### PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1918.

It is an interesting speculation whether in the war-time summers the standard of cricket at the Public Schools has greatly declined or not. To some extent, of course, it has, and it would be extraordinary if this were not so. For one thing the average age of an Eleven is now younger, and one year at this time of life makes a great difference in strength and skill. For another, the class of opposition in "foreign" matches has been by no means the same thing. The boys, as a rule, have had neither the same good bowlers nor the same good batsmen against them as in pre-war years, save in one or two exceptional cases. One boy who had an "old head" on his shoulders told me that by far the best bowling he met in the term was in his school's chief school match. Before the war it was almost a certainty that the school bowling would be about the easiest. The fact of not seeing and not playing such good cricket as before, must have its effect, but I think that disappointing as much of the batting was in the Lord's Schools v. the Rest match at Lord's, it would not be fair to judge it too harshly. The weather, and the wicket were all against boys showing their best, and on the next two days, in the Schools v. Captain Warner's XI match, the batting was much better. All will hope that this year these matches will be favoured with fine weather and good fast wickets. Such conditions are, for boys at any rate, a truer test.

There is one point that has gained some prominence in school cricket lately: namely, the choice of innings. In the Eton and Harrow matches of the last ten years or so, Eton have put their opponents in several times, and Harrow once—until it has, one might almost say, become the fashion for the side that wins the toss to bat second. The old settled tradition that in 99 cases out of 100, batting first was an advantage is still and will be one thinks adhered to by the great body of cricketers in school as well as in all other matches. Eton, as is generally known, have done astonishingly well against their old opponents in the last decade—in fact, until this last summer they had not lost a match with them since 1908—winning no less than ten in succession, and on each occasion, save one, I believe, they were the side that went in second. But this I think, proves little. Eton have had a wonderful run of good

Elevens, and they won these matches because they were the better side—in many cases much the better side—and not from an advantage gained in most instances by batting second—at least such,

I think, will be the general opinion.

In an interesting little book, little known to the majority of cricketers of this generation, entitled, "The Public Schools Matches, and Those we Meet There," by a Wykehamist, published in 1853—the writer, Mr. Frederic Gale, was better known as "The Old Buffer"—there is a delightful description of one of the matches in the days when the three schools, Eton, Harrow, and Winchester met at Lord's, and when 100 was still a very good total for a side. He says: "Let us walk up to the Pavilion and meet our friends.... a small circle is collecting round the captain of one of the Elevens, who is waiting to toss for first innings. The minutes seem hours now. At last down comes the other captain, and up goes the shilling—Heads—Heads it is. By jingo! 'We go in,' says the winner of the toss. 'That's worth twenty runs.'"

For twenty or thirty years after this, let it be remembered, too, that to get over 200 in a fourth innings was thought an astonishing feat, and even in modern conditions the wicket, in ordinary circumstances, is less easy in the last innings than in any other. A school side that puts its opponents in without any real reason for doing so, will sooner or later lose a match by it,

and will have no one but the captain to blame.

Public schoolboys could not complain of any lack of cricket last year in the holidays, for there were matches of one kind or another nearly every day of the week, so that everyone got his chance. The representative match, Lord's Schools v. the Rest, was played at Lord's on August 5 and 6, and was followed by a game between Capt. Warner's side, which was captained by the Treasurer of M.C.C., Lord Harris, and a side selected from the 22 Public School Players. It was, I believe, fifty years before that Lord Harris first played at Lords for Eton—a remarkable record—and his batting in this match was quite wonderful.

Mr. Lacey had, once again, taken the greatest pains to get the best available sides. It was thought that the Lord's School's batting might prove a little weak, not from the fact that the selection had left out good players, but that there was a certain lack of talent in the batting of these schools this summer, and

such perhaps proved to be the case.

