

SCHOOLS CRICKET IN 1989

Although only M. M. Patel remained available in 1989 from the players capped for English Schools Under-19 the previous year, most of those who played in the Under-17 series against Sri Lanka were still at school. As the regional trials had suggested, the batting was stronger than the bowling, although against Welsh Schools, speed in the first innings and spin in the second led to a decisive win. However, an inability to dismiss the lower order resulted in a draw against Scottish Young Cricketers, and the bowlers could not prevent defeat at Lord's by a strong MCC side containing two former Test batsmen. A comprehensive defeat at the hands of the New Zealand Young Cricketers in the limited-overs fixture was avenged in the three-day game when, after the weather had cut deep into the playing time, a run-chase brought a notable victory.

Including the two matches at Lord's, played under the appellation of MCC Schools, twenty players appeared for the senior Schools side. They were: J. P. Crawley (captain), P. E. I. Donnison, S. C. Ecclestone (Bryanston), I. Fletcher, E. S. H. Giddins, J. C. Hallett, C. J. Hawkes, G. Kersey, M. A. Khan, D. P. Ostler (Solihull C of T), M. M. Patel, R. R. Montgomerie, T. A. Radford, M. Rawlings, A. C. Richards, M. W. Stanford, R. J. Warren, T. C. Walton, G. Wells and A. S. Williams. Unless indicated, their schools may be found in the scorecards of matches played at the MCC Festival,

Oxford.

The strength of the team lay in the batting of Crawley, Fletcher, Radford and Warren, whose only collective failure came in the one-day game against the New Zealanders. The leading bowlers were the consistently hostile Hallett, and Patel, who bowled his slow left-arm rewardingly and accurately for long spells. These two shared 43 of the 62 wickets taken, a true indication of the disappointing lack of support they received. Hallett's fast bowling against Welsh Schools produced probably the best figures ever achieved by a bowler in a match at that level.

It was encouraging to see Patel, who played in all the matches, make his County Championship début for Kent at the end of the season, while Crawley went on to play for England Young Cricketers in the first "Test" match against New Zealand Young Cricketers. Along with Radford and Hallett, Crawley was selected to tour Australia with England Young Cricketers in 1989-90. However, the problem of counties requiring the services of players in their last year of school, or even in the lower sixth, was again evident, and it was largely because of the calls of county Second XIs that there were five changes from the English Schools side which lost to the New Zealanders to that which beat them.

The most emphatic victory of the summer came at Bromsgrove School on July 23, 24 against Welsh Schools, who must have regretted their decision to bat first on a good pitch; within 100 minutes they were bowled out for 94 by Hallett, who took the first nine wickets for 46 in twelve overs. Patel bowled the last man. Fletcher (81) and Radford (84) put on 136 for the first wicket and English Schools amassed 271 for four in their 60 overs. Offering sterner resistance in their second innings, Welsh Schools were eventually dismissed for 214, of which M. J. Newbold made the top score of 59. Hallett went

without a wicket, but Patel's fine spin bowling brought him figures of 40.3–17–91–8, with Hawkes, also slow left-arm, taking the other two. English Schools, requiring 38 runs for victory, got them for the loss of one wicket.

Scottish Young Cricketers batted first at Broughty Ferry on July 31, August 1, and were restricted to 186 for seven, Hallett and Patel taking three wickets each. In English Schools' reply of 255 for five, Radford made 103 not out, sharing stands of 97 for the first wicket with Fletcher (59) and 60 for the fifth with Walton (38). At 153 for six in their second innings the home team looked destined for defeat, but there was inadequate support for Hallett, who had taken five of the first six wickets. Stands of 50 for the sixth wicket and 61 for the ninth extended the innings to 289 in 87 overs (Stanger 50, M. Mudie 44). With time only for English Schools to reach 63 without loss (Radford 42 not out), the match was drawn.

Against New Zealand Young Cricketers at Rugby School on August 3, a suspect pitch and lack of application brought a humiliating defeat by 139 runs. Having restricted the tourists to 201 for seven in 55 overs (Giddins four for 26), English Schools were summarily dismissed for 62 in 29.2 overs, including 22 extras. Wells batted over half the innings for 70 minutes before being last out, but only Crawley (17) reached double figures. However, this defeat was avenged in a rain-affected match at Oundle School on August 25, 26, 27. The New Zealanders, 89 for three when rain ended play at lunch on the first day, declared at 197 for six at lunch on the second. English Schools then managed 88 for two between interruptions, and on the final day, which was uninterrupted, Crawley (49) declared at 187 for four (Wells 40). By tea the New Zealanders had reached 112 for two, but the next three overs yielded 48 runs and the declaration at 160 for three left the home side a target of 171 in what turned out to be 28 overs. Williams was out first ball to a wide full-toss, but Warren saw the score to 140 with a fine 69 and Ostler, gaining in confidence while scoring 44, hit the third ball of the last over for six to secure victory by six wickets.

Despite their heavy defeat by English Schools, Welsh Schools enjoyed a pleasant season under the captaincy of R. D. B. Croft, who went on to make his Championship début for Glamorgan. Against Scottish Young Cricketers at Pondarddulais, he bowled his off-breaks for an unbroken spell of 41 overs on the third day to close up one end while the fast bowlers secured victory by 14 runs. In Welsh Schools' first innings, D. L. Hemp (67), Croft (43) and Newbold were the chief contributors to a total of 229; the Scots replied with 133 (Mudie 66, R. Wiseman four for 12). The Welsh side also struggled when they batted again, P. Mitchell being the top scorer with 38 as D. R. Brown took six wickets for 79. Needing 236, Scotland managed only 221 (S. Hodgson 43) as Wiseman took his match return to eight for 29 and E. H. Holland collected three for 24. Against Irish Schools at Malahide, Croft took seven for 99 as the home team compiled 224 for eight declared. Hoping for a significant lead, Welsh Schools batted on but managed only 292, of which 94 came from Newbold and 50 from G. Wood. When the Welsh bowlers failed to make an early breakthrough on the third day, Irish Schools batted through to 229 for seven and a draw.

The sun shone throughout the MCC Schools Festival at Oxford, where much good cricket was in evidence.

HMC SOUTHERN SCHOOLS v THE REST

At Wadham College, July 15, 16. HMC Southern Schools won by three wickets. A spirited game on a good pitch produced 949 runs. The first day was dominated by fine innings from Williams for The Rest and Montgomerie for Southern Schools, supported respectively by Hunt and Stoneman. Williams hit two sixes and eighteen fours in his fifth hundred of the summer. Hawkes, slow left-arm, and off-spinner Richards were the pick of the bowlers, but on the second day it was Giddins, working up a lively pace and well supported by Jahangir and Hollioake, who caught the eye as he threatened to dismiss The Rest cheaply. But for Walton's fighting 90, Southern Schools would have faced a considerably smaller target than 255 in just over three hours. A second-wicket stand of 104 between Daley and Jahangir put them well on their way, and with injury preventing Richards from bowling, Hollins, Hodgson and Stoneman were able to maintain the momentum to achieve victory with an over to spare.

ESCA NORTH v ESCA SOUTH

At Keble College, July 15, 16. Drawn. Needing 289 for victory, the South looked to be heading for defeat when Laudat's accurate opening spell reduced them to 57 for five. However, Radford contributed his second obdurate innings of the match and his unbroken stand of 120 with Williams earned an honourable draw. For the North, who generally dominated the game, Stanford played two composed innings, receiving good support in the second from Loye and Warren. Again it was the slow bowlers who caught the eye on a dusty, turning pitch. Patel and Hodgson, a leg-spinner, bowled tidily for the South, while Priscott, another slow left-armer, destroyed the South's first innings with a lovely controlled piece of attacking bowling.

Reports from the Schools: Seven batsmen from the schools reviewed here passed 1,000 runs: I. Fletcher of Millfield (1,343), R. R. Montgomerie of Rugby (1,226), J. D. Morley of Trinity (1,179), A. J. Brand of Merchant Taylors, Northwood (1,117), A. C. Richards of Forest (1,024), S. C. Ecclestone of Bryanston (1,014) and J. M. Casey of King's, Chester (1,010). Montgomerie's runs came at an average of 136.22, while Fletcher averaged 103.30. Ecclestone and Richards also took 34 and 33 wickets respectively. J. P. Crawley of Manchester GS was the outstanding batsman of the season. In addition to his 940 runs in eleven innings for his school, at an average of 156.64, he scored 85 in four English Schools' international matches, 61 not out and 124 at the Oxford festival, and followed his 88 against MCC at Lord's and 75 not out against NAYC with a fine unbeaten 113 against Combined Services.

Despite the abundance of excellent pitches favouring batsmen, four bowlers took 60 or more wickets: P. A. Gardner of Trinity (71), R. M. Cousins of Wellingborough (67), C. M. Long of Brighton College (67) and J. F. Phillips of Malvern (60). Gardner also scored 565 runs, and of another fifteen bowlers who took 50 wickets, R. A. Hawkey of Merchant Taylors', Northwood made 560 runs. Other leading all-rounders were G. R. Davis of Haileybury (862 runs, 44 wickets), K. Jahangir of Aldenham (819 runs, 46 wickets), A. J. Inns of Pocklington (802 runs, 40 wickets) and N. S. Whitfield of Durham (917 runs, 38 wickets).

