SCHOOLS CRICKET IN 1994

Schools cricket in the British Isles, especially in the south of England, suffered from a series of wet Saturdays in April and May, with match after match abandoned, and exams in June made their usual demands on players. The long, dry spell which will be entrenched in the memory of cricket-lovers began as the summer term was ending, so that the festivals, at least, enjoyed the panorama of blue skies and white marquees. It follows that school sides found it difficult to become established in the few weeks available to them. Because of examinations and the early departure of school-leavers, younger players, often only 14, who came into the first eleven in mid-term, made more appearances than their seniors had done. So many schools now report having a young eleven that it has ceased to be a novelty. These young cricketers do not lack enthusiasm, but while their obvious enjoyment is pervasive and infectious, standards are inevitably lowered.

To a varying degree, the schools whose records appear in the following pages all offer sound coaching to their players. There are staff with NCA coaching qualifications and experience in playing at county, university or club level, and in many cases the services of a professional gilds the lily. Their teams play on favourable wickets on which 450 runs in a match are not uncommon, half-centuries abound, and the top three or four batsmen will win plaudits for their technique. Bowlers, however, can find difficulty in dismissing sides. Those of genuine pace are rare, though there are plenty of medium-paced seamers displaying the virtues of line and length. There is a high proportion of spinners, often drawn from younger players not afraid to attack and give the ball a high trajectory. They are the beneficiaries of conventional cricket, rather than the scapegoats of the limited-overs game. As long as schools are ready to make equitable declarations, the conventional game must be the flagship of first eleven cricket at school level, and the experience of the 1994 season suggests most schools interpret their role sensibly. There remain a few who retain a negative attitude, determined not to lose whatever the price: names are known on the circuit.

Boys who wish to play in July and August can find a great deal of cricket is available through clubs and the county associations. Most prestigious in the Schools' seasonal calendar is the annual MCC Oxford and Lord's Festival, where among those watching in 1994 were Micky Stewart, the NCA Director of Coaching and Excellence, and Graham Saville, the England Under-19 manager. The Festival, unlike its three immediate predecessors, was played in mostly glorious weather and in a heat wave, although the first day was interrupted by rain. At the end of seven days' cricket, those who had survived to the end, and passed through the various stages of selection, had endured – and, one hopes, enjoyed – a marathon exercise.

Of the boys chosen by the Headmasters' Conference (HMC) and English Schools Cricket Association (ESCA) selectors, there was a large number of able batsmen. Among those who got no further than the Oxford "prelims" were David Lawrence (Cheltenham), Christopher Walsh (Tonbridge) and Michael Sutliff (Wyggeston & Queen Elizabeth I SFC). Spinners included Gareth Batty (Bingley GS), while Christopher McDonald (De La Salle,

Lancashire) kept wicket well. The three bowlers of any pace at Oxford all appeared at Lord's.

After a particularly entertaining final trial at Christ Church ground, Oxford, the HMC and ESCA selectors invited a squad to play in at least one match at Lord's. To their ranks were added three others from the Oxford Festival, selected independently by the National Association of Young Cricketers (NAYC) for their match against the MCC Schools. The possible overlap in selection can be a source of confusion, not to say occasional irritation to the organisers. What is more important is that the following 16 boys from those at Oxford played cricket at the game's headquarters: Richard Baggs, Andrew Bairstow, Dean Cosker, Michael Davies, Orlando Le Fleming, Ian Gompertz, Barry Hyam, Neil Killeen, Patrick McKeown, Lee Marland, Robin Martin-Jenkins, Paul Mitchell, Wayne Ritzema, Anurag Singh, Alec Swann and James Taylor. Their schools may be found in the scorecards that follow. – Gerald Howat.

HMC SOUTHERN SCHOOLS v HMC NORTHERN SCHOOLS

At Wadham College, Oxford, July 8, 9. HMC Southern Schools won by one wicket.

