might have shown us something

well worth watching.

Clearly the best cricketer in the Trial game was Cowdrey. He was an infant prodigy when he first forced his way into the Tonbridge side in 1946; avoiding the fate of so many prodigies, he developed into a really good School cricketer, showing himself at Lord's to be a punishing batsman with strong strokes in most directions, and almost certainly the best leg-break bowler turned out by the Public Schools since the war. It was remarkable that he was still in such splendid form after spending the long summer term carrying an otherwise uncommonly weak Tonbridge team. In the match against Combined Services, when he bowled with great effect, his batting thunder was stolen by J. H. V. Dicks of Haileybury; but I should most certainly rate Cowdrey as the best School batsman of the year.

Dicks, too, was a player aware that the scoring of runs is the batsman's first consideration. Like Stewart, he was inclined to adopt a stance which militated against leg-side play, but within the compass of his footwork he was an excellent, robust stroke player. His partnership of 150 with A. Kamm of Charterhouse, a stand which pulled the Schools out of trouble and produced a substantial first innings lead over Combined Services, was a very good performance; they tackled their task with fine spirit and gave

the opposing bowlers a solid beating.

Kamm is obviously a fighter. On this occasion he did not appear in the least worried by early troubles. He accepted escapes almost in the nonchalant manner of Herbert Sutcliffe and pushed on regardless. As a School wicketkeeper he was first rate. His work throughout the two games was a distance ahead of the standard of either wicket-keeper in the University match last summer. The other Trial stumper, T. R. Summers of Shrewsbury, was distinctly useful, though he handicapped himself by standing far outside the off stump, where he was a "bus ride" away from the leg-side ball. So there is to be found in the Public Schools hope that University wicket-keeping, which generally has been surprisingly bad since the war, will shortly improve.

There were other useful batsmen in the Schools. M. H. Bushby of Dulwich, who captained the representative team, missed success at Lord's, but did enough to show that he had developed well since he first played in these matches the previous year. Then he was sound defensively but had very little scoring power. Now he had strokes. His opening partner was D. R. W. Silk (Christ's Hospital). Here was certainly a resolute fellow, one whose aim was to dig in and stay dug in. He watched the ball closely from an ugly open stance, from which he prodded with remarkable patience. His defence was valuable on this occasion, but if he aims to go further in the game he must give a thought to the development of strokes.

There are few openings for the stonewaller to-day.

Some of the other all-rounders, including H. W. Joynt, who had a great season for Bradfield, and J. M. Fry of Bedford, also batted in promising style. One disappointment was J. F. Tucker, who had hit an exhilarating century by batting free from restraint and inhibitions, for Cheltenham against Haileybury the previous year. He again scored well for his School, but at Lord's he was not now so sure of his ability to take liberties and yet seemed to feel that that sort of thing was expected of him. He appeared to be at the cross-roads, uncertain whether to continue as a gay adventurer or whether to move closer to orthodoxy. It is to be hoped that he will not move so far as to forget the advantages which good wrists and a fine sense of timing give him.

The bowling of the chosen boys was altogether more encouraging than in 1948. Cowdrey, Lindsay and Griffiths have been

mentioned. Then there was R. G. Marlar of Harrow, an off-break bowler who genuinely spun the ball. There were distinct possibilities about him, though as yet he was somewhat stereotyped, his flight flat and unvaried so as to leave the batsman in no doubt about where the ball was landing. As might have been expected, his spin, allied to accuracy, gave him success against the boys in the Trial game, but the sameness of his attack prevented him from being much of a danger to the more experienced Services batsmen. He should have learned much from the contrasting experience of these two matches. The other main off-spinner tried, D. C. P. R. Jowett of Sherborne, gave the ball air but lacked Marlar's life. Like so many School off-spin bowlers, Jowett seemed rather sluggish off the pitch; but there was definite promise in his bowling.

From the numerous seam bowlers, M. G. C. Jeffreys (Eton) and the all-rounder, Joynt, finally emerged as the openers against the Services, though R. D. Bailey of Repton was a first choice until injury put him out of the team. Bailey was really fast for a boy—remarkably so, considering his action. Here was a boy with natural ability for pace bowling above the average but developing quite wrongly, which may partly account for his breakdown. When he reached the bowling position his weight was already so far forward, his body inclined towards the batsman, that he obtained no help from body swing, which is the essential part of a good bowler's make-up. His pace came from the momentum gathered during his dash to the wicket and from his arm. Yet that pace was considerable, and he looked like a bowler of whom much could be made with proper coaching.

Jeffreys was an energetic, hard-working pace bowler who played in the Trial because his fellow Etonian, I. R. Lomax, was injured, and when Bailey dropped out he made his way into the final team. Without appearing more than a solid workman, he pulled his weight in both matches, but it would have been interesting to see the faster, if wilder, Lomax on the opposite Trial side to

Bailey.

Of the others, the style of M. D. Cobham, a boy from Stowe standing some six and a half feet high, impressed me most. He had a good out-swinger's action, but his delivery was somewhat languid, as though he had to move his immensely long legs and arms in slow, measured time to keep the machine in gear. With more fire he could be a really good bowler. At medium pace he took only one Southern Schools wicket and yet probably beat the bat more often than did anyone. His opponents frequently sparred at and missed his away swingers outside the off stump. A few more balls directed at the stumps would surely have brought him more reward.

Curiously, the best opening bowler I saw was D. M. Richards (Cheltenham), who did not figure in the Trial game. His method

was admirable, and his record of 37 wickets at 12.36 each for one of the leading cricket schools speaks for itself. He was unlucky not to be singled out, but in Tucker Cheltenham already had one representative. Selection on figures, reports and hearsay, on which these Schools selectors necessarily have to rely, is certainly unpleasant and difficult. No criticism of their work is intended here.