Naturally, some of those asked could not play, owing to one reason or another, such as the Clifton captain, Richards; A. C. Gore, the Eton bowler; and Byass, the Repton captain; while no Wykehamist was available, as the school did not break up until well after the match. The sides which eventually took the field were as follows: Lord's Schools—C. H. Gibson (capt.), (captain of Eton);

W. R. de la C. Shirley and B. S. Hill Wood (Eton); W. A. R. Collins (captain of Harrow); P. H. Gold (Harrow); B. H. Lyon and G. F. Straker (Rugby); G. S. Butler (captain Marlborough); A. E. L. Hill (Marlborough); I. J. Kilgour (captain of Cheltenham); and P. W. Adams (Cheltenham). The Rest.—G. T. S. Stevens, captain (University College School captain); N. E. Partridge (captain Malvern); L. P. Hedges (captain Tonbridge); A. R. F. Chapman (captain Uppingham); K. S. Bahadursinhji and G. Colchester (Shrewsbury); C. E. Stones (Westminster); P. W. Rucker (captain Charterhouse); H. L. Calder (captain Cranleigh); R. L. Wightman (captain Bedford) and N. H. Saint (Merchant Taylors).

The game, unfortunately, was very largely interfered with by the weather, though it was finished easily enough. But the ground all through was hopelessly wet, and the wicket pretty difficult. Such conditions are the last in which boys are likely to distinguish themselves. Part of the time it was the sort of wicket when a batsman who gets about 12 in four hits, and then out has done very well. A good deal of the batting was no doubt unenterprising, and what was remarkable was in many cases the weakness of the leg hitting. There were during the course of the match a great number of leg balls which ought to have been hit for fours (and a

four means a lot on this kind of wicket), which were missed.

The Lord's Schools batted first, and scored 60, the best batting, perhaps, coming at the start of the innings by A. E. L. Hill of Marlborough, who is most promising. The Rest only headed this by three—they actually lost five for 16, and then came the best piece of "in-cricket" of the whole match by Hedges of Tonbridge, aided by Stones of Westminster. Hedges played the right game, and went for the bowling, his 27 being the highest and best innings in the game. The Lord's Schools only got 43 second time—no double figure score on the side—and the Rest got the runs for the loss of one wicket, Chapman's 19 not out being next to Hedges's the most impressive piece of batting in the match, while Bahadursinhji showed some skilful defence, and looked to be a good batsman apart from his failure to hit leg balls.

If the batting was as a whole disappointing, the bowling was the reverse. For the Lord's Schools, Gibson, with six for 13, had one of his best days on the Monday, and H. L. Calder, the Rest's fast medium bowler with a nice action, and plenty of change of pace, was equally good. There were three left-handers: Rucker, Straker, and Wightman. The last is said to be very good, but he did not come off in this match. Between Rucker and Straker there did not seem much to choose, though Rucker has the more attractive action—Straker's arm gives the impression—perhaps more fancied than real—of being a trifle low—but undoubtedly the bowler who looked most difficult was Stevens,

the captain of the Rest (right-hand medium), who has a great variety of ball, command of the googly and leg break, and is certainly a bowler of more than ordinary ability. The fielding was most of it first-rate, Hedges at cover-point being particularly brilliant, and only one catch, and that a difficult one, was dropped in the match.

From the two Elevens, a side, captained by Stevens, was chosen to play the Eleven got together by Captain P. F. Warner, who owing to ill-health, could not play, Lord Harris, as already stated, acting as captain. The school eleven was: Stevens, Gibson, Partridge, Calder, Adams, Butler, Hill. Bahadursinhji, Chapman, Rucker, and Hedges. It proved a low-scoring match, which was won by lunch-time on the second day by Captain Warner's XI.

The two school cricketers of the year who gained the greatest reputation were Stevens and Partridge, of Malvern. Stevens had more strength and more experience than the year before, and was, for a boy, a splendid all-round player. Though he was not very successful in batting in the holiday matches, he is a good batsman with heaps of possibilities, but his bowling, referred to before, is perhaps his strongest point. More than one first-class cricketer assured me that he thought Stevens was quite fitted to take his place as a member of a strong County side of pre-war days. He had the honour of being included in one of Captain Warner's sides against the Dominions at Lord's.

Stevens and Gibson were among the boys whose portraits appeared in Wisden last year. This year the pictures are of Partridge—another all-rounder; Chapman, a batsman, and a fine field, who also bowls; Hedges, a batsman and fine field; Adams, a wicket-

keeper: and Gore, a bowler.

