

PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN THE WISDEN CENTURY

A tribute to the Masters in charge of cricket and the professional coaches. Their patience, enthusiasm and hard work outside school hours have provided countless thousands of schoolboys with a love of cricket which has stood them and their country in good stead. They have given back to the game all that they have to give and their reward is in the spread of enjoyment, happiness and friendship which remain the best reasons in the world for playing the game.

Bibliography

Should any student of cricket wish to delve more deeply into the history of our Public Schools the books mentioned here will be of great assistance to him. Unfortunately it is not possible to do anything like justice to 100 years of school cricket in the space available. Let me say at once that many schools and well-known names of cricketers, cricket masters and professionals are regret-

fully omitted. To them all I would apologise.

The first edition of *Wisden* contained no mention of school cricket though much of the contents no doubt proved invaluable for general knowledge papers! That same year (1864) for the first and only time *The Cricket Chronicle* appeared on the market. Edited by Captain W. Bayly the production looks more like the modern *Wisden* than any of the early editions of the Almanack. It contained no less than 513 pages of which 127 were devoted to the scores of school and even house matches! Poor Captain Bayly, his "Volume the First to be continued annually" proved wishful thinking.

Future historians who wish to write their schools cricket history do not have to search far. Since 1894 Wisden has devoted aspecial article to the subject. From this date it is possible to build up year by year the individual cricket history of many schools. In addition to Wisden I would like to recommend and acknowledge the help and enjoyment I have received from Ayres Cricket Companion. From 1905 to 1931 it carried school cricket histories as follows:—Aldenham (1907), Brighton (1928), Charterhouse (1914), Cheltenham (1916), Christ's Hospital (1918), Clifton (1917), Cranleigh (1921), Denstone (1930), Dulwich (1913), Eton (1909), Haileybury (1925), Harrow (1908), Highgate (1922), Marlborough (1912), Malvern (1929), Repton (1919), Rossall (1926), Rugby (1911), St. Paul's (1927), Sherborne (1906), Shrewsbury (1923), Tonbridge (1924), Uppingham (1915), Wellingborough (1931),

Wellington (1920), Westminster (1910), and Winchester (1905) These Companions are not rare and can still be obtained in the second-hand market.

Very few books have been written about Public School Cricket as a whole but individual schools have been more fortunate Mr. J. W. Goldman in his Bibliography of Cricket mentions 45 items on Eton, 18 on Harrow, 11 on Winchester and so on.

The first real attempt to publish a history was made in 1951. Public Schools Cricket, 1901-1950 was edited by Mr. W. N. Roe. who was master-in-charge of cricket at Eton from 1929-1938. This admirable book contained the cricket history of 17 schools written by men closely connected with each school. It is an invaluable source of reference. Above all, my gratitude and acknowledgements are due to Mr. H. S. Altham for his references to school cricket in A History of Cricket (1926).

Wisden through the years

The second edition of 1865 mentions but three schools by giving the scores of the matches at Lord's between Eton and Harrow, Rugby and M.C.C. and the match between Eton and Harrow combined v. M.C.C. Scores only are given until the 1870 edition when brief descriptions are added to some of the games and past results of certain inter-school matches are usefully added for the first time. The early editions contain scores of matches played by eight schools:—Eton, Harrow, Winchester, Rugby, Marlborough, Charterhouse, Westminster and Cheltenham,

From 1871 a definite Public School section made its appearance and this grew larger until 1880 when the Editor regrets his inability to find space to include full scores of matches played by M.C.C. against 19 schools. He does, however, quote Bell's Life of June 29, 1872:—"If there is one thing more than another for which the Marylebone Club deserve the thanks of the cricketing community, it is for the support they give the noble game in visiting, and being visited by, the Public Schools of this Country."

In 1876 Schools were shown for the first time against the names of the players in the 1875 Freshmen's Matches. Of the 46 players involved no fewer than 29 came from Eton, Harrow, Winchester, Rugby, Marlborough, Clifton and Uppingham.

From 1888 the Public School section became larger once more and for the first time a three-page résumé of the previous season appeared. In 1891 and subsequent years the players' schools were

mentioned in the University match.

The 1894 edition brought the first signed article on the subject and this marked the beginning of a thorough coverage of Public School cricket which has been one of the features of Wisden ever since. It was by Mr. C. B. Fry, who wrote a short résumé of the 1893 season at 24 schools and 24 pages of scores and averages

followed at the end of the Almanack. Apart from the war years the coverage of school cricket grew year by year till we find in last vear's edition the averages of no less than 151 schools and 67 pages

devoted to the subject.

From 1896 to 1904 Mr. W. J. Ford wrote annually a most interesting article. He attempted to divide schools into three classes from a cricket point of view. It remains a most difficult task to decide which school team or player is the best. No Championship is possible and the strength of the opposition could mean that a batting average of 50 at a smaller school is attained more easily than an average of 20, say, at Eton. In 1895 Mr. Ford put Eton, Harrow, Rugby, Marlborough, Winchester, Cheltenham, Clifton and Charterhouse in Class 1. His Class 2 included Uppingham, Malvern, Repton, Wellington, Haileybury, Sherborne, Shrewsbury, Tonbridge, Westminster and Rossall. Whilst Bedford Modern. Bradfield, Brighton, Dulwich, Epsom, Lancing, St. Paul's, and Whitgift were in the third division!

Captain W. J. Seton followed Mr. Ford in 1905 and 1906, the latter edition containing the obituary of one of the most famous of all cricket masters, the Etonian Mr. R. A. H. Mitchell. The Editor wrote the schools article in 1907 and thereafter found a succession of devoted scribes who between them have made it possible to

follow cricket history in our schools.

The Authors and the years their work appeared in Wisden are

Mr. C. Toppin (1908-11), Mr. F. B. Wilson (1912), Mr. E.B. Noel (1913-22), Mr. H. S. Altham (1923-28), Mr. A. Podmore (1929-37), Mr. Hubert Winterbotham (1938-39), Mr. Charles Burton (1940), Lt.-Colonel G. H. M. Cartwright (1942-44), and annually since 1945, Mr. E. M. Wellings.

