

PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1933.

Not since 1921 has the weather proved so kind to cricket as in the past season, few matches being interfered with by rain, and for the first time since 1914, when Clifton and Tonbridge gained inclusion in the Lord's Schools, a definite decision was arrived at in the five principal school matches at headquarters in the holidays. The climax was reached when the representative Schools XI beat the Army for the first time in the series of matches inaugurated in 1920.

While there were not many outstanding players in 1933, the School elevens reached the average, and the excessive caution which marred much of the batting of the previous year appeared to lose favour. Doubtless the fast wickets on which boys are nearly always at their best had much to do with this, but the fact remained that the rate of run-getting attained a high standard, and many big individual scores were put together. As instances of the enterprise displayed, Bartlett, who achieved the distinction of captaining Dulwich for the third year, created a new school record by scoring over 200 runs against both Bedford and Mill Hill, each innings occupying less than two hours and a half. Cheltenham declared against Malvern, and the home side, left to get 268 in two hours and a half, hit off the runs with thirty-five minutes to spare, P. G. Leeson making 115 not out. At Haileybury I. C. Henry and M. H. Bell, without being parted, put on 235 for Uppingham's third wicket in ninety-five minutes before lunch, Henry's 194 occupying him no more than two hours and a quarter. Dover wound up their most successful season for many years with a brilliant victory in an innings over the Band of Brothers, the College scoring 371 for six wickets in two hours and a half. D. R. Weymouth, who hit fiercely for 118, should make his mark at Cranwell.

Much of the batting at Lord's compared unfavourably with what the boys accomplished on their own grounds, possibly because of different conditions and the ordeal attaching to a first appearance at Headquarters. Still, though many of the boys had been playing

five or six days a week for three months, the fielding showed no signs of slackness, and, indeed, was frequently brilliant.

While the fetish of swing and swerve appeared to be on the wane, with more attention paid to length, there was, with the possible exception of J. B. Dobson, a left-hander from the Oratory School, still a regrettable absence of really promising fast bowlers. On the other hand, the high standard of wicket-keeping was maintained, and in this connection mention may be made, in addition to those who took part in the representative matches, of Cranston (Rugby), Hayles (Haileybury), Norris (Cheltenham), Bird (Wellington), Miller (Highgate), Morgan (Sherborne), Lloyd (Blundell's), Griffith (Dulwich) and Man (Eastbourne). Griffith, in particular, showed great improvement upon his form of the previous year, but both Cranston and Bird suffered injuries in June, and the last named could not "keep" again.

The cricket in the Eton and Harrow match presented a strong contrast to much of that played by other schools. The conditions could scarcely be compared, and, after all, the players merely followed the example of their seniors in their policy of safety first and lack of aggressiveness, but in view of the brilliance of the Eton batting at Winchester it proved the more disappointing. Heavy rain having fallen overnight, winning the toss was a doubtful blessing to Harrow. Boys cannot be expected to force the pace in such circumstances, but too many long hops and half volleys on the off were neglected, and the game deteriorated into an uninteresting draw. Yet, after all, if the closure had been applied an hour earlier, a definite result—very possibly in Harrow's favour—might have been reached. Probably the Harrow captain was not unmindful of the way the Winchester bowlers had been treated a fortnight earlier, and feared to take the risk. Pawle, after a necessarily careful start, played delightful cricket and quite fulfilled the reputation he established against Marlborough, his wristy strokes through the covers being beautifully executed. His dismissal in the second innings was nothing short of a tragedy. Hotchkiss watched the ball as carefully, and offered as dour a defence as in the two previous years, his performances in his three matches against Harrow being altogether out of the common. Tindall, even though lacking some of his former brilliance, played two valuable innings. Heaton hit wholeheartedly and Collins, at a critical time in Harrow's second innings, played the best cricket of the day. The bowling did not reach a high standard, but Duveen had one glorious hour, both in length and spin, which definitely turned the game in Harrow's favour for a time. Turner and Brocklebank never reached the heights they attained four weeks later against the Army. The fielding and catching fell below the level expected in this match,

and the throwing in, with a few exceptions, was bad, and yet the "Eton-Harrow" is a law unto itself, and perhaps, only those who have taken part in it are really in a position to "throw stones."

A very unusual incident, and one believed to be without parallel in the history of the games between the two schools, occurred in the Eton and Winchester match. Following a discussion overnight between the captains, the umpires, and a representative of the M.C.C., two runs were deducted from the score of Davies-Scourfield, and the Winchester total amended to 336. The match produced a Marathon contest. Bousfield (50), Davies-Scourfield (91) and Barton (103) were all at their best, and the Winchester total reached 294 before the fourth wicket fell. Then an attempt to force the pace proved too much for inexperienced batsmen, and the innings closed for 336. Three of Eton's wickets, including that of Hotchkiss, fell overnight for 70, but a sound 75 by Bewicke, and fierce hitting by Villiers, a left-hander, who made many beautiful off drives in his 83, pulled the game round. Holmes (77) and Turner (45 not out) added 125 in hurricane hitting for the eighth wicket and enabled Hotchkiss to declare at the interval. Tired though they were, Bousfield and Barton, after the first wicket had gone quickly, faced their job with great courage, and carried their side into safety. Winchester, when stumps were drawn, being 33 runs on with seven wickets in hand. If throughout the two days the bat beat the ball, the fielding was maintained at a high level.

The Clifton and Tonbridge match produced much bright cricket, as many as 963 runs being scored in the two days. Clifton owed their victory to enterprising batting—they scored at a rate of over 80 an hour—and the leg-break bowling of Scott, a youngster of 15, who took six wickets for 56 in the first innings. With the exception of Scott, the bowling lacked variety, and half volleys and long hops received their deserts. Edelsheim, making one of his all too rare appearances for Clifton, played good innings of 53 and 65 (not out), and Nuttall revealed sound timing of the ball on the off side, while Heath, Lapage and Riseley all hit well. For Tonbridge, who redeemed a seemingly hopeless position and made a great fight, Ball, Day (a son of A. P. Day, the old Malvernian), G. C. La Fontaine, Morrison and Leach, took chief honours.

Rugby, who made such a promising start the previous year at Lord's, when rain stopped the match, beat Marlborough for the first time since 1926 by 168 runs. Marlborough had fared so well all the term that the result was unexpected, but Gemmill managed admirably the great variety of bowling at his command, and none of the Marlborough batsmen really settled down. Alston, Waddy and Napper all appeared set, but in each case a timely

change of bowling brought reward. The out cricket of both sides was very good, some brilliant catches being made; Gemmill brought off one at second slip which only a fieldman of phenomenal reach could have touched. The batting, however, provided the real surprise. Not until the season was well advanced were Steel and Duncan definitely selected to open the Rugby innings, and on only one occasion had they exceeded 30 in partnership. Yet on a perfect Lord's wicket they proceeded to make history, displaying such freedom as to put on 115 runs in an hour and a half before being parted. On the second day they increased a lead of 98 by 100, and placed their side in an impregnable position.

Haileybury defeated Cheltenham by ten wickets, the losers, except for the all-round play of Arengo-Jones, the batting of Blatherwick, and the wicket-keeping of Norris, who helped in a good stand in the second innings, giving a disappointing display. Cheltenham made a disastrous start from which they never recovered, and in which Hayles, whose wicket-keeping was the feature of the match, bore a big part. P. K. Mayhew, who took five wickets for 13 runs in the first innings, carried off the bowling honours for Haileybury, and received good support from Darewski, a left-hander who will captain the side this year. Haileybury started badly, but with four wickets down for 30, Childs, the youngest player in the game, steadied the side. Eighth out at 173, he received valuable assistance from C. P. Mayhew. Darewski and Staples added 66 for the last wicket by really good cricket which virtually assured victory.

Following an even first-day's play, the Rest, who included Ballance and Beaumont, two of the School bowlers of the year, in addition to Judge, who afterwards played for Middlesex, beat the Lord's Schools by 117 runs. Ballance, the Uppingham left-hander, who kept a fine length and made pace off the pitch, took five wickets for 19 in the second innings, and Beaumont, with the assistance of his Repton captain, Mendl, outstanding behind the wicket, came out with nine wickets at a cost of under twelve runs apiece. Angelo played a delightful innings, his execution and freedom on the off side being admirable. His timing on the leg side was not so good, but he showed great improvement at the Oval in September. Mitchell-Innes and Garnett, of whom so much had been expected, disappointed, but Bousfield and Judge played soundly, and Mendl hit wholeheartedly. Tindall and Hotchkin gave the Lord's XI a good start in each innings, and Morrison and Pawle treated the bowling on its merits, but apart from some lusty hitting by Darewski the others did little in either innings.

Those who followed School cricket closely agreed that the best side possible had been selected against the Army, and it came

as a shock on the morning of the match when Ballance, who bowled so well the previous day, had to withdraw to undergo an operation. The change was particularly unfortunate for, although the batting inspired some confidence, the bowling looked by no means formidable, but it may be said at once that Turner, the Eton medium-paced bowler, who filled the vacancy, more than justified his selection.