N. E. Partridge, of Malvern, certainly accomplished the most remarkable performances of any boy last year, and very few in any year have approached him. For several years Mr. C. Toppin, who has worked so hard and so successfully in the interests of Malvern cricket, has had the highest opinion of his possibilities, and he fully justified his hopes last year, both as batsman and bowler,—but it is, I think, his batting that is the more remarkable, It is considered by many that he is already fit to play in any company, even the highest. Mr. Toppin says of him: "As an all-round player, I have never seen Partridge's equal as a boy. It is very sad that his cricket should come in these broken times." And let it be remembered that Mr. Toppin has had such great cricketers under his care as some of the famous Foster family, S. H. Day, W. H. B. Evans, and many others.

As a batsman he is essentially an attacking player, with the possession of almost every shot of the cricketer of potential fame; as a bowler his action is not particularly impressive, but he is sound

and liable to defeat any one at any time.

His performances in School matches are so remarkable that I give them below :—

I can remember some wonderful school records, but I doubt if those who know their Wisden most intimately, can produce anything better in past years than this.

As an instance of stamina, it might be recorded that on the first day of the Repton match—a very hot day, Partridge bowled

thirty overs and made 160 not out.

Though he bowls left-handed with some ability, it is also as a batsman that Chapman is chiefly distinguished. He is a left-handed player, and he is one of those who are able to put great power behind almost any stroke with very little apparent effort—the classic examples are Mr. F. G. J. Ford and F. E. Woolley. Chapman has a fine wrist and any amount of strokes all round the wicket. From one who saw a good deal of his cricket at Uppingham I hear: "He is a fine natural cricketer, and if only old "H.H." had been alive to coach him, he would have been tip top." As it is, his defence is not quite sound, but with such natural abilities, he ought to make his mark.

L. P. Hedges, of Tonbridge, who distinguished himself more than any other batsman in the match at Lord's, is a fine boy batsman of a type that one likes to see who does not "let the grass grow under his feet." He is also an exceptionally brilliant cover-point. During the term he averaged 63 for ten innings. He scored 114 against Lancing, 63 against M.C.C., and 87 not out second innings against Haileybury; but his great performance was against Major A. D. Whatman's side—not a weak side, either. The visitors got 276. The School with just over two hours to play, lost two wiokets for ten runs. Then in an hour and forty minutes Hedges scored 201 out of a total of 282, hitting two 6's and thirtyeight 4's, and the school won by six wickets.

The average of wicket-keeping in the schools was not high this year, but P. W. Adams, of Cheltenham, proved himself a most efficient stumper, and if, as is possible, he has another year at school, he should certaiuly be very good. He kept, and kept well, in the Lord's Schools v. the Rest, and also in the match against Captain Warner's XI. It is unfortunate that he gets his hands damaged rather easily; one hopes this may not be a bar to his future success. From one who saw a good deal of his cricket I hear: "On his day, and with bowling he knows something about, he would take some beating behind the sticks." He has improved as a batsman, but is rather too fond of trying to pull short balls.

A. C. Gore is a young cricketer whose performances have also been remarkable. His record at Eton is:—

The fifty-one wickets were got in fourteen innings (not all completed), or on an average nearly four wickets per innings.

Gore bowls right-hand fast medium, and swings from the off. At times he might bowl out anybody. He does not require a wind, and in fact, many of those who saw him think he bowls better without a wind.

Eton, Harrow, and Winchester played each other in the same way as the year before—that is, one-day matches—Winchester meeting Harrow at Winchester, and Eton at Eton. Eton and Harrow met twice, once on Six Form Ground and once on Agar's Plough. On the last occasion Harrow broke their long run of ill-success against Eton with a hard earned victory—their first since 1908, which should give them renewed confidence. A long run in such matches either way is a bad thing.

The Winchester and Harrow match was played at Winchester on a miserably cold and wet day, but on a slow and fairly easy wicket. Winchester were put in by their opponents, and took advantage of it by making 239 for six declared—C. Ashton 92 and D. M. Jardine being the highest scorers. Harrow, in spite of the fact that the Winchester bowlers were handicapped by a wet ball—nearly all the innings was played in a drizzle—never looked like playing out the three hours left to go, and were all dismissed by Leggatt and Firth for 112.

