PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1932.

The opening of the 1932 season did not foreshadow the glories that were in store. For the most part cold and wet, May saw many matches left unfinished but June and July brought real cricket weather and runs came easily. There was, however, a tendency towards slow scoring and a general desire to make the side absolutely safe before closing the innings—reasonable, perhaps, in an interschool match, but against the spirit of the game and bad policy from The fielding team the point of view of the declaring captain. possess a better chance of victory when their opponents have time to get the runs but, if no such opportunity is given, the game is apt to degenerate into an uninteresting draw. There were many St. Edwards', after declaring, lost their exceptions to this habit. first two matches at Oxford just on time. Victory, too, became a secondary consideration to the enjoyment of a fine finish at Oundle where after a sporting declaration at the fall of the sixth wicket by Stowe, the home school managed to win in the last over by two wickets.

Practice was so much interrupted that the earlier matches in May found many schools in a state of only half preparation, and Oakham did not play their opening game until the last day of the month. Small wonder that the school did little against the bowling of Robinson and Oates, the Nottingham professors. Young batsmen are seldom seen to advantage on slow wickets, as they lack sufficient power in forcing strokes, and the bowlers, for their part, have not the knowledge necessary to take advantage of the conditions. some good performances were achieved. In the opening match at Tonbridge the captain, Crouch, took five of the Town wickets, including the "hat trick," for no runs. Later, at Mill Hill, four of the last five Repton Pilgrims fell to Down, without cost, and Evans performed the rare feat of taking, at a cost of 41 runs, all ten

wickets for Caterham.

The first week of June brought improved weather. Better batting at once became noticeable and interesting events occurred at certain schools. Remarkable hitting took place at Marlborough, where the College scored 457 runs in four hours, Courtenay and Napper each making a hundred; and a few days later Bartlett and Bennett put on 229 runs in one hundred minutes for the second wicket of Dulwich against Brighton. Uppingham won three School matches in an innings and had no superior among the schools. A sound batting side, with a great variety of bowlers, they have lost only one match in the last two seasons and then they went for a win when they might easily have drawn the game. For the first time for over 50 years Rugby beat the Old Rugbeians, a feature of the match being the wicket-keeping of Cranston, who claimed seven victims and gave away no byes in the first innings.

The passing of an old school is always a matter for regret. Founded in 1698, Stramongate, the old Kendal Quaker School where David Livingstone and other famous men received their education, closed down at the end of the Summer term and the Past

v. Present match was played for the last time.

Everything promised well for the all-important fortnight at Lord's but, following a change in the weather in the last week of July, the batting proved disappointing, few players doing themselves justice. The bowling on the whole proved of good length and considering the slippery ground the fielding as it should do approached a high standard. The teams, as usual, were selected most carefully, but it is always inevitable that there must be many young players of ability for whom places cannot be found. Among others, Garnett (Charterhouse), Sullivan (Shrewsbury), Barnby (Sedbergh), (who shaped so well in the Under XVI match in 1930), Horton (Shrewsbury), Dollery (Reading) (who was unable to accept the M.C.C.'s invitation) and Cranmer (St. Edward's) would not have weakened the batting. Walford (Rugby), Judge (St. Paul's), W. Wooller (Rydal), W. C. and K. J. Burton (Kingston), Caruana (Oratory), and Packe (Stowe) showed exceptional promise as all-rounders. Though there was a shortage of fast bowlers, more than one who had shaped well the previous year failing to come up to expectations, Baraldi (Uppingham) and Trevaskis (Marlborough)—both fast medium right—and Noble (Bedford), Ballance (Uppingham), Armitstead (Shrewsbury), Venn (Wellington), Reynolds (Cranleigh), and Dobson (Oratory)—all left handers—did consistently good work,

Wicket-keeping has reached a high standard at the Public Schools and Waddilove (Ampleforth), a "keeper" of real merit, especially strong on the leg side, who made a very favourable impression in the Young Surrey Amateur's week at the Oval, must rank among the best of recent years. Winlaw (Winchester), Cullin (Rossall), Naylor (Mill Hill), King (Taunton), Warr (Bromsgrove) all rose above the average

Again I have to thank the many kind correspondents who have supplied me with information. In one or two cases no communication has reached me, and some arrived too late for publication.

From the point of view of the Lord's Schools, who had an admittedly powerful batting side, the match against The Rest proved a disappointment. No play was possible after lunch on the first day and only Tindall, Seamer, and Morrison batted well, the last-named hitting with delightful freedom. On a sodden, slow pitch Cameron, the Taunton googly bowler, accomplished a fine performance in taking all seven wickets and next day he finished off the innings: his full analysis reading 19.1 overs, 3 maidens, 49 runs, 10 wickets. Walker played up to his reputation, and Bartlett, the Dulwich left-hander, hit well in front of the wicket, but five Rest wickets fell for 60, before Watson, another left hander with an average of over 100 for the last two years, Mitchell-Innes, and Savage produced the best batting of the day.

Little fault could be found with the selection of the Public Schools XI against the Army—none at all so far as the bowlers were concerned—and at one time it seemed likely that the not too powerful Army batting side would be out for under 100. However, C. W. C. Packe, who played a beautiful innings of 108, and Tyler, pulled the game round. Against the moderate score of 219, the Schools, losing their last six wickets for 12 runs, fared badly, finishing 93 behind. The Army declared their second innings closed leaving just over 300 to get. All went well with the Schools at the start, but there came another collapse. In the two innings the last seven batsmen—all of whom had at one time or another, put together scores of over 50, and the majority had made hundreds for their schools—could do no better than aggregate 37!

If the batting in the Army match disappointed, the all-round cricket of the Young Amateurs against the Young Professionals on the two following days was even less impressive. With the exception of Whitaker, who just missed his century and showed a variety of strokes on the on side, Geen, his partner in a stand of 107 for the first wicket, and Jacobs, a stylish batsman, the side failed lamentably in the first imnings, and but for one or two brief partnerships, the second was equally undistinguished.

The Under XVI game between the Lord's XI and Mr. Carleton Tufnell's XI, invariably introduces some promising youngsters, and the cricket last season was as varied as the physique of the players. The wicket gave the bowlers little assistance, but D.W. Gillespie (Uppingham) kept a very steady length and T. Ohlson (Harrow), F. W. Mason (Bruton), and C. A. Holliman (Dulwich), all shaped favourably. The batting for the most part lacked enterprise, too much respect being accorded to half volleys. R. P. P. Powell (Charterhouse) the outstanding batsman in the first innings of Mr. Tufnell's XI, registered 72 in an hour in the second when runs were wanted quickly. H. Lee (R.N.C. Dartmouth), revealed good

style behind the wicket and the fielding was fair, but the running between wickets and judgment of a run left something to be desired.

The weather did not favour the Young Amateurs of Surrey in their annual week at the Oval, and only one match could be finished, Essex being beaten by an innings and 21 runs. The features of the week were the batting of Bartlett, the left-handed captain of Dulwich, who scored 126 v. Kent, 46 v. Essex—including three 6's out of the ground off consecutive balls—and 110 v. Sussex, and the all-round work of the Rugby captain, K. L. T. Jackson, who took nine wickets and played innings of 47, 135, and 70. Knight, of Uppingham, with a chanceless innings of 126—his first century in any class of cricket—put on 165 with Dinwiddy (Radley) for the first Kent wicket, and J. C. Wykes (Oundle) hit very hard in making 81 for Essex. Waddilove the Ampleforth wicket-keeper fully justified his reputation. Taking the ball smartly on the leg side, he caught two and stumped two Surrey batsmen and, against some erratic bowling, gave away only 7 byes in an innings of 420.

The Eton and Harrow match was in a sense disappointing. Suffering from a strain Baker, who had determined Harrow's defeat the previous year, was unable to bowl at his best, and Hedley, their most dangerous scorer, whose hard-hit 72 had much to do with saving the Winchester match, could not play, so that Eton had little to hope for but a draw. That they accomplished this was entirely due to the remarkable batting of Hotchkin, who narrowly failed to equal the record of two hundreds in the match set up by M. C. Bird for Harrow in 1907. If unattractive to watch, he showed no deficiency in strokes and displayed inexhaustible patience. Every one regretted that yorker from Simpson which deprived Hotchkin by 4 runs of the almost unassailable record of three consecutive centuries in this annual fixture. Beautiful innings by Tindall and Gascoyne, a painstaking century by Pulbrook, and some hitting by Clive, looked like giving Harrow a chance of victory at long last, but two overs by Turnbull dashed these hopes and interest in the game evaporated.

