PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1919.

The teaching of cricket to Public School boys, it's methods, shortcomings, and advantages, is a subject on which cricket opinion is widely divergent, but few would assert that those masters who give their time ungrudgingly to this work have either an easy or an entirely enviable task. They are pretty certain to be criticized, and they are liable to be judged too much on results. If a school loses its important school match in several successive years, the cry is sure to come that " the coaching at so and so is all wrong."

This year both Eton and Harrow are losing, I believe, the services of masters who have devoted themselves to cricket for many years, for I hear that Mr. C. M. Wells and Mr. M. C. Kemp are giving up the supervision of cricket next summer, and Repton cricket has suffered a severe loss in the death of Mr. J. W. Stratton. All three were the keenest of the keen. Mr. Stratton, unlike Mr. Kemp and Mr. Wells, was never himself a noted cricketer, though more than a useful player, but he had a wonderful gift of teaching the game.

If one is to judge by success in the great school matches, Mr. Wells's record is wonderful. He succeeded the great Mr. Mitchell, going as a master to Eton in the 90's and taking over the position occupied for so long by Mr. Mitchell a few years later. During Mr. Wells' regime Eton have had some splendid sides, and since 1910 an unprecedented run of success, and on several occasions were probably the best school side of the year. Proportionately they may not have produced so many cricketers who became great afterwards, but many of the elevens were very strong all round : one strength being that they could nearly always bat all the way down ; another being as a rule a richness in talent of bowling of over medium pace. Much of Eton's success is undoubtedly due to Mr. Wells : yet at one time, when Eton lost a match or two, the coaching at Eton was at once called into question, in one case by a critic notoriously ignorant of practical cricket, which if I remember rightly, elicited a spirited reply from two old Eton captains. Mr. Kemp was at Winchester for one summer after he came down from the University, and since then for thirty years has looked after Harrow cricket. In the earlier part of his time Harrow cricket was at a high ebb, especially during part of the '90's, and his work for the cricket of the school will always be remembered. Since 1910—the historic match which Harrow lost by eight runs after it had looked 1,000 to 1 on them—they have so to speak been wandering in the wilderness, and it must have been rather a disheartening experience, but Mr. Kemp has never lost his keenness.

Mr. Stratton too was at Repton at a time when that school produced some grand sides—and great cricketers, J. N. Crawford, R. A. Young, A. F. Morcom, Miles and John Howell are only a few of the names that occur to one—and some of the sides early in this century were quite exceptional.

It was a great thing for school cricket that this year the elevens which could be got together to oppose the schools, if not generally equal to those of pre-war days, were much stronger than for the last four summers, and this will have it's effect, I feel sure, on heightening the standard again

It was undoubtedly a year of individual cricketers rather than of sides : indeed though Winchester, Marlborough, Malvern, and Uppingham were above the average there was no eleven that was outstanding. On the other hand there were a number of fine individual cricketers. The names of many really great schoolboy cricketers-some of them excelled afterwards; others never fulfilled their early promise, others did not have the opportunityreadily occur to the mind, such as R. A. H. Mitchell, C. J. Ottaway, Walter Forbes, A. G. Steel, F. S. Jackson, C. L. Townsend, J. R. Mason, R. H. Spooner, J. S. Curtis, and others-but I doubt if any one year can point to more cricketers of abundant promise than G. T. S. Stevens (University College School), N. E. Partridge (Malvern) C. H. Gibson (Eton), L. P. Hedges (Tonbridge), A. P. F. Chapman (Uppingham), G. S. Butler (Marlborough) and D. R. Jardine (Winchester). All of these are now in residence or are likely to be next summer at the Universities, so that they will have a further chance of distinguishing themselves. Nearly all of them were leading school cricketers last summer and I must ask forgiveness if I repeat something of what was said about them last year-Stevens, Partridge, and Butler are all-round cricketers; Chapman a batsman who bowls; Gibson a bowler who bats-he can indeed, bat quite well, but one hopes he will not sacrifice any of his bowling to it, for when that rara avis, a good amateur bowler appears, he is worth his weight in gold. Jardine and Hedges are primarily batsmen only. Chapman, Hedges, and Jardine are all fine fields at cover point, the first two particularly, and Jardine is better than he looks. He does not appear very fast, but he can stop very hard hits with the greatest ease, and has a splendid pair of hands.

