# PUBLIC SCHOOL CRICKET IN 1939

In spite of a wet spell which spoilt several good matches and also accounted for subsequent batting collapses by sides who had excelled on the fast wickets of May and June, the Schools season was a thoroughly interesting one, notable in two respects—first for the number of outstanding all-rounders, and secondly for

an improvement in the standard of bowling.

Among the most successful all-rounders were S. I. Philips. the Brighton captain, who scored 727 runs (including four centuries) and took 27 wickets; D. G. Lacy Scott, the Marlborough captain; H. A. Pawson, the Winchester captain; P. W. P. Clarke, the Repton captain; P. B. K. Gracey, the Wellington captain; D. A. N. Allen (Charterhouse), N. Gibbs (Clifton), W. J. N. Carter (Uppingham), M. P. Rose-Price (Tonbridge), R. J. A. Darwin (Radley), R. J. C. Higgins (Cranleigh), D. H. Burrow and J. H. G. Deighton (Denstone). These were either good batsmen who bowled well or good bowlers who batted well, so that the list is still incomplete without such successful batsmen wicket-keepers as A. O. L. Lithgow, the Harrow captain, N. T. A. Fiennes, the Eton captain; N. M. Mischler, the St. Paul's captain, who also turned himself into an opening bowler on several occasions; A. L. Evans (Worksop); R. M. Hill (Wellington); and A. Dawes, the Dover captain.

Outstanding fast bowlers were few and far between, but among those more accurately described as medium to fast who had a good season were D. G. Lacy Scott (Mariborough), L. E. W. Byam (Harrow), P. Benett (Charterhouse), M. R. G. Earls-Davis and H. J. C. Bashford (Sherborne), A. L. Hardy (Haileybury), J. H. G. Deighton (Denstone), and R. J. A. Darwin (Radley).

Lacy Scott was particularly effective with the new ball and was seen at his best against Winchester and Cheltenham. Byam had good control of length and bowled his off-breaks with marked success in Eton's second innings; and against Charterhouse and Winchester. Benett could maintain a fine pace for about four overs and was most effective against Harrow and Eton.

Earls-Davis and Bashford proved a strong combination for Sherborne and had an especially good match against Westminster. Hardy lacked effective support, but could maintain both a good length and pace. Deighton, although he did not have such sensational figures as in the previous season, was again very successful,

as witness his 62 wickets, average 8.72. He has an action not unlike that of Maurice Tate, and at times gets almost bewildering pace off the pitch. In addition he developed into a good opening batsman.

Considering that he was not seventeen, Darwin had a splendid record (62 wickets, average 15.8), though at times he was inclined to be erratic. Among outstanding spin bowlers were M. P. Rose-Price (Tonbridge), B. R. Bland (Marlborough), W. J. N. Carter (Uppingham), H. A. Pawson (Winchester), N. Gibbs and A. K. Rees (Clifton), W. R. Duff (Cheltenham), J. D. Sayer (Shrewsbury), and J. Hunter-Gray (Ampleforth).

Rose-Price had a remarkable record for Tonbridge, taking 78 wickets, average 11.35. This brilliant form he reproduced during the Lord's Fortnight, when he excelled against Clifton, The Rest, and The Army, taking altogether 12 wickets for 105 runs in four innings. He varied his pace cleverly, flighting the

ball effectively, without any sacrifice of length.

Bland bowled his leg-breaks with marked success against Winchester and Cheltenham, and Carter and Sayers, both left-handers, had impressive records. Gibbs and Rees bowled well against Tonbridge, and Pawson bowled with considerable guile even on easy-paced wickets. Hunter-Gray, a 15-year-old "discovery," has an easy action, and good control of length and spin.

There was, as usual, no lack of good batsmen, who were helped by the hard wickets of May and June. Pawson (Winchester) fully developed the promise he had shown in the previous season, his finest innings, perhaps, being against Harrow. W. R. S. Dods, of Malvern, who scored 744 runs in 12 innings, Philips, of Brighton, who followed up a splendid season at School by scoring a brilliant century for the Young Amateurs against the Young Professionals at Lord's, G. W. L. Courtenay and D. P. T. Deshon (aged 16) who shared in a record opening partnership of 243 against Downside, and D. A. N. Allen, whose 151 for Charterhouse against Harrow after Charterhouse had followed on and lost seven wickets for 129 in their second innings, was one of the finest innings of the season. A. O. L. Lithgow, the Harrow captain, Lacy Scott, of Marlborough, P. B. C. Moore and C. J. H. Paget (Cheltenham), W. J. H. Shephard (Haileybury), P. B. K. Gracey (Wellington), P. G. C. Wood (Tonbridge), H. C. Munro, the Rugby captain, and M. A. Mahony (Ampleforth), were other outstanding school batsmen.

For the most part batsmen showed plenty of enterprise, and a refreshing eagerness to go for the runs, an eagerness which produced several fine finishes, such as those between Haileybury and Uppingham, and Uppingham and Rugby, while captains on the whole were imbued with the right spirit in making their

declarations. But there were occasions when it seemed that the game was sacrificed to the result, either by excessive caution on the part of batsmen, such as that shown by one side which took two hours and a half to score the 80 odd runs needed for victory (their captain batted an hour and thirty minutes for 10 runs), or safety-first tactics by captains, as exemplified by one captain, who appealed against the light (which was certainly not good, but presaged rain putting an end to the match) when his side, with six wickets in hand, needed only some 30 runs to win. The will to win, as so splendidly demonstrated by A. O. L. Lithgow and his Harrow side against Eton at Lord's, is always to be encouraged, but not the fear of losing.

The records of the various schools are dealt with in subsequent pages, but special mention should be made here of Tonbridge's remarkable performances. Apart from the fact that they were unbeaten in school matches, and also beat such sides as M.C.C., Free Foresters and Band of Brothers, it is worthy of note that nine of their batsmen scored individual 50's, four scored centuries,

and six aggregated over 450 runs.

Another performance which calls for special mention is N. M. Mischler's wicket-keeping feat for the Rest in the second innings of the Lord's Schools. In stumping four and catching three batsmen, Mischler, who, incidentally, had not done much wicket-keeping for St. Paul's, this season having turned himself into an opening bowler, accomplished what is probably a schools' record. Certainly the feat has not been surpassed in First-class cricket.

#### YOUNG AMATEURS' SUCCESS

The Clifton v. Tonbridge, Rugby v. Marlborough, Lord's Schools v. Rest, and Army v. Public Schools matches are dealt with under "Other Matches at Lord's," but no mention of the Lord's Fortnight would be complete without reference to the fine victory gained by the Young Amateurs over the Young Professionals. A century by Brooks, followed by good bowling by Lee, resulted in the Young Amateurs following-on 128 runs behind. A brilliant century by their captain, S. I. Philips (Brighton) supported by a hard hit 74 from R. O. Lloyd (Liverpool), improved the position, and the Professionals were left to get 112 runs to win. With only four wickets down for 71, the Professionals seemed well placed, but so skilfully did Philips use his bowlers, notably W. J. N. Carter (Haileybury), and G. W. Knight (Victoria College, Jersey), that the last wicket fell at 111 with only three minutes of the extra time left.

#### CANADIAN SCHOOLBOYS' TOUR IN ENGLAND

A team of Canadian Schoolboys visited England for a short tour during July. Apart from the fact that they were unaccustomed to turf wickets, they were unlucky in having to play most of their games on soft wickets, and their batsmen consequently were usually in difficulties against spin bowling. Their captain, L. J. Ashburner, played several good innings, notably against Tonbridge, King's Canterbury, and the English Public Schools team which later toured Canada. N. A. Urquhart, J. R. Henderson, G. H. Gallie and T. B. Seagram also played useful innings. Ashburner was also the side's best bowler and had good support from Henderson, A. K. Johnston and Gallie. The fielding, particularly the throwing in, was always keen.

Of the eleven matches arranged, those with Malvern and Marlborough were washed out by rain, the games with Cheltenham and R.A.S.C. at Aldershot were abandoned, also through rain, the games with Charterhouse and Cranleigh drawn, those with Sherborne, Tonbridge, King's Bruton and The English Schoolboys (at Lord's) lost, and that with King's Canterbury won, this being

the only school match lost by King's Canterbury.

#### BRITISH PUBLIC SCHOOLS' CANADIAN AND U.S.A. TOUR

For the first time, a British Public Schools team played a series of matches in Canada and the United States, under the auspices of the Overseas Education League of Canada. The team was under the management of Mr. P. M. Heywood, and comprised the following players:—

W. N. White (The Leys), captain, J. G. Mackeurtan (Eton), vice-captain, J. P. Pyman (Repton), S. S. Rogers (Highgate), J. Corben (King's Canterbury), L. Linley (Repton), R. J. A. Darwin (Radley), R. G. Nicholls (Oundle), R. S. Colquhoun (Glenalmond), J. G. Larking (Charterhouse), F. F. Calway (Westminster), A. J. Witherington (The Leys), G. J. Ellerton (Highgate), G. T. Pearson (Radley), P. N. Watt (Oundle), and R. C. Lynch (St. Peter's, York).

Of 14 matches played seven were won, five drawn, one tied, and one lost. W. N. White not only headed both batting and bowling averages for the Tour, but proved an ideal captain. He had good support in batting from R. J. A. Darwin, A. J. Witherington and J. Linley, while most of the others were useful run-getters. Most of the side found it difficult to reproduce their best form on the matting wickets. There was a good variety of bowling and the wicket-keeping was shared by G. T. Pearson and R. S. Colquhoun.