I would say one thing about the Southern Schools v. The Rest match, which I imagine others besides myself find unsatisfactory. There can be no competitive interest in a game for which the sides are chosen from Schools divided by what in more agreeable travelling days was the main line of the Great Western Railway Of those who play in or watch the game, who could follow that line on a map with any degree of accuracy, a line which splits every town through which it passes? With all its faults, the former Lord's Schools v. The Rest was cut-and-dried and offered some point of interest. The present match must be solely an exhibition of personal skill by twenty-two boys, with the onus put on the two captains to divide the opportunities as equitably as possible A preliminary try-out before the representative match is necessary. but I suggest such an engagement in its present form does not rightly belong at Lord's. Could it not be staged elsewhere, and could not the Schools then play two matches instead of one against outside opposition at Lord's, if it is thought desirable to compensate for the loss of the days now devoted to the Trial? That would surely be more satisfying.

So, there is the general picture of Public School cricket in 1949. It is a fair hope that we shall be able to look back on it as the year in which the decline was checked and the recovery started. Judging by the number of very young boys who distinguished themselves the prospects for the succeeding season were good indeed.

In addition to young Coulman, Winchester had a 15-year-old wicket-keeper, M. D. Scott, and boys of similar age were prominent in other major cricket schools. There was A. C. D. Ingleby-Mackenzie leading the Eton batsmen and M. S. Meeson heading the Bedford batting averages. Then Cheltenham had a likely medium-paced bowler, P. H. Blackburn, who contributed materially to their inning's victory at Lord's. While much spade work remains to be done in some schools, the signs generally pointed to better times ahead for numerous others.

THE SCHOOLS

(Scottish Schools will be found at the end of this section.)

Aldenham School participated in several exciting finishes during a reasonably successful summer which brought four victories and six draws from thirteen matches. A. S. Heywood-Jones, in his second season as captain, handled the side capably and was again the most hostile bowler. The eleven was rich in players of allround ability, J. R. Heron, R. H. M. Arkell and R. M. S. Gardiner all doing well with bat and ball. Besides heading the batting list, T. J. Law kept wicket admirably. He leads the team, which will include six old colours, in 1950.

Chief credit for the success of Alleyn's School went to the captain, M. J. Stewart, who welded the team into a powerful combination. Stewart, revealing batting skill beyond his years, earned a place in the Schools side at Lord's. Although pitches generally favoured batsmen, J. F. Pretlove gained remarkable figures with slow left-arm bowling admirably supported in the field.

Not since 1939 did Allhallows School field such a well-balanced and effective team as that which won nine and drew four of its sixteen games last summer. M. Ray-Hills handled the side competently and, although occasionally rash, his batting was consistent. W. T. M. Luff, G. T. R. Pitts-Tucker and K. G. Hutchings all showed a pleasing tendency to attack the bowling. Although lacking a left-hander, the bowling proved too strong for most opposition. S. J. Harvey, K. F. Keightley, R. Taylor and Luff shared the wickets.

The Ampleforth College eleven developed into one of the strongest and most attractive for many years. Clearly the most talented all-rounder, J. F. Murphy, impressed particularly as a batsman, hitting two centuries. M. J. Tate, who once reached three figures, gave splendid support in both departments, and J. A. Dick batted confidently. P. A. Mitchell also did grand work in an attack so effective that no school opponents totalled 100.

The remarkable decline of the captain, M. B. Sheridan, placed an unexpected burden on the shoulders of the later Beaumont College batsmen. The responsibility frequently proved too great for players of little experience and the team's record was unimpressive, although the last match of the season brought a thrilling victory by one run over Oratory at Lord's. Sheridan failed to reproduce the form he showed in 1948, when he scored over 600 runs, and his average fell below 10. P. A. Dingli showed considerable improvement in batting and A. B. Wallerstein, a newcomer, bowled particularly well.

Undefeated in school matches, Bedford School owed much to accurate fast bowling and hard hitting by the captain, J. W. Fry. Fry's experience and the all-round ability of J. A. Spooner encouraged several excellent performances by younger members of the side. Prominent among these were M. S. Meeson, an attractive and consistent batsman, and M. H. J. Allen, who flighted his left-arm slows cleverly. Six of the side will be available in 1950.

The expectation of another highly successful season at Bedford Modern School was upset by the failure of the two leading batsmen, R. E. G. Jeeps and the captain, P. G. Miller, to reproduce their 1948 form. Jeeps, whose average fell from over 100 to 17, was specially disappointing. Fortunately the bowlers, notably K. Tait (fast) and P. F. W. Wright (medium off-break), rose to the occasion, and the final record was four wins, three losses and two draws.

But for lack of time, Berkhamsted School probably would have doubled their number of victories. As it was, their record of two wins, six losses and four draws made unimpressive reading. At best the batting looked steady and the bowlers rarely seemed capable of forcing a win. J. M. V. Turner kept a length and D. F. Brown turned the ball from the off, but the attack possessed little "bite."

With a young side, Bishop's Stortford College won two and lost five of twelve fixtures. Impetuous batting more than once brought defeat. R. H. Stearn, the captain, proved the chief source of danger in attack, and his "rustic" methods with the bat often checked a collapse.

Bloxham School won all their inter-school matches, but against club sides the middle batsmen failed frequently to consolidate a useful start. The record for all matches was six wins, three defeats and one draw. Although sometimes rash, J. W. Barton played many delightfully aggressive innings. P. C. Jones and R. F. de Lattre were dependable openers, and the wicket-keeper, T. H. Civil, stiffened the tail. Barton, the most successful bowler, handled his attack intelligently. R. Law, slow left-arm, bowled very steadily, but was not available regularly.

Led by a useful all-rounder in M. C. P. Tatton-Tatton, Blundell's School played attractive cricket, although the results were only moderate. Three games were won, four drawn, seven lost and one ended in a tie. T. R. Newell Price, who headed the batting figures, improved considerably as the summer progressed and played a prominent role in each of the victories. Apart from Tatton-Tatton, the leading bowler was J. M. Bedford (slow left-arm), who bowled a capital length. A. D. W. MacLean kept wicket admirably.

The young Bradfield College team enjoyed a satisfactory season under the able captaincy of H. W. Joynt, an all-rounder of merit whose hard hitting earned him a place in the Schools eleven at Lord's. Other accomplished batsmen were M. E. Taylor, C. J. Lee, D. J. Kerr and J. L. Quarrington. R. D. Butters did not quite maintain his impressive early form with the ball and the bowling lacked variety until Joynt bowled regularly. Lee fielded brilliantly near the wicket.