Winchester, however, hardly did themselves justice against Eton. They batted first, and though they were a good batting side on the whole, they failed to cope with the Eton bowling, and were dismissed cheaply. Eton had to work fairly hard for the runs, but got them all right, and won the match, and eventually got a good lead. Winchester were put in again, and a fine defensive innings by R. H. Hill prevented any chance of an innings defeat.

In both of their matches with Harrow, Eton put their opponents in. On Sixth Form Ground, in June, they got Harrow out for 142 (C. T. Bennett, 34; P. H. Gold, 24; J. R. M. Matson, 31); and they then played the Harrow bowling with confidence, and never looked likely not to get the runs. The chief scores were H. H. Low, 23; M. J. Babington Smith, 34; W. R. Shirley, 37; J. Bevan, 25; and C. W. Boden, 35. In their second innings Harrow lost nine for 79. Shirley, in the match, took nine wickets for 64.

The match at Agar's Plough was the only one between the three schools which was really close. Eton were without one or two of their regular players, owing to influenza, and some of the others were only recently out of bed. The game was played on a slow wicket, but one which was not really difficult. Nearly half Harrow's score of 98 was the work of E. G. Hoyer-Millar. Eton lost Shirley, Low, and Babington-Smith for nine runs, and the body of the team failed to redeem this bad start, though W. J. Hill Wood—a brother of B. S., who was not available—put up a gallant defence, and T. H. Brand made some good strokes in his 23. But with nine wickets down there were well over 20 runs to make. Cokayne-Frith, and Gore then made another gallant effort, and took the score to 91 before Gore was well caught at coverpoint, and Harrow had won, after long and weary years of waiting, by seven runs.

Eton besides beating Harrow in one match and Winchester, defeated Charterhouse, Lord Francis Scott's XI, and Indian Gymkana. They lost to Sandhurst, Captain Warner's XI and Harrow (2nd match). In that their batting was very moderate, Eton were not up to the high standard of side which they have had of late years: but they were a formidable school bowling side, especially on the Agar's Plough wicket, which is often, to say the least of it,

decidedly lively. The four chief bowlers were C. H. Gibson (the captain), W. R. de la C. Shirley, B. Hill Wood, and A. C. Goreall fast medium to fast right-hand. As they were able to get a foothold and bowl well on a slow wicket, the loss of a slow bowler was not much felt. It is rather curious that Eton have produced so few slow bowlers of merit lately, especially when one remembers that Mr. C. M. Wells, who does so much for their cricket and so ably, was a past-master of the art, but, no doubt, the lively wickets need lively bowlers.

Owing to illness at Easter, Gibson, who was so very good in the previous year, was never quite himself. He often bowled well, but instead of being very steady and accurate, he was often erratic, and seemed to lose control of the ball. However, I believe him to have the makings of a really fine bowler. Of Gore I have

spoken earlier.

The batting, as I have said, was moderate. Shirley, who was not in the best of health, is a good player with a fine wrist, but he was rather disappointing, as was Brand, who plays in nice style. Low played some valuable innings, and Boden made most runs but he was rather favoured by fortune. Yorke was a hitter-strong, if unsound, but dangerous and capable of turning a match. The fielding was good, and, what is so delightful, but rather rare in modern school cricket, there were a great many fine throwers on the side. Cokayne-Frith-a grand cover-point-Gibson, Gore, and Bevan were the best.

It is rather noticeable that the Eton batting of late years, while it has often been good, sound, and efficient, is quite different from the typical style of the Mitchell regime. For those who loved grace of style and movement, there seems a distinct loss. Not to go back to the Eton batsmen of the past, the great Mitchell himself, E. W. Tritton, Alfred Lubbock, Walter Forbes, the Lytteltons, the Studds, and others who to many are little more than names, nowadays, one may say that the last years have hardly produced a single player to rival in grace of style such players of the '90's, and of this century as the Pilkingtons, A. B. Lubbock in 1895, and his brother the next year, as C. K. Hutchison, as P. R. Johnson, as P. Pearson Gregory, as K. I. Nicholl, to mention only a few whose names occur at once to the mind.