#### ETON v. HARROW

At Lord's, July 14, 15. Harrow won by eight wickets. Those who were present at the headquarters of cricket on Saturday, July 15, 1939, will never forget the delirious excitement aroused by Harrow's first victory since 1908 over their great rivals. As Lithgow, the Harrow captain, finished the match with three successive drives to the pavilion boundary, the crowd invaded the field and carried both Lithgow and Crutchley in triumph to the pavilion.

Then for twenty minutes an ordered assembly, numbering about 8,000, cheered the heroes. The victorious team, with Hendren, their popular coach, appeared on the balcony; the Harrow school song was sung and there followed a free fight for top hats. Not for twenty years had the meeting of Eton and Harrow ended with such a frenzied scene. Before the 1920 match, the Eton captain, W. W. Hill-Wood, in consequence of the fighting that followed the conclusion of the first game after the 1914–18 war, issued a notice that any repetition of such misconduct would lead to the Eton and Harrow match being taken away from Lord's. That warning had the desired effect and the behaviour had been

exemplary until this 1939 meeting.

Harrow thoroughly deserved their victory, but it was a hard struggle, particularly on the opening day when at one period the Eton bowlers threatened to gain the upper hand. From the start Eton shaped well with the bat, but against keen bowling and smart fielding, half the wickets fell for 102. Then the Hon. R.F. Wood, son of Lord Halifax, played a steady innings while Henderson hit the ball to all parts of the field. Wood made some neat strokes through the covers, besides scoring well on the leg side, and in half an hour he and Henderson put on 60. Eighth to leave Henderson, top scorer for his side, claimed nine 4's. Driving and pulling with tremendous power, he made his runs in thirty-eight minutes. The Harrow bowlers suffered even worse punishment from Gilmour and Pearson, whose brisk partnership yielded 78. A stylish left-hander, Gilmour cut splendidly and also scored freely in the region of fine leg. During his early minutes at the crease Pearson was remarkably fortunate; his first fourteen runs all came off the edge, but afterwards he pulled heartily, Harrow having to pay

dearly for some rather loose bowling towards the end of the innings.

According to M.C.C. recommendation the six ball over operated, as in all school matches, and Boult, given long spells, tired, though he was the pick of the Harrow bowlers. Cowley sent down some good leg breaks, but was creatic. Still he dismissed both Gilmour and Pearson when things were becoming

somewhat desperate for the Dark Blues.

Thanks to hard hitting by the tail-end batsmen, Eton reached quite a formidable total. Crutchley and Anson, bearing names associated with the last Harrow win thirty-one years previously, came together at the fall of the fourth wicket at 102, and in an hour they gave their side a real fighting chance by adding 117, the best stand of the match. The real hero was Crutchley. Going in when the second wicket fell at 29, he batted stylishly and produced plenty of strokes. He forced the ball off his legs with easy facility and his off drives yielded many runs. When fifth to leave at 219, after batting just over two hours, Crutchley had just hooked Henderson for two 4's in the same over that the new ball was taken; trying another punishing stroke, he was caught at mid-off. His 115 included thirteen boundaries. Lithgow helped him put on 64 for the third wicket and when stumps were pulled up on Friday, Harrow were three behind with three wickets left. Anson not out 66, had attacked the bowlers severely, cutting and pulling with great power, but next morning he soon fell, having made his 76 in one hour, fifty minutes and hit ten 4's. Eton bowled keenly and Wallace, who employed a ring of three short legs, accomplished splendid work in taking half the wickets. He always commanded respect, but the other bowlers suffered heavy punishment from Crutchley and Anson

heavy punishment from Crutchley and Anson.

Shortly before midday Eton went in again, 26 runs behind. They lost Colman at six, bowled off stump, but Fiennes and Barton took command in a second wicket stand of 60. Both shaped confidently until Henley, medium pace, turned the issue for Harrow by dismissing three men in the course of seven deliveries. Barton was taken at silly mid-off; superb catches at mid-on and second slip disposed of Mackeurtan and Fiennes. When Byam, who specialised in fast out-swingers, knocked back Wood's middle stump, half the side were out for 79 and the lunch interval arrived with the total 86. Eton continued to offer stout resistance, but Boustead was responsible for the fall of the last four wickets. He bowled Coats, and though hampered by a colleague, he held a skier from Gilmour behind the bowler. Next, Boustead caught Lyttelton at extra cover and

finally he ran out Pearson.

Harrow began their task of making 131 to win at half-past three and the excited crowd cheered every run from the beginning of the innings. There came

an early set-back when Boustead's stumps were wrecked at 18, but sound and vigorous hitting by Paul and Lithgow virtually saw Harrow safely home. Both of them drove, pulled and hooked superbly; to counter this Eton bowled and fielded magnificently. So there was always a possibility that the unexpected might happen and many onlookers recalled Fowler's match when Eton won

The crucial moments came after tea, taken at 47 for one wicket. A violent assault on Pearson's leg breaks yielded 18 runs in one over, Lithgow hitting three boundaries and Paul one; with Henderson also suffering from Lithgow, 40 runs came in twenty minutes. The partnership realised 78 before Paul was bowled at 96 and then Crutchley stayed while Lithgow continued his gay onslaught. The remarkable scenes at the finish have already been described, but mention must be made that Lithgow claimed as many as eleven 4's while lanking 67 in only 75 minutes. Superior batting gave Harrow their advantage and they won comfortably. Eton deserved compliments for their attractive cricket. There was no slow play in the match; both teams hit the ball well in front of the wicket.

Of the 110 matches played, Eton have won 43, Harrow 36, and 31 have been drawn. This is the generally published record, but Harrow men object very strongly to the game in 1805 being treated as a regular contest between the two schools, contending that it is no more correct to count that than the fixture in 1857 which has been rejected.

The one-day matches between the two schools during the 1915-1918 War are not reckoned as belonging to the regular series.

#### THE SCHOOLS

Aldenham, with only three old Colours, experienced a less successful season than usual, drawing nine and losing six of the fifteen matches played. T. M. Argile, the Captain, was the outstanding member of a young and inexperienced side, and his consistent batting was a feature of the season. He had chief support from L. K. Scott, a careful and reliable batsman and a steady bowler. Several newcomers showed promise, notably K. G. Hickson and D. J. E. Roberts as batsmen and R. H. G. Hoff as an all-rounder. The bowling suffered from lack of accuracy, but the fielding was good.

Alleyn's enjoyed a fairly successful season, winning six and drawing three out of a total of fourteen matches played. The outstanding player in the team was B. C. R. Smith, the captain, who had the fine batting average of 66.3 for an aggregate of 796 runs, and who took 36 wickets for 16.1 runs each; in so doing proving himself to be one of the best all-rounders the school has produced in recent years. Compared with this, the performances of the other members of the team were moderate only, but P. R. Noakes bowled consistently well and S. W. G. Hill was a successful bowler during short spells, while J. E. Keech showed himself to be a greatly improved batsman.

Allhallows. Judged by results, the season of 1939 was successful, and had the weather been less bad during the latter part of the term, the record might have been very good indeed. In School matches, Kelly College, Newton, and R.N.C. 2nd XI were defeated, while drawn games, all spoiled by rain, were played with Exeter School, Weymouth, and King's College, Taunton. The only reverse during the season was at the hands of a strong Somerset Stragglers side.

The fielding was generally excellent. The batting showed some improvement on that of previous seasons, particularly as there was much more promise and ability shown lower in the order. Harper and Stumbles made a useful opening pair and set an excellent example in prompt running between wickets. McKelvie was consistent and sound and showed real promise, while most of the other members of the side contributed usefully at times.

McKelvie and Clarke, who captained the side with the greatest possible keenness, were badly overworked bowlers, as the weakness of the side lay in the shortage of change bowling.

Ampleforth went through the season unbeaten and must be regarded as one of the best sides in the North. In school

matches, Bootham, St. Peter's (York), Sedbergh and Douai were all beaten and rain prevented any chance of a finish with Durham. Of the club matches four were won and five drawn. the result in every case save one being much in favour of the school. G. V. Garbett, an excellent captain, was also a fine wicket-keeper and useful batsman. A. M. Mahony headed the batting averages with the fine average of 62.1. In seven innings he scored five fifties and two hundreds, the one against St. Peter's School being a particularly brilliant effort. E. A. Smith, second in the averages, was the class batsman of the side though no less than four others reached the fifty mark on one or more occasions. Of the bowlers, P. J. Liddell and M. A. Sutton, fast and slow bowlers respectively, each captured over thirty wickets but J. Hunter-Gray must be regarded as the best. The fielding was very good indeed with Sutton showing up brilliantly at cover-point.

Public School Cricket in 1939

Ardingly were hampered by the lack of a left-arm bowler, and the bowling was, in fact, of too much the same style. The batting, however, was sound even though a satisfactory opening pair could not be found. C. R. Simms-Reeve, the captain, set the side a good example, his best innings being 117 not out against Cranbrook. For the first time since 1933, the Old Boys were beaten, while the match with M.C.C. was lost by only seven runs.

Beaumont. The season of 1939 proved to be one of the most successful that the School has ever had. Batting and bowling were of a high standard and it came as a big disappointment when they were beaten at Lord's by their old rivals, the Oratory School. Previous to this game they had won all their School matches. D. L. Bruen and H. Holmes were the oustanding batsmen, while J. Corbould (slow left hand), and C. A. Crouch (fast right hand) bowled well throughout the season. The fielding was not always up to standard, though A. de la Mare proved himself to be a first-class wicket-keeper. J. A. Corbould will again captain the side this season and will have the assistance of two old Colours, D. L. Bruen and P. L. Allpress, while most of last year's team will still be at school.

