PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET.

Public School cricket in 1931 was sadly interfered with by the weather. Practice ruled general in the Easter holidays and the cricket classes at Lord's were as well attended as ever but the weather proved cold and much work had to be done under cover. The beginning of term foreshadowed what was to come. Match after match was abandoned, those schools who confined their fixtures chiefly to Saturdays being the principal sufferers. In many cases rivals met each other without having had a preliminary trial game against "foreign" opponents. Only two days' cricket was possible in the Oval week in September, two out of three matches arranged for the Young Amateurs of Surrey being abandoned without aball being bowled. Furthermore rain spoilt five out of the thirteen matches arranged in the holidays for the Richmond Public Schools team.

The result of this was that the young batsman had few opportunities of attaining that freedom of action and follow through of the strokes which are essential, nor could he perfect his footwork on the treacherous surface. Young players are rarely seen at their best on slow and soft wickets where they are too prone to play forward and have not the strength to deal effectively with short-pitched balls but they had so much experience that by the end of the season many of them had overcome the difficulties. Among these were Tovey (Clifton), Mills (Denstone), Allen (Eton), Walker (Uppinghan), Beresford (Oundle), Nelson (Harpenden), R. de W. K. Winlaw (Winchester), Barlow (Shrewsbury), Maxwell (Brighton), Covington (Harrow), Human (Repton), Carey (Sherborne), Skinner (Leys), and Alston (Marlborough).

The bowlers were equally handicapped, not many knowing enough to take advantage of the wickets when these were in their favour, and the majority having to bowl under conditions which gave them no assistance. The faster bowlers were especially handicapped and had few chances. Of these Kershaw (Radley), Snowden (Sherborne) and Heath (Bradfield) were consistently successful. The last-named has real pace and comes off quickly from the pitch. Barlow (Shrewsbury) varied pitch and pace cleverly and often had

the opposition in difficulties, but Cornu (Malvern) and Cameron (Taunton), though they accomplished several good performances on the slower wickets, hardly came on to the extent anticipated. Among the promising left-handers were Milman (Uppingham), Grimshaw (King William's), Dick (Sedbergh), MacNamara (Marlborough), Elson (Rydal), Dyson (Charterhouse), and Nelson (Harpenden).

Wicket-keeping again reached a high standard and apart from Wolff and Maxwell, whose methods are in strong contrast and who both impressed favourably in the representative match at Lord's, the following showed form above the average: Lloyd (Cheltenham), Addey (Malvern), Middleton and his understudy, Mendl (Repton), Matthews (Westminster), King (Taunton), Fenwick (Sherborne), Quill (Lancing), A. W. E. Winlaw (Winchester), Baerlein (Eton), Powell (Charterhouse), Waddilove (Ampleforth), and F. G. S. Jennings (Kingston G.S.)

The ground fielding was keen and accurate, but the catching, owing partly to the slippery surface of the ground, hardly up to standard, and the positioning of the slips frequently at fault. It is a matter for congratulation, however, that the schools rose superior to the conditions, as shown by the unusually large number of successes in the Past v. Present matches and against the M.C.C. teams, and the promising form shown in the holiday matches.

Remarkable hitting was seen at York where St. Peter's were set 170 to win by the Yorkshire Gentlemen in a little over two hours. The play of the opening batsmen did not suggest a possible victory but, with two wickets down for 76, Scott came in and gave a sensational display of fast scoring. In the first over he received he scored 21, hitting two 6's and two 4's and, reaching his 50 after only thirteen minutes' batting, won the match without further loss.

In the Repton and Malvern match Human, the Repton captain, scored his third consecutive century, 440 runs were made in three hours and a half, and MacBrayne and Sutcliffe added 88 runs in the first eight overs of Repton's innings and altogether 100 in thirty-five minutes.

Some fast run-getting occurred at Ardingly where Cranbrook scored 385 runs in under three hours. Clark (109) and Jacobs (129) put on 245 for the first wicket, the innings being declared closed when Taylor, who went in second wicket, had completed his hundred.

Maxwell, the Brighton captain, had the distinction of scoring a thousand runs in the term, including six centuries.

Hereford Cathedral School celebrated the 550th year of its foundation by the annual match between Past and Present.

Lord's v. The Rest, though the batting, especially on the first day on a beautiful wicket, rather disappointed, proved one

of the most interesting matches of the series. The running between the wickets was very good, and the fielding, catching and wicket-keeping made up for any shortcomings in the bowling. In a fine finish, the Rest won by 32 runs, after a sporting declaration by Human, who left the Lord's Schools two hours, and a quarter to make 198 runs to win. Human did the Rest a good turn by winning the toss. Maxwell and Beresford started in promising fashion but with the exception of Human himself, who made delightful strokes all round the wicket and, in a lesser degree, Richards, Nelson and Kershaw, the Rest did little and were all out for the moderate total of 220. Baker, on whom so much depended and who had been the chief cause of Harrow's defeat, had hurt his arm and could not produce his real form—he was unable to bowl at all in the second innings—but Atkinson-Clark made every use of his limited bowling, though he might well have given himself a chance.

Allen and Brettell gave the Lord's Schools a capital start before the former was out to a brilliant catch at the wicket. With 130 up for the loss of three wickets and Atkinson-Clark and Covington well set—the Eton captain playing steady cricket and the Harrovian taking full toll of any ball over or short of a length—a big lead seemed probable but, when stumps were drawn, the Lord's Schools with four wickets in hand were still 32 runs behind.

A heavy thunderstorm overnight delayed play next morning and only 50 runs were added for the last four wickets. Facing arrears of 18, Human and Beresford played free cricket in the three-quarters of an hour before lunch. Walker, who showed his real form, Richards and Nelson, found little difficulty with bowling still further weakened by an injury to MacNamara, the Marlborough left-hander. Nelson and Walker, the latter of whom has a pronounced two-eyed stance, put on 65 runs, both hitting whole heartedly and when Human declared Walker had played a fine innings of 76 not out, his leg side play being particularly good.

The Lord's Schools went for the runs and Allen played the innings of the match. Rain fell again, the light grew bad, and a series of disasters overtook the batsmen. Kershaw took the last three wickets for 13 runs and the side were all out for 165. This was the eighteenth match, of which The Rest have won eight, the Lord's Schools four, with six unfinished.

The match against the Army was confined to the first day, and for the fifth year in succession was left drawn. Considering the strength of the Schools batting, a score of 223 was a little disappointing. Allen, who played all the bowling with ease, and Human put on 76 runs, the former hitting two 6's in succession over mid-on's head. Atkinson-Clark and Walker consolidated the position and

later came fierce hitting by Nelson, who included a six into the pavilion in his not out innings of 61. The Army went in for an hour and a quarter's batting, but the batsmen did not attempt to force the pace. When stumps were drawn one wicket had fallen for 60 runs. Continuous rain prevented any play the next day.

In view of the severe defeat administered by the Young Amateurs the previous August several young players who had taken part in firstclass cricket were given places in the Young Professionals' XI. The Amateurs had a strong all-round side including two left-hand bowlers who had met with consistent success throughout the term and Cameron, the Taunton googly bowler, who had appeared in the corresponding fixture the year before, and had impressed favourably in the Colts match in 1929. The batting was so powerful that the first ten batsmen might have drawn lots for the order of going in. Powell, of Charterhouse, proved a reliable wicket-keeper and there were some good fieldsmen on the side, notably Sanderson, of Oakham. Yet the Amateurs were outclassed, and rain the next day deprived them of the chance of redeeming their reputation. Certainly the Professionals gave a consistent display of batting, but the best use was not made of the bowling, Grimshaw (King William's) who was kept on for an hour and twenty-five minutes, bowling thirty-five overs for three wickets and 79 runs and Cameron twentyeight overs for 91 runs and seven wickets. Shneerson (St. Paul's) was given only three overs, and the rest delivered only seventeen overs between them. The total reached 245, some of the later batsmen showing unexpected form. When the Young Amateurs went in, Covill, who came off the pitch at a fast pace, had most of them in trouble, Morgan, the Sherborne captain, alone playing with confidence. Dollery (Reading), Wreford-Brown (Charterhouse), Dinwiddy (Radley), and Sanderson all made good strokes and shaped well, but the last wicket fell at 90, Covill taking six for 36.