Eton and Harrow, 1864-1900

Eton against Harrow at Lord's has always been regarded as the most important of all school matches. It is certainly the best supported. Turnstiles were first used at Lord's in 1871 and no less than 24,626 spectators paid 1s. in the two days of the match. The number increased to over 27,000 in 1872 and 1873. In the latter year Wisden estimated that 40,000 watched "the great cricket attraction of the London fashionable season." Harrow won this match by five wickets and the wild scenes of enthusiasm at the close caused the Secretary of M.C.C. to write to the Editor of Bell's Life regretting that "their efforts to prevent a scene of confusion at the termination of the schools match were frustrated by the unseemly conduct of persons on the ground." He appealed to the authorities of both schools to check the "immoderate expression of feeling." So seriously did M.C.C. and the school authorities view the commotion that it was decided that the

admission charge should be 2s. 6d. in order to diminish the number of spectators! Half a crown was real money in those days but this did not deter over 15,000 paying to watch the Eton victory of 1874.

From 1805 to 1863 Eton had won 19 and Harrow 16, the remaining three matches being drawn. The match had been played regularly since 1832 (apart from 1856 and 1857). Of the eight previous fixtures Harrow men still object to the first being considered as one of the series, contending that it is no more correct to count 1805 than the rejected 1857 match which was for boys under 20.

Harrow gained the lead in the series in the next 37 years. The main reason for Eton's partial eclipse until 1900 was an overall weakness in bowling. In fact they won the match only three times between 1877 and 1900 against 10 Harrow victories. Drawn matches now became more frequent but a suggestion that the match should be of three days' duration was strongly resisted by

the Eton Headmaster, Dr. Warre.

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Mr. H. S. Altham has described the period under review as "The Halcyon Days of Amateur Cricket." The two great schools can point proudly to the many illustrious cricketers produced before the turn of the century. At Eton such players as: H. W. Bainbridge, Hon. Ivo Bligh, B. J. T. Bosanquet, F. M. Buckland, Lord Harris, Lord Hawke, A. Lubbock, The Lyttelton family (reviewed elsewhere in this book), F. Marchant, R. A. H. Mitchell, C. J. Ottaway, C. C. Pilkington, the Studd family (J. E. K., G. B., and C. T.), and C. I. Thornton. Over the same period Harrow produced: C. F. Buller, F. C. Cobden, E. M. Dowson, W. H. Hadow, H. T. Hewitt, A. N. Hornby, F. S. Jackson, M. C. Kemp, A. C. MacLaren, W. B. Money, W. H. Patterson, the Walker family (V. E., R. D. and I. D.) and A. J. Webbe.

Other Public School Cricket, 1864-1900

Originally there had been an inter-school week at Lord's in which Eton, Harrow and Winchester played against each other. "Lord's" still defines those who have won their colours at Winchester, though they no longer play there. Winchester's only regular school fixture till the First World War was the Eton matchesecond only in importance (except for Wykhamists) to the Eton and Harrow encounter. This is now played in alternate years at the two schools. Winchester more than held their own in the last years of the century with the help of such fine cricketers as R. P. Lewis, H. D. G. Leveson Gower and J. R. Mason.

Even before 1864 Charterhouse were playing Westminster (1850), Rugby v. Marlborough (1855) and Marlborough v. Cheltenham (1856). These are among the earliest regular school fixtures and before 1900 what great players they produced! To name but a few: F. L. Fane, C. A. and G. O. Smith, and E. G. Wynyard from

Charterhouse, P. F. Warner, E. R. Wilson and W. Yardley (Rugby), the Druce's (W. G. and N. F.), A. J. L. Hill, R. H. Spooner and A. G. Steel (Marlborough), E. I. M. Barrett, A. H. du Boulay, F. H. B. Champain and H. V. Page (Cheltenham).

Other great school contests were to begin during the early years of Wisden. Uppingham v. Repton (1865), Haileybury v. Wellington (1866), Haileybury v. Uppingham (1868), Malvern v. Repton (1871), Clifton v. Cheltenham (1872), Dulwich v. Tonbridge

(1874) and Cheltenham v. Haileybury (1893).

These matches saw the start of many famous cricket careers. Malvern in her short history could acclaim C. J. Burnup, S. H. Day, W. H. B. Evans, the Fosters (H. K., R. E. and W. L.) and G. H. Simpson (later Simpson-Hayward). Repton produced C. B. Fry and the Palairets (L. C. H. and R. C. N.) whilst the names of K. J. Key, C. L. Townsend (Clifton), G. MacGregor, W. S. Patterson (Uppingham), A. C. M. Croome, G. J. Mordaunt and G. J. V. Weigall (Wellington) show in no small measure how much English cricket owed to her Public Schools.

Despite all this talent no less an authority than Mr H. S. Altham is constrained to write: "I am not sure that the greatest boy player of the whole epoch was not V. F. S. Crawford. True the opposition he encountered at Whitgift was not of the first water, but when he did come up against first-class bowling he dealt with it as summarily as any other." Halcyon Days indeed!

This period ending in the tragedy of war saw the flowering of Public School Cricket to full bloom. The first representative match was played at Lord's in 1904 between M.C.C. and the Public Schools. Lord's Schools v. The Rest in 1913 began a series in which many fine cricketers were to make their first appearance at Headquarters on the side of "The Rest," whilst players on both sides were to become famous in more exalted company.

It was during this period that Shrewsbury began their matches with Repton (1901) and Uppingham (1909). Clifton played Rugby for the first time in 1909. The war years introduced such famous matches as Clifton v. Tonbridge (1914), Winchester v. Charterhouse (1915), Harrow v. Charterhouse and Winchester (1916), Malvern v. Cheltenham (1916), Winchester v. Marlborough (1917) and Rugby v. Uppingham (1917).