Bedford. The season opened with five old colours-J. G. Doubleday, the captain and a batsman, three bowlers in C. R. Feilden and T. H. Blundell (both fast-medium), and A. C. Marston (medium in-swingers), and P. M. Vasey, an all-rounder. Matters did not go well from the start owing to a series of batting failures. No one could make runs except Doubleday, who was a model of consistency, and finished with a fine average. In the second half of the season, D. D. Audley developed into a sound opening batsman, and T. Daniel was a good forcing bat, but the rest of the side were singularly short either of strokes or of reliability. R. H. Crompton gave Doubleday the most help in the early matches, and played really well at a crisis on several occasions, but he failed completely in three out of the four school matches, and only recovered form in the Old Bedfordian match at the end of the term. Bedford could never find a good opening pair, or a No. 3, and Doubleday, at No. 4, had to play defensively in match after match. The three main bowlers were as good an attacking force as Bedford have had for some years, but all too often they did not have a big enough total to bowl against and a good slow bowler, a left hander or a leg-breaker was badly needed. Vasey often bowled slow off-spinners quite well, but he was no more than a change bowler. The final record might have been better but for a shoulder injury suffered by Marston, which kept him out of four of the club matches. He was the best bowler on the side, good enough to worry the best of batsmen when he struck a length. In School matches St. Paul's were beaten, the matches with The Leys and Dulwich drawn, and that against Oundle lost.

Berkhamsted, though they had five old colours, did not have a very successful season. They lost badly to St. Lawrence and Bishop's Stortford, and by a small margin to Mill Hill. They drew with Christ's Hospital, Merchant Taylors' and Aldenham, and their only victory was over Whitgift. Isherwood was the outstanding member of the team, though in bowling he did not equal his performance in 1938. The batting generally was very inconsistent, but R. G. Simons and Bleakley, who should both be back for 1940, played really well at times. After Term, Isherwood was invited to play for Bucks, and Simons for Hertfordshire.

Bishop's Stortford had a good season against school sides. Felsted, Berkhamsted, and Chigwell being beaten, while the Aldenham game was left drawn, the only defeat being by The Leys. J. Ferguson, the captain, was not so successful in batting or bowling as in the previous season, while D. W. Smith failed to maintain a fine start. A. N. F. McLean, D. W. Dupont and L. G. Wilson were usually reliable and the newcomers to the side provided useful all-round support. The new captain is McLean.

Blundell's began the season badly by losing four of their first five games, but afterwards won all the five other matches which measles and the weather permitted them to play. In July, only two matches were possible owing to rain, and the crowning disappointment came when the XI, invited to play before the King and Queen against the Royal Naval College, Dartmouth, arrived there to find the wicket under water.

At Sherborne the side were outplayed early on in the season by a very strong batting side, while after dismissing Downside for 146 on a good wicket, the batting broke down, B. A. Miller, the captain, alone offering real resistance. From this stage onwards the attack was very convincing and no opponents totalled 150. Miller set his side a good example with ball and bat and was one of the best all-rounders Blundells have had for some years. He is succeeded as captain by D. Chapman, another good all-rounder.

Bradfield played fourteen matches, five of which were won, five lost and four drawn. Of the schools, St. Edward's, Radley, and Lancing were beaten; the Stowe game was lost by a large margin, and that with Wellington was drawn. The batting came on quite well. B. G. Brocklehurst was by far the most successful player. He could hit hard and scored 24 runs in an over at Lancing. D. J. Martin, the captain, and R. S. Kingsford played steadily. and B. C. Elgood was a stout defender who has strokes also if he will only use them. H. F. Watson played some good innings and the left-hander, G. T. Gutteridge, improved. There was variety in the bowling and Evans at his best was extremely good, being able to spin the ball both ways at above average speed. Helm worked hard, but had less control of length than last year and proved more expensive. Roden is a promising left-hander. Cain showed quite good form behind the wicket, and the fielding was sound, though nobody showed special ability. Martin always handled the side well on the field.

Brentwood had a satisfactory season, eight matches were won, three lost and ten drawn. There was no outstanding batsman, but H. B. Carroll was a good all-rounder with a batting average of 18, 35 wickets to his credit and consistent excellence in the field.

Bromsgrove enjoyed a successful season, and proved to be the best side the school has produced for several years. Of the eleven matches played, five were won and four lost, as compared with only one victory in the previous year. This improvement was largely due to the efficiency and enthusiasm of the captain, C. C. J. Forge, whose all-round play was a great asset to the side. The batting, apart from J. C. Davies, who developed into a most dependable opening batsman, was rather uneven, though everyone showed himself capable of making runs on occasions. Of the bowlers, C. C. J. Forge and O. S. E. Lloyd were outstanding, and bowled consistently well throughout the season. D. P. Gray was a safe wicket-keeper and his all-round improvement owes everything to his keenness. The fielding, though not in any way exceptional, was up to the standard of the previous year.

Brighton started the season confidently with good victories over the Blue Mantles, the Sussex Martlets, and Epsom. However,

this was followed by a long run of either drawn or lost matches. until the end of the season, when the side made a somewhat belated return to the form of which they were always capable. but only showed, on comparatively few occasions. The main reason for this lay in the batting, which was inconsistent. Too often the side had to rely on S. I. Philips, who rarely received the support from the first five batsmen of the side which he expected. He himself had a very fine season in every respect. and his batting on some occasions was a joy to watch. As for the rest of the batting, West, after a good start, lost his form, while Jones was unable to get going, but Colbourne made some useful fifties and should make many more next year. The bowling was steady, and at times dangerous, though with only four regular bowlers it was naturally lacking in variety. Pugh and Wilson both bowled very well on occasions, though the latter was apt to be expensive, and Clayden, like so many bowlers of his type, often beat the bat but hardly got as many wickets as he deserved. The fielding, like the batting, was inconsistent,

Bristol Grammar School was undefeated in 1939, but, out of the eleven matches played, seven were left drawn. The batting rather depended on A. N. John as far as attacking powers were concerned, but the rest of the batting was always very steady. R. M. Palmer made a very sound Captain, and was an inspiration to the fielding, which was good all round. There was a great deal of variety in the bowling which was chiefly in the hands of D. J. Exten (fast left hand), a useful all-rounder, R. Douse (fast-medium right), C. J. Wier (slow left), and A. N. John (right-hand, leg-spinners).

Campbell College, Belfast went through the season without defeat, winning eleven and drawing seven of their eighteen matches; of the drawn matches, in only one did defeat look probable and, in at least three, victory looked certain. This was a really excellent performance and one on which the captain, J. W. Huet, and his team can be most heartily congratulated. The batting of the side was strong and, whilst there were no real stars, there was ability right down to number 10 and number 11, if he had had any little chance of showing it. The fielding was sound, Swales, Huet and Jackson deserving special mention, and Lyle was safe behind the wickets and in his last match at Bromsgrove attained a high standard. If there was any weakness on the side it lay in the paucity of change bowling. Huet, Fraser and Swales had to take the strain throughout the season; Huet, who bowled as much as the other two put together, fully realised the high promise he had shown in previous seasons; if he now and then erred it was in trying too many variations.

Canford had a successful season as far as School matches were concerned, beating Weymouth, Victoria Jersey, and Bruton easily, just beating Taunton, and losing to R.N.C. Dartmouth by 8 runs. The Club sides, as usual, were a little too strong, but 247 for 4 declared in the opening match, against a strong I Zingari bowling side was a good performance. The batting was steady all through the side, and the bowling, which was steady if not very menacing, proved sufficient to cope with school opponents. The fielding was uniformly good and the side was very well captained by P. M. C. Hare who, keeping wicket for the third year, improved out of all knowledge and played for Dorset during the holidays. It is hoped that six of the side will be back in 1940 with J. H. Covington as captain.

Caterham. The season was rather less successful than usual partly because of an epidemic of mumps which caused the absence of some players and partly because of the lack of any player of outstanding ability. A young team showed lack of steadiness in batting and bowling but made up for a lot by their magnificent fielding. With more steadiness in 1940 the team should be well up to the average again.

Charterhouse. In spite of a wet July, out of the thirteen matches played, six were won, three were lost and seven were drawn. In School matches three were won and two drawn. On the slow wickets early in May the young inexperienced eleven hardly looked like the Carthusian sides of recent years, but on the faster wickets batting and bowling alike improved and a comfortable win by five wickets over Wellington was most encouraging. The Winchester match, played in a heat wave at Winchester, was drawn but on the following Saturday Eton were defeated by 124 runs at Charterhouse: this being their third defeat by Charterhouse in four years. At Harrow, after being made to follow-on, the side made a very late but gallant recovery and set Harrow 226 runs to win in the fourth innings but unfortunately rain prevented what promised a most exciting finish. The strength of the side was further demonstrated by their win over the Old Carthusians and a convincing victory over Westminster. Put into bat, Westminster scored only 26 runs and the official match ended before 1 o'clock.

Brown is to be congratulated on making such a strong team out of the untested material at his disposal. Although the selection of bowlers was a problem at first, the addition of Hoban's inswingers improved the bowling strength both in variety and effect. He was the ideal foil to Bennett who had a highly successful season. Allen proved to be an efficient change bowler and on anything like a sticky wicket his leg breaks were difficult to play.

Donne usually bowled a steady length and always looked dangerous: while Larking's slows were a valuable reserve. The batting was well up to standard. Allen, at times, was superb and his fighting innings of 151 not out at Harrow was not only one of the best played in these matches in recent years but earned him a place in the Rest side at Lord's. Larking's consistency as an opening bat was an immense asset. Cunningham gave him useful assistance on several occasions and Brown always showed himself able to play a captain's innings. Peet and Croll, the two youngest members of the side, promised well, while Stanham proved. against Westminster, that he can hit the ball very hard, and Hoban, Bennett and Tanner could always be relied upon to make runs in an emergency. Tanner's brilliant wicket-keeping is worthy of record; he made twenty catches and stumped eight batsmen. while out of 2.797 runs scored against the school, only 37 were byes. Some of the fielding was excellent, especially that of Brown. Larking, Allen, Croll and Stanham.

