SCHOOLS CRICKET IN 1998

The face of schools cricket – and the Under-19 representative game – changed further in 1998. After 14 years, the Schools Festival at Oxford was consigned to memory, to be replaced by matches played the ECB Under-19 banner. The major schools fixture became a one-off game between the northern and southern schools, played at Shenley Park, MCC's out-ground, as a two-day, 12-a-side game.

The aim of the new structure was to reduce the amount of representative cricket played by the best young cricketers, while still allowing them to compete in high-profile matches. All the cricketing bodies who had previously fielded representative sides were invited to nominate players, as were those counties who played Under-19 cricket. Teams based on these sides later played the Combined Services and the Pakistan Under-19 teams. To link the matches into the ECB's "Development of Excellence" programme, all the teams were trained by national coaches Tim Boon and Paul Farbrace.

ECB SCHOOLS NORTH v ECB SCHOOLS SOUTH

At Shenley Park, July 14, 15. ECB Schools North won by 18 runs. Toss: ECB Schools North. The North scraped home in the first ECB Schools match after two of the South's players retired hurt, and a third was unable to face a ball. The two-day, 12-a-side game adopted a 100-over format to encourage batsmen to build longer innings, and bowlers to attack. The North chose to bat on a pitch of pace and bounce, and made heavy weather of it. Although five batsmen made starts, none could take advantage of the available time. The bowlers were happier: Webb, with real aggression, and Sethi, hitting a steady line, claimed three wickets each as the North were dismissed for 190. But before the close, Willis-Stovold retired injured, and Fearick removed Fray. Next morning, Cherry was struck on the arm and could not bat on. Fearick then took four more wickets and, when their last fit batsman arrived at the crease, the South still needed 52. The Millfield pair of Hellings and Webb played sensibly, but were 19 short when Webb was bowled.

ETON v HARROW

At Lord's, June 26. Drawn. Toss: Eton.

Returning to Lord's after the 1997 washout, the schools agreed that the match should consist of 115 overs, with no more than 65 allowed to the team batting first. This was to avoid the tendency to delay declaring until the second side had no chance of winning. But rain, which arrived in the sixth over and wiped out nearly two hours, reduced the match to 87 overs. When play resumed, it was dominated by Bruce, who took six of the seven Harrow wickets; the other was run out. Figures of six for 40 were the best by an Etonian in this fixture for 13 years. But Harrow were held together by de Rougemont, who hit two sixes and eight fours before Bruce dismissed him for 68 from 77 balls. Eton were finally set 196 in 39 overs. They started slowly and were only 50 at the halfway mark. Then Loudon and Maan added 115 in 20 overs of fading light before running out of time.

Of the 162 matches played between the two schools since 1805, Eton have won 52, Harrow 44 and 66 have been drawn. Matches during the two world wars are excluded from the reckoning.

The fixture was reduced from a two-day, two-innings-a-side match to one day in 1982. Forty-nine centuries have been scored, the highest being 183 by D. C. Boles of Eton in 1904; M. C. Bird of Harrow is the only batsman to have made two hundreds in a match, in 1907. The highest score since the First World War is 161 not out by M. K. Fosh of Harrow in 1975, Harrow's last victory. Since then Eton have won in 1977, 1985, 1990 and 1991; the 1997 match was abandoned and all other games have been drawn. A full list of centuries since 1918 and results from 1950 can be found in Wisdens prior to 1994.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE SCHOOLS


Although the weather was every bit as miserable as the previous year, batsmen coped better with the soggy conditions of the 1998 season; four players passed 1,000 runs, compared with two in 1997. The most prolific were D. B. Wilson of Haberdashers' Aske's, who scored 1,169 runs at 77,93 in 21 innings, and D. A. Cullen of King's, Worcester, who made 1,165 at 72.81 from 22. Close behind were N. J. C. Kay of St Peter's, York, with 1,076 at 59.77, and B. J. Thompson of Magdalen College School, Oxford, whose 1,014 came from 18 innings, at 67.60.