Eton v. Harrow, 1901-1919

Harrow's ascendancy continued for the first three years of the century. In 1901 the team included three future University captains in E. W. Mann, K. M. Carlisle and C. H. Eyre. F. J. V. Hopley was also to win a Blue and H. P. Chaplin later played for Sussex. The tide turned in 1903 and 1904, Eton winning by an innings on both occasions. The one-day games during the war are not counted in the series and Harrow could claim victories only in 1907 and

1908 when they had two strong sides, which included M. C. Bird. The Hon, R. Anson, M. Falcon, G. F. Earle and G. E. V. Crutchlev. Other subsequently well-known players at Harrow at this time were T. O. Jameson, G. R. Jackson, G. Wilson and C. D.

Gray.

Eton had some fine sides before the war and by 1919 were ahead in the series again. The most famous of all school matches took place in 1910. Eton, compelled to follow on, found themselves four runs ahead of Harrow with nine second innings wickets down. Fowler, top scorer in the first innings, was out for 64 in the second. Only a brave partnership of 50 in twenty-three minutes between J. N. Manners and K. Lister-Kaye made it possible to set Harrow 55 to win. "Fowler's match" has been described many times before—it reads like fiction. In 10 overs Fowler took eight for 23 to give Eton victory by nine runs in front of 10,000 people, inspiring in future Eton XI's a frame of mind which continued for many years to give them the edge over their opponents. No less than 42 Etonians at school between 1901 and 1919 were to appear later in first-class cricket. Most famous are their England cricketers N. C. Tufnell, N. E. Haig, Lord Tennyson, R. T. Stanyforth and G. O. Allen. In addition during this time at Eton were P. F. C. Williams, M. N. Kenyon, Sir William Worsley, Lord Cornwallis and W. G. L. F. Lowndes, all of whom captained their counties. Those fine players R. H. Twining and R. Aird will be remembered not only for their cricket but for their services in the administration of the game.

Other Public Schools, 1901-1919

Winchester defeated Eton in 1904 and 1907 but on the whole they had rather the worse of their solitary school encounter. Many Wykhamists regard the 1904 side as the best the school has ever had. E. L. Wright, the captain, now in his fourth year in the XI, had with him C. N. Bruce (later Lord Aberdare), H. Teesdale and J. H. Gordon, who all won Blues. The war years brought forth five of the best cricketers Winchester had ever seen in the three Ashton brothers (G., H. and C. T.), J. C. Clay and D. R. Jardine. The renewal of the two-day Eton fixture in 1919 saw a strong team captained by Jardine victorious by 69 runs. This was a powerful XI in which no less than seven players were to play later in firstclass cricket and only one, the Oxford blue, M. Patten, did not represent a county. The others besides Jardine were C. T. Ashton, R. H. Hill, W. F. Baldock, T. B Raikes and J. E. Frazer. During these 19 years Winchester gave 16 future Blues to the Universities including H. C. McDonell, A. G. Pawson and A. J. Evans. Other fine players of the period were A. C. Johnston, G. P. R. Toynber, D. M. Evans, R. de B. Evans, P. M. Hall and C. P. Brutton, all of whom played for Hampshire. Mr. E. R. Wilson who was coach at Winchester for 20 years has written that he considered H.S. R. Critchley-Salmonson in 1912 the best school bowler he

had ever seen.

Few schools can show such a succession of good sides as Repton himed out in this glorious era of her history. In 1903 they lost only one match, and that by one run. In 1905 they were unbeaten. The 1903 eleven contained R. A. Young, E. A. Greswell, J. N. Crawford, N. V. C. Turner, W. L. Price and A. L. Morcom-all of whom were to be seen later in first-class cricket. J. N. Crawford was captain in 1905 and Mr. H. S. Altham who was in that team writes: "There has never been a better Public School cricketer." A year before he left school he made 54 in his first match for Surrey and took 44 wickets for under 16 apiece before the end of the season for his county. The year after he left school he accomplished the double and represented the Gentlemen at Lord's. Others in the 1905 side, which won eight and drew one included R. H. T. Turner, N. V. C. Turner and W. T. Greswell. Three years later H. S. Altham, captaining the side for a second year, had with him not only R. H. T. Turner and W. T. Greswell but also R. Sale, I. P. F. Campbell, J. L. S. Vidler, A. T. Sharp and W. B. Franklin, all of whom were to play first-class cricket and also A. E. Cardew, who was asked, but was not able to play for his county! Just before the war Repton included The Hon. F. S. G. Calthorpe and the two brothers M. and J. Howell. The former made his name as a batsman but John was killed in action in 1915 which "surely robbed England of a great opener." During the war G. F. Bell, H. M. Morris, R. L. Holdsworth and A. J. Holmes continued Repton's great cricket tradition.

Malvern may have had rather the worse of the argument with their great rivals but they had very strong sides in 1901, 1907 and 1910. W. H. B. Evans, A. P. Day, G. N. and M. K. Foster,* C. C. Page, H. L. Simms, W. J. Bird, F. T. Mann, D. J. Knight and N. E. Partridge are but a few of a host of young cricketers who owed much to the coaching of Mr. C. Toppin during this period to 1924.

If Malvern and Repton were going through a golden age, other schools were also providing cricketers who were to become well known in the wider field of first-class cricket. Space prevents naming but a few: H. A. Gilbert, J. S. F. Morrison, R. C. Robertson-Glasgow (Charterhouse), K. R. B. Fry, M. G. Salter, G. E. C. Wood, G. O. Shelmerdine (Cheltenham), R. P. Keigwin, A. F. Bickmore, A. E. J. Collins (who did not appear in first-class cricket but made 628 not out in a house match!) (Clifton), N. A. Knox, R. K. Nunes, A. E. R., A. H. H. and F. W. Gilligan (Dulwich), G. N. Bignell, H. D. Hake, N. M. Hughes-Hallett, F. J. Seabrook

(Haileybury), G. G. Napier, D. C. Robinson, M. F. S. Jewell, S. H. Saville, J. F. Ireland (Marlborough), D. C. F. Burton, R. A. Boddington, C. P. Johnstone, J. L. and R. T. Bryan, M. D. and B. H. Lyon, G. A. Rotherham (Rugby), A. W. Carr (Sherborne), K. L. Hutchings, F. H. and C. H. Knott, L. P. Hedges (Tonbridge), A. P. F. Chapman (Uppingham) and C. H. Taylor (Westminster).