Stevens, of course, had the great honour of being selected, and playing, for the Gentlemen of England, at Lord's. Whether the distinction is unique or not is a debated point. Mr. Mitchell, it is believed, was asked, but did not play; but Mr. A. J. Lowth, in the 40's, was probably still at Winchester when he played. For Middlesex Stevens was a little disappointing, perhaps, but he did most valuable service for them several times. He can with his variations of pace and his command of many kinds of ball, be very difficult as a bowler, but he is apt to be expensive. In batting he was not consistent, but he has the knack of getting runs when they are wanted—and on several occasions when he went in late he did most valuable service to his side in this way. He is a good catch though slow on his feet in the field for a boy of his age.

Partridge had a most marvellous record in bowling at Malvern this year, though his batting performances did not equal those of 1918, and in one match he suffered what is said to be the fate of every good batsman, except W.G., namely to get a pair of spectacles. The Malvern ground is more or less a batsman's paradise, and the sides which play at Malvern are not as a rule by any means weak, and it was as a whole a summer of good wickets. Taking all this into account a record of over seventy wickets for 12 runs apiece is something quite out of the ordinary.

Hedges played for Kent all through the holidays and many people had an opportunity of seeing his form. He is a delightful type of amateur player with great punishing powers and the way he hits the ball past the covers is most refreshing.

Chapman's defence may not be altogether convincing to watch, but he does not seem easy to get out and he has that astonishing gift—a combination of wrist and timing—which enables great power to be put behind almost every stroke, whether defensive or attacking, and often sends the ball like a cannon ball to the railings. There was no reason to alter the opinion one had held of Gibson's bowling. He had recovered from the effects of the operation which had rather interfered with his cricket in 1918, and he was more dependable

and consistent without losing any of his dash. He is a beautiful bowler to watch with a very easy and pretty action who can go on bowling for a long time at a pace just short of fast, but well over medium. He swings the ball late and has a deadly yorker.

Butler comes nearer to being a hitter pure and simple than any of the others, and indeed in the matches at Lord's he went for the ball almost at once. He is one of those players whom the spectator, even the most critical and knowledgeable spectator who watches the game from behind the bowler's arm with a most practical eye says—" Oh, I do hope he won't get out, he is such fun." Butler is most powerfully built and has a splendid eye. Like Chapman, almost every stroke is played hard, but there is much more conscious effort. He does not when he is making his hits lift the ball much, but he hits it along the ground with great power. He had the very rare feat for a schoolboy to his credit this summer of making two hundreds in one match. His bowling, fast medium to fast, is also a most useful asset.

Jardine, of all the school cricketers had, perhaps, the soundest defence, the greatest patience and the best judgment, and he was the most difficult of any to dislodge. He had a wonderful record an average of over 50 for Winchester, making big scores both against Eton and against Harrow, and four big innings without a failure in the matches at Lord's.

It must not be imagined that Jardine is a player without strokes. He can and does hit the ball very hard on the on-side and indeed he lets off very few chances of scoring. He has, too, the offside strokes, though he does not use them quite so often as he might. He is a cricketer with an old head on young shoulders, and I shall be very surprised if he doesn't follow his father's footsteps and get into the Oxford side as a freshman. His father, I believe, holds the curious record of being the only man who got 100 and two noughts in the University matches.

The selections for the Public Schools matches at Lord's in Bank Holiday week—Lord's Schools v. Rest and the Schools v. Mr. P. F. Warner's XI—were in some respects criticised this year. But the difficulties are very great. Those who saw Clifton and Tonbridge, Haileybury and Cheltenham, and Rugby and Marlborough the week before thought that certain players in these matches should have been included. But it must be remembered that the sides have almost of necessity to be picked earlier in the year, that the field is very wide, and that reliable evidence is not always easy to get. And, of course, some selected players—for instance Partridge and Hedges this year—find themselves unable to accept the invitations. It was a year when really good wicket-keepers were scarce, but it was perhaps a mistake to choose Aird, who is a good batsman and does not profess to be first-rate as a keep, and not to select a player for the Lord's Schools as a wicket-keeper pure and simple.

The sides which took the field in the first match—Lord's Schools v. Rest—were as follows :—

Lord's Schools—C. H. Gibson (captain), W. H. Hill-Wood, and R. Aird (Eton), W. A. R. Collins and C. T. Bennett (Harrow), G. F. Straker (Rugby), G. S. Butler and T. W. Mansergh (Marlborough), A. C. Keell (Cheltenham), H. P. Marshall (Haileybury), and C. H. Knott (Tonbridge).