Among those who passed 500 runs, four recorded three-figure averages. For the second year running, R. Clinton of Colfe's led the way with 141.75; D. Jackson of Downside averaged 130.60, while P. J. Furniss of Ellesmere College was fractionally behind with 130.00. T. J. Alldis of West Buckland scored at 122.50. There was only one double-hundred, an undefeated 200 from Kay. The next two highest innings came from Clinton who hit 169 not out and N. R. Boulton of King's College, Taunton, with an unbeaten 166. Four players scored four hundreds: M. J. Banes of Tonbridge, A. R. Duncan of St Paul's, I. S. Pay of King's CS, Wimbledon, and Furniss, who played just ten innings. Dodging the rain better than most, I. Brunnschweiler of King Edward VI, Southampton, recorded 26 innings and 633 runs.

The bowlers acquitted themselves slightly better than last year, with two collecting 60 wickets or more. Brighton College's P. J. S. Spencer took most, with 77 at 8.92 from 300.5 overs – the

greatest number bowled by any player; J. Amin of Haberdashers' Aske's delivered 292.3 overs to dismiss 60 at 9.61. Four others passed 45: G. D. Hicks of Lord Wandsworth College (54 at 10.09), A. A. Hirtenstein of Magdalen College School (52 at 12.38), N. J. K. Creed of Hurstpierpoint (48 at 14.75) and A. T. C. Phillips of King's, Worcester (48 at 17.22).

T. E. Mitzman of King's, Ely, with 42 wickets at 9.73, joined Spencer and Amin as the only bowlers to take 30 wickets with a single-figure average. The outstanding analysis came from H. Smuts-Muller of Glenalmond, who took ten for 37 against Sedbergh; he was the only bowler to take all ten. J. Knox of St George's College, Weybridge, with nine for 19, and G. R. Boyce of Brentwood, with nine for 67, both came close. P. Adshead of St Edmund's, Ware, took seven for six. Of the eight reported hat-tricks, the most remarkable was by R. Johnstone of Christ's College, Finchley, who bowled just once in a season otherwise dedicated to wicket-keeping. Going one better, A. Kelly of Queen Elizabeth GS, Wakefield, grabbed four in four balls against Leeds GS.

In terms of quantity, the leading all-rounders were Spencer, with 602 runs at 37.62 to complement his 77 wickets, B. W. Craft of King Edward VI School, Southampton, with 902 runs at 47.47 and 36 wickets at 14.44, T. J. Phillips of Felsted, with 676 runs at 42.25 and 38 wickets at 16.71, and C. J. Ellerbeck, of St Peter's, York, with 445 runs and 30 wickets. In terms of averages, the best among those with 500 runs and 30 wickets was Spencer.

Of the seven schools that remained unbeaten, Christ's College, Finchley, had the best record, winning 15 of their 18 games. Bromsgrove, Forest, King's College, Taunton, Radley and Woodhouse Grove all won at least half their matches, but St Edward's, Oxford, achieved just one victory to set against nine'draws. Bablake put together a most impressive series of results, successful in 12 of their 13 games.

From all regions, schools reported massive interference from the weather, with the West Country worst hit. Truro lost 11 of their 19 fixtures to rain while Kelly College, Kingswood and Plymouth College abandoned half or more of their scheduled games. Elsewhere, however, others were more fortunate; Bancroft's played all but four of their 28 intended matches.

The seven British schools who took part in the 12th Sir Garfield Sobers Schools Cricket Festival, held in Barbados in July, were Aldenham, Bedford, Belfast Academy, Bryanston, Canford, Clayesmore and Wilson's. Bedford reached the semi-finals, where they lost to the eventual champions, Dominica Schools.

Details of records broken, other outstanding performances and interesting features of the season may be found in the returns from the schools which follow.