The ball came very quickly from the pitch when the Schools batted first, and such a disastrous start occurred that five wickets were down for 29. However, Morrison drove with skill and power, and the score reached 114. Turner and Morrison opened the bowling for the Schools, and, both keeping a fine length and swinging away, half the Army wickets fell for 25. Wolfe-Murray and Melsome, in a big sixth wicket stand, then pulled the game round, and the Army finished 50 ahead.

Next morning Bartlett and Mendl hit with delightful freedom, and, by adding 153 in ninety minutes, made their side safe. Bartlett, missed when 15, drove with great power, so in the end the Army were set 240 to win, a task that proved beyond them. Brocklebank's leg-breaks proved very effective, the Etonian dismissing four men for 42, but the whole side worked like a team under Bartlett, the wicket-keeping of Mendl and smart catching and ground fielding contributing to a great victory.

Notwithstanding an hour and a half's stoppage for rain, the Young Amateurs and Young Professionals match, which brought the second week to a conclusion, yielded nearly a thousand runs. The Professionals were saved from defeat by a sound second innings of 66 (not out) by Edwards, a left-hander. The feature of the game was a great score of 189 by N. W. D. Yardley, who will again captain St. Peter's, York, this year. W. M. Eadon, the Canford slow bowler, sent down many loose balls, but he took thirteen wickets for 150 runs with his leg-breaks and googlies, and, if he perseveres, should have a big future. D. M. Matthews (Felsted) brought off good catches to dismiss the first four batsmen—Bishop and Goldsmith (who put on 127 for the first wicket), and Muncer and Simpson, who also shaped very well. Compton, a left-hander of 15, with an easy action, impressed very favourably, and he played a freely hit innings of 45 besides taking three wickets for 32. Several of the Amateurs showed promising form, notably I. C. Henry (Uppingham), N. H. Golding, an enterprising left-hander from Bedford, T. H. Whitaker (Highgate), W. E. W. Jacobs (Cranbrook) and D. G. T. Hicks, the Eltham all-rounder, but Yardley, who combined a sound defence with great driving power and accurate timing on the leg side, overshadowed everybody else in batting.

Some very quick scoring took place in the Colts' match, Mr. Tufnell's XI, 29 runs behind on the first innings, accomplishing

the task of getting 198 runs to win in an hour and forty minutes. The match introduced several promising young cricketers, especially J. M. Lomas (Charterhouse), who was unlucky to be thrown out when 98, K. Cranston, an all-rounder from Liverpool, who has been in the School eleven for four years and will captain the side this year, E. D. R. Eagar (Cheltenham), B. D. Carris (Harrow), P. J. M. Nelson (Harpenden) and D. R. Macindoe (Eton). The two sides included seven left-hand bowlers, of whom S. J. Mills (Monkton Combe) and F. F. Richardson (Westminster) looked the best, while D. M. Brooke (Harrow) promised well behind the wicket. The "out" work, however, with the exception of that of Cranston and one or two others, disappointed. The fieldsmen were not on their toes and lacked anticipation.

The Young Surrey Amateurs' Week at the Oval produced some very keen cricket, I. C. Henry and R. H. Williamson (Uppingham), S. C. Griffith (Dulwich), R. H. Angelo (Westminster), and L. G. Morey (Cranleigh), the last-named a promising left-hander, being prominent among the batsmen and R. West (Rugby) and the left-handers Williamson (Uppingham) and B. D. Napper (Marlborough) commanding chief notice in bowling. Griffith showed greatly improved form behind the wicket and Morey and Williamson were conspicuous in fielding. The feature of the match against Kent, which Surrey won by 67 runs, was the batting of Morey (57), Henry (72) and Griffith (65 not out) for the home side in the second innings, and stands for Kent by B. J. W. Hill (King's, Canterbury) (34) and F. J. Reynolds (Cranleigh) (40) in the first innings and W. Murray Wood (Mill Hill) (86 not out) and D. J. Weymouth (Dover) (38) in the second.

Time robbed Essex of victory, the visitors requiring five runs with four wickets in hand. Essex owed their advantage to the all-round work of B. H. Belle (Forest) and R. F. T. Paterson (Brighton), the former playing sound innings of 60 and 67 at critical periods.

Owing to a misunderstanding of dates the Sussex match did not take place, and a return was arranged with Surrey Club and Ground, whom the Young Amateurs defeated the previous week. The Club, who included Gover, McMurray, Whitfield, Fishlock Parker and Mobey, gained a lead of 111 runs on the first day, and carried the score to 391 the next morning, Parker hitting freely for 79 (not out). A big stand between Henry (114) and Griffith (78) enabled the Amateurs to declare at 394 for seven wickets, leaving their opponents 182 to get in an hour and a half. Runs came slowly at first, but Bartlett, the Dulwich captain, hit fiercely for 92 not out, and the task was achieved with six wickets in hand.

The previous week Surrey C. and G. declared at 314 for eight wickets (H. M. Garland-Wells 81) and the Young Amateurs replied with 335 for six (declared), Williamson hitting brilliantly for 108. Mobey (92 not out) and R. C. Eglinton, the Old Shirburnian (71) added 149 for the Club's fifth wicket, before the second innings was declared, leaving the Surrey boys two hours and a half to get 267 to win. All the bowling coming alike to Williamson, the runs were obtained in under two hours for the loss of two wickets, the Uppinghamian being unbeaten with 109.

The Richmond Public Schools enjoyed a fairly successful time in the holidays, winning four, losing four, and drawing two of the ten matches. The fielding, with the important exception of that of the slips, was excellent, L. G. and D. G. Morey (Cranleigh), G. R. Fennell (St. Paul's) and R. H. Williamson (Uppingham) doing specially good work, and S. C. Griffith (Dulwich) and F. W. Naylor (Mill Hill) playing well behind the wicket. Much credit went to the all-round play of D. H. Belle (Forest), Williamson, R. F. T. Paterson (Brighton), and D. E. Young (K.C.S., Wimbledon). H. T. Bartlett on the only two occasions he played did much to win the matches against Hornsey and the H.A.C. with brilliant innings of 109 and 142 respectively.

One might have imagined that *Eton* had two elevens in 1933. The one played with varying fortune and a fair measure of success until on the second day of the Winchester match it produced a batting display of real brilliance; the other, although consisting of the same players, contested the match at Lord's with a lamentable lack of the spirit of adventure, and contributed more than its share of dullness to a dreary match. There is no dearth of talent at Eton, but the course of recent games at Lord's suggests that the onus of a quarter of a century's amenity from defeat is too heavy for boys to bear. If that is so, the sooner the crash comes the better. At the outset of the season there were gloomy forebodings concerning the lack of bowling talent; it was felt that Turner and Turnbull would not win matches. The appearance of Brocklebank, a more than ordinarily fast leg-breaker, made up for the loss of form of Birkbeck, the left-hander, and, with Holmes's swingers and Pilkington's steady length to add variety, the attack proved itself considerably stronger than that of the previous year. Conversely, no one had any serious misgivings about the batting. Hotchkin was the soundest run-getter Eton had produced for many years, and Boyd, a very steady left-hander, Bewicke, the wicket-keeper, Dixon and Johnson appeared likely to form a reliable nucleus. Pilkington seemed an obvious choice, and Holmes, an all-rounder, Villiers, a free-hitting left-hander, and Cripps looked like fighting it out for the last places.

Unfortunately things did not so work out. True, Hotchkin, whose record against Harrow of 458 runs in five innings may not be beaten in 100 years, developed considerably in scoring powers and proved an excellent captain, but Boyd and Bewicke did not come on as anticipated; Dixon was out of form all the season and Johnson eventually had to be dropped. Much, therefore, depended on the new-comers, Pilkington, Cripps, Villiers and Holmes, and fortunately they did not disappoint, Cripps in particular being, next to his captain, perhaps the best batsman in the eleven. The throwing-in, with one or two exceptions, and the fielding scarcely reached the Eton standard. Boyd will captain the side this year and with Dixon, Pilkington and Villiers will again form the backbone of the batting. Johnson, who showed such great promise in 1932, and Birkbeck are also available.

Harrow's successful season held out bright prospects for the next few years. Of the eleven matches played before Lord's, two ended in victories, and most of the nine drawn matches were definitely in the School's favour. The absence of a fast bowler could not fail of being severely felt, though Tindall's left-hand deliveries, to some extent, remedied the deficiency. Kaye and Martin bowled well to dismiss the Crusaders for 144, and bring about a narrow win, Carris proved his value as a bowler against the Household Brigade, who were beaten easily, and Duveen had an inspired hour at Lord's. All the School matches were drawn. Pawle played a great innings of 134 against Marlborough, after the first five wickets had fallen for just over twenty runs, and some surprising bowling by Pulbrook gave Harrow rather the best of the position. Slow and unenterprising batting on an easy-paced wicket at Winchester produced a tame draw. After Charterhouse, thanks to consistent run-getting and another fine innings of 128 by T. R. Garnett, put together 381, Harrow, for whom Pulbrook and Carris, by very careful play, obtained 210 for the first wicket, replied with 431 for eight, Pawle and Studd carrying on the good work. Against M.C.C., Tindall played a great innings of 202 out of a total of 306 for five, the second hundred being a brilliant exhibition of free hitting. Tindall and Pawle, the outstanding batsmen, bore a big hand in drawn games with the Wanderers and a strong Harlequin XI. Pawle succeeds Tindall, who proved an admirable captain, and Carris, Pelham, Kaye, Studd, Stogdon and Duveen should help to make Harrow a powerful side.

