

# THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN 1955

Public School cricketers of 1955 improved on acquaintance. When they first arrived at Lord's for their four days of representative cricket they looked a decidedly moderate crowd. By the end of the fourth day they had created a much better impression, and in the last innings of all there was even a welcome improvement in the fielding standard. On the whole, however, that was again much below what we have every right to expect from youngsters enjoying continuous opportunities for practice. Nothing will induce me to become really enthusiastic about Public School cricket

until this fielding weakness has been put right.

At one time during the first day of the match between the chosen XI and Combined Services I made note that in succession G. W. Cook (Dulwich), B. L. Reed (Winchester) and M. D. Duck (Wellingborough) allowed the ball to go between their legs. There will doubtless be some who will ask why these three offenders should be named. My answer is that general criticism of the fielding standard seems to get us nowhere. Let us therefore proceed from the general to the particular. Then the young cricketers who offer themselves for our approval annually at Lord's may take more pains to fit themselves as fielders for that experience. There can be no excuse for such players to allow the ball through their legs now that the fielding quality of the playing area at Lord's has been improved. If they fail to that extent they deserve to be noted and named.

Young English cricketers have need to pay more attention to their fielding than boys of most other cricketing countries. The reason is that the majority of those who prosper as batsmen or bowlers are astonishingly awkward movers. There seems to be no grace of movement about most of them, and they contrast greatly with the easy movers from other parts of the Commonwealth. It might be that athletic and gymnastic instruction would benefit

our young cricketers.

No amount of help, however, will avail them if they will not devote much more time to fielding practice. G. W. Cook, for instance, is a large fellow who moves ponderously. If he wishes to get anywhere in the game, he therefore needs to do everything to overcome his natural handicap. He has not allowed it to hold him back as batsman and bowler. Why then should he let it so hamper his fielding? He and the many other young players whose state is similar, should reflect that it is much easier to make oneself into a good fielder while young than at any other period during a playing career.

If I have given the impression that the fielding was unusually

bad this year, that is not what was intended. It has indeed been worse, but it is still so far below a good standard that it seems wise to state the case strongly. There was happily an improvement before the end of the four days, and generally the catching was superior to the ground fielding. A. R. B. Neame of Harrow, who was a highly accomplished all-rounder, took a most brilliant catch in the big match against the Services. Moreover, from first to last the wicket-keeping was so good that it seemed a pity that both the stumpers on trial, C. B. Howland (Dulwich) and A. C. Smith (King Edward's, Birmingham), could not advance into the representative side.

There are fortunately signs that some of the schools are mindful of the importance of fielding. Bradfield, for instance. claim that their success-nine wins against two defeats-was largely due to their catching and throwing. Charterhouse, who won seven times and lost only once, report somewhat similarly. So do Marlborough, who won more often than they lost in spite of having weak batting. Moreover, those reporting on the success of the three schools with claims to be considered the year's leaders, Wellington, Winchester and Dulwich, also mentioned their standard in the field. Of the three, Wellington perhaps have the strongest claims to be placed first. They were unbeaten and they won seven times. Moreover, they were outstanding against other schools, among whom Eton, Harrow and Haileybury were heavily beaten. All three of the leaders were deservedly represented by two players each at Lord's. They helped the South to beat the Rest by a wide margin, and all six then went forward to the representative match.


That trial game was played on a pitch which might charitably have been described as sporting. It played well enough on the first day, but before the end it was rough, though not perhaps quite rough enough to account for the collapse of both batting sides. In a well-beaten side from northern parts P. J. Sharpe justified the batting reputation which had preceded him from Worksop. There he had made 1,251 runs for the school team, with an average of 113.7. Among his seven centuries were two exceeding 200 and two others which were scored in the same match. In his spare time Sharpe had also taken 23 wickets. It may be that he had made too many runs and some of those rather too easily. That would account for the one obvious weakness he showed at Lord's. It was a weakness of outlook, for he was inclined to be careless and to take liberties which cost him his wicket needlessly.

