

# THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN 1954

Once more the Public Schools story is marred by a tale of disappointing fielding. It is a great pity that it should be so, for the 1954 standard otherwise was good. The general standard of those who played in the first representative match, Southern Schools v. The Rest, produced a higher average, except in fielding, than in any year I can recall. There was no batsman quite in the class of Peter May or Colin Cowdrey. There was no bowler so good as C. S. Smith. But there was a high level of ability, and it was most unfortunate that the picture over all should have been marred by


the fielding.

Whatever the fielding may be in the individual Schools teams which play at Lord's, it should be first-rate among those good enough to be chosen for the representative games. Here we have the pick of the year's boy cricketers, which means by and large the most natural players among them. From the most talented cricketers good fielding is to be expected as a matter of course. For a start we have the right to expect a fine show of keenness in the field, the close fielders poised eagerly in anticipation of a catch and the more distant ones alertly on the move when the ball is bowled. Among the representative cricketers of 1954 we saw little of that. There was a sad lack of movement and zest among the young fielders. There were fellows in the covers planted on their heels. There were slip fielders standing negligently in each other's nockets.

It did not seem that there had been much attempt at the schools to tackle the important subject of fielding. The groundwork had not been done, and accordingly the faults were numerous. Mistakes on the ground were frequent, sometimes caused by a fielder using only one hand when the use of both was practicable, and the throwing was horribly untidy. Much of the erratic throwing sprang from faulty method. The easiest way to throw with accuracy is the time honoured one in which the hand is above the level of the shoulder. A more difficult way is from a flatter position with the throwing hand below the shoulder. Most difficult of all is to combine the two, and that, it seemed, was what some of the throwers on view were trying to do. The young fielder could with advantage

sacrifice some of his length to increase his accuracy.


When the second match, Public Schools v. Combined Services began, there was at first some sign of improvement among the fielders. That did not last long. In turn J. V. L. Coate (Bradfield), P. R. H. Anderson (Marlborough) and G. N. L. Stubbs (Oakham) made bad mistakes on the ground, and the fielding continued below the desired level. I have named these players advisedly.

While a general criticism is liable to make no more impression than water on a duck's back, individual criticism is something not sought in this respect and may have some good results. Having named the three who started the rot, as it were, I should make hasty mention of one player to whom none of the criticism applies. He is I. Gibson of Manchester Grammar School. Gibson showed himself to be a beautiful fielder. He was quick and alert in the covers, and from anywhere he was able to throw accurately. For his throws the wicketkeepers in the two matches could stand confidently at the stumps. For most of the others they had to chase hither and thither. There was also some good fielding at times by others, including M. D. Livock of Charterhouse, but they did not maintain their standard as did Gibson.

Now to the most pleasing features about Public Schools cricket in 1954, and there were many of them. If the fielding had been even reasonable I would have had no hesitation in describing it as a vintage year. That the representative side was being outplayed by a strong Combined Services side when rain ended the match after one day does not affect that view.

The batting was stronger than the bowling. In the first game, the Trial, it seemed that all the boys could bat. Livock came in number ten for the Southern Schools and began with a perfect on-drive against the slow spin of R. W. Barber (Ruthin). The Rest were so powerful in batting that R. W. Street, an opening batsman from Bedford, was down at number nine and the innings did not reach him. In the second knock he was sent in first and certainly shaped like an opener.

The first match showed the boy batsmen at their best against bowling within their compass. In the representative game they found Spencer (Leicestershire) with too much pace and resource for them. That is not surprising, for Spencer has already played in a Test Trial match, and it seemed rather unkind to set him loose against schoolboys. I am strengthened in my view that Combined Services are not the ideal opponents for the boys on this occasion. The M.C.C. themselves could more surely get together the right side to give the boys a hard game and at the same time instruct them by example. The Services are apt to fail in such matters, with the result that the occasion is not always so satisfying as it should be.

On the evidence of the first game there were so many efficient batsmen that it is difficult to know where to begin. There was R. W. Barber, an elderly schoolboy who has appeared annually in these matches at Lord's since 1952. This year he arrived with the additional recommendation of having already played for Lancashire. His left-handed batting was quite clearly more mature than in the previous year, more assured also, so that he was wont to swing the bat more freely. He was an admirable Public Schools batsman and an all-rounder of great promise. On normal occasions

his leg-break and googly bowling is unusually steady for such a young player. His control against the Southern Schools was wellnigh perfect, though he did not find his touch against the Services. He was not alone in that. Most bowlers on that occasion, lacking the right support from the fielders, wilted under the attack of the more experienced side. The aggressive batting of P. E. Richardson. who as a batsman is probably even more advanced than is Spencer as a bowler, made it difficult for the boy bowlers to settle down. I would be most unwilling to blame them for wilting in the circumstances.