Thanks to fine forcing batting by Hedley and a brave last wicket stand between Turnbull and Birkbeck, Eton just managed to save the game with Winchester who, with all their wickets in hand, needed 19 runs to win at the end of the extra half-hour. Winchester took the honours, but an injury to Baker—"hors de combat" for a fortnight before the match through a strained arm—handicapped Eton, who, however, had one consolation in the success in each innings of their three youngest batsmen.

The weather again spoiled Clifton and Tonbridge at Lord's, no play being possible on the first day. With little prospect of a definite decision being reached, interest centred in individual

performances. Kinnersley, the Clifton captain, going in first, carried his bat through the innings, his superb 95 providing evidence that the Clifton boys do not believe in letting the ball hit the bat. On a dead wicket Vickers also hit well, while Morrison of Tonbridge showed admirable all-round form.

So bad were the conditions for Rugby v. Marlborough that had it been other than a School match there probably would have been no play. As it was cricket was restricted to the opening day. In the circumstances, criticism would be absurb and it is sufficient to say that Jackson, captain of Rugby for the second year, still further enhanced his reputation as a medium-paced bowler; West, swinging in late from the off, proved dangerous, and Cranston shaped like a real wicket-keeper. When Marlborough batted between the showers Walker, who saved the side the previous year, Alston and Napper alone offered much resistance.

Though play did not commence on the first day until 1.30 the Cheltenham and Haileybury match, as often in previous years, was favoured with the best weather of the Schools week. Haileybury certainly deserved their victory, their batting on a dead wicket being the more enterprising and their bowling possessing greater variety. It was in fielding, however, that the winners chiefly demonstrated a superiority, a number of quite exceptional catches being effected. Cheltenham, batting on a difficult pitch, faced a hopeless task. They followed-on 117 behind and broke down so badly before the immaculate length bowling of Romer as to be dismissed a second time for 77.

Eton had only three old colours and, as the poor quality of the 16-year-old game in 1930 and 1931 foreshadowed, a shortage of promising new material caused difficulty in building up a side. Baker, the captain, could bowl well enough at times to run through a side, but there existed no one else outstanding in the attack. Hotchkin was a sound No. 1 batsman and Hedley, who secured a place in 1931 largely on his fielding, had possibilities as a hitter. The one position easy to fill was that of wicket-keeper. Bewicke and Branch both useful bats, were good enough from the start. May brought no new discoveries, but by early June the appearance of Boyd, a left hander who looked like quite a good partner for Hotchkin, Stevens, a sound and watchful No. 3, Bewicke at No. 4, and Dixon No. 5, improved the outlook, but apart from Baker, the bowling, consisting of Turnbull (fast medium), Birkbeck (slow left), Turner (medium) and Hotchkin (leg breaks), remained ordinary. Then Baker revived an old strain in his arm, and, out of the game for a fortnight, was able to bowl only at half speed in the Winchester match. The one redeeming feature at Winchester-apart from a general display of grit on the second day and a fine innings by Hedley-lay in the

fact that all three 16-year-olds did excellently. These were Dixon, Birkbeck and Johnson—a son of P. R. Johnson—who had come in a fortnight earlier. Things went from bad to worse. Baker just got fit for Lord's, but had had practically no practice for a month; Hedley became ill and was not considered well enough to be anything but 12th man-wretched luck for him and the side. Boyd strained a leg muscle and though limping badly in the match itself, could not be replaced. As it was, Eton, mainly through a monumental effort by Hotchkin and two inspired overs by Turnbull at a critical period, came out as well as could have been expected. If Hotchkin stays on he will captain the side this year; the other old choices remaining are Bewicke, Boyd, Dixon, Turnbull, Birkbeck and Johnson.

Harrow suffered even more misfortune in the matter of weather than most schools. Of the 12 matches arranged, that against Marlborough was abandoned without a ball being bowled, 8 others were unfinished, including those with Eton and Winchester, 2 won, and I lost. In most games the scoring was high on both sides, Harrow possessing a powerful run-getting team and bowling of moderate character. Tindall fully realised expectations after the hopes he raised in 1931. An ideal opening batsman he watched the ball right up to the bat; he also possessed enterprise and a variety of strokes. Pulbrook, a left-hander with a dour defence, proved an admirable partner for him and came into his own at Lord's. Gascoyne never really settled down but played a beautiful innings at Lord's, and Covington, Clive, Haslewood and Borwick made the batting decidedly formidable. Covington and Tindall were largely responsible for the two victories, retrieving a bad start in a masterly partnership against I.Z., while against Charterhouse each scored his highest innings of the term. Tindall could not play against the Harlequins and in this, the only match lost, E. R. T. Holmes and C. K. Hill-Wood dismissed the first four batsmen without a run being scored—a start from which there came no real recovery. The Eton match "fizzled out." There could be little doubt as to Harrow's superiority but with Strange feeling the effects of a strain, the bowling-at no period in the term at all deadly-never approached its best and the early dismissal of Tindall came as the greatest disappointment of all. Varied bowling found sound support, even if the fielding did not reach the standard of some previous years. Tindall will captain the side this year, and with Pulbrook as an opening batsman, Heaton the wicket keeper, and Strange and Simpson to bear the burden of the attack, there is every prospect of another good side.

Inasmuch as Winchester defeated Marlborough, played a more or less level draw with Harrow, and were robbed by only a small margin of time of decisive victories over Eton and Charterhouse,

they had clear claims to be rated as a school eleven of more than usual strength. The batting, handicapped by one of the wettest Mays on record at Winchester, took some time to mature, but in the Eton match revealed much more than average strength; the bowling just lacked the variety and penetration of attack necessary to raise the team from a side very hard to beat to one difficult to hold. Savage, fast-medium with a fine high action and a stout heart; Awdry, who flighted the ball well, and Lee occasionally using spin to good purpose, proved steady, but a bowler of real pace was needed and still more a leg-spinner. Thus, though supported by good fielding and, in Winlaw, a wicket-keeper well up to the average, the attack never became more than reasonably effective. Of the batting a different story can be told. In Bousfield and White Winchester had a most successful opening pair, who scored over 100 together against both Charterhouse and Marlborough and failed by only one run to repeat the feat against Eton. White, very straight and sound, possessed an imperturbable temperament and Bousfield showed himself a really gifted batsman with great ease of stroke play, his 80 against Eton being an innings of quite unusual mastery. To support these two there were Robertson, an attractive left-hander, Barton—scorer of 134 against Eton—and Leigh, not quite orthodox but a forcing player who may become first-class. Lee, an excellent captain, reached his best in tactics and personal leadership in the long fight aginst Eton. This year Winlaw, as captain, will have Bousfield and Barton to form the nucleus of his batting but bowlers will have to be found.

Rugby were a much better side than for some years, the bowling and fielding being strong and the batting far more consistent. Of the school matches, two were unfinished and one lost-to Clifton after a great game by three wickets. Against the powerful Uppingham XI, who declared at 272 for six wickets, Rugby scored 198 for eight wickets, and in the rain-ruined match at Lord's they got down eight Marlborough wickets for 36 runs by lunch on the first day, but no further play took place. The defeat of the Old Rugbeians formed a feature of the term's cricket, this being the School's first victory in the annual game for over fifty years. The foundation of the success was laid by Steel and Clark, the former playing capital innings of 77 and 41. Jackson and Gemmill took the bowling honours. Jackson, a first-rate leader, did not show his true batting form until the holiday matches, but he bowled consistently well. Right hand, bringing the arm well over, he with his fast-medium bowling contrasted strongly with the left hand deliveries of Gemmill, whose accuracy improved considerably. Walford was the most promising all-rounder on the side; with his slow left-hand spinners he took seven for 68 v. Foresters, and five for 72 v. M.C.C.

