# SCHOOLS CRICKET, 2004

#### REVIEW BY PAUL COUPAR

The decline of competitive cricket in British state schools — where Geoff Boycott once grafted and ground for Hemsworth Grammar and Ian Botham belted sixes for Buckler's Mead Secondary — has been going on for at least 20 years. Fixtures were cut by an estimated 70% in the 1980s, when many teachers, underpaid and overworked, refused to supervise sport after the home-time bell rang. Most fixtures were never re-established. The decline came to be seen as a regrettable but pretty much inevitable part of British cricket — like April showers, and bad beefburgers at Test matches. However, 2004 saw two powerful challenges to the mood of resignation.

The first came from the very top. In December, in response to the ballooning waistlines of British schoolchildren, Tony Blair announced the biggest changes in secondary-school sport for a generation. Out would go non-competitive physical jerks, squeezed into the statutory minimum two hours' PE a week. In would come traditional competitive sport, including cricket, with at least four hours a week to be offered. A ring-fenced £519m a year, or an average of £150,000 for each secondary school, would pay for the extra PE teachers needed. "I want to see competition between schools," said Tessa Jowell, the Secretary for Culture, Media and Sport. "We have to get beyond the politically correct nonsense of the 1980s that competition damages children."

The second powerful challenge came from the Cricket Foundation, a charity which ploughs money from first-class cricket into development. In May 2005, its director Nick Gandon, a former coach at Haileybury, plans to announce a huge campaign, with the goal of restoring competitive cricket to the heart of life in state schools. The numbers are impressive. The foundation aims to put £50m into schools; riches indeed in cricket, where

a year's TV revenue for the ECB is around £55m.

Pitfalls remain for both projects. The Labour government have to win a forthcoming general election. The Cricket Foundation estimates no more than 30% of state schools play even the odd competitive game – the decline

has made deep cuts.

So, in 2004, most regular, competitive matches were played by the 7% of children who attend private schools. And the best team was a familiar name with a long-standing sporting reputation: Millfield. They won 20 of their 22 games, mainly limited-overs, and enjoyed reflected glory when James Hildreth, a former pupil, scored two enchanting hundreds for Somerset. Millfield also lifted the Lord's Taverners Under-15 Cup, their ninth outright victory in 16 years (they have also shared the Trophy once). "Millfield were simply better than us," admitted the opposing coach from RGS High Wycombe.

Many others could sympathise. The school's only defeats came against a powerful Exeter University side, and Tonbridge – another institution that

prides itself on placing equal value on sport and studies. Their attack only twice failed to cut through the opposition, leading the side to a record 15 wins, from 17 games. Sutton Valence, under the former England bowler Alan Igglesden, also blazed through the summer, winning 13 games. They were one agonising last-ball finish from a 100% season, which would have been the first recorded by *Wisden* since at least 1980. With slightly lower percentages of victories – 15 from 20 – came Oundle, whose cutting edge was Patrick Foster, with 54 wickets at 9.07, the school's best total by a pace bowler since 1895, and Brighton College, the top dogs in 2003.

With much of the season played under dark May clouds, no batsman showed the obvious class of Bedford School's Alastair Cook in 2003. However, James Cole of Merchant Taylors', Crosby quietly accumulated his way to 959 runs at 119.87, the best average in the country, played several games for Lancashire seconds, and still modestly admitted that "I'm more of a wicket-keeper than a batsman." Another all-rounder was the country's heaviest run-scorer: Martin Walters of Harrow with 1,204 at 109.45.

However, there was something rather unusual about Walters. For a start he was 19 years old. And he arrived four months after the traditional start of the academic year, having already completed his schooling at Selborne College in East London, South Africa. It certainly raised eyebrows, especially in the run-up to the Lord's match against Harrow's age-old rivals at Eton: "We wish him every success with his single AS-level module," said the Eton College Chronicle impishly, "and a very happy 20th birthday next March."

Walters and Harrow were far from alone. Gleaming sports records look good in glossy school prospectuses, and more schools are taking more sports scholars for shorter and shorter stints. Some weaker schools reported that games have become futile – for everyone involved. There were certainly some big mismatches: early in the summer Bharghav Modha, another sixthform sports scholar and a leg-spinner working with Terry Jenner on the ECB's spin coaching scheme, took ten for 19 for Oakham against Worksop.