Sharpe did not, for that reason, score as freely in these representative matches as outstanding batsmen of the past, most notably P. B. H. May. But I have not the slightest hesitation in describing him as an outstanding schoolboy batsman. He was a stockily built young cricketer with a maturity of technique beyond his age. He

had a wide range of solid and well-managed strokes, and he looked equally good off front and back foot. To a bowler his bat must have looked not only illegally wide but uncompromisingly straight. His bat indeed appeared as broad as his person, and between the two he allowed no gap. The one technical flaw was a tendency to try to play the ball pitched on the leg stump too square on the leg side—a flaw which has often cost leading Test batsmen their wickets while touring on the faster Australian pitches.

In common with several others, Sharpe was also an indifferent runner between wickets. He squandered several runs by that failing, and, like fielding, this is one of the arts which suffers from neglect in the schools. One who was worse in this respect was also one of the faulty fielders, and may here be allowed anonymity. He never seemed prepared for an over-throw, nor for a second run when the ball was misfielded. Lazy running is common in all ranks of the game today, but there is less excuse for it among boys than among any other group of players.

As a team the Public Schools played with considerable spirit against an apparently superior Combined Services side, which proved disappointing in practice. The Services have not provided the type of opposition required in this match, and it is not surprising that the M.C.C. have been considering making themselves responsible for a team to play the boys.

On this occasion the Schools were not far from victory at the close, after having fought back from a position of almost certain disaster. In their second innings they had three men, including Sharpe, out for 30 and were still three runs behind. They were saved by D. J. Mordaunt (Wellington) and G. W. Cook, who put on 71 for the fourth wicket. In previous innings Cook had appeared to some to be unnecessarily cautious, but now his powers of concentration and his solid defence came in extremely handy. He provided the stubbornness while Mordaunt boldly challenged the Service bowlers and deprived them of the initiative. It was a notable piece of cricket.

Cook, who had made 734 runs at an average of 66.7 for Dulwich, based his soundness on a brief back lift. Mordaunt was a free batsman with an obvious love of driving, and, if his bat was not always quite straight while driving, the fault was not vital. He did, too, appear to sacrifice control by holding the bat close to the top of the handle, in spite of which he was clearly a most excellent schoolboy batsman. He and the other Wellington representative, I. A. Addison, had splendid seasons for their school side. Not otherwise perhaps would Mordaunt have won through to the representative side. In the trial game he was stumped for a small score in the first innings, and in the second he was monstrously unlucky. He received a ball which kicked so sharply from a good length that he was struck on the right shoulder, and on

appeal he was given out caught in the gully. In the end all came right for him, since in the representative match he was top scorer in each innings.

Addison was the highly successful captain of Wellington, the leading batsman and also the wicket-keeper. He could not keep wicket at Lord's, but he turned his talents to slip fielding with conspicuous success. His batting was sound and sensible, and his cover driving most attractive. He resembled Sharpe in not making all the runs at Lord's that he appeared worth.

The main batting of the schools was completed by a couple of diminutive cricketers, B. L. Reed of Winchester and Neame. Though he began with an innings of 33, Reed had a disappointing run. He appeared to be passing through a temporary spell of staleness, during which he got out in some rather elementary ways. His Winchester record against good opposition places him in a high class, but just how high we were not allowed to judge. Neame, who had also been one of the leading players of the previous year, batted particularly well in the trial match. On the second day of that game, when the pitch was unreliable, his 45 not out while his side could total only 118 was an excellent innings. He watches the ball closely, has a good defence and bases his play on nimble footwork. He was also the team's off-break bowler, and a good one with a springy action.