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West also bowled eleverly at times. Above medium pace, he swung in late and at Lord's he took four Marlborough wickets for 12 runs. Apart from Clark and Steel, the opening pair, the mainstays of the batting were Baker, who registered 101 against the Foresters and Walford 100 v. Leamington, 63 v. Foresters and 50 v. Old Rugbeians, Cranston, a quiet and efficient wicket-keeper, should be very good this year. Catching six and stumping one, he had a big hand in the victory over the Old Boys. With Gemmill captain, and Walford. Baker, Dowson, Cranston, Watts and West remaining, the outlook for 1933 is very bright.

Public School Cricket in 1932.

Though a good side, Marlborough scarcely did themselves justice in their school matches. At Winchester they bowled really well and the home side had to fight for their total of 197. Mariborough had time to make the runs and though the ball did not run easily to the boundary, with 100 up for four wickets they were level with the clock. However, efforts to force the pace led to disaster and the School lost a match that at one time they looked sure to win. At Wellington much the same thing occurred. A thunderstorm had made the wicket nasty and a score of 178 was not too bad, With six Wellington wickets down for 103, the visitors were in a strong position, and even if they failed to win Marlborough seemed to be safe for a draw. Olivier and Munro, however, pulled the game round, and Wellington snatched a victory by three wickets five minutes before time. Cheltenham were well beaten, not a ball could be bowled in the Harrow match and between showers less than two hours' play was possible with Rugby at Lord's. Against the clubs the School did very well. Seamer, a sound captain, played a straight bat, watched the ball carefully and at cover point set an excellent example in the field. Alston, if batting with less dash than in the previous year, was, with Waddy, as reliable as ever in opening the innings, but Courtenay, beautifully free, appeared apt to "nibble" at the rising ball on the off side. Walker brought into play some powerful strokes in front of the wicket and to leg. Trevaskis and Duggan, both fastish, the former a really good bowler with a new ball, and Duggan, with a puzzling swing, formed the backbone of a varied attack. Russell Smith, a good length and dangerous in-swinger, Napper, slow left-hand, and Pawle, who could swing from leg, and on a helpful wicket turn the ball quickly from the off, were useful changes. With Napper, a capable all-rounder. Alston, Trevaskis, Waddy and Adlard—a promising wicket keeper again available, Marlborough have the nucleus of a good side this vear.

Cheltenham can seldom have had so poor a season. Of thirteen matches played, they won only one—and that against a scratch side at the very beginning of the season. All four School matches ended in heavy defeats. At Marlborough the side, coming suddenly on to a fast wicket, gave an indifferent batting display and were out for 153 and 94, while missed catches helped Marlborough to a total of 457. Against Malvern also the fielding was bad and Malvern with only two wickets down passed Cheltenham's 168. In the Clifton match the "out" work improved, but the batting still lacked determination, and the side collapsed in the second innings for 94. It is interesting to speculate what might have happened at Lord's, had the catching of the two sides been reversed, for Haileybury held five really remarkable catches and Cheltenham missed five "possibles." Throughout the season the bowling proved steady, Whitehead, doing a little in the air either way, often had the batsmen in trouble and Robinson accomplished some good performances. Cohen and Scrafton could each bowl a very difficult ball, but sometimes became expensive. Dracopoli, with a dangerous off-break, should be useful this year. Fairweather, a very good cover point, set his side an example in the field, but as a batsman failed to get going: Cohen was a real trier all through and Leeming could drive well, but the most dangerous bat on the side was the left-hander, Sewell, and nothing finer than his driving through the covers in his 172 against the Old Cheltonians has been seen on the College ground for a long time. On that occasion the College ran up a score of 516 for seven wickets, Leeming scoring 109 not out. Norris, Arengo-Jones and Dracopoli remain for this year.

The Haileybury season bore a similarity to that of many Schools, four of the fifteen fixtures being scratched on account of the weather. Seven matches were won, three lost and one drawn. The side took a long time to settle down and though eight batsmen were capable of big scores, seldom did more than three meet with success in any one match. Evers showed himself the best and soundest batsman in the eleven, Ehrke the most brilliant, but a shaky starter, and Osborne a distinctly useful opening partner to Evers. Haileybury's strength lay in the bowling, backed up by brilliant fielding. Allen, though rarely finding a wicket to suit him, bowled magnificently all the season, and found inclusion in the representative side against The Army. He took over fifty wickets for 10 runs apiece. Darewski, slow left hand, Barton, leg-breaks and googlies; Romer and Scott off-breaks, and Mayhew, fast left, completed a varied Only at Uppingham where the side, weefully short of practice, broke down in batting, and in the re-arranged one-day fixture with Wellington, did the bowling really fall short of requirements. The fielding reached its zenith at Lord's where nothing better has been seen in School cricket for years. Ehrke on the off-side, Barton in the gully, Mayhew close to the wicket, besides Romer and Williams were all brilliant and Hayles showed soundness behind the stumps. Barton, the new captain, has the nucleus of a good side

left in Darewski, Mayhew and Hayles.

If not such a sound eleven as in the previous year, Clifton, as regards results, had a thoroughly good season. Of eleven matches played they won six, drew four and lost only one-to a strong team of Free Foresters. In inter-school matches they beat Rugby by three wickets and Cheltenham by 187 runs. As has happened so often rain ruined the Tonbridge game. Kinnersley, in his fourth yearin the eleven. practically carried the side on his shoulders, as the averages demonstrate. Besides scoring two centuries-170 v. M.C.C. and 113 v. Cheltenham-he played through the innings against Tonbridge at Lord's for 95, and was not out 92 against Gentlemen of Worcestershire. Considering the cares of captaincy and how much depended on him, his batting was wonderfully free. In the circumstances, it could not be regarded as surprising that his success with the ball fell below that of 1931, though his possibilities as a bowler impressed Somerset when he was tried for the County in August. Pickles, Vickers, and Monteath gave him best support in run-getting. Easily the outstanding bowler, Coachafer (right hand slow medium spinners) had he not missed two matches through examinations would almost certainly have got over fifty wickets. Vickers and Howard-Smith rendered useful assistance at times, the latter having one brilliant morning, when he dismissed the first five Liverpool batsmen for 11 runs. The fielding improved as the term progressed. Jones, who had kept wicket in the two previous seasons, gave up the gloves to Nuttall, a brother of the 1931 captain, who showed promising form. Only three old colours are expected back and the new side will be very young.

During an exceptionally successful season, in the course of which eight matches were won and only one lost, Tonbridge were served by four consistent run-getters—Crouch, the captain, Morrison, Morton and Brown. The first two, with assistance from Harding, Albertin and Scoones also bowled very well. The most notable win was over a strong M.C.C. side, when Crouch and Morrison bowled splendidly and Morrison played a fine innings of 97. The School also defeated Sherborne and Lancing—Morrison took ten wickets for 76 runs against the latter—and played drawn games with Dulwich and Clifton. Against Tonbridge Town, Crouch, going on as second change, took five wickets including the "hat trick" in seven overs without cost. He and Morrison played for the Lord's Schools v. The Rest, and Morrison, who also figured in the Public Schools XI against The Army, will captain the eleven this year with Harding, Brooks Scoones and Ball again available.

On the whole the Repton XI of 1932 showed better results than that of the preceding summer. No run-getter of the calibre of J. H. Human came to light—indeed the batting often disappointed—but the side scored more evenly. In an attack definitely stronger

Beaumont's leg-breaks formed a feature, but the fielding with the exception of that of Mendl, the wicket-keeper, and Harris, who saved many runs at cover point, fell below standard. In short, a weaker team than usual, but one which manifested great improvement towards the end of the season. So little play could take place early in the Term that an untried side met Shrewsbury on the first hard wicket of the year, an innings defeat resulting, and against Uppingham—a match nearly spoilt by the weather—Repton were outplayed by a really good school side. A cheerful conclusion to the fixture list, however, came at Malvern, where after a grim and fluctuating struggle, the Repton bowlers won the day. Mendl, an enthusiastic captain, Fallows, Beaumont, Simpson and Montgomery will be available again, with W. Payton, the old Notts player, once more assisting in the coaching.