The Rest—G. T. S. Stevens (University College School) captain; D. R. Jardine and C. T. Ashton (Winchester), R. C. Robertson Glasgow (Charterhouse), A. P. F. Chapman (Uppingham), R. B. Wyatt-Smith (Sherborne), T. Geoghegan (Downside), H. Douthwaite (Lancaster), S. G. V. Considine (Blundell's), K. W. Symons (Highgate), and F. L. Richmond (Wellingborough). It was remarkable that every man on the Rest side had made 100 for his eleven in a school match.

The Rest, in the end, gained an easy victory by 225 runs. There was very little in it on the first day's play, the Rest, who batted first, being 44 ahead with all ten wickets in hand. On Tuesday a long stand for the second wicket between Considine and Jardine took the score to 225 from 19, and made the Rest's position perfectly safe. They were able to declare at three o'clock, leaving the Lord's Schools 347 to get in about three hours and a half. The Lord's Schools then more or less collapsed, and soon after five the match was all over.

From the two elevens the following side were picked to play Mr. Warner's XI :--Stevens, Gibson, Jardine, Ashton, Chapman, Robertson-Glasgow, Considine, Butler, Mansergh, Hill-Wood, and Wyatt-Smith. Mr. Warner had a splendid batting side, which included Mr. H. W. Taylor, Mr. R. H. Spooner, Mr. D. J. Knight, Mr. S. H. Day, etc., though the bowling was not really strong. The Schools on the first day did very well, for they got out Mr. Warner's XI for a small score and finished with the best of the argument. But it was hardly to be expected that Mr. Warner's XI would be dismissed cheaply again and so it proved, but for once the boys' fielding went wrong, and both Mr. Knight and Mr. Spooner, who eventually got right on top of the bowling and gave a delightful exhibition of batting, were missed. A most attractive innings by Mr. Day followed later, and in the afternoon of the second day the side was able to declare. At one time the boys looked to have an outside chance of a win—at no time did they look likely to lose. In this last innings Ashton, who had not come off before, played a delightful innings. The match ended in a draw.

In the four days there was much interesting cricket and some players added to their reputations—Robertson-Glasgow, of Charterhouse, for instance, bowled his fast medium especially well and showed himself a real slip fielder. Jardine was the most successful of all the batsmen, making runs in all his four innings. Douthwaite, who came up with an extraordinary record from Lancaster Grammar School—his average was, I believe, over 100—did not get many runs, but in his second innings he showed himself to be a promising batsman, and he was a good field. Indeed, as a whole, this year the fielding was very good, which is a delight to see. The school matches have now established themselves as an important part of the cricket season. Next Summer the boys are to play an Army side.

Eton played Winchester on Agar's Plough, and were beaten after a most interesting and in some ways a remarkable match; they had an easy victory over Harrow at Lord's, and Winchester had much the best of the drawn game with Harrow. This was only a one-day match : it is to be hoped, perhaps, that it may in future be extended to two days. I think there can be little doubt that Winchester were the best side of the three. The Eton and Winchester match was a hard struggle all through. The first innings on both sides were failures; on a moderately easy wicket neither made much over 100. But Winchester failed against the stronger bowling, for not only were Gibson and Hill-Wood a better pair than Ashton and Frazer, but the change bowling of Winchester was very weak. It was the end of the first day's play that gave Winchester their great advantage. Hill and Jardine opened the innings, and if they played slow cricket and took no possible risk it was the right game for their side. Very slowly but surely they got on top of the bowling, and they paved the way for the large score that followed. Winchester were able to put Eton in with over 300 to get. The wicket was still perfectly good and if the Eton batting was not strong

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the Winchester bowling was by no means alarming. More than once it looked like Eton saving the game ; at one time there looked a possibility of their winning it, but as a whole Winchester were just in the better position most of the time, and in the end the match was won comfortably. Ashton and Frazer had to bowl over forty overs each, and they stuck to their work gallantly and were well supported in the field. It was Winchester's first win in the series of matches-excluding the war years-since 1907, and there was a scene of considerable enthusiasm at the close. Without being the equal of some Winchester elevens of the past, notably those of 1890-1892 and 1904-the best probably which the school have ever produced-Winchester were undoubtedly a good school eleven, though some weakness in bowling, especially change bowling, just prevented them from being a remarkable one. In Jardine, Hill, and Ashton they had three thoroughly good bats and Baldock and one or two others were more than useful. Hill and Jardine were a splendid first pair. Of Jardine's batting I have already spoken. Hill plays very straight in pretty style and though he has not an abundance of shots he can score all round the wicket, beside being a difficult man to get out. His footwork-once his stumbling block-has much improved and though his actual record for the season is not great, his value to the side was much more pronounced than the figures show. Ashton was more attractive to watch than either of the others-with his bowling he was easily the best all-round man on the side-and he has great possibilities. He is more "get-out-able" than Jardine, and more than once just as he was getting going he threw away his wicket by a bad shot, but he has many strokes, fine wrists, and is quick on his feet. He bowls fast medium and swings awkwardly, and at the beginning of an innings he is likely to bowl some most difficult balls. Fraser, fast medium left, rather erratic at times, but also capable of bowling difficult balls, bore the brunt at the other end. Of the rest there is not very much to be said. The whole side were sound fielders without any particularly brilliant stars, and Paton kept wicket very well all the season.