Lack of experience made *Winchester* rather below the average standard, but much promising talent discovered last year should reach fulfilment this summer. Of the batsmen, Bousfield and Barton were clearly the best. Bousfield revealed his best form

in the four school matches, scoring 78 (not out) against Charterhouse, 54 against Marlborough, 63 (not out) against Harrow, and 50 and 39 at Eton. A resourceful and watchful player with a good temperament, he may well prove a success at Cambridge. Barton, whose strong back play and forcing strokes on the on-side must always make him a batsman above the average on wet wickets, could do nothing right in May, but a century against the Old Wykehamists restored his confidence and for the second year in succession he scored 100 against Eton—a feat unparalleled in the cricket annals of Winchester. Winlaw, the captain, when the burden lay heaviest on his shoulders, played splendidly during the opening month, and Grover needed only defence to make him a formidable batsman. Scourfield, who fared admirably in his first season in the eleven—he obtained 91 against Eton—should make many runs this year. The bowling left much to be desired. There has not been a really fast bowler at Winchester for twenty years, nor did there come to light a genuine spin bowler of merit. The bulk of the work in attack fell on Baird and Wrench, medium-paced swingers, though Kingsley, a late choice, proved himself dangerous when the wicket gave him assistance, and Scott could swing the new ball sharply. For some time the fielding fell far below that usually displayed by Winchester, but it improved out of all recognition, Bousfield being a first-class cover point, Scourfield, a very good catcher anywhere—he helped to dismiss five men in the Eton innings—and Wrench and Eggar consistently sound. In the school matches Charterhouse were easily defeated, but Marlborough, thanks to the steady bowling of Napper, won by five wickets. The Harrow game was drawn, rain spoiling what might have been a sporting finish, and the Eton match, also drawn, produced some very high scoring. Grover is this year's captain, and as he will have the help of Wrench, Baird, Scott, Eggar, Foster and Scourfield of last year's young eleven, the team should be strong.

Starting the season uncertainly, *Rugby* gradually settled down and by July were a pretty good side. By that time the batting was much more dependable than in recent years, the varied bowling always proved troublesome, and the fielding, if not up to that of the last few seasons, at least improved to a respectable level. Of the three schools played, Clifton, for the first time for many years, were beaten by four wickets in a most exciting one-day match; Uppingham won by three wickets a game of missed chances, and Marlborough were beaten at Lord's by 168 runs, Duncan and Steel sharing in a three-figure stand for the first Rugby wicket in each innings. Cranston, Baker and Walford were the most consistent run-getters, but later most of the eleven produced good form, so that the failure of these three at Lord's made little difference. Gemmill, the captain, who set

a fine example in the field, and brought off an extraordinary catch at Lord's, was the steadiest of the bowlers, and Cranston kept wicket very well until injured at the end of June. Walford, a most useful all-round cricketer, will captain the eleven this year, and West, Steel and Boyes also remain.

The *Marlborough* season—a very good one—ended with a bad set-back at Lord's. The whole side could bat, and bat well, but they failed to do themselves justice against Rugby, missing perhaps, the perfect light and easy-paced wickets of Marlborough. Napper, the captain, bowled admirably for the first half of the term—he had the left-hander's spin and flighted the ball skilfully, but, as was apparent at Lord's, he lost his elusiveness towards the close of term. Whitehouse, medium right, with beautiful action and length, and Trevaskis, fast medium, with an off swing, but both rather mechanical; Westwood, a really good leg-break and googly bowler who might have been utilised more, and Dickson, medium right, with a sharp off-break, made up a good quintet for a school side. The batting possessed variety and freedom. Alston and Waddy, the opening pair, were both quick scorers, the former, who treated all bowling alike, being apt to suffer accordingly; Hughes, steady as a rock; Napper, free and enterprising, at his best when hitting but apt in defence to cock up the ball, and all the others were capable of making 50. The fielding, as usual, left small room for complaint. Cheltenham were beaten by an innings and 220 runs (Napper 103 and Courtenay 115), Winchester by five wickets (Napper five for 46), Wellington by nine runs (Napper five for 81), and the Harrow match resulted in an even draw. Hewan will captain the side this year, and Whitehouse, Harbottle, Dickson, Westwood and Fletcher are expected to return.

Though stronger than in the two preceding years, *Cheltenham* again disappointed, six matches being drawn, four lost—at the hands of B.N.C., Malvern, Marlborough and Haileybury—and only two won. Undoubtedly the eleven was handicapped by the indisposition of George Dennett, who has acted as cricket coach for the past eight years. Some rapid scoring at Malvern enabled the home team to win by four wickets, after Cheltenham declared; a collapse in the second innings resulted in Marlborough winning by ten wickets; Haileybury gained a decisive success at Lord's, and rain robbed Clifton of certain victory. The results of the earlier matches, including those with the Gloucestershire Gipsies—well beaten—and the Liverpool Club, against whom the College declared at 348 for three wickets, had not presaged such failure, and the last match of term against the Foresters resulted in a fine victory, a task of making 316 runs being completed on the stroke of time with the last man in. The side, young and good in fielding,

should undoubtedly improve. Norris showed real promise as a wicket-keeper, and nine of the eleven were capable of scoring 50, but the bowling lacked sting. Falconar (slow spinners) bowled well throughout the term, and Foster (fast medium right), though erratic, did effective work with the new ball, while Eagar, who played for the Colts in the last two years at Lord's and finished top of the College averages, may well develop. Blatherwick started the season with hundreds against St. John's, Oxford, and Liverpool, but fell away. Manners, a sound and reliable batsman, should be really good this year, and Arengo-Jones, Norris and Bell batted splendidly at times. With Norris, Arengo-Jones, Eagar, Manners, Foster and Piggott available, this year Cheltenham's prospects appear much brighter.

Only six of *Haileybury's* fixtures could be finished, the remainder being drawn with two abandoned. In the school matches, although badly beaten by Uppingham, Haileybury scored an easy victory over Cheltenham at Lord's, while against Wellington a very interesting struggle ended in an even draw. At the beginning of the term lack of batsmen among the old colours made the outlook none too favourable, but as the season progressed the batting became the strongest part of the side, even if no outstanding player made his appearance. The bowling proved a little disappointing and only moderate, but the fielding, backed up by a fine wicket-keeper in Hayles, gave full satisfaction. Of a very young team, Darewski (captain), Hayles, C. P. and P. K. Mayhew, Purdy, Gale, Childs and Hayfield remain to form the backbone of the 1934 eleven.

Although beginning with very modest hopes, *Clifton* ultimately had quite a successful season. Heath's earlier efforts to fill the vacant places met with failure and not until after the Rugby match, lost by four wickets, did anything like the right side declare itself. The introduction of Scott, a fifteen-year-old slow right-hander, on June 24, at once strengthened the team, and as he took thirty-two wickets for 15 runs apiece by the end of term, his bowling may mean a great deal to Clifton cricket in the next few years. Rain alone saved Cheltenham from severe defeat, when Nuttall (158) and Robertson (102 not out) put on 259 for the second wicket in two and a quarter hours. Clifton won the match against Tonbridge at Lord's by seven wickets, 963 runs being scored in the two days for the loss of thirty-one wickets. Scott's bowling proved an important factor; he got rid of Morrison, the Tonbridge captain and most dangerous batsman, in each innings. Even with Scott, Clifton lacked an effective attack, Weston, slow medium right, being perhaps the most consistent of the other bowlers. Lapage was very erratic, and Heath the more likely to take wickets even though of less pace than Lapage.

Anderson, the wicket-keeper, took the fast bowling well, but still had much to learn. A number of batsmen could make runs, Nuttall, Edelshain and Heath being the best, though Robertson, in his own peculiar style, did immensely valuable service. Heath will again captain the side, and as six of the team, including Scott, are expected back, the outlook is good.

The *Westminster* Eleven won two and lost four of their six matches. In the school games they drew with Charterhouse, Sherborne and Wellington, but lost to less powerful opponents in Radley and Stowe. On paper the team appeared strong in batting, but until nearly the end of the term failed to fulfil expectations. Angelo and Turner, the two outstanding batsmen, averaged 55 and 44 respectively and Edgar and Alderson also played some capital innings. The bowling was steady but far from dangerous on the perfect wickets of last summer, with Grace perhaps the best member of the attack. Richardson, a very young left-hander, showed much promise in the Colts match at Lord's. While the ground fielding remained good, far too many reasonable catches went to grass. Matthews, captain of the eleven for the third successive year, kept wicket in first-class style and once more gained a place in the Rest team against the Lord's Schools. Angelo, also chosen, scored a very good 80 and thus secured inclusion in the representative XI. Angelo, who obtained centuries against the M.C.C., Old Westminsters and Hampstead, will captain the side this year.