Malvern possessed very useful bowling but inconsistent batting prevented them from becoming a really formidable side. weather in May caused two matches to be scratched and, preventing real practice until the season was well advanced, accounted to some extent for the low scores. Malvern gained victories over Wadham College and Christ Church—the latter by three runs in a very exciting finish when the last four wickets of the "House" fell for four runs-and lost to Free Foresters by ten wickets (the bowling of R. C. Robertson-Glasgow proved a feature of this game) and to a strong Old Malvernian XI by five wickets. In the School matches they beat Cheltenham and Shrewsbury by eight wickets and three wickets respectively, and suffered defeat by 38 runs at the hands of Repton. Peake, who captained the side with good judgment recorded the only century. Byass bore the main part in the attack and bowled very steadily, his best performance being thirteen wickets for 144 runs against Free Foresters. D'Ambrumenil, Cope, Leeson, Fry and Hampson are left for this year.

While Shrewsbury won only two matches as against six lost and four unfinished, they had a much better season than these figures suggest. The two victories were in inter-school matches, Repton and Rossall being beaten in convincing style, and defeat from Malvern came by only two wickets after an exciting finish. Uppingham, who had probably the best all-round side in all the schools, beat them in an innings, the other substantial reverse being at the hands of Shrewsbury Saracens, who brought down almost their best possible eleven. The School's performances against M.C.C. who just managed to play out time, and Free Foresters—victorious by four runs—were most creditable. The bowling turned out to be a little stronger than the steady rather then brilliant batting. Butterworth, who made full use of a good pair of wrists, played fine innings against Repton, Rossall and Free Foresters. He received able support from

Sullivan, the captain, who also gave some admirable displays. Best, a promising left-hander, Cramsie, McIrose, Leigh-Bennett and Singleton batted creditably at times and the last-named should make many runs next term. Armitstead, fast medium left-hand, with swerve and the left hander's break, Cramsie, medium right hand, Singleton, leg-breaks with an occasional googly, Butterworth and Sullivan, who could both spin the ball, formed the attack. Singleton, Leigh-Bennett, Watkinson, Best and Darbyshire return this year.

So successful a season did Uppingham enjoy in 1931, thanks largely to J. D. Parkinson, D. V. Ibbotson and D. L. K. Milman, who between them took ninety-three wickets for just over 12 runs apiece, that in the absence of these three bowlers troublous times were feared. Under the captaincy of Walker, who had proved himself one of the soundest School batsmen of the previous year and an able leader, however, the new side developed into one of the best, if not the best School eleven of the year, all but repeating their feat of 1931 in going through the season without defeat. Walker being admirably seconded by Gillespie, the batting became even more consistent than in 1931. To four bowlers of more than average merit—Baraldi, fast medium; Ames, slightly faster; Ballance, left-hand, and Green, a right-hand spinner, with Gillespie and Williamson as changes, the catching and ground fielding afforded fine support, Henry and Williamson being most dependable in the slips and Knight quiet and efficient behind the wicket. Walker, who also showed splendid form for Norfolk, had an average of 80 and provided the feature of the term's cricket in a great innings of 224 not out-only two runs short of the School record set up by Clayton Palmer nearly 30 years ago. Baraldi took twenty-four wickets for less than eight runs apiece, including three for 4 v. Haileybury, five for 15 v. Oundle, and six for 27 v. the Old Boys. Ballance also achieved some notable successes. with four for 13 v. Leicester Gentlemen, five for 14 v. Hailevbury, four for 27 v. Old Boys and six for 25 v. Shrewsbury. He later did effective work for Norfolk. Uppingham overcame Haileybury, Repton and Shrewsbury in an innings, Oundle by six wickets and had the best of a drawn game with Rugby. They held a fine record with seven matches won and two drawn, until in the last game of the season, when going all out for a win against time, they lost to Notts Amateurs. With Henry, captain, Williamson, Ballance White, Green and Ames available, Uppingham's prospects for 1933 are again bright.

Wellington, no more fortunate in their trial games than other Schools, placed an eleven of unknown quantity in the field, when Marlborough visited them on June 11. The match provided one of the best finishes seen on the College ground for many years. Marlborough were all out for 178, and with six wickets down and forty-

five minutes left for play Wellington required 76 to win. Munro. the captain, and Olivier set about the task so effectively that the runs were hit off six minutes from time with three wickets to spare. Westminster were soundly beaten by ten wickets, Furlong (92) and Auret (56) hitting off the runs by splendid cricket. Illness caused the cancellation of the Haileybury match, and after nearly three weeks inactivity, the eleven, batting poorly at Bradfield, went down by four wickets, but they returned to form in a hastily arranged one-day game at Haileybury and won on a fast wicket by 42 runs. The games with Charterhouse and Old Wellingtonians were drawn. Furlong and Auret usually gave the side a good start, but the middle batting proved unreliable. Still there is every chance of the first six places of the batting order remaining the same in 1933. The attack had plenty of variety. Loring did a great deal of hard work as a fast bowler; Venn, left-hand slow—the find of the season bowled extremely well against Marlborough and Westminster, Fox-Male, medium right-hand, kept a consistent length, and Munro, medium left, made a useful change. It is hoped that Furlong. Fox-Male, Rawlence, Auret, Forster and Packe will be available this season.

Charterhouse had a poor season, winning but one of 13 matches and losing five. Only four old colours being available many experiments were tried with young players, to whom the experience should prove useful this year. The chief need was a good wicket-keepera position never satisfactorily filled—but the fielding generally attained a very high standard. Dyson, left-hand, and Dunbar nearly always rendered rungetting a slow affair and this, rather than lack of enterprise on the part of the Charterhouse batsmen, caused many drawn games. The batting was rather inclined to tail off after a good start, the best performance of the season being a stand for 110 in just over an hour by Garnett and Henderson against Winchester. Garnett, captain this year, will have with him Richards Powell and Woodbridge.

A very young side Westminster lacked solidity in run-getting, but Angelo, who scored 655 runs with an average of over 50 and made three centuries, stood out conspicuously. He created a favourable impression in the Colts match at Lord's the previous season and should have two more years at the School. Other useful batsmen were Turner, who got runs consistently, Munro and Eggar. If improved in length, the bowling possessed little variety, Brown, Eggar and Grace all being medium-pace right-hand. Johnson, slowleft, who headed the averages with thirty wickets for 26 runs apiece, lacked spin. Brown accomplished one fine performance against Stowe, taking seven wickets for 25 runs. The Sherborne match was scratched owing to illness; the games against Wellington

and Radley were lost, and those with Charterhouse and Stowe drawn, The fielding reached a high standard throughout. Matthews, the captain, earned his place as wicket-keeper for The Rest at Lord's, and did remarkably well, being responsible for six of the twelve "Lord's" wickets which fell. Matthews will captain the eleven for the third year in succession and seven old Pinks-Angelo, Turner, Alderson. Eggar, Grace, Brown and Edgar should be available.

The Westminster and Downside matches being cancelled owing to illness and four others spoilt by rain Sherborne's season proved disappointing. The School lost to Radley by four wickets and to Tonbridge by five wickets, both good games in which at one time Sherborne looked like winning. The bowling generally was steady without being dangerous. Evans and Smith kept a consistent length, but the absence of a player of real pace made itself badly felt. The catching of the side did not reach as high a standard as that of the ground fielding and throwing. Smith is this year's captain and old colours in Cook and Robinson are returning.

Starting the season very well, St. Paul's defeated the Household Brigade, Felsted and Leys with plenty in hand, but, as the term advanced the side became depleted. Rogers felt the strain of bowling. the attack weakened and six defeats were suffered. The weakness in bowling caused Readhead, who otherwise captained the side admirably, to delay his declarations. In batting he showed great enterprise, keeping the score moving after the earlier batsmen had exhibited caution. As Judge and Ffennell-a sound opening pair-Garton, the wicket-keeper, Passmore, North and Fisher return, the eleven should be strong.