Thanks mainly to splendid bowling by R. S. Priestley and J. V. Nettleton, Bradford Grammar School enjoyed a moderately successful season, with four wins, four defeats and five draws. A. M. King proved the most accomplished batsman, and useful support came from G. A. Yewdall and G. W. Moore.

Once again C. Griffiths proved the mainstay of the Brentwood School eleven, which won four matches, lost seven and drew five. Although occasionally impetuous, Griffiths was the most talented cricketer in the side, and amply justified his selection for the Schools at Lord's. He played also for Essex II. Apart from Griffiths, who goes up to Cambridge, the batting was uncertain, although W. T. Green hit a fine hundred. Best support for Griffiths in attack came from R. G. Sharpe, who beat the bat more often than his figures suggest.

After losing two early matches, **Brighton** College exceeded all but the most sanguine expectations and remained unbeaten in the last six fixtures. This was due mostly to the greatly improved form of the batsmen, especially A. B. D. Parsons, who, though still a Colt, scored nearly 600 runs for an average of over 50. P. Kemp and the captain, J. A. Ince, enjoyed consistent all-round success, and two newcomers, L. C. Cole and J. S. Gibson, did creditably. Six of the team, including Ince, stayed on for 1950.

Another encouraging season at Bromsgrove School was featured by the good work of the captain, J. D. Link, in moulding the side into a happy and effective combination. Coached by C. H. Palmer, the Worcestershire batsman, the team concentrated upon improving their fielding, with the result that accurate bowling often looked formidable. Link was again the mainstay of the attack and T. N. Mitchell and J. Faull, two young batsmen, showed much promise. Five schools were beaten, but four of the five club matches ended in draws.

The Bryanston School team developed rapidly. C. G. Scholes kept wicket competently and, after early failures, proved the most consistent batsman. The captain, M. C. Geddes, batted well at times and his slow leg-break bowling helped to form a well-varied

attack with T. G. Sankey (fast-medium), and A. C. Rawson (medium pace), who but for occasional fielding lapses would have enjoyed more success.

Canford School cricket was undistinguished, although the eleven contained several promising players. P. W. Littman batted well against clubs, but did little in school matches, and not until late in the season was a sound opening pair found in P. B. C. Emby and G. A. Milnes, also the most successful bowlers.

With a well-balanced team, Caterham School won six of their nine inter-school matches. The strength of the eleven lay in the usefulness of every member. A. P. Hodgson did not enjoy marked success as an all-rounder, but his leadership inspired a high standard in the field. D. B. Campbell and T. R. Blackwood formed a lively opening attack and J. Alderson gained some remarkable figures. Hodgson and N. C. J. Austing were the pick of the batsmen.

Despite the inclusion of five old colours, Charterhouse School fell below expectations. Uncertain batting was partly responsible, but the side's chief need was for a spin bowler. P. J. H. Lowe, who came into the side in this capacity, proved more useful with the bat. C. E. Holt, another newcomer, did very well on occasion, otherwise the bowling lacked venom. The cares of captaincy affected A. Kamm's wicket-keeping, although his batting frequently proved valuable. J. W. H. May leads the eleven in 1950.

Cheltenham College, after drawing the first three school matches, improved during the season and won the remaining three. Their record in all matches was less impressive, with three wins, five draws and four defeats. J. F. Tucker, again in good form with the bat, hit the loose ball hard, but R. T. Procter, the captain, did not score as freely as expected. Unbalanced at first, the bowling developed into a hostile and well-varied combination. D. M. Richards formed the mainstay, and good work came from two other medium-paced bowlers, the brothers J. M. and P. H. Blackburn. Procter's fielding, especially in the Lord's match, was magnificent.

Christ's Hospital owed much to the excellent form of the captain, D. R. W. Silk, for their good record of eight wins and two losses in eleven games. A sound and graceful opening bat and a slow leg-break bowler of great potentiality, Silk represented the Schools against the Services at Lord's. A. Joanes scored freely when set, and D. Christensen lent solidity to the batting. Apart from Silk, the best bowler was W. H. Stevens, a much-improved medium-paced opener, who varied his swerve intelligently. Including Silk, seven players remain for 1950.

Strong in bowling, City of London School played attractive cricket after a discouraging start. An intelligent leader, M. W. Spruzen shared the bowling honours with B. W. Cridland. The batting, although steadier than it looked the previous summer, lacked confidence. More victories than five might have been recorded but for slipshod fielding. Three matches were drawn and five lost.

In five inter-school matches, Clifton College gained convincing wins over Tonbridge and Sherborne, drew with Rugby and Marlborough, and lost to Cheltenham. This satisfactory record reflected much credit upon the slow off-spin bowler, J. D. C. Rees, whose consistency compensated for the limitations of the batsmen. R. V. Turner and the captain, D. B. Bird, possessed ability as run-getters, but frequently assisted in their own downfall by making half-hearted strokes. J. Turner, a medium-paced opening howler, improved steadily.

Cranbrook School did well against other schools, winning four of the five matches by decisive margins. The most successful batsmen were B. B. Moore, a steady opener, and R. T. Nye. With well-flighted off-breaks J. M. Cochrane, who captained the side admirably, took over 40 wickets for the third successive summer. He was well supported by B. H. Wardle, fast but often erratic, and A. R. C. Galpin, medium-pace.

Apart from the excellent batting of D. J. Lister, Cranleigh School cricket was undistinguished. Lister, who seldom failed in school matches, received useful support from R. H. Bowman and N. A. Paul, but their combined efforts were rarely sufficient to compensate for weakness in attack. Two games were won, five lost, and six drawn.

Strong in batting, Denstone College proved more than a match for most of their opponents. Wrekin, Stonyhurst, Trent and Worksop were among the sides defeated. J. Oliver led the eleven capably and showed remarkable improvement as a batsman. He hit a fine century against Stonyhurst as well as playing several other polished innings. The slow bowlers, W. G. Tobias (left-arm) and D. E. Cook, performed well, and S. D. Hignell fielded splendidly.

