

## THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN 1956

Rain treated Public Schools cricket as scurvily as any other in 1956. The matches at Lord's suffered severely, though in the final representative game the weather allowed Combined Services to win narrowly after a declaration by the boys. Unfortunately the trial game, Southern Schools v. The Rest, was seriously upset, and selection of the representative team was greatly complicated.

Those matches at Lord's were distinguished by the brilliantly uninhibited batting of H. C. Blofeld of Eton, and the season in general can be described as one for all-rounders. The wet is a handicap for inexperienced players, but all the evidence is that the boys in this appalling summer stood up well to the difficulties of sodden turf. There is no doubt that there were numerous excellent players. The standard was good, and the final side was certainly among the better Public School representative teams.

In recent years the officials at Lord's have looked farther and farther afield for players. The smaller schools are often as well represented as the larger and, in a cricket sense, more illustrious ones. It is a policy to be encouraged, and if those larger schools sometimes have their players judged more strictly than the others, no serious cause for complaint exists there. That may well have happened this year, when both Eton and Harrow seemed powerful enough to justify them being represented at Lord's by more than the one player each were allowed. Their players habitually meet stronger club opposition than most other schools, and their additional experience can be of particular value to the representative team.

It is always difficult to name the best side of the year. The wise part is to name the leaders without ranking them. We may start then with the unbeaten Winchester side, clearly a very well balanced one that fielded brilliantly. Then Malvern, who have not been particularly prominent in most seasons since the war, won four out of five school matches, and among their victims were the Harrovians. Harrow themselves defeated Charterhouse, who have to go back a long way to find a side equalling their 1956 record of nine wins. Tonbridge, too, had nine wins and those out of only 12 matches. As already mentioned the standard at Eton was high, and among schools whose opposition is not quite so consistently strong Brighton went through the season unbeaten.

The particular disappointment was Dulwich. They had been a leading side during the previous year, and they had a large proportion of that successful side still available. Yet they could win only three out of 15 matches, for which they themselves divide the blame between faulty fielding and weaknesses in the middle batting. Another of the outstanding 1955 sides to slip back was

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Wellington, in spite of some splendidly consistent all-round play by S. J. S. Clarke.

Clarke was one of many who scored most runs and took most wickets for their schools during the season. His 490 runs and 36 wickets for a team demanding more and more of him won him a well-deserved place in the representative schools side at Lord's. There Clarke was among so many who had been equally prominent as all-rounders that he batted at number nine

Even then he went in ahead of P. R. Stevens, who had played the largest part both as batsman and bowler in the success of Winchester. The record of Stevens, 425 runs with an average of 38.6 and 32 wickets as an opening bowler at 15.0 each, speaks for itself. Any team which could place him at number 10 could expect to be rated as an extraordinarily strong batting side in boys' cricket. The only member of the side without batting ability was J. A. Wichers, the steady left-arm spin bowler from Cheltenham.

Others in the side who led both as batsmen and bowlers during the school term were M. D. Duck of Wellingborough, D. M. A. Steel (Fettes), J. Watt (Eastbourne), R. D. Montgomerie (Merchant Taylors) and D. Smith of Sedbergh. In addition Blofeld was both batsman and a wicket-keeper who was rated the best at Eton for many years. This was an impressive side of all-rounders, difficult to captain but encouraging for English cricket at a time when all-rounders in first-class cricket are few and far between.

In adult cricket these all-rounders, and several others for whom there could not be places in the respresentative side, will be urged to specialise. Some will have specialisation forced on them, for as they develop in one branch they will, though not with intent necessarily, slip back in the other. To those whose batting and bowling continues to progress evenly I would urge a policy of independence when some senior—or seniors—advises them to specialise. If Trevor Bailey whose physique in his early years as a first-class player was far from robust, can maintain the role of all-rounder, there is no reason why these youngsters should doubt their strength.

The season 1956 was one also for young players. Blofeld was only 16, but a cricketer developed beyond those years as his average of 41.78 from 585 runs for Eton prove. Against the type of opposition Eton have to meet and in a damp summer those would have been magnificent figures for a boy of top school age. For one of 16 they are already remarkable before his 179 runs while being dismissed only once in the representative games are added to them. That one dismissal, moreover, was a run out.

Naturally the important event was his not-out century against Combined Services after the first six wickets had fallen for 71. Only P. B. H. May (Charterhouse) and M. C. Cowdrey (Tonbridge)

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had previously hit centuries for the Public Schools XI at Lord's since the war. With a year to go, as captain of Eton, Blofeld has equalled their performances. If he can develop as they have, we shall excuse 1956 its wetness and think of it as the season which brought a fine young player to our notice.