Southern Schools snatched an unlikely victory with one ball to spare after Northern Schools had mostly dominated. The shortened first day featured vigorous innings from Bairstow and McKeown, followed by a sound knock from Lawrence, and on the second day, Ritzema's neatly made century enabled Marland to set a target of 241. Southern Schools were 129 for six when the last 20 overs began and 161 for six ten overs later, but then Ford launched an assault on the bowling, going swiftly from 50 to 93 before being well caught by Bairstow, and Goodwin settled matters by hitting Le Fleming for 12 off the first five balls of the final over. Southern Schools bowled steadily but without much penetration, while the pick of Northern Schools' bowlers were Martin-Jenkins and Davies. The fielding was excellent throughout.

Their superior bowling gave the North the upper hand for most of the match. Their first three batsmen, Trainor, Sutliff and Swann, performed well in both innings, with only Cosker bowling accurately enough to keep them in check. However, when the South batted, Killeen twice caused early damage and his pace was a constant threat. Taylor and Hyam batted sensibly in the first innings and Baggs was commanding in the second to give the South a hint of victory, but there was not enough support. Both sides were sharp in the field, with the wicket-keeping of Hyam particularly good.

Lynch, a New Zealand Under-19 player, tested the covers with some powerful driving and, once past his century, took 20 off an over. In very hot conditions, the Schools' bowlers stuck manfully to their task, until a declaration after 54 overs set an

interesting challenge. The Schools made a sound start through a second-wicket partnership of 112 between Mitchell and Swann, with Singh sustaining the momentum. However, with 125 needed in the last hour, the experienced spinners, Simmons and Potter, took control. Despite an effective 43 by Martin-Jenkins and a final flurry by Le Fleming, the Schools ended five runs short with the last pair together.

Heavy thunderstorms, following a long spell of sultry heat which had hardened the ground, delayed the start until the afternoon, when a 35-overs match was played. On a lively wicket the NAYC opening bowlers, Harvey and Burroughs, were too sharp for MCC Schools, who were in some trouble at 26 for three. However, the 1994 MCC Oxford Festival was noticeable for its array of batsmen, and the left-handed Baggs played attackingly while Singh confirmed that he is one of the most promising schoolboys in the country, leaning into the ball with a textbook cover drive. His running between the wickets with McKeown was an education. When NAYC replied, James Taylor of Hampshire batted with vigour and, for the second evening running, Le Fleming, who has won selection for Devon as a medium-fast bowler, featured in a late chase, spoiling Swann's analysis as his 38 took NAYC to victory with three balls to spare.

ETON v HARROW

An uninspiring game suddenly came alive in the closing stages. Chasing 236 in what became 46 overs, Eton had lost the previous year's centurion, Machin, for nought and reached only 51 by the 23rd. Then Fulton and Hardy let rip and the next 23 overs yielded 179. With eight left they needed 60 and had nine wickets in hand. But Rayner bowled Hardy and Duberly with consecutive deliveries and, after Roundell had removed Lightfoot, finally dismissed Fulton for 112. He had hit three sixes and 11 fours from 138 balls. Nine runs were required from Roundell's last over; for a wild moment, when two wickets fell off the first two deliveries, any result seemed possible. But both sides had shot their bolt

and the game was drawn. Despite asking Harrow to bat, Lightfoot and his spin attack never quite exerted their control of the previous year, though they conceded under two an over before lunch. Growing more aggressive, the left-handed Chittenden brought up the 100 with a six; first he, then Roundell, looked likely to score the third successive century in this fixture. But with both falling short, the honours went to the 16-year-old Fulton.

Of the 159 matches played between the two schools since 1805, Eton have won 52, Harrow 44 and 63 have been drawn. Matches during the two world wars are excluded from the reckoning. The fixture was reduced from a two-day two-innings-a-side match to one day in 1982. Forty-eight centuries have been scored, the highest being 183 by D. C. Boles of Eton in 1904; M. C. Bird of Harrow is the only batsman to have made two hundreds in a match, in 1907. The highest score since the First World War is 161 not out by M. K. Fosh of Harrow in 1975, Harrow's last victory. Since then Eton have won in 1977, 1985, 1990 and 1991; all other games have been drawn. A full list of centuries since 1918 and results from 1950 can be found in Wisdens prior to 1994.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE SCHOOLS