Winchester were quite a good Eleven-much better, I think, in batting than Eton or Harrow. They beat Charterhouse after

an exciting match, lost to Marlborough, and beat Bradfield.

C. Ashton, who was in great form early in the season, has, like his elder brothers, a lot of cricket in him, and is admirably keen. For his size he has plenty of strokes and power of hitting, and he is very neat on his feet, but he has one or two faults. D. R. Jardine was also good, but hardly improved as much as expected.

No one, however, did more for the side than R. H. Hill, who as the season went on, was found to be an excellent man to go in first. He has plenty of defence and watches the ball well. Scoring consistently, he headed the averages with 43. He has lots of wrist, and is getting quicker on his feet as he grows stronger, which

was perhaps what he most needed.

The captain, J. D'E. E. Firth, did not repeat any of his astonishing bowling performances of 1917. He is, I believe, the only instance of a Wykehamist in modern days being "Prefect of Hall" and captain of the Eleven. Probably the amount of work entailed by the double office had something to do with the falling off of his individual cricket. The most effective bowler on the side was Leggatt-fast medium-who bowled well in nearly all the school matches. J. R. Toppin was a useful all-round player who could both bowl and bat, and was a fine field; and Fraser was a useful hitter, though unsound.

One cannot say impartially that one thinks Harrow, in spite of their one victory over Eton, were the equal of the other two sides. Their captain, Collins, was a hard worker, and he and Matson were just a useful pair of bowlers, both medium-paced swingers and no more. Matson, too, always showed himself likely to get a few runs by cheery and light-hearted, if unsound, hitting. In batting, C. T. Bennett, who is still very young, will, no doubt, be good. He is left-handed, and has many of the left-hander's qualities. Gold too was useful, and had some nice shots on the offside.

In passing, one may say that a fault which was noticeable in a number of boys' batting last season, was the fact that the bat was not taken up straight, but towards point, and certainly if the bat is taken up crooked it is not so likely to come down straight. Many good school coaches and others are most insistent on this point, and it is certainly an important one.

Charterhouse were not a very strong side I am told-nothing like equal to that of 1917—but they played up to their merits, and were by no means unsuccessful. They beat Harrow after a close match by 12 runs at Harrow, and lost after another good finish, by three wickets, to Winchester, at Godalming. Their match against Eton was not such a debacle as it looks on paper. On a difficult wicket at Eton, B. S. Hill Wood and A. G. Gore got them out for only 13-Hill Wood six wickets for one run and Gore four for eight. Charterhouse, however, then proceeded to get more than half of Eton out for very little more. Then rain came on again making the wicket easier, and a good bit of hitting by Yorke and Bevan made a small total into quite a large one for the day-168. Charterhouse in their second innings got 83, and so lost by an innings and 72. Wellington were beaten at Wellington by 73 runs. Among other matches Charterhouse lost to M.C.C. by 58 runs; beat Indian Gymkana by four wickets; and drew with the strong side which the Coldstream Guards were able to play against more than one school last year. As a whole, both the bowling and batting needed consistency. P. W. Rucker, the captain, bowled well—he got six for 45 against Harrow and five for 24 against Wellington, five for 70 v. M.C.C., and in all thirty-seven wickets for 9.7 runs each, but too much depended on him. R. C. Robertson-Glasgow is a good, steady bat, and quite a fair medium pace bowler, but illness handicapped him considerably. He is an improving cricketer, and should be quite good this year when he will captain the side. F. H. Barnard is a young and most promising bateman.

Of Wellington I have little information, I am sorry to say. I hear, however, that they were not a strong side, but with one player, Bryant, above the average. Another member of the eleven was E. J. Mordaunt—son of one of Wellington's most famous cricket sons, G. J. Mordaunt. He is a slow bowler of some promise. There is rather a curiosity to record in Wellington's match against Charterhouse—namely that ten of the eleven bowled in an innings of 183.

Rugby had another good eleven. They, like Eton, have been on the crest of the wave of success for some years. They beat Malvern—the luck was rather in their favour in the match—and Uppingham, but collapsed against Marlborough. Straker was consistently successful as a bowler. He varies his pace well, and is tempting. His record for the term was 48 wickets for 12 runs each. There was a good deal of useful batting on the side, with a brilliant player in B. H. Lyon, who had the highest average, 25.7, and played one really fine innings of 98 against Malvern. He is not sound, but he is less reckless than he used to be, and with his fine wrist and quick eye, he makes some lovely strokes. Rugby, I believe I am right in saying, had not lost a school match until this summer since 1914.

