

GENTLEMEN v. PLAYERS MATCHES OF 1,000 RUNS.

The 1889 match at the Oval, 1,145 runs for thirty-one wickets; the 1883 match at Lord's, 1,098 runs; the 1864 match at the Oval, 1,025 runs; the 1878 match at Lord's, 1,066 runs; the 1884 match at Lord's, 1,000 runs; the 1871 match at Brighton, 1,022 runs for thirty-six wickets; and the 1885 match at the Oval, 1,044 runs, are the only instances of over 1,000 runs being made in contests between Gentlemen and Players.

ETON V. HARROW.

Played at LORD'S, Friday, Saturday, July 11, 12.—The disadvantage of limiting the Eton and Harrow match to two days was never so strikingly exemplified as in 1890. Drenching rain overnight and a further downfall on the Friday caused the first day to be an absolute blank, and, though the boys were playing their hardest on the Saturday from half-past ten in the morning till seven o'clock in the evening, there was never any real prospect of arriving at a definite issue. We do not know what is the objection to allotting three days to the game instead of two, but, having regard to the large number of matches that have been left drawn of late years, it would certainly seem desirable to fix the match for Thursday and Friday, and so have the Saturday available in case of need. For the present, however, there is no prospect of such a change being brought about, the usual two days having been fixed for 1891. The present plan puts the game entirely at the mercy of the weather, and in the interests of a contest which the boys of both schools look forward to with such absorbing interest, something should certainly be done to avoid the chance of the match being so often left unfinished.

The captains were, of course, most reluctant to give up the idea of playing on the opening day, but while they were waiting in the hope of the wicket would not be fit to play on, the postponement till the Saturday morning was decided on at four o'clock. It is quite likely that had Saturday been a bright day the game would after all have been played out, but in the absence of sunshine the wicket, though very soft, never became so difficult as had been expected, and in the course of the long day's play 361 runs were scored for the loss of twenty-three wickets. The fact of cricket having been impracticable on the first day did not seem to affect the public, and it was estimated that at the height of the afternoon the attendance on the Saturday must have numbered close upon 15,000. So far as it went, the cricket furnished something of a surprise. The form shown in the trial games, and private reports from the two schools, had clearly pointed to a victory for Harrow, but when the stumps had finally to be pulled up and the game abandoned, Eton were in the better position, being 95 runs to the good with seven wickets to go down. The performance of the Light Elues was all the more creditable, as they had to depend entirely upon players who were new to the match, G. B. Gosling, the captain—and the only old choice left in the school-being prevented by illness from taking part in the contest. Harrow, far more fortunate, had no fewer than six members of the 1889 team available-namely, MacLaren, Pope, Napier, Anderson, Peebles and Gowans. MacLaren, who first played in the match in the season of 1887, was the captain, and unquestionably the best bat in the eleven.

Eton won the toss, and though their first innings only amounted to 108 it lasted three hours and five minutes, this slow cricket in the early part of the day going very far to make the draw a certainty. The feature of the innings was the stand made by the two first batsmen, Brewis and Studd, who stayed together for an hour and fifty minutes, their partnership producing 59 runs. In an hour and a quarter they only scored 25, but then such a change came over their play that in another quarter of an hour they increased the total to 50. Brewis played well, but inasmuch as in scoring his 44 he gave a couple of palpable chances his innings was not so good as it looks on paper. Perhaps the most notable feature in the Harrow bowling was the success that attended Peebles' lobs. Harrow's innings began at twenty-five minutes to two and ended at a quarter to five for a total of 133, or 25 runs to the good. MacLaren played superb cricket, going in first and scoring 76 out of 120, and being the seventh man to leave. He was at the wickets an hour and fifty minutes, his innings including six 4's, five 3's, and twelve 2's, and so far as could be seen he did not give a chance. How well the Harrow captain when promoted to first-class cricket sustained his school repu-tation is told in another portion of WISDEN'S ALMANACK, the young batsman having the distinction of scoring a hundred the first time he played for his county. Nine members of the Harrow team scored only 31 between them, the one batsman who gave his captain any assistance being Butler, who helped to put on 38 for the seventh wicket. Of the Eton bowlers, D. Forbes-a cousin, we believe, of the famous Eton cricketer, Mr. Walter Forbes-was decidedly the