As though being the leading all-rounder was not enough, Neame had a busy summer captaining his school and then his two teams at Lord's. His own play seemed rather better than his captaincy. It is a difficult job captaining a scratch team of schoolboys insufficiently grounded in the cricketing arts. Both Neame and M. D. Duck, who led the Rest, suffered from the ignorance of the fielding positions shown by several of their followers. Some very peculiar positions were taken for the slow left-arm bowling of D. M. Alty (Merchant Taylors, Crosby) and the fast left-hander, D. R. Cook (Warwick). The latter suffered not a little from the habit of his short-leg fielders to stand too deep and also on occasions from the absence of a short fine leg.

D. R. Cook was one of a trio of good seam bowlers chosen against the Services. He was the fastest of them and one who looked likely to develop into a really good bowler. He had a good, powerful action, and in addition to his natural in-swing he could move the ball away from the batsman off the pitch. He was successful in both matches and deservedly so. He was also an uninhibited clouter of the ball with the bat, and that he batted at number ten indicated the absence of a tail in the representative side.

The other two opening type bowlers were C. A. A. Black, who had taken 54 wickets at 12.8 for Winchester, and Duck, who was an all-rounder with particular emphasis at Lord's on his bowling. All three were able to bowl accurately, and it was pleasing to see

that each could move the ball towards the slips. It was as much due to the persistence of their attack as to lack of enterprise on the part of the batsmen that the Combined Services could manage only 131 for 7, when set to hit 184 in 145 minutes on the last afternoon.

In spite of Neame, the spin was not so impressive as the faster bowling. The attack was completed in its main form by Alty, a slow left-hander who made little use of spin. He did not take many wickets, but he played his part usefully in the big match as a batsmen with a free style. G. W. Cook and Mordaunt were also bowlers of some ability.

There was some curious captaincy in the trial game which kept A. Hurd, of Chigwell, out of the Rest attack until seven Southern wickets were down in the second innings. Having batted at number eleven, he must have been wondering about his exact role, when a belated message from the pavilion reminded his captain that he was selected as an off-break bowler. Hurd then took two of the remaining three wickets and actually looked the most promising spin bowler in the game. He had a good, lively action and spun the ball more than anyone else, which, incidentally, brought out the best of Smith's wicket-keeping. Happily Hurd was due to remain at school for another year and could expect another chance of playing in the big match.

So many of the leading boy players both bat and bowl-even if they sometimes neglect their fielding—that it is not easy to give all a full chance in a trial game lasting two days. Several of those who remained reserves figured only briefly and inconclusively in the proceedings. As the game went the reserve strength appeared slight, so that only Smith, Hurd and R. C. Coke-Wallis, another useful seam bowler from Marlborough, challenged the chosen XI at all closely.

It is not so long ago that the trial game was between Lord's Schools and the Rest. In 1955 only three members of school teams who play at Lord's were selected for the Southern Schools and the Rest game. They were Neame, Coke-Wallis and E. McQ. Rose of Rugby. The change has obviously benefited schools cricket by

widening the field of choice, though the strength of the Southern Schools is habitually such that even in its present form the game

is not entirely satisfactory.

Among the Lord's schools without a representative was Eton. In recent seasons they have contributed comparatively little to these games, which is a source of weakness, for they were formerly a school who provided the representative team with a solid foundation. In 1955 they had an unusually young side, some of whom may now develop into representative class players. There were others in the schools of obvious promise for 1956, including J. R. Bernard, who topped both the batting and bowling averages at

Clifton. H. J. Conlin, who took 50 wickets for Downside, was another scheduled for another year at school, while G. J. Sharman (Lancing) and R. M. Prideaux (Tonbridge), though still younger, were among the successful cricketers of the year of whom we should soon hear more.

The signs for 1956 were good, but obviously the fulfilment of the considerable promise shown by these younger players will depend in part on their willingness to tackle the fielding question. Even the best batsman or bowler may find himself disregarded by the selectors at Lord's unless he can field well. It happened to P. B. H. May during his last but one year at Charterhouse. He had played for the representative side in the previous year, and after the gap he did so again two years later, since when there can have been few complaints about his fielding. If the selectors at Lord's could drop May, then no lazy fielder among the leading school cricketers has reason to consider himself safe.