A side that did particularly well was Marlborough. They won three of their school matches, and the fourth was a draw, They beat Winchester by 106; drew with Wellington; beat Cheltenham by 21; and finished up with a triumph over their old opponents, Rugby, who have had the best of it during the war years. The match was fixed for July 23 and 24, but it rained all the first day and it was decided to play on the 24th and 25th. One day, as a fact, finished the match. Rugby, batting first, made 108. Marlborough, after a not over-promising start—four wickets were down for 44—replied with 274. The heroes of this innings were T. W. Mansergh 74, and N. M. Jerram, who made 88 out of 120, while he was at the wickets. Rugby were got rid of again for 72; and Marlborough won by an innings and 94. Two of the Rugby team,

R. Stapleton and R. G. O. Dwyer, could not bat in the last innings owing to influenza, which had, as a fact, I believe, affected several of the team. On their record, Marlborough may certainly claim to be one of the school elevens of the year. The report I hear of them is: "a good match-playing side, but they lacked the experience of really good cricket." "Not so good individually as many Marlborough sides, but distinctly awkward customers to tackle. As batsmen not very sound, but they could all make runs." A. E. L. Hill is full of possibilities, with a nice easy style, and a good deal may be expected of him. G. S. Butler, the captain, was the allround man of the side. His record for the year was 460 runs in eleven innings, and an average of 41.8, and twenty wickets for 16.9. He is a powerful bat—an experienced Australian cricketer who played several times for the Dominions this year, has a great opinion of his capabilities—a vigorous fast medium bowler, faster than he looks, and a good field. No less than seven of the side had batting averages of over 25, which means a good deal. There was also good combination and variety of bowling. F. W. B. Smyth (34 wickets for 12.2 runs) in the season, is a useful slow bowler with a good length and deceptive flight. B. S. Hume, swinging left-handers, was apt to bowl a most difficult ball occasionally, but with many bad ones in between. These two, with Tress, Butler, and Jerram, made a distinctly useful quintet. Finally, though not brilliant, they were a sound fielding side.

Cheltenham gained a narrow win over Clifton by eight runs, but lost their other three school matches, Malvern beating them decisively twice, and Marlborough by 21 runs. I hear from Cheltenham again, as from so many schools, that the side suffered from not playing against such good teams as of old. The most satisfactory point about Cheltenham was their fielding and keenness. They were in this respect quite the equals if not superiors, of the sides they met, L. J. Kilgour, the captain, at extra cover-point; A. C. Keell at cover, and L. W. Haslett-a fine all-round athlete-in almost any position being particularly good. Kilgour is a useful bowler and bat who captained the side with much keenness, and he might become a good cricketer with more experience. The bowling, with the exception of J. V. Townsend, left-hand, was all medium right-hand and lacked variety. The batting as a whole was fair, but fast bowlers and foreign grounds were too much for them. Of Adams' wicket-keeping I have spoken before. It is pleasant to hear that Woof, a cricketer of the old school, still coaches with all his old skill and keenness.

Clifton, whose opponents were chiefly military sides, won five, lost two, and drew two matches. In their only school match against Cheltenham they threw away their chances by weak

fielding. Richards, the captain, was easily the best cricketer on the side. Hussey played a few good innings, and Aslott and Bisdee

have plenty of cricket in them.

Malvern were a side which, if only for the presence of a player of the quality of Partridge, were bound to be redoubtable. Apart from him, however, there was plenty of promising cricket, and Malvern may certainly claim to have been among the best public school sides. They just lost the first match against Rugby, when they had to bat in the fourth innings on a worn wicket, which had been damaged by rain in the morning. They won their other matches easily, and indeed, in one or two of them "swamped" their opponents. Cooper was an excellent school bat and stumper. Brooke as bat and fielder well above the average. Robson very promising, but rather unlucky; and Tweedie, Cave Rogers, and Cuthbertson well up to the average. In bowling, beside Partridge. Pridham was very useful, as were Horsley and Tweedie as changes.