Besides their victory over Eton and the draw with Harrow, Winchester after looking very like losing to Marlborough pulled the match out of the fire and they had all the better of a draw with Charterhouse, when they made 272 for eight declared and got eight Charterhouse wickets down for 148. The match against Old Wykehamists was revived on the Monday and Tuesday of Whitsun week and was as enjoyable as ever. Ashton will be captain next summer. He is the third brother of the family to hold this position; an occurrence which has never happened at Winchester before, and probably at not many other schools either.

The Eton and Harrow match was played at Lord' for the first time since 1914, and it's revival in its old form was one of the great events of the cricket season. It was revived with all the old concomitants: no one of the traditions seemed to have been forgotten. The crowd, especially on the Friday afternoon, which was gloriously fine and hot, was as large and as brilliant as ever. There was all the old friendly rivalry in the pavilion, and on the mound. Nothing except, alas, scores of familiar faces who had loved the match and had watched it year by year were absent from the scene.

It was not a very distinguished game, but one must remember that nerves were bound to play a large part on such an occasion. For, of course, no one on either side had appeared in the match at Lord's before, and I am told that there were only about twenty boys at either school who had seen a real Eton and Harrow.

In the end the match was very easily won by Eton, and it was the two Eton bowlers Gibson and Hill-Wood who won the greatest honours of the game. Harrow collapsed before them badly in the last innings, no one making any show at all. The wicket certainly was by no means easy and Hill-Wood especially made the most of it with his slow bowling which created a good impression. He was never afraid to pitch the ball well up; he made it turn a good deal, and quickly enough to be unpleasant and he bowled with good judgment.

The Harrow batting in this innings was too bad to be true, and certainly an attempt at resolute hitting might have done a good deal towards improving matters and might have put the bowlers off their length, but until late in the innings, when a six was hit there was no one who attempted these tactics and Hill Wood was bowling with his "tail up" all the time. Eton thus won their sixth victory in succession (apart from the war matches which do not count in the series).

Eton were certainly the stronger side of the two though Harrow's showing at Lord's did not do them justice, but Eton were certainly weaker in batting than they have been for some time their chief strength was in their bowling and in their first pair of bowlers. Of Gibson I have spoken earlier. He had a most successful season and everyone has high hopes of him for the future, though I believe he intends to go out to the Argentine in some few years. Still one hopes he will not be lost to the game. His school cricket has come in broken times and he has not thus had the chances of playing against such good sides in foreign matches as he otherwise would have done, and certain of his performances in the war years may have been rather flattering, but he must be ranked as one of the great boy bowlers that Eton have turned out.

Hill-Wood—one of the keenest of cricketers—was a splendid foil to Gibson, and we all know what a foil is worth at cricket. Bowlers of the Lockwood devil and Richardson pace at each end are most disagreeable, but not more formidable to play perhaps than a Mold and Briggs. Hill-Wood, who no doubt in run up to the wicket and general method has modelled himself on Mr. Wells, in whose house he is—was as different from Gibson as possible. These two perhaps constituted the greatest strength in the eleven, but there were several useful change bowlers, Shirley (fast) being formidable on anything like a fiery wicket.

The batting was not by any means really strong. Shirley was a good player, but was out of form for most of the season, and there was no one outstandingly good though several were useful. Two new-comers after the Winchester match, Brand and Allen strengthened the batting and both are full of promise. Hill-Wood was a useful and consistent scorer in a curious and individual style. The best performance of the side was against a strong Free Forester eleven, when Gibson took eight wickets for 36 and Chance hit up 81 not out. To sum up one might say Eton had a very good bowling side, pretty good fielding and very good throwing in, and fair batting. Hill-Wood is captain for 1920 and will have a good nucleus of a side in Brand, Allen, Aird, Yorke and Mayo. As all cricketers know, George Hirst has been appointed professional at Eton.