The *Charterhouse* team of 1933, one of the best seen in recent years, won six and lost only two of their thirteen matches. The season will long be remembered for Garnett's wonderful achievement in scoring five centuries with an aggregate of 1,023 runs and an average of 93—a record for Charterhouse cricket. Garnett opened the campaign with scores of 81, 99 and 96, scored 128 and 130 (not out) in drawn games with Harrow and Westminster, and wound up the summer with 118 in the six-wickets' victory over Wellington. His one real failure occurred in the Winchester match, lost by seven wickets. Thanks to the good starts given by him and Lomas, a most promising youngster, who played a beautiful innings of 98 in the Colts match at Lord's, the batting rarely broke down. Richards did useful work, with a splendid century against the Butterflies as his best performance, and Caldwell, the hitter of the side, could usually be relied upon when runs were needed quickly. The same high standard was reached in the field, Garnett setting a fine example. The bowling, if steady, could not be termed deadly, and the need of a really fast bowler and a good length slow "spinner" made itself felt. Diver achieved most success, and the introduction of Wilson, a left-hander, gave the attack variety.

The Old Carthusians were beaten, for the first time within the memory of any present Carthusian, by 104 runs, the school declaring their first innings at 400 for six wickets, after an excellent beginning by Garnett (146) and Lomas (69). Richards is captain for this season, and Lomas, Wilson, Powell, and Diver remain.

Except when meeting Dulwich, *Tonbridge* failed to produce their best form in the inter-School matches. The batting was fairly consistent, with Morrison, *facile princeps*, but no bowler could be relied on to get cheap wickets. The burden of the attack fell upon Sutcliffe, Morrison and Harding, all of whom, supported by some excellent ground-fielding and the smart wicket-keeping of Brooks, worked hard. The best win was over a strong M.C.C. side, whom Tonbridge, after declaring at 288 for eight wickets, dismissed for 158. Of the fifteen matches played, three ended in victory with seven drawn. Morrison will be succeeded in the captaincy by T. S. La Fontaine, and the following members of the eleven will be available in 1934: Popple, Day, Leach and Cobb.

With an improved side at their command, *Malvern* made runs regularly and fast during the early part of the season, but fell away somewhat towards the close. If steady, the bowling throughout possessed little variety, but Fry was unlucky in not obtaining more wickets. Evans easily headed the batting averages achieving the distinction of scoring a century in two successive matches. Rogers, though not a stylist, hit the ball tremendously hard, and Leeson at times played really well. The Liverpool match provided one of the best performances of the year, Malvern scoring 387 for six (five batsmen scoring over 50 apiece) and dismissing six of their opponents for 137. The School lost to Wolverhampton, Shrewsbury, Repton, and the Old Malvernians, and defeated Christ Church and Cheltenham, scoring in the last-named instance the 270 runs required in an hour and fifty-five minutes. Cope, Morden, Broadhurst, Willis-Dixon and Tolkein remain for this year.

The *Repton* Eleven was, on the whole, up to the average. The batting, apart from that of one or two proved, on the fine wickets, disappointing; on the other hand, the School met bowling on most occasions definitely above ordinary club standard—a fact that might account for the relatively few number of runs scored. Steadiness was the chief quality of the attack, but the fielding, good throughout, reached a very high level indeed against Malvern. To the above remarks, two exceptions must be made. Mendl, the captain, enjoyed an excellent season, his batting being powerful, aggressive and consistent, while as a wicket-keeper he had few rivals in the schools. He led the side splendidly. The other outstanding figure was

Beaumont, the slow spin bowler, who kept a good length and turned the ball on the hardest wickets. Only once was he really collared, and considering the amount of bowling demanded of him, his figures represented fine work. Both these boys played for the Rest and against the Army at Lord's—an unusual record—and both won high praise. Without them, the Repton side would have been badly off. Of the others, Ashton showed some promise as a fast bowler, and Foster bowled steadily without much luck. Montgomery (captain), Ashton, Barrett and Foster are staying on this year.

Strong in bowling, *Shrewsbury* had a successful season, beating Repton and Malvern handsomely in one-day matches, Rossall in an innings, and losing to Uppingham as the outcome of a most exciting two-day struggle by 48 runs. Singleton, with forty-five wickets for nine runs each, took chief bowling honours, his slow off-breaks and medium out-swingers being specially effective in the inter-School matches. Skipwith bowled similarly varying his deliveries in clever style, and Pooley (fast right-hand) and Warman, who showed promising form with his leg-breaks, co-operated in this varied and skilful attack. Six members of the team scored over 50 at least once, and Best, who headed the averages, batted in splendid style against other schools, making 128 v. Repton, 50 v. Malvern and 52 v. Rossall. Singleton and Watkinson put together good scores in several matches and Thornycroft, Darbishire, Leigh-Bennett and Marrian should do well next season. Best will captain the side this year and Watkinson, Leigh-Bennett, Thornycroft, Warman, Stanbury, and Marrian are also returning.

Uppingham for the last three years have laid claim to a record of which any school would be proud, losing only one game during that period. Last season Uppingham won ten of their eleven matches, and had all the best of a drawn game with the Free Foresters, who lost eight wickets for 122 in reply to the School's 285 for nine. The victories included those gained over Rugby and Shrewsbury in exciting finishes, Haileybury by an innings and 44 runs, and Oundle by 115 runs. At Haileybury, Henry (196) and Bell (95) in his first school match, put on 275 runs in two hours and ten minutes for the third wicket and Ballance in the two innings took ten wickets for 89 runs. Against Notts Amateurs, Williamson dismissed six batsmen for 16 after the School, thanks to a fine innings of 103 by White, declared at 303 for five wickets. Much of the credit for the success of the side fell to the captaincy of Henry, who, making a hard-hit 117 against Brasenose, headed the batting averages, was a useful change bowler, and set a fine example in the field. Williamson, a slow left-handed bowler with an easy action, was another good all-rounder, who scored two hundreds in the holidays for the Young Amateurs against Surrey

Club and Ground. Eight of the eleven averaged over 20. The running between wickets was really good and the only time the batting looked like failing was when nine wickets fell in the second innings against Shrewsbury, and then Ames and Ballance saved the situation by adding 50 for the last wicket. It is hoped that six old colours are remaining.

As *Wellington College* started the season with not one bowler left from either first or second elevens of 1932, their results—four matches won, three lost and four drawn—must be considered very satisfactory. Intensive practice at a single stump and a square of paper on the length spot helped to a wonderful extent to improve Hood, a left-hander, and he took nineteen (sixteen clean bowled) of the first thirty-three wickets which fell. Holden, medium right-hand, came on steadily and Wakelin, slow left-hand, could be relied upon to keep an end going. The chief strength of the team, however, lay in the batting and fielding, while Bird showed great promise behind the wicket until he broke a finger at half-term and could play no more. Rawlence and Auret, who headed the batting averages, were the outstanding batsmen, Rawlence playing excellent innings of 133 not out v. M.C.C., and 104 v. O.W's., and Auret 100 v. Berkshire Gentlemen and 77 v. M.C.C. A gratifying feature was the ability of the middle and tail end batsmen of the side to get runs when badly needed. They did this in every school fixture. Wellington had a great match at Marlborough. The scores were level when the last man went in and did sufficient to bring victory to his side. When, in the last fixture of the season, they were thoroughly beaten at Charterhouse, Wellington undoubtedly had the worst of the wicket. Packe, Bird, Wakelin and Holden and possibly Hood and Wigram are staying on for this summer.

After easily beating Blundell's and Radley, *Sherborne* fell away, losing to Downside and drawing with Tonbridge and Westminster. Smith, a very reliable batsman and useful good-length bowler, was rather slow in the field. Cook and Meredith lacked consistency, but Bell was a sound batsman and he and Robinson, this year's captain, will probably make many runs. Wilson, slow left-hand, and Clarke, slow right, met with great success and should be of value to the side this year. Among a smart fielding team, Morgan, who also will be staying on, was a very promising wicket-keeper.

A record of three matches won, four drawn and six lost presents unimpressive reading, but *Radley*, with an inexperienced eleven, suffered defeat in four of the first five matches. By the time

the school games came along, they settled down into a useful lot, a certain lack of bowling being counteracted to some extent by capital fielding. In the five school matches, victories were gained over Lancing and Westminster; that with Bradfield was evenly drawn; the batting twice broke down completely at Sherborne, who won by an innings, and a fluctuating struggle ended in a win for Stowe. Hunter proved a capital captain, and showed good run-getting form on occasion while Hamersley, Birks, Royds, Stanger and McDowell were all capable of making runs. McDowell hit the ball very hard, but was a little unreliable. Egerton and Stanger got through a lot of bowling with credit, but Bucknall, slow right-hand, held out most promise and he may do very well this year when Birks will be captain. McDowell, Stanger and Short are also left.

