PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1895.

NOTHING would be more delightful or more interesting to cricketers than an arrangement by which the leading public schools could meet each other in a series of matches conducted on the league principle. Unfortunately, nothing is more impossible, though something approaching to it was realised when Eton, Harrow, and Winchester played a week's cricket against each other in turns at Lord's. Unhappily, that week has long since been abolished, and the difficulty of classification—apart from scholastic reasons—would make an attempt at such organisation hopeless. Consequently, the question as to the best public school of the year is only to be decided by individual judgment, and not by points or proportional parts. The very trial matches themselves afford no good criterion, as the elevens sent by such roving clubs as I Zingari, the Free Foresters, the Quidnuncs, and the Harlequins, to say nothing of the M.C.C., vary so much in strength that they offer no help in the question of differentiation. Averages are even more fallacious, partly owing to the difference in grounds, partly to the variety of calibre in the clubs met, and the critic has consequently nothing to fall back upon save his own judgment, aided and abetted by the opinions of good cricketers, who are more or less conversant with the doings of different schools. These opinions naturally diverge largely, as there is one class of men in whose eyes their old school cannot do wrong, and another to whose views, as *laudatores temporis acti*, "cricket is not as it was in my days, sir," etc., etc., generally concluding with a recapitulation of a wonderful innings played by the speaker at 17 years of age against the most formidable bowlers of fifty years ago. Never was truer word said than by Mr. Horace Hutchinson to the effect that when a cricketer begins to recount an extraordinary incident that has come under his observation, he invariably winds up with "I remember I happened to get some runs in that match."

To return to the question of the school supremacy. There will be no one, I think, to traverse the statement that Eton was the

strongest school of the year. The Etonians had a very severe series of test matches to play, yet one of their players averaged over 40, two over 30, and several more were well over 20. They had two capital bowlers and an infinite variety of change, with excellent fielding to support it, and, finally, they defeated Winchester—not a very good side, by the way—with consummate ease, and were in a fair way to treat Harrow very unceremoniously when time intervened; in fact, it was only an unfortunate error of judgment in not putting the closure in force sooner that prevented the Light Blues from winning outright. At the same time, Harrow, though quite the weaker side, made so game a fight that those who were not personally interested in the match were not sorry to see them escape.

If I were asked to say on oath which school should stand second, I should refuse, at all hazards, either to swear or to affirm. I saw Winchester put in some excellent fielding while their weak bowling was being cut to ribbons by the brawny Eton batsmen, and I saw Rugby play a fine up-hill game against Marlborough, and also against a really strong M.C.C. team, which included Rawlin. Of the two sides I infinitely preferred Rugby, though a judgment formed on one or two matches is not necessarily correct. Certainly the Rugby boys were good all through, and there was hardly a man who did not require, like Barlow, a deal of shifting. My own opinion is confirmed by an old Harrow-Oxford cricketer, who says of them, "You might expect a stand for any wicket." Hence, I should have liked to accredit Rugby with second place, but am deterred from committing myself by the excellent reports, verbal and otherwise, as to Clifton, Charterhouse, and Cheltenham, no one of which, as far as I can gather, was inferior to Rugby, while all were probably superior to Winchester and Harrow. In this quandary the best chance seemed to be to fall back on an analysis of the figures of the best players on the different sides, and though this shall not be inflicted upon the reader, he shall have the results, and can take them for what they are worth. On this principle I should put Charterhouse second, Clifton and Cheltenham equal third, Rugby fifth, and Harrow and Winchester equal sixth, were it not for the fact that the big Charterhouse figures are largely due to two long innings against the comparatively weak sides of Westminster and Wellington. Consequently I am going to degrade Charterhouse and give play to my own predilection for Rugby, finally bracketing Rugby, Clifton, and Cheltenham for second place, with Charterhouse to follow, and Winchester equal with Harrow. Clifton, by the way, had rather the best of a draw with Cheltenham, but not enough to influence my verdict, and in elevating Rugby, inferior in figures, to an equality with the others, I am remembering that the Close at Rugby was by no means an easy ground this

year for batsmen. I should have liked to find a better place for Marlborough than eighth, as the Wiltshire school had some very fair batting and one really good bowler, but the side collapsed so hopelessly against both Rugby and Cheltenham, after playing a winning game in the early part of each match, that there must have been as serious a lack of nerve as there was of change bowling.

