and the attendance was not much below the average, the ground presenting a most animated and brilliant appearance. There was, perhaps, an absence of the enthusiasm to which we are accustomed at the great schools' match, but seldom indeed did the game flag in its interest. A long day's cricket was got through on the Friday, 390 runs being scored between eleven o'clock in the morning and seven o'clock in the evening for the loss of 23 wickets, Harrow won the toss, and played a curiously unequal innings. A. C. M'Laren, a very promising young cricketer, scored 55 runs, and the second wicket did not fall until the total was 83. Then, however, came a most remarkable collapse, and Bromley-Davenport and Brand bowled so finely that the last eight wickets fell for the addition of only 18 runs. Bromley-Davenport, who is considered one of the most promising school-boy bowlers we have had for years, accomplished a remarkable performance, taking six wickets at a cost of 44 runs. Brand, though rather less successful, took three wickets with a capital analysis. Field kept wicket in excellent form. When Eton went in to bat, two good wickets-those of Llewellyn and Gosling-were quickly obtained, but afterwards the great superiority of the Eton eleven asserted itself. Foley, Coventry, and Lord Chelsea all made their runs in capital form. Lord Chelsea, who, curiously enough, was the eleventh choice of the team, hit with remarkable vigour and pluck. He forced the game, and scored off all the bowlers with most surprising rapidity. The Harrow bowling did not compare with that of Eton. The wicket-keeping was good, but Jackson, the fast bowler, was not sufficiently tried. Eton led by 104 runs on the first innings, and Harrow, before the call of time, put on 84 runs for the loss of three wickets. Watson played capital cricket for 30, and A. C. M'Laren again showed exceedingly good form, being not out 42 at the close of

As Harrow were 20 runs behind, with seven wickets to go down, a large amount of interest was taken out of the concluding day's play, but though there was the probability of the match being over before luncheon, a large number of spectators visited the ground. The cricket was more interesting than it had promised to be, and it was nearly a quarter to four before the match ended. The last few Harrow boys played up in good form, and things might have gone better with them had not Torrens been foolishly run out when he was well set. A. C. M'Laren increased his not-out score of 42 to 67. Seldom indeed has a young batsman done better in the Eton and Harrow match. He played with great confidence in both innings, and except that he gave a chance in his second innings when he had made 58, there was scarcely a fault to be found with his performance. As will be seen from the score, he made in his two innings 122 runs. The chief hits of his admirable 67 were eight 4's, five 3's, and five 2's. The innings closed shortly before one o'clock for 204, a total that would certainly have been reduced had the Eton boys taken all the chances that were offered them. Eton only wanted 101 runs to win, and, with the wicket in capital order, there was very little doubt as to the runs being obtained. The early play, however, was far from encouraging, as Llewellyn was out leg before at 2, and at 14 Foley was bowled. Brand, the captain, then adopted a very wise course of action. He had intended to keep the same order of batting as in the first innings, but when this bad start had been made he went in himself to join Gosling, a stroke of policy which proved eminently successful. At lunch-time the score was 32 for two wickets, and on the game being continued the score rose at a great pace. The total was up to 62 before the third wicket fell. Gosling and Brand had added 49 runs during their partnership, and had practically put the result of the match beyond doubt. Gosling played admirable cricket throughout, and the runs were hit off for the loss of five wickets, Eton thus winning by five wickets. Gosling's well-played and finely-hit 56 not out included seven 4's, two 3's, and three 2's. No one in the match showed better style or punished over-pitched balls with more certainty. There was great enthusiasm at the success of the Etonians, who, it was admitted on all hands, were unquestionably the stronger team. Full score :-

RUGBY v. MARLBOROUGH.