These then from the traditional cricket schools but other schools were now beginning to produce fine players: F. R. Foster (Solihull), J. W. H. T. Douglas (Felsted), P. G. H. Fender (St. Paul's), G. T. S. Stevens (U.C.S.) and J. C. White (Taunton) being famous fore-runners from the lesser known cricket schools who were soon to

produce many notable players.

In the 1913 Wisden Mr. W. J. Ford suggested that a match between the Butterfly schools (Eton, Harrow, Winchester, Rugby, Charterhouse and Westminster) and the Rest would be of great value. He selected two "teams." The Rest included boys from Wellingborough, Brighton, Rossall, Forest and Edinburgh Academy. Was this the seed from which grew the match between Lord's Schools and The Rest?

In the 1918 and 1919 editions of Wisden there appeared photographs of five Public School bowlers and five Public School cricketers—the only occasion on which this has happened and

replacing the usual Five Cricketers of the Year.

Early editions of Wisden headed the Public School section with a quotation. Referring to school matches The Times in August 1857 had written that "It is important to secure a race of young Englishmen who in the days to come, when our bones have mouldered away, shall retain the grasp of England upon the world."

How many more famous names could now be recorded here if it had not been for the 1914–18 war? In 1916 Mr. E. B. Noel wrote "Other parts of *Wisden* testify to the services that Public School cricketers have done for their country. The list shows how great is the number of famous cricketers and of those of great promise who have given their lives for the Empire." In the three small war-time issues, 1916–18, over 200 pages were devoted to the Roll of Honour. They bear silent testimony to those who retained "The grasp of England upon the world."

School Cricket between the Wars

First-class cricket between the Wars continued to benefit from, and enjoy the so-called "Amateur approach" of many Public School cricketers. What was most noticeable was the ever-widening area from which they came, and this is made evident from the list of Blues given in *Wisden* from 1925 onwards. That the war years had not unduly handicapped the ability of school cricketers is shown by the large number of fine players who were able to give their

talents to the game in the 1920's. In 1921 the hitherto unbeaten Australians were sensationally defeated at Eastbourne by a team raised by A. C. MacLaren. Most of his side consisted of men who had been playing school cricket during or shortly before the 1914-18 War.

In 1920 Sir Pelham Warner raised the team to play the Schools. This had previously been an M.C.C. fixture but from 1921 it was taken over by the Army until 1939. In 1926 a Public School XV played the visiting Australian Touring Team but the match was

rather one-sided and has never been repeated.

Eton v. Harrow, 1920-1939

Harrow had last beaten Eton in 1908 and they were to wait 111 1939 before tasting the fruits of victory again amidst scenes of great rejoicing. Crowds still flocked to the match, even if not in mite the same density. Thus between 1920 and 1939 Eton won six. Harrow one and the remaining 13 games were drawn. Despite their lack of positive success in the great match Harrow had some fine sides. In 1921, for example, although defeated by seven wickets their eleven contained five cricketers who were destined to win Blues: L. G. Crawley, H. F. Bagnall, P. H. Stewart-Brown, H. J. Enthoven, C. T. Bennett. The long series of drawn matches between 1922 and 1927 and again between 1932 and 1936 were due to a variety of circumstances not least, one suspects, a determination not to allow the old "enemy" to triumph. Towards the end of the period under review Harrow, through their captains, made many friends by their positive efforts to gain a victory, culminating in the tremendously popular result to the 1939 match. Other notable cricketers from the school during this era were: R. E. C. Butterworth, N. M. Ford, A. M. Crawley, M. Tindall, J. H. Pawle, B. D. Carris, P. M. Studd and R. A. A. Holt.

Year in, year out Eton cricket at this time was exceedingly strong. Mr. R. A. Young took over the cricket from Mr. C. M. Wells in 1920 and in that year George Hirst began his long and illustrious career as coach which was not to end until 1938. His

side never lost at Lord's!

The victorious elevens in 1920 and 1921 included R. Aird, G. O. Allen, P. E. Laurie and the Hon. J. B. Coventry in addition to W. W. Hill-Wood (1920) and Lord Dunglass (1921). Between the two Wars Eton won no less than 19 Cricket Blues and altogether 40 Old Etonians appeared in first-class cricket. Amongst all this talent perhaps the best-known players between 1922 and 1939 were: E. W. Dawson, G. C. Newman, D. J. and C. K. H. Hill-Wood, P. V. F. Cazalet, R. H. R. Buckston, Lord Hazelrigg, I. A. Akers-Douglas, Hon. C. J. Lyttelton (now Lord Cobham), A. W. Allen, A. G. Pelham, N. S. Hotchkin, J. M. Brocklebank, F. G. and J. P. Mann, D. H. Macindoe and A. J. B. Marsham.

The Other "Lord's Schools," 1920-1939

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Rugby and Marlborough won four matches each with the remainder drawn between 1920 and 1939. Neither school produced many famous players but the general level of their cricket continued to be of a good standard. Perhaps their best-known players from this era are P. T. Eckersley, E. F. Longrigg, M. M. Walford, D. G. Clark and J. R. Bridger (Rugby) and Sir G. E. B. Abell, S. A. Block, J. T. H. Comber, J. W. Seamer (Marlborough).

Cheltenham won six against Haileybury's five and Tonbridge had the better of the argument against Clifton with eight victories against four during this era. There is no doubt that K. S. Duleepsinhji was Cheltenham's greatest cricketer. Others who have played in first-class cricket are E. M. Wellings, D. A. C. Page, T. A. Higson, E. D. R. Eagar and D. C. Brooke-Taylor. Haileybury for their part can claim R. E. H. Hudson, R. J. O. Meyer, E. N. Evans and F. St. G. Unwin.

As far as can be discovered very few players in the Clifton v. Tonbridge match appeared later in first-class cricket. B. O. Allen and E. K. Scott (Clifton) and J. G. W. Davies, T. A. Crawford and J. R. Thompson (Tonbridge) are the best known.