We may now take a glance at the doings of what, for convenience of classification, may be considered the second class of schools—from a cricket point of view. From many of these a large number of our best cricketers have come, but they have usually been tritons among minnows, though in various years such places as Uppingham, Malvern, Repton, and Wellington have produced elevens that would have run the larger schools very close for pride of place. It is almost impossible to produce anything like an order for these schools, but, taking them alphabetically to begin with, we may be able to get a fair idea of their relative merits, especially where they have met bat to bat and ball to ball. Haileybury met Wellington, Uppingham, and Cheltenham, losing to Uppingham and drawing with the other two schools, and considering the strength of Cheltenham the draw, in no way in the latter's favour, was creditable to the even side sent up by Haileybury, whose bowling was really good. Malvern was a thoroughly useful team, with strong batting, and bowling that was fair and highly promising, so as the side beat Sherborne in an innings and Repton by ten wickets (having declared in the first innings with but seven men out), it has ample cause to congratulate itself, especially as the two best bowlers will be available next year. Repton, again, had a capital side, described by an outsider as one of the best they ever had, and certainly both batting and bowling averages are excellent. The defeat at Malvern's hands, however, detracts from the general performance of the Reptonians, who, by the way, played a drawn game with their rivals from Uppingham. Passing to Sherborne, we find that the Dorset boys beat two weak schools (St. Paul's and Bradfield), and as these were their only victories and they had to bow before the conquering arm of Malvern, they must be classed as moderate, though, thanks to Bowley, the ex-Surrey bowler, they improved wonderfully as the season progressed. Shrewsbury consider their 1895 side the best they ever had, with abundance of batting all through the team, and six bowlers. They beat Rossall handsomely enough, but appear to have lacked really reliable batsmen of the G. Kemp stamp; still with a plucky tail, that had ability as well as pluck, the season was quite satisfactory, and it is to be regretted that the eleven was not pitted against some stronger schools. Tonbridge had some formidable batting averages, but suffered from weak bowling. It is hard to estimate the exact

strength of the side, as Dulwich was the only school encountered. This year the Dulwich boys had to put up with a severe beating, and cricketers would be glad to hear that their victors had arranged matches with some more powerful schools. Uppingham had a good useful team, with fair bowling and plenty of batting, inasmuch as all the eleven had double figure averages. Their famous coach also says of their wicket-keeper that they never had a better, which is a high compliment indeed, seeing that the great Gregor MacGregor is an Uppingham man, but I believe that his talents were somewhat latent in his schoolboy days. Wellington was so ruthlessly treated by Charterhouse that there must have been some weakness in the bowling department, though the batting works out as good and consistent. They were, however, certainly stronger than Westminster, who fared equally badly at the hands of Charterhouse. I am glad to hear, however, of the Westminster boys that they showed distinct pluck and promise, and that with eight old pinks, including the captain, for 1896 there is every prospect of a revival of the Westminster form.

From these rather casual remarks it will be seen how tangled the skein is, and how hard it is to institute a comparison between the schools I have put into the second class. I think, however, that on public form Malvern, Uppingham, and Wellington must have been fairly equal, and I am disposed to bracket Repton with them, as though Malvern made light of the Derbyshire school, still it fought a good fight with Uppingham and other strong elevens. Judging from statistics and from what I can glean from others, Haileybury should come after these four, but not very far after, and next, in the order given (though I give it with all diffidence), Westminster and Tonbridge equal, Sherborne and Shrewsbury equal, and lastly Rossall, clearly a weak side. Two batsmen only (one of them the captain) reached an average of over 20, and the two best bowlers were very expensive, so that, remembering the severe defeat inflicted by Shrewsbury on the Northern school, I cannot give them a higher position on the list.