Rossall won three of the thirteen matches and lost five, but four club games were drawn distinctly in the school's favour. Although Walker, Breay, Beresford and Oakey all played some good innings, no one was consistent and the batting was generally unreliable. Hosking set a good example in the field and Langdon from his position behind the wicket managed what bowling he had adequately. Beresford bore the burden of the attack. Defeats were experienced at the hands of both Sedburgh and Shrewsbury, but Rossall's form in the Stonyhurst match—a draw—gave promise of better times for this season. It is hoped that Beresford and four other old colours will be staying on.

St. Edward's, with nine old colours left, were even stronger than in the previous year, and though having a hard fight to beat Eastbourne by three wickets, they enjoyed easy victories in the other four school matches. The captain, Cranmer, did not pass the 900 runs mark as he did in 1932, but still proved a prolific scorer and was given good support by the brothers Butterworth, and Dixon, who settled down into a reliable opening batsman. Berry, the fast bowler of the side, came out with the best figures, his thirty-five wickets costing just over ten runs apiece, and J. Butterworth took forty-seven for an average of under twelve. The fielding was very good indeed, and Lawson, the wicket keeper, showed great improvement. J. Butterworth will captain the side in 1934, and will have the assistance of Lawson, Cooke, Dixon, Reid, Howell and Bennett.

Considering the possibilities of the team, *Dulwich*, winning only four of their fourteen matches, could be accounted disappointing, but to Bartlett, the captain, a left-hander, fell special honour. He scored over 800 runs with an average of 74, his 228 against Mill Hill

set up a new record for Dulwich in any match, and he went on to score 204 against Bedford, a feat which constituted a record for Public Schools cricket. Seldom does a schoolboy hit with such terrific power coupled with such ease of movement, in wrist and footwork. He was not seen at his best at Lord's, but he wound up the holidays with a great innings of 142 in eighty minutes for the Richmond Public Schools against the H.A.C., and won the match against time. Griffith, whose wicket-keeping proved a considerable asset to the side, was rather dwarfed in comparison, but played a delightful innings of 114 against the Masters. More should be heard of both these players at Cambridge. Booty, an opening batsman, did splendid all-round work and ought to be very good indeed this year. Chiverall and Holliman bore the main burden in attack. Booty, with 23 wickets for just over 13 runs apiece, also contributed to the bowling strength, combining pace from the pitch with fine accuracy of length. The ground fielding and throwing-in improved greatly, but the catching was unreliable. Holliman, a capable leg-break bowler, remains to captain the side, with Campbell, a useful left-hand opening batsman, Thornton, Chiverall, Beaumont, Booty and Haycock to help him.

Improving vastly upon their doings in 1932, *St. Paul's* fared well, seven of the nineteen matches being won—including those against Dulwich and Brighton—three lost and nine drawn. Brighton were beaten by nine wickets and Dulwich by 54 runs; high scoring prevented a decision against Leys and Bedford, and time robbed Felsted of an easy victory. The outstanding player was Judge, who afterwards distinguished himself for Middlesex. He scored over 600 runs, making centuries against Leys and the Old Paulines, and broke the existing school record by taking 84 wickets with his fast medium deliveries for under 15 runs apiece. Fennell, one of the safest and most brilliant cover points in the Public Schools, batted consistently throughout the summer, obtained a century against the Leicestershire Gentlemen, and was unlucky to miss another by 4 runs against the Wanderers. His season's aggregate amounted to 499. Alexew and Crebbin both bowled well and should get many wickets this year, and Passmore, the captain, played several useful innings. Garton proved a worthy successor to his brother behind the wicket. Passmore will again captain the side, and it is expected that Fennell, Moon, Street and five others will be returning.

A well-balanced side with a wide variety of bowling, a high standard in ground fielding, and a number of sound batsmen, *Sedburgh* enjoyed considerable success. Mitchell-Innes showed such excellent and consistent form that he finished with an average of 109, and seldom left the rest much to do. Barnby, a batsman of the same class, lacked, as yet, the match temperament. All six bowlers did

well, particularly Warren and Reed. Only two defeats were suffered by the four school teams, but the one school match won was against Rossall. Turnbull, the wicket-keeper, who will captain the side, and Learmonth, an opening bowler and useful bat, are the only members of the eleven left, but Sedbergh cricket improves yearly and a good season is anticipated.

Of their fourteen matches *Stonyhurst* won five, lost two, and drew seven. Horton, the captain and easily the best batsman, scored three centuries, with an average of 48.62 for a total of 632 runs, and he also bowled well. Seven other members of the team held averages ranging from 30 to 17, Moran batting consistently and obtaining 375 runs. Of the bowlers *de Bertodano* was again outstanding, his fast deliveries bringing him 39 wickets for an average of 17, while he received good support from Weidner, Horton, Kelly, and Mooney. Moran, O'Brien, Kelly, Green, Weidner, Castigan and St. Lawrence are available this year.

With a record of five wins, four draws and three losses—one by 4 runs at the hands of a strong Authentic side—*Stowe* had reason for congratulation. They beat Westminster and Radley, drew with Oundle and lost to Bradfield by 52 runs. Ten players could make runs, Blois at times being brilliant and Lucas playing some good innings, but Smith alone showed consistency. In a varied attack Blois and Davidson, fast medium, were above the average; Lucas made the ball swing, Smith and Bourne bowled off-breaks, and Ling leg-breaks. The ability of the eleven to rise to the occasion formed the most pleasing feature of the summer, Lucas setting a very good example in really excellent fielding. With Mallett, a sound wicket-keeper and bat, Bourne, Oliver and Goldschmidt remaining to help Lucas again, the prospects for the coming season are hopeful.

Bradfield could show six wins and six drawn games against two defeats. In School matches, they won at Stowe by 50 runs and lost at Wellington by a similar margin, the games with Radley and Lancing being brought to an early conclusion by rain. The strength of the side lay in team work. The fielding, particularly in the slips, reached a high standard, and Barber kept wicket very well, a good pair of opening fast-medium bowlers in Raynor and Wood, who between them took over 80 wickets, thus receiving much help. Wright's spin bowling also proved very useful. Tyndall, a splendid captain, and Gray were by far the best batsmen, nine of the team being capable of scoring well. The running between wickets did not reflect credit on the batsmen, and contributed largely to both defeats. The outlook for 1934, with Raynor, Hunter, Wilson, Paine and Allpass again available, is cheerful.

Quick, keen and accurate fielding throughout the whole eleven formed the most noteworthy feature of the *Leys* season. The school lost to Mill Hill, beat University College School and drew their games with Oundle, St. Paul's, Felsted, and Bedford. In club matches they went down before a strong M.C.C. side but gained decisive victories over the Old Leysians and Incogniti. V. B. Jones, who scored over 700 runs, was the mainstay of the run-getting, and J. A. Sykes, Fletcher and Proctor batted well on occasion, but Holloway, the captain, though setting a fine example in the field, never found his true form in batting. Of a none too impressive set of bowlers, W. N. Sykes did best work.

Starting the season badly, *Durham* suffered defeats by Giggleswick and St. Peter's, York, before they ran into form. They followed with three victories, including one by 70 runs over Ampleforth, finishing with a record of three wins, five draws, and four losses. The batting was unsound and the attack without a fast bowler could not make the most of fast wickets. Thomas, the captain, scored two hundreds, reaching an average of 40, and Grey, with one century, averaged 32. Grey also met with most success in bowling, taking 32 wickets at a cost of just over 18 runs apiece. He will captain the side this year, and hopes to have the support of Brett, Pitt, Bailey, Scott, and Johnson.

Showing more consistent form than in recent years, *Canford* had a very satisfactory season, beating King's (Bruton), Victoria College (Jersey), Weymouth College, Eton Ramblers and Royal Tank Corps, and drawing with Downside and M.C.C. Their six conquerors included Taunton School, a very strong I.Z. side, and Foresters. Eadon, whose leg-breaks and googlies brought him 62 wickets, batted nicely in several games. In that with Downside he dismissed eight men for 28, and with 32, was the only batsman on the side to reach double figures. He also met with marked success at Lord's, where he took thirteen Young Professionals' wickets for 150. Sloan, besides being a useful opening bowler, played two good innings of 112 and 76. Early in the term Treasure, slow left-hand, bowled well. Phillips, a useful change bowler and fine field, could always be relied upon for runs, and wound up the season with a chanceless 100. M. Whitwell, P. A. Phillips, P. M. Treasure and G. R. Yeomans remain for this year.