Notable individual performances included double-centuries by Brand, Whitfield and N. B. Driscoll of Caterham, while J. A. Franklin of Colston's struck six sixes in one over. Two bowlers took all ten wickets in an innings: D. J. Waggett of King's, Rochester v St Edmund's, Canterbury and P. J. Cobb of King Henry VIII, Coventry v Coventry School - Bablake. In addition, seven hat-tricks were reported: by N. J. B. Allan of Ellesmere, S. W. Baker of Lancing, A. Brandon of Chigwell, G. Dill of St Albans, J. R. S. Lloyd of Fettes, B. J. McGonigle of Foyle and Londonderry College and R. M. S. Weston of Durham. A feature of the season was the introduction of more young players than in past years, as the new exam schedule left schools without the services of their more experienced cricketers.

In schools matches Abingdon beat Bloxham, Newbury, Reading (by 1 run) and the Zimbabwe tourists, Plumtree, and were near to victory in five of the drawn games. Their two defeats came on successive days at the hands of Radley and Brentwood. Their strength lay in the batting, with centuries coming from each of the first three batsmen - D. E. Stanley, M. Snow and E. J. Tilley. Although lacking real pace on the unusually hard wickets, B. R. Marnane was unlucky not to finish with more than 37 wickets and P. A. B. Page (left-arm) looked a good prospect. Fourteen-year-old J. S. Tilley showed promise as an off-spinner. A highlight for Aldenham was an emphatic win v Felsted - the first for twenty years - when the captain, K. Jahangir, scored 124 not out and took six wickets. He was the side's outstanding player, heading the averages with 819 runs and 46 wickets, respectively two and three times more than the next person.

Alleyn's enjoyed wins v Colfe's, Wilson's, MCC, the XL Club and KCS Wimbledon. The seam bowling of C. A. Berglund and A. C. Winter, who shared 48 wickets, was always accurate and they were ably supported by the leg-spin of G. I. Wharton. Berglund, the sixteen-yearold captain, was the mainstay of a batting line-up which generally remained rather thin. The fielding was often excellent, with V. B. Jeffery and G. R. Harrison outstanding. Against Trinity, Harrison held five catches in the outfield and Berglund hit an unbeaten century. Allhallows had a successful season in which the averages were dominated by the vice-captain, P. Holland, an opening bat and change bowler. A highlight was J. Carstairs's 128 not out v Devon Dumplings in the last match.

Ten of Ampleforth's seventeen matches went to the last over, with three being won off the last ball. The other three wins were achieved in less dramatic circumstances. Led by a popular and disciplined captain in W. G. Easterby, they formed a potent unit, despite rarely fielding the same side twice in succession owing to exams. Easterby's batting was solid and dependable, A. R. Nesbit batted at No. 6 with enthusiasm and reassuring level-headedness, and B. T. Dow, an American, played strokes of high class without ever really fulfilling his talent. In the absence of a genuine left-arm spinner, T. O. Scrope's leg-breaks were a useful diversion from seam. The fielding and field placing were above average, and the wicket-keeper, T. Codrington, was one of those who made a positive contribution on and off the field. Although having a creditable season, Ardingly ought perhaps to have had eight wins rather than five. Three winning positions were thrown away. The bowling lacked penetration and the batting promised more than it achieved, but with many of the side returning, an improvement is expected in 1990.

It was a season of rebuilding for Arnold, who fielded 21 players, the majority of whom were under sixteen. M. Clinning was restricted by injury to seven innings but none the less scored the most runs, including a maiden century v Lancaster and a second v Rossall. Left-arm spinner S. M. Aga took eight for 48 in the six-wicket defeat of William Hulme's GS and was selected to play for The Rest at Oxford - the school's first representative at this level. Chasing 231 v King's, Macclesfield, Arnold recovered from 48 for three to win with two balls to spare. Ashville College beat Barnard Castle, Mount St Mary's, Bradford GS, Batley GS, Ripon GS, Scarborough College, Leeds GS and Bury GS, losing only to Harrogate GS and RGS Newcastle. The school was invited to take part in the Sir Garfield Sobers festival in Barbados

Bancroft's did not achieve the results they had anticipated, suffering from poor catching, lack of consistency and injuries. The captain, G. P. Brown, though unable to bowl until after half-term, took 28 wickets, at times generating considerable pace, and scored 440 runs. T. C. Dolan was another all-rounder of promise, hitting the side's only century - v J. G. Bromfield's XI - while G. A. Fisher kept wicket with distinction and flair against fast and sometimes erratic bowling. He also played some crucial innings. Bangor GS, with thirteen wins, enjoyed another successful season. The all-round performances of S. L. Mann, a fine captain, and of R. G. Scott formed a solid base. M. W. R. McCord passed J. W. G. Elder's record of wickets for the school and is expected to add to his total in 1990.

Barnard Castle, with a young side, again enjoyed a better season than anticipated, winning seven matches and losing four. Although high scores were rarely achieved, the bowlers were able to restrict the opposition batting. The averages were headed by J. G. H. Murphy, the captain, who passed 1,000 runs and 100 wickets for the school in his two seasons to date. Bedford reported a mixed season, with the first half more profitable than the second. Victories were recorded v The Leys, Haileybury, Uppingham and MCC (off the last ball). P. C. Wynn scored 122 not out against The Leys in his first school game and R. G. O. Spencer, a lefthander, was 100 not out at the end of a tense fourth innings v Tonbridge. Spencer, on a rugby tour to New Zealand, was one of several key players missed at the end of the season, when a new 55-overs format at the Stowe festival found the side wanting and they lost their last three schools matches. The captain, R. W. H. Smith, bowled left-arm medium or orthodox spin with some effect.

Undefeated by schools, Bedford Modern lost only to Northants Amateurs. P. J. Clark (slow left-arm) took six for 8 as Kimbolton were dismissed for 65, and G. A. H. Awudu six for 29 as Stamford managed only 58. Against Nottingham HS, Awudu made 110 while J. A. A. Moore (medium) produced a collapse from 156 for two and ensured victory with a spell of six for 6 in six overs. Haberdashers' Aske's, Watford GS and Queens' College, Cambridge, were also beaten. Fast bowler Awudu was the leading all-rounder with 37 wickets and 495 runs, including another century (104 v The Perse); D. J. Outtrim proved a consistent opener, as well as claiming 27 dismissals behind the stumps; and M. C. Waddington was a good new-ball partner for Awudu.

Beechen Cliff, unbeaten, won six of their eight matches. Highlights were the dismissal of Monkton Combe for 47 before lunch; the nine-wicket defeat of Prior Park, in which S. M. Priscott's left-arm spin brought him seven for 14; and the win v a strong Bath CC side, agains whom P. Tisdale (81 not out) and M. D. Thurman (82) put on 136 for the third wicket. Wicket-keeper S. Griffiths, leg-spinner J. D. Colbourne and Priscott, the captain, all played for Somerset Second XI, with Priscott being awarded a contract for 1990. Berkhamsted put an early-season defeat by Haileybury behind them and beat Stowe, Brentwood, Aldenham, St Lawrence, Kimbolton, Framlingham, MCC and Gentlemen of Hertfordshire. The captain, D. T. Hodges (slow left-arm), took 33 wickets and was also the most consistent batsman, scoring 100 not out v Trinity GS, from Sydney. His fellow-opener, E. P. Shek, left-handed and fast-scoring, included 110 v Bishop's Stortford in his 595 runs. C. M. Lovegrove (fast-medium) returned eight for 29 v Gentlemen of Hertfordshire, and R. D. Hilton, a Hertfordshire Under-15 player, was a promising addition to the pace attack when he came into the side during the second half of the season. J. P. Crowther held eleven catches at first slip.

Positively captained by J. R. Torrance, Bishop's Stortford were always prepared to risk defeat in pursuit of victory – a tactic not always followed by their opponents. They beat Uppingham, Aldenham, Chigwell, The Leys, Stamford, Gresham's and Christ College, Brecon, but failed to do themselves justice in the 40-overs formula of the Sir Garfield Sober festival in Barbados. Their strength lay in the depth of the batting, with six players passing 200 runs, though there was only one century (L. E. M. Riddell v MCC). The bowling depended heavily on J. R. Torrance (fast-medium away-swing), whose 56 wickets were five short of the school record. Certainly the medium pace of R. D. F. Wright was missed when he was injured halfway through the season.

Although Bloxham recorded only two wins – v the XL Club and Ellesmere in the end-of-season Woodard Festival – they played some good cricket. M. J. Day, the captain, improved as an opening bat, and E. M. Hockey, promoted to open alongside him, scored the first century for Bloxham since 1982. Hockey also took the most wickets, bowling medium-fast, while the economical off-spin of A. R. Channing, having his first full season, brought 32 wickets. Blundell's positive, attacking cricket produced improved results, with wins v Plymouth College, King's Taunton, Uppingham and Ampleforth – the last two in their festival at the end of the season. For runs much depended on the openers, C. D. Bending, the captain, and M. R. N. Hunt, a Colt. R. S. Castle (left-arm fast-medium) had a lean season by his standards, with his 26 wickets including a return of six for 51 v King's, Bruton.