best. Very fast, with a slinging delivery, he was not particularly straight or accurate in pitch, but at times he sent down an undeniably good ball, and, as will be seen from the analysis, he took five wickets at a cost of something over 13 runs each. Eton went in for the second time at ten minutes past five, with an hour and fifty minutes left for cricket, and some admirable batting was shown. Brewis and A. R. Hoare took the score from 21 to 63 for the second wicket, and the former batsman, in company with Pilkington, carried it from 63 to 97 for the third. Pilkington's style of play made a great impression, his not out innings of 38 being in every way a capital display. In conclusion it may be mentioned that R. A. Studd is the youngest member of the famous cricketing family. By staying in for a couple of hours in Eton's first innings he proved himself possessed of a strong defence, and in time he may develop more hitting and do credit to his name.

Sixty-five matches have been played, of which Eton have won twenty-seven, Harrow twenty-seven, and eleven have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857 for boys under twenty which has been rejected. R. B. Hoare's 108 in 1888 was the ninth three-figure innings in the matches between the schools, the previous great scorers having been E. Bayley 152 in 1841; A. K. Watson 135 in 1885; A. W. Ridley 117 in 1871; C. P. Foley 114 in 1886; W. F. Forbes 113 in 1876; A. W. T. Daniel 112 not out in 1860; C. J. Ottaway 108 in 1869; and E. Crawley 100 in 1885.

M.C.C. AND GROUND v. DERBYSHIRE.

Played at LORD'S, Monday, Tuesday, July 14, 15.—Some exceedingly fine cricket was shown by the M.C.C. batsmen, Davenport, the Cheshire professional, being seen to special advantage. On winning the toss the club took first innings, and remained in the whole of the time play lasted, the total amounting to 434 for pine wickets. Davenport, who went in when four wickets had fallen

for 76, was not out 155 at the drawing of stumps. Alec Hearne and Shacklock each made over 50, and there were six other double figure scores. Davenport eventually carried out his bat for 158, a faultless display that lasted five hours, and included a 6 (4 for an overthrow), ten 4's, ten 3's, and eighteen 2's. Derbyshire, who sadly missed Mr. Spefforth and Chatterton, were in a thankless position, and being dismissed for 148 and 123, were beaten in a single innings with 181 runs to spare.

M.C.C. AND GROUND v. YORKSHIRE.

Played at LORD'S, Thursday, Friday, July 24, 25.—Magnificent batting performances by Moorhouse and Mr. F. S. Jackson enabled Yorkshire on the first day to obtain a tremendous advantage over the weak team put into the field by the M.C.C. The opening of the match gave no indication of the

Yorkshiremen's superiority, for half their wickets fell for 28 runs, but then Mr. Jackson and Moorhouse became partners, and put on no fewer than 134 in an hour and a half. Moorhouse, who had never previously scored 100 for his county, made 105 out of 170 in an hour and three-quarters, his figures including sixteen 4's, five 3's, and four 2's. The M.C.C. were dismissed for 86, and on following their innings lost four wickets for 13. On Friday only seventy minutes' play was found necessary, the last six wickets falling for 47 runs. RUGBY V. MARLBOROUGH.

Played at LORD'S, Wednesday, Thursday, July 30, 31.—There were some good individual batting performances on both sides, and the match, after a capital contest, was won by Marlborough by 145 runs. The result was brought about by better bowling, wicket-keeping, and fielding rather than by a marked superiority in batting. The best form was shown by F. P. Warner, for Rugby, who made 38 and 85, the latter being the highest score in the match. Cheales and Shorland for Marlborough, and Whitting for Rugby, also deserve very high praise praise.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN 1890.