Lack of sting in bowling limited the effectiveness of *Oundle*. Uppingham beat them by 115 runs, they drew with Stowe and Bedford, and rain caused an abandonment of the game with Leys. Chase, the captain, who revealed many strokes and hit the ball

hard, was the outstanding batsman, and chief support came from Field, Payne and Newsholme. Cowan, Newsholme and Stuart, the new captain, did most work in bowling and, with Payne, Maw, Adkins and Teall, will stay on this year.

Strong in batting and sound in the field, with a reliable wicket-keeper in Dawe, the captain, *Bedford* lacked the bowling to win matches, eight of their fifteen fixtures being drawn and four lost. The batting of Golding, a forcing left-hander, who impressed very favourably at Lord's against the Young Professionals, provided the feature of the season. He scored three centuries, in addition to 97 v. St. Paul's and 88 v. Dulwich, and altogether made 746 runs for an average of 53. Walker and Burton were a useful opening pair, Walker finishing the term with a fine 140 v. the Old Boys when the School declared at the big total of 422 for six. Stein played a beautiful 101 not out against St. Paul's, and Dawe, with 80 against Oundle, found his form late in the season. Power and Russell were the mainstays of the bowling, with help from Golding (slow right), Day (medium off-breaks) and Rawlins (slow left). Power's physique enabled him to keep up a fast pace, and Russell maintained a steady length. Burton is this year's captain, and Walker, Rawlins and Manby will also be back.

Blundell's, under the able captaincy of Stone, who goes to Cambridge, won three matches, drew three and lost four. Wynne, the leading batsman, put up a School record when scoring 206 not out against the Old Blundellians. Cale and Jones, fast medium bowlers, both met with considerable success and Lloyd, who allowed only 40 byes in ten matches, kept wicket brilliantly. Wynne and Norman are the only old colours remaining for this year.

Brighton are to be congratulated on a good season. To be deprived unexpectedly of the services of K. M. Dodd and G. A. R. Crawford, the best players on the side, was a great setback, and the record of five matches won, one tie, six drawn, and only two lost speaks for itself. They beat Christ's Hospital, tied with Lancing, and drew with Dulwich and Epsom, but met with a heavy defeat from St. Paul's, for whom Judge took six wickets for 26 runs. Paterson, Buckley and Wilson were the most consistent batsmen, but the first ten had the ability to make 50, and seven actually did so. Dowding and Hollebone proved an effective opening pair of bowlers, but Paterson, whose swingers met with great success in the holidays, was not called upon. The fielding, with the exception of Buckley and Minton—a captain above average ability—was patchy, though John behind the wicket, showed great promise. Rea, Hollebone and Holdsworth will be available this year.

Bromsgrove did not fulfil the promise of the early season, the main weakness being lack of bowling. Of the twelve matches played two were won, four lost and six drawn. Holden always batted well, particularly on wet wickets, but no one except Gould, the captain, appeared likely to break up a partnership. Shearer, a tall medium-paced right-hander with quite a fast leg-break, met with some success. Bhole, the wicket-keeper, will captain the eleven this year and Brazier, Turner, Green, Spencer and Jones will support him.

Able for the second year in succession to call upon seven old colours, *Cranleigh* placed in the field their strongest side for a long time. It must be said that, if they lost more matches than they won, all with the exception of two were very close, and when the batting failed, this lapse was often atoned for by the bowling and fielding. G. J. Reynolds, the younger of the two left-hand bowlers, accomplished the best individual performance by taking all ten Highgate wickets for 56 runs. Despite that achievement the match ended in a narrow defeat. The other school match, against Mill Hill, was drawn. F. J. Reynolds (102) and Cox (51) scored over a hundred for the School's first wicket against Old Cranleighans, and D. J. Morey, a younger brother of the captain, played an enterprising innings of 95 against the Authentics. L. J. Morey, the captain, a free-hitting left-hander and a brilliant field in any position, and Black put together several useful innings. Foot, receiving admirable support from Loates, bowled well. Seven colours will in all probability be returning this season.

The *Dover Eleven*, strong in batting and especially so in bowling and fielding, accomplished some fine performances, winning twelve of their sixteen matches and losing only three. The season concluded with a splendid victory in an innings over the Band of Brothers, against whom 371 runs were scored in two hours and a half for the loss of six wickets. Weymouth, who nearly saved the Young Amateurs of Kent from defeat at the Oval in September, terminated his school career with a dashing century. Altogether he scored over 500 runs and with his medium-paced deliveries took fifty-seven wickets for 11 runs apiece. He and Low, the captain, who had an aggregate of 534, averaged 37 and 33 respectively. Gibbs, a spin bowler, who could turn the ball either way, dismissed seventy-eight batsmen at a cost of exactly 10 runs each. Gange will be captain this year and Stewart, Clarke, White and Parsons are also staying on.

With a team averaging just over sixteen years of age *King's, Canterbury*, enjoyed their best season for thirty-four years, winning eight and drawing two of their fourteen games. The School's

success in club matches was largely due to the all-round ability of Robinson, the captain, and Knight. In the victory over K.C.S., Wimbledon, that school, after reaching 100 for the loss of one wicket, were dismissed for 151. Thanks to Knight and Jervis, who each scored 76, King's obtained the runs for the loss of three wickets. Jervis, the new captain, will have the help of Gower, Lovelace, Donaldson, Battiscombe and Parsons.

Though undergoing a temporary eclipse during the wet weather, the *Downside* team turned out to be one of the most successful in recent years. Bisgood and Gahan, the opening pair, whose running between wickets was exemplary, could usually be relied upon for runs, and if Seroope failed to reproduce his form of the previous year, he made amends to some extent by his brilliance in the field. Mackenzie played some first-rate innings. Van Cutsem was a real "find" as a slow bowler and took wickets regularly, his best performance being seven for 44 against Blundell's. Burke, Bell and Cave rendered him valuable assistance. The fielding on the whole was good, Muir, the captain, being above the average of school "stumpers." His fine work in catching four and stumping one enabled the School to gain a narrow victory over Sherborne. The only old colour left is Bell, but Pinsent and P. S. Smith, who played in some matches, are also expected to be available.

Except for the all-round play of the captain, Middleton, who afterwards kept wicket for the Young Amateurs at Lord's, *Christ's Hospital* had rather a disappointing season. A powerful hitter, Middleton showed special strength in the hook stroke. Lewis, who varied his pace and swung in dangerously, and Baggs, a steady left-hander, were the most effective bowlers. None of the other players fulfilled expectations. Macrae will captain the side this year with Davis as secretary.

St. Lawrence took some little time to settle down, but later scored wins over Incogniti, St. Edmund's (Canterbury), The Buffs, and the Old Lawrentians, winding up with a great victory over Dover, their old rivals, who thus suffered their only defeat in a School match. Much of the success was due to the captaincy—for the second year—of Hill, the best all-round player in the side. Calvert proved easily the outstanding batsman, and Beney and Hill worked splendidly in bowling. Pleydell and Cooper also showed promise. Seven of the side remain for this season:—Calvert (captain), Pleydell, Monk, Cooper, Beney, Larsen, and Brown.

With seven old colours available, *Wellingborough* anticipated better results than were achieved, but the batting was unreliable; bats-

men, having played themselves in, frequently losing their wickets through wretched strokes or poor judgment in running between wickets. J. Garne, the best player of the two previous years, never found his true form, no doubt because of ill-health in the spring, and excess of work for examinations. His comparative failure exercised a bad effect on those who followed him, though Egginton amongst other displays showed fine form against M.C.C., and Brodhurst batted well towards the end of the season. Jackson and Wells bowled steadily, but with little support and a slow leg-break bowler was badly needed to add variety. The fielding was generally safe and clean, Brodhurst being always reliable and at times brilliant behind the wicket.

The *University College School* Eleven, like so many others, very young and inexperienced, should do better this season. In more than one case outplayed, they lacked stability in batting, could call upon no bowler of any pace, and fielded indifferently. Wreford, who played in the Colts' match at Lord's for the last two seasons, possesses a real knowledge of the game, and as he will captain the eleven this year, an improvement may be expected. Campbell, Rodwell, and Bradfield are also available.

If not faring so well as in the previous season, *Oratory School* can look back on last year with satisfaction. They won eight matches, lost six and drew two, beating Douai and Magdalen College School, losing to Beaumont at Lord's, and to the Imperial Service College for the first time since the institution of the fixture in 1923. Burns, for the second year, kept wicket for the Lord's Schools and again headed the batting averages with 528 runs, and Molloy, a good all-rounder, scored 412 runs and took thirty-six wickets. Percy, another all-round cricketer, was a sound opening batsman and, with Gibson, broke the school first wicket record in a partnership of 195 against Berkshire Wanderers. The best bowler of the side was Dobson, fast left-hand, who took forty-nine wickets for just over 11 runs each. Molloy may return to captain the side and seven other old colours are expected back.