"The Rest," 1920-1939

The general standard of cricket at Winchester at this time was very high. True, the bowling was never as strong as the batting, which accounted for many of the 15 drawn games against Eton, but the school could usually point to having one of the best school sides of the year. In the 1920's J. L. Guise, P. G. T. Kingsley, G. S. Grimston, A. W. Richardson, I. D. K. Fleming, R. S. G. Scott R. de W. K. Winlaw, D. C. H. Townsend, R. G. Tindall; and in the 1930's A. R. Legard, M. R. Barton, J. N. Grover, J. D. Eggar, K. B. Scott, Sir D. T. L. Bailey, R. B. Proud and H. A. Pawson give sufficient evidence of the quality of Winchester cricket between the wars. All told between 1920 and 1939 the school provided 17 Blues and 14 others who played in County cricket.

Of the schools so far not mentioned, Charterhouse, Dulwich, Malvern, Repton, Shrewsbury and Uppingham were probably the strongest. Cricket standards are apt to go in cycles, but in the 20 years under review, schools who could turn out cricketers of the calibre of the following names, will have more good years than bad. This period of school cricket coincided with an advance in standards at schools which hitherto had not provided many great players. Now more than ever was it impossible to say which were the strongest school elevens. G. T. S. Stevens, who had the unique distinction of playing for the Gentlemen whilst he was still at University College School, was the first of a series of such players.

St. Paul's provided E. T. Killick, H. M. Garland-Wells, A.K. Judd, C. H. L. Skeet and P. F. Judge. Highgate gave R. W. V. Robins, Leys—F. R. Brown, and Downside—M. J. Turnbull to English Cricket. St. Peter's, York, gave Yorkshire two of her greatest captains in A. B. Sellers and N. W. D. Yardley. It was from Glasgow Academy that I. A. R. Peebles learnt his secrets of flight and spin. The list is almost endless and many names and schools are inadvertently omitted but space must be found to include M. J. C. Allom and G. J. Bryan (Wellington), R. G. Hunt and T. C. Longfield (Aldenham), P. Cranmer, E. J. H. Dixon and P. A. Gibb (St. Edward's, Oxford), W. H. V. Levett (Brighton), N. S. Mitchell-Innes (Sedbergh), W. Murray Wood (Mill Hill), C. G. A. Paris (King's, Canterbury), T. N. Pearce (Christ's Hospital), A. Ratcliffe and W. Wooller (Rydal).

The War Years, 1940-45

Once more the guns halted the regular sound of bat on ball. Six seasons were taken from the lives of those who lived. There were many who would never put their flannels on again. During this war school cricket carried on as normally as possible, though Eton and Harrow played one-day matches away from Lord's and these are not counted in the official series. Apart from this game the schools' week at Lord's continued throughout, apart from 1944 when the flying bombs over London prompted a temporary halt. Even in that year the Lord's Schools played The Rest and a Lord's XI played a representative Public School side.

These matches gave our school cricketers some experience of a higher class of cricket even though the standard was naturally lower than before. Masters and professionals were otherwise engaged and boys left school earlier for reasons known to the German High Command. Despite all this the war years provided a nucleus of at least 25 young amateurs who were to help County Cricket Clubs in the years immediately following the war, among them T. E. Bailey and A. W. H. Mallett (Dulwich), N. D. Howard (Rossall), W. H. H. Sutcliffe (Rydal), G. H. G. Doggart (Winchester), D. E. Blake (Aldenham), D. B. Carr (Repton) and P. B. H. May (Charterhouse).

In 1945 for the first time since 1913 the Lord's Schools' match against The Rest was replaced by Southern Schools v. Northern

Schools—a further compliment to those schools who used to be termed "The Rest." They were getting too numerous and powerfull

The Years since 1946

The two representative fixtures were again changed in the first full season of peacetime cricket. Since 1946 Southern Schools have played The Rest and the full Public Schools XI have had the

Combined Services as their regular opponents.

Since the war Harrow have won four to Eton's three matches whilst 10 have been drawn. It is extraordinary, after so many years, that the oldest school rivals at Lord's should be so level in their results. Thus Eton have now played Harrow 127 times (officially!) and Eton lead by six in the series. Tonbridge and Rugby are slightly ahead of Clifton and Marlborough but a "cycle" could soon change that and Cheltenham could draw level with Haileybury in 1963 in their 64th encounter!

In 1946 Wisden noted "a natural stylist." A 13-year-old Tonbridge boy who was mainly instrumental in his school's victory over Clifton by two runs. M. C. Cowdrey made 75 and 44 and took eight wickets in the match. In the following year P. B. H. May scored 148 for Southern Schools and followed this up with 146 against the Combined Services. Shades of things to come!

There is a strange fascination in selecting imaginary teams. Given all the players in their prime the following team of schoolboys since 1940 would surely give a good account of themselves against any generation of school cricketers. In batting order:

D. S. Sheppard (Sherborne), M. J. Stewart (Alleyn's), P. B. H. May (Charterhouse), M. C. Cowdrey (Tonbridge), E. R. Dexter (Radley), T. E. Bailey (Dulwich), R. W. Barber (Ruthin), A. C. Smith (King Edward's, Birmingham), C. D. Drybrough (Highgate), R. I. Jefferson (Winchester) and R. G. Marlar (Harrow).

The batting of this team is immensely powerful with Bailey and Barber in the middle in the unlikely event of something going wrong! The bowling is varied if not particularly penetrative and

the fielding and catching should be good.

Now let us look at some of the reserves who many would doubtless include: J. G. Dewes (Aldenham), G. H. G. Doggart and the Nawab of Pataudi (Winchester), M. J. K. Smith (Stamford), D. B. Carr (Repton), R. M. Prideaux (Tonbridge), D. R. W. Sik (Christ's Hospital), P. J. Sharpe (Worksop), A. W. H. Mallett (Dulwich), C. S. Smith (Williams Hulmes), R. A. Gale (Bedford Modern) and A. J. Corran (Gresham's).