Cheltenham were unfortunate in being unable to play the Clifton match this year, and in having the Lord's match with Haileybury completely washed out. Against Malvern they drew. and they lost to Marlborough in an exciting match of unusual scoring. During the season C. J. H. Paget, the captain, played many good innings, his best being a fine century against Malvern. P. B. C. Moore was much the most consistent run-getter and played many a good fighting innings, his highest score being his 197 not out at Malvern. D. C. Brooke-Taylor made several good scores and proved himself a useful and reliable opening bat. The wicket-keeper, S. C. S. Farmer, always reliable and frequently brilliant, developed into a promising attacking batsman. and D. A. Bird showed promise for the future as a steady opening bat. Of the bowlers W. R. Duff was the most effective, and J. E. D. Mann throughout could be relied on to keep up a steady length at one end for long periods.

Christ's Hospital. The team were business-like and out to win, they took defeats sensibly and never let their victories blind them to the possibility of improvement. For this most credit must be given to llett, who set a high standard of accuracy and a fine example of enthusiasm. He also enjoyed very loyal support from all his team.

The defeats came from Epsom in a low-scoring match, and Brighton. When the side won, they won handsomely, as against Leatherhead and Mason's XI, or at any rate convincingly, as against the Sussex Martlets and (though rain made the games somewhat unreal) Eastbourne and Whitgift.

With Cornish starting with two centuries, and J. G. Davies

taking a hat-trick, and Lerwill "going berserk" in the final match and hitting quite improper sixes off opening bowlers, the season certainly did not lack its high spots. Though a suitable partner was not found to open with Cornish, the batting was solid all through; one never felt a 50 was impossible at any time from any of the first ten or eleven batsmen. The bowling was never ragged and was fairly well balanced, though one would have liked to see more genuine spin-bowling. Above all, the fielding, though by no means impeccable, was always vigilant and keen.

City of London. The side had a fairly successful season. winning seven matches, losing four, with three drawn. There was a large proportion of low scoring games, due mainly to the uncertainty of the batting, and the efficiency of the bowling. In four games, against Whitgift, Forest, Hampstead C.C. and the Old Citizens, the school won by narrow margins after thrilling finishes. Other wins were recorded against Blackheath C.C., Kings College London and the Masters. The School failed badly against Imperial Service College and Hornsey C.C. The other two lost games might well have been won, had the batting been stronger. Against U.C.S. the School lost by only one wicket, and at Hurstpierpoint, after scoring 60 for 1 in reply to a total of 121, the side was out for 89. Of the drawn games, two were decidedly in the school's fayour, but against Dulwich C.C. the school were only saved from defeat by the clock. Fiddes was the outstanding bowler, taking fifty wickets for the remarkable average of 7.86. Dale, the school captain, also had a successful season with the ball, taking 48 wickets at an average of 10.21. Harman and Barrett head the batting averages with 24.33 and 21.91 respectively. The fielding was at times brilliant, but sometimes dropped catches proved costly, as at U.C.S. and Hurstpierpoint. The team might have done even better if it had been given a chance to settle down, but in almost every game, it was handicapped by the absence. either through injury or the calls of work, of several members of the side.

Clifton. The XI had a moderate season for which the weather was to a great extent responsible. For the whole of July those games that were possible were played on sodden pitches, and what had looked a promising side was completely routed by Tonbridge on a moderately quick wicket at Lord's. The captain, P. Kinnersley, though a shaky starter was a very dangerous bat with a variety of strokes. He received useful support from Potter, Moreland and Gibbs who all at one time or another made useful scores. But on the whole the batting was not sound enough to compete with the changing pace of wickets. The brunt of the bowling fell on Gibbs and Rees. Of these Gibbs was chosen to

play for the Lord's Schools while Rees' analysis in the Tonbridge match (8 for 70) speaks for itself. The fielding was well up to the average.

Cranbrook played six other schools. Beaten by Dover and Hurstpierpoint they defeated Sutton Valence, King's Rochester and Emanuel, and drew with Ardingly. Their complete record of five wins, five draws and two losses fairly reflects the strength of the side. Though lacking a batsman of outstanding merit the side was rich in run-getters of average ability and consistency, and only on two occasions did they fail to get going. J. A. Myers, who hit a century against King's Rochester, headed the list with an average of 37.25, and he was closely followed by P. H. Attfield, F. J. G. Shearburn and P. A. West, all of whom played several good innings. F. J. G. Shearburn, a right arm bowler of medium pace, proved the most successful bowler with 48 wickets at a cost of 11.60 each, and he received able support from a well varied attack consisting of H. L. Wilson (fast medium), P. A. West (right arm slow) and D. R. O'R. Shearburn (left arm slow).

Cranleigh. In School matches St. John's Leatherhead, and Brighton were beaten, the games with Mill Hill, Epsom, Highgate and Canadian Schools were drawn. The batting was much above the average, most of the side being capable of making runs, while R. J. C. Higgins, who was chosen to play for the Young Amateurs against the Young Professionals was a model of consistency. K. F. Prebble kept wicket and captained the side equally well. The fielding improved enormously, but the bowling, though usually of a good length, lacked variety. P. W. Hutchings and Higgins, however, bowled steadily throughout the season.

Dean Close were a very young and inexperienced side with none of the 1938 bowlers available, nor any mainstay from the previous season's batting. Only one match was won, against King's School, Worcester. The matches with Bromsgrove School and Monkton Combe School were both lost.

Denstone were fortunate in retaining their two outstanding members of the previous year's Cricket XI—D. H. Burrow and J. H. G. Deighton.

Fourteen matches were played, nine won, four lost and one drawn. Of inter-School games, those against K.E.S. Birmingham, Rossall, and St. Peter's York, were won. The match with Trent was drawn. Those against Bromsgrove and Worksop were lost, the latter by a small margin of 6 runs. The two outstanding members of the team were D. H. Burrow and J. H. G. Deighton, both of whom were picked to play for the Rest Schools at Lord's. The School side scored 1639 runs during the season for a loss of 84

wickets, an average of 19.5 runs per wicket. Their opponents scored 1,613 runs for 144 wickets, an average of 11.2 runs per wicket.

Douai. The season was disappointing as the team seldom did itself justice. T. J. Walsh the captain, was unlucky in getting only very few wickets to suit him and he failed to repeat his outstanding performances of the previous season. B. H. Richardson and D. S. Scratton were two young players who showed great promise. Apart from the overwhelming defeat at Downside, all games were well contested and the standard of cricket was higher than results suggest. The match with Ampleforth was particularly interesting as it provided the double sensation of 4 wickets in 4 successive balls by T. J. Walsh and a record last wicket stand of 60 runs.

Dover had another successful season, although on paper the results do not compare with those of 1938. Four matches were won (including two school matches), five were drawn (four in favour of the college) and three were lost—the King's School match—the only school match to be lost, by 26 runs, while the Cryptics got home by 5 runs. The side was again particularly strong in bowling and only twice did the opposition succeed in scoring over 160 and never was the attack really mastered. Mott bowled his medium fast right-hand in-swingers with plenty of life and enthusiasm and was well supported by Bloy (right-hand leg-breaks) and Pearce (slow left hand). The batting at the beginning of the season depended too much on Dawes and Bloy, but in the last seven matches the side was worth 80 runs more than in the early part of the season and time after time the tail wagged merrily. Dawes, who kept wicket for the Young Amateurs at Lord's, was not so successful as in 1938 as a batsman, perhaps because he was too aggressive, but Bloy improved greatly-his left hand batting has polish and the stamp of class-more should be heard of him as besides being an excellent spin bowler he is a fine field anywhere. A most refreshing feature of the season was the fielding -the ground fielding in particular having drawn favourable comment on several occasions.

Prospects for 1940 are bright as six colours remain under

the captaincy of Bloy.

Downside on the whole enjoyed a satisfactory season, in spite of a heavy defeat by Sherborne School. Two matches were won, two lost, and six left drawn, and one abandoned without a ball bowled. In all the drawn games the school did well and in three came near to victory. The batting strength of the side lay chiefly with A. C. Glass, the captain, H. E. Watts and R. W. Smith, but on more than one occasion other members of the

XI showed great promise. H. E. Watts was a class by himself and during August he had the distinction of playing for the Rest XI and the Public Schools XI at Lord's. He then played six innings for Somerset County, ending with an average of 15.20, all this when only just over seventeen years old. R. G. Sheridan and L. Carton-Kelly carried most of the bowling between them and on all but one occasion they kept the score against the eleven down to a very reasonable figure, largely owing to their very accurate length. The fielding in every match was exceptionally good all round.

Dulwich, with eight colours available, and a side potentially strong in batting, were expected to do better than win four and draw four of their thirteen matches. But apart from the fact that the bowling lacked real sting and variety, there was a general spirit of enterprise wanting. Nor was this entirely due to B. E. Collingwood's captaincy, which at times erred on the side of caution, though never lacking in keepness. There were occasions when more forceful batting would have made all the difference to the result, notably against St. Paul's. Collingwood and Turner, opening partners for the third season, usually gave the side a good start, though Collingwood was not so free in style as he was the previous season. J. A. Barnett, an attractive batsman, had little luck, though he showed his best form against Mill Hill. T. E. Bailey, who headed both batting and bowling averages, proved a most useful opening bowler, and a steady batsman who could with profit have made more use of his attacking strokes. Most of the other members of the side could be relied upon for runs. The bowling chiefly depended upon Bailey (fast medium), D. V. Knight (medium), and W. O. Thomas (slow left-hand). while N. J. Goodwin and A. W. H. Mallett, both medium pace, gave steady support at times, but a good leg-break bowler was badly needed. After keeping wicket splendidly in the first few matches, J. L. Nainby had the misfortune to break a finger. His place was eventually filled by M. W. Field, who proved a very useful substitute, though lacking experience. W. O. Thomas will be the new captain.