Harrow were not strong in any department of the game, but they had in C. T. Bennett and H. J. Enthoven two players who may develop into good batsmen, in P. H. Gold a batsman who may be dangerous, and in J. G. Collins and R. H. Baucher young players of some considerable promise. F. S. Greaves was a watchful player, and frequently made runs when sorely wanted. H. I. Murly-Gotto might turn into a useful player, but he is a bad starter; he can hit well at times. The rest constituted however too long a tail. In bowling W. A. R. Collins was easily the best, and at times was very difficult, as he can make the ball swerve dangerously. R. O. Ramsay, nephew of R. C. Ramsay, known at Cambridge as "Twisting Timmy," bowled very steadily with a good swerving ball. W. S. Miles, the fast bowler, worked always energetically, but lacked variety. F. S. Greaves bowled leg-breaks, with occasional off-breaks, but too often was too high and too slow in his deliveries. E. J. Richards trained into a respectable wicket-keeper and kept well at Lord's. The fielding generally lacked dash and life, but at Lord's. showed up better than in all the other matches. Generally, it was a side that might have done better, but lacked confidence in itself, and was liable to nerves.

Charterhouse is well situated for playing matches against other schools, and they met no less than five. Besides their draw with Winchester, they lost to Harrow, who had the better of the wicket at Harrow and for whom Collins got seven wickets for 24, lost to Wellington, when they did not do themselves full justice; and just lost to Eton after a fine match and a splendid finish. Charterhouse, after making 120 for two wickets were out for 196, of which T. G. Frost (97) and F. H. Barnard (61) made nearly all the runs. When Fox joined Boden for the last Eton wicket 18 runs were wanted and these were obtained. They beat Westminster when Robertson-Glasgow played a fine innings of 97 by four wickets, with half-anhour to spare. They also beat a very strong Forester side, and lost to a good I.Z. side.

On the whole it may be said that Charterhouse nearly had a good side but not quite. Robertson-Glasgow was the best man, improving all through; his bowling was excellent and his batting free and easy. Barnard is a most promising cricketer and should become first-class. He ought to have two more summers at school. J. A. W. Gilliat, a very fair wicket-keeper and a very clumsy but effective bat. H. E. Le Bas, T. G. Frost, and C. W. Drabble were useful but not really convincing bats. In fact most of the side could not be trusted not to fall into the most obvious bowler's trap. G. F. T. Colby was a good left-handed hitter at times. L. A. Escombe a left-hand bowler with an odd action was not a bad bowler to start with Robertson-Glasgow, otherwise the bowling was very weak. D. G. A. Patchitt (the captain) is a fine field and he captained the side very well on the whole. Westminster enjoys perhaps the privilege of meeting stronger sides than any other school, one reason of course being that Vincent's Square is an ideal spot for the busy man to get to for a Saturday match, and in most years with the kind of opposition they get, Westminster are likely to lose a good many matches. Their record this year shows one win only over Radley. The other three school matches were lost. That against Charterhouse was a good game, against Wellington the batting broke down rather badly, and they were routed by Tonbridge. Strong sides of M.C.G., Eton Ramblers, Butterflies, I.Z., and Foresters also beat them.

The bowling of the side was perhaps the chief weakness, and it was much lacking in sting. There was some promising batting, but wickets were far too often thrown away by undecided shots or bad running. I read that there is plenty of young talent in the School, which only needs developing and coaching. Some of the grounds used last year were in a very bad state, and this is a serious thing for cricket throughout the school. Next summer some of the bad wickets are I hear to be covered with cocoanut matting. Westminster will in 1920 have the advantage of the coaching of Mr. D. J. Knight, who will be there as a master. During the past season they owed much to the coaching of Mr. R. N. R. Blaker, who kindly gave much time to the work. A good number of the 1919 eleven are expected to be at Westminster next season, including H. F. Gorman, who captained with grit and judgment; and F. D. Berryman who showed great promise in 1918, but was rather disappointing last year. In bowling he was apt to make the most fatal of mistakes : sacrificing length to pace.