In the third class I rank Bedford Modern School, Bradfield, Brighton, Dulwich, Epsom, Lancing, St. Paul's, and Whitgift, and again it is not easy to classify, owing to the paucity of matches, and, in some cases, to what racing men would call in-and-out running. I suspect that Bedford Modern were a fairly tough nut to crack, as their best bat had an average of over 80, while their best bowlers had capital results as well. Their season, however, was not very brilliant in its results, taken as a whole. Bradfield was unlucky, illness interfering with several matches, and the toss going wrong on eight occasions out of nine. Still there was a goodly

show of batsmen and some fair bowling, so that the College is perhaps justified in considering the eleven of '95 the best it ever had. Brighton won nine matches and lost four, among the wins being all the school games, against St. Paul's, Dulwich, and Lancing, and in A. H. Belcher, the captain, an excellent cricketer has been unearthed. Dulwich fared but moderately, losing three out of four school matches; their bitter cry, with many other schools, is weak bowling. Epsom had one good bat and some passable bowling, and managed to win a bare majority of their matches, but Lancing, to judge from the figures, was weak in all departments. St. Paul's had one thoroughly sound batsman in G. S. Lee, and a couple of fair ones, while the bowling works out pretty well, but it must not be forgotten that the ground was on the bumpy side all the season, and consequently in the bowlers' favour. The school's best performance, it claims, was its victory over a fairly strong M.C.C. team, to which I wish to append, "which had little or no bowling in it." Finally we come to Whitgift School, which won eighteen matches and lost three, one to an M.C.C. side which brought some good bowling down. Whitgift was a purely two-man side, and of those two men I shall have something to say hereafter, but given that the two were in form with bat and ball (as they generally were), the team was a hard one to beat, especially in a school match.

I am again at a loss to assign a proper place to each member of this group, but I don't think there was much to choose between Brighton, Bradfield, and Bedford, and next to these I shall put Whitgift—as an all-round side—though the two champions of that school might well have turned the tables on any of the first three. Dulwich must come fifth, with St. Paul's sixth, Lancing seventh, and Epsom to bring up the rear.

Having thus discussed the various elevens we may now open up the question as to the best individual performers of the year, and remembering that the season which has just expired was all in favour of the batsmen, we shall not be surprised at finding the batting averages superior to the bowling, especially as the broken weather of July came too late to be of any help to the school bowlers, A. J. Turner (Bedford Modern) with 84 has far and away the best record, and a very fine average it is, seeing that he exceeded the hundred three times and made 99 once. It must be remembered *per contra* that his opponents were not of a very high class, but the performance is a great one in any case. A. L. Gibson (Winchester) comes next with 52, then E. H. Simpson of Malvern with 49, J. H. Stogdon of Harrow (47) and Chinnery of Eton (45), others with an average of over 40 being G. S. Lee (St. Paul's), E. T. M. Barrett (Cheltenham), W. B. L. Barrington (Charterhouse), A. H. Belcher (Brighton), H. H. B. Hawkins (Whitgift), J. C. G. Sandford (Marl-

borough), and H. M. MacLaurin (Blair Lodge). This is indeed a fine list of averages, speaking well for the batsmen, and well—honour to whom honour is due—for the ground men, who had a trying season. It would be a hopeless task to try to pick the best bat out of this dozen, but Stogdon of Harrow has no superior, good as are the Eton and Winchester men. Barrett of Cheltenham was, I am told, offered a place in one of Surrey's matches, a high compliment indeed, and his comrade, Champain, appeared once or twice for Gloucestershire. The only other schoolboy who represented his county was Pilkington of Eton, probably the best all-round boy of the year, though his début for Lancashire was not marked by any phenomenal success. It would be impossible to catalogue those who have averages ranging between 30 and 40, as there are no less than twenty-five of them, and about sixty have exceeded 20 and fallen short of 30, so that there has been no dearth of good scoring in the cradle of cricketers, our public schools. To digress for a moment, what a fine eleven might be constructed out of players who have never been to a recognised public school. What a lot of beating the following side would take:—W. G. Grace, K. S. Ranjitsinhji, A. E. Stoddart, Sir T. C. O'Brien, W. W. Read, C. J. Kortright, G. L. Jessop, G. G. Walker, J. A. Dixon, F. Mitchell, and W. Newham! I purposely omit W. L. Murdoch and J. J. Ferris as having learned their cricket elsewhere.