The names of these players give only part of the story of the Public School contribution to English cricket since the war. Let us look at some County Captains. T. E. Bailey (Dulwich and Essex), A. J. Corran (Gresham's and Notts), R. G. Marlar (Harrow), G. H. G. Doggart (Winchester), D. S. Sheppard (Sherborne) and

F. R. Dexter (Radley), all of Sussex. S. S. Rogers (Highgate) and G. E. S. Woodhouse (Marlborough) both of Somerset. N. D. Howard (Rossall) and R. W. Barber (Ruthin) of Lancashire. A.C.D. Ingleby-Mackenzie (Eton and Hampshire). C. T. M. Pugh (Rton and Gloucestershire). D. Kirby (St. Peter's, York and Leicestershire). W. H. H. Sutcliffe (Rydal and Yorkshire). D. B. Carr (Repton and Derbyshire). P. B. H. May (Charterhouse and Surrey). I. P. Bedford (Woodhouse and Middlesex). O. S. Wheatlev (King Edward's, Birmingham and Glamorgan).

This is quite a list for these days when the future of the Amateur is under the microscope. Others who have appeared in first-

class cricket somewhat irregularly since the war are:-

Since 1945 that stern critic Mr. E. M. Wellings has been following the fortunes and standards of school cricket in Wisden each year. He has been rightly indignant that, at times, the fielding of the boys has not been first rate during the week at Lord's. There is no reason why eleven young athletes should not show the keenest and most exciting fielding of the year at Headquarters, but much depends on the enthusiasm and personality not only of the master in charge but above all the school captain himself. In the 1950 edition of Wisden Mr. J. D. Eggar replied to some of Mr. Wellings'

strictures in an article of much sound sense.

It was good to read in Wisden last year that Mr. Wellings felt the standard of cricket in our Public Schools has never been higher than in 1961. Young cricketers like R. A. Hutton (Repton), A. R. Windows (Clifton), M. M. Mannaseh (Epsom), B. A. Richardson (Malvern), M. W. Mence (Bradfield), and M. G. Griffith (Marlborough) have their careers before them. It is to be hoped that they can find the time and the inclination to give their talents to the greatest of all games and thus continue the great cricket traditions of our Public Schools to the ultimate benefit of English cricket as a whole.

THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN 1962

By E. M. WELLINGS

Several excellent schoolboy cricketers had no chance of establishing their claims to inclusion in the representative team of 1962. It was particularly unfortunate that most of the trial game at Lord's, Southern Schools v. The Rest, should have been rained off. The rest of it was rather curiously called off. After less than two hours of play on the first day it was decided to regard that cricket as non-existent and to start a new game on the second. I am still baffled by the logic of the move, to say nothing of the equity of expunging performances then put up. The effect of the decision would have been to reduce the trial game from one of four hours of batting to three hours by each side. In the event the rain continued. and no further cricket was possible.

The representative team had to be chosen entirely on school reputation. Some, such as M. D. Mence of Bradfield, M. G. Griffith of Marlborough and E. W. J. Fillary of St. Lawrence, Ramsgate, had established reputations which rendered their selection automatic. It must have been much more difficult to evaluate the performances during the term of those in the running for the final positions. E. T. Razzall, for instance, was an allrounder with a batting average of 57.75 and a bowling average of 10.04 at St. Paul's and yet could not win a place on reputation. I have long thought it unfortunate that there is not more representative school cricket at Lord's.

Public School cricket, and the game generally, would benefit if, I suggest, there could be three trial games before the representative match instead of one. My idea is to collect three area teams from the Public Schools and one from the English Schools Cricket Association to play two games. A final trial could then be played between two sides chosen from the 44 players, and the Schools cricket festival would end with the representative match, though not perhaps against Combined Services as at present.

Such a programme could be arranged only at the expense of the three inter-school matches which now occupy the week before the trial game. The matches are very pleasant for those of us who were at one of the six schools, but it would be reasonable to ask us to sacrifice them for the general good of schools cricket. The present programme at Lord's caters too exclusively for a handful of schools at the expense of the great majority. Moreover, it is obvious that the many, many schools affiliated to the English Schools Association should be included no less than the Public Schools. Their one-day game against H. S. Altham's Public Schools team at Lord's was another fixture rained off. A year in which the trial match is washed out to the great disappointment of the hopes of 11 of those chosen to take part in it, improves the argument in favour of some change such as I have suggested.

What little cricket was played in the trial game of 1962 revealed the obvious class of one of the outstanding players of the year. He was Fillary, who made 44 of the 69 the Southern Schools scored for two wickets. Both then and when he was the only early batsman in the Public Schools side who stayed long against the Services on an awkward, rain affected pitch, he looked a thoroughly good and surprisingly mature batsman. He had a wide range of strokes; he got well behind and over each ball; he was watchful and at the same time aggressive. Though others scored more runs against the Services, none looked quite such a good schoolboy bat. We saw just enough of Mence in the trial game to indicate that he was in the same high class, but not enough of Griffith to add to our ideas about his batting.

Fillary was also a leg-spinner. Youthful exponents of that brand of bowling, which puts a severe strain on the arm muscles before they attain their full strength, seldom maintain their skill as adults. We must hope that Fillary is an exception, for I cannot recall seeing a boy who imparted such vicious spin to the ball. He was inaccurate against the Services, but when he pitched a leg-break, or more obviously a googly, it turned with a fizz that beat everything in sight. There was obviously great potential in Fillary. For his school he made 869 runs with an average of 96.55, and his 55 wickets cost only 9.76 each. He had advanced considerably since we saw him at Lord's in 1961. In 1963 he was scheduled to be at Oxford, and there I hope, despite modern suspicion of such bowling, his leg-breaks and googlies will be encouraged.

Only Mence looked a more thorough all-rounder during the days at Lord's. He, unlike Fillary, was playing there for the first time. Had he belonged to any other school than Bradfield, he would surely have figured in the trial game of the previous year. But Bradfield had two other outstanding players selected for that game and Mence had to wait his turn. When it came he took it splendidly. As a left-handed batsman he was showing his quality when rain destroyed the first game. He did not score well against the Services, but he bowled so well that his subsequent good start in county cricket with Warwickshire was no surprise.