A highlight for **Bradfield** was the nine-wicket victory over Canford in which D. J. Wiggins's in-swing bowling captured eight for 27. Wiggins finished as the season's leading wicket-taker and captained the side well, generally setting good fields and fostering a strong team spirit. J. T. C. Kendall (left-hand bat, medium-pace out-swing bowler) developed into a valuable all-rounder, while fifteen-year-old W. S. Kendall scored the most runs and B. E. Walker, giving the ball a good "tweak", delivered some useful overs of left-arm spin. D. J. Brockis had a successful season behind the stumps, holding some spectacular, athletic catches. After winning four of their first five games, **Bradford GS** were handicapped by an injury to their captain, A. G. Webster, which prevented him from bowling. He had been the most penetrative of the attack, with eighteen wickets at 3.61, and for all the efforts of P. R. Booth, a left-arm seamer, the side often struggled to dismiss the opposition. The batting, too, relied heavily on Webster and, despite sound innings from D. C. Whitfield and N. H. W. Marshall, it was not always consistent. The absence of some key players on a rugby tour gave opportunities to younger players, who contributed to victories in the last two matches.

Brentwood fielded a strong batting side offset to a large degree by young, inexperienced bowlers, with the result that they often found themselves chasing a large total. At such times C. J. Wilkins was in his element, notably in the wins v Young Essex, against whom he made 121 not out, and Chigwell (73). Another highlight was an opening stand of 154 v Abingdon

between left-hander G. K. Fletcher and T. P. Clements. A. Majundar (left-arm medium) bore the brunt of the bowling and was supported by two promising fourteen year olds in P. R. Brooks (off-spin) and D. P. McAllister (medium). C. M. Long of Brighton College was by far their most successful bowler, his 67 wickets including a return of seven for 40 v Christ's Hospital and taking his tally for the school to a new record of more than 200. A young Bromsgrove XI managed only one win and it was hoped that the experience gained on a tour to Barbados would stand them in good stead for 1990. Pre-eminent for Bryanston was the captain, S. C. Ecclestone, who represented English Schools in their victory v New Zealand Young Cricketers. A left-handed opening bat, he played several outstanding innings to achieve a school record aggregate of 1,014 at an average of 92.18. He also headed the bowling with 34 wickets.

Canford felt that a relatively experienced side should have performed better. There were notable achievements from the opening batsman, J. A. Perry, who scored 643 runs, and fourth-former M. J. C. Allom (seam), whose 32 wickets were more than twice the return of the next bowler. Caterham's young, inexperienced XI went from strength to strength under the captaincy of N. B. Driscoll, whose 870 runs at an average of 87.00 included 200 not out v St Dunstan's. I. Armitage, a consistent opening bowler, claimed 33 wickets at just 9.21 apiece. Hundreds for Charterhouse were hit by P. Gorman (102 v Bradfield) and G. R. Brooke (101 v Butterflies). Cheltenham College, unbeaten by schools, recorded convincing wins v Clifton, Shrewsbury, Rendcomb, Pates GS, Free Foresters and Gloucestershire Gypsies. Highlights were innings of 121 v Rugby and 112 v Rendcomb by A. J. Thompson, who headed a heavy-scoring batting line-up, and the 54 wickets captured by D. R. Fulton (medium-pace in-swing).

In an improved season, Chigwell won five of their first eight matches, owing much to their bowlers. In the first match A. Brandon's medium pace brought him four for 15, including a hat-trick, against St Edmund's, all four wickets falling in one over, and G. Haysom (medium) took seven for 35 v The Perse. No batsman reached 50 until the last four matches, which were, however, all lost. Highlights for Christ College, Brecon were the defeat of old rivals Monmouth and an unbeaten century v Old Breconians by the captain, M. Yendle. Nine of the side are expected to return in 1990.

Christ's Hospital won only one schools match – v Whitgift – for which they owed much to a return of six for 40 by M. D. Taylor. In club matches, when the batsmen were noticeably more relaxed and aggressive, Royal Navy Club and Sussex Martlets were beaten. J. M. Sillett was a forthright opening batsman, and there were generally runs from J. D. English and S. J. Hitch in the middle order. J. D. Bryant played the sheet-anchor role. The attack comprised mainly the medium-pace swing and seam of Taylor and T. Endacott, with the accurate off-spin of English lending support and variety. Clayesmore frequently found themselves either unable to defend a reasonable total, or failing to score enough runs. This resulted in a disappointing record of three wins and twelve losses, in contrast to their success in 1988. Highlights were P. Bradbury's century v Millfield, and G. Owton's v Milton Abbey and v Victoria College, Jersey, which took his total of hundreds for the school to eleven in four seasons.

Clifton College's young side performed better against adult sides, beating MCC, Free Foresters and Old Cliftonians, as well as Colston's and Blundell's. Both J. P. Parish and J. R. A. Williams passed 500 runs and T. C. Henderson, the captain, was the leading bowler. Highlights were innings of 105 not out v MCC by M. G. N. Windows and 100 not out v Downside by Parish, who, bowling fast-medium away-swing, took eight for 55 v Exeter University. Colston's reported only moderate results with just three wins in schools matches -v Monmouth, Kingswood and Bristol Cathedral School. J. C. Reice's 40 wickets included nine for 61 v Bristol GS, and J. A. Franklin struck six sixes in an over v Queen Elizabeth's Hospital on his way to a maiden century.

In a season mediocre by their own standards, Coventry School – Bablake beat Handsworth GS, Abbot Beyne, King Edward's Camp Hill, King Edward's Birmingham and King Edward's Nuneaton; but they also lost seven matches. For the tenth time in eleven years, they reached the final of the Warwickshire Under-19 knockout competition, losing to Solihull School. The success of Cranbrook was founded on excellent fast bowling, headed by S. P. France and A. P. Boughton and backed by fine attacking fielding. The best team performances came in the wins v Ardingly and v MCC, against whom M. Richardson hit a brilliant and inspirational

unbeaten century. Cranleigh, while experiencing limited success, played positive cricket in closely contested games. They won three of their hardest – v Cranleigh CC, Surrey Young Cricketers and Brighton, arguably their strongest schoolboy opponents. Ably captained by S. McGuire and enlivened by their Canadian wicket-keeper, A. Archer, they enjoyed their season in a cheerful atmosphere.

Lacking both a penetrative bowler and a dominant batsman, **Dauntsey's** played too many indecisive draws. Just one match was won, although they lost only once in schools matches. They relied heavily on the captain, R. A. Pollach, who scored the side's only hundred and took 25 wickets, bowling at medium pace. R. P. Smith was the other mainstay of the batting, although he suffered a lean spell mid-season, and J. Amor (medium) took the most wickets. **Dean Close** defeated King's, Worcester, with J. M. Bowditch (fast) taking eight for 34, and set up a ten-wicket victory over Bloxham by dismissing them for 40, Bowditch and S. K. Organ (medium) each returning five for 16. Organ, the captain, scored the most runs, but in that department reliable technique and sustained concentration were not always in evidence.

Denstone's season was memorable for the batting of J. N. Snape, the 1988 England Under-15 captain. His average of 93.11 was a school record, his aggregate of 838 (in eight fewer innings) was just 25 short of the record, and he equalled the record of four centuries in a season: 104 not out v Ellesmere, 114 v Old Denstonians, 103 v Abbot Beyne and 151 not out v Trent. He went on to play for Northamptonshire Second XI. More games could have been won but for the lack of a penetrative bowler and the reluctance of opponents to set a realistic target in view of Snape's reputation. Dover College enjoyed a more competitive season, with J. O. Manfo showing promise as a fast bowler. The batting was again strong: S. J. Schilder scored a maiden century, D. M. Rouse threatened the post-war record aggregate, and his elder brother, J. D. Rouse, the captain, hit two hundreds to take his aggregate for the school to 1,598 in four seasons.

Downside's batsmen, although competent, proved incapable of putting together a big innings and only once passed 200. Without a reasonable total to defend, the bowlers were always under pressure and only the captain, N. C. R. Holmes (left-arm medium) performed with any consistency. A young XI at The Duke of York's Military School managed three wins but too frequently were handicapped by loss of confidence and unimaginative captaincy. The more experienced batsmen got out to rash shots, leaving the young middle order too much to do. The captain, S. J. Gale, and A. G. Wilkinson bowled medium pace to good effect, but often with little luck, and G. M. Kennett's leg-breaks were a welcome addition to the attack. Dulwich College enjoyed good wins v Whitgift and Surrey Young Cricketers and lost only in the last over to St Paul's and Merchant Taylors', Northwood. A strong batting line-up featured G. Y. Mohabir, who twice reached three figures, and R. S. Sheldon, who did so once. However, while J. A. J. Charlwood was consistent, the attack lacked penetration. A highlight for Durham was the match v St Albans, in which W. P. C. Weston compiled an accomplished century and his younger brother, R. M. S. Weston, took a hat-trick. Their all-rounder, N. S. Whitfield, later played for Glamorgan Second XI. A successful Eastbourne XI enjoyed ten victories. E. S. H. Giddins, who played for English Schools, and F. A. Ali were a formidable opening attack, while the batting featured strength in depth with G. E. Thwaites, T. C. Nicholson and wicket-keeper T. J. Duffill all contributing several notable innings. Two early victories for The Edinburgh Academy were followed by six defeats and three draws in schools matches. Although all the players had their successful moments, these rarely coincided to challenge opponents. In a second successful season, Elizabeth College, Guernsey, beat twelve sides, including MCC for the first time and Victoria College, Jersey, by eight wickets. S. B. R. Mackay's 793 runs included two centuries, while a third came from D. J. Marshall. The captain, N. E. G. Garrett, excelled as a left-handed bat and slow bowler, equally sharing 62 wickets with R. J. B. Turville (fast-medium).