Durham lost only two of their fourteen matches, winning four and drawing eight, the majority of which were interfered with by rain. W. D. Orwin, the captain, headed the batting averages with 31 and took most wickets, 32 for an average of 14.2. A. D. Cunningham and W. Greensword, useful all-rounders, were a very good opening pair, but the batting of the side as a whole was below average.

Orwin will be captain again in 1940 and will probably have

four old colours to support him.

Eastbourne With only two old colours left from the strong 1938 side and rather unknown material to draw from, the side took some time to get together, and lost three school matches early in the season. After half term however the luck changed, the old Eastbournians were beaten for the first time for ten years, and this success was followed up by victories against the Sandhurst Wanderers and Major Lloyd George's Lords and Commons XI, with most creditable performances against a strong Free Foresters XI and the Stragglers of Asia.

By far the best Cricket of the term however was seen in the last inter-school match v. Radley when both sides attacked the bowling in a way rarely seen in school cricket. Radley getting rather the better of a drawn game in a most successful two-day encounter. D. M. Man the captain, who goes up to Cambridge, is a good wicket-keeper and an excellent batsman, although the demands of captaincy did not allow him such a good season as the year before. R. E. J. Smith was the most consistent rungetter and scored an excellent 91 against Radley. D. S. Brown came on very much as a fast bowler with a lovely action and captured 45 wickets.

Ellesmere. There was a marked improvement in the School cricket. The fielding, as usual, was of a consistently high standard, Rigby at cover-point, Wallis at point and Davies and Thomas in slips being especially good. The batting was certainly much brighter, more wickets being lost through over-eagerness than through hesitancy. The bowlers were unfortunately inclined to concentrate on speed at the expense of accuracy and length, but at times they were really devastating. On the whole a very good season.

Eltham College. The season was a disappointing one. Most members of the team gained notable successes but no two people ever succeeded in the same match. P. J. Thomas made a fine captain. He was frequently called upon to play a captain's innings and he seldom failed.

Epsom had a disappointing season, as none of the old colours found his form with the bat. Two matches were won, against Christ's Hospital and the Old Epsomians, and creditable drawn games were played with the M.C.C., Googlies, and Cranleigh. Far the best batsman was N. O. Bennett, who played many good innings, including one century. The bowling was of a much higher standard, P. A. Soar being once again very deadly. The fielding and catching was generally excellent, a good example being set by the captain, V. D. O. Smyth. Perhaps the most distinguished member of the side, apart from Bennett and Soar, was the wicket-keeper, A. W. Tomlinson, who made a great

impression in all matches. Bennett remains to captain the side this year.

Eton College had a moderate season, but it was not really disappointing since it was never expected to be very outstanding. J. G. Mackeurtan was the mainstay of the batting with 94 v. I. Zingari and 69 v. Winchester. There was a sound opening pair in B. D. Barton and D. W. J. Colman (next year's captain). N. T. A. Fiennes, besides batting well was an able captain and wicket-keeper. The bowling was rather weak. M. B. Henderson and V. G. Wallace, both fast-medium in-swingers, were the most successful, but J. A. Lyttelton should be a good bowler next year, I. McL. Pearson, slow leg-breaks, was on occasions, notably against Haileybury, very dangerous indeed, but he had not enough control of length and so was much too expensive; coming in for some heavy punishment in some matches. Of ten matches played Eton won three, lost five and drew two. They beat the Harlequins, Household Brigade and Haileybury, lost to Eton Ramblers, M.C.C., Free Foresters, Charterhouse and Harrow. The draws were against Hampstead and I. Zingari. Rain ruined the Marlborough match.

Exeter School had a sound batting side containing more good batsmen than in recent years. There was no outstanding bowler, but the bowling was ably supported by fielding of a very high standard. Mackay, the captain, Hutchings, Pellow and Urwin being prominent. The school beat the Devon Dumplings and in the other matches, which were drawn, gave a very good account of themselves.

Felsted. The side was on the whole strong in batting but weak in bowling, and although W. R. Gaunt was easily head of the batting averages, the side did not rely on him for runs as can be seen from the highest scores of the other players. The team was young on the average and in normal times seven or eight of them should be available for next year.

There were three thrilling matches in the season—one against the Gentlemen of Essex which was won with two minutes to spare, after a sixth wicket partnership of 135 in 65 minutes, the second against the M.C.C. which was lost with a similar margin of time, and the third against St. Paul's who won with what was in any case the last ball of the match, in spite of a gallant innings by R. Crouch, the Felsted captain.

Forest. The side worked very well together under the captaincy of G. H. A. Wellum. The first five matches were all won, but weakness in the later batsmen largely accounted for the fact that the rest of the matches were either drawn or lost. Wellum

was as good a captain as Forest have had for some years. He was himself the mainstay of the batting and nearly always made runs as an opening batsman. Apart from him, the side had to rely largely on four all-rounders: D. Coard, A. B. Cowie, C. J. Weir and P. Greenfield. All four are very promising and did excellently considering the amount of work they had to do. Coard in particular proved a really good medium paced bowler, and Weir, who is still very young, should make a sound bat. The fielding was generally very good, and H. R. Neil was a reliable wicket-keeper.

C. M. Howell-Jones is in residence at Pembroke College, Oxford and H. R. Neil, though belonging to Lincoln College, is

in residence at Exeter.

Giggleswick. The season of 1939 was melancholy in two major respects. In the first place the rain completely ruined three matches and partially spoiled several others. Secondly the XI won only one match and that was virtually a draw, the arrangement between Giggleswick and St. Bees being that, if no result on two innings is obtained in two short days, the first innings shall count. On the other hand the side was an unusually young one; P. J. Taylor, the captain, started badly but, in the end, was leading his side quite well; unfortunately he never found any sort of form with the bat. K. L. Wilson was a really promising slow left-arm bowler, who added flight to spin, F. H. L. Barber, right-hand off-spinners, was a consistently useful stock bowler, D. Wilcock and W. H. Sellers played some sound innings, and R. Stephenson kept his head and made good use of a sound defence in several crises.

Haileybury enjoyed a very good season and this was due to the fact that they were a well-balanced side. Of the school games Uppingham were beaten in a fine finish against time; Wellington and Stowe both ended in drawn games with a position very much in Haileybury's favour. The only school match lost was against Eton, when the school completely failed to show anything like their true form. The Cheltenham match was washed out with no play at all. Of the Club games four were won and two lost. The captain, Shephard, gave many inspiring exhibitions and was well supported by A. Fairbairn and A. B. Sheldon. Most of the side could get runs. Hardy, J. H. Fairbairn and A. Fairbairn shared the bowling honours with Hardy the most successful. Ross towards the end showed his ability to bowl a steady length. The fielding was generally good and sometimes outstanding.

Harrow began the season with only two old Flannels, and so A. O. L. Lithgow had no easy task in building up a new, and as it turned out, young side. But the vital match against Eton at Lord's was won at last, and won most convincingly, each

member of the side making his contribution to the success, for four batsmen made over 50, and the five bowlers shared the wickets. In the early part of the season the School struck its worst form against Winchester, and was badly beaten. The other school matches were both drawn. Harrow seemed to be in a winning position against Charterhouse, who were made to follow-on, but they recovered in their second innings, and then rain spoiled the finish. Marlborough batted until well after tea, and there was no prospect of a result. The other matches were all drawn except two, the School defeating the Town, and losing

by an innings to the Harrow Wanderers.

Lithgow revealed himself from the start as a first-rate and consistent batsman, and a wicket-keeper of class. He made the winning hit at Lord's to complete an innings of 67 not out, and was chosen to play as a batsman for the Public Schools. His best support came from E. Crutchley, a stylist player, who made an excellent 115 at Lord's, and from G. F. Anson, who improved rapidly, and hit the ball very hard for his age. The problem of an opening pair was eventually solved in the persons of J. L. Paul and R. M. Boustead. Their form was rather variable, but Paul had good scores against Eton and Winchester. L. E. W. Byam, D. C. H. McLean and D. F. Henley also had useful scores at times, as too did P. E. E. Prideaux-Brune, though he did not live up to the expectations of him. Byam and F. C. Bould were the opening bowlers and the most successful. D. F. Henley is promising, while R. M. Boustead and J. L. Cowley were also useful change bowlers. Nine of the side are expected back next summer, so that if the war permits a match at Lord's, Harrow has great hopes of repeating its win.

Haverfordwest. The School's matches are almost entirely against men's teams, and its most successful day was July 20, when it entertained a Pembrokeshire County XI chosen from the teams taking part in the Bowen Summers Cup Competition. W. M. Evans captained the side. He also captained the schools of the Rest of Wales in their matches against Monmouthshire and Glamorganshire, played for the Welsh Schools in their matches with Rydal and the Glamorgan Colts, and was awarded his cap. S. K. Lucas and L. G. James also played twice for the Rest of Wales.

Hereford Cathedral School. The eleven won four matches, lost two, drew six, and tied one—a record which compares unfavourably with those of previous years. Of the school matches the side won two, drew two, and tied one, the other fixtures being with Club sides. Against the Royal Grammar School, Worcester, every member of the team showed that he could bat fairly well, while some good hitting in the last few moments brought the

school a win. The match against the King's School, Worcester, was drawn, if anything, in favour of the school. The Llandovery match ended appropriately in a draw, the two elevens being very evenly matched. Mistakes in fielding on the part of the School deprived them of a possible victory, while a good innings by W. Ll. Griffiths, who was well supported by the "tail," enabled the School to equal their opponent's total. Against Monmouth the School had an easy win, rendered more easy perhaps by an early declaration by the Monmouth captain, which allowed. Herefore more than enough time to get the runs. The victory was also largely due to a valuable innings of 67 not out by G. J. Williams. At Gloucester, against the Crypt School, Hereford had the chance of an easy win, but the Gloucester batsmen were able to play out time.