Repton were a weak side, particularly in bowling. In B. O. Byass, the captain, and J. M. Coldham, captain for 1919, they had two good batsmen, particularly Byass who, when he recovers his

health, should be heard of again.

The season at Shrewsbury was, on the whole, very successful: Uppingham and Clifton were soundly beaten, Repton and M.C.C. had much the worst of drawn games; the only failure was against Malvern. Four old colours remained from 1917, of whom G. McFerran (captain) and H. D. Badger formed a very useful bowling combination. while J. R. Hunt and K. S. Bahadursinjhi fully justified the expectation that they would make plenty of runs. A good wicket-keeper was forthcoming in G. Colchester. The remaining six members of the team improved very much as the term went on, and the eleven turned out in the end to be one of the strongest Shrewsbury sides of recent years. No side succeeded in making 200 against them, the nearest in inter-school matches being 181 by Malvern. Badger (fast right-hand) was inclined to be erratic at times, but his figures for the season were very creditable. G. M. McFerran, the captain (slow off-break) bowled an excellent length: J. A. Evershed's slow leg-breaks proved quite useful as a change. The batting was, perhaps, the strongest point. K. S. Bahadursinhji greatly improved his defence, and played several excellent innings, notably 150 against Repton, and 102 v. Clifton. Hunt and Jones made centuries against the M.C.C.: the former was the most dependable batsman on the side, and the latter's back play is good, but he relies too much on scoring behind the wicket at present, and should develop his forward shots. The remainder were all capable of making runs, Boumphrey's 87 v. Clifton, in particular, being a promising innings for so young a player. The fielding was variable, sometimes reaching a high level :

Jones and Hewetson were the best fieldsmen on the side. Colchester is a natural wicket-keeper, and some of his catches and pieces of stumping were really first-class. McFerran as captain was all that could be desired.

Out of a card of ten fixtures, most of them against soldier sides of varying strength, Uppingham won five matches. lost four. and drew one. They lost the only two school matches which could be played, Rugby and Shrewsbury. The real weakness of the side in batting was due to the fact that everything depended on Chapman coming off. Thornton played one good innings, and some of the younger members of the side showed promise for the future. The fielding was good and keen, and Chapman set his side an excellent example in this important respect. He proved himself all round a keen and energetic captain.

Tonbridge had a good season, winning seven matches and losing only three. They won all their school matches, Lancing, Westminster, Haileybury, and also beat M.C.C. Their defeats were against R.M.C. Woolwich, R.A.F. Cadet School, Hastings, and a strong side got together by Captain Warner. Though due in a measure to their captain, Hedges's batting, the school's successful season was also the result of consistently good fielding, and the possession of two good bowlers, Musson and Pryor. "The best pair Tonbridge have had for some years," is the opinion of a fine amateur bowler of other days. E. P. Solbé, who is likely to do well this year, played some useful innings.

Another eleven who distinguished themselves were Bedford, who won three out of their four school matches, easily beating Leys by 199 runs, Wellingborough by 134, and Dulwich (188 for four wickets against 183). Bedford had to get the runs in about an hour and three-quarters, and just did it. The fourth against Merchant Taylor's was drawn, the latter just saving the match. In R. L. Wightman, the captain-picked to play at Lord's-the school had an excellent fast-medium left-hand bowler, who swings with a new ball, and keeps an admirable length. He is also a useful bat and good field. In the season he got thirty-five wickets for 9.09 apiece, and was particularly successful against schools. J. S. Carter was the most stylish bat on the side, better against medium or slow bowling than fast-he averaged 39.43; and C. C. Schmidt (31.7), a brilliant hitter if unsound in defence; C. J. Scager, R. T. W. Macleod, and A. B. H. Dyer were other useful bats. E. C. Herbert, a medium right swinger, was the next best bowler to Wightman, but too much depended on the latter.

In conclusion, I must once more thank those masters who, busy as they must have been this term, and some of them with influenza in their houses, have found time to send me the information which is absolutely indispensable to a writer on Public School cricket.

### CAPTAIN P. F. WARNER'S XI. v. PUBLIC SCHOOLS XI.