Forced to build a new team around the only remaining colour, E. H. Morris, Dover College failed to win any of their ten matches and lost seven. Several promising young players were discovered, the most prominent being M. H. W. Jones, a useful batsman and talented bowler.

Good medium-pace bowling by M. F. Daly, supported by keen work in the field, amply compensated for the indeterminate batting of **Downside School**, who won six of their ten fixtures. Daly swung the ball appreciably from leg and commanded continual respect. His captaincy also proved a valuable asset. Another medium-paced bowler, J. A. Dearlove, gave useful support. E. A. McGuire developed into a consistent free-scoring batsman, but K. Wylie suffered through impatience. Daly went up to Cambridge

The need for a sound opening pair was apparent at Dulwich College, where a nucleus of six old colours failed to ensure a successful season. Six of the fourteen fixtures ended in defeat and only three matches were won. M. H. Bushby, who led the Schools at Lord's, batted consistently, but the frequent depressing starts affected his colleagues, notably P. Pearson, who was seldom able to follow his aggressive instincts. Pearson and J. L. Ames did most bowling, and there was room in the side for a capable legbreak bowler.

With only two of the successful 1948 team available, Durham School were forced mainly to rely on young and inexperienced players. It was not surprising that results were unimpressive, although the cricket improved steadily as the summer progressed. The early batsmen, best of whom were T. Bourn and D. I. Mort, were reliable, but their colleagues lacked confidence. J. M. Rans, with off-breaks, was the steadiest bowler.

The Eastbourne College team was the strongest since the war, particularly in batting. Although six of the fourteen games were lost and four won, the side played attractive cricket and two of the drawn matches might have ended in victory. The captain, R. T. V. Brown, improved considerably as a batsman, and others who scored freely were A. S. Myrtle, A. E. W. Gooding, A. G. Fisher and C. J. G. Harding. Brown's medium-paced bowling was less effective than in 1948, but P. F. Morgan again did well.

Results at Eltham College were the most encouraging for many seasons, for of the eleven matches played, six were won and two drawn. The chief credit is due to the bowlers, P. D. Bairstow and H. R. Thomas, who were rarely mastered. The batting, although not brilliant, was enterprising and generally dependable, B. J. McSweeney, the captain, being the most consistent.

Epsom College experienced a remarkable change of fortune. With roughly the same team which failed to win a match in 1948, the eleven in 1949 won every inter-school fixture. This success was achieved despite the falling-off of the captain, P. Bunday, as a run-getter, and D. A. G. Eadie as a bowler. The batting was

again strong, P. Adlington, a hard-hitting left-hander, J. S. Hall and Eadie being especially prominent. Hall and J. R. A. Dickey, a promising swing bowler, formed the spearhead of a muchimproved attack.

Eton College met with varied success. Although at their best in defeating Harrow, Wellington and Free Foresters, the eleven nevertheless fared dismally against Charterhouse and Marlborough. The batting, often pleasingly aggressive, lacked steadiness until A. C. D. Ingleby-Mackenzie, a young left-hander, ran into form. I. R. Lomax, a grand stroke-player, D. H. Clegg, M. D. M. Sellar and R. S. Napier played valuable innings. The bowling was stronger than in recent years. J. S. Guthrie's slow off-breaks provided an effective contrast to the pace attack of Lomax, M. G. C. Jeffreys and A. S. Aird. J. A. Bailey captained the team well, and when he was away through injury Guthrie capably led the side. A useful nucleus of old colours remained for 1950.

Possessing a hostile and accurate opening attack, Framlingham College enjoyed their best summer for many years, gaining eleven wins and a draw from fifteen matches. G. A. Warner, who was equally effective as a fast-medium or off-spin bowler, and C. M. M. Ford frequently bowled unchanged despite the variety of the change bowlers. D. A. Walton, the captain, was easily the best of a useful batting side and he set a splendid example in the field.

Contrary to expectations, Giggleswick School results were the best for many years, a largely inexperienced eleven winning six and drawing one of their ten matches. Credit for this improvement was shared equally between the captain, J. R. Jameson, and M. S. Davidson. Besides revealing powers of leadership, Jameson repeatedly came to the rescue when earlier batsmen failed. Davidson, possessing natural swing, bowled medium-pace at a consistent length and fully earned his impressive figures.

A batsman of distinct promise, J. H. V. Dicks, the Haileybury and I.S.C. captain, played several splendid innings. Especially strong on the off side, Dicks hit a hundred in the Wellington match, and finished the season with a century for the Schools at Lord's. Apart from Dicks, the batsmen were unreliable, and of the twelve games played, two were won and four lost, including an innings defeat by Cheltenham at Lord's. The fielding left much to be desired.

Potentially strong in bowling, the Harrow School eleven nevertheless gained few successes because of the frequent failures of the batsmen. The bowlers, best of whom were R. G. Marlar, R. A. Jacques and M. Kok, were usually handicapped by having

to watch the scoreboard carefully, so modest were the Harrow totals. A. S. Day handled the attack thoughtfully and set a fine example in the field, but as a batsman he disappointed after his success in 1948. To offset this there was the encouraging advance of J. D. Thicknesse, who revealed pleasing style.

Highgate School again did well, suffering only three defeats in fourteen matches. The batting generally was aggressive, the whole-hearted stroke-play of W. Knightley-Smith and the captain, R. D. Owen, both left-handers, being particularly pleasing. W. H. Cooper gave valuable support. Steady rather than incisive, the bowling gave less cause for satisfaction, although handled cleverly by Owen. J. C. Dare (off-breaks) bowled accurately but suffered through dropped catches. Fielding, however, was usually sound. I. E. H. Clifford (fast-medium) and N. Gilpin (slow left-arm) were more fortunate.

Hurstpierpoint College, again stronger in bowling than batting, won all their inter-school matches, and finished with six victories, two draws and four defeats. A resourceful captain, K. R. Jenkin, was the mainstay of the eleven in batting and bowling, although C. L. Carter showed great promise with the ball.