Highgate had a good season. Felsted, Aldenham and Merchant Taylors were beaten, and the Cranleigh match was drawn, rain interfering. This is the fourth season in succession Highgate have been unbeaten by a School. Of the sixteen matches played, seven were won, five lost and four drawn. Two of the most exciting matches were ones in which the School was defeated. Against the M.C.C after the School had declared, the match was lost off the fifth ball of the last over. The Incogniti produced a last wicket stand of 47 to win by one wicket. A notable performance was the defeat of the Old Cholmeleians, the first time the School have won this match since 1925, when R. W. V. Robins was captain.

Rogers was the best batsman, and was well supported by Carnell, Thornton, Andrews, Ellerton and Wood. Most of the others made useful scores. The bowling was good and varied. Buckbarrow, 15 years old, bowled very steadily, slow left-hand, Ellerton slow leg-breaks, Andrews fast-medium, Rogers slow off-breaks, Smith leg and off-breaks, and Hughes left-hand in-swingers. Ellerton captained the side extremely well. Ellerton and Rogers were included in the Public Schools team that toured Canada. Ellerton is now at Oxford and Wood at Cambridge. The side may be summed up as being good all-round, and were very keen in the field.

Hurstpierpoint maintained the great improvement shown last year and won nine of their matches against six losses and four draws. Of the School games three, against Cranbrook, City of London and Caterham were won; against Ardingly only 8 runs were needed to win with three wickets to fall. The fixture against Lancing was renewed and was lost by 39 runs, but there wonly a difference of 6 runs in a narrow defeat at Whitgift. The side was very well balanced, perhaps stronger in batting than

in bowling. K. Lock and L. C. Henwood were two very consistent all-rounders while T. F. Sibbald bowled extremely well to secure 51 wickets during the season.

Imperial Service College had a more than usually successful season in 1939. Under the able captaincy of A. P. Raynor the XI lost only one school match, that against Beaumont College, by the narrow margin of 11 runs. Against this, however, is to set a handsome victory over Merchant Taylors' by 97 runs, this being the first time the College had defeated them. Aldenham were beaten by three wickets and St. John's, Leatherhead, by one run after a most exciting finish. City of London School were also defeated, but the game against Whitgift ended in a very even draw. Of the club games the best performance was against Home Park C.C. who were beaten as a result of four byes off the last ball of the game. A strong Incogniti side was held to a draw, but M.C.C. and the Old Wykehamists won fairly easily.

The team was perhaps stronger in bowling and fielding than in batting. Though the bowling had not much variety it was steady, as is shown by the fact that only one side made over 150 against it, and the fielding could always be relied upon. Nearly all the members of the side made runs on occasions, but the batting as a whole lacked something in determination, especially when the earlier batsmen were out cheaply.

King's School, Canterbury had one of the best seasons for many years. All the school matches were won, and many of the Club games were favourably drawn, the only defeats were against the Masters, the Canadian Schoolboys and a touring Emmanuel College, Cambridge, side. Against the Eton Ramblers the school was in a strong position at the close of play, and in the M.C.C. match the visitors, facing a total of 206 for six wickets, declared, found themselves behind with only three wickets to fall at the end of the day. This success was due to the sound batting of J. Corben, D. G. Carter, D. L. Hurford, P. L. H. Lovelace and B. E. Fern, but more especially to the accurate bowling of J. S. Brett and D. L. Hurford, who generally proved too much for the opposition.

The side was efficiently captained by D. L. Hurford and proved a well-balanced team. The batting was generally sound throughout and the attack became more convincing as the season progressed; but with the exception of J. S. Brett, the bowling rather lacked variety, and there was a conspicuous lack of steady length bowling. The fielding was excellent. Much credit for the side's success must be given to Frank Woolley for his invaluable advice and coaching.

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The King's School, Macclesfield, experienced a moderately good season, winning five, drawing three and losing seven matches. E. Fairhurst led the team confidently and competently. His fielding at mid-off was inspiring; his batting, unfortunately, was most unreliable. Goodwin, the vice-captain and Stuart were the corner stones of the batting; against the Cestrian Nomads they stayed together while more than two hundred runs were scored. and Goodwin had the best bowling average. He proved himself an extremely safe field at point. Barker's left-handed spin and Hankinson's off-breaks were valuable, but Hargreaves with real speed off the wicket at times was most unlucky and many catches off his bowling were dropped. In addition to Fairhurst, five members of the side are staying on.

King's School, Peterborough. The season was one of the most successful for many years, and was notable for the unusual number of all-rounders in the side. R. Laxton led the team, for the fourth successive year, and, amongst others, good wins were recorded over King's Ely, King's Grantham, the Etceteras, and the Old Boys. The game against Selwyn College Cambridge was just lost.

King's Rochester had a most disappointing record, but the side was dogged by a series of misfortunes which could not fail to have a depressing effect on the players. Early season injuries deprived the side of leading players, J. Gilpin, the captain, being badly missed in several matches. At the same time, there was no excuse for poor fielding and lack of concentration shown by most of the batsmen, while the bowling suffered from the same weakness.

King's, Taunton began the season with four old colours in E. L. King, P. M. Phillips, P. W. F. Lamb and J. L. Braithwaite. Unfortunately poor weather conditions interfered with several fixtures, but on the whole the season can be regarded as one of moderate success. The team comprised no outstanding individual as in previous years, but its success relied solely on team play. The batting was good on occasions, but on the whole was rather unsteady. K. S. Spooner showed most consistent form, and on a few occasions gave an admirable exhibition of hard hitting. Throughout the whole season there was a marked lack of sound opening batsmen, the original pair having failed too often, and there was great competition for this position. The bowling provided a steady and varied attack, but it was the slow bowlers who met with greatest success. E. L. King bowled his slow left-arm spinners extremely well and with great accuracy. The pace bowlers did not enjoy much success, largely due to the unsuitability of the wickets. but show distinct promise for the future. The ground fielding was quite good, but too many possible catches were not taken. Of the ten matches played, two were won, six drawn and two lost. The most interesting match of the season was against Clayesmore School who were narrowly defeated by thirty runs.

King's College School, Wimbledon had a very young side which was exceptionally weak in batting, and won only three matches, losing ten. Two of the wins, however, were against schools-Whitgift and St. John's Leatherhead. The side lost to U.C.S. and Beaumont, the other School matches having to be scratched. R. M. Williams captained the side well and batted stylishly, though rarely doing himself full justice. J. M. L. Cook was the most promising of the other batsmen. The bowling honours were shared by L. T. Cotton, a very promising fast bowler, and O. E. H. Birchall, a spinner; and Williams often proved useful. Eight sides were dismissed for under 150. Six of the team will be available in 1940.

Lancing had a better season than last year, although only two old colours were available at the beginning of the term. In School matches the XI beat Eastbourne and Hurstpierpoint, drew with Radley and Brighton, and lost to Tonbridge, and to Bradfield after having declared. The batting was about average. Three hundreds were made, two by A. C. Burnett, and one by G. A. Wagner. The bowling, however, depended too much on the ability of R. H. Bradley and A. A. McIntyre who both bowled well throughout the season. C. W. A. Rowden also bowled well on occasions.

Leeds Grammar School. A young side had an averagely successful season. A. Carter (the captain) proved an exceptionally reliable bat. W. M. Holton was a very sound wicket-keeper and stylist bat not always blessed with the best of luck, while B. Scott (slow) and D. G. B. Fletcher (fast) proved to be bowlers well up to the average.

The Leys won three and lost two of their thirteen matches. The side was much stronger than these figures suggest, for on several occasions time prevented an almost certain victory. A splendid win over the M.C.C. was the outstanding event, and J. Pepper's 81 not out against a strong bowling side was probably the season's best individual performance. The batting was sound and often brilliant. W. N. White played several dashing innings, and almost everyone could be relied on for runs. The cares of captaincy proved a little too much for A. J. Witherington, though he had two days of brilliant success. The bowling, though steady, was not destructive. There was plenty of variety, however, and the really brilliant fielding was almost always able to keep the opponents' rate of scoring down. In almost every match the school scored from 15 to 20 runs an hour faster than their opponents.

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A. J. Witherington was a very keen and thoughtful captain. W. N. White captained the Public Schools side which visited Canada, and both he and A. J. Witherington were most successful with bat and ball during the tour. J. Pepper, A. J. White and C. C. R. Vick remain. A. J. Witherington and W. N. White are at Cambridge.

Public School Cricket in 1939

Liverpool College had the best all-round side for some years. The captain, R. O. Lloyd, played for the second time for the Young Amateurs at Lord's, and had a big hand in their narrow victory over the Young Players. Three good wins were obtained in School matches. Against Ellesmere College an opening stand of 126 by Wilson and Green paved the way to a declaration at 217 for 2. Ellesmere were dismissed for 61. Against King William's College, Green and Lloyd, putting on 141 for the third wicket, enabled a declaration to be made at 184 for 3, and King William's were all out for 33, Lloyd taking 6 for 6 and Neale 3 for 9. Against Merchant Taylors', Crosby, Wilson with 101 and Lloyd with 75 were largely responsible for a score of 221 for 4. In dismissing Merchant Taylors for 115, Lloyd took 6 for 48 and Neale 4 for 33. The College lost a close game with Rydal School by 11 runs, and drew, not very creditably, with Birkenhead School in a low-scoring and tedious game.