No play was possible on the first day of the Colts match, but some interesting cricket took place next day when Mr. Carleton Tufnell's XI. led the Lord's XI. by 36 runs on the first innings. Judge (St. Paul's) and Angelo (Westminster), prominent members of their Schools' first elevens, overshadowed the others, but the left-hand bowling of A. C. Duveen, a small Harrovian, and the wicket-keeping of B. M. Fisher (Eton), provided the features of the innings. R. C. L. Pilkington, a son of H. C. Pilkington the old Eton captain, played the best cricket of the day, his innings of 48 including many excellent strokes on the off side. Johnson was the most successful bowler, his four wickets costing only six runs.

The Young Surrey Amateurs week at the Oval was confined to the Kent match (twelve a side), which the home side won by eleven wickets, play being impossible on the other four days. The features of the game were the bowling of the two left-handers, K. J. Burton (Kingston G.S.) (nine for 31) and J. W. T. Grimshaw (King William's, I.O.M.) (seven for 94), the wicket-keeping of C. R. Maxwell (Brighton) and of A. G. W. Hill (St. Lawrence), the fielding of Burton and H. P. Dinwiddy (Radley) and the batting of Maxwell, Hill, R. de W. K. Winlaw (Winchester), K. L. T. Jackson (Rugby), F. P. H. Pearse (Lancing), V. H. I. Knowland (Dulwich) and K. Blackmore (Harrow).

Five of the matches arranged for the Richmond Public Schools were spoilt by the rain, but of the other nine, seven were won, one lost and one drawn. A. F. Ward (Hampton G.S.), who played in all the matches, showed most consistent form and made 315 runs in nine innings. R. P. Nelson (Harpenden), Maxwell (Brighton), B. J. A. Lowe (Rossall), Jackson (Rugby), Dinwiddy (Radley), I. N. Brettell (Cheltenham), and R. H. Jerrome (Hereford C.S.) all played one or more good innings, Lowe hitting well for 108 not out against the Civil Service Crusaders. Nelson (twenty-three wickets for 199 runs), P. F. Judge (St. Paul's) (nineteen for 203), Ward (nineteen for 239) and Jackson (seven for 75) did most of the bowling and W. C. Burton, twin brother of the Kingston left-hander, took seven for 27 against Battersea.

The batting in the Eton and Harrow match must have been almost as great a surprise to Eton as it was a disappointment to Harrow. With the notable exception of Allen, the Eton batsmen all through the season had caused uneasiness among their supporters, even Atkinson-Clark failing to find his form, and the Winchester match had in no way tended to relieve the anxiety. Added to this, the great advantage Eton held in bowling was largely discounted by the fact that, owing to injuries, both Page and Baker, on whom so much depended, were doubtful starters almost up to the day of the match. Harrow, though admittedly not strong in bowling, had never failed to put up a respectable score and only the previous week had broken the School record with 337 for the third wicket. As a set off to this the pace and liveliness of the Lord's wickets

Harrow's great chance, then, appeared to be the early dismissal of Allen, and this might have occurred, for, Eton having won the toss, Allen was missed from a difficult chance in the slips when five and again when 22 by the wicket-keeper, standing back. He made no further mistake and was not out 112 at lunch, with the total 212 for no wicket (Hodgkin 70)—a record stand for the first wicket of the match, and the only time an individual century had been scored before lunch. A slight drizzle fell during the interval and without adding to his score, Allen was taken in the slips in Clive's first over. The mischief, however, had been done.

approximated more nearly to those of Agar's Plough than to those

of the Sixth Form Ground.

Badly missed at short leg when 95, Hodgkin made no other mistake before being finely taken on the leg side for 153, after batting soundly for four hours and a half, and the innings was declared at 431 for five wickets. Harrow, left with an hour and a half's batting, were in no way dismayed by the formidable total. Covington and Gascoyne played confident cricket and next morning Covington continued to hit freely. Clive kept up the rate of scoring and with 212 up and four wickets in hand there seemed a probability of Harrow saving the game, but Atkinson-Clark changed his bowling with judgment and Harrow had to follow-on 186 runs behind.

Harrow's prospects of escaping defeat appeared rosy. Baker played a classic innings and Tindall continued the good work with Gascoyne. Slowly the score was carried to 144, when Gascoyne was caught at the wicket. Then Baker came on and in one over changed completely the aspect of the game, Tindall being brilliantly taken at the wicket and Haslewood and Benn bowled. Covington, after another confident start, hit just too soon at a half volley, and Clive was out to a wonderful catch at short leg by Atkinson-Clark, who took a full-blooded hit with the right hand extended and fell heavily in effecting a catch which will not be forgotten by those who saw it.

Hanbury, bowling at a fine pace, then finished off the match, Eton winning by an innings and 16 runs. The last eight wickets fell for 26 runs and to Baker, who took nine wickets for 60 runs in the match, must be given the chief credit of dismissing twice an undoubtedly strong batting side for comparatively small scores. He flighted the ball well, kept a length and, coming quickly from the pitch, turned in sharply at times.

Eton and Winchester provided a remarkable game. There was nothing apparently wrong with the pitch, but in the course of the first day, no fewer than twenty-six wickets fell for 326 runs, Winchester, who lost six wickets for 32 in the second innings, finishing only 48 runs on. Winlaw, the captain, next morning brought about a recovery and, Du Boulay and Lee rendering splendid assistance, the score reached 132 before Winlaw was bowled. Left with 146 to get to win, Eton did not appear to have a formidable task and with 124 up for three wickets, and Allen undefeated with 63, the game seemed over. Without addition Allen was out and Townsend and Lee became masters of the situation. Eight wickets were down for 137 and with Hanbury at the wicket and only Page and Baker, both more or less crippled, to come in, the odds had veered round in Winchester's favour. Baker, however, soon settled the matter, hitting off the remaining nine runs in one over and so having a big hand in both victories of Eton in the school matches.

The Clifton and Tonbridge match was ruined by the weather, no play being possible on the first day until a quarter past three. With an undoubtedly powerful batting side against moderate bowling, it was expected when Clifton went in on an easy wicket that a big score would be forthcoming, but two of the best batsmen, including Nuttall, the captain, were run out with only three runs on the board. It was a terrible start, but Tovey, who timed the ball well, redeemed the situation, receiving valuable assistance from Cornes and Pickles. He made 99 out of 161. Vickers hit with great pluck and the total reached 208, Morrison, who pitched the ball well up, taking the last six wickets for 45 runs. Next morning, Morton, Crouch and Haines proceeded to put Tonbridge in a good position, the last two named adding 90 runs in an hour for the fifth wicket. Despite some good fielding, especially by Nuttall and Tovey in the covers, the later Tonbridge batsmen scored freely, Morrison and Pennick putting on 61 for the last stand. Clifton, 117 behind, were in no way alarmed and, Kinnersley playing a delightful innings while Cornes hit very hard, they had a lead of 78 with five wickets in hand when stumps were finally pulled up.

Marlborough beat Rugby for the second year in succession. The Rugby XI. were very young—seven of them will probably be seen this year at Lord's—and they made a disastrous start on a really fast wicket, to which they were not accustomed. MacNamara, the left-hander, came very quickly off the pitch and occasionally kept low, and Mole bowled fast at the other end with the result that the first five wickets were down for eight runs, only one of which had been scored from the bat. The side was saved from ignominy by Pridmore and Walford, the latter a youngster of 15, who put on 60 runs in forty minutes. Mole made short work of the tail, the last wicket falling at 92. Marlborough had six men out for 74, and there was not a great deal in it until Walker, in forty minutes' fierce hitting in partnership with Martin-Jenkins, more than doubled the score, including in his 66 two 6's and nine 4's. Marlborough gained a lead of 114. Gemmill, a left-hander, took eight wickets for 45. Overnight Rugby lost one wicket in their second innings for seven runs, and play was not possible until halfpast twelve the next morning. Jackson, still suffering from a damaged shin, played a good innings, but Marlborough had only 62 to get. The task was treated very lightly, the runs being knocked off for the loss of three wickets. The ground fielding of both sides all through the match was a delight to watch.

Cheltenham beat Haileybury by 161 runs, a well deserved victory and a personal triumph for the Cheltenham captain, Brettell, who played two fine innings of 103 and 52. Unwin, on whose fast bowling Haileybury depended so much, was unsuited by the wicket

in the first innings and unable to bowl at all in the second. The fielding of both sides and the wicket-keeping of Lloyd and Wolff, gave satisfaction, the stumping of Brettell by the latter in the second innings being one of the smartest things done during the week. Cheltenham batted first on a slow wicket and thanks mainly to Brettell and to a partnership between Sewell, a promising left-hander, and Cohen, the score reached 277. Rogerson and Pilbrow started Haileybury's innings auspiciously but, when stumps were drawn, six men were out for 100. Next morning Unwin made a brave effort, but the last wicket fell at 172.