Merchant Taylors', in their first season on the new ground at Sandy Lodge, did not come up to expectations. Of the thirteen matches seven were drawn; four lost; and only two won. Piper, the captain, showed good all-round form, making scores of 117 not out, and 74 not out, while, with his leg-breaks, he took most wickets. Balkwill as an opening batsman was sound. The bowling possessed sufficient variety to trouble opponents. Barnes kept a length that precluded punishment and Quayle, left arm fast round the wicket, did useful work. Gibbon, this year's captain, saved many runs by particularly fine fielding. Camp, Clark and Barnes also remain.

Highgate did so well as to win outright all their five school matches. King's, Canterbury, were dismissed for 58 before lunch and Mill Hill for 63 a few minutes after the interval, the strength of the bowling being amply demonstrated by the fact that no school totalled more than 157 against it. Most of the work fell on Hayles, a left-hander, who had the splendid record of fifty wickets for 13 runs apiece. Three newcomers, Pawsey, Maclure and Freathy, rendered him sound support. In run-getting, Whitaker again enjoyed a good year, Hayles came on wonderfully and, if he has the leisure, should make a name for himself as an all-rounder, while Bemister gave some excellent forcing displays and Turnbull showed promise as an opening batsman. A good team missed being really first class through a certain slovenliness in the field, though Miller kept wicket consistently well. Turnbull, Freathy, Maclure and Pawsey stay on for next year.

Though *Eastbourne* lost five and won only three of the twelve matches played, the eleven were about the average form. Three of the undecided games were drawn in the school's favour. Bonsford was the best cricketer in the team and Horton, who scored a chanceless century against Lancing, and Hepburn, this year's captain, did useful service. Man led his colleagues skilfully and impressed favourably behind the wicket for the Young Amateurs of Kent against Surrey at the Oval. In the School matches, King's, Canterbury, were beaten, the Lancing game unfinished, and defeat experienced at the hands of Christ's Hospital and St. Edwards. Hepburn will have two old "Stags" to support him this year.

Leatherhead had an unfortunate season. They easily won the two School matches in May, beating Imperial Service College by eight wickets and Christ's Hospital by 39 runs, but a mumps epidemic put an end to all further school games. Turvin, the captain, played many fine innings and headed the averages with 47, and Mitchell (slow spin) and Kahn (fast swingers) shared the bowling honours. The fielding was always clean, Woodroffe at cover being brilliant on many occasions. Speak's all-round cricket was a feature and he will be captain this year. Lister, Lewis, Bagnall, Kahn, Woodroffe and Jones are also staying on.

Epsom won two out of seven matches, the one defeat being that by Merchant Taylors. Against Club teams they won three times and lost on five occasions. If the batting showed a pronounced tail, Eggar, Thompson, Little, and Brown were very consistent and seldom failed. The bowling honours fell to Gethen and Eggar, the former of whom, in particular, spun the ball well and kept a good length. Dunbar proved safe as wicket-keeper, and the

fielding was keen and smart. Only Thompson (captain), Higson and McClintock will be available this year, but there is plenty of promising young material.

The *Ampleforth* eleven fell below the standard of previous years, but in C. F. Grieve, the captain, they had a batsman who must rank among the best of those at the Public Schools. His doings at Oxford will be followed with interest. Waddilove, who with Coghlan bore the main burden of the bowling, rendered Grieve valuable assistance, and in a stand of over 200 for the fourth wicket at Sedbergh, enabled the visitors to pass the home score, Waddilove making 111 and Grieve 102. Two old colours, Waddilove and Walter, with E. H. Grieve, Gillow and Lovell, form the nucleus of this year's side.

At the start of *Leeds Grammar School's* season, it looked as if the batting would be the main strength of the team, but except that Phillipson and Shepherd played several excellent innings, expectations were not realised. The bowling, on the other hand, provided a pleasant surprise, Hargreaves and Capes, fast-medium, and Shepherd, a slow spin bowler, being remarkably successful at times. The Eleven found their form in June, and the season's work gave considerable satisfaction, four school games being won, one lost, and six unfinished. Shepherd succeeds Phillipson in the captaincy, and hopes to have the assistance of Sugden, Capes, Wormald, Atkinson, White, Bolton and Rakusen.

Mainly owing to Belle, the captain, a fine all-round athlete, *Forest* won all their inter-school matches and lost only two of the others, including that with M.C.C. A sound opening batsman with plenty of strokes, Belle scored over 300 runs in nine completed innings, and, taking 26 wickets for less than fourteen runs apiece with his good length medium-paced deliveries, headed both batting and bowling averages. He set a fine example in the field, especially at first slip, and in an emergency could keep wicket. Chief credit should be given to the bowling, in which Belle received able support from Hill, McGlew and Taster. Belle's athletic career at Oxford will be closely watched.

Cranbrook School, defeated only once the previous year, again lost once—by 42 runs to the same opponents, Dover College. Jacobs the captain, headed both tables of averages and he received valuable assistance from Clark and Kitchen, two all-rounders, and Skinner, a slow spin bowler, who took 38 wickets for just over fourteen runs apiece. Jacobs—who averaged over 50 for the third successive year—and Clark, both played for the Young Amateurs at Lord's, and each

scored a century against Ardingly in an innings declared at 403 for nine. Clark remains to captain the side and Kitchen, Weston and Scott will also be available.

Considering the strength of the opposition, *Bishop's Stortford* could feel satisfied with the results of the season. Seven of the sixteen matches were won and three drawn. Special distinction fell to the opening batsmen, D. F. Cock and J. D. C. Joslin, who distinguished themselves in the holidays for the Young Amateurs of Essex. R. L. G. Dawson will captain the side in 1934 and will have the assistance of A. S. Tee and R. F. A. Sharp.

Though young and inexperienced, the *Whitgift* eleven, with only one old colour left, developed promisingly after an unsettled beginning. The club matches yielded better results than those with other schools, and the side put up a confident show against the M.C.C. Only two members of the team have left, Osborne, the captain, having gone up to Cambridge, and four old colours, Merrett (vice captain), Lambert, Christophers and Crowson remain to form the backbone of the side this year.

A little weaker in batting than last year and missing the services of a fast bowler, *City of London School* won only four of their fifteen fixtures. Deacon, with two centuries (both not out) batted exceedingly well all the term, and Bolton, with one not-out hundred, showed promise of becoming a really good bat. The bowling lacked variety and sting, but excellent fielding prevented opposing batsmen from taking full toll. Hartley, the wicket-keeper, stumped nineteen and caught seven. The school won a most exciting match against *Whitgift* by one wicket, 18 runs being needed when the last man went in.

The best performance in a successful season for *Taunton* was a victory by four runs over M.C.C., whose team included J. C. White and three professionals. The batting improved considerably, but the bowling lacked the deadliness of past years, Cameron—who headed the batting averages—having lost much of his spin. The most useful bowler was J. V. Wild, who will captain the side this year. He is the only old colour left, but Clifford, Collett, Jones and Strivens, second XI colours, will be available.

Rydal did well to win six and draw four of their matches, W. Wooller, the captain, and Welsh international footballer, a very fine bat and most useful fast bowler, developing a bad knee and being able to play only in the first game. In the school matches Birkenhead and Merchant Taylors were each beaten by five wickets while Liverpool won an excellent game by four wickets. Hughes scored over 500

runs, and Burton, under fourteen at the beginning of the term, proved quite an exceptional cricketer. He opened the innings regularly and scored nearly 400 runs. The absence of a fast bowler was felt severely, but Costain, Littler, Mellor and Hughes, who could all spin the ball, formed a useful combination, backed up by probably the best fielding side the school has ever had. It is hoped that Littler, Burton, G. Wooller, Griffiths, Costain and Downes will return this summer.

Edinburgh Academy began the season badly by losing to George Watson's, but made amends by defeating Fettes, and having lost to Glengalmond—probably the best school side in Scotland—wound up satisfactorily with victories over Loretto and Merchiston. The best all-round player was Tait, who should do well at Cambridge. Stevenson will again be captain and there remain Bruce-Lockhart, Herriott, Kennedy, Newman, the wicket-keeper, and Ballantyne.

Undefeated in School matches *Trinity College, Glengalmond*, gained good victories over Fettes and Edinburgh Academy. The batting, bowling and fielding reached a high standard, and Hunter, the captain, a good all-round cricketer, never hesitated to pursue a bold policy. McJannet, whose forcing cricket gave him first place in the batting averages, and Hunter are both going up to Oxford. Mudie, captain next year, proved himself a most useful all-rounder, and with old colours in Gregoire, who bowled very well, Milne, Kennedy and Keiller, should be able to build up another good side.

Loretto disappointed, for of nineteen matches played but three were won, six lost and ten drawn. They won only one School match—that against George Watson's; the others were all lost. The batting was unreliable and lacked confidence, no one being able to make runs consistently, and apart from Barratt no effective bowler came to light. Robertson, who will captain the team, Gray, Swanson, Haigh and Gillies remain for this year.