Marlborough were certainly one of the best sides of the season, and I regret I have not got more detailed information about them. They did particularly well in school matches, winning all except that against Winchester which at one moment looked like a certain victory for them. They also had some anxious moments in the last innings against Rugby at Lord's, but in the end got the runs successfully. Besides Butler and Mansergh, who have already been mentioned, there were several useful cricketers on the side including A. I. L. Hill and two lefthand bowlers, Skerrett-Rogers and Oakley.

The Rugby eleven were a very fair school side, and in Saunders. captain for 1920, and Standring they had two very promising cricketers. In school matches they beat Clifton—a weak side:

lost to Uppingham in a one-day match; and lost the Marlborough match. The bowling was probably really the weak point, and G. F. Straker, the captain, did not fulfil expectations. He is a left-hand bowler who had done well in 1918, but this year his record was only 25 wickets at a cost of over 33 apiece. The cares of captainship weighed rather heavily on him. He sometimes kept himself on too long, and when he began to get hit he began to bowl faster, and, of course, the faster he bowled the more he got hit. Standring is a promising right-hand medium bowler. When he is bowling well, he makes the ball come quickly off the pitch and he brings the ball back from the off. With more strength next year he should be good.

The batting was well up to the average. Saunders, who played two thoroughly good innings at Lord's, has the primary merit of watching the ball, and is developing some fine off-side shots. He averaged 39.9 for the season. Wimble has plenty of shots, but no patience. He averaged 29, and Scoorch, a somewhat slow bat with a good cut, 30. There were several others who were useful. On the whole the fielding was slow and clumsy, but Stapledon is a fine fieldsman. Windle was quite a useful wicket-keeping was poor

After some lean years Uppingham had a much better side, with Chapman, of course, as the star player, and in school matches they were most successful, beating Repton, Haileybury, and Rugby, while only rain saved Shrewsbury from a severe defeat. The coaching of Ernest Humphreys of Kent, now the school professional, did a great deal, and his keenness and enthusiasm were felt in every department of the game. He had some good material to work on. A. P. F. Chapman was an admirable captain. His experience and example in the field were a great asset to the side. Chapman's defence improved greatly during the season, and his innings of 107 against Rugby on a wicket when the ball wanted constant watching was the best he had played on the school ground. He changed his bowling during the season from slow to fast medium, and met with considerable success, especially with a new ball. The best bowler on the side, however, was J. A. C. Thornton, who has all the makings of a really good fast bowler, keeping an excellent length and putting in the occasional ball that wants a lot of stopping. He also came out with the fine batting average of 71.5, his best innings being 174 against Repton. He is rather a shaky starter and has an ugly halfcock stroke he must get rid of, but he hits well all round the wicket when set, and rarely misses anything on the leg side.

Of the others, C. P. Oscroft played an excellent innings of 102 against Shrewsbury, and as a bowler developed a happy knack of getting wickets when wanted. Ward and Nicol did useful work with the bat, and the latter improved his bowling greatly in the course of the season, while Dorman played some really useful innings and showed considerable promise for the future. The fielding as a whole was excellent.

Wellington had a successful year, playing nine matches, of which four were won, three drawn. and two lost. The defeats were from Marlborough, against whom Wellington collapsed rather badly. and the Staff College, who won by 9 runs. The M.C.C. match was drawn : the Club made 270, and Wellington replied with 159 for five wickets. The match with Haileybury was also a draw. On the first day's play Wellington were dismissed for 260, and Haileybury had made 175 for eight wickets. The next morning there was heavy rain, and Cameron, the Wellington captain, decided, as Relf, the school professional, was not available so early, to have the ends of the pitch covered. Unfortunately the tarpaulins used were larger than the regulation size, and the umpires proclaimed the match a draw. Haileybury were then dismissed for 177. On the second attempt Wellington made 143 for seven wickets and then declared. Haileybury then lost four wickets for 59. The other draw was the Free Forester match. Wellington made 309 for seven wickets and then declared. The Foresters got 275 for three wickets, when stumps were drawn. Wellington easily defeated Westminster, a new fixture this year. Westminster batted first and were all out for 109. Wellington passed this total for the loss of only two wickets and finally made 194 for five wickets. Bryan played a very fine not out innings of 102, and De Brett got eight wickets for 26. One of the wins was over Charterhouse at Godalming. Wellington won the toss and made 163, of which Bryan made 40. When Charterhouse went in there was a collapse and eight wickets fell for 40. Mainly owing to some good left-hand hitting by Colby, the score reached 115.