Brettell elected to bat again and, had two or three wickets fallen quickly Haileybury, with their admittedly powerful batting side, still had a chance of victory. But before double figures had been reached both Brettell and Ogilvie were missed and two other possible chances went astray. Haileybury were left just over three hours to make 287 runs to win, and though Pilbrow and Hill put on 57 runs by plucky cricket for the third wicket, the end soon came and Cheltenham once more took the lead in the series of matches between the schools.

Once again I have to express my sincere thanks to the many kind friends and correspondents, without whose invaluable assistance these notes could not have been written. I regret that in a few isolated cases no information was forthcoming.

With eight of the successful 1930 side still at school, Eton had every prospect of a fine eleven. Page and Hanbury again provided a formidable opening pair, but in bowling it was doubtful if Baker, a fastish in-swinger with that occasional devastating alternative which goes away after pitching, could make up for the loss of A. G. Pelham. As to the batting, Atkinson-Clark (captain), Allen, Gosling, Baerlein (the wicket-keeper), with Hogg and Aubrey-Fletcher, looked good for a heap of runs. Two more batsmen were all that were needed and one of them, Hotchkin, appeared at once, but May made life difficult for young batsmen and impossible for fast bowlers. Aubrey-Fletcher bowled encouragingly and June brought a plumb wicket, a big score and the workmanlike dismissal of a strong Eton Ramblers batting side but, as the weeks went by, it became apparent that all was not well with the batting. Atkinson-Clark, though seeing the ball perfectly, got himself out time and again in the 'teens; Hogg, Aubrey-Fletcher and Baerlein were shadows of their former selves, and all too often Allen had to carry the team on his shoulders. This was the situation on the eve of the Winchester match. Thereafter even the most inveterate optimist had the scales torn from his eyes. The match had been won, albeit by the narrowest of margins, but the memory of the batting made hideous all thoughts of Lord's. Worse still, Page and Baker

the most dangerous bowlers in the side were both badly strained. Neither could be replaced and Atkinson-Clark gave the last place to Hedley—a racquet-playing batsman with a safe pair of hands—nursed his invalids, and hoped for the best. As events proved he was right. Allen and Hotehkin, in their record partnership removed at once all fears of a failure in batting, and though Page's leg broke down, Baker, strapped up afresh at every interval, survived to administer a coup de grace in an historic over.

Out of twelve matches played Harrow won three, lost one, and the remainder were drawn, mainly in favour of the School. The eleven were strong in batting and never failed to reach a respectable total, and although at Lord's a collapse occurred in the second innings little fault could be found with the first. Covington, Gascoyne and Tindall were all sound, Blackmore made up for his unsteadiness by hard hitting and a keen eye, and Clive batted very well at Lord's, but he and the rest can hardly be described as batsmen with a good and solid defence. In the inter-school matches only Clive, medium-paced right-hand, ever looked like a bowler of any class. Much may be expected of him this year. Hopton bowled well at times, but Covington did not fulfil the hopes he raised in the previous season. The fielding never reached the standard of 1930, and the catching was unreliable. The Eton match proved the more disappointing because a very strong batting side of the Harrow Wanderers, rather weak in bowling, was nearly beaten the preceding week. This game was noteworthy for two fine innings of Covington (182) and Gascoyne (163), who put on 337 for the third wicket—a record stand for the School-before the former declared at 550 for seven wickets. It would seem that the continued disappointments at Lord's are largely due to the perfection of the Harrow wickets from which the ball comes off nearly always at the same height and makes batsmanship too easy. With Covington again captain, and Haslewood, Clive, Tindall and Gascoyne and possibly Heinemann, the wicket-keeper, remaining, Harrow's prospects are more healthy than they have been for many years.

Winchester up to the middle of June had an unbeaten record, winning four of their club games, playing an even draw with Harrow, and scoring decisive wins over Charterhouse and Marlborough. But against Eton at Agar's Plough, only Du Boulay in the first and R. de W. K. Winlaw in the second innings rose superior to a sad batting failure. The breakdown of the batting on the fast wickets of their three last matches was so marked as to deny Winchester the claim to be a first-rate school side. On a slow pitch there were few, if any, better. The three medium-paced bowlers, Legard, Gillies, and Townsend reinforced by Lee, a slow left-hander, who was kept out of the side for the earlier matches by a broken leg, made up for what they lacked in variety by steadiness in length and direction. Of the batsmen.

R. de W. K. Winlaw was the most reliable, especially in school matches, getting 100 v. Charterhouse, 75 v. Marlborough and 75 v. Eton. White scored heavily and was full of strokes, though often shaky in starting. Robertson, a left-hander of easy style, should, with increasing experience, become really good. Townsend played some attractive innings, noticeably a century against the Butterflies, and Du Boulay, an unconventional hitter with a fine eye, showed much courage. The fielding was good with R. de W. K. Winlaw, White and Du Boulay a strong trio on the off side. A. W. E. Winlaw should turn out to be a wicket-keeper above the average. Lee will be captain this year, and Robertson, and the younger Winlaw, with Bennett, the twelfth man, a useful bowler, are also left.

The Rugby eleven disappointed. The team, a very young one, had plenty of good players, but opportunities for practice in the early weeks of the term were restricted. The bowling was steady, if lacking sting, and the fielding really good, few runs being given away. Pridmore, the most dependable run-getter, combined a good eye with a proper disregard for the bowlers' wiles. Jackson, who will again captain the side, was sound and steady and at his best in a crisis. Medium pace, with an easy action and run up to the wicket, he returned excellent bowling figures, notably against the Free Foresters when he took five wickets for 54, and Gemmill. a tall left-hander, gained in accuracy and bowled well at Lord's. Spens, Walford, Brown, and Clark, the last named with leg breaks, should be useful as change bowlers this year. Rugby lost to Clifton and Marlborough and the Uppingham match was ruined by rain. With Jackson, Gemmill, Dowson, Walford, Spens, Clark, and Brown left for next season, Rugby should do well.

Marlborough had a good eleven, built on the solid foundation of four able bowlers, Mole, fast, MacNamara, left hand with a quick lively action, late in-swing and pace off the pitch, Napper, slow left with some spin-a strong contrast to the first two-and Nelson, with his off-break and puzzling flight, most useful as a change. All the side could make runs. Alston, possessing a straight bat and a quick eye, proved a hard-hitting opening batsman and made centuries against Cheltenham, Wellington, and the Free Foresters. Nelson, with a perfect stance and a remarkable eye, had many strokes, but owing probably to the cares of captaincy, scarcely did himself justice. Mole, a fast scoring but not always careful batsman, made a useful partner to Alston, and Seamer watched the ball carefully and hit well on the leg side. Walker, a player of real class, seemed to lack confidence, but played an innings of 66 at Lord's which changed the aspect of the Rugby match. Nelson set an excellent example in the field, and Martin-Jenkins developed into a useful wicket-keeper. The Cheltenham match fizzled out into a draw. Against Winchester

who defeated them, Marlborough had to bowl under unfavourable conditions but Wellington were beaten handsomely. Harrow just failed to win decisively, MacNamara and Trevaski, the last Marlborough pair staying together thirty minutes. Rugby were overcome by seven wickets, Mole taking five wickets for 21 in the first innings and ten in all. Seamer, Napper, Alston, Maples, Walker and Duggan should be back this year.

At the beginning of the term at Cheltenham it was expected that the batting would be up to strength and that there would be a serious lack of bowling but with one big exception—against Marlborough the reverse proved to be the case. The Marlborough and Malvern matches suffered interference from the weather and at Clifton, Cheltenham went down by ten wickets to a side better all round, except behind the wicket and perhaps in ground fielding. Lord's provided a triumph in an unexpected victory over Haileybury by 160 runs for which Brettell, the captain, who had played a brave innings of 101 against Marlborough, was largely responsible. Of the other batsmen Ogilvy started the season brilliantly but fell away later, Fairweather batted really well against Clifton and in a stylish innings of 91 against the Free Foresters. Humphreys, who should have at least two more years in the eleven, was strong on the leg side. Ruffer throughout the whole term was easily the most dangerous bowler, his best performance being twelve for 138 against the Foresters. Never afraid to pitch the ball up, he changed his flight well and varied his usual leg break with a cleverly-disguised off break and top spinner. Scrafton was erratic but at times bowled his sharp off breaks effectively. Lloyd, brilliant on the leg side, had few superiors behind the wicket. Fairweather, Scrafton, Cohen, Sewell and Humphreys are staying on.