Barber never found his length in that match. His captaincy also was not nearly so good and mature as it had been in the Trial game. Under pressure he was reluctant to spread his field and for much of the time that the Services batsmen were building up the rip-snorting start given them by Richardson, Barber had his men in half-and-half positions. There was a lack of men policing the boundaries; many of them were stationed where they were too deep to save the singles and too close to cut off the fours. It was, however, a very testing occasion, and it would be wiser to remember that Barber had previously captained The Rest guite admirably.

Barber's opening partner was I. Gibson. He too was no stranger to Lord's. He had played for the representative side the previous year, when he had shown particular promise which he is well on the way to fulfil. In any year Gibson, who is still especially strong when playing off the back foot, would be among the leading school batsmen. To his fine batting and excellent fielding he added some leg-break bowling which would have been in more demand if the Schools had not already Barber to bowl in that manner. Against the Southern Schools he took a truly magnificent catch off his own bowling when Livock crashed a drive back at him. Gibson picked

it up almost casually with one hand.

D. C. Moor (King's, Canterbury) also impressed me greatly. He was a newcomer and a most welcome one for he believed in putting the bat hard against the ball. His first innings was too brief to make an impression. It was his second attempt that compelled his selection for the representative side in the big match. Moor is a left-hander whose bat is very straight. He is an excellent stroke player with particular strength on the leg side. On the off side he did not seem to be so powerful, though he was just as correct and his strokes looked quite promising. I have often noticed that most boy batsmen are either good on the front or the back legthe Northerners usually being the expert back foot players. Moor looked equally well trained when playing forward or back. And, another distinguishing feature where many boys fail, he was a good runner between the wickets. He should go a long way if he will get down to the job of improving his fielding.

There was also an even more eager stroke player from Repton,

S. M. Starkey, who had played at Lord's the previous year without winning selection for the Public Schools XI. He had come on greatly since then and had developed into a powerful stroke player. If he appeared at times to lean away from his stroke when driving, there was sufficient merit about his robust play to put him high among the best batsmen of the year. He was also a tearaway fast bowler, too tearaway, I thought, to develop far in that direction. He was so intent on hurling the ball down at maximum pace that he doubled himself up until his arm was only about four feet above the ground when he released it. If he has ambitions as a bowler he will need to curb his urge for pace at all costs and learn to stand up to bowl. He will not go far unless he first controls his movements.

Apart from Moor all the leading batsmen seemed to be allrounders. There was A. R. B. Neame, whose batting and bowling had played an unduly large part in the triumph of Harrow over Eton. He looked an excellent Schools cricketer, a sound batsman and an off-break bowler of considerable promise. I thought him the best of the off-spinners, followed by G. D. Edge, a second boy from Manchester Grammar School, and then by P. R. H. Anderson. That Barber as captain of the Schools thought differently and made much more use of Anderson did not shake my view that the first two seemed likely to go further in the game. More than either of the others. Neame practised the arts of variation. His flight was liable to get the batsman groping uncomfortably, and as he had both finger spin and fair accuracy he was quite an impressive bowler. Incidentally all three were more lively than the usual run of Public School off-spinners.

Anderson, too, was an all-rounder, a big fellow with power in his wrists and forearms. He hit two great sixes to round off the only day on which play was possible against the Services. In the previous match I made note that he was a mature-looking player who made good use of his weight in his forward play. Throughout I preferred him as batsman rather than bowler, useful though he was in the latter role, more perhaps in a stock capacity against good batsmen than as a quick wicket-taker. He could keep a length and could stay bowling for long spells, but the general impression was that his bowling was rather plain. That may, however, be a wrong impression, for he spent so much of the season bowling at School that he may well have lost his verve by the time the holidays arrived. Yet, whatever the truth about his bowling, Anderson was clearly a good cricketer.

Edge was unlucky. In most years he would have won a place in the representative side without difficulty. He could both bat and bowl, and it was his misfortune to clash with both Neame and Anderson. Particularly as a bowler it looked as if he could make much of himself. There was good rhythm in his rather languid, easy action—which was vaguely like that o Oakman of Sussexand he kept an almost monotonously accurate length. Had he varied his bowling more, he could not have been kept from the

Schools side even with the other two already chosen.

It is surely the first occasion on which two boys from the same Grammar School, Gibson and Edge, have appeared in the game at Lord's. It so happened that in the year that this happened there was not a single representative from Eton, whose cricket has fallen on, for them, evil days. Of late the authorities at Lord's have searched far and wide more thoroughly than ever before for the year's best schoolboy cricketers, and in doing so they have notably improved the standard of play in their matches.

I am somewhat chary about claiming anything as a first ever event. Last year, when Barber scored 1012 runs and took over 108 wickets, I said I could not recall a previous instance of a player at school doing the double. My memory was faulty. I should have remembered that it was first done by J. H. Rogers, who was a contemporary of mine at Oxford, though he did not win a Blue. Rogers did the double in 1929 at Birkenhead School. My attention has also been drawn to a performance by M. Taylor—like Barber a Ruthinian—who scored 1003 runs and took 110 wickets in 1946.