Ellesmere's positive cricket and their use of spinners whenever possible gained results in most of their matches, six finishing in their favour. N. J. B. Allan (fast-medium) took a hattrick v the Gentlemen of Shropshire, dismissing Nos. 1, 3 and 4, and hit an unbeaten hundred v the XL Club. For the first time in living memory, Enfield GS failed to win a match. They lost their first six, a consequence of poor batting by senior members of the side, but there was some improvement after half-term, when the three youngest players emerged as the leading wicket-takers. Epsom College were unbeaten by schools in England, although their results in the Sir Garfield Sobers Tournament in Barbados dented this record. Highlights were a return

of six for 26 by W. E. J. Crawford in the victory v King's, Canterbury, A. S. M. Trengove's six for 10 v St James College in Barbados, and seven half-centuries by B. Grante. Eton were unbeaten, but their four wins – v Radley, Wellington College, Charterhouse and I Zingari – were all in the first half of the season. The rare triumph at Radley was the outstanding success, and Charterhouse were bowled out for 92, thanks to a return of seven for 26 by the opening bowler, P. M. C. Millar. In general, however, the bowlers never found it easy to take wickets, which made the progress of H. J. P. Chetwood's off-spin encouraging. The strength of the XI lay in its batsmen, notably C. H. G. St George and G. E. A. Morgan. The bowling of Exeter School was headed by the medium-fast opening partnership of the captain, P. R. Taverner, and M. J. Stevenson. The batting was sound, without any one batsman dominating, and J. P. L. Hottot again kept wicket tidily.

Felsted's young side enjoyed a spectacular June in which they recorded seven of their eight wins, the most exciting being that by seven wickets v Bedford. They go into 1990 with the experience gained on a winter tour to Australia. Early-season optimism at Fettes College was dispelled, as reckless and inexperienced batting prevented them from capitalising on the winning positions often won by their bowlers. J. R. S. Lloyd (fast-medium) returned eight for 61 v Glenalmond and did the hat-trick v The Leys at the end-of-term festival. Sensible batting in that latter match brought victory by six wickets. Forest overcame the loss to exams of key players to win seven matches. The English Schools representative, A. C. Richards, was an astute captain and outstanding batsman, his 1,024 runs including a magnificent 167 v the XL Club and 102 not out v Bancroft's, against whom he put on 210 for the first wicket with the wicket-keeper, A. R. Heyes (101). His off-spin bowling accounted for 33 batsmen. The most notable bowling performance, however, came from L. Adenaike (fast-medium) v Enfield GS: his first five overs cost 31, his next 7.2 yielded figures of eight for 7. Despite their inexperience, Foyle and Londonderry College recorded ten victories and reached the final of the Gordon McCullough Cup. J. A. S. Brown headed a talented batting line-up and scored a responsible century v Wirral GS, while the pick of the varied attack was B. J. McGonigle, an off-spinner, who took a hat-trick in the Schools Cup. Framlingham might have improved on their tally of five wins had injury not depleted a potentially strong seam attack. M. J. West played the only three-figure innings - 112 not out v Norwich - and S. C. Giller enjoyed another fine all-round

Giggleswick, in their first schools match of the season, dismissed Oakwood for 10 (M. M. K. El-Ebrashi six for 5, A. A. G. Caton four for 4) and might have won more than five games had their batting been more consistent. Under the captaincy of K. J. Matthews, The Glasgow Academy showed commitment and improved as the season progressed. They lost only once and ended the season with a three-wicket win v George Watson's off the penultimate ball. Fifteen-year-old J. M. Gayfer, batting high in the order and bowling medium pace, looked a sound prospect in both departments. Glenalmond, a young side, recorded wins v Strathallan, Kelvinside, Merchiston Castle, Fettes, George Watson's, Scottish Wayfarers and the Invincibles. The captain, I. M. S. Wilson (right-hand bat, left-arm fast-medium bowler), headed both averages and took his aggregates for the XI to 1,147 runs (35.84) and 91 wickets (15.18). A highlight for Gordonstoun was the match v the Old Boys at Headingley, in which the school successfully chased 190 to win. At Grenville College, S. Wait and P. M. Dale (both fast-medium) carried the attack, swinging the ball prodigiously, but while no team found batting comfortable against them, they rarely had enough runs to defend. Apart from the first day of the season, when G. S. Dermody scored a century, the batting was always vulnerable. An inexperienced Gresham's side won only two of their 21 matches, but with nine of the XI expected to return in 1990, prospects are good. I. D. Barnett looked a fine all-rounder; A. J. Evans and D. J. Newton both scored 500 runs.

Haberdashers' Aske's won fourteen of their twenty matches, losing only to Bedford Modern in their last schools fixture. The opening batsmen, D. I. Chippeck (captain) and B. Moore, tepresented Hertfordshire Under-18 and Middlesex Under-17 respectively, while R. Yeabsley, an outstanding seam bowler with 58 wickets, played for England Under-15 and Middlesex Second XI. His brother, off-spinner M. I. Yeabsley, bowled consistently and S. Arumugam (medium-fast) headed the averages in his first season in the XI. Haileybury, given their wealth of experienced batting, did not obtain the results they had anticipated, but they were more successful in Barbados in August. They reached the semi-finals of the Sir Garfield Sobers Tournament before losing to Radley. The outstanding player was G. R. Davis, left-hand bat and right-arm fast out-swing bowler, who scored 862 runs at 78.36 and took 44

wickets at 14.79. **Hampton's** successful season saw them undefeated with ten wins. S. C. Janes, a fifteen-year-old opening bat and wicket-keeper, scored 835 runs, including 133 not out in a partnership of 214 v RGS Guildford with D. W. Rixon. Rixon captained the XI with maturity, as well as scoring runs when they were most needed. Good fast bowling from R. A. Hall was backed up by the left-arm spin combination of S. Patel, who increased his return to 150 wickets in three years, and newcomer J. E. Saunders.

In schools matches **Harrow** beat Tonbridge, Wellington (both by nine wickets) and Malvern, and lost to Radley only off the last ball. J. A. R. Hill headed the averages, followed in both by the captain, C. Raper, whose 111 not out in the 3-run defeat by MCC was the innings of the season. S. H. Aldous and C. J. A. Virgin made a productive opening partnership. **Hipperholme GS** were hampered against strong opposition at the beginning of the season by inadequate batting and lack of depth in the bowling. However, matters improved once they began scoring runs, and of the last five matches only the last was lost, Woodhouse Grove deservedly winning an exciting run-chase. A highlight for **Hurstpierpoint** was H. Reid's innings of 119 not out v Worksop.

Ipswich again lost only to the Old Boys in term time, beat four sides, and in several drawn games needed one more wicket. The captain, T. Gregory, a determined opening bat, ensured victory on several occasions and received good support from all-rounder D. Stone. M. Thorndyke also played some match-winning innings and bowled well towards the end of the season. A strong batting line-up at Kelly College took advantage of some excellent pitches to maintain an unbeaten record until the last match v an Invitation XI. Victories included those v Exeter and Truro schools, but a lack of penetrative bowling resulted in the high number of drawn games. That said, J. J. Wood and W. G. Pendrill, both in their first year, put in some useful work at medium pace. A. Adebayo headed the batting averages for the fourth time, achieved a school-record career aggregate, and along with K. R. Burgess hit a hundred.

Unbeaten in their most successful season for several decades, **Kent College** had ten wins, the best being v Trinity GS from Australia and a Canterbury District XI. Few sides could cope with the left-arm spin of E. J. McCabe, whose 43 wickets included six for 35 v Dover College. Two Kent Under-15 players, L. E. Robson (left-arm) and P. W. Hooker, opened the bowling. S. N. Warley, who opened the batting with 746 runs at 93.25, passed 50 in nine of his fourteen innings, and G. S. M. Jenkins also scored heavily. Some low-scoring games involving **Kimbolton's** young team came about as a result of their fragile batting and incisive bowling. R. J. T. Ramply contributed consistently, yet might have scored more without the burden of captaincy, and T. C. Agnew, who topped the batting averages, was injured for part of the season. The attack was spearheaded by I. R. A. Prideaux (fast), backed by the medium pace of Ramply and the attacking left-arm spin of G. S. Littlewood. The fielding was good and S. G. Wood looked a high-class wicket-keeper in his first full season.