Strong in all departments, King Edward's School, Birmingham, enjoyed a successful summer, with a record of eight victories and one defeat in sixteen matches. P. Hutchings and B. Lobb, the fast-medium bowlers, who frequently ran through the opposition, were largely responsible. F. B. Revill, an intelligent slow bowler, also did well. A. J. Homer, the captain, proved the best of a useful batting side.

Results were moderate at King Edward's School, Stourbridge, three matches being won, three lost and four drawn. F. B. W. Farmer again shouldered most responsibility for run-getting, although G. Marsh developed into a watchful batsman. G. Weston and B. F. Fieldhouse were the pick of a useful set of bowlers.

Again King's College, School Wimbledon, did not fulfil expectations. In all matches the opposition was flattered by overcautious batting, although K. T. W. Ambler, E. G. Springthorpe and D. A. Chamberlin tried hard to instil confidence into their colleagues. The bowling, with K. R. Briggs the mainstay, was steady, but lacked variety.

Despite the exceptional youth of the eleven, King's School, Canterbury, won ten of their seventeen fixtures. Already accomplished stroke-players, R. O. A. Norris, P. J. Walker and B. E. Lee played several attractive innings. J. B. Phillips bowled extremely

well for one so young, taking many wickets with the ball swinging late from the off. Norris and the captain, I. F. Black, performed useful all-round work.

Despite splendid out-cricket, **King's School**, **Ely**, failed to do really well because of the limitations of the batting. Six matches were won, six lost and five drawn. In a splendid attack, four bowlers, B. J. Tunnell, P. Thorpe, M. H. Boorman, the captain, and J. V. Gowler, met with marked success. Of the batsmen, G. B. Tomalin alone fulfilled expectations.

Much credit for the success of **Kingswood School** was due to the captain, K. J. H. Brown, who moulded an inexperienced side into one of the best fielded by the school for many years. Five of the seven inter-school matches were won, and this record might have been improved had not J. P. Jenkins, the leading batsman, left in mid-season. The chief feature of the summer was the remarkable performance of J. G. Smith, the leg-break bowler, in taking 32 wickets at just over five runs apiece. Smith, a vigorous hitter, also did well with the bat.

Possessing no bowlers of more than average ability, Lancing College fared moderately. J. W. Jenkins, an intelligent captain and competent wicket-keeper, proved the best of a sound batting side. R. A. Naylor and M. A. C. Lyon made many attractive strokes and wasted no opportunity to hit hard. N. G. Williams, who was to lead the eleven in 1950, had two old colours available.

Although the young Leeds Grammar School eleven did not develop as rapidly a had been hoped, the record of five victories and five defeats from sixteen matches was satisfactory. With several promising players remaining, the prospects for 1950 were bright. S. G. Metcalfe, T. A. Balmforth and A. D. Booth batted splendidly, and D. B. Hufton, a capable leader, bowled well.

Although the team did not enjoy the success which was awaited in view of the talent available, Leighton Park School, who gained six wins from twelve games, always played keen and attractive cricket. For this they were largely indebted to the inspiring leadership of D. I. Hamilton, who brought the season to a fitting climax by carrying his bat for 106 out of a total of 131 in his last match for the school. This was his second three-figure innings of the summer. D. G. Taylor also made a hundred, and R. W. Sherborne and T. W. Greeves batted well. Hamilton (medium pace) and Sherborne with mixed spins provided the chief danger in attack. They were supported by excellent fielding.

The Leys School won only one match, lost five and drew seven. This disappointing record was due to weak change bowling

and poor middle batting. N. R. Nesbitt, although receiving little support, batted confidently, and I. T. Craig fully earned his impressive bowling figures. I. I. Gaston handled his limited resources intelligently.

The Liverpool College eleven settled down into a useful combination after a mediocre beginning to the season. For runs the side depended mainly upon the captain, R. H. Griffiths and S. D. Cooke. J. W. M. Fitzpatrick, a newcomer, showed real promise. The bowling proved stronger than anticipated, with K. H. Rimmer and C. A. Sowerby doing especially good work.

The inspiring leadership and stylish batting of P. M. Davies was chiefly responsible for Llandovery College winning all their inter-school matches. Davies was selected for the Schools Trial at Lord's. D. A. Rees, slow off-spinners, and H. A. John, left-arm medium-paced, were the best of a well-balanced attack. The fielding was exceptionally keen.

Malvern College showed considerable promise for the future, although results in 1949 were moderate. The example set by the captain, A. A. Gregory, led to a high standard of fielding, but this could not offset the limitations in attack. R. H. Chadder and T. J. F. Herold did well with the bat.

Possessing two splendid fast bowlers in G. H. McKinna and D. Matthews, Manchester Grammar School were too strong for most opposition. Besides his splendid work with the ball, McKinna made several useful scores and led the side capably. His talents were recognised by Cheshire, who included him in their Minor Counties team. J. R. Crossley and J. Y. Holloway were other prominent run-getters.

Stronger all round than in 1948, Marlborough College included an innings defeat of Rugby at Lord's and good victories over Eton and Wellington among their seven wins. Three matches were lost and four drawn. A feature of the batting was the remarkable improvement of the captain, P. F. Worlidge, who failed only twice to reach double figures. J. A. Tyzack showed unexpected skill with the bat, but his bowling underwent a corresponding decline. Worlidge handled capably his well-varied attack, in which C. J. Denham-Davis and J. A. Burnett (leg-breaks) took chief honours. J. M. C. Coates, who leads the eleven in 1950, distinguished himself behind the wicket.

The Merchant Taylors' School record of four wins and two losses would have been more impressive but for lack of time which deprived them of victory in three of the five drawn matches. The

eleven was strong in all departments. P. H. Sims, dismissed only three times during the season, returned an average of over 70, and the captain, J. G. Banwell, and D. B. Ross batted extremely well. Sims and J. G. K. Ingram opened the bowling in hostile fashion, but the best work was done by J. A. Prodger, left-arm slow. The fielding left room for improvement.