The success of Blofeld and J. M. Parker, the Harrow captain, against Combined Services seems to bear out what I wrote earlier about the value of experienced Etonians and Harrovians in the schools team. Together they hit 232 of the 389 runs scored by the boys in that match; Parker, a particularly fine schoolboy batsman, made 73 in the second innings.

For Parker that was a splendid finish to a Harrow career during which he was in the XI for four years. In that time he made 1,750 runs, more than any other Harrovian, and in his last term his side was beaten only once. Yet during the season greater success was enjoyed by G. D. Massy, who must normally have figured in the representative games at Lord's. He made 655 runs with an average of 65.5 and was second among the bowlers with 29 wickets at 12.9.

Young players were largely responsible for Brighton's outstanding season, during which their batting side was not once entirely dismissed by any opponents. Of a trio of 16-year-old cricketers who had much to do with the success, R. W. Lewis headed the batsmen with 530 runs and an average of 88, which would have caused a flutter even in a dry and high-scoring summer. Lewis is a left-hander who hit the ball hard. Tonbridge, too, had a youthful scorer, R. M. Prideaux, of whom even more will be expected next year than his 37.8 average of 1956.

Clearly another very young player of exceptional promise was the Nawab of Pataudi, whose father was Oxford's most successful and, I think, best batsman between the wars. At the age of 15 the present Nawab averaged 27 and was one of the prominent members of Winchester's fine fielding combination. With these, and others like them, still at school next year the outlook for Public Schools cricket is obviously something more than promising.

Of more mature age was M. D. Duck, who was in the Wellingborough side for the sixth year and the Public Schools team for the second. He topped both the batting and bowling figures of his school and led them with such success that they lost only once and won nine of 14 games.

Felsted had a similar record, losing only to their masters. R. A. G. Luckin made no fewer than 868 runs, which appears to be the highest aggregate in the schools, as well it might be in such a wet summer. Another notable aggregate was the 742 for Charterhouse by J. J. Carless, an attractive stroke-player who unfortunately did not come off at Lord's. Not even P. B. H. May scored more for Charterhouse in a post-war season.

Inevitably there were numerous fine bowling performances. It Lord's, the Rugby captain, T. B. L. Coghlan, did the hat-trick and helped his side to beat Marlborough on the first innings by whicket to the surprise of most followers of the two sides. Even more spectacular were the four wickets, all clean bowled, in four balls with which the Stowe fast bowler, D. G. Garwood-flowers, routed the M.C.C.

For several schools 1956 in the wet was one of modest success. Yet it was surprising how many of them found consolation from befeating the M.C.C. Both Cheltenham and Haileybury, two moderate sides whose match at Lord's was wrecked by rain, recalled such a success among numerous disappointments. However weak the schools, it seems that the M.C.C. were able to find still weaker ides, but the purpose of an M.C.C. match is surely not to provide neasy win for the boys.

Mention should also be made of Highgate's season, for the sult of no fewer than eight of their 15 matches depended on the inal over. That their record was not better was no fault of C. D. Drybrough, who was another to make most runs and take most rickets for his school. So also did R. A. Godfrey of St. Paul's, and he like Drybrough was the school captain.

Those who follow Public Schools cricket may well have felt to take 1956 was the most rewarding season of any since the war. During it five amateur batsmen occupied the first five batting ositions in a Test against Australia. Four of them, Bailey, May, Steppard, and Cowdrey—to put them in the order of seniority—tayed for the Schools at Lord's between 1942 and 1950. Not since the middle ages of cricket has amateur batsmanship been so rominent, nor Public Schools batsmanship.

There is no reason why the latter should not play an ever more rominent part. Those at Public Schools enjoy advantages of rood grounds, good coaching and time for play that give them a ring start against most other youngsters. In the past those who are taken most advantage of the opportunities have often been at to the game when they start work, but to-day cricket as a reation is becoming increasingly attractive to the Public Schoolboy. The rewards of professionalism, and even skilfully exploited mateurism, in the game are considerable and must attract more and more young players.

There are already numerous Public Schoolboys on the fringes iprofessionalism. Others have attempted no camouflage but have renly embraced professionalism. Among them are two who rently played for the representative team. Michael Stewart, of leyn's and now Surrey, was number two batsman to Cowdrey rently became a professional with Middlesex.

Another present professional, D. C. Morgan, played in what

has developed into most distinguished company in 1947. He was in The Rest side at Lord's when May, Sheppard and Ian Bedford were Public School players. Morgan himself had a quite undistinguished match, but he has since become a valuable all-rounder

for Derbyshire.