Merchiston Castle's young and inexperienced side, met with varied experiences. The batting proved good enough, and the bowling, if lacking real sting, was for the most part steady, but the ground fielding and catching provided the feature of the cricket. Gummer, who scored nearly 700 runs, including a splendid innings of 135, did best in batting, and often received useful support from Lumsden, Drummond and Yellowlees. Richardson, right-hand medium, could make the ball do a little either way and Herd, medium left-hand, with swerve and speed off the pitch, bowled very well for a boy under sixteen. Of the old colours, Gummer, Drummond, Harker and Herd are staying on, in addition to Yellowlees and Webster, half blues.

George Watson's enjoyed a most successful season, losing only to Loretto, of the Schools, defeating Edinburgh Academy and Merchiston Castle, and drawing with Fettes and Glenalmond. The all-round form of McNeil and Dunn, the captain and vice-captain, stood out prominently, this pair participating in several good first-wicket stands. McNeil's slow bowling on three occasions earned him seven wickets in an innings and in all he took 67 for just over nine runs apiece. Dunn scored 546 runs and took 34 wickets at an average cost of less than fourteen runs each. Thomson, Holmes, Hill, Davies, McNab and Dewar remain for this year.

ETON v. HARROW.

Played at LORD'S, Friday, Saturday, July 14, 15. — For the ninth time in twelve years the Eton and Harrow match was left drawn, Eton, when stumps were pulled up at a quarter past seven on Saturday, being 104 behind with six wickets to fall. When at five minutes to seven Eton had four wickets down for 51 runs great hopes were entertained by the Harrovians of registering that victory which for 25 years had eluded them. Thirty-five minutes remaining for play there existed a possibility of an exciting finish but, as it happened, no further success attended the efforts of the Harrow bowlers. Cripps and Dixon for twenty minutes resisted all attempts to separate them and it was decided to draw stumps. Maintaining the improvement they showed the previous year, Harrow again appeared to be the better side, but, like Eton, had no particular strength in bowling. Neither school possessed a dangerous fast bowler, though in Duveen, who took seven wickets for 10 runs apiece, Harrow had a promising slow left-arm bowler. Slight in build, he revealed a nice action and imparted spin and flight quite cleverly. Most important of all, he kept a good length. At times Kaye, right-arm medium, bowled well. He kept down the runs in the Eton first innings while Duveen obtained the wickets, but he sent down far too many balls outside the off stump. Eton, in escaping defeat, once more had to thank Hotchkin for his sound defensive batting. Hotchkin boasts an outstanding record against Harrow for, in three matches, his consecutive innings have yielded him these scores: 153, 109, 96, 88 and 12, making an aggregate of 458 runs and an average of 91.60. While he failed to score many runs on the off side he was very strong and certain when hitting to the on, and he made most of his runs in front of the wicket. Seventh out in the first innings, he batted three hours twenty minutes, hitting eight 4's and seven 3's.

Besides Hotchkin, their captain, the Eton eleven contained four other members—Boyd, Dixon, Bewicke and Turnbull—who appeared against Harrow

in 1932, while the Dark Blues had three "old flannels" in Tindall, their captain, Pulbrook and Heaton. It was notable that Heaton, who gave away 42 byes in Eton's first innings the previous year, conceded only six byes in this encounter, all in the second innings. He was responsible, however, for one remarkable incident when Eton had scored 147 for five wickets. Pilkington left his crease, imagining that the ball had gone past the wicket-keeper, but Heaton had gathered it, and, though he could have run up and removed the bails, he stood still and, when he aimed at the stumps, he missed. Fortunately the error did not prove serious.

Heavy rain, which spoiled the Oxford and Cambridge match earlier in the week, left the pitch rather soft but Tindall, on winning the toss, decided to take first innings and Harrow, putting together a total of 237, kept their opponents in the field exactly five hours. The conditions were certainly difficult for batsmen before lunch, when in two and a half hours Harrow scored 102 for three wickets, but gradually the turf dried and, all things considered, Harrow had every reason to be satisfied with their batting efforts. At times a high wind caused large dark clouds to vary the light and there were a few spots of rain though no delays occurred on the first day. On the other hand, when Eton went in at ten minutes past five for an hour and fifty minutes, the sun shone brilliantly and the pitch having become firm, everything favoured run-getting.

Harrow began well, Tindall bringing off several delightful strokes, but Pulbrook, who hit up 104 in the corresponding match in 1932, never appeared comfortable. Left-handed, he wasted his natural advantage of height by adopting a cramped "two-eyed" stance. Still, he saw 48 runs obtained during the opening stand. Then wickets fell steadily and seven men were out for 137, but Pawle, who went in second wicket down at 51, still remained. Up to this point he had batted cautiously, but at last he found a reliable partner in Heaton, who immediately attacked the bowling. Heaton hit four boundaries from straight drives and in half an hour scored 27 out of 46. Having seen the easy way Heaton made his runs, Pawle changed the character of his batting and, whereas, when joined by Duveen, he had occupied three hours ten minutes making 54, he scored his next 42 runs in half an hour before tea. Directly after the interval he lost Duveen when the ninth wicket stand—the best of the innings—had realised 54 in fifty-five minutes. Attempting to reach three figures, Pawle gave a catch to mid-off. Batting altogether three hours fifty minutes he made his 96 out of 186. When seven he offered a sharp chance off Hotchkin of stumping, the ball going wide on the leg side. Subsequently he did little wrong until reaching 70, after which, in trying to force the game, he made some mis-hits. These, however, were minor faults in a skilful and plucky innings. Strong on the leg side and good in cutting, he hit ten 4's. Hotchkin employed six bowlers, but Holmes and Turner alone caused much trouble.

When Eton went in Harrow tried no fewer than six bowlers while the total rose to 13, and of these Tindall, fast, and Pulbrook, Duveen and Carris were all left-handers. Boyd, who batted left-hand, left at 45 but Cripps, hitting freely to leg, helped to add 43, and at the close the Eton total stood at 91 for three wickets. The next morning Dixon stayed until the score reached 131, following which the last six wickets fell in seventy-five minutes for 64 runs, Harrow gaining a lead of 42. Going on at 160, Duveen in his last spell returned these figures: 9.1 overs, 2 maidens, 19 runs, 4 wickets.

Thanks to the hard hitting of Tindall and a neat display by Collins, Harrow obtained 146 for the loss of six wickets by tea time, when heavy rain caused a delay of eighty-five minutes. Tindall declared and Eton had an hour and thirty-five minutes to get 189 to win. Losing Hotchkin at 20 and Boyd four runs later, they soon found themselves struggling hard to avoid defeat.

On each day the attendance numbered about 17,000, the spectators paying for admission being 13,411 on Friday and 13,194 on Saturday.

Of the 104 matches played, Eton have won 42, Harrow 35, and 27 have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857 which has been rejected.

The one-day matches between the two schools during the War are not reckoned as belonging to the regular series.

In making his 183 Boles set up a new record for the match, beating the 152 obtained in 1841 by Emilius Bayley, afterwards the Rev. Sir John Robert Laurie. M. C. Bird in 1907, by scoring 100 not out and 131, performed a feat without precedent in the match. In 1932, N. S. Hotchkiss, who played a three-figure innings in the previous year's match, scored 109 and 96, following these scores in 1933 with 88 and 12.

Up to lunch time on Tuesday, Clifton held the upper hand, but Tonbridge fought back and at one point possessed a slight chance of victory. Clifton found run-getting so easy on a fast pitch that they declared at tea time on the first day, the feature of their innings being a fine partnership between Heath and Nuttall, who added 60 in twenty-five minutes. Tonbridge broke down badly before Scott, a fifteen-year-old leg-break bowler, half the side being out for 86, and despite a plucky innings by Leach, Day, a son of A. P. Day, the former Kent cricketer, and Ball, they had to follow-on 127 behind. Losing four wickets for 43, Tonbridge stood in danger of an innings defeat until Ball and Day helped G. C. La Fontaine to put on 109 and 62. Requiring 131, Clifton had three wickets down for 39, but then Barlow and Edelhain, taking no risks, hit off the remaining runs in creditable style.

RUGBY v. MARLBOROUGH.

Played at Lord's, Wednesday, Thursday, August 2, 3. — The victory of Rugby over Marlborough by 168 runs was made memorable by the achievements of Steel and Duncan, who twice engaged in a three-figure opening stand. In the first innings they scored 115 in ninety minutes and followed this with a partnership of 124 in an hour and twenty-five minutes. Their efforts constituted a record for Rugby. At the start both sides found runs difficult to make, for after Cheltenham had been dismissed in an hour and a half for 97, Haileybury lost half their wickets for 42 before Childs came to the rescue with a sound innings that extended over nearly two hours. Mayhew, who took five wickets for 13 runs with his medium-pace deliveries, followed up his good work with the ball by giving a dashing exhibition, adding 80 in fifty-five minutes in company with Childs. Then a bright last-wicket stand of 66 between Darewski and Hayles made Haileybury's position very strong. Cheltenham, 142, behind, reduced their arrears to 75 for the loss of four men on Friday evening, and the next morning Arengo-Jones hit powerfully for an hour, but after he left the end soon came.