Though Dulwich won only 2 matches, drew 10, and lost 2, they could look back on the season with satisfaction. Not for a long time had the batting been so consistent. Bartlett, captain for the second year, again distinguished himself at Lord's and in the Young Amateurs matches at the Oval. He improved his defence without losing any of his fine hitting powers and Bennett, who returned to the team after a year's absence, proved not only an ideal opening batsman but the most consistent player on the side. He and Bartlett put on 229-a school record-for the second wicket against Brighton, 200 runs actually coming in eighty minutes after lunch. Emus made a steady opening partner for Bennett and Jeary, with supple wrists, brought off beautiful strokes, especially on the offside. Griffith played several good innings, notably 97 against Incogniti. The bowling proved the weak feature of the side but Jeary kept a good length and made the ball get up quickly and Holliman, a colt, may develop into a good leg-break bowler above average pace. In contrast to the ground fielding the catching, with the exception of that of Bartlett in the slips and Griffith, in any position, was not consistent. Towards

the end of the term Griffith, after a lapse of three years, took up the responsible position of wicket keeper with conspicuous success. Four of the School matches were drawn-Brighton, Mill Hill, St. Paul's and Tonbridge. The other, against Bedford, Dulwich won with six minutes to spare by 19 runs. Bartlett is again captain and, as Griffith, Blaine and Holliman are staying on and the Second eleven did not suffer a defeat, there is every prospect of another good side being got together.

After an indifferent start, owing to want of practice, Bedford did well under Noble, a slow left-hand bowler and forcing bat. He proved the mainstay of the bowling, taking fifty wickets for 15 runs each. Dangerous with a new ball he invariably kept a good length but will have to cultivate more finger-spin and flight if he is to do well in better cricket. The outstanding batsman was Burrows, who played in several matches in the previous two seasons without securing a regular place in the side. He received good support from Power, a sturdily built and invaluable if unorthodox hitter who nearly pulled the Dulwich match out of the fire. The fielding all through was good, the "bright particular stars" being Golding, anywhere, Lindsay-White in the slips, and Dawe, a thoroughly sound wicket keeper. The St. Paul's match had to be abandoned owing to rain, Leys were beaten easily, close games with Oundle and Dulwich were lost by 7 and 19 runs respectively. Dawe is next year's captain and Golding, Power, Russell, Coleman, Stein and Evans will all be back in addition to Walker and Burton.

Bradfield experienced an interesting season, though they won only four matches against six defeats, their victims included Wellington, Lancing and Stowe. The fielding reached exceptional heights, there being scarcely a dropped catch to set against many of brilliant character—a great asset to a not over strong bowling side. Wright was by far the most successful batsman, particularly in school matches, his best scores including 77 v. Stowe—out of a total of 134 and 72 v. Lancing. Tyndall, late in coming into the side after a severe illness, Rayne and Washington rendered useful assistance. Hughes, the captain, an all rounder was, on his day, a good mediumpaced school bowler with a high, easy action and occasional quick turn from the off. Taking five wickets for 25 runs he won the Stowe match and after bowling really well against Wellington he scored 48 at a crisis and made the winning hit. Higgins, particularly successful against school sides—he took eight wickets for 77 against Lancing—may become a really good slow bowler this year. The School possessed in Hunter a very sound wicket keeper. Most of a strong Second XI are staying, and with Tyndall captain, and Washington, Grey, Wright, Higgins and Usborne of last year's players to help him, the side should be good.

Another successful season rewarded Radley, who won seven, drew six, and lost two of their matches. The eleven failed to do themselves justice against Stowe-the first of the School fixtures and went down by eight wickets but there followed success over Sherborne and thenceforward the side went from victory to victory, beating Lancing by an innings and 201 runs, Bradfield by an innings and 53 runs, and Westminster by 173 runs. In each of these games the School scored over 300 in a single innings, at an average rate of 100 an hour. Dinwiddy, as in the previous season, was the mainstay of the batting and not only invariably made runs himself, but led the side splendidly and set an excellent example in the field. He has become a really good attacking player with improved footwork, a quick eye, powerful wrists and the cricketer's temperament. Guy developed into a magnificent and discreet hitter and the fact that he made three consecutive hundreds in School matches, testifies that he was no mere slogger. Stubbs, this year's captain, played some delightfully free cricket, demonstrating clearly his infinite possibilities, and Hunter and Birks seem bound to make runs this year. The burden of the bowling fell on Stubbs and Mackenzie, the former of whom, though having a good action, bowled erratically. Mackenzie had the great asset of length and could always do just a little with the ball. Egerton showed promise as a slow left hander but the School felt the need of a good fast bowler. The fielding, particularly the catching, was up to standard and Lycett did well behind the wicket. Stubbs will have seven old colours to help him, so that this year can be looked forward to with confidence.

A disappointing side, Rossall won only two of their twelve matches. The old colours fell below expectations and the appalling weather in May made it difficult to bring young players on. Royal-Dawson set his team a fine example in the field and Rossall have seldom been served so well behind the stumps as by Cullin, who has gone to Oxford. Morton, Royal-Dawson—who gave the side a good start in both school matches—Chadwick and Breay did best in rungetting with Beresford, Brookes and Morton the chief bowlers. Royal-Dawson will again captain the side and with Morton, Breay, Beresford, Williams and Oakey to support him, the prospects for 1933 appear much brighter.

With victories over Radley and St. Paul's, a drawn game with Westminster, and narrow defeats by 33 runs from Bradfield, and by two wickets at Oundle, Stove had a satisfactory season. Packe, the captain and mainstay of the side, headed both tables of averages, scoring 606 runs for an average of 50 and taking 36 wickets with his slow left-hand deliveries. Of the other batsmen, Bevis had some beautiful strokes and Smith, though slow on his feet, played more than one good innings. Lucas, after his promise of 1931, rather

disappointed as an all-rounder. The attack lacked sufficient variety, but Ling at the beginning of the season proved successful as a fast bowler. A very useful "stumper" came to light in Mallett, who, with Smith, Hawker, Blois, Ling and Bourne are staying on under the leadership of Lucas.

Starting the campaign rather shakily, Lancing did not come up to expectations. They lost to Radley, Tonbridge and Bradfield in the middle of the season but, later on, under the able captaincy of Read, showed their full capabilities in beating Eastbourne and drawing with Brighton. The most successful and consistent batsmen were Slocock, Read and Pemberton. The bowling rested entirely upon the shoulders of Read and Pemberton, though Manners, a younger member of the side, bowled admirably in the last few games. Pemberton is captain for the coming season and has four old colours to support him including Slocock, Eliot-Lockhart, the wicket-keeper, and Manners, of all of whom much is hoped. As only three members of last year's team have left, there will still be available, besides those mentioned, four other members of the side.

Following several successful seasons, Leys fell below the average. Of the old colours Whitaker, the captain, and Holloway were inconsistent and injury prevented Glendinning from playing at all. Bate batted brilliantly at times. Of the bowlers Williams, who turned the ball sharply from leg, did well but, like most of his kind, lacked certainty in length. Eastman and Sykes proved steady mediumpaced right handers and Crawford did useful service. No School match ended in victory though those with Oundle, when Holloway and Bate put on 142 for the fifth wicket, and with Felsted were drawn. A victory over the M.C.C. by 40 runs stood out as the best performance of the eleven. Six old colours, including the most successful players, will be available this year.

Oundle played twelve matches, winning four, drawing six and losing two. Rain accounted for most of the drawn games, three of which ended distinctly in favour of the school. In the school contests victories were gained over Bedford and Stowe, that with Leys ending in a draw and that with Uppingham being lost. Geen, the captain and easily the most consistent bat, possessed both wide variety of stroke and good defence. Fyfe played some hard-hit innings and Field, Raymond and Chase also batted well. Most of the work in bowling devolved upon Fyfe, who showed valuable allround form and Field and Stuart rendered him able support.

With seven old colours, including Wright, the previous year's captain, and Dyer and Hurn, who had also been in the eleven three years, Mill Hill looked to have every prospect of developing into one of the strongest sides that had represented the school for some

time. Unfortunately, however, bad weather interfered so seriously with practice that not until July did the whole team find their form. The season finished with victories over Cranleigh, Leys and a Hampstead C.C. XI, and a very creditable draw with M.C.C. Wright and Clark formed a useful opening pair, supported soundly by Kent and Hurn; and Wright, Down and Dyer worked hard as chief members of the attack. Naylor, a useful batsman and efficient wicket-keeper, Murray Wood, a promising young all-rounder, and Gotch are the old colours left.

With five victories Merchant Taylors had a much better season than for some years. Much of the general improvement could be traced to the captaincy of Elston, who played a prominent part behind the stumps. Booth's all-round cricket, too, was a feature of the season. The steadiest batsman on the side, he shared with Quayle the distinction of being the most successful bowler. Camp made great strides as a batsman, and Vernon and Balkwill put on 101—the biggest partnership of the term—for the second wicket against Dover. Piper, who succeeds Elston in the captaincy, proved a sound opening bat. This year, when the matches will be played on the new ground at Sandy Lodge, he will have the assistance of Quayle, Gibbon, Balkwill and Camp.