Haileybury, who won seven matches, lost four and drew three, had a side above the average, an important factor in their success lying in team work. They also held the advantage of possessing one of the best school wicket-keepers of the year in their captain, Wolff. They disappointed in their school matches and suffered bad defeats from Uppingham and Cheltenham, but showed their best form at Wellington where they gained a fine victory, thanks mainly to an innings of 133 by Hill and the bowling of Allen (six for 21). In club games the School achieved notable successes against a strong Crusaders' XI. and the Old Haileyburians, and defeated the M.C.C. by five wickets in a race against time after the Club had declared. Rogerson, who headed the batting averages, was a much-improved player and a vigorous hitter, Hill possessed style and Allen, Pilbrow and Romer were promising all-round players. Unwin took thirty-four wickets for under 18 runs apiece, an excellent record for a fast bowler when few pitches suited him. Also he suffered from an injury to his shoulder which interfered at times with his bowling and prevented him delivering a ball in Cheltenham's second innings. Allen, a medium paced right hander, who will captain the side this year, did some good performances, and Barton's googlies were useful at times. Allen will have the assistance of Romer, Barton, Osborne and Scott.

The Clifton team included enterprising batsmen who lost no time in getting their runs, three really dependable bowlers, sound fieldsmen, and two wicket-keepers. Rugby were beaten in an innings, Cheltenham by ten wickets, but the Tonbridge match had to be left drawn. Nuttall, captain for the second year, and Kinnersley made a good pair of opening batsmen. Tovey, who gained his colours with Nuttall in 1928 and headed the batting averages, has great power in the forearm and played a forcing innings of 99 at Lord's. With Carr, another hitter, he put on 235 runs at Rugby in an hour and three-quarters. The side could make runs down to No. 10. Harrison, who had played for the Lord's Schools against the Rest in 1929, met with considerable success with the ball, among his best performances being eight for 22 on a tricky, drying wicket at Rugby. A fastish medium-paced right-hander he delivers the ball from a nice height. Kinnersley and Coachafer provided admirable contrasts, and between them these three took four-fifths of the wickets, Kinnersley with slow spinners and Coachafer with slow medium deliveries, which he turned either way. Vickers and Lyons-Montgomery were the other change bowlers. In fielding Tovey at cover and Nuttall at extra cover maintained their brilliant form of four years ago. Carr promises to develop into a first-rate wicket-keeper. Kinnersley, Jones, Vickers and Pickles are expected back.

Tonbridge had a young side, seven of whom will be available this year and four in 1933. The batting lacked confidence. Ten matches were drawn, two won, and four lost, but a good performance against Clifton at Lord's compensated to a large extent for an otherwise poor season. Those on whom the burden of the attack fell stuck to their job and received able support in the field. There was no tail to the batting; no member of the eleven averaged less than 17, and the last two wickets put on 100 at Lord's. Crouch (captain), Davis, Morrison, Morton, Durtnell, Britton, and Harding are available for this year.

Although Malvern won four matches and did not know defeat, the results rather flattered the eleven who, though a useful bowling side, lacked batsmen. The two opening fixtures against Liverpool and Wolverhampton were abandoned without a ball being bowled and the team went to Shrewsbury without having batted right through.

However Cornu and Byass, who bowled unchanged, with five for 34 and four for 28 respectively took the side to victory by nine runs. Rain spoiled the Cheltenham match and saved Malvern from a heavy defeat at Repton. In this game Smith carried his bat through Malvern's first innings for 63. Cornu was again the mainstay of the bowling, taking fifty-six wickets for an average of 13.39. He has increased his pace, but scarcely kept such a consistent length as in 1930. His best feat was six wickets for 26 against Christ Church. Oxford. He received useful support from Byass, who took four for 32 in the same match. Smith, who in ten innings made six scores of between 44 and 63, was the most consistent batsman, but Crabtree did not reveal his true form. Addey is a wicket-keeper of promise, his effort of six wickets (four stumped, one caught, one run out) against Shrewsbury playing no small part in the narrow victory. Peake is this year's captain, and Byass, Addey, Thomas, Moss and Nunnelev also remain.

On paper, Repton had a poor season—they lost as many matches as in the three previous years put together—but figures are not always a fair test and though they lost five, drew one, and won only two, the School scored 100 runs more than their opponents. Repton scored 440 in three hours and a half against Malvern, Sutcliffe and MacBrayne putting on 107 in the first thirty-five minutes—one of the most remarkable pieces of schoolboy cricket ever seen. Malvern made 161 and lost seven wickets in their second innings for 234, when rain stopped play with over two hours to go. Human, who scored three consecutive centuries, is a natural cricketer with most strokes at his command. A splendid field anywhere, he should have a fine cricketing future. Sutcliffe, whose partnerships with MacBrayne were one of the features of the summer, played an heroic innings at Uppingham. A forcing bat, he was a reliable and sometimes deadly bowler. Mendl, an able reserve wicket-keeper, did not do himself justice with the bat. Heale, fast medium, bowled really well on occasion, and Allen, a natural bowler with a good action, will improve with strength and experience. Middleton developed into an effective wicket-keeper. Mendl succeeds Human in the captaincy and Allen is also staying on.

As in 1930 Shrewsbury's school matches were interfered with by illness, no game being possible against Uppingham or Rossall. The bowling was much above the average, with Barlow, the captain, slow medium right, the outstanding performer. He received capital support from Pratt and Blyth, fast medium right, and Green, slow medium left. Barlow bowled extremely well throughout the season, varying his late swing from leg with an off-break. Pratt brought the ball back from the off occasionally besides making it go away from the batsman. Barlow, strong on the on side

and in defence, was also the backbone of the batting. Hughes, Sullivan, Crawford and Llewellyn all played some good innings, but there was a lack of consistency in the batting. The fielding reached a high standard. The only matches lost were to Malvern (by seven runs) and Wolverhampton; victories were gained over Repton, M.C.C., Liverpool, Cryptics, Old Salopians, and Shrewsbury Town. Sullivan is this year's captain and Butterworth is also available.

Uppingham enjoyed their most successful season for many years, seven matches being won and four drawn. They beat Haileybury by ten wickets, Repton by three wickets and Oundle-whom they met for the first time-by five wickets. The Radley match was spoiled by rain and that with Shrewsbury cancelled through illness. The best performance was the defeat of a powerful Free Foresters eleven by 89 runs, while they overcame a strong batting side of Notts Amateurs by seven wickets, the other victories being against Old Uppinghamians, and the Leicester Gentlemen. The strength of the team lay in the three bowlers, Milman, Ibbotson, and Parkinson, who were remarkably consistent. Parkinson formed the mainspring of the attack and round him the bowling successes revolved. Ibbotson, though handicapped by slow wickets, proved a good bowler, and Milman's ability in spin and flight made him a most effective left hander. Mention must be made of Milman's six wickets for 29 against Repton and six for 47 against Notts Amateurs, Ibbotson's ten for 73 in the two innings against Haileybury and Parkinson's five for 14 against the Foresters. Walker, an excellent captain, batted consistently well especially in the earlier matches, his innings of 66 against Repton and 77 (out of a total of 133) against Rugby being outstanding. Gillespie played a splendid innings of 108 against Haileybury and Baraldi made a happy debut (75 not out) against Oundle. The fielding was clean and sound, Milton, who won the fielding prize, showing intelligent anticipation at short leg. Tulloch served the side well behind the wicket. Uppingham will again have Walker as captain this year.

Westminster improved upon their rather dismal record of 1930, and although a record of one win—against Wellington—six defeats and six drawn games was not impressive—they gave several promising displays against strong clubs. Drawn games were played with Charterhouse and Stowe, but the Radley and Sherborne matches ended disastrously for the school. The bowling, always weak, devolved mostly on Argyle, medium left, Johnson, slow-left, and Angelo, medium right. The fielding was good and the wicket-keeping of Matthews smart and unobtrusive. Broadhurst, neat in style and quick on his feet, was the most consistent batsman. Johnson, promoted from No. 11 to No. 1 in the batting order is, at present, too slow a scorer and lacks strokes but will improve. Pagan

made a steady opening partner for Johnson and Brown, a forcing left hander, hit well at times. Byrne, Angelo, Turner and Munro all showed considerable promise as batsmen. Indeed, Angelo, who played an innings of 68 in the Colts match at Lord's in August, did exceptional work as an all-rounder and much is expected of him. Matthews will captain the side again this year, and Johnson, Angelo, Munro, Turner, and Latey also remain.

