The 13th MCC Schools Festival, held in fine weather at Oxford from July 12-15, featured some of the best schoolboy cricketers in teams chosen separately by the Headmasters' Conference (HMC) and the English Schools Cricket Association (ESCA). Although some of the older boys are unavailable these days, owing to the increasing representative opportunities elsewhere, this does give younger boys a chance of making their mark. And many do.

At Wadham College, July 12, 13. HMC Northern Schools won by eight wickets.

It was a match for batsmen, with four reaching three figures and no bowler taking more than two wickets. Southern Schools dominated the first day, on which Pyemont scored an excellent century before lunch. A century from Hodgson on the second day enabled Fulton to set a target of 291, whereupon an imposing partnership between the game's other centurions, Young and Richardson, settled matters decisively with time to spare.

ETON v HARROW

Eton won the toss, but could not take advantage of it. Having asked Harrow to bat, they made them fight for their runs at first; Maydon took 50 minutes over his three. After lunch, however, Harrow's batsmen accelerated. Norris hit nine fours and a six in his half-century, and put on 85 in an hour with Gillions. Then he was caught behind, the first victim of medium-pacer Bailey's spell of four for 12 in five overs. Harrow declared at 238, giving their bowlers two hours and 40 minutes to bowl Eton out. At tea, they were hopeful: they had dismissed the top three for 31 in 15 overs. But the final session saw Lea and Bailey take their partnership to 87 in as many minutes. Only one more wicket fell, that of Lea, whose 57 was the highest score of the match. With only half an hour to the close, he had already ensured Eton's safety.

Of the 161 matches between the two schools since 1805, Eton have won 52, Harrow 44 and 65 have been drawn. Matches during the two world wars are excluded from the reckoning. The fixture was reduced from a two-day, two-innings-a-side match to one day in 1982. Forty-nine centuries have been scored, the highest being 183 by D. C. Boles of Eton in 1904; M. C. Bird of Harrow is the only batsman to have made two hundreds in a match, in 1907. The highest score since the First World War is 161 not out by M. K. Fosh of Harrow in 1975, Harrow's last victory. Since then Eton have won in 1977, 1985, 1990 and 1991; all other games have been drawn. A full list of centuries since 1918 and results from 1950 can be found in Wisdens prior to 1994.


HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE SCHOOLS

Although it was not a vintage year, some memorable moments and notable performances were reported by the schools. Seven batsmen passed 1,000 runs, four doing so in less than 20 innings. The most prolific were R. Wilkinson of Worksop, who scored 1,161 runs at 82.92 in 17 innings, and M. A. Truman of Framlingham, who made the same number, but in 22 innings at an average of 64.50. Close behind them was S. J. Birtwisle of Durham, whose 1,107 came at the best average of 110.70. J. P. Pyemont of Tonbridge had 1,098 at 64.58, followed by D. C. Nash of Malvem (1,093 at 68.31), E. D. C. Craig of Winchester (1,061 at 55.84) and D. P. Reddyhough of Loughborough GS (1,041 at 65.06). Of those passing 400 runs, three-figure averages were also recorded by N. Millar of Fettes, with 668 at the season's best of 111.33, and C. G. Taylor of Colston's Collegiate, who scored 410 in only four innings at an average of 102.50. D. J. Young of Warwick School and A. Major of Canford both scored double-centuries, and there were five innings of 175 or more. Two scored five hundreds: B. J. Thompson of Magdalen College School collected his at a rate of one every 3.6 innings.

The bowlers fared rather better than in 1995. Two passed 60 wickets. J. M. Milton of Oundle had by far the most, with 75 at 17.44, although he bowled a phenomenal 433 overs; T. W. Briggs of Reigate GS bowled 148 fewer overs for his 67 at 13.86. The others to take 50 or more were G. R. Saxton of Bradford GS (55 at 13.18), P. R. Elsley of Framlingham (53 at 16.20), P. W. Anderson of Kingston GS (51 at only 8.66), I. Azam of Christ's College, Finchley (51 at 10.74), T. J. Phillips of Felsted (51 at 14.01) and N. G. Hatch of Barnard Castle (50 at 13.26). Single-figure averages were also achieved by G. S. Sodhi of Ellesmere, who was the most economical of all with 49 at 8.28, and S. C. B. Tomlinson of the Oratory School, whose 43 cost 8.81 apiece.

The outstanding analysis was Azam's ten for 37 against Gents of Hertfordshire, followed by nine for 27 by S. A. Musk of Royal GS, High Wycombe. No one else took nine in an innings. E. Smallman of Ardingly took four wickets in four balls, and there were eight other hat-tricks from Hatch, D. Finch of St Edmund's, Canterbury, H. Fitch of Bryanston, M. Lloyd of South Craven, R. P. F. Montagu-Williams and R. Robinson of Solihull, G. L. Walters of Monmouth and P. Young of St Edmund's, Ware.

In terms of quantity, the leading all-rounders were Sodhi, who scored 747 runs at 49.80 in addition to his 49 wickets, Tomlinson, with 759 runs at 75.90 to set alongside his 43 wickets, D. J. H. Walder of Oundle with 682 runs at 52.46 and 49 wickets at 14.59, G. D. Franklin of Malvern (541 runs and 45 wickets), D. Bell of Dauntsey's (516 runs and 42 wickets) and E. Sellwood of Royal GS, Worcester (546 runs and 43 wickets). In terms of averages, the best among those with 500 runs and 30 wickets was Tomlinson, winner of the Cricket Society's Wetherell Award, followed by Sodhi and Worksop's Wilkinson, who took 33 wickets at 14.33 in addition to his 1.161 runs.

Of the 40 schools who won more than half their matches, Bangor GS recorded the best winning percentage of 86, while Campbell College and Durham both won 83 per cent and Taunton 82 per cent. The six unbeaten sides were Langley Park, Merchant Taylors', Northwood, Eton and King Edward VI, Southampton – all of whom won more than half their matches – plus Fettes and Trinity. Dover College and Llandovery College were the only sides to win none at all.

Although a surprising number managed at least to start all their fixtures, nine schools, from all parts of the country, reported as many as five completely abandoned, while Gordonstoun, Llandovery, King Edward VI, Stourbridge, South Craven and St Lawrence, Ramsgate all lost a third of their fixtures. In contrast, Brighton College lost only one hour all season and wondered whether that was a record in Britain. Many schools played a variety of types of game – declaration, limited overs or "proportional limited overs" (in which the side batting first faces 50 overs, their opponents face 45 and a draw is possible).

The five British schools who participated in the Sir Garfield Sobers Schools Cricket Festival in Barbados were Ashville, City of London Freemen's School, Gresham's, Merchiston Castle and Uppingham. Gresham's, who had also played in the inaugural festival in 1987, achieved the highest placing of sixth, with only a dropped catch preventing them from heading their group. The tournament was won jointly by Transvaal Schools and Dominican Schools after the final was rained off.

Details of records broken, other outstanding performances and interesting features of the season may be found in the returns from the schools which follow.