Now a few words about the bowlers. Figures are proverbially fallacious, but as figures back up my own personal observation as well as the opinions of other people, I am going to put H. H. B. Hawkins and V. F. S. Crawford, both of Whitgift School, at the very top of the tree—not merely because their figures are good for school matches, but because they have been highly tried outside, and have come out of the ordeal with the greatest credit. Next to them stand Pilkington of Eton and Probyn of Westminster, the latter a really fine bowler, who came on very fast as the season advanced. Champain of Cheltenham and Ainsworth of Marlborough, with de Gex (Clifton), Weigall (Wellington), Eccles (Repton), Dowson (Harrow), Belcher (Brighton), Burnett-Stuart (Repton), and Wilson (Uppingham) seem to be the pick of the bowling talent for the year, and as several of these are going to the Universities it is certain that more will be heard of them, for bowling is, was, and ever will be—with rare exceptions—the weak point of 'Varsity elevens. To pick the best all-round man of the year would not be easy amid such a plethora of talent; probably Pilkington, the Etonian, would be the first favourite for the place, and I should put the Whitgift pair next, with Eccles, Champain, Gibson, Gowers (Rugby), and probably Turner, and here my efforts at order-making must cease.

The six chief schools in Scotland play a series of matches on the League system, with the result that for the past year Fettes and Blair Lodge are equal for the championship, having lost no match, and having played a draw with each other, but Blair Lodge had on paper a good deal the best of the latter game. Loretto stands third, followed by Edinburgh Academy, Merchiston, and Glenalmond, the latter school not gaining a single success. It is worth noting that no less than six out of fifteen matches are recorded as draws, which, in a competition of this kind, is to be regretted. Blair Lodge had a thoroughly useful side, and as many of its representatives are young, it should be a formidable opponent next year. H. M. MacLaurin has an average of over 40 for sixteen completed innings, and should be heard of at Oxford, while H. E. Kingston, the crack bowler, has also a good record with the bat. Oxford is his destination also. Fettes had a very even side, with five men averaging over 20, the bowling being also of a very fair class, and T. Gowans, the wicket-keeper, well above the average. Loretto owing to bad fielding, had a poor season. Bowling was the strongest point of the side, but good bowling is seriously handicapped when the fieldsmen fail in their duty. It may be observed that till this season Fettes had not beaten Loretto on the latter's ground for twenty-one years. Edinburgh Academy could boast of seven men with double-figure averages, but the highest was only nineteen, and that fell, appropriately enough, to the captain, T. A. Nelson. The Merchiston averages are not high, though a good report comes to me of G. O. Turnbull, the captain, but here, as in all the Scotch schools, the bowling works out better than the batting, which is doubtless due to the effect of the moister climate on the grounds. No report has come to hand from Glenalmond.

A gratifying part of the task of collection and collation has been the almost universal praise of the fielding and wicket-keeping, though in several cases too many extras have been given away. It is the opinion of many good judges that only an exceptionally good keeper, who has exceptionally straight bowling to take, can afford to dispense with a long-stop, and as catching and stumping are his essential and primary duties, I venture to suggest that, at any rate in the early part of the season, the nowadays defunct long-stop should be revived, partly to save the stumper's hands, partly to keep down extras. I hope I shall be offending nobody—I have nobody in my mind's eye—when I suggest that the umpiring in matches against schools is not always quite satisfactory to the visitors. Of course, in inter-school matches foreign umpires are now imported, and this fact alone proves that the school professional is supposed to have some degree of bias towards his own boys. I am bound to say that a grumble is often heard after such

a match to the effect that it is hard work to play the school and its professional into the bargain, but apart from this, it is a thoroughly bad thing for a school side to be accustomed to get a majority of appeals answered in its favour, and then suddenly to find that with foreign umpires things do not go so smoothly, that they are more frequently out l.b.w., and that their wicket-keeper makes fewer catches. The school professional should be as rigidly impartial as any other umpire, though it is easy to understand that there is a great temptation to give one's eleven the benefit of the doubt on all occasions. As I said before, I am thinking of nobody in particular, and should be sorry to hurt the feelings in the slightest degree of a very hard-working and meritorious class of men. I don't remember ever suffering myself, but I have heard other men talk, and have seen some curious decisions given; hence these remarks.

The following are some of the more prominent members of public school teams who will be in residence at the Universities next year. It will be seen that Oxford has, on paper, considerably the best of the deal.

ETON V. HARROW.