Bryan was the most consistent run-getter, and he is a boy batsman-left-handed-above the average. He is still quite young and a good deal may be expected of him. He averaged over 74 and made 598 runs. Durlacher and Phayre both batted consistently, and there were two very useful all-round cricketers in De Brett and Mordaunt. The latter a son of one of the most famous of Wellington cricketers—G. J. Mordaunt—is a batsman with attractive offside strokes, a useful slow bowler, and a good field Altogether it was one of the strongest Wellington sides of recent years.

Cheltenham won two and lost one of their school matches. Marlborough beat them by eight wickets and at one time seemed as if they would gain an innings victory, but the Cheltenham batting in the second innings improved greatly. Clifton were easily beaten by ten wickets, poor fielding depriving Cheltenham of an innings victory. At Lord's, after a good game, Cheltenham beat Haileybury by eight wickets. It was the first time Cheltenham had won since 1910-there were no matches in 1915, 1916, 1917, or 1918. In batting the eleven was fairly strong, and G. R. Neale, R. C. Swain, E. J. Pye-Smith, and G. V. S. Hart (captain) had averages of over twenty. The bowling was not strong and depended largely on Hart, Coxwell-Rogers, and Keell. The fielding of the side improved as the term went on and at Lord's against Haileybury it was very good indeed. Pontifex was reserve wicket-keeper to Coxwell-Rogers at the beginning of the season, but when the latter took up bowling he improved rapidly, and in the end was looked upon as one of the best school wicket-keepers of the year.

The Haileybury eleven was on the whole a weak one. Sometimes a good start was made by the first two batsmen. Phillips and Heywood, the latter a left-hander, but there was not much reliable batting to follow. For instance against Uppingham 90 was up before a wicket fell, and the whole side was out for 190. R. H. Rose, who played a fine innings of 52 against Cheltenham, has plenty of strokes, but he is too fond of trying a "cow-shot" before he has got going at all. The bowling lacked variety and all of the bowlers sent down too many loose balls on the leg side. H. D. Rankin, who was captain of the side, was the best. He bowls fast right-hand, and at Lord's against Cheltenham bowled very well for a few overs at the start of each innings, but he soon got tired. He can make the new ball swing considerably. H. R. Ferguson, left-hand medium with an occasional nasty swinging yorker, bowled well at times, and H. P. Marshall got a lot of wickets with slow leg breaks. The

match against St. Paul's was the only school match won. Haileybury did well to beat a strong side of Foresters and also Incogniti, but failed badly against Uppingham, Wellington, and Butterflies. The Tonbridge match was very exciting, Haileybury in the end losing by 12 runs.

I next come to those old opponents Malvern and Repton. This year Malvern again had a good side and Repton a weak one, and, of course, the presence of Partridge in the side made the Malvern eleven redoubtable. They played eleven matches, of which seven were won, three lost, and one drawn. Their best win was an easy victory over a strong side brought by R. H. Hickman, due mainly to the all-round play of Partridge, who scored 131 and took six wickets for 43. The drawn match v. Herefordshire was a virtual win for the boys. Partridge's batting on many occasions, his bowling nearly always, except towards the end of term, when he was obviously tired, and his fielding without any exception, and the way he inspired his side, were wonderfully good. Apart from Partridge there was plenty of other batting on the side. Robson, Brooke, Abbott, Stubbs, and Cave-Rogers were well up to public school average, particularly Robson, who potentially is a fine bat but fails to produce the runs expected. In bowling the side depended largely on Partridge, but Pridham, though expensive in the aggregate, always managed to get some of the best wickets, and Horsley was very useful, but not tried enough. The fielding was quite good, but Taylor as a stumper was only fair. Partridge's double record was : batting, 15 innings, 2 not outs, 569 runs, average 43 ; bowling, 292 overs, 922 runs, 71 wickets, average 12.9-a wonderful achievement,

As all three school matches were lost it must be recorded that the *Repton* eleven was again a weak one in spite of having J. N. Crawford as coach, but he had little material to work on, and it was through no fault of his that the side was not stronger : he certainly taught them to field, for in this respect the team compared most favourably with the other school elevens that were met. Coldham, the captain, was disappointing, the cares of office no doubt affecting his play. Trubshaw, who is to be captain in 1920, developed well, and was the mainstay of the batting : he is thoroughly sound until he starts hitting, at which he is successful at first, but then becomes rash and picks the "wrong" uns." He played two fine innings against Uppingham and Malvern, when things were going badly. A great deal is expected of him next year. C. A. Winter, who had made a was no real bowler on the side except Mower, left-hand. With coaching, D'Arey Hulton, if he learns to control his impatience, may develop into a good batsman; Byrne was unorthodox, but often effective, while Stevenson shewed a stubborn defence at times. The best point of the side was its fielding: Sorensen, the captain, who, after the first match, lost his batting, was a really dangerous cover-point. Hawker was a capable wicket-keeper.