Maidstone Grammar School. Harris, the new captain, started the season with four old colours. Around these he built one of the most successful teams the School have had for some years: but it cannot be said that the side was well-balanced. The batting tended to rely too much upon J. S. Anscomb, who is probably the finest batsman the School has ever possessed. He set up a record season's aggregate and also made the record score of 158 not out. Besides this, he scored two other centuries and three scores of 50 or over. With these feats, the other batsmen could not hope to compare. Harris distinguished himself by two fighting innings late in the season, while Burdge, Gould, Stroud and Simmons shone in valuable innings every now and then; but for the most part the middle batsmen were steady rather than brilliant or consistent. Of the bowlers, Stroud, medium-paced, and Simmons, off-breaks, captured the most wickets, but there was very little other bowling talent. There were plenty of change-bowlers, but no solid supporting bowlers. Next season should be an extremely successful one, as Harris will be staying on, and with him will be Anscomb, Stroud, Burdge, Gould and Matthews.

Malvern. The most satisfactory feature of the season was the excellence of the batting. High scores were frequently made, and only in the match against Shrewsbury did the batting prove inadequate. The outstanding performer was W. R. S. Dods, who batted consistently well throughout the season. His many long innings provided him with invaluable experience, which should prove a great asset to the side next season. R. O. H. Porch improved greatly last year, and scored runs quickly with powerful hooks and drives. His absence at a critical period of the term was a real loss to the side. B. H. Schofield, R. A. Young and H. M. Sells all played several sound innings, and to P. H. Walker must go the credit of having laid the foundations of several big scores by his opening partnerships with Dods. The bowling was the weakness that caused many of the matches to be drawn. G. H. Chesterton and R. W. L. Cary often bowled well; but the lack of variety and the absence of a good spin bowler were keenly felt. A. G. Denton-Thompson, who captained the side, kept wicket with his usual ability.

Next season (by kind permission of His Grace the Duke of Marlborough) Malvern will have the use of the beautiful ground at Blenheim Palace. In addition to the usual matches with Repton, Shrewsbury and Cheltenham, other matches with schools in the vicinity will probably be arranged. It is hoped that seven of last year's side will be available with R. A. Young as captain in his

fourth season in the side.

Manchester Grammar School. There was a lack of outstanding cricketers, but even so the results were fairy satisfactory. L. Higgins was a first-class wicket-keeper, a fine leader and a much improved batsman. The main responsibility for run getting fell on T. C. Keen, but useful support was given by Lawer, Harrison and Calvert. Wigoder carried off the bowling honours, although he was expensive at times. Parry and Bramhall both bowled well on occasion, but Bentley was unable to reproduce his previous form.

Marlborough beat Winchester for the first time since the war and also beat Cheltenham for the second year in succession. The match against Wellington was drawn very much in their favour and there was no reason why they should not have won at Lord's had not rain decided otherwise. In their captain D. G. Lacy Scott they had the best all-rounder in the 1939 Public Schools. He was a brilliant batsman and a dangerous bowler with the new ball. He will be up at Cambridge next year and should be a strong candidate for a place in the Varsity team. G. J. Redfearn was, on his day a good fast bowler, but he did not really reach the standard expected of him. J. R. Sale did not reach his form till the middle of the season but then played some brilliant innings; he will still be there next year. B. R. Bland, a leg-spinner, proved himself to be a very effective bowler and his performances against Winchester and Cheltenham deserve special mention. J. B. H.

Knight, the wicket-keeper, improved out of all knowledge as the term progressed and as a batsman he was one of the liveliest of a lively tail. Of the newcomers R. P. Dashwood and C. J. Studdert-Kennedy made an extremely good opening pair. The team was a good fielding side although they did not produce their best form at Lord's. Next year under the captaincy of J. R. Sale, there remain four others besides B. R. Bland.

Merchant Taylors'. The performance of the 1st XI was disappointing. They started promisingly by winning the first two matches, against Whitgift School by 40 runs, and against Civil Service Crusaders by 9 wickets. Then came two rather uninteresting drawn games against King's School Canterbury, and Aldenham. After that something happened and five of the remaining eight games were lost. Defeats were at the hands of Imperial Service College (90 runs), the Masters, Beaumont College (by 4 runs), Highgate School (by 2 wickets) and M.C.C. (by 2 wickets). Poor batting was the cause in each case. The match against Berkhamsted School was drawn and that against Merchant Taylors' Company was won (by 8 wickets).

Mill Hill had, on the whole, a successful season. Of the School matches those with Dulwich, Berkhamsted and Aldenham were won, and the only defeat was by St. Paul's. The matches with the Leys, Felsted and Cranleigh were drawn. Parr was an inspiring captain, and he was unlucky to miss his century against the Old Millhillians by only 3 runs. Spivey was the most successful batsman. He nearly always scored freely and was on occasion a useful spin bowler. Rowell, the only batsman to make a century, was a steady wicket-keeper. He rarely missed a catch and his stumping improved considerably as the season progressed. Thurstan, Wright, Patten and Whitehorn were the best of the remaining batsmen, the latter being very promising. The bowling was not so strong. Apart from Scarf, a very effective fast bowler, there was no one who could be relied upon to take wickets, though Wilkinson was always steady and occasionally flighted the ball well. Apart from Spivey, Farmer, who had occasional bursts of success, and Kirk, who came into prominence towards the end of the season, were the only noteworthy bowlers. The fielding of the side was usually of a very high standard. Unfortunately there has been a big leave, and of the colours only Wilkinson and Whitehorn will be left next summer. There is, however, a wealth of promising juniors. Next season Mill Hill have a new fixture list since the school is now at St. Bees. Matches have been arranged with Sedbergh and Stoneyhurst (2 days).

Monkton Combe had the strongest batting side for some years; only once was the side all out, and thrice they won with

six or more wickets in hand. The bowling, too, was stronger than was expected, though it lacked variety. Yet somehow the side failed, at least on three occasions, to take advantage of a superior position and push home a win. At the beginning of the season, the whole side fielded very badly, and although there was a definite improvement later, subsequent matches showed that as a team ability in the field was lacking. Hearle and Royds proved a steady opening pair—too steady once or twice, for they spent so long digging the side in that the latter, and more dashing batsmen, like Carne-Ross, Hooper, Reeve and Orr-Ewing, lacked the time necessary to get the runs.

Mount St. Mary's. Of the ten games played, Mount St. Mary's College won five, lost two and drew three. Of their school matches those against K.E.S. Sheffield, Wakefield Grammar School and Cotton College were won, while the game with Worksop College ended in a draw. The batting was superior to the bowling, E. C. Hutchinson, though absent from three matches owing to injury, being remarkably consistent. He was ably seconded by the captain, S. S. de Freitas, who could be relied upon to give his side a good start. The bowling rather lacked sting, and R. J. Higham and J. B. Campbell, who bore the brunt of the attack, lacked support from the change bowlers. The fielding was keen and safe, J. M. Rowland at cover-point and S. S. de Freitas at second slip being outstanding.

Newcastle Royal Grammar School were badly handicapped by Wood, their captain, breaking his ankle at the end of the football season, and being unable to play cricket until the middle of June. On returning to the side he played several good innings, but never quite regained the confidence of last season. Marrian and Seymour showed considerable improvement, and the batting as a whole was fairly adequate. The real weakness was the paucity of the attack which was rarely effective enough to dismiss the opposition for a reasonable score. All things considered, the final record of four wins, six draws and four losses, was fairly satisfactory, particularly as no inter-school game was lost. Durham and Highgate, were perhaps a little unfortunate in not winning, but the match with University College School resulted in a very exciting finish, U.C.S. requiring thirteen runs with one wicket to fall, when stumps were drawn.

Oakham won three matches, lost 9 and drew one. Of the inter-School matches Oakham beat Trent College, but lost to Wellingborough and Bedford Modern. The weakness of the side lay in the batting; the bowling and fielding were good throughout the season. J. C Donald played the best innings of the season, scoring 113 in very quick time against a Leicester

Ivanhoe XI. A. E. F. Lane, too, played a splendid innings of 71 not out v. Trent College, but the steadiest bat in the side was W. A. Noton, who played several very good innings. A. R. Grier, again, proved the mainstay of the bowling and took 44 wickets in 13 matches with an average of 10.25. A. R. Grier, P. J. P. Read, T. S. Atkins, W. J. Barradale, and E. D. Palmer stay on for the coming season.

Oratory had a satisfactory season and defeated Beaumont at Lord's for the fourth year in succession. Once again the strength of the XI was its general effect as a team and especially when in the field. Three of the bowlers, C. A. Bodenham, N. J. Neville and R. D. Slater took over 50 wickets in school matches and the fielding throughout the season was exceptionally good. M. C. Bodenham captained the side well and although he failed at Lord's, was the outstanding bat of the team. During the season he scored over 700 runs for the school. Apart from Bodenham there were several useful batsmen and whenever the side were in difficulties there was someone to come to the rescue. At Lord's with six wickets down for 67, prospects were not good, but numbers 7, 8 and 9 in the batting order made 112 runs between them of which F. Thorneycroft made 70. Six of the XI stay on for another season.

Oundle had a successful season, defeating in their School matches Bedford and Uppingham, and drawing with Leys and Stowe. P. N. Watt was the most consistent bat, performing especially well in the four school matches, in which he had an average of 76. J. M. Mills, the captain, also made a large number of runs in attractive style, as being well supported by R. G. Nicholls and D. J. Forbes. R. G. Nicholls proved the most effective bowler the school has had for some time, his leg-breaks being very dangerous, especially against Bedford and Uppingham. The fielding was good and R. G. L. Brittain kept wicket very well.