Played at Lord's, Wednesday, Thursday, July 27, 28.—It was generally considered that both teams were slightly below the average, but the Marlborough boys certainly showed superiority at all points of the game. On the first day a very long day's cricket was got through, play lasting from eleven o'clock until seven, and between these times 368 runs were scored for the loss of twenty-three wickets. Up to a certain point the game was fairly even, but in the last hour the Marlborough boys did great things, and at the finish were 134 runs on with seven wickets to go down. There were only six old blues in the match, Dickson, Wilson, Jackson, and H. Bowden-Smith for Rugby, and Rowell and Prest for Marlborough. The best Rugby batsman, H. C. Bradby, was kept away by an accident. Marlborough went in first and scored 131, and then Rugby were dismissed for 117. On going in a second time Marlborough made 120 for the loss of three wickets. Maurice, who hit out in fair form, was not out 52, and Collins not out 20.

On the second day the result of the match was really never in doubt. The Marlborough boys increased their total to 269, Maurice making 74 and Collins 50. Maurice in his 74 hit six 4's, seven 3's, and eleven 2's. Rugby had 284 runs to get to win, but the magnitude of the task quite overcame the batsmen, who offered a most feeble resistance to the excellent bowling. The innings was all over for the poor total of 66, and Marlborough were left with a brilliant and decisive victory by 217 runs. Hill and Robinson bowled with conspicuous success for the winning team, and the former is considered a most promising young bowler. Full score:—

It will thus be seen that 30 matches have been played, of which Rugby have won 19 and Marlborough 8, while 3 were unfinished.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS MATCHES IN 1887.

Eighteen hundred and eighty-seven was perhaps not a great year for public school cricket, comparing unfavourably with such a remarkable season as that of 1885; but still the various teams did very well on the whole, and there was, more particularly in batting, no lack of individual excellence. The opportunities of comparison are so few that it would be quite speculative to say which was the best or second best school of the year, and we shall therefore not attempt to place the various sides in any approximate order of merit. In the absence of any direct guide as to relative form, it would be idle to say whether Cheltenham would have been able to beat Eton, or whether Winchester or Harrow would have had any chance with Clifton. is for many reasons regrettable that the competition between the schools is not more complete and systematic, but it is almost hopeless to look forward to a better state of things. Great injury to school cricket was done when the Winchester authorities, years ago, decided that their boys should not come up to Lord's, and there is no sign of change in the policy which we cannot in the interest of cricket consider anything but shortsighted and mistaken. The present writer cannot pretend to any exhaustive knowledge of the different school elevens, some of which did not come under his immediate notice, and his review of the season's doings must therefore be rather in the shape of generalisation.

The Eton eleven were several times dismissed in their home matches for disappointingly small scores, but when they came up to London and beat Harrow at Lord's they certainly gave one the idea of being much above the average of public school teams. But for a little slackness in their bowling and fielding in the later stages of the game, they would have won more easily than they did; and their side included several players of more than ordinary promise. C. P. Foley, who played so remarkable an innings in the 1886 match, had so far, as could be judged, rather gone back than advanced in his batting, but there were two other batsmen on the side of whom we shall in all probability hear a good deal in the future—viz., R. C. Gosling and W. D. Llewellyn. Llewellyn failed at Lord's, but those who saw his long innings against Winchester on the Eton playing fields spoke very highly both of his style and hitting. He had shown on that occasion a remarkable power of forcing the game, and it was a disappointment that London critics had no better opportunity of gauging his abilities. Gosling, on the other hand, played very finely at Lord's, his not out 56 in the last innings of the match being in all respects a masterly display. Especially noticeable were the power and certainty with which he punished almost every over-pitched ball. Among the other Eton batsmen by far the best were Lord Chelsea and the Hon. M. B. Tollemache. Lord

Chelsea did not do much in the home games, but his 72 not out against Harrow was a most dashing and brilliant innings. In bowling Eton was fairly strong, the two standard bowlers of the team. Bromley-Davenport and Brand, being well supported by Maclachlan and Harvey-Bathurst. We should be inclined to think that Bromley-Davenport was the best public school bowler of 1887, and if he could get his arm a little higher we should feel hopeful of his appearing at some future date for the Gentlemen against the Players. He is pretty straight, and at times, considering his pace, gets a good deal of break on the ball. He stays on at Eton, and is captain for 1888. Brand is a right-handed slow bowler, and in both innings against Harrow he did remarkably well. As will be seen further on in these pages he took fewer wickets than Bromley-Davenport for Eton, but came out with a better average. It was pleasant to see a lob bowler again in a school eleven, but Hervey-Bathurst did not strike us as being in any way deadly. He was useful to the eleven, however, taking 22 wickets at an average cost of just over 16 runs each. C. A. Field was a thoroughly efficient wicket-keeper, far above the average of public school boys. Mr. R. A. H. Mitchell has lost nothing of his keen interest in Eton cricket, and to our thinking the team of 1887. though inferior to the side which just lost the memorable match of 1885, did great credit to his coaching.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS MATCHES.