Mence took eight for 34 in the first innings, including a spell of five for one, and altogether ten for 96 in the match. From a controlled run and strong action, which made the fullest use of body movement, he was the type of bowler who appears to gather pace from the pitch. He had been well grounded in the cardinal virtues of length and direction, and he varied in pace from being fast enough to knock a stump clean from the ground to medium when he was able to exploit finger spin. For a schoolboy he was an

all-rounder quite out of the ordinary, as were his school figures—846 runs, average 70.5, and 84 wickets, average 10.62, both being records for the School. Of his three centuries one was hit before lunch.

Griffith had a comparatively lean time at Lord's. On the eve of playing there he suffered a severe finger injury. A bottle of ginger pop burst as he was opening it and almost sliced off the top pad of the middle finger of his right hand. He played against his doctor's advice, and, if he could not succeed with the bat, he kept wicket surprisingly well for Marlborough against Rugby. His wounded finger was still more troublesome in the representative match, and he could not repeat that form, handicapped as he was when having to take unfamiliar bowling, particularly the difficult spin of Fillary Later he was fit to keep wicket excellently for Sussex, and we are obviously safe in accepting his splendid record at Marlborough at face value. If he did not match his remarkable scoring feats of the previous summer, he still scored more than 600 runs. Moreover. he and B. A. Richardson (Malvern) were the only players who scored centuries against the powerful Rhodesian Fawns during their 25-match tour of our Public Schools.

Richardson, the third of the Worcestershire cricketing brothers, was one of several other gifted players in a season remarkable for the batting strength. He batted left-handed, like his brothers, with a polish of stroke that promises well for the future. Though he bowled his leg-breaks little at Malvern, handing over that job to G. M. Lawson, who headed the averages, his captain at Lord's called him to action. He bowled well enough to indicate that it would be a pity for him to concentrate solely on his batting. English cricket can do with all the spin it can find in these days of

famine.

It was as well that the schools had so much batting. Griffith, captain for the second year, took first innings when he won the toss against the Services, and, as the pitch played, his side had the worst of the conditions. Few such sides could have recovered effectively from 61 for five, but the next two batsmen, R. M. C. Gilliat (Charterhouse) and M. A. Freedman (Haileybury), would in most years have been among those first five. They added 101 and batted uncommonly well. Gilliat, who had made nearly 700 runs for Charterhouse, was the more polished, a left-hander as elegant and polished as Richardson and with a similarly wide range of strokes. His cutting was perhaps the most notable feature of his play, but he also drove excellently and once hooked Buss, the young Sussex professional, for six. Freedman was less graceful, but his batting was basically correct, and he was particularly strong when punching the ball with powerful forearms off the front foot.

Earlier in the order R. E. J. Chambers (Forest) batted robustly, a trifle rough and ready perhaps, but a spirited performer who

swung the bat freely, and M. R. Guest's play explained how he had scored 944 runs for Rugby. He was the most studious of all the young batsmen on show. Against the Services he played much the same role in the second innings as did Gilliat and Freedman in the first, except that he played it on a much lower note. I do not intend in any way to belittle his cricket by suggesting that he was too studious in method. He had perhaps watched some modern professional batsmen too closely, those who employ no back lift. If keeping one's wicket intact is the sole consideration, a method based on merely raising the bat from the block hole and proffering it to the ball cannot be faulted. But the primary object of cricket is the scoring of runs. Matches are won by runs, not by time spent at the wicket.

Guest was a bat raiser. He took it back with the wrists only when he saw a chance to play an attacking stroke. But the man who does that can take advantage only of the most obvious scoring openings. His pick-up is an afterthought. The man who is prepared to take advantage of all such openings, even those he spots late, is the one whose first movement is the purposeful pick-up as the bowler delivers the ball. That Guest did not lack the ability to hit the ball we could see when he did spot the scoring chance sufficiently early to adjust his pick-up and give the ball a hearty crack.

The same feature was noticeable in J. Hopper, who played two considerable innings for Marlborough against Rugby. In the first innings as a bat raiser he scored 79 with undue deliberation. In the second, when his side needed runs quickly, he picked the bat up and attacked magnificently, actually running to his first 50 inside half an hour. In that innings of 84 he was without inhibitions. Attack was his means of defence. I believe he and Guest, and others like them, should put more faith in their attack than in their ability

to survive by unambitious methods.

The Schools side was composed largely of all-rounders. In addition to Mence, Fillary and Richardson, Guest, a medium pacer, Freedman, slow left-arm, and J. Worsdale (Denstone) qualified under this heading. Worsdale had to bat at number nine. That was final proof of the batting strength. To me his batting, and particularly his driving, was more impressive than his slow bowling. Without Mence the bowling would have been obviously weaker than usual. School cricket is a reflection of the first-class game. Pitches of lush green grass, on which any hack who can hold the seam upright and leave it to do the work is successful, have put such emphasis on seam bowling in the counties that spin has fallen to a woefully low standard. That trend is reflected in the schools. There was not one orthodox spin bowler in the representative side of true class. The left-handed A. H. Barker had done well for Charterhouse, 46 wickets at 18.15, but he was disappointingly ordinary at Lord's.

More likely orthodox spinners helped Cheltenham to the most remarkable win of the Schools fortnight at Lord's. They beat Hailevbury after losing their first seven wickets for 23, and after having their first innings total passed for the loss of only one Hailevburian wicket. The main architects of that remarkable recovery in addition to the leading batsman, P. A. Baker, were N. C. P. Winstanley, a left-hander, and P. A. Evill, an off-spinner The former was the more successful, an obviously good how bowler, but to me Evill looked the one with the greater potential He had an admirably business-like action. To digress a moment and write as a Cheltonian, some of the satisfaction of that remark. able win was lost when Haileybury, in the final innings, continued to blaze for victory when all hope of achieving it had disappeared. Cheltenham have had little to cheer in recent years. We should have been happier in victory if Haileybury had made sterner efforts to save the game when the chance of victory had gone. Equally we should have been pleased at moral victory if their efforts had succeeded.

It is now called sporting to play in such a way as to give the opposition a chance of winning. It is widely done in the county game, but that is not true cricket. The object of the game is to win. When that becomes impossible the secondary object is to attain an honourable draw. Thoughts about giving the other side a chance are absurdly out of place in any team game, and I have no patience with those who urge altruistic declarations on school captains. I have a cutting from one of our leading newspapers which criticises the Shrewsbury captain, who was never in the game with a chance of winning, for not throwing the game with Uppingham open by making such a declaration. The Shrewsbury captain most obviously followed the correct course. The writer was equally obviously at fault. Such writings do damage to school cricket.