For the first half of the season, Charterhouse were stronger in bowling than in batting but later the position was reversed. The Winchester match was lost and those against Westminster, Harrow and Wellington spoiled by rain. Of the batsmen Hollebone was most consistent and he showed sound defence. Wreford-Brown, often brilliant, lacked restraint and Powell, a wicket-keeper above the usual standard, played some valuable innings. Greening and Davidson were good leg break bowlers, Dyson a steady left hander, and Tetley and Dunbar fast medium right. Dunbar proved his usefulness in nearly always securing a wicket early in the innings. Dyson (captain), Garnett, Henderson and Dunbar are staying on.

Wellington College for the first time for many years failed to win a match. They had no outstanding cricketers and a very definite weakness in bowling was apparent throughout the season. A legbreak bowler could not be discovered and an attack composed of medium-paced bowlers could not be relied upon. Wellington lost to Marlborough, Westminster and Haileybury, and drew with Bradfield and Charterhouse. The fielding reached a good level as the season advanced. The captain has not yet been appointed but Munro, Furlong, Ker, Muir, and Moggridge remain for 1932.

Bradfield were a useful side-more so than their record of 3 matches won, 3 lost, and 5 drawn might suggest. The only spell of fine weather occurred during the Greek Play, when no cricket took place. Illness prevented the Stowe match being played and Bradfield lost to Radley, but they had the better of a draw with Wellington. Bovell, who bowled slow off-spinners, did an amazing performance against Radley, after lunch, when he took five wickets, including the "hat trick," for two runs. Heath, really fast, stood over six feet and made the good length ball swing away. Bathurst, the captain and most dependable batsman in the side, handled the attack well. Gray and Wright, who both have two more years at school, should be very good with increased strength. Gibson, who came into the team late, was the best all-round player. A fixture has been arranged with Lancing for this year, when Hughes, a fast medium bowler, Gray, Tyndall, Wright and, it is hoped, Heath will be left.

Durham had a most disappointing season and failed to win any of the six matches not interfered with by rain. Shawyer

captained the side for the second year and showed great improvement in batting, but was not successful with his bowling on the slow wickets. He played a fine innings against Ampleforth. Kissack bowled well, taking 34 wickets for less than fourteen runs apiece. He succeeds Shawyer in the captaincy and will have the assistance of Johnston, Brunton, Thomas, Smallwood, and Lishman.

St. Paul's a really good side, won seven matches and lost two. Richards, captain for the second year, Hadingham and Shneerson, celebrating their fourth season in the eleven, were all experienced cricketers who could hit, while Judge proved a steady opening batsman with a quite remarkable defence. Between them this four rarely failed to give the side an encouraging start. Stowe and Felsted were defeated, drawn games played with Bedford and Dulwich and rain stopped play when St. Paul's had scored 190 for two against Leys. Hadingham hit two centuries for the School and Richards and Shneerson one each. Richards at one period had scored 410 runs for three times out in six innings. Richards, Shneerson, and Judge, fast medium right handers, formed an effective trio of bowlers. Readhead will be the new captain and Ffennell, Stephens and Tyndall are also available.

Dulwich, with six of the most promising players left from the previous year, hardly fulfilled expectations, there being a weakness in the bowling and too long a tail in the batting-due to lack of confidence. Accidents to Staniforth and to Knowland, who stood out of the Bedford, Oundle and St. Paul's matches and could not bowl against Tonbridge, weakened the attack. Mill Hill were beaten, defeats experienced from Lancing and Brighton and drawn games played with Bedford, Oundle, St. Paul's and Tonbridge. The Tonbridge match was renewed again after a lapse of several years, but the fixture with Lancing has now been withdrawn. Bartlett, a hard hitting batsman, scored over 700 runs with an average of 70 but like many left-handers proved prone to offer a catch to second slip. Knowland had some attractive strokes and Griffith, quick on his feet and with powerful forearms, made runs rapidly. Andrews' square cutting featured his play and Jeary, a stylist, and Staniforth, a hitter, played several valuable innings. Watt did his utmost to bear far more than his share of the fast bowling, but Knowland (leg breaks with top spin) was the best bowler. Bartlett will captain the side again and Griffith, Watt, Knowland, Jeary, and Blaine also remain.

Sherborne, five of whose matches had to be abandoned, possessed three players of undoubted promise in Morgan, an excellent captain, Carey and Snowden. The batting was sound all through with Carey the outstanding figure. He was unfortunate not to catch the eye of the selectors at Lord's. Morgan, a steady batsman with a sound

defence, showed promise as a left hand bowler who could spin the ball. Snowden delivered from a good height at considerable pace and, coming off the wicket really fast, brought the ball back sharply at times. In the two innings of Westminster, Fenwick, a much improved wicket-keeper, allowed only one bye and made five catches. Sherborne easily defeated Blundell's and Westminster, drew with Tonbridge and lost to Radley by five wickets. Fine bowling by Snowden, who took seven wickets for 53, and an admirable innings of 129 by Carey, enabled the school to defeat the M.C.C. comfortably. Fox, Evans, Smith, Fenwick, Innes and Warre-Dymond are expected to be available this year.

Radley enjoyed a satisfactory season, winning all five school matches in addition to those against M.C.C., Lincoln College, B.N.C., Radley Rangers and Gloucestershire Gipsies. Stowe were beaten by eight wickets, Bradfield by 24 runs, Westminster by 155 runs and Lancing—a new fixture—and Sherborne each by five wickets. Much of the success was due to Dinwiddy, who proved not only an able captain but a most consistent run-getter and in School matches alone had an average of over 60. He saved many runs by his fielding at cover and was a dangerous googly bowler when he found his length. The strength of the attack may be gauged from the fact that only one side scored more than 175 runs in an innings against the School. Kershaw was easily the best bowler. A medium paced right hander, he kept an admirable length while making the ball do just enough to keep the batsmen playing. He was well supported by Williams with in-swingers and by Monks with off-spinners. Lycett showed ability as a wicket-keeper and the catching of the side was safe. Dinwiddy will again captain the side, with Guy, Lycett and Hunter also continuing.

Rossall went through without defeat, four matches being won and six drawn. Lowe, their best bat, had early in the season a run of bad luck which caused him to be over cautious in the later matches. Coatsworth made runs consistently and forced the game well. Riley adapted himself according to the demands of the situation and on two occasions made victory possible by his spirited hitting. Strachan sacrificed himself admirably to the needs of his side. Royal-Dawson, a useful leg-break bowler, Cullen, the wicket-keeper, Chadwick, Beresford, and Brookes, are likely to be available again.

Lancing did reasonably well though a brilliant start was not maintained. After Christ's Hospital, Dulwich, Tonbridge and Cranleigh had been decisively beaten the School lost to Radley, Eastbourne and Brighton. The side was carried to a great extra by the captain and secretary, Pearse and McLagan, to both of whom high praise is due. Barker and Read at times gave excellent help

and the wicket-keeping of Quill generally reached a high standard. Read will captain the side this year and Pemberton and Yglesias are also remaining.

Leys had a fairly successful season though the side was definitely weaker than of late years. Felsted and University College School were beaten and drawn games played with Bedford and Mill Hill. Skinner, who played for Derbyshire in the holidays, and Bisseker were the mainstays of the batting, each scoring more than 500 runs with an average of over 50. Whitaker, who played several good innings, will be captain this year and will have the assistance of Holloway and Glendinning.

With five victories, including one over Bedford, to set against a defeat by Uppingham, Oundle had every reason to feel satisfied. The batting largely depended on the opening pair, Beresford and Geen, captain and captain elect, who seldom failed the side, while Fyfe and Cullen also made some valuable scores. Maw, a fast medium right hander, who kept an excellent length and swung with his arm, and Cullen with leg-spinners, bore the burden of the bowling. Morton, also fast medium right, could be relied upon to get every help from the pitch.

Brighton can congratulate themselves on one of the most gratifying seasons of recent years. Eight matches, including those with Dulwich, Christ's Hospital, Lancing, and Epsom, were won, five lost and three drawn. In the batting Maxwell stood head and shoulders above the rest with a total of over 1,000 runs and six centuries. He received able support from Forster whose back play was very sound, Benham and Sayers. In bowling Dodd, Rae and Foster did practically all the work, Dodd's slow leg-breaks being invaluable. Maxwell, above the average as a school wicket-keeper, had a hand in the capture of thirty-five wickets, and captained the side with judgment. Dodd, Lenton and Secretan remain for this year.

