The MCC Oxford Festival again benefited from the fine July weather. Forty-four of the most talented young players were selected to participate by the Headmasters' Conference (HMC) and English Schools Cricket Association (ESCA). It was unfortunate that some of the players were below their best, owing to the amount of cricket they had played in the preceding two weeks: three of the seam bowlers broke down through injury on the first two days of the Festival and other players were unavailable for the final game at Lord's owing to exhaustion or injuries.

At the end of the four days at Oxford, the following 13 players were selected to play at Lord's: Toby Bailey, Paul Bainbridge, Andrew Birley, Anthony Crozier, Sam Diment, Noel Gie, Giles Goodwin, Tim Lamb, James Lawrence, David Lewis, Luke Sutton, Chris Taylor and Mark Wagh.

HMC SOUTHERN SCHOOLS v HMC NORTHERN SCHOOLS

At Wadham College, Oxford, July 14, 15. Drawn.

On an excellent pitch, batsmen and bowlers alike were able to demonstrate their skills in a tense and well-fought match. South had the better of the first day, with all their batsmen chipping in and the bowlers restricting North to 183 for seven. A highlight was the wicket-keeping of Bailey, who executed two very sharp leg-side stumpings, while Birley thoroughly deserved his six wickets and Fulton batted thoughtfully. Taylor and Strauss showed their class with the bat on the second day, enabling Sutton to set a target of 269 in four hours. After the usually prolific Chilton and Lowe had gone cheaply, North only just managed to stave off some spirited bowling and salvage a draw, thanks to a sensible half-century from Bailey.

ETON v HARROW

Harrow had the satisfaction of bowling Eton out, thanks to the swing of Leathes, whose six for 19 included a spell of five for three in 23 balls. It was the first time since 1991 that either side had been dismissed. But the breakthrough came too late to make a match of it. Dixon had batted four hours for Eton's third century in successive years, hitting 13 fours and adding 110 in even time with Lea. It was Lea's removal, by Nicol, which signalled a falling-away for Eton: their last seven fell for 54, with Dixon reaching three figures just before he became Leathes's fifth victim. Harrow had to chase 220 in what became 45 overs and, after a slow start – 12 for two in the 12th over – they never looked like getting there. Cox was their leading batsman, with 45, and though Spry lived up to his name with seven fours in 31, wickets fell at regular intervals and it was left to Gillions to ensure safety. Two male streakers, carrying blue shirts, loped across the outfield in the evening sunshine.

Of the 160 matches played between the two schools since 1805, Eton have won 52, Harrow 44 and 64 have been drawn. Matches during the two world wars are excluded from the reckoning. The fixture was reduced from a two-day, two-innings-a-side match to one day in 1982. Forty-mire centuries have been scored, the highest being 183 by D. C. Boles of Eton in 1904; M. C. Bird of Harrow is the only batsman to have made two hundreds in a match, in 1907. The highest score since the First World War is 161 not out by M. K. Fosh of Harrow in 1975, Harrow's last victory. Since then Eton have won in 1977, 1985, 1990 and 1991; all other games have been drawn. A full list of centuries since 1918 and results from 1950 can be found in Wisdens prior to 1994.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE SCHOOLS

Once the pitches dried out and many became a batsman's paradise, batting records tumbled. From the schools reviewed here, 16 batsmen scored 1,000 runs, five more than the previous best of 11 in 1990 and 1993.

Eight of these played fewer than 20 innings and the most prolific, C. G. Taylor of Colston's, made his 1,597 in only 18, at an average of 106.46. He also took 31 wickets at 18.87 and won the Cricket Society's Wetherall Award. Others to pass 1,300 runs were S. E. P. Davies of Bradford Grammar School, D. Grundy of Merchant Taylors', Northwood and M. J. Chilton of Manchester Grammar, who scored 1,361 at 104.69 in only 16 innings. Four batsmen recorded four-figure aggregates with three-figure averages; in addition to Taylor and Chilton, E. J. Wilson of Felsted made 1,202 at the season's highest average of 120.20 and R. W. J. Howitt of Denstone scored 1,016 at 101.60, while D. Young of Warwick was close with 923 at 102.55 from just 12 innings.

Of the five double-centuries reported, Taylor had two: 278 not out, which equalled the highest for an English public school by J. L. Guise in 1921, and 201. Other double-centuries came from N. A. Gie of Trent, S. C. B. Tomlinson of Oratory and R. G. H. Widdowson of Loughborough Grammar. There were hundreds galore, with nine bastsmen scoring five or more. Taylor topped this list too, his eight coming at the rate of one every 2.25 innings, while Chilton and M. Swarbrick of Clayesmore had seven at a similar rate.

As might be expected, the bowling figures were less spectacular, although some bowlers were surprisingly economical. No one took 60 wickets, but four had 50 - one more than in 1994. T. Slade of Caterham was the most successful with 57 at 11.75, followed by N. Sapra of Merchant Taylors', Northwood (53 at 12.69), B. W. O'Connell of Tiffin (50 at 19.50) and A. T. J. Clark of Trinity, who bowled the most, with 50 at 18.30 off 341 overs. O'Connell also scored 635 runs and Clark 501. There were five single-figure averages recorded by bowlers with more than 30 wickets. The most economical was M. Breetzke of Stonyhurst, whose 42 cost just 7.42 apiece, followed by E. Lamb of Merchant Taylors', Northwood (39 at 8.64), A. B. Birley of Birkenhead (33 at 9.78), S. S. Nanji of Gordonstoun (36 at 9.88) and M. J. Williamson of Bangor Grammar (38 at 9.97). Exeter's A. O. F. Le Fleming had the best analysis with nine for 26, while other nine-wicket returns were achieved by A. Herman of Portsmouth Grammar (nine for 29), J. A. S. Pye of Solihull (nine for 40) and L. J. Ratcliffe of Marlborough (nine for 62). Hat-tricks abounded. Eight were reported from M. Attwood of Wrekin, B. Barton and Slade both of Caterham, S. D. G. Engelen and D. de Jager of Harrow, M. Joel of St Edward's, Oxford, M. Klein of Kimbolton and D. Walder of Oundle.

In terms of quantity, the leading all-rounders were M. A. Wagh of King Edward's, Birmingham with 1,062 runs at 53.10 and 40 wickets at 12.87, J. M. Palmer of Lord Wandsworth (742 runs and 48 wickets), J. Gibson of The Edinburgh Academy (724 runs and 46 wickets) and P. R. Mouncey of Pocklington (721 runs and 41 wickets). In terms of averages, four players with 500 runs and 30 wickets averaged 50 with the bat and 14 with the ball – Palmer, Wagh, Gibson and J. W. Hatch of Barnard Castle, while Le Fleming, although ten runs short of the criterion, had the best averages with 490 runs at 61.25 and 35 runs at 10.48.

Of the 35 schools who won more than half their matches, Oratory had the most impressive record with 76 per cent won, followed by Canford with 72 per cent. Oratory were one of five unbeaten sides, the others being Forest, Malvern, Plymouth and Radley. Of these, Radley and Forest won more than they drew and Malvern won half their games, but Plymouth had only three wins to offset as many as 11 draws. Although several sides won only once, Sutton Valence were alone in managing none. The experiment with limited-overs games often proved popular and, following the MCC initiative at the beginning of the season, there were fewer complaints of negative play. Despite the increasing influence of examinations during the season, many schools played more than 20 matches.

Details of records broken, other outstanding performances and interesting features of the season may be found in the returns from the schools which follow.