Returning to the boy batsmen of 1954, the next to be mentioned is G. W. Cook (Dulwich), an excellent player of forward strokes but a shaky performer when required to go on to the back foot. Cook had the height and the ability to drive, but generally speaking he was less vigorous than he could have been. It struck me that he was so eager to be correct in all his movements that he could not let himself go properly in attack. A little more forcefulness, even at the expense of correctness, would not be a bad thing. The first seven batsmen in the Schools team then were Barber, Gibson, Cook, Starkey, Moor, Anderson and Neame, an order which could have been changed several times without disturbing the balance of the side.

That remark could be extended to include the number eight, who was G. N. L. Stubbs. He set about winning selection for the big match by as stodgy an exhibition of batting as it is possible to imagine. Long after we had decided that he was devoid of attacking strokes he at length proceeded to pick up his bat to drive Anderson twice in one over past extra cover. From that point he played vastly better. He almost left the playing of his natural game too late. His early brand of batting was such as to put off any selector, though Stubbs would probably have been chosen in any case as a left-arm spin bowler. He had a good controlled action and was generally steady except when he released an occasional ball down the leg side.

In reserve the Schools had several useful batsmen. The twelfth man was rightly Edge. Apart from him the pick of the reserves was perhaps R. K. Whiley (Malvern) who had developed his batting in all directions since 1953, when he also played for The Rest. There was also J. M. Woolley (Taunton) who most appropriately for a man with that illustrious name batted left-handed. He should be commended for using his feet to get him down the nitch at slow bowling. He used his feet so confidently and well and got his nose so well over the ball when driving with a nice full swing that I imagine I was not alone in regretting when he was yorked and bowled by Barber. D. A. Bulfield of Beaumont was also ready to venture down the pitch, and other batsmen in the game to show ability were R. W. Street, D. J. Wylie (Lancing) and J. E. Kirby (Ampleforth) whose strength lay on the leg side.

Once again G. A. A. Currie (Rugby) was one of the wicketkeepers. He had improved since 1953, but he was still finding his size difficult to tuck away behind the stumps. In fact he was still a trifle clumsy, and he lost his place in the representative side to C. B. Howland (Dulwich). Howland was an excellent wicketkeeper, so sound as to be largely unnoticed, the sign of a thoroughly competent stumper. Even when he stumped Starkey on the leg side in the Trial game the quietness of his method tended to obscure its excellence. He was an obvious improvement on recent players

who have kept for the Schools side.

So many of the bowlers were also batsmen that there remain only the pace bowlers to mention. The best of these was J. V. L. Coate (Bradfield). He was a fast-medium left-hander, who had a good run-up and an easy action and who delivered the ball from his full height. As that height was considerable he could make the ball bounce more than most from a good length. He did, indeed, look a thoroughly good schoolboy bowler. If he could learn to bring his body more into his delivery, he would become still more lively.

The other opener in the representative side was Livock. At first sight he was rather ordinary both in his action and the results of that action. It also seemed that his changes of pace must have been fairly obvious to the batsman. But Livock was a bowler of medium quick pace who certainly improved on acquaintance, when his merits became more clear. They were steadiness of length and an ability to bowl an outswinger that not infrequently pitched on the awkward place, frequently enough to explain his excellent

record for Charterhouse.

M. F. Byrne (Stonyhurst) completed a set of five pace bowlers with Coate, Livock, Starkey and J. D. Cheetham, of Merchant Taylors', of whom little was seen. Byrne was quite fast and had a powerful action, but he is somewhat handicapped by his approach to the wicket. He was runing at full pace too soon, and there was no possibility of acceleration as he reached the crease. He, like Starkey, would do well to curb his enthusiasm and to bowl rather more within his capabilities. Cheetham, who had taken 111 wickets at a cost of under ten runs each for his School in three years, had an off day when the Trial match began. After six costly overs in the

first innings he did not bowl again.

After the Trial game there was some criticism of the Southern Schools. In their second innings they were set to get 231 in 150 minutes and were content to play out time with 147 for one wicket, Moor and Cook having a long partnership of 128. This is so essentially a trial occasion, on which all the players are fighting for places in the representative match, that it is hardly reasonable to expect them to jeopardise their chances by going hell for leather to obtain a result to the game. This is an occasion on which the result is not of importance. It is designed to be a parade of the leading schoolboy cricketers and must be accepted as such.

There is one point which should be mentioned about the play at Lord's. That is the waste of time when a wicket fell. Most of the batsmen took far too long replacing their predecessors, and there were one or two occasions on which the two minutes allowed by law were exceeded. On most school grounds the dressing-room is nearer the field of play than at Lord's, where the journey to the gate leading to the playing area is considerable, but the players are expected to adapt themselves to the geography of grounds. The two minutes are allowed in the laws, but there is also a recommendation that batsmen should cross at the entrance to the field of play, and such matters should be practised early in a player's career or they will always go by neglect.