Bedjord disappointed, winning only three matches, losing three and drawing eight. Wise fell below expectations both with bat and ball and was undoubtedly affected by the cares of captaincy. Edwards, a tremendous hitter, showed to most advantage in school matches. Gilbert, right arm medium to fast, and Noble, left arm medium, were a good pair of opening bowlers, and Dawe an efficient wicket-keeper. Noble is captain this year and others returning are Dawe, Golding and the twelfth man, Burrows.

Dover, more fortunate than most schools, brought to a definite issue ten of their eleven matches. Only three of these were won but at one time as many as six of the team were under sixteen and youth and inexperience told their tale. Aylwin, Weymouth,

and at times Gibbs all did well in bowling, but Fyers has not yet reached his best. Aldous succeeds Goodbody in the captaincy and will have with him Fyers, Weymouth, Low, Comyn, Turner and Gibbs.

Following a record football season King's, Canterbury, fared almost equally well on the cricket field, only one of the school matches—that against St. Lawrence—being lost. Victories were gained over Dover, Eastbourne, Highgate and Merchant Taylors. Lovatt proved the most stylish bat on the side, backed up by D. W. Whittall and Wheeler, the last-named a fast scorer. Weatherall, the captain, frequently played well in adverse circumstances. The most dangerous bowlers were Booty, who for a schoolboy revealed great pace, and Robinson. Booty is taking over the captaincy and may have the assistance of Lovatt, Robinson, Foord-Kelcey, Baker, Thomas, H. F. Whittall and Johnston.

St. Lawrence won three, lost four and drew four matches. They beat St. Edmund's and King's, Canterbury, lost to Dover and drew with Berkhamsted. A. G. W. Hill, an excellent batsman and wicket-keeper, easily headed the batting averages with a highest innings of 106, not out, against St. Edmund's. Slade, the captain and Calvert also played well on occasion. B. J. W. Hill, who will captain the side next season, and Slade had far too much bowling to do. The fielding was extremely good. Four old colours in Calvert, Winter, Monk and Sharpe stay on.

Felsted beat Highgate and Mill Hill, and lost to Leys and St. Paul's. The absence of Wyatt in the Leys match made all the difference, as besides being the steadiest batsman, he was a useful spin bowler. Skelton did well at times and Matthews, only fifteen, should develop into a good left-hander. Lowe, Kelso, Matthews, Edwards and Carr-Archer may be available this year.

Considering the talent at their disposal at the beginning of the term, Mill Hill should have done better, but they could not adapt themselves to the sticky wickets. Hurn has the makings of a first-class left-hand bat and Wright, the captain, also played several good innings. The bowling lacked stength and variety. Taylor, who came into the team late in term, should do well next season. Wright, a slow spinner, will captain the side again and Dyer, Hurn, Down, Kent, Phillpott and Taylor are also left.

An epidemic of measles handicapped Stowe but there were one or two bright points about the side. Levis, the wicket keeper, had few, if any, superior in the schools. Hotham frequently treated opposing attacks cavalierly while Lucas, a left-hander, and Smith also made runs. The latter pair should have two more years at least in the side. The bowling depended largely on Lucas an in-

swinger, and Packe, slow left-hand, and the fact that only the Authentics and Christ Church, Oxford, reached 300, was mainly due to the excellence of the fielding. Packe, Lucas and Smith remain for this year.

Five of Canford's fourteen matches being abandoned without a ball bowled, and two others spoiled by rain, the side, with only three old colours left, never settled down. Nuding and Eason showed useful batting form and the former and Thwaites the captain bore the burden of the bowling. Palmer, a slow left-hander, showed promise. The only school match played—against Victoria College, Jersey—was won. Eason will captain the side this year and five old colours are available.

Stonyhurst, though undefeated, met with no great success, three matches being won and twelve drawn. Upon Monahan, Horton, Houghton, Lescher and Moran the batting mainly depended, and the school had two good left-handed bowlers in Hughes and McGrath, the former of whom did the hat-trick against Ampleforth. Horton topped the batting averages and obtained a century against Rossall. Cuffe kept wicket well and de Bertodano showed promise both as batsman and bowler. The school matches with Sedbergh, Ampleforth (both two-day matches), Giggleswick and Rossall all ended in draws.

Leeds Grammar School lost their first four fixtures but won six of the remaining nine, including the school matches against King Edward VII, Sheffield, Ripon, Giggleswick, Wakefield and Pockling ton. Phillipson, who against Ripon hit the first century scored for the School in seven years, formed the mainstay of the batting, and he was ably assisted by Holderness and Potter. As a bowler Holderness secured six wickets for 23 v. Manchester G.S., seven for five v. Wakefield and five for 12 v. Ripon. Mawer took eight for 27 against the Old Leodiensians. Holderness (captain), Mawer, Phillipson, Shepherd, Hutchinson, Thornton, Kelsey (wicket-keeper) and Taylor will lend experience to a strong side this year.

Considering that their attack depended mainly on fast medium bowlers, St. Peter's, York, secured a praiseworthy record—five victories, four losses and two draws. Upon the solitary occasion they played on a hard wicket they gained a great victory over Durham School, Dodds, a left-hander, taking five wickets for 12 runs. This was only the second time since the War that St. Peter's had beaten Durham. Allport led the side for the second year and set a capital example in the field, Yardley showed consistent batting form and Scott, a powerful hitter, played several fine innings, notably that against the Yorkshire Gentlemen. Allport, in his fifth season in the eleven, will again be captain and will have the support of Yardley and Ogley and four others of the 1931 team.

The Ampleforth eleven was the best seen there for many years, only one match being lost, four won and five drawn. In Waddilove they had an excellent wicket-keeper, who accounted for nineteen wickets. Bean, the captain, scored two centuries, one against the M.C.C. when Grieve made 94 not out. Waddilove also revealed good form. The slow bowlers, Ainscough and Bean had a lot of work to do and the former kept an accurate length and flighted the ball well. His career at Oxford will be watched with interest. Durham were beaten by one wicket and Ampleforth took the honours in drawn games with Sedbergh and Stonyhurst. Grieve, Waddilove, Barton and Bush will be in this year's side.

Although Bromsgrove won five matches and lost four, the season on the whole disappointed. C. F. Williams the captain, alone produced dependable batting form in the first half of the summer.

Cranleigh, with a very young side, enjoyed their best season for four years. In the inter-school matches they registered decisive victories over Highgate and Epsom, drew with Mill Hill and Christ's Hospital and lost to Lancing. Morey should develop into a first-rate left-hander and Cox into a reliable opening batsman, as he has sound defence; Reynolds, a left-hander, and Ketteridge, a leg-breaker, proved useful all-rounders. It is hoped that A. C. Glover, Fairweather (captain 1931), Greenwood, Morey, Ketteridge, Reynolds, Cox, Shelley and Wickes will be at school this year.

For the first time for many years, *Highgate* lost all their school matches, the only victory being over the Old Westminsters. For the second year Whitaker headed the batting and with normal progress he should accomplish much this summer when Ellis may captain the side.

Blundell's record of only one win in fourteen matches hardly gave a fair idea of the campaign. Greater consistency existed than last year among the earlier batsmen, notably Parsons, Greig and Lake, and the tail displayed a marked ability to make up for any bad work of their predecessors. The bowling though lacking variety was steady. Talbot, Martin and Lake all did good work with the bat. Lake will be captain this year and Parsons, Greig, Fox, Martin and Stone are also staying on.

St. Edwards School in spite of two of their old colours being incapacitated for most of the term, had a successful season, winning nine matches, losing two and drawing eight. They beat Bromsgrove, I.S.C., Windsor and Campbell College, Belfast, and drew with Wrekin Good performances were recorded against several strong sides from the Oxford Colleges. Gibb their wicket-keeper, occupied first place

in the batting with an average of 45.00 and should be heard of again in Yorkshire cricket. Berry achieved most in bowling and Veitch proved an excellent captain. Six old colours remain.

Rydal experienced an excellent summer. Not only did the eleven remain unbeaten, but of seventeen matches played, they won twelve. Bibby, the captain, who made well over 600 runs, and Rouston could usually be relied upon to give the side a sound start, while W. Wooller, who obtained two centuries, Kay and Rimmer, all batted well. The main strength of the side, however, lay in the bowling. Elson, slow left-hand, took eighty wickets for just over nine runs apiece and W. Wooller, fast medium right, was also very effective. Ballantyne, right-hand with a deceptive flight, and R. Wooller, a promising slow left-hander, gave them useful support. Bibby will again captain the side and will have the support of W. Wooller, Kay, Ballantyne, R. Wooller, Holmes and Swallow.