Sherborne won four matches, lost five and drew three. In school matches they drew with Blundell's, lost to Radley and drew with Downside. The feature of the year was the all-round play of the captain, R. B. Wyatt-Smith, who headed both the batting averages with 40.55, and the bowling with 49 wickets for 17.20. He is a good bat with strokes all-round the wicket and with a little more defence and power might become first-class. His leg-breaks are delivered with a rather curious action, but they are lower in the air than with many bowlers of the kind, and so less easy to hit full pitch. H. R. Partridge was promising both as a bat and a wicket keep.

Bedford have had a remarkable run of success in school matches of late. In the last few years out of fourteen matches they have won ten, lost one—against St. Paul's in May 1916—and drawn three, two of the three draws also being virtual wins. It says a great deal for the work done by three Gloucestershire cricketers for the school, namely: Mr. R. W. Rice, and Pepall and Broad, the professionals. This year Bedford won four matches, including all three school games, lost three matches and drew one. They were, for a school, an old and experienced team. J. S. Carter was again captain, and his leadership and all-round cricket; C. C. Schmidt's rather intermittent brilliance; E. C. Herbert's right-hand medium, steady and persevering bowling; J. C. Seager's consistent scoring; and F. C. Thody's wicket-keeping were the main causes of the success of the side.

Once again I must thank all those masters and others who have so kindly sent me information about various schools. Below is given a list—always a feature of *Wisden's* before war, of some of those school cricketers who will be in residence at Oxford or Cambridge in 1920. The list is not complete, but I hope it may prove of value.

ETON v. HARROW.

Played at LORD'S, Friday, Saturday, July, 11, 12.-Except that the cricket proved far too one-sided to be in the least degree exciting, the renewal of the Eton and Harrow match after the war was a brilliant success. On the opening day, with the weather in its kindest mood, there was nothing to suggest that the continuity of the match had been broken for four years. Lord's was thronged with people, the King was present before luncheon, and everything seemed just the same as in old days. It need hardly be said that the one day games between the two schools during the war were not counted in the regular series. They kept up the cricket spirit and gave opportunities to players who would otherwise have had no chance of showing what they could do, but that was all. Eton after declaring their second innings closed with nine wickets down, won the game in the easiest fashion by 202 runs. There is no doubt that Harrow played a good deal below their form but it is equally certain that Eton had vasily the better team. Their superiority in bowling alone would have been sufficient in any circumstances to determine the result. Great progress was made on Friday. twenty-six wickets going down in the course of the day. Eton won the toss but made such a shockingly bad start that with four men out the score was only twenty-four. The fifth wicket fell at 46, but after that things rapidly improved and in the end the total reached 176. Hill-Wood deserved every credit for his score of 43. He played in a cramped, ungainly style, but his patient defence saved his side from disaster. Brand's batting was more vigorous and far more attractive. Harrow up to a certain point seemed likely to do well, but after the second wicket had fallen at 41, the two Eton bowlers, Gibson and Hill-Wood, who in pace and style were finely contrasted, carried everything before them. The result was that Eton led on the first innings by 100 runs. Gibson, who combined great accuracy of pitch with his puzzling swerve, took six wickets at a cost of three runs each. On going in for the second time Eton did not follow up their advantage. Allen played with admirable steadiness but the other batsmen failed and at the call of time six wickets were down for 75.

Rain set in early on Saturday morning and at the ordinary time for starting play was quite out of the question. There seemed some fear that the m tch might have to be abandoned, but happily the afternon turned out fine and at about a quarter to three Eton went on batting. Allen, on the slower wicket, kept up his form of the previous day and was playing extremely well when, with nine wickets down, Gibson thought it safe to declare. Harrow required 244 to win, but though this was regarded in the circumstances as a hopeless task, no one was prepared for the dismal collapse that followed. The batsmen seemed paralysed and, except Gold, could do nothing against Hill-Wood and Gibson. There is no need to go into details as the innings was finished off for 41. Encouraged by success Hill-Wood bowled his slows with remarkable skill. He was full of devices and brimful of confidence. Of course, he was much flattered by the weak batting, but he would have probably have done well against a far better side than Harrow.