With nine newcomers in the XI, King Edward VI College, Stourbridge struggled in their early matches, but as the side gained experience, several free-scoring batsmen emerged. The fielding was excellent, although the lack of penetrative bowling on good wickets was always a handicap. King Edward VI, Southampton enjoyed their most successful season ever, winning thirteen of their 26 matches and achieving first victories v Winchester, Magdalen College School and Elizabeth College, Guernsey. They owed much to the two spinners, R. M. Salter (left-arm), whose 59 wickets were a school record, and M. L. Tidby (off-spin) with 46. J. D. Stanley, a shrewd captain, opened the batting to good effect and was well supported by B. Quantrill and C. B. Blishen. King Edward VII, Lytham considered themselves unlucky that their attempts to play positive cricket did not yield more than two wins – v University College School and Burnley. J. Greenslade captained the side with enthusiasm and had his best season with the bat. G. A. Roberts, the leading batsman, hit 101 not out v Arnold and, bowling legspin, shared the most wickets with M. C. A. Greatorex, whose fast-medium bowling offered a new cutting edge to an otherwise ordinary attack.

King Edward's, Birmingham reported a season of near misses with a large number of "winning" draws. M. J. Goodall (right-hand bat and leg-spinner) and M. M. Dean (right-hand bat and medium-fast bowler) made impressive all-round contributions with 1,186 runs and 105 wickets between them. In schools matches King Henry VIII, Coventry lost only to RGS Worcester, against whom their captain, K. P. Street, carried his bat for 74. A solid batting line-up was headed by M. D. Scott – his two centuries included 121 not out v Old

Swinford Hospital – while P. J. Cobb (fast-medium) was the leading bowler, taking all ten for 26 in the eight-wicket victory v Coventry School – Bablake and seven for 34 v King Edward VI, Birmingham, who were beaten by the same margin. An inexperienced King William's College, Isle of Man XI won five of their twelve matches, two of the victories coming at the end-of-term festival at Aldenham. The batting tended to be fragile, although longer innings were played later in the season, and the bowling was rather too dependent on the openers, N. C. Capewell and D. R. Norman.

King's College, Taunton defeated Canford, Wellington, Monmouth and Allhallows, and were just one wicket away from victory on four other occasions. D. J. G. Dowsett (slow left-arm) had an outstanding season with 43 wickets. Highlights for King's College School, Wimbledon were a tour to Barbados in July and an exciting match v Pembroke School, Adelaide, who snatched victory off the last ball with nine wickets down. Too often a likely victory proved elusive when KCS were batting second, but with eight players expected to return, such draws may be turned into wins in 1990. The batting was headed by J. Parrish, a dogged opener, and R. Q. Cake, a fluent strokeplayer who, bowling leg-spin, also took the most wickets. King's, Bruton returned from a pre-season tour of the Far East to enjoy their most successful season ever. Eight wins included those v Sexeys, Allhallows, Wellington School, Bristol GS and King's, Taunton, and owed much to the bowling of N. Gammon. His 53 wickets were a school record. The most prolific batsmen were T. Mornement and C. Squire, whose maiden century v Bristol GS was the XI's one three-figure innings.

King's, Canterbury, though losing only to Epsom in schools matches, did not always find it easy to force victory from winning positions. Against Eastbourne (255 for six) they slumped from 175 for one to 233 for nine, and batting second v MCC they levelled the scores with 202 for seven. In a strong batting side, wicket-keeper M. G. le Huray and the left-handed opener, N. V. Daley, both scored centuries. King's, Chester, another young side, took advantage of the fine weather and splendid pitches, and their successful season was characterised by the opening partnerships between J. M. Casey, the captain, and J. R. H. Spencer. The left-handed Casey became the first batsman at the school to score 1,000 runs, which he achieved despite dropping himself down the order on occasions to allow others to enjoy the conditions. Another strong batting side, King's, Macclesfield were bowled out only twice and beat Cheadle Hulme, Bolton, Stockport GS, Newcastle-under-Lyme, Birkenhead, Hulme GS, Arnold and King's, Chester; their defeats were by Arnold and Ipswich. The first four batsmen all scored heavily, with S. R. Swindells, the captain and wicket-keeper, passing 500 for the third successive season.

Two players contributed outstanding performances for King's, Rochester. The Kent Under-15 representative, M. J. Walker, hit 135 not out v Cranbrook and 167 v the Band of Brothers to increase his aggregate to 1,611 in two years. A poor start was turned round as leg-spinner D. J. Waggett ran into form, and four of the last five matches were won. Waggett took 27 wickets in this period, including all ten for 52 v St Edmund's, Canterbury after conceding 30 runs off his first 3.3 overs. The batsmen of King's, Worcester overcame a shaky start to find their touch and the season produced six wins. The fast-medium bowling of J. Richardson, penetrative on the most lifeless of wickets, was equally important, his seven for 31 v Kelvinside Academy being one match-winning effort. A promising and well-balanced attack at Kingston GS was never given the chance to bowl the side to victory, owing to the batsmen's inability to score enough runs. M. Gosling kept wicket with distinction, while fourteen-year-old D. Spencer, who headed the batting averages, offered hope for the future.

Lancing, unbeaten by schools, defeated Christ's Hospital (twice), Eastbourne, Hurstpierpoint, Pembroke, Malvern, Charterhouse, Sussex Martlets, Free Foresters and Ardingly (twice; once to win the Langdale Cup). They were ably led by J. A. Martin, who scored two centuries in compiling nearly twice as many runs as the next batsman, and he also took the most wickets. He and J. E. Hegan put on 210 in an unbroken second-wicket partnership v St Peter's, Adelaide, which was a school record for any wicket. All-rounders R. H. D. Spink and S. W. Baker also enjoyed notable success, Baker taking a hat-trick. The contrasting opening attack of D. H. Wilson and B. W. Watson (left-arm) was sound rather than penetrative, with support coming from off-spinner M. J. Gooda and the splendid wicket-keeping of A. Near. The nine wins by Leeds GS included five v schools and a first defeat of MCC. The batting was generally stronger than the bowling, with three batsmen hitting hundreds. T. C. Walton, whose 154 not out v Queen Elizabeth GS, Wakefield was the highest

innings, also took 26 wickets and he played for MCC Schools and English Schools. R. M. Atkinson, a fifteen-year-old left-arm spinner, took the most wickets in his first season.

The Leys beat Highgate, Gresham's and Monkton Combe in schools matches, but were handicapped in the second half of the season by the absence through illness of their captain, J. S. Lewis. His six for 34 v Mill Hill was the season's best return. Llandovery College enjoyed one of their most successful seasons for some time, the most notable of their six victories coming v Hereford Cathedral School and Christ College, Brecon. A memorable highlight was the visit to the school of Central Club, Barbados, for whom the West Indies opener, C. G. Greenidge, scored a marvellous 124 not out. A relatively inexperienced Lord Wandsworth College XI enjoyed a fair measure of success under the fine leadership of M. Critchley. Their bowling was tight and penetrative, especially the leg-spin of D. Berry and the off-spin of D. Robinson, but the batting was uncertain and looked fragile against genuine pace. Lord Williams's School, Thame were similarly hampered by inconsistent batting, although the progress of their under-17 side to the south-east semi-final of the Barclays Bank Cup promised well for the future. That side was captained by M. A. Khan, whose brilliant wicket-keeping led to his selection for English Schools v New Zealand Young Cricketers and for Northamptonshire Second XI.

Unbeaten in Scotland, Loretto won six of their schools matches and lost two. The economical and penetrative attack captured 124 wickets in thirteen schools matches, best performance including six for 49 by J. S. Bedi (off-spin) v Strathallan and two inexpensive five-wicke returns by A. C. F. Mason. The batting was again headed by the captain, S. S. Hodgson: a talented left-hand bat, he had an outstanding match v Rossall with 143 not out and a return of five for 25. Good cricketers abounded at Loughborough GS, where G. Leeson, a left-handed opener, and W. A. Dessaur scored 800 runs, and C. Jones passed 500. Dessaur, a medium pace, also took 30 wickets, including seven for 21 v Lincolnshire Gentlemen, and he played for Nottinghamshire Second XI. However, the outstanding player was the slow left-armer, C. J. Hawkes, whose 50 wickets included six for 49 v Loughborough Students. He played for MCC Schools, English Schools and Leicestershire Second XI and received the Daily Telegraph Under-19 bowling award, having won the Under-15 award in 1987. The XI, beaten only by the Friars of Derby, won nine matches, including those v Uppingham, Loughborough Students, Lincolnshire Gentlemen, the Old Boys, Gentlemen of Leicestershire and St Peter's, Adelaide.

Magdalen College School's sole defeat was at the hands of King Edward VI in the final over of their last schools match. Their seven wins had come consecutively in mid-season, including substantial victories v Dean Close, The Oratory and Plumtree School, Zimbabwe. In powerful all-round side M. B. Bixby was prominent with the bat, while a balanced attack was headed by J. C. Bobby (fast-medium) and S. D. Stinchcombe, a fifteen-year-old off-spinner. Manchester GS also lost just once - to Bradford GS - and beat Bolton, Shrewsbury, Denstone, Arnold, Leeds and MCC. Their opening batsman, J. P. Crawley, scored 940 runs in eleven innings at an average of 156.66 and established a school record of six centuries, five of them in consecutive matches: 135 not out v Shrewsbury, 104 v Stockport GS, 150 not out Birkenhead, 105 not out v Denstone, 112 v RGS Lancaster and 118 not out v Arnold. He and S. E. Maggi (97) shared a record opening partnership of 252 v Birkenhead. Had Crawley and missed the last six days of the school's cricket following his selection for representative games he would surely have passed his brother, M. A. Crawley's record of 1,123 runs in eighteen innings. In his absence I. R. Cross scored 101 not out v Leeds GS and 135 not out v MCC two days later. The bowling did not reach the high standards of the batting, and significantly the victories came chasing a target. C. F. Sinton was the most successful bowler, his 29 wickets including six for 48 v Liverpool College, and while N. J. Atherton bowled very fast, his direction was often wayward.