With only two matches won, against six lost and seven unfinished, the record of the Oratory School did not provide impressive reading, but the eleven was an exceptionally young one, and every member can be called upon again this year. The chief match against Beaumont College ended in victory, thanks to a sound innings by Reynolds and the bowling of Caruana, the captain, and Dobson. Besides playing some valuable innings, Caruana bowled at medium pace and with the left-hand deliveries of Dobson, helped considerably towards success. Burns again kept wicket well and batted nicely.

Beaumont, at the start of the season, appeared to have the nucleus of a really good side with five of the best players left from the previous year, but they failed to come up to expectations. The Imperial Service College, St. John's (Leatherhead), and Douai were beaten and defeats suffered at the hands of K.C.S. (Wimbledon), Epsom and the Oratory. The Oratory match, which had been played at Lord's for the previous four years, took place at the Oval. Hewett, the captain, scored 400 runs and Darwood, a medium paced right-hander, stood out among the bowlers. The fielding attained a high standard and Jenkins, who showed promise as a batsman, proved himself a wicket-keeper above the average.

St. John's, Leatherhead, under the leadership of Sharp, did very well. Lucas and Turvin carried off the honours in a sound batting side, the former scoring two hundreds and Turvin one. The bowling showed considerable improvement on that of former years, Speak, coming into the side late in the term, accomplishing much fine work. Turvin and Jennings are promising all-round players. Lucas, now in his fifth year, is the new captain and, with Bryan, Jennings, Turvin, Watts, Jackson, Speak and Mitchell left, the eleven should be strong.

Considering that they enjoyed the help of four of the previous year's eleven, including Whitteridge and Wilson, two of the best all-rounders, University College School failed rather badly, eight matches being lost, three won, and three drawn. The chief weakness lay in the batting, despite the occasional brilliance of the captain, Whitteridge, who played one particularly bright innings of 132 against King's College School. Wheeler, King, Dickie, Seigal and Sinclair remain this year.

Wellingborough, young and lacking experience, suffered a misfortune early in the season, Thomas, the most successful bowler in 1930, straining his back and being of no further use. They had their full share of rain, seven of the fourteen matches being unfinished, four won and three lost. Garne played seven innings of over 50 and should have a bright future. Wait, the captain and best all-rounder, also proved reliable, but Hatchett, Barrett and Hill disappointed. Staples, slow left hand, Caswell, medium right with an off break, Wait with a swing and off break, all put up some good performances with the ball and the fielding, splendidly led by Wait, was always good. Brodhurst, straight from the previous year's under fourteen eleven, kept wicket in promising fashion. Much useful material is left for this year.

With victories over Denstone, Trent and St. Peter's, York, a drawn match against Mount St. Mary's, and the only school match lost that with Oakham, Worksop had a good all-round eleven. The best batting performances were against strong sides visiting the school and from the bowling of Yorkshire Gentlemen, Eacott made 102 not out. The best batsman on the side, he repeated his success against St. Peter's with 103 not out, and was well supported throughout the term by Burton and Snow. Gorman took fifty-two wickets for 10 runs apiece and received valuable help from Green and Eacott. Seven of last year's eleven are available this summer.

Wrekin have ever reason to feel satisfied with the results of the season. They easily beat Denstone and Ellesmere and played a drawn game with St. Edward's. Eaves, the captain, and Poole proved the mainstay of the batting and Griffith, Middleton-Smith and Goodhart all had excellent bowling figures. Goodhart, Stokes, an efficient wicket-keeper, and Middleton-Smith remain for this year.

Never before in their history had Monkton Combe known so triumphant a summer. Seven matches were won, including that against the M.C.C., four drawn and one lost. The feature of the season was the batting of Watson, who, dismissed only four times in eleven innings, hit up two hundreds and returned an average of 133. After changing his style he also became a useful fast bowler Taylor's slow leg breaks often served to break up partnerships. Watson will captain the side this year and it is hoped that Porter, Dudley, Brooke-Harte, Watts, and Bune will also be available.

Forest School called upon five old colours, but the new captain, H. C. J. Belle, experienced some difficulty in filling the vacancies. Five matches were won, five lost and one drawn. The captain and his brother, B. H. Belle, were again the chief run-getters. B. H. Belle had to do most of the bowling and special praise fell to him for his accuracy and consistently good work. H. C. J. Belle, in his first season in that position, kept wicket with credit.

Bishop's Stortford won two and drew the other three of their school matches. Johnson, a most improved player, turned out the best all-rounder on the side. The batting was not reliable, but there never occurred an utter break down. Knight and Bonnar gained most prominence in run-getting, Knight putting together a fine century against Berkhamsted. Six, possibly seven, old colours remain with Bonnar, as captain.

Edinburgh Academy lost three of the four school matches. Oliphant, who will again captain the side, was a dependable batsman, scoring over 700 runs, including an innings of 135. J. A. Stevenson, who easily headed the averages, had, with Tait and Murray, most of the bowling to do. With J. A. Stevenson, Elder, Bruce-Lockhart, a promising all-rounder, Tait, Bell-Scott, Kennedy, Macrae and Dunnett again at Oliphant's command, the Academy should do well this year.

Fettes did well in beating Glenalmond by nine wickets, Loretto by one wicket and George Watson's by 106 runs. The eleven captained by Anson, possessed all-round strength, especially in bowling. Bad weather caused the cancellation of the Edinburgh Academy match.

Dundas batted consistently for Glenalmond and Lorraine played several good innings, particularly one against Merchiston. Gregoire and McJannet did most of the bowling, which reached a better standard than in the previous year. Glenalmond won seven matches, lost to Fettes and Loretto and drew on five occasions. Dundas captains the side and Gregoire, McJannet, Marshall, Mudie, Ferguson, and Morrison are remaining at school.

Loretto, though losing by one wicket to Fettes after an exciting finish, did quite well, only three matches being lost. Centuries have been plentiful in Scottish cricket of late years, and Wordsworth obtained one against Glenalmond. Kyd, McKechnie, Guthrie, Barratt, Mackay, King-Clark and Laycock are expected to be available this season.

Merchiston Castle opened the season with a brilliant victory over Forfarshire but could not maintain that standard. The bowling, especially that of Ballantyne, Agnew and Rose, proved steady enough to prevent any big totals being scored, and the fielding throughout

the season was excellent. Merchiston defeated Watson's, lost—through reckless batting—to Fettes, and drew with Loretto, Edinburgh Academy and Glenalmond. Ballantyne, the best allround player in the side, a sound bat and clever left arm bowler, is the only old colour left.

ETON v. HARROW.

** Played at Lord's, Friday, Saturday, July 10, 11. — Entering upon their 102nd match against Eton with hopes of breaking the unhappy spell which had attended their efforts in the great struggle at Lord's for more than twenty years, Harrow, so far from realising those expectations, suffered one of the heaviest

of defeats in the long history of the fixture. Eton declaring with five wickets in

hand and winning by an innings and 16 runs. Not only did the Harrovians' bowling prove so unequal to the demands of the occasion that Eton registered 431 runs in four hours and three quarters but their batting broke down in such miserable fashion that whereas, after following on 186 behind, the Dark Blues, at quarter to four on Saturday had 144 on the board with only one man out, the innings by five o'clock was all over for 170. The last eight wickets actually fell in an hour for 26 runs. This further and pronounced failure on the part of Harrow, whose most recent success against Eton dated back to 1908, naturally occasioned general disappointment but there could be no question about the brilliant triumph of the Light Blues being most thoroughly deserved.

Such expectations of victory as Harrow might have entertained were destroyed before lunch time on Friday, A. W. Allen and N. S. Hotchkin, after the former player had enjoyed some luck at the commencement of the contest, obtaining such a remarkable mastery over the bowling that at the interval they had put on 208 runs and were still together. In so doing the two batsmen not only obtained the largest number of runs ever recorded in the Eton and Harrow match before lunch but made the biggest stand for the first wicket in the long history of these games and Allen, by completing his hundred before the adjournment, also established a record.

Three times previously there had been a three-figure first-wicket stand, but always in the second innings. In 1887 Eustace Crawley and J. T. F. Fair made 114 for Harrow's first wicket, twelve years later H. K. Longman and F. C. Grenfell opened Eton's innings by putting on 167 in two hours and a quarter and in 1923 E. W. Dawson and W. P. Thursby shared in an Eton first-wicket partnership which reached 111.