HARROW sent a decidedly moderate team up to Lord's, and would not have won one match in five against Eton. J. St. F. Fair, of whom so much was hoped in 1886, showed a sad falling-off in batting. By far the best feature of the school's cricket was the batting of A. C. Maclaren, a very young cricketer, who played really superb cricket against Eton at Lord's, scoring 55 and 67. We can give the young batsman no higher praise than to say that he was a worthy successor to Eustace Crawley. He has a lot of time before him, and ought to make a great name for himself in the cricket world. Not one of the other Harrow batsmen struck us as showing more than ordinary ability. Fair did very well as a slow round-arm bowler, but we should think the best bowler on the side was F. S. Jackson, right hand fast. The fielding at Lord's

sadly lacked smartness.

MARLBOROUGH gained a decisive victory over Rugby at Lord's by 217 runs, and had by far the better eleven; but in excuse for the Rugby boys it should be mentioned that incomparably their best bat, H. C. Bradby, was prevented by an injured hand from taking part in the London match. How much the side was handicapped by his absence may be estimated from the fact that while his batting average for the team was 27.2, the average next to his was only 15.6. R. A. Wilson and A. W. Dixon were very useful bowlers for Rugby.

The CHELTENHAM boys were badly beaten by the M.C.C. at Lord's, but in excuse for them it may be urged that they had to play in their first innings against Attewell and Martin on a slow wicket—a difficult task for even more experienced cricketers. They practically lost the game before luncheon on the first day, and all their efforts in the second innings were powerless to avoid defeat. However disappointing the London performance might have been, there can be no doubt that Cheltenham had one of the very best school elevens of the year. The annual matches with Clifton and Marlborough both ended in victory. and the only defeat up to the match with the M.C.C. was sustained at the hands of Exeter College, Oxford. There were two excellent batsmen on the side in Champain and Turner, the latter scoring 645 runs, with an average of 43, and Champain 551, with an average of 42.3. A very high estimate was formed of Champain's ability, and he was asked to play for Gloucestershire, a flattering invitation which absence from England compelled him to decline. No proper and complete analysis was kept of the Cheltenbam bowling, but we know that Glass, the captain, took 55 wickets for the team, and Heaven 47.

The CLIFTON averages also indicate a high standard of general excellence, and one batsman, H. S. Schwann, can show the very fine average of 48.2. This record, however, was largely gained by a score of 209 not out in a match against Sherborne. The College played a very creditable match against the Surrey Club and Ground at Kennington Oval. only losing by 55 runs, after K. F. Crawford, one of their best batsmen, had been hurt, and on that occasion Bradford took eleven of the seventeen wickets which appear to his name in the average tables.

The most successful bowler in the team was H. N. Wethered.

As regards the other schools our remarks must be brief. We may say here that Winchester, although beaten in the annual match with Eton, could boast a good number of consistent run-getters, and one really fine batsman in F. J. N. Thesiger. Incomparably the best cricketer at Brighton College was G. L. Wilson, who had the honour on more than one occasion of playing in the Sussex County Eleven. He scored, it will be seen, 865 runs for the College, with an average of 54, and took no fewer than 70 wickets, thus proving himself quite a tower of strength on the side. Farrant bowled and batted with conspicuous success for Repton, and Uppingham could boast a capital batsman in J. F. Whitwell. For the rest we must direct our readers to the scores and averages which follow. Foley, R. C. Gosling, and Lord Chelsea, of Eton, R. A. Wilson, the Rugby bowler, and A. Martineau, of Uppingham. G. H.