Played at LORD'S, Friday, Saturday, July 12, 13.—By reason of the exciting incidents which marked its closing stage, the Schools' match of 1895 may rank among the most remarkable games played in recent years between Eton and Harrow. It was agreed on the second morning to play on if necessary till half-past seven; and when at half-past five on the Saturday Pilkington, the Eton captain, declared his second innings closed with the score at 233 for nine wickets a very quiet and uneventful finish to the game seemed in prospect, the consistently good scoring up to this point giving no suggestion that a definite issue could be arrived at in the hour and forty minutes that remained for play. As it turned out, the Harrow boys succeeded in drawing the match; but so desperately pushed were they that in all probability another five or ten minutes would have brought about their defeat. As events turned out, Pilkington would have been wise to put the closure in force at least a quarter of an hour earlier than he did; but we expect, if the truth could be known, he had no real hope of winning the match when Harrow began their second innings. Be this as it may, however, the people who stayed at Lord's up to the close of one of the longest day's cricket we have ever sat through, had a very exciting time of it. With 218 runs required, Harrow had only to play for a draw; and though Vibart failed, there was nothing in the cricket up to a certain time to threaten danger. Indeed, Maw and Stogdon played so well that 40 went up with only one wicket down. Then, in the course of four or five minutes, the position entirely changed, Pilkington, in quick succession, securing three wickets. With four men out for 43, Crawley joined Stogdon, and the two batsmen played so steadily that Harrow's supporters again began to feel secure. Mitchell, however, on going on to bowl at 56, brought the game to an acute point by dismissing Crawley and Page with successive balls. The sixth wicket fell at seven o'clock, the Eton boys having half an hour left in which to win the match. Stogdon, who under the most trying conditions played with perfect nerve, found a valuable partner in Cruise, and nearly a quarter of an hour went by without further disaster. Then Cruise was bowled, and Dowson became Stogdon's partner. Seven minutes elapsed, and Harrow seemed almost out of danger, when at 75 Stogdon was stumped in a very lucky way, the ball rebounding from the wicket-keeper's pads. Just afterwards little Dowson, who had kept up his wicket for ten minutes without attempting to score, was out to a brilliant catch at forward point, and Cole, the last man, joined Henley with three minutes still left for play. The excitement was naturally intense, but, happily for Harrow, the two batsmen kept their heads. Cole played the remaining four balls of an over from Pilkington and Henley, and though the fieldsmen crowded all round him, safely got through an over from Mitchell. Stumps were then pulled up, and a remarkable match was left drawn.

Though the last stage of the game was much more exciting than all the rest, the earlier cricket was, in its way, thoroughly interesting. Eton came up to Lord's with a high reputation, but reports from Harrow had not been so favourable, and when the game commenced most people expected to see Eton win rather easily. That they were the finer side all round there could be no doubt, their batting being indeed quite exceptional. Whatever the respective merits of the players at home, Chinnery took all the honours at Lord's, playing in

beautiful style for his 75 and 64. That Harrow, though so nearly beaten at the finish, played such a capital game, was due to three members of their team—Stogdon, Crawley, and little E. M. Dowson. Stogdon, who had to assume the duties of captain through the illness of C. P. Gore, had the distinction of making the third best score ever obtained in the Schools' match, his 124 being only inferior to the 152 by Sir Emilius Bayley in 1841 and the 135 by Mr. A. K. Watson in 1885. Going in first wicket down, when only one run had been scored, Stogdon stayed till the Harrow total had reached 211, his innings lasting close upon three hours. With good height and reach he showed, for a schoolboy, exceptional power, most of his runs being obtained by clean hard drives. The chief figures of his innings were fifteen 4's, four 3's, and thirteen 2's. For the most part his cricket was quite free from fault; but he had one great piece of luck, Chinnery missing him very badly at cover-point when he had made 36. The surprise of the match was the bowling of Dowson, a son of the Mr. E. M. Dowson so well known years ago in connection with the old Surrey eleven. The little cricketer had only gone up to Harrow from Elstree after the season of 1894, and we have seldom seen anyone so young and small in the Schools' match. As to the quality of his left-handed slow bowling, however, there could not be two opinions. With the easy natural action of a first-rate professional he kept his length perfectly during long spells of work and made the ball do a good deal.