Marlborough enjoyed some fine matches, with only a few dull draws. However, much depended on three players: the opener, A. K. W. Jackson, whose consistency usually ensured a solid start; left-arm fast bowler J. J. Hey; and an outstanding all-rounder in E. A. M. Longfield (505 runs, including two centuries, and 33 wickets). In the victory over Winchester Jackson carried his bat for 28 and Hey took six for 20 as Winchester were dismissed for 90. Against Sherborne, with 6 needed for victory, Longfield struck the last ball high over the mich wicket boundary. A record of six wins was the best for some time by Merchant Taylors. Crosby. R. W. Glynne-Jones, in his sixth season in the XI, hit unbeaten centuries v Bolton

and the XL Club and was followed at the top of the averages by his brother, G. S. Glynne-Jones, who batted with great application and judgement. The attack was spearheaded by S. R. McGee and T. J. Ryan, right- and left-arm respectively, supported by an off-spinner, I. G. Sutcliffe. Ryan took six for 36 v William Hulme's GS and Sutcliffe six for 65 v St Mary's College.

Merchant Taylors', Northwood were a strong batting side, but did not always bowl or field nuite eagerly enough to force victory. They did, however, beat St Albans, Highgate, Watford GS, MCC, University College School, Westminster, Dulwich and Cranleigh, A. J. Brand scored 1,117 runs, the best aggregate for 88 years, which included a school record 201 not out ySt Paul's. He batted for three hours with 33 boundaries, scoring a hundred before lunch and making his fourth fifty in 22 minutes. R. A. Hawkey's 57 wickets (slow left-arm) took his return in two years to 109. Merchiston Castle, in a year of rebuilding, put a dismal start behind them and finished on a high note with decisive victories in two-day games v Fettes (by an innings and 22 runs) and The Edinburgh Academy (by six wickets). Much was expected of the talented D. M. Streek, and when his batting failed to fulfil its promise, the side's brittleness was exposed. Fortunately Streek's fast-medium bowling helped compensate. Two players were outstanding for Millfield. I. Fletcher compiled 1,343 runs at an average of 103.30. including four hundreds in his first six innings, and he won the Daily Telegraph Under-19 batting award. J. C. Hallett headed the bowling with 45 wickets and was selected to tour Australia with England Young Cricketers in the winter. Both played for MCC Schools, English Schools and Somerset Second XI.

Mill Hill owed much to the medium-pace bowling of E. M. Latter and J. Handforth, aided by outstanding fielding, for victories over Christ's College, Highgate, University College School, St Paul's, The Leys and Norwich. J. H. Bohn, the captain, propped up a somewhat fragile batting order, but N. C. Propper and N. Kamath showed promise. G. E. S. Brock (slow left-arm) returned seven for 70 v Warwick School, showing the benefit of the advice received from G. A. R. Lock, the school's professional. Milton Abbey's strong batting side took advantage of the summer's firm pitches and the school enjoyed their most successful season since 1976, remaining unbeaten and winning nine of their thirteen matches. The opening pair, S. J. Courage (captain) and J. F. A. Baring, each scored hundreds, but while the bowling exceeded expectations, the opposition twice held on with nine wickets down. Bryanston's last pair played out twelve overs for a draw. Monkton Combe did not fare as well as of late, yet were encouraged by the performances of the young all-rounder, T. Simmons, in whom Somerset Second XI showed some interest.

Although, J. N. Britton apart, Newcastle-under-Lyme found batting difficult, this hardly mattered because of the strike-rate of their hostile and accurate pace attack – D. J. Brock, R. G. Mawby and M. H. Colclough. Brock's 52 wickets included six for 53 v Wolverhampton GS, Mawby returned six for 64 v MCC, and the wicket-keeper and slips held 26 catches. A highlight for Nottingham HS was a seven-wicket win v Repton, against whom J. Kennedy bowled 22 overs of in-swing for six for 71 and the captain, N. A. Hunt, hit an unbeaten 133. Other wins came v Welbeck College, Bishop Vesey's GS and Forest Amateurs, while there were defeats by MCC, Wakefield and Bedford Modern, the last despite another century from Hunt.

Oakham, beaten just once, enjoyed a better season than anticipated. Their four wins included one v local rivals Uppingham – for only the second time – and in four of the drawn games the opposition were nine wickets down at the close, among them Bedford Modern. The batting was headed by N. C. Kingham, who showed signs of becoming a fine attacking batsman, while I. R. Forsyth (medium) bowled a good line and length for his 38 wickets. Playing some good positive cricket, Oundle defeated The Leys, Mill Hill, Uppingham, Stowe and the XL Club. A feature of the season was the batting of the left-handed T. Harrison, the captain, whose 769 runs included 162 v Bedford and 174 v Blundell's, both of which exceeded the previous record for the school. A. Lee (fast-medium) took twenty wickets in his first four matches before missing most of the season through illness.

The Perse, putting out a strong batting side, beat The Leys, Wrekin, Kimbolton, Cambridgeshire Colts and King's, Ely. R. J. Doel, in an aggregate of 729 runs, established a school record by scoring first 144 not out v Newport and then 152 not out v The Leys, only to see it beaten by D. L. Young's 154 not out v Wrekin. The bowling and fielding were usually

less potent. **Pocklington's** success was built on the efforts of four strong batsmen, all of whom passed 500 runs; M. J. Wood, the captain, totalled 940 and A. J. Inns 802. However, their reputation led to some demanding declarations by the opposition, and these were beyond the rest of the batting if the main batsmen failed. The inability of Wood, a leg-spinner, to bow for much of the season weakened the attack. It was a successful season for **Portsmouth GS**, a young side who lost only once to schools opposition. They relied heavily on the batting of the captain, I. H. Muir, and J. F. Osborne, both of whom scored centuries. The major wicketakers were C. J. Ward (fast-medium) and A. M. Small (leg-breaks).

For Prior Park College, another young side, G. Lee was outstanding with 47 wickets – the most on record for the school – and 506 runs. More than 80 wickets fell to Lee (off-spin), K. Nwagbogu (slow left-arm) and K. Hemmings (off-spin). Downside were bowled out for 139 and Monkton Combe for 111. However, the batting did not always provide sufficient runs, although J. Power scored 478 in his first season in the XI. Queen Elizabeth's Hospital were beaten only by Queen's, Taunton in schools matches. Their improved fielding was a feature, but while D. Bennett and W. Phelan headed the attack with some success, they often lacked the support to bowl sides out. Queen's College, Taunton played all their matches away, owing to the re-laying of the main square, and so were particularly pleased to win six matches – Kingswood, Wycliffe, Exeter, Bristol GS, Queen Elizabeth's Hospital and King's, Bruton. The XI played positive, attacking cricket, and in C. Amor and M. Knight they had one of the most effective opening attacks in the south-west.

In schools matches, **Radley's** record was dented only by a last-over defeat by Eton; they in turn beat Wellington College, Winchester, Stowe, Abingdon, St Edward's, Oxford and, off the last ball, Bradfield and Harrow. M. J. Lowrey, the captain, and the left-handed J. T. M. Samuda, both of whom scored 500 runs, gave the side a good start with two century and three half-century opening stands. J. R. Pearce-Smith, who opened and bore the brunt of the bowling, took seven for 56 v Free Foresters. **Ratcliffe College** reported an encouraging season in which they won six and lost seven of their matches. In the consistent attack, J. Astill (medium) was the most penetrative, with the left-arm spin of G. Patel at its best in helpful conditions. Although the batting tended to be fragile, fourteen-year-old E. Meredith showed much promise when he joined the side towards the end of the season. Highlights for **Reading** were an innings of 105 v the Old Boys by the opening batsman, P. J. G. Darlow, who had made his maiden fifty in the previous match, and a return of eight for 58 v Abingdon by T. J. C. Dance (left-hand bat, right-arm fast bowler), who headed both averages.

A promising start for **Reed's** was followed by a run of five successive defeats. With a suspect middle order, too much depended on the opening batsmen, M. R. Neal-Smith and J. P. W. Ovenden, while the bowling relied on the success of J. R. Dharmasena (fast-medium). **Reigate GS**, fielding an inexperienced side, did well to achieve five good wins to offset six losses, four of which came early on. M. P. Lander was pre-eminent with 31 wickets and an aggregate of 739 runs – bettered only by N. J. Falkner's record in 1980. His 158 not out v Camul CC in Colchester was, however, a school record. J. R. Munday also passed 500 runs, as did the talented wicket-keeper-batsman, M. M. G. Wright, whose 120 not out secured a four-wicket win v his former school, Whitgift. The captain, G. J. Lawson, led from the front, capturing 31 wickets with some fiery bowling. **Rendcomb's** excellent season brought only one defeatby Cheltenham College – with nine wins and the better of all nine drawn games. Highlights were a return of seven for 13 v North Coney CC by A. Jones (slow left-arm) and an inning of 105 v Swindon CC by J. M. Fellows. Seven of the XI represented Gloucestershire Under-19.