During the dozen years I have been writing Public Schools cricket for *Wisden* some notable players have emerged and there have been some stirring events in the representative matches. Among them the most memorable has been the win by the Public Schools in 1951, when the Services set them to score 188 in 115 minutes. A. C. D. Ingleby-Mackenzie of Eton set off so brilliantly—his own 50 in 20 minutes and altogether 58 out of 77 in a few overs—that they were home very comfortably.

May played at Lord's in 1945, when he was only 15 and routed by the pace of T. E. Bailey, and 1947, but he was omitted from the representative side in the middle year. His fielding then did not satisfy the selectors. In 1947 May was a highly accomplished player of whom I wrote that he "stood out far above the other boys." And those others included Sheppard, whose part against Combined Services was small and who developed his

powers largely after leaving school.

In 1947 May scored his 146 against the Services, having previously made 148 for the Southern Schools. Three years later Colin Cowdrey had scores of 126 and 55. Hence in *Wisden* appeared "We have now seen two unusually gifted schoolboy batsmen in

the five post-war years. The other was P. B. H. May."

Both have gone on to still bigger things. But all the leading school players of their year have not been so fortunate. In 1945 P. D. S. Blake looked an uncommonly promising batsman. He had an exceptional season for Eton with five centuries and an average of 86. He was never as good after leaving school, even if he did go on to captain Oxford. The same is true of another Oxford Blue of the same period, I. P. Campbell, stumper and slogger. He made more than 1,000 runs in each of two successive seasons for Canford, but he could not adapt his slogging to the needs of better bowling.

Most disappointing perhaps was Ian Bedford, who took 25 wickets at low cost for Middlesex with his leg-breaks and googlies while still a boy at Woodhouse Grammar School, Finchley. "I can see only one danger," I wrote in *Wisden*, "that he will allow himself

to be overworked before he is muscularly set."

That does, I fear, happen to most young bowlers of the googly type. Few who start really young in that style ever come to much as adults. Many of the most successful start late, such as R. W. V. Robins and F. R. Brown. Certainly no Public Schools bowler of that type has yet come to anything since the war, though there have been promising ones. At the time Bedford was playing

Schools cricket there was another of his type, G. P. R. Esdale of Malvern. He took many wickets well at the age of 15 and 16. At 17 his skill had departed so far that his 23 wickets at school cost him 32.86 runs each.

Another of ecceptional promise was R. V. C. Robins. Perhaps be, too, overworked his unusual spinning ability before he was muscularly set, and perhaps he fell between several cricketing schools while even now remaining a player of distinct promise.

There have been few high-class boy bowlers during this period. Of them all, whatever their types, the best after Bedford was perhaps C. S. Smith, who came to Lord's as an all-rounder from Manchester and has since developed as a fast bowler with Cambridge and Lancashire. Next to him while at school might have been R. G. Marlar, a contemporary of Cowdrey and Stewart. Even then Marlar was an off-spinner who "genuinely spun the ball."

Among many others who played and showed their promise in the games at Lord's there must be mention of M. J. K. Smith, who was in that great 1951 match with Ingleby-Mackenzie, W. Knightley-Smith, C. C. P. Williams, M. E. L. Melluish, R. A. Gale and Robins. M. Smith did much less in the Schools games at Lord's than he has since done for Oxford, though he was even then a sound batsman, "a good back-foot player." The boy who is good off the back foot has a solid grounding for play against professional spin-bowlers, as Smith has demonstrated since those days.

If the next dozen years produce as many first-class cricketers, he schools will deserve overall congratulations. For that they must set their standards as high as possible, and there is a tendency or them to be satisfied rather too easily. And above all there must he an even greater drive to improve the fielding standard and the maketing knowledge of the young players in the widest sense. It is not enough to instruct in the nets. There is much in cricket that mannot be taught there.

#### **CHARTERHOUSE**

With eight old colours available, the success of the previous season was well maintained. Not since 1876 had more wins been recorded, but one of the two defeats was a crushing reverse by Harrow. T. R. Jakobson again led the side well and developed into a capital all-rounder. He was a specially good field. The chief rungetter was J. J. Carless, a fine stroke-player, who finished the season with consecutive scores of 81, 62, 77\*, 118\*, 63\*. He played in both Schools matches at Lord's. Of the other batsmen, R. H. Sclater did well in his first season. Jakobson (medium fast) was probably the best bowler though A. J. South (fast) was often dangerous, and A. T. C. Allom (medium pace) most consistent.