For an unprecedented third year running, Tom Woolsey, a left-arm spinner from St Peter's, York, topped the country's list of wicket-takers, with 55. To get there, he laboured through 307 overs, 40 more than anyone else, before taking up a place at Cambridge University. More incisive, taking one wicket fewer in two-thirds of the overs was Foster of Oundle. However, the sharpest of all, and the most discussed schoolboy cricketer of 2004, was another Yorkshireman.

On May 23, Ajmal Shahzad made cricket history when he bowled six tidy overs in the totesport League for the Yorkshire Phoenix, becoming the first Yorkshire-born Asian to play for the county's first team. It was a symbolic and overdue moment, coming more than 30 years after migrants from the subcontinent began arriving in Yorkshire in large numbers. The county's operations director, Geoff Cope, called it "A magic day... It is a clear message that if you have the talent and work hard, you can play for Yorkshire, whatever your skin colour." By contrast, taking 19 wickets for Woodhouse Grove, even at the country's best average of 4.63, must have seemed prosaic. Only a back injury stopped him grabbing many more.

In August, Chris Paget, an off-spinner from Repton, followed Shahzad into first-team cricket. He became Derbyshire's youngest-ever Championship player, at 16 years 284 days, won praise from a hard judge in the county coach David Houghton and then returned home to wait for GCSE results. "I think it's going to be difficult to concentrate on my school work," said Paget as he contemplated spending two A-level summers trying to help salvage Derbyshire's struggling first team.

However, unarguably the best player in schools cricket in 2004 starred for King's, Macclesfield. Having contacted the school's opponents, MCC, in search of match practice as he recovered from injury, the New Zealand leftarm spinner Daniel Vettori bowled ten cheap overs for King's, hit a quick fifty and still had the energy to push the sightscreens at both ends.

Vettori had a rival in the fame game. After the 2004 season, Uppingham reported that they had to cope without one of their leading batsmen of recent years, Harry Judd, who cut short his studies at the end of 2003 to become the drummer in a boy-band McFly. By the end of the next season, McFly had enjoyed two No. 1 singles, and the adoration of thousands of teenage girls, which some would call greater fame than any number of Test caps.

Most would be happy with even one cap, including a remarkable young man who made his debut for Harrow. Five years ago Mumtaz Habib fled the Taleban and arrived from Afghanistan in England, with no formal education, English or knowledge of cricket. He landed lucky, and was taken by his state school to a net in a local leisure centre, where he showed an

outstanding instinctive talent. "I saw this boy who could do everything," enthused Harrow's master in charge, Simon Halliday, who spotted Habib and arranged a full bursary. Statistically, the move improved Habib's chances of playing professionally by a multiple of around four. In 2005, Tony Blair and the Cricket Foundation hope to do something about that.

#### **ETON v HARROW**

At Lord's, June 26. Eton won by 20 runs. Toss: Eton.

A storming captain's innings from Eddie Nissen led Eton to their third successive victory over Harrow. Rain washed out the morning, and Nissen arrived at 47 for three. He reached 50 in 45 balls, then lashed 74, including four sixes, off his next 37. Mumtaz Habib, a 17-year-old Afghan refugee given a sixth-form scholarship at Harrow, took two wickets, one caught and bowled, plus two boundary catches. Needing six an over, Harrow were on course at 145 for one in the 24th: Hamish Morrison struck two sixes into the Tavern Stand and 11 fours. But he fell for a 72-ball 79 as Gyles Scott-Hayward struck twice in two overs. The skies darkened, the asking-rate rose and the last wicket tumbled at 7.37 p.m.

Of the 166 matches played between the two schools since 1805, Eton have won 55, Harrow 45 and 66 have been drawn. Matches during the two world wars are excluded from the reckoning. The fixture was reduced from a two-day, two-innings-a-side match to one day in 1982, and became a limited-overs fixture from 1999. Fifty centuries have been scored, the highest being 183 by D. C. Boles of Eton in 1904; M. C. Bird of Harrow is the only batsman to have made two hundreds in a match, in 1907. The highest score since the First World War is 161 not out by M. K. Fosh of Harrow in 1975, Harrow's last victory before 2000.