Despite the presence of four old colours, Mill Hill School experienced a dismal season, winning only one of their eleven games. Seven ended in defeat. Apart from J. Roberts, a useful all-rounder, the batsmen were unimpressive, but the chief weakness was bowling.

Mount St. Mary's College, with greater all-round strength than in 1948, gained four victories, but were beaten six times. J. Power advanced considerably and became the most consistent batsman, and M. Maxwell showed similar improvement as a bowler. J. Veys, P. Wrigglesworth and P. Humphreys also did well with the ball.

One of the most successful seasons for many years at Newcastle Royal Grammar School was marked by the fine batting of the captain, D. R. Lowther. He revealed a wide range of strokes and with J. S. Hall formed the backbone of the side. P. Stephenson and G. N. Green were the best of an attack which, although steady, lacked variety.

The strongest team fielded by Oakham School for several years won six and drew six of their fifteen fixtures. P. R. Forman improved considerably as a batsman and with P. J. Derry was the pick of a dependable batting side. Forman's bowling was more effective also than in 1948.

Results at Oratory School showed a distinct improvement compared with the disappointing records of the past few seasons. This advance was due mainly to the coaching of the former Warwickshire professional, F. R. Santall. The strength of the eleven, which gained seven victories and three draws from seventeen matches, lay in attack. J. B. Phillips and J. S. Fitzherbert gave little away and fully earned their impressive figures. By comparison, the batting was mediocre, although E. R. Arundell, a young left-hander, showed much promise.

Handicapped by the inability of F. S. Price, their leading batsman, to play in many matches, **Oundle School** could win only twice, whereas their defeats numbered five and draws two. When available, Price rarely failed, and his eight innings during the summer included two hundreds and a 97. Others who batted well

were the captain, J. S. Haines, and C. M. Lowe. A. R. Armitage's medium-paced bowling earned him the admirable figures of eight for 22 against Rugby and seven for 26 against Stowe. D. V. Bell provided chief support with left-arm slows. The side was young and at least seven remained for 1950.

Although strong in bowling, Perse School fared only moderately because of uncertain batting and fielding. R. A. Lovelace and B. Reed (left-arm) formed an effective opening attack and spin was provided by M. C. L. Kay. B. S. Adams, upon whom the main batting responsibility rested, lacked the ability to force the pace.

With a young side, Radley College lost three of their first five matches, then went through the rest of the summer without defeat. A. J. M. Meyrick fully justified his late inclusion by heading the batting, and was seen at his best in an attractive innings against Sherborne. The most polished batsmen, however, were J. R. M. Britten and D. B. Reid, both of whom commanded a wide range of strokes. Apart from his capable leadership, R. M. Sorsbie bowled finely. The fielding rarely fell below a high standard, with P. J. M. Patten, the wicket-keeper, often brilliant.

Forced to build an almost entirely new team, Reading School did well to win six and draw five of their sixteen games. J. C. Rudd was an attractive batsman and K. Cotterell improved steadily. The bowling depended mostly on D. Wilson and G. H. Burleigh.

Despite victories over Rugby and Malvern, Repton School cricket proved disappointing. Once again the weakness lay in batting, for A. C. W. Lewis alone showed the right temperament. Two young batsmen, J. F. M. Walter and J. M. Cropper, gave promise. Finding the pitches better suited to his fast bowling than in 1948, R. D. Bailey took nearly twice as many wickets at less cost. Good support came from the medium-pace bowlers, Lewis and A. R. Lawson. E. Marsh, the former Derbyshire all-rounder, was appointed coach for 1950.

Splendidly led by J. A. Carter, Rossall School produced their strongest eleven for many years. Undefeated in school matches, they overwhelmed St. Bees, Sedbergh and Stonyhurst, besides enjoying the better of draws with Denstone and Shrewsbury. The main strength was batting. Between them J. M. Phillips, K. V. Holmes and G. P. Marsland hit five hundreds, and there were ten other scores of over 50. The bowling of Carter, Marsland and S. L. Watson was rarely mastered.

The Rugby School record of seven losses and one win from fourteen games was a fair reflection on the strength of the eleven.

For a time the batting depended almost entirely upon the captain, D. R. Wright, but J. J. Gardner developed steadily and also passed 400 runs for the season. The catching and throwing were uncertain and keener bowling was needed. O. R. S. Bull lacked much of his fire of recent summers, and T. J. N. Cartwright, left-arm slow, did not spin the ball sufficiently.

The splendid batting of D. Stewart, the captain, marked Rydal School cricket. Stewart, who drove with great power off the back foot, made over 900 runs. He hit three centuries. But for a bad patch in mid-season when four consecutive games ended in defeat, the team proved more than a match for most opposition. A. J. Lord, Stewart's opening partner, revealed a fine range of strokes. Injury to Lord placed an additional burden on J. G. Bailey, leftarm slow, and P. W. Hughes, fast-medium, who responded nobly.

The Sedbergh School record was marred by an occasional inability to recover once the opposition gained ascendancy. A run of early victories was checked by Rossall, but the side returned to form when the batsmen became acclimatised to faster pitches, and a capable M.C.C. XI was defeated through some very quick scoring. W. B. Moralee proved an astute leader and was one of several useful batsmen. The bowling, though less impressive, was adequate.

Results hardly did justice to the ability of the Sevenoaks School team, which was capably led by P. Prodger. The most satisfactory feature was the splendid support given in the field to a persistently hostile attack. I. F. Carmichael bowled particularly well. The batting, although not so reliant on Prodger as in 1948, gave less encouragement.

Possessing an unusual wealth of all-rounders, Sherborne School again developed into a powerful combination under the captaincy of M. W. Pailthorpe. The batting was particularly consistent, four players scoring over 300 runs—F. M. Anderton, D. I. Gillespie, D. M. Turner and W. S. Blackshaw. Turner's fast bowling improved steadily during the summer. He and D. C. P. R. Jowett formed the spearhead of a well-varied attack.