Brighton's outlook at the beginning of the season was rather gloomy, but despite lack of early practice the results proved satisfactory, five matches being won, one lost and eight unfinished. In inter-school matches they beat St. Paul's, the other four being drawn. If there was no outstanding batsman, some one always rose to the occasion when collapse seemed imminent. The strength of the side lay in the attack and the four stock bowlers, Crawford, Dodd, Mason and Dowding, did splendid work. To the fielding of the team fell most credit for a successful season. Lenton, the captain, set the example; many brilliant catches were brought off and few runs given away. This year's captain has not yet been elected but probably the following old colours will be available—Dodd, John, Secretan, Buckley, Crawford, Paterson, Dowding and Minton.

Stonyhurst, who won three and drew seven of their matches, had a young and inexperienced side. They lost three of the first four games, including those with Sedbergh and Ampleforth by heavy margins, but never afterwards knew defeat and finished the season with a victory over Rossall. The batting depended largely upon Horton, the captain, who made several good scores, notably a chanceless century against Rossall. He headed the averages and Moran was consistent. De Bertodano and O'Brien also did useful work. The former, bowling fast medium right, was the most reliable member of the attack. Kelly, leg-breaks, Flynn, slow left.

O'Brien and Horton bowled well at times. Weidner, an efficient wicket-keeper, helped in the taking of nineteen wickets. Horton, supported by four other old colours in de Bertodano, Moran, Kelly and O'Brien, will again lead the side so that, with all the best batsmen and bowlers staying on, the outlook is bright.

St. Edward's had their best all-round eleven for several years, the batting being strong, the bowling steady and the fielding uniformly good. The Bromsgrove match resulted in an even draw but the other three school matches were won by handsome margins. Cranmer, the captain, who scored 122 in the match with New College and 156 against Wrekin, J. Butterworth, Gibb, Dixon and A. G. Butterworth—an enterprising but somewhat unorthodox batsman—formed the backbone of the batting. Most work in bowling fell to Hayes-Gratze, medium right, J. Butterworth, slow right, Gibb, Berry and Baldwin. Cranmer will again captain the side and there also remain, J. Butterworth, A. G. Butterworth, Berry, Cooke, Lawson, the wicket-keeper, Dixon and Reid.

Taking a long time to settle down, King's, Canterbury, until half term did not find form worthy of a team including six old colours. Still the results of the School matches were very even. Booty, the captain, a good all-rounder, for the second season in succession, headed the bowling averages, closely followed by Robinson, who, at times, performed splendidly. Though securing first place in the batting figures, Robinson scarcely fulfilled his early promise. Whittall again kept wicket well and his hitting frequently saved the side from collapse. Lovatt did not run into form until late in the term, but Lane and Johnston (who won the fielding prize) made runs consistently and Jervis created a great impression. The second eleven enjoyed the most successful season for some years and Robinson, with three other old colours, should have plenty of young material to call upon this year.

Bad luck dogged *Dover* throughout the term and what might have been a brilliant season became a poor one, only four matches being won, against seven lost and three drawn. Illness laid aside the best players and on only two occasions could a team of full strength be placed in the field. Much was expected of Comyn, Fyers, Benbow and Gange but they rarely touched their true form. Throughout the season Low and Redshaw gave the side a good start but seldom received support. Gibbs at times bowled admirably but neither Aldous nor Fyers did as well as in 1931. Aldous worked tremendously hard to improve the standard of cricket throughout the School. This year's captain is Low, and Weymouth, whose absence last season was an irreparable loss, Gibbs, Gange, Benbow, and Huxley are returning.

Owing to illness, *Downside* played few School matches but the eleven proved their worth against some strong club sides, Scroope, Gahan and Cave being outstanding batsmen and Bisgood showing promise. Anchorena, Cave and Addington bore the burden of the bowling, with Muir, who captains the side this year, a sound and at times a brilliant wicket keeper. The prospects appear bright as Cave, Gahan, Addington, Scroope, Bisgood, Bell and Worrall again are available.

Enthusiasm for cricket is on the up grade at Sedbergh, the School enjoying a most successful season. Two of the three defeats were at the hands of very strong sides; the other, by Ampleforth, was due to wretched fielding and a bad batting collapse when the match appeared to be won. Against these Sedbergh could point to seven victories. In a varied and highly effective attack Lockhart and Warren were the most prominent and there were two batsmen of real class in Mitchell-Innes and Barnby. A capital all-rounder, Mitchell-Innes did well at Lord's but failed when tried for Somerset. The outlook for this year is excellent. Mitchell-Innes will again captain the side, with possibly Barnby, Turnbull, the wicket-keeper, Warren, Learmonth, Gundill and Adair to help him.

Winning only one match, drawing three and losing four, Durham had a poor season. They found the uncertainty of the weather and consequent changes in the pace of the wicket most disconcerting, Smallwood, who ended the season with an average of 43, alone doing himself justice. Thomas developed into a useful opening batsman and is a promising wicket-keeper. The bowling was varied but mostly inexperienced and Kissack, the captain, failed to reproduce his form of 1931. The following members will be available this year—Thomas (captain), Oliver, Lishman, Grey, Brett, Willis and Ayton.

Amplejorth's record read: Won five, Drawn four, Lost three. As three of the drawn games finished very much in their favour, and all four school matches—with Stonyhurst, St. Peter's York, Durham and Sedbergh—were won, it could be considered satisfactory. The chief strength of the side lay in the batting. Three times Ampleforth totalled over 300, four times over 200 and on seven occasions it was not necessary for the whole eleven to bat. Grieve, the captain, Waddilove, one of the best wicket-keepers of the year, and Aleazar between them made five centuries and eight scores of over 50; most of the others could also bat well. After beating St. Peter's York by seven wickets, the School went on to make their record total of 362 for seven wickets, Aleazar hitting a very fine 144. Though perhaps not up to the standard of the batting the bowling was good, Coghlan's inswingers rendering him very

difficult. Next season Grieve will again captain the side and he will have with him Coghlan, E. H. Grieve, a promising bat, and Walter, a good all-rounder.

Cranleigh's hopes of a good season were not fulfilled, all three School matches ending in defeat. As some set-off they won four club matches, including that with M.C.C., who were dismissed for 36 by some really excellent bowling on the part of Foot. The batting disappointed for although Morey, F. J. and G. J. Reynolds, Shelley and Cox all played some admirable innings, no one was consistent. The slow left-arm bowling of F. J. Reynolds proved most effective. Foot, who has learnt to swing the ball late, bowled well at times; Wickes, Kettridge (leg-breaks) and G. J. Reynolds (slow left) did able service. The fielding showed pronounced improvement and Shelley kept wicket most efficiently. Morey, this year's captain, will have six old colours and some promising colts from whom to choose. Much is expected from the coaching of Hubble, nephew of the Kent wicket keeper.

Despite the promise shown early in the term, Canford had an unfortunate season. Of the twelve matches played they won only one with three left drawn. A result such as that against the M.C.C. when the school scored 103 and the M.C.C. 105 for eight wickets, was typical of the cricket. The bowling and fielding never failed, but the batting lacked confidence. The "find" of the season was Yeomans, a young left-handed slow bowler, who in seven matches took 28 wickets and headed the averages. Mention should also be made of Pomeroy, another consistent performer. The school, with eight old colours returning, can look forward to better experiences.

Highgate fared vastly better than in 1931, four of the five School matches being won and the other honourably drawn. They beat Mill Hill, Cranleigh, King's Canterbury, and Aldenham and drew with Felsted. In the Mill Hill match Miller did a remarkable performance in stumping six men. The batting of Whitaker who scored nearly 800 runs with an average of just under 80 and the bowling of Hayles formed the features of the season's work. Whitaker has patience and fine defence but needs to develop his off side strokes. Hayles, who took 39 wickets for just over 14 runs apiece, bowls slow medium left-hand with varied pace and flight but lacks spin. The fielding fell below the standard usually associated with Highgate and for this reason some of the old colours may have to fight hard for their places, there being a wealth of talent available in the 2nd and Colts elevens. Whitaker, Hayles, Frost, Bemister, Broad, Barlow, Miller, Scott and Foster remain this year.