Reverting to the season at Lord's, Mence's opening partner, R. Titchener Barrett, did not take a Services wicket. Less than justice was done him, for he appeared a pretty good fast bowler. He had a vigorous action, which should serve him well in the future. He will bowl less well than he did at Lord's and be successful. The reserve bowling, like the batting, was on show only briefly during the trial game. The Rest bowlers suffered from a common fault; they arrived at the wicket showing their chests instead of their left sides to the batsman.

The representative game was drawn, an excellent result when it is remembered that the boys had the worst of the pitch conditions. Only in the matter of bodily strength were the matured Services cricketers perhaps superior. As a team they were not so workmanlike, nor so purposeful. Though the Schools fielding was not generally quite so good as in the previous few years, it was noticeably better than that of their opponents. In several respects

the Services did not set a good example for the young to follow, and several cricket masters in the pavilion disapproved strongly. In particular the young medium-paced bowler who did not shed his sweater throughout a lengthy spell, and who strolled back so leisurely that he spent nearly 100 seconds each over walking to his mark, aroused their ire. They were equally critical of the captain for not correcting the young man. It seems that the M.C.C. might find more suitable opposition for the boys in their big match.

Of the individual schools Bradfield perhaps deserve first mention. They were unbeaten in 15 matches, and since they have lost only five inter-school games in the past 11 years they have the strongest possible claims to be considered the most consistent team of the period. At the start of the term the prospects were not good; that a new side was fashioned so successfully proves how well founded cricket is at Bradfield. Another Mence seems to be on the way up. Among the new members of the side was G. R. J. Roope, who at the age of 15 made 611 runs, took 11 wickets and became a first-rate slip fielder.

Only St. Lawrence, Ramsgate, of the other more famous cricketing schools, went through the season unbeaten. Several lost once only, and among them were two who have not often figured prominently in recent years. St. Paul's, thriving on the allround excellence of Razzall, and Tonbridge were the two. St. Paul's won all their inter-school matches and were clearly the outstanding side in London. They won eight games, and so did Tonbridge, for whom six batsmen averaged over 30. At their head was D. P. Toft, one of the unlucky trialists in the Southern Schools side at Lord's, with 603 runs in 10 completed innings. Among them, too, was P. J. C. Canney, who hit a century in 95 minutes against Dulwich. Tonbridge spent the season proving that enterprise pays on the cricket field. Sedbergh, another school beaten only once, added to the existing evidence that bowlers win matches, and Bedford with the all-round strength of an exceptionally young side enjoyed a similar record. In Scotland, Loretto with nine wins and one defeat were the most successful team. They could look forward to even greater success in 1963, for nine of the current side were booked to remain at school for another year.

Though Winchester are still in process of regaining the power they possessed in the days of Pataudi and Jefferson, they continue to do memorable deeds. This time they shared with Eton a classic match, in which both sides won honour and Eton the ultimate thrilling victory by six runs two minutes from time. Eton had their best season for many years, but they did not have a single representative in the trial teams at Lord's. In their palmy days before the war Etonians habitually formed the hard core of the Public Schools XI

Minor Counties.

schools of Rhodesia, and a combination too powerful for individual English schools, was an admirable venture. They were not by any

means the first visiting team of youngsters to this country-I

played my first match for Cheltenham against Haverford College from U.S.A., and collected a duck, in 1925—but they were by far

the most powerful. They played splendidly aggressive cricket. It was arranged that in 1963 a still more powerful combination representing all the South African schools, including those of Rhodesia, should tour here. Their quality may be judged by the fact that only one Fawn gained inclusion in the 1962 team. The best English school sides could not match their strength, but the programme was being widened to include games against some

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RHODESIAN SCHOOLS IN ENGLAND

By CHARLES BURTON

A team of fifteen Rhodesian Schools Cricketers, styled "The Fawns," drawn from ten schools (the first Rhodesian side from any sport to visit England), took part in a memorable tour in May and June. Twenty of the 25 matches played during the tourists' six weeks' stay were won and five drawn, each of the drawn games ending much in the Fawns' favour. What was in store for opponents was made ominously evident by the crushing defeat inflicted by the Fawns on a Forty Club side including the brothers Bedser, J. W. Martin, V. J. Ransome, A. J. McIntyre and A. F. Skinner, all players of County experience, in the first match of the tour at The Oval. After declaring at 262 for three the Fawns dismissed the Club for 135. Such was the strength of the batting that in 17 matches, they declared at a total of over 200, and were never fully dismissed! Indeed, in their 25 matches they scored an aggregate of 52,321 runs for the loss of only 114 wickets, an average of 212 runs per match, and 46.70 per individual innings. Six of the side scored hundreds, the two most memorable innings being 159 not out, including ten 6's and fifteen 4's in eighty-five minutes by S. Barbour, against Eastbourne College, and 143 not out, including four 6's and twenty-one 4's in an hour and three-quarters by W. Hodnett against the Forty Club.

Although possessing only one pace bowler, D. Northcroft, who took 53 wickets, average 8.90, the Fawns had an effective attack, rich, moreover, in spin. M. Burton proved most successful with his off-breaks, taking 57 wickets, average 790, while two slow left-handers, G. Ridley and H. Capon, more than once proved match winners; A. Suleman, an Asian, bowled his leg-breaks and the occasional googly to good purpose.

The Fawns also possessed an exceptionally good wicket-keeper in C. Nourse, who was watched with interest by more than one English County as he intended

who was watched with interest by more than one English County as he intended to stay in England to take up cricket as a profession. The throwing-in, too, was most impressive. T. Wells proved a quiet and unassuming captain, though lack of experience lost him the "battle of tactics" in at least three of the drawn matches. Finally, the Fawns were fortunate in having as Manager and counsellor Mr. Harry Birrell, the former Oxford Cricket and Rugby Blue. His experience of English wickets and conditions proved most valuable.