After a promising start with victory v Oundle, Repton lost to Rugby, Nottingham HS and Malvern before finishing well with wins v Shrewsbury, Uppingham and (in the Stowe festival) Wellington College, Stowe and Bedford. R. A. C. Jerman's 689 runs included 151 not out Wellington, 109 v Bedford and 100 v Cheltenham, against whom he shared a fourth-wickel partnership of 204 with A. E. Jordan (117 not out). Rossall's high number of drawn games (fourteen) reflected their inability to bowl sides out. They batted in depth; among 817 runs scored by the left-handed opener, N. H. Crust – the most for the school for more than 40 years – was 112 not out v Merchant Taylors', Northwood and seven fifties. The dominan player for Royal GS, Guildford was the captain, P. Challinor, who captured 43 wickets and set a school record with 611 runs in fourteen innings. He was ably supported with the bat by A. Stedman and B. Ray, and though he lacked a reliable partner to open the bowling. A. Thomson (medium) provided good back-up with 30 wickets. Until the end-of-term

festival, at RGS High Wycombe, they were never bowled out and had lost only to Portsmouth GS. The festival, however, brought defeat by RGS Worcester, RGS Colchester and the hosts. In a season of rebuilding, Royal GS, Newcastle enjoyed surprising success with nine wins and just two defeats. A. Markham's long, accurate spells of fast-medium bowling brought 52 wickets- the best for more than a decade – and his runs were invaluable, notably his unbeaten 122 v The Perse. Equally significant was the contribution of O. Youll, a stylish left-hander, who topped the batting averages again with 641 runs, as well as capturing 26 wickets at 12.69 with his improving leg-spin.

Batting in depth, Royal GS, Worcester were unbeaten by schools and lost only to a powerful Masters' XI. The captain, M. J. Walker, led the scoring wth 751 runs, supported by M. J. N. Taylor, J. C. Ingles and C. J. Eyers, all of whom passed 500. The attack lacked penetration, although N. P. Haddock (slow left-arm), Walker (off-spin) and Eyers (medium) took more than 30 wickets each. A feature of the side was the wicket-keeping of R. J. Coyle, who broke all school records. Rugby enjoyed a confident and successful season in which five of their seven wins came in schools matches. They were ably led by R. R. Montgomerie, who scored a school record of 1,226 runs at 136.22 and went on to play for English Schools. Of the three other batsmen who scored hundreds, S. P. Corkill also passed 500 runs. Although no bowler dominated, the fielding was of a high enough standard to put pressure on most batting sides. Technical shortcomings at Rydal were compounded by a lack of resolution and concentration on the part of some senior players. An exception was P. J. Acheson, a young captain, who performed admirably as a leg-spinner and defensive batsman. R. L. Stewart (fast-medium) disappointed with the ball but hit to some effect on occasions, while fourteen-year-old M. MacDonald showed promise as a batsman.

Careless fielding by **St Albans** resulted in an average of three dropped catches per match, and yet they still managed ten wins. Having gone nine years without a century, the school recorded three in 1989. G. Dill broke the 84-year-old school record with an aggregate of 845 runs, and his 27 wickets included a hat-trick v Queen Elizabeth's – all taking middle stump. Another highlight was E. Foster's eight for 28 v St George's. A young **St Augustine**'s side did well to win half their matches, helped by their bowlers' ability to restrict the opposition to totals that their batsmen could overhaul. Two pairs of brothers – Edwards and Rego – were all useful all-rounders, especially Alton Rego who, in addition to his splendid slow left-arm bowling, made sure of several victories with the bat. As expected, **St Dunstan**'s suffered mixed fortunes in a time of transition. **St Edmund's, Canterbury** likewise were affected by the youth and inexperience of their XI. Their one win, v the Duke of York's Military School, was achieved almost single-handedly by J. D. Bowden, who scored 127 not out. He was the outstanding batsman, C. R. M. Whittington (slow left-arm) headed the bowling, and both were backed up by the talented all-rounder, A. Hajilou. **St Edward's, Oxford** lost only to Radley and in schools matches beat Bradfield and Bedford.

St George's, Weybridge were unbeaten by schools for the second successive season, and for the seventh time in eight years. I. B. Turner, an outstanding cricketer, be it as batsman, wicket-keeper or off-break bowler, had a particularly fine match v Tiffin, scoring 113 not out and returning eight for 43. He totalled 928 runs and headed both averages, although T. Clark took the most wickets (52) with his slow left-arm deliveries. A. Hollioake played for NAYC vMCC Schools at Lord's and for Surrey Second XI. A tour of Zimbabwe was undertaken in August. St John's, Leatherhead beat Alleyn's and Cranleigh – the latter bowled out for 68 in 12ply to 223 for nine declared – and in schools matches lost to Epsom, Hurstpierpoint and Seaford. With only two old colours available, St Peter's, York lacked depth and experience. However, T. E. J. Cooper enjoyed an excellent all-round season with 772 runs and 28 wickets (off-spin), the captain, R. Hutchinson, struck form late in the season, and S. A. C. Robinson left-arm fast-medium) could count himself unlucky not to finish with more than 35 wickets.

In terms of matches won, Sevenoaks had their most successful season since 1973, when C. J. Tavaré and P. R. Downton were in the side. Schools beaten were Ardingly, Colfe's, Cranbrook, Eltham College and Skinners'. While the bowling and fielding were reliable, it was the batting of D. E. Neil-Dwyer, the captain, and Omar Iqbal on which the XI's success was based; both averaged over 50 from 701 and 515 runs respectively. Neil-Dwyer scored 117 vArdingly, 117 v Cranbrook and 104 not out v Skinners', while Iqbal hit 107 v Brentwood. Sherborne, confidently captained by S. J. Leeke, won nine matches, including seven against schools, and lost only to Sherborne Town and Marlborough, when the last ball was hit for six.

A high standard of fielding contributed much to their success, with J. D. de la Hey again a competent wicket-keeper. Leeke hit the school's first century v MCC, B. D. Atwell collected hundreds v Dorset Rangers and Canford, and J. R. Tweedale played some fine innings. In the match v Radley S. W. Stevens (fast-medium) took six for 29, and C. D. Clarke captured six for 34 v Bradfield.

Shrewsbury's young and talented XI finished strongly with convincing victories v Malvern and Uppingham, plus a tense draw v Eton. On the debit side, resounding defeats by Repton and Cheltenham bore testimony to the inexperience of the middle-order batsmen. The captain, D. J. Bowett, dominated the season as a fast bowler and with the bat, his 753 runs including centuries v Uppingham and Shrewsbury Saracens. The leg-spin of P. W. Trimby and off breaks of H. E. E. Raven lent variety to a successful attack. Simon Langton GS gained maximum points in the Kent Reliance Under-19 League thanks to some notable performances by their bowlers. A. R. Danes (fast) took six for 14 v Bexley and Erith TC, while A. D. Judge (left-arm fast-medium or slow) captured six in the ten-wicket defeat of Norton Knatchbull and six for 16 v Chatham GS. Against St Edmund's, Judge followed innings of 104 not out by N. S. Cox and 112 not out from P. C. Relf by taking seven for 26. Relf, the captain, and D. G. Newton, the wicket-keeper, scored 129 not out and 91 not out respectively against Exeter School, sharing a record second-wicket stand of 219.

Under the positive and adventurous captaincy of J. M. A. Inglis, Solihull School won ten matches, including the final of the Warwickshire Under-19 knockout competition v Coventry School – Bablake, and lost only once. The first five in the batting order scored so freely that the others rarely got to the wicket. R. E. Hatcliffe was a model of consistency with eight half-centuries in his 873, including 155 v MCC and another hundred v Lytham. Inglis, too, passed 800 runs, with innings of 150 v RGS Worcester and 100 v King's, Worcester, and his often fiery bowling yielded 29 wickets, including eight v Warwick and seven v Newcastle-under-Lyme. S. A. Randall also bowled with great fire, and it was because of the success of the seam bowlers that S. K. Bushell's left-arm spin was under-used. M. Bevin was an excellent and enthusiastic wicket-keeper. Stamford produced some fine performances, notably v Trent and the Old Boys, yet were unable to win more than three matches. With the exception of D. Richardson, the captain, the batting was rather uncertain.

In a season of rebuilding, **Stockport GS** reported mixed fortunes. J. Mellor scored 102 not out in consecutive games v King's, Macclesfield and William Hulme's GS and produced a fine all-round performance v Cheadle Hulme, scoring 52 and taking five for 32 bowling medium pace. With the opening bowlers rarely beating the bat, much depended on the leg-spin of the captain, P. Duckworth, who took six for 46 v King's, Tynemouth. Fourteen-year-old S. Lapsia showed much promise with the bat when he joined the side in mid-season. Ably led by J. P. Flood, **Stonyhurst** beat Rossall and Stonyhurst Wanderers and lost only to Ampleforth and Birkenhead. A fine team spirit and excellent ground fielding were evident throughout the season. B. Hammond, like his captain a fine fielder, made an excellent all-round contribution, taking most wickets with his fast-medium in-swing bowling and finishing second to Flood among the run-scorers. In the innings defeat of the Wanderers he scored 98 and had a match return of eleven for 35. Leg-spinner M. Brotherton occasionally caused much confusion among opposing batsmen, while K. Riley (fast-medium) impressed in his first season. R. Hayhurst (21 ct, 2 st) kept wicket tidily.