For some general remarks on the public schools elevens of 1890. and the individual members of the various teams, we are again indebted to Mr. O. R. Borrodaile, who has twice before dealt with the subject of public school cricket in the pages of WISDEN. Mr. Borrodaile does not think that there were many very brilliant batsmen in last year's elevens, but some did so well as to hold out great hopes for the future. So far as averages go the first place belongs to G. T. Campbell, of Fettes College, who played fourteen innings, two of them not out, with an aggregate of 741, and an average of 61.9. This record, of course, speaks for itself, but in comparing it with the achievements of other batsmen the quality of the sides opposed by Fettes must be taken into consideration. Any way our correspondent gives the first place among the school batsmen of the year to A. C. MacLaren, who scored 553 runs in thirteen innings, with an average of 42.7. The high estimate formed of MacLaren was, of course, much strengthened by his highly successful appearance in the Lancashire eleven. Another good batsman was R. C. N. Palairet, of Repton, who scored 594 runs with the splendid average of 54. This gentleman has gone up to Oriel College, Oxford, and should have a good chance of emulating his brother, L. C. H. Palairet, in getting into the University eleven as a freshman. E. J. Whitting, of Rugby, showed himself on many occasions to be a fine batsman, and the veteran Tom Emmett, who is now the coach at the school, is understood to have a high opinion of his abilities. Inasmuch, however, as Whitting had five not out innings to help him, his average of 46 is not quite so good as it looks on paper. Other prominent batsmen were C. M. Wells, of Dulwich College, who averaged 58.3, and had a trial for Surrey ; L. C. Bathurst, of Radley; A. L. Jones, Bedford Modern; and H. R. Blaker, of Westminster. Turning to the bowlers the best performance that has come under notice is that of W. Patison, of Merchiston College, who took seventy-two wickets at an average of 6.8 apiece. Here again, however, as in the case of Campbell's batting, the class of the opposing teams must be allowed for. Wells, of Dulwich, was only less successful with the ball than with the bat, his fifty-two wickets costing little more than seven runs

each. Among other effective bowlers were F. W. Potter, of Bedford Modern, Bathurst, of Radley, and T. M. C. Hunt, of Bedford Modern. With regard to fielding Mr. Borrodaile writes that from the reports that have reached him the fielding generally has not been up to the mark, many catches having been dropped, and matches thereby lost. Uppingham and Highgate Schools seem to have furnished exceptions to the rule, their fielding having been always good, and at times really brilliant. Our correspondent says that the school captains should take more trouble, and insist on fielding being practised in a thorough and systematic manner.

As regards the question of which school had the strongest team in 1890, Mr. Borrodaile, judging from what he saw and heard during the season, gives the preference to Harrow. This opinion is to a considerable extent borne out by statistics, HARROW having only lost three matches out of ten. MacLaren was not particularly well backed up in batting, the second best average on the side being 18.1 by A. H. M. Butler. Pope, medium pace right hand, showed some command over the ball, and took thirty-three wickets at a cost of less than 10 runs each. ETON drew both the school matches against Winchester and Harrow, the former game, however, being left in an unfavourable position. G. B. Gosling, the captain, was, by reason of ill-health, kept out of the two big games, and consequently Eton had to depend entirely upon new choices. This being the case the team may be said to have done very well, their display at Lord's being far better than any one could have expected. A. R. Hoare took the first place in the batting averages, and D. H. Forbes, right hand very fast, was far above all his colleagues in bowling, taking forty-one wickets for little more than 10 runs each. MARLBOROUGH may be congratulated on having beaten both Cheltenham and Rugby, and consequently on having had a successful season. In the important matter of fielding they were far ahead of Rugby in the match at Lord's, and this fact went a good way towards securing their victory. A. E. Cheales proved himself a good bat, averaging 22.6, and on both the great occasions did himself justice. T. E. Etlinger, the captain, was a very valuable member of the eleven, averaging 16 in batting, and taking fifty wickets for a little more than 121 runs each. Another successful bowler for the eleven was McNamara, who took 36 wickets. On paper RUGBY's record was very unsatisfactory, only two matches out of ten ending in victory, but it should be pointed out that on two occasions the team suffered defeat by the narrow margin of four runs. E. J. Whitting not only showed himself one of the best school batsmen of the year, but discharged very fairly well the duties of captain. P. F. Warner was only second to his captain in batting; he