Inspired by the leadership of T. R. Summers, Shrewsbury School recovered so completely from a disastrous beginning—the first four matches were lost—that the remaining ten fixtures brought five victories and five draws. Of the schools encountered, only Rossall looked a stronger combination, but even they failed to force a win after outplaying Shrewsbury on the first innings. Repton, Uppingham and Malvern were decisively beaten. Chief honours went to the batsmen, among whom A. G. Phillips, S. A. Barr and A. W. Morris were consistent. J. H. G. Ducksbury

invariably offered stout resistance in the tail. J. R. V. Woods and P. E. F. Whittome provided the best bowling, and S. H. Barber and Phillips also did well with the ball.

Solihull School went through a moderate season, drawing five of their nine games and winning two. D. W. Thomas enjoyed fair success as an all-rounder. J. I. H. Smith developed into a reliable opening bat, and the captain, B. W. Balls, performed creditably in attack.

Stonyhurst College failed to maintain their undefeated record of 1948, and only three games were won out of fourteen. Eight were lost. Dropped catches and lack of determination among the batsmen were responsible for this decline. Only P. J. Leyden, whose consistently sound though unspectacular batting brought him an average of over 70, showed proper appreciation of the ball to hit. B. M. Rooney, of whom much was expected as a fast bowler, seldom found a length, but M. K. Courtney gave promise with the ball.

Although seven members of the successful 1948 team were available, Stowe School did not do as well as expected. Lack of consistency among the batsmen, despite some fine innings by the brothers J. F. and D. E. Conington, accounted largely for the fact that more matches were lost than won. M. D. Cobham, whose slow to medium in-swingers earned him a place in the Schools match at Lord's, bowled consistently.

St. Alban's School enjoyed considerable success in inter-school matches, thanks to the accurate medium-pace attack of the captain, D. J. George, and H. A. F. Malden. By way of contrast, the batting was most unreliable. Only M. G. Smith, a vigorous left-hander, commanded sufficient strokes to score consistently.

Few players distinguished themselves for St. Bees School, who went through a moderate season, winning five and losing six of their twelve matches. The side depended chiefly upon J. J. Whitehead for runs, and D. G. Holliday was the mainstay of the attack.

St. Dunstan's College batsmen were unenterprising and, despite the usual excellence of the out-cricket, the team failed to maintain the high standard set the previous summer. The captain, D. P. Thomas, batted soundly, and did fine work also with the ball. J. A. Pierce again puzzled most schoolboy rivals with his left-arm spin bowling, but R. J. Edwards met with less success.

The young St. Edward's School, Oxford, team gained exciting wins over Bradfield, Bromsgrove, Eastbourne and Radley in their encouraging record of four victories, three defeats and eight draws.

Although still unreliable, the batting was better than in 1948, and the captain, D. B. T. Lattey, played some valuable and attractive innings. R. Lock, left-arm slow, kept a steady length for long spells.

The all-round ability of the captain, C. J. Godfrey, was the feature of St. Paul's School cricket. He showed himself also to be an intelligent and resourceful leader. Apart from J. Krieger and D. Many, the other batsmen generally lacked confidence. Although hampered by muscle trouble, N. B. W. Widlake was an effective fast-medium bowler. He received grand support from two spin bowlers, A. M. Dougall (left-arm) and R. O. C. Norman (right-arm off-breaks). Godfrey and Widlake go to Cambridge.

Despite the inclusion of seven old colours, St. Peter's, York, suffered from uncertain batting, and only three games were won compared with six defeats. P. T. Baker filled the treble role of captain, wicket-keeper and leading batsman with distinction, but lack of confidence with the bat was evident among his colleagues. The out-cricket showed great improvement. D. Walter again headed the bowling. Much of his burden as stock bowler was eased by the advance of A. M. Kendell and P. J. Dennis.

Sutton Valence School met with varied fortune and finished with the satisfactory record of six wins, six losses and three draws. The side was strong in bowling, although the qualities of speed, swing and spin were not always allied to length. A. F. Tipples, an astute captain, scored freely, but the batting suffered from the lack of a steady opening pair.

With a well-balanced side, Taunton School improved upon their previous season's record by winning six and drawing five of their fifteen matches. The most useful player was J. Baker, a Colt, who batted attractively and proved a resourceful bowler. Making the majority of his runs through powerful driving off either foot, D. Hazell earned the best batting figures, and the captain, D. Suter, did well also. D. Brighton shared the bowling honours with Baker.

Playing his fourth year in the Tonbridge School eleven, M. C. Cowdrey overshadowed his colleagues and began to justify the hopes of those who saw him as a 13-year-old at Lord's. The success or failure of the side depended almost entirely upon his efforts. In such circumstances an unimpressive record was inevitable, but Cowdrey responded so well that five matches were won out of fifteen. The remainder were lost. As a batsman, Cowdrey reached three figures four times, and his leg-break bowling earned him more than three times as many wickets as any two

other members of the side. Apart from Cowdrey, who leads the side again in 1950, the most satisfactory feature was the enthusiasm shown by all in the field.

Trent College were seriously handicapped by an injury to their leading bowler, B. Nicholson, who was unable to play during the latter part of the season. That accounted largely for the side's unimposing record of three wins, four draws and six defeats. The batting honours again went to the captain, F. Smit, who played two entertaining three-figure innings. N. Armstrong scored freely at times and A. P. Hutton did valiant work during Nicholson's absence.

With two old colours available, neither of them bowlers, Uppingham School tackled the difficult task of team-building with reasonable success. Faulty at first, the fielding became steadier. J. E. K. Goodbody more than fulfilled early promise as a bowler, and the batting, although there were occasional collapses, was adequate. Apart from Goodbody, the best newcomer was C. K. R. Vartan, a dependable middle batsman and useful bowler. P. B. G. Scotcher, a hard-hitting left-hander, F. C. Samworth and the captain, W. J. Corner, batted well. Twelve matches were played, of which three were won and seven lost.

Unreliable batting, due mainly to inexperience, handicapped Wellingborough School to such an extent that the match with the XL Club brought the only victory of the summer. Seven games were lost and two drawn. F. J. Cook batted consistently without much support. The bowling and fielding were keen.