Stowe's suspect middle-order batting prevented the XI from taking full advantage of their generally tight attack. The left-arm spin of M. J. T. Jefferson and off-spin of J. G. Raynor restricted all but four sides to less than 200. A highlight was the innings of 101 not out v Rugby by G. J. Amdor, whose enterprising captaincy led to several close finishes, notably the draw with scores tied v Bradfield. In a disappointing season Strathallan nevertheless found encouragement in the stamina and promise of H. A. D. McKenzie-Wilson (fast-medium), who collected 42 wickets, and the slow left-arm bowling of fifteen-year-old K. L. Salters. Sutton Valence put behind them the loss in a fire of their pavilion, with its reminders of the school's sporting past, and finished with eight wins. Their one defeat was by MCC. Their strength lay with four colours, of whom the captain, J. F. Barr (opening bat and slow left-arm bowler), collected 629 runs and 39 wickets and D. S. Patel (leg-breaks) took 35 wickets, including his 100th for the XI. However, opening bowlers R. Girling and Y. S. Patel were unavailable from mid-June, and with other leading players also absent at times, a total of 21 players appeared in the side.

Taunton won seven of their sixteen matches, but with a strong side on paper they were disappointed to record as many as seven draws. They attributed this to the bowlers' inability to break through on good batting pitches. The Warwickshire player, P. C. L. Holloway, and A. Habib, who played for Middlesex Second XI, both averaged over 60 with 831 and 792 runs respectively. The next-highest aggregate was 187 from G. Bennett, who headed the bowling with 35 wickets. Holloway was selected for the winter tour of Australia by England Young Cricketers. Tiffin had a mixed season. The batting fell apart at crucial times and the captain, J. Matthews, did not always get the best from his slow left-arm bowlers. It was felt also that R. D. Nash did not bat to his full potential, even though he scored his 608 runs quickly. However, G. J. Kennis, who played for England Under-15, displayed real class in his four matches, and B. J. Walters, who played for England at that level in 1988, enjoyed a good allround season with 456 runs and 33 wickets bowling slow left-arm, R. H. Beeching's 37 wickets, also from left-arm spin, included seven for 22 v St Benedict's. Tonbridge beat Wellington, Haileybury, Sevenoaks, Eastbourne, Old Tonbridgians and Tonbridge CC, losing only to Harrow. D. R. Penfold's 621 runs included 106 not out v Eastbourne, while the captain, C. J. Hollins, a brilliant fielder, scored 476 runs and his off-breaks provided a contrasting attack with the pace of D. L. Gilbert, R. D. Gill scored 100 not out v Haileybury and P. J. A. Scrimshaw-Wright was a very able wicket-keeper.

At Trent College, five batsmen hit ten centuries. The left-handed T. C. White, scorer of three in 1988, set school records with four hundreds and an aggregate of 805, while his fellow-opener, J. D. Evans, hit three. Against Warwick School, Trent compiled a record total of 331 for one declared with all three batsmen reaching three figures (White 110 in 59 minutes, Evans 101 not out, I. R. Birch 113 not out). A. J. Bailey (fast-medium) led the attack in fine style and was ably assisted by C. G. Pye (left-arm fast-medium) and Birch (leg-spin). Trinity, unbeaten by schools, won fourteen matches. The captain, P. A. Gardner, led from the front with 565 runs and, bowling fast, 71 wickets to increase his total for the XI to a post-war record of 195. He also played for Surrey Second XI. J. D. Morley broke the school batting records with 1,179 for the season and an aggregate for the XI of 2,511. There was strong batting support from D. M. P. Turner and S. S. Prabhu, while J. D. Good (medium) and C.N. Hollands (slow left-arm) performed well with the ball. An undefeated four-match tour of Holland provided a fitting climax to the season. Truro, whose five defeats were all by narrow margins, improved during the summer and look forward to a more rewarding season in 1990.

A highlight for University College School was the return of six for 1 by off-spinner D. Quint as Westminster were dismissed for 45. Uppingham's young side managed only one win - v a strong Rugby side. However, prospects are good with nine of the eleven expected to return in 1990, among whom J. H. Renison, P. S. Gaekwad and E. R. Fowler all passed 500 runs. Warwick School reported a disappointing season. The bowling was ordinary, conceding seven hundreds, whereas no Warwick batsman looked like reaching three figures. Taking their lead from the civilised captaincy of D. S. Miles, Watford GS played attractive and at times enterprising cricket. N. A. Potter batted with maturity and increasing confidence, and while A. D. Griffin played less freely than in 1988 he was more reliable. He also kept wicket excellently. Despite a tendency to bowl too short, S. R. Easterbrook took the most wickets, and D. H. T. Warren purveyed some promising off-spin. Undefeated by schools, Wellingborough beat ten sides, including Oakham, Kimbolton, Ratcliffe, Chigwell, Watford GS and Lord Williams's, Thame. Their opening bowler, R. Cousins, was again outstanding, his 67 wickets including eight for 18 v Ratcliffe, eight for 32 v Gentlemen of Leicestershire and six for 9 v Kimbolton (dismissed for 14, with N. Haste taking the other four wickets for ² runs). Haste made an excellent all-round contribution with 421 runs and 50 wickets, and the captain, J. M. Attfield's 707 runs contained fine centuries v Forest and Brentwood.

The determination of Wellington College to play positive cricket resulted in an exciting and enjoyable season in which seven schools games were won, six lost and only two drawn; twelve games went to the last two overs. M. C. K. Hodgson headed the averages and led the side enthusiastically, fostering good team spirit. Wellington School enjoyed their best record for many years with eight victories, six of which came at the end of the season. Notable wins were those v Simon Langton GS, Bristol GS and Hereford Cathedral School. They attributed their success to sensibly aggressive batting, particularly by J. Austin, S. Comins and C. Vellacott, the captain. Westminster's season was plagued by the disruption of exams, rail strikes and inopportune storms – and as well as that they lacked penetrative bowlers. An early victory v

Highgate, in which they successfully chased more than 200 runs, should have established confidence, yet the only other win was v the Old Westminsters in the last fixture. A cheering feature was the confident batting of fourteen-year-old A. Worthington. At Whitgiff, indifferent batting early on saw the XI lose to Dulwich and Brighton; but then Hurstpierpoint were beaten in a low-scoring game, and in the second half of the season Whitgift totalled 218 and 267 to beat Old Whitgiftians and MCC respectively. Lacking support for R. J. Targett (fast-medium), the school often struggled to bowl sides out.

Dominant for Woodbridge in a mixed season was their captain and fast bowler, P. E. I. Donnison, whose 40 wickets included eight for 39 in the defeat of St Joseph's College. He went on to play for Suffolk and represented English Schools v New Zealand Young Cricketers, Although he was well supported by the left-arm spin of M. Baumbach, the side lacked another quality strike bowler. Similarly the batting depended on the first three, for the middle order tended to be weak. Woodhouse Grove had an undistinguished season, with their only victory, v Hipperholme, coming in the final over of the last match. S. N. Lee (leg-spin) bowled well and received sound support from R. D. Webster (medium), but other more experienced bowlers lacked the necessary control. J. L. Gomersall, captain and opening bat, demonstrated a broad range of strokes and admirable application, and C. J. Rika, an under-15 batsman, looked an outstanding prospect as he scored 100 not out against Durham's accomplished attack. Worksop College's young side played some good positive cricket and beat Denstone, Bloxham and Ellesmere, losing only to Hurstpierpoint in schools matches. The captain, J. D. Goode, scored 116 v St Peter's, York and 124 not out v Trent, while R. A. Kettleborough and J. C. Beardsley both made fine all-round contributions.

Wrekin, another young side, had a season of contrasts in which some excellent victoriesnotably v MCC, Denstone and King Edward's, Birmingham - were offset by unnecessary defeats. Wycliffe College enjoyed one of their most successful seasons in recent years, winning six of their last eight schools matches. The defeats of Kingswood, Dean Close and King's, Worcester were particularly noteworthy. Success stemmed from a solid all-round team effort, including some excellent fielding. G. M. Collins (opening bat and wicket-keeper) held the innings together while the strokemakers made quick runs, and his brother, S. P. Collins, compiled a maiden century v Rougemont. The bowling, accurate and penetrative, was opened by the improved T. J. S. Horton and S. B. Thomas, with J. F. P. Tovey, the captain, providing flighted off-spin and G. A. McDade some left-arm variety. In contrast, Wyggeston & Queen Elizabeth I Sixth Form College reported their least successful season for some years. However, under the excellent captaincy of J. K. Rainford, the young team's enthusiasm in the field compensated in part for their lack of experience. D. Green topped both averages as his brother, J. L. Green, had in 1988.