played a fine innings of 85 against Marlborough at Lord's, and averaged just upon 38. W. Dixon unfortunately suffered from illhealth, and could not do himself justice. WINCHESTER could hardly be said to have had a good season, as out of thirteen matches they lost no fewer than nine. Batting was the strong point, and bowling the weakness of the team. H. G. G. Leveson-Gower averaged 38, and on many occasions showed himself a capital batsman. He was well backed up by J. R. Mason, who only fell 4 runs an innings behind him in the average. Among the bowlers C. Wigram did best, A. J. Boger, of whom a great deal was expected, proving so expensive that his thirty-one wickets cost more than 181 runs each. It was certainly rather hard luck for Winchester that the match with Eton could not be played out. CHELTENHAM were not very successful in 1890, winning three matches, losing five, and leaving five unfinished. Still there were some good cricketers in the eleven, notably E. N. Brooke, who scored 137, not out, against the M.C.C. at Lord's, and obtained altogether 559 runs, with an average of 32. He is described as being a particularly clean and vigorous hitter. The Hon. W. G. Thesiger and R. G. Austin also batted well, while A. C. Macpherson proved himself a useful school wicket-keeper. REPTON had two very good cricketers in R. C. N. Palairet and C. B. Fry, the captain, to the former of whom reference has already been made. Fry, though his average compared most unfavourably with Palairet's, did well in the two school matches, and was handicapped by the fact that he was reading all through the season for the Indian Civil Service. The fielding of the side was not good. It is many years since RADLEY had such a successful season, as out of thirteen matches played seven were won, and only two lost, the remaining four being left unfinished. This brilliant result was very largely due to the exertions of L. C. V. Bathurst, the captain, who not only headed both the batting and bowling averages, but proved himself a most painstaking and energetic leader. A. L. Nelson was a good wicket-keeper, but to judge from the number of extras given ne would have done better not to have dispensed with the longstop. As a batsman he showed himself a great punisher of loose bowling. ROSSALL did not have a successful summer, but the fact has to be borne in mind that they met very strong teams. The team had the satisfaction, after a very hard fight, of beating Malvern by 8 runs. DULWICH COLLEGE did not, as the season advanced, realise the high expectations that were formed, the side depending to a large extent on the efforts as a batsman of C. M. Wells, a young cricketer whose all-round abilities have already been mentioned in this article. No one else in the team was anything like the same class. TONBRIDGE SCHOOL played eleven matches,

of which they won three, lost six, and drew two, a twelfth fixture having to be abandoned. M. O. C. Tandy was probably one of the best public school fieldsmen of the year, but otherwise he hardly realised expectation. By far the best bowler on the side was J. M. Marshall, a left-hander with a good break. UPPINGHAM SCHOOL won two matches and lost two, the other five having to be left unfinished. The best feature in the cricket was the fielding, which was far above the average, and quite a pattern to other schools. The best all-round cricketer on the side was T. Hemmant, who batted well, and took forty wickets at a cost of just over 12 runs each. WELLINGTON COLLEGE did not have a satisfactory season, winning only two matches. There were some good bats on the side, but the bowling was weak. M. D. Woods was a consistently successful batsman, and as he is staying on at the school will probably be of great service in another year. G. J. Mordaunt was an efficient captain, but though he played some fine innings his batting was hardly so good as in 1889. WESTMINSTER SCHOOL showed a decided improvement, and, though they were not victorious in many matches, they had the satisfaction of beating Charterhouse in a single innings. H. R. Blaker, the captain, scored 171 against I Zingari, and on several other occasions proved himself a fine free hitter. BRIGHTON COLLEGE did fairly well, and would have had a better record if more attention had been paid to the fielding. W. H. Picton was decidedly the best bat in the team, and H. H. Jupp the best bowler. Though their doings hardly come into comparison with those of the other public schools, it should be mentioned that HIGHGATE SCHOOL-thanks in a large measure to their fielding-managed to win more matches than they lost, and that BEDFORD MODERN SCHOOL enjoyed a most successful career. FETTES fared very well indeed, and had certainly the best school team in Scotland. Much of the success which attended the side was due to the all-round cricket of G. T. Campbell, the captain. The best bowler in the eleven was certainly A. N. Fleming, who with a high delivery varies his pace and pitch well, and has considerable command over the ball. MERCHISTON SCHOOL could only set four victories against ten defeats and five drawn games, the batting of the team being very weak.