Handicapped by weakness in bowling, Wellington College went through a disastrous season, losing nine of their twelve fixtures. J. H. E. Whittaker, P. D. Waghorn and R. O'Brien usually batted well. Useful support came from the captain, R. H. Chappell, who maintained a high standard in the field. With eight colours remaining, prospects for 1950 look brighter.

Three of the six defeats suffered by Westminster School were extremely narrow, and the side's record of three wins and a draw was hardly a true indication of the standard of their cricket. The eleven, composed chiefly of young players, benefited from the coaching of the former Middlesex and England player, J. W. Hearne, and the batting showed much improvement compared with the previous year. C. C. P. Williams again did well, and many good scores were made by the captain, R. T. Robinson, and R. K. Pitamber. K. J. M. Kemp and G. N. P. Lee formed a penetrative opening attack.

Whitgift School began the season poorly, and not until R. Subba Row recovered his batting form with hundreds against Reading and P.S. Wanderers did the side settle down. The final record was seven wins, six losses and three draws. Besides heading the batting, Subba Row proved a talented off-spin bowler, and he relieved R. N. Lewis of a good deal of the burden in attack. J. G. Hollands and G. Thompson scored freely on occasion.

Although Winchester College did not enjoy the success of the splendid 1948 eleven, results in school matches were satisfactory. Harrow and Marlborough were defeated, a moral victory was gained over Charterhouse and, after a follow-on, the Eton match was saved comfortably thanks to a not-out century by M. R. Coulman. Always seeking runs, Coulman often batted brilliantly, but lacked the defensive qualities of D. W. R. Bedford, who was seen at his best in a crucial situation. Despite two creditable innings, the captain, J. P. Raison, disappointed with the bat, but R. M. J. Burr, who like Coulman has two years more in the side, showed considerable promise. J. G. A. Varley, also a muchimproved batsman, bowled steadily, but apart from P. M. Welsh (off-spin) he received little support. Four matches were won, six lost and five drawn.

The remarkable bowler-wicket-keeper combination of twin brothers, G. S. and J. W. Thompson, was largely responsible for the success of Worcester Royal Grammar School, who won seven and drew six of their sixteen matches. Each set up a school record. Bowling leg-breaks and googlies, G. S. Thompson claimed 66 wickets at small cost, and his brother assisted in 31 dismissals, including 22 stumpings. Both played for English Schools against Wales. D. R. Claytor and G. S. Thompson headed the batting.

The lack of reliable opening batsmen so handicapped a youthful Worksop College eleven that only three matches were won—all in the first month of the season. Three pairs were tried, but only twice did the first-wicket stand exceed 20. In other respects the batting was sound, four players making over 200 runs. F. J. Hewitt, a useful all-rounder, headed both sets of averages, but the bowling usually lacked penetration.

Without a match-winning bowler, Wrekin College experienced a dismal season, winning only two and losing seven of their sixteen fixtures. J. B. Nichols, who led the side efficiently, began the season well as a batsman but failed to maintain this form. His bowling, too, was less effective than in 1948. The most promising newcomers were J. I. Gartside and P. I. Cunningham.

Chiefly because of inexperience, the Wycliffe College batsmen were unreliable, and the side suffered eight defeats compared with

two wins. J. R. Maguire bore the main burden of getting runs and scored more than twice as many as any of his colleagues. The attack was well balanced and the captain, D. Garton, bowled accurately.

Dogged by illness, Wyggeston Grammar School failed to settle down and the only victory was against an Old Boys XI. N. Sutherland, the captain, bowled extremely well without support and was the best of a feeble batting side.

SCOTTISH SCHOOLS

Just as the 1948 captain, I. A. H. Syme, overshadowed his colleagues at Edinburgh Academy, so J. M. Allan dominated the cricket there last summer. Bowling left-arm slow, Allan took 85 wickets at a cost of little over six runs apiece and he easily headed the batting. The only defeat in school games was suffered at the hands of Glenalmond. In all matches, Edinburgh won eight, lost six and drew three.

The splendid batting of the captain, A. S. Hay, formed the chief feature of a moderate season for Fettes College, who won three and lost six of their fourteen games. Hay's command of strokes and general comprehension of the game showed exceptional maturity. D. S. Lowe possessed the qualities required of an opening bat and gave promise as an off-break bowler. The best bowler was R. M. Giles, left-arm slow.

Loretto School were weaker than in 1948, and especially in attack. Only J. de M. Macphail could be relied upon to keep a steady length, and apart from the captain, W. D. Marr, fast but erratic, there was little hostility about the bowling. Considering the difficult tasks which they were set, the batsmen responded admirably. J. D. M. Cunninghame scored freely and J. A. S. Renwick, a new player, showed promise. Four of the seventeen matches were won and seven lost.

The powerful Merchiston Castle School bowling, keenly supported in the field, brought victory in five of the seven inter-school matches. Five bowlers, headed by the captain, A. B. Taylor, shared the work with almost similar success. By comparison the batting proved disappointing, despite good innings by I. S. Taylor. The record for all games showed ten wins, six losses and three draws.

Although George Watson's Boys College fared considerably better than in 1948, the batting still left room for improvement. J. H. Howard, P. Everett, D. A. Henderson and D. S. Macdonald

bowled well at times, and Everett, Howard and A. A. S. Reid were the best batsmen. Seven of the fifteen matches were won and six lost.

Hampered by a number of injuries at the beginning of the season, Trinity College, Glenalmond, did not fare so well as expected in gaining six wins and six draws from eighteen matches. Most seriously affected was the bowling, which lacked the regular assistance of the captain, I. C. Burnett. E. R. Paton worked hard, but H. J. J. Denholm, slow left-arm, proved more effective. Potentially, the batting was strong, but A. C. Denholm alone met with consistent success.

Although unable to retain their unbeaten record, Glasgow Academy again played attractive cricket and were fairly strong in all departments. Again C. A. B. Campbell, an aggressive batsman and clever leg-break bowler, headed both sets of averages. Also prominent with bat and ball was the captain, I. F. Colquhoun. Eight matches were won, three lost and one drawn.