The dismal weather at the beginning of the summer caused many games to be cancelled or curtailed, affecting the results of batsmen and bowlers alike. Gordonstoun in Morayshire was an exception, reporting the best May in years. From the schools whose results are recorded here, only three batsmen reached 1,000 runs, the same as in the poor summer of 1991. P. A. Sogbodjor of Christ's College, Finchley, was by far the most prolific with 1,332 at 70.10, followed by W. Ritzema of Durham (1,038 at 57.66) and C. Jones of Victoria College, Jersey (1,019 at 72.78). Sogbodjor had the advantage of playing more innings than anyone else (26), while Ritzema and Jones had 21 and 20 respectively. Of those who passed 500, four batsmen recorded three-figure averages. The highest of these was that of I. Gompertz of Blundell's, whose 875 from 14 innings came at an average of 125.00; the others were O. M. Slipper of St Edward's, Oxford, with 558 runs at 111.60 and R. W. Nowell of Trinity, with 737 at 105.28, who both had ten innings, followed by O. A. Shah of Isleworth & Syon, whose 510 runs at 102.00 came from eight innings. There were 18 scores

of 150 or more, but Sogbodjor was alone in going on to a double-century with 206 not out. His five hundreds were also the most, while seven batsmen made four.

If the batting records were less spectacular than in 1993, the bowling suffered even more. No bowler took 60 wickets and only three collected 50, two fewer than in 1991, which provided the worst record for many years. The three were L. J. Botham of Rossall, with 54 at 10.00 off 230 overs, M. G. J. Walker of Barnard Castle, whose 51 off 287.3 overs cost 16.13 apiece, and A. G. Levenger of Solihull, who bowled 228 overs for his 50 at 14.88. Another seven bowlers took 45 wickets or more, all requiring at least 200 overs to do so. Seven boys sent down more than 250 overs, with J. R. Burrans, a spinner from Pocklington (314), alone in bowling 300.

The only bowler to pass 30 wickets with a single-figure average was A. B. Birley of Birkenhead, whose 40 cost just 7.77 apiece. The best innings return was nine for 45 by G. Henderson of St George's, Weybridge, and there were eight instances of eight-wicket returns. Five hat-tricks were reported: from T. J. Allen of Campbell College, B. Lockwood of Clifton College, S. J. Speller of St John's, Leatherhead, N. P. Sproule of St Lawrence College, Ramsgate and J. M. Palmer of Lord Wandsworth College. This last hat-trick was remarkable for being all stumped – by the reserve wicket-keeper, C. J. Walker.

In terms of aggregates, the leading all-rounders were J. W. Hatch of Barnard Castle, with 910 runs at 45.50 and 47 wickets at 15.06, C. G. Taylor of Colston's Collegiate, who had 917 runs at 61.13 and 40 wickets at 15.00, and Botham, who hit 774 runs at 70.36 in addition to his 54 wickets at 10.00. In terms of averages, four boys stood out, doing better than 70 with the bat and 12 with the ball: Nowell (737 runs at 105.28, 29 wickets at 10.65), D. Sales of Caterham (830 runs at 83.00, 34 wickets at 11.23), Botham (as above) and S. C. B. Tomlinson of The Oratory (564 runs at 70.50, 35 wickets at 10.40). The Cricket Society's Wetherall Award went to Nowell, who was honoured for a second time, having shared the 1992 award with D. Spencer of Kingston GS.

Twenty-seven schools won more than half their matches, and of these Isleworth & Syon won 75 per cent, King's College School, Wimbledon won 73 per cent and Tonbridge 71 per cent. Isleworth & Syon and Tonbridge were unbeaten, as were ten other schools. Of these Bryanston and Queen Elizabeth GS, Wakefield, also won more than half their matches, but some had an alarmingly high percentage of draws, the most extreme being St Peter's, York, who drew 17 of their 21 encounters. Harrow, another side with a high preponderance of draws, had the unenviable record of no wins. Again several schools expressed their frustration at the negative attitude of some opposing sides, while many were proud of their positive approach.

The Sir Garfield Sobers International Schools' Cricket Tournament took place in Barbados in July and August, unfortunately clashing with the MCC Oxford and Lord's Festival. Of the four British schools which participated in 1994 – Bradfield, Dr Challoner's GS, The Leys and Merchiston Castle – Dr Challoner's did best in taking 11th place. The tournament has featured some notable players in the eight years it has been held: in 1987 it was Brian Lara, playing for the Fatima College, who made the headlines.