St. John's Leatherhead, had a fair season, five matches being won, four lost and three drawn. The batting never really settled down,

but in Speak, Lewis, Turvin and Mitchell the School possessed four first rate bowlers. Speak, who headed both tables of averages, played a good innings of 88 against Whitgift and took three wickets for four runs. Turvin also accomplished some noteworthy allround performances. In addition to these four players Lister, Lee and Parminter are staying on.

Although Whitgift's young and inexperienced team achieved little success last season they showed promise. The captain, Neve, carried the batting on his shoulders, playing several outstanding innings, and Trent and Talbot Smith, this season's captain, both did well on occasions. Hunter, who headed the averages, bowled medium paced spinners with considerable skill, he and Hill—fast but erratic—doing most bowling with Neve and Trent useful changes. Only two of the School matches ended in victory, two being drawn and four lost.

Forest School experienced a successful season, winning seven matches, losing three, and drawing only one, while four had to be scratched. Rain handicapped the development of new players, so it was fortunate that H. C. J. Belle—in his second year as captain—and his brother B. H. immediately found their old form and never lost it. On these two rested the fortunes of the whole team. B. H. Belle bowled finely until the last two or three matches when overwork told its tale. However, Phillips improved tremendously in the later games and ably filled the breach. After a season's wicket-keeping, H. C. J. Belle gave way to Thurgood and set an example by his excellent fielding at cover.

Only two old colours were available at *Denstone*, but under the captaincy of Homer, a useful team soon came into being. The eleven was on the young side, the average age being just under 16. Of the seventeen matches five were won, four lost, and eight drawn. The school revealed particularly good cricket in some of the club matches especially against strong teams sent by Derbyshire Friars, Burton-on-Trent, and Craven Gentlemen. With the following remaining, the prospects for 1933 should be excellent:—Watkins (captain), Sutton, Burrow, Burrow, Kemp, Bayly, Pitts and Sutcliffe.

In a disappointing season Wellingborough won only two of the fourteen matches played, the cause being mainly weak and inconsistent batting. Garne, the captain, was again easily the best, his 509 runs including two centuries, but even he proved unreliable. Wain and Pecorini rendered him best assistance. The bowling if steady lacked sting. Adnams, fast medium right hand, was often dangerous. Staples, slow left hand, lost his length for a long period but finished strongly. Safe, clean fielding was the best feature of the cricket.

Beaumont were unreliable. Oratory, Leatherhead, Douai and Reading were beaten, but heavy defeats came from Epsom and King's College School, Wimbledon. Of the other games, three were lost, two won and two drawn. The batting lacked confidence but improved with the passage of time. Bidwell was the mainstay of the side, his two not out innings at Lord's being an important factor in the defeat of Oratory. Those on whom the burden of the attack fell stuck to their job and greater success would have come their way had the fielding been less uncertain. Jenkins, the captain, again proved himself a wicket-keeper above the average.

Giggleswick did splendidly, overcoming Leeds, St. Bees and Lancaster, while time alone saved Stonyhurst from a heavy defeat. St. Peter's York, inflicted the one reverse, and that by the narrow margin of 10 runs. Gallagher, Ibbotson, Burgess, Middleton and Coles all made runs well and the three first named also bowled steadily.

Monkton Combe, who won five, lost four and drew two matches, owed much to Watson, whose average for the second year in succession exceeded a hundred. Against Weymouth College the School total reached 175 for two wickets, Watson hitting up 141 in ninety minutes. He deserved the compliment of being selected for The Rest against Lord's Schools, and impressed very favourably in an innings of 74, not out. His career at Balliol will be followed with interest. Watts, a useful wicket-keeper, is expected to captain the side this season, which will be his third in the eleven. Dudley a fast medium bowler, Bell, Scott, Wheeler, Spear—reserve wicket-keeper—and Mills, a slow left-hand bowler, probably will be available.

Not since they moved to Caversham in 1922 had Oratory School enjoyed so successful a campaign. They lost only three of their eighteen matches, winning twelve and drawing three. The Beaumont match at Lord's caused some disappointment, the batting failing and the School losing for the first time for six years. Caruana, captain for the second year, accomplished excellent all round work, Burns, who headed the batting averages proved an effective wicketkeeper, and he played both for Lord's Schools and for Public Schools against The Army. Dobson, a left-hander, did best in the attack.

Rydal won five and lost five of their fourteen matches. They easily defeated Birkenhead School and Merchant Taylors, Crosby, but lost, for the first time, to Liverpool College and had to be content with a draw in the return match. W. Wooller, Bibby (the captain) and Hughes, all batted soundly, but the "tail" revealed weakness, and Kay, one of the best bats of the previous season, completely lost

his form. W. Wooller, fast-medium right-hand, could make the ball get up quickly he and R. Wooller, slow left, forming a strong opening pair of bowlers. Between them they took 78 wickets, but received little support. Prospects for this year are good for there are several promising juniors available. W. Wooller, who headed both sets of averages, will captain the side which again will include Hughes, Kay, Burton, Waggott and Butler.

Most of St. Edmund's, Canterbury eleven were in the school football or hockey side, or both, and having won all their School matches in these two games, entered with unlimited confidence upon the cricket programme. Three of the five School matches resulted in handsome wins, and in the other two time, rather than lack of enterprise on the part of Lendrum in his declarations, robbed St. Edmund's of victory. Of the batsmen, Dodd averaged nearly 60 and three others over 30 in School matches. Backed up by keen, sound fielding, Wynne-Roberts and Rimer carried off chief honours with the ball. All the bowlers studied length rather than pace and swing, and Gainford in particular improved greatly.

St. Lawrence, a young side, often disappointed, but at times showed really great promise, only experience and confidence being needed to bring the consistency so necessary to a School team. While everyone could make runs, the side came up to expectations on very few occasions. The lion's share of the work in attack fell upon Winter and Hill, who this year should profit by their experience. Eight old colours are left—Hill, captain, Calvert, Winter, Monk, Waters, Pleydell, Cox and Sharpe.

As a side St. Peter's York were below the average, but they possessed one batsman who stood head and shoulders above the rest—Yardley, who scored over 650 runs including three centuries for an average of 50. After a bad start he had an extraordinary run of success in June, scoring 160 v. Durham and 108 v. Worksop in one week, and 425 in five consecutive matches. In addition to his brilliant batting he was a useful change bowler and inspiring field. Allport, leading the side for the third successive year, three times shared with Yardley in three-figure partnerships for the first wicket and set a fine example in the field. Brittain's fast medium bowling met with less success than it deserved. The slow left-hand bowling of Dodds had most to do with the sensational victory by 10 runs registered in the Giggleswick match. Yardley, captain this year, will have the assistance of Ogley and Dodds.

Bromsgrove had a young team that improved steadily, and in July rose above normal. Six matches, including those with King Edward's (Birmingham) and Wrekin were won, four lost and seven drawn. Most of the batsmen proved capable of making runs, with

Farquharson and Piddock consistently good. Warr maintained his fine form behind the wicket and should do well at Oxford. Gould will captain the eleven this year, with probably six or seven old "caps" in support.

The success of the opening pair of batsmen—Snow and Burton—who almost invariably gave the side a good start and on three occasions put up over 100 for the first wicket, formed the feature of Worksop's season. The bowling, however, lacked variety. Burton has gone up to Cambridge but otherwise the side will undergo little alteration from that of 1932, with Turner, captain for the second season, Snow, Green, Rennie, Wilson, Blackmore, Aitkin and Martin again available.

Wrekin, with only three old colours, won four matches, drew four and lost seven. The School matches against St. Edward's and Bromsgrove were lost. In the Denstone match—the one School fixture that brought success—Akeroyd and Braithwaite, after nine wickets had fallen for 81, put on 102 runs for the last—a School record. Poole (captain), and Stooks were the outstanding batsmen and Moore should be useful next season. Middleton-Smith and Braithwaite bowled consistently well, though injury prevented the latter from playing in several matches. Middleton-Smith flighted the ball deceptively and he kept an excellent length. He is also an admirable slip fielder. As Braithwaite, Moore, Egerton-Smith, and possibly Hobbins return this season's prospects are quite hopeful.