In making their record stand of 208 runs, Allen and Hotchkin were at the wickets for two hours and a half, the partnership coming to an end in the first over after lunch when a catch at slip off a ball which seemed to hang a little disposed of Allen. When once set Allen batted in most attractive fashion, playing in almost faultless style as well as with delightful freedom. Indeed he brought his score to 50 in seventy minutes and hit in all thirteen 4's. The credit of a memorable performance, however, had been somewhat discounted by a chance which Allen gave to second slip in the first over of the match. That batsman, moreover, when 22, offered a palpable and fairly easy catch to Heinemann behind the wicket, the total at that point standing at 38. Thenceforward, however, Allen's batting, apart from a faulty stroke towards mid-on, called for almost unstinted praise. While overshadowed by his partner, Hotchkin accomplished a highly creditable piece of work in completing his 50 in little more than an hour and a half.

Slight rain delayed the resumption by ten minutes the umpires, after making their way to mid field, being driven back and immediately after Allen's dismissal another shower interrupted the game for twenty minutes. The opening pair having placed Eton in such a commanding position, Atkinson-Clark at once hit out and so naturally had a short stay but Hotchkin, when 95, was let off from the easiest of chances to short-leg. Hogg helped Hotchkin to put on 58 for the third wicket in fifty minutes and after Hogg's departure Gosling and Hotchkin hit up 72 in thirty-five minutes, the tea interval arriving with the total at 368 for three Subsequently 63 more runs were obtained in half an hour, Atkinson-Clark declaring at a quarter-past five. Fourth out at 399, Hotchkin, apart from the simple catch he offered when 95, had batted in very fine form for rather more than four hours and a half. He did not drive with any great power but, with eleven 4's among his hits, he scored cleverly by all the other recognised strokes. Let off twice, after Hotchkin's departure, Gosling batted with such freedom and vigour that he had nine 4's in his 73 which he put together in sixty-five minutes.

Exactly an hour and half remained for play when Blackmore and Tindall entered upon Harrow's task of making the 332 runs required to avert a follow-on. In Page and Hanbury Eton had two faster bowlers than any at the command of

Harrow. A capital struggle took place and although Tindall and Blackmore were both out by the time the total reached 54, Gascoyne and Covington batted with so much skill during the last fifty minutes of the day that at the drawing of stumps, Harrow had 109 runs on the board and only two men out.

Next morning a yorker from Page at once broke up the excellent partnership of Gascoyne and Covington and soon all likelihood of the Dark Blues escaping a follow-on had disappeared. Covington hit away in fine style and Cive drove well but the eight wickets which had remained when play ceased on Friday went down for 136 runs. Eton certainly fielded with much keenness and there always seemed plenty of life about their bowling even if Hanbury scarcely realised expectations and Page, straining himself, had no part in the final phase of the contest. Curiously enough Harrow, despite the anxieties of their position, exercised no restraint. Indeed, if adding no more than 136 runs, they obtained these at the rate of about 90 an hour. The big element in the speedy dismissal of Harrow was the work not primarily of either of the fast bowlers but the mediumpace bowling of Baker who, after disposing of Haslewood and Benn, finished off the innings in company with Page, sending back Couper and Las Casas in one over while Page, with following balls, disposed of Heinemann and Hopton. In all the Harrovians' innings lasted only just over three hours.

Entering upon their second innings forty minutes before the luncheon interval, Harrow were given a capital start by Blackmore and Tindall who at the adjournment had knocked off 49 of the arrears of 186. Again, on returning to the field, the two Harrovians settled down in most promising form, Blackmore driving hard to the off, and Tindall scoring chiefly to the on. Not only did Blackmore reach his 50 but the 100 appeared with all ten wickets standing. A ball which kept low brought Blackmore's excellent innings to an end at 101 but another hour passed by before any further success attended the efforts of Eton. Tindall played extremely well during this period and he and Gascoyne might have placed their side almost safe from defeat had not Gascoyne devoted himself so exclusively to defence that in the hour he obtained no more than six runs. A little more enterprise during this period would quite possibly have made all the difference to Harrow. As it was the total was taken to 144 and the Dark Blues prospects of escaping defeat had become quite rosy when a catch at the wicket disposed of Tindall who had withstood the Eton attack for more than two hours. For the moment Harrow, thanks to what Blackmore and Tindall had accomplished, looked sure to save the game without serious difficulty.

Immediately afterwards, however, came the extraordinary collapse. Baker with the third ball of an over had Gascoyne caught at the wicket and with the afth got Haslewood leg-before while the sixth-a yorker-shattered Benn's wicket. These three disasters all occurred with the total at 147. Eight runs later a catch low down at cover point sent back Covington and Clive was brilliantly taken at forward short leg. The tea interval being at hand, Atkinson-Clark took off Baker in favour of Hanbury whose first ball dismissed Las Casas and so at the adjournment there were eight men out for 159. On resuming Hanbury bowled in very erratic fashion but he managed to hit the wickets of Heinemann and Couper, and Harrow being all out for 170, Eton were left with a truly remarkable victory by an innings and 16 runs. Baker, a bowler with a habit of swinging his arms in peculiar fashion just before he delivers the ball, had a very big share in the triumph of Eton, disposing of five batsmen for 14 runs and coming out with the splendid record for the match of nine wickets for less than seven runs apiece. In the course of the match no fewer than 70 byes were given away-45 by Baerlein who for all that showed much keenness and no little ability as a wicket-keeper. If dull at times the weather proved favourable and the game attracted a large company each day.

Eight of Eton's victorious eleven had taken part in the previous year's contest, but only four members of the Harrow team played against Eton in 1930.

Played at Lord's, Monday, Tuesday, July 27, 28. - Not until after three o'clock on Monday did the state of the ground allow of Clifton and Tonbridge beginning their annual contest and later on rain caused a delay of nearly half an hour. Play indeed on the opening day was restricted to two hours and forty minutes but for all that Clifton succeeded in putting together a first innings of 208. In achieving so much Clifton were mainly indebted to Tovey who, going in second wicket down with the total only three, hit away so brilliantly that in an hour and three-quarters he made 99 out of 161. Playing some particularly fine forcing strokes. Tovey excelled on the leg-side and had four 6's and nine 4's in a remarkably fine innings. Cornes helped him to add 71. The other batsmen could do little with Morrison who accomplished a splendid bowling performance. Tonbridge next morning had three men out for 25 but then came some great work by Crouch who put on 55 with Morton and 92 in seventy minutes with Haines. Apart from a chance when 30 Crouch batted admirably. For all that Tonbridge had six wickets down for 188. Morrison, however, followed up his skilful bowling with an admirable display of batting and, the last two men giving unexpected trouble, Tonbridge secured a lead of 117. Any expectations Tonbridge might have cherished of forcing a win were destroyed by Kinnersley and Cornes, both of whom played excellent cricket. In the end, Clifton with five wickets down, were 78 runs ahead.

RUGBY v. MARLBOROUGH.

Played at Lord's, Wednesday, Thursday, July 29, 30. — Late on Wednesday Marlborough established a big advantage over Rugby and in the course of the next afternoon gained a victory by seven wickets. Going in first, Rugby actually lost four wickets to MacNamara and Mole for eight runs—only one from the bat. Pridmore and Walford checked the "rot," putting on 60 for the fifth wicket in forty minutes, but the whole side were out in less than an hour and a half for 92, Mole disposing of five batsmen for 21 and MacNamara of three for 12. An exciting struggle appeared in prospect when, on Marlborough going in, Gemmill's fast bowling proved so deadly that six wickets fell for 74. There ensued, however, some brilliant hitting by Walker who, with two 6's and nine 4's as his chief strokes, shared in a remarkable partnership with Martin–Jenkins that yielded 90 runs in forty minutes. Thanks to this stand, Marlborough secured a lead of 114. Next day Rugby had lost half their wickets before the arrears were cleared off and although Jackson batted pluckily for an hour, they could only set Marlborough 62 to make—a task accomplished in three-quarters of an hour at a cost of three wickets. Mole, again disposing of five Rugby batsmen, made his record for the match ten wickets for less than seven runs apiece.

They owed much to Brettell their captain who, given a "life" when 32, made 103 out of 190 in rather less than three hours, bringing off some particularly good strokes in front of the wicket. Sedgwick partnered Brettell in a stand which yielded 116 runs in 100 minutes. Failing to seize the opportunities so offered, Haileybury had to pay a big price for their blunders. Brettell turned his luck to good account and in the end Haileybury were set to make 287—a task altogether beyond the powers of that team.