Epsom's season was one of more than average success, six of the fourteen matches being won and three lost. The eleven played together as a real team, every member contributing to the general excellence. Walton and Eggar were the most consistent bats, and Rogers and James showed good form on occasions. Chief bowling honours were shared by Gethen, Eggar and J. L. I. Miller, with the fielding good all round. Hawks managed the side extremely well. Eggar will be captain this year; Gethen, Rogers, Brown and Thompson also remain.

ETON v. HARROW.

Played at LORD's, Friday, Saturday, July 8, 9,-Great hopes were entertained that Harrow, who had not known victory over Eton for nearly a quarter of a century, might at length break the spell which appeared to have ken cast over their efforts to lower the colours of their great rivals. Once again, however, hopes in that direction were frustrated. Eton, winning the toss, lept Harrow in the field for five hours and a quarter and thenceforward, apart from the chance of something abnormal happening in the game a draw for the eighth time in the course of the last eleven years was nearly always certain to be the issue of the contest. Harrow gained a lead of 66 on the first innings and they were unquestionably much the stronger bowling side but the superiority they possessed was not so pronounced as to enable them to drive it home in face of the stubborn and skilful tactics pursued by Hotchkin. In the absence of that player, Harrow no doubt would have gained a comfortably victory. With that the batsman directing his energies to the averting of defeat and pursuing his usk with unflagging determination, Eton escaped—possibly had not much the worst of the position when the match came to a conclusion—but, considering the great traditions of the match, the reduction of the contest to a question as to whether the Etonians could save the game was rather matter for regret,

Of the Eton eleven who had inflicted so severe a defeat upon Harrow in the previous season only two members remained but these were Hotchkin who had put together an innings of 153 and Allen who had taken nine wickets for 60 runs—five in the second innings for only 14 runs. The Harrow "old flannels" numbered five—Covington, the captain, Tindall, Gascoyne, Haslewood and Clive. Of these Covington and Haslewood, as well as Borwick, bowled slow left, while Simpson and Strange were of medium pace and Clive fast medium. Altogether the Harrow attack formed quite a formidable combination but on the great occasion, although Clive rising fast from the pitch, accomplished some fine work latterly and Borwick disguised his slow ball with much eleverness, the bowling did not prove equal to the task before it. Heaton, the wicket-keeper, gave away 42 byes but for these he was little to blame and he stopped any number of balls on the leg side. He would probably, however, have been wiser to stand back to Clive and possibly to both Strange and Simpson.

Eton, winning the toss, fared so well for a long time that when, shortly after four o'clock, the fourth wicket went down the total had reached 256. Hotchkin and Boyd, a left-hander, laid the foundation of this fine work, staying together for an hour and a half and raising the score to 80 before a smart piece of fielding ran out Boyd. Hotchkin found another invaluable partner in Dixon who, keeping his end up for two hours and a half, helped to put on 94. Third out at 222, Hotchkin followed up his 153 against Harrow last year with a score of 108, For three hours and forty minutes he offered a very admirable defence to the Harrow attack and, apart from two narrow escapes when in the nineties of being stumped off Simpson, he never appeared in any real difficulty. Scoring mainly on the leg side he always waited for his chances and, while he hit fifteen 4's during his long stay, he displayed little ability to drive.

Following Hotchkin's departure, Branch helped Dixon to take the score to 256 but with Branch dismissed at that point, Clive and Borwick afterwards bowled to such purpose that the last six wickets went down in the course of fifty minus of actual cricket for the addition of 27 runs. Clive bowled Baker, Birkbeck and Turnbull in the course of five balls, the last three wickets all falling at 283.

Having finished off Eton's innings in summary fashion after everything had suggested the probability of the Light Blues occupying the wickets for the whole of the first day, Harrow had ninety minutes' batting on Friday and scored 118 for the loss of two wickets. Tindall, in company with Pulbrook, opened very brightly but a smart catch at short leg sent him back at 38. Gascoyne hit out so attractively on the off side that he scored in forty minutes 50 out of 60 for the second wicket.

Next morning Covington, if not able to travel at the pace of Gascoyne on the previous evening, put on 55 in little more than an hour and a half and Clive joining Pulbrook with four men out the Eton attack was for the time being so thoroughly mastered that Harrow went ahead with six wickets in hand. When, however, the partnership had added 80 in fifty-five minutes, a catch in the slips disposed of Pulbrook who, fifth out at 292, had batted for three hours and three quarters. A left-hander, Pulbrook watched the ball well, made some fine on-drives—his hits including fifteen 4's—and gave no chance, but somehow his batting did not impress. On the other hand Clive played most attractive cricket, making 67—chiefly by drives—in eighty minutes but after he left the last four wickets went down in twenty minutes for 29 runs. Batting forty minutes less than their antagonists, Harrow, all out for 349; made 66 more runs but that advantage did not serve any particular purpose.

Eton went in again at three o'clock, and, although they lost Boyd at 39, they cleared off the arrears without further loss. Hotchkin and Stevens—most wisely in the circumstances—played with commendable restraint even if they did not neglect their opportunities and soon the only remaining matter of interest centred in the question whether Hotchkin would equal the achievement of M. C. Bit of Harrow who, in 1907, made two separate hundreds in the same match. Hotchkin came desperately near achieving that distinction, but when he and Stevens

had added 120 in about two hours and he had brought his score to 96, a "yorker" from Simpson took his middle stump. Although thus disappointed in the endeavour to equal Bird's performance, Hotchkin, batting in the second innings for two hours and a half and hitting twelve 4's, had undoubtedly saved his side, Following upon Hotchkin's dismissal, Dixon, Stevens and Branch were out in quick succession but by that time nothing that happened possessed much importance. Stevens batted so doggedly that his 44 runs occupied him more than two hours. The drawing of stumps found Eton 150 runs ahead with half their wickets in hand.

On each day the attendance numbered about 20,000, the spectators paying for admission being 15,028 on Friday and 14,524 on Saturday.

Of the 103 matches played, Eton have won 42, Harrow 35, and 26 have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857 which has been rejected.

CLIFTON v. TONBRIDGE.

Played at LORD'S, Monday, Tuesday, July 25, 26.—Cricket being impossible on Monday owing to rain, the meeting of Clifton and Tonbridge resulted for the third year in succession, in a draw but a most interesting—if in the end undecided—fight took place on the first innings. Kinnersley, the Clifton captain, carried off chief batting honours for his side, going in first and being still unbeaten with 95 runs to his credit when, at the end of three hours, the College were all out for 179. While skilful and untiring defence was the outstanding feature of his play, he scored with much ability on the off side. Among his strokes he had, in addition to a 5 and seven 4's, a hook for 6 and a pull for the same amount. Vickers, who appeared to special advantage in cutting, had seven 4's in his 43 and helped his captain to put on 71 in an hour. Kinnersley, when Lapage, the last man, came in, wanted 28 for his hundred and was enabled to get 23 of that number. Albertini, a medium-pace bowler, had the remarkable analysis of six overs two runs and two wickets. Morrison, also medium-pace, took four wickets for 42 and when Tonbridge went in, he and Morton, after three wickets had fallen for 39, added 57 in fifty minutes. In all Morrison, scoring clevely all round the wicket made, despite one very slow spell, 67 in an hour and fifty minutes, hitting a 6 and six 4's. Tonbridge at seven o'clock, when the game was given up, stood 13 in arrear and had two wickets to fall. Coachafer proved the most effective of the Clifton bowlers.

Played at Lord's, Monday, Tuesday, August 1, 2.-Overshadowing everything else in this match was the slow spin bowling of J. H. Cameron of Taunton School, a son of Dr. J. Cameron who toured this country with the West Indies team in 1906. Cameron, varying his leg-breaks with "googlies," took all ten wickets in the first innings of the Lord's Schools for 49 runs and secured the only two wickets which fell in the second innings of that side-twelve in all for six runs apiece. To begin with the Lord's Schools lost three batsmen for 34 but Tindall and Seamer added 34 and, following Tindall's dismissal, Seamer remained to help Morrison who, strong in hitting to leg and on driving, put on 44 out of 60 for the fifth wicket.