Peter Symonds' School, Winchester. In the seven matches against Schools, four have been won and none lost, three being drawn. As in 1938, Smith, the captain, was the most consistent batsman, with an aggregate of 406 runs, including a not out century. Rogers, Andrews and Vicarage all provided valuable support from time to time. Rogers and Sharpe were the most successful bowlers, both capable of producing short but devastating spells of accurate and aggressive bowling. The fielding of the side was of a high standard, with Oliver and Bayer outstanding.

Radley, who were a young and inexperienced side, had a disappointing season judged by the result of two wins, six losses and 7 draws. Actually they were full of promise and although

they failed to win any of their five school matches, a very slight change of fortune might have brought victory in all of them, as the scores indicate. The batting, especially at the commencement of the innings, was unreliable, and only H. R. J. Taylor, who frequently came to the rescue with powerful driving, was at all consistent. C. C. Fergusson, M. S. Hodges, R. J. A. Darwin and O. F. O. Womack were all good stroke players and the last two should get a lot of runs next year. Darwin (fast medium) and P. B. Morris (medium) were an admirable pair of opening bowlers, the former always likely to run through a side and Morris invariably steady. The change bowling, if lacking much variety in pace, had the great virtue of length. Womack, Darwin, Taylor, T. P. Hayward and R. A. Murray remain for 1940 and there is the possibility that G. T. Pearson, captain and wicket-keeper in 1939, may be available.

Reading. The XI had a very disappointing season. Of the fourteen matches played, eight were drawn, one won and the other five lost. But of the five matches lost only one was an inter-school fixture, and of the eight matches drawn six were definitely in the school's favour. The most noticeable weakness of the side was its lack of keenness in the field. It was extremely unfortunate that illness and the weather so seriously affected the season's play.

Repton, in a more successful season than the record suggests, won three matches, drew seven and lost 4. They beat Shrewsbury, drew with Malvern and Rugby, and lost to Uppingham. Clarke, the captain, who played for the Rest at Lord's, and Tubbs, were the best bowlers, and were ably supported by Curtis, Laing and Russell. Laing, who also played for the Rest, batted brilliantly throughout the season, his century against Malvern in an hour being his best innings; and de Piro, an opening batsman, scored 472 runs in his first year in the side. With Pyman these two bore the brunt of the batting, though Linley, Francis and Vickery all played useful innings. The magnificent fielding of the side was probably the strongest point. Tubbs is next year's captain, and he will have Curtis and Russell to assist him.

Rossall's record of one win, four defeats and eight draws was a disappointing one. Of the school matches only that against Sedbergh was won, and that by the narrowest of margins. Shrewsbury were led on the first innings, but Rossall found some good spin-bowling in the fourth innings on a drying wicket too much for them. Against Denstone two inexplicable batting collapses brought a heavy defeat, while Sedbergh also proved superior all round. In the other matches the best performance was against the Old Rossallians, when the school had all the best of it. The chief reason for the team's lack of success was the unsteadiness

of the batting. C. C. P. Pocock played some fine aggressive innings, but of the others only Williams showed any consistency. The bowling was good, G. D. M. Pocock in particular having much success with his varied medium-paced stuff, while Lee showed distinct promise as a slow spinner. The old colours staying on are Davison, Furness, Harvey, Lee and G. D. M. Pocock.

Rugby. Although the record of ten draws, two losses and only one win may appear a very disappointing one, Rugby had in fact a very useful side and much good cricket was played. The weather actually caused six of the drawn matches, and two others had most exciting finishes, and were very nearly won. Two other factors led to the number of drawn matches: one was the falling off of W. H. D. Dunnett after the beginning of June, which materially weakened the side as a match-winning combination, and the disappointing form of A. J. Pickard with his leg-breaks. Added to this, the other opening bowler, H. G. Gilbert, fell ill just when he was beginning to bowl really well and did not play after June 24. When Dunnett bowled well, which was on three occasions, the side gained its only win, and almost won the two other matches. Otherwise the bowling was not strong enough. The batting was exceptionally strong, and nearly everyone on the side, as witnessed by the averages, could and did make runs. H. C. Munro and L. G. H. Hingley did not find their form till the beginning of June, but after that they never looked back and one or both of them came off in nearly every match. M. A. C. Beaman is clearly a player of high promise. All four school matches were drawn-a moral victory over Clifton, a moral defeat by Uppingham, and a level high-scoring match with Repton. Rain unfortunately reduced the Marlborough match at Lord's to one day. The only win was at the expense of the Butterflies. Munro made 131 not out against Clifton and 108 not out against Repton, both fine innings, while Hingley scored 123 not out against the Forty Club.

Rydal had quite a good season. They played twelve matches, won two, lost one and the remainder were drawn. In the majority of the drawn games they were in a comfortable position. They beat Wallasey Grammar School by five wickets and Liverpool College by 11 runs. The matches with Merchant Taylors, Crosby, and Birkenhead School were drawn, both very much in favour of Rydal. The batting was very sound all through the side, and several batsmen, notably Walter, Hacking, Blackburn, Gregory, Jones-Evans and Hirst, showed real class. The bowling was steady but apart from Daniels there was no one who really looked like taking wickets, though Blackburn bowled his leg-breaks very well at times. The fielding was always good and keen and Thornhill kept wicket well. Jones-Evans will be captain next

season and Walter, Hacking, Hirst, Godkin, Harrison, and possibly Gregory and Thornhill will also be available. W. K. Blackburn has gone up to Oxford.

St. Albans. The XI had a good season, playing thirteen matches, of which they won seven and lost three. They were lucky however to escape defeat against Haberdashers' School. G. F. Pellant, the captain, was the best all-rounder, F. E. Arnold's showed considerable promise as a batsman, and B. Marder's hard hitting was very valuable. W. Fenton, with good-length slow off-breaks, had a remarkable season, and F. Shepherd, slow left-hand, also did well, although missing several matches.

The fielding on the whole was good, and at times—notably in the match against the Old Albanians—brilliant. R. K. Fookes, whose batting failed to fulfil the promise of last year, improved as a wicket-keeper. The team's best performance was their victory over a strong Old Boys XI—the first for many years.

St. Edmund's, Canterbury, had a rather disappointing season on the whole; after winning the first three games they were afterwards only successful against Whitgift School. In School matches Kings' Rochester, and Whitgift were beaten, the matches against St. Lawrence College, Sutton Valence, and King's Canterbury were lost and the Dover College match was drawn. Except for G. P. Baylis, J. O. T. Owen, and sometimes M. A. R. Lidgley, the batting was disappointing. The bowling was weakened by the absence of F. A. Hooke owing to injuries. After the first match it rarely appeared to have any venom in it. This was probably due to lack of variety. The fielding was reasonably good, but its buoyancy sometimes departed from it during long innings. The ground fielding was in some cases especially weak.

St. Edward's, Oxford, gradually improved as the season progressed though the side lacked solidity in batting and attack in bowling. It was only possible to play one school match, which was lost. R. George, the captain, deservedly headed the batting averages and T. Abrahamson was also consistent. M. W. Henderson and R. B. Walker bowled well on occasions and J. W. Halliday held out hopes of better things to come with good performances in the last three matches.

St. George's, Harpenden, were only a moderate side, relying entirely upon the captain, D. C. V. Watts, for runs and largely upon the same player for bowling. Watts is a fine free-hitting left-handed bat who regards attack as the best means of defence. The rest of the batting was weak, although D. H. Larkin showed a good defence. J. E. Norman gave Watts very useful support with the ball and D. Birkinshaw was a safe and consistent wicket-keeper.

St. John's, Leatherhead, in their school matches beat Epsom. Whitgift and Beaumont, and lost to I.S.C. Windsor, Cranleigh, Christ's Hospital and K.C.S. Wimbledon. The I.S.C. and Epsom matches produced thrilling finishes; I.S.C. won by one run on the last ball of the day and against Epsom the St. John's tail just wagged enough to scrape home by 3 runs. The victory over a useful M.C.C. side—the second in twenty years—was a very good performance. The mainstay of the side was the captain, A. W. Jackson. He bowled untiringly, taking 36 wickets, and played some excellent innings. It was fitting that in the last match of the season, against Beaumont, he should have carried the team to victory. The batting of the side was not very consistent. Stallibrass and Hughes showed good form at times but it was nearly always Stoneham who came to the rescue at the critical moment. In bowling, Jackson bore the brunt of the attack. Stallibrass and Dodd gave useful support. The fielding was keen and up to standard.

St. Paul's. Of sixteen matches played, seven were won, five lost, and four drawn. Of the matches won, five were school matches, Leys, Mill Hill, Felsted, Brighton and Dulwich being beaten. N. M. Mischler was again captain, and had a most successful season. Individual performance fell short of the record season of last year; but he unselfishly delegated his wicket-keeping to R. A. Burke, a most efficient substitute, and emerged himself as an opening bowler (fast-medium) with considerable success. In batting he was well backed up by the old colours, J. D. Somper, M. K. Brett and M. A. Rahman, but the chief run-getting was due to the newcomers, A. H. J. N. Walker, who scored 450 runs with top score of 103 not out, P. A. Mann, and A. D. C. Lewis. Chief bowling honours went to D. A. Dailey, a boy of under sixteen, who took 40 wickets for an average of 16 runs. Walker and Lewis also gave valuable assistance, as did Brett and B. J. Hennessy. The fielding was up to the usual high standard, conspicuous being Rahman, Brett and Mischler. Of those leaving, N. M. Mischler goes to Cambridge, St. Catherines, also P. A. Mann.

St. Peter's, York. The side played well together throughout the season and were a credit to the captaincy of R. C. Lynch, who led them splendidly, but unfortunately the team lacked a really reliable batsman or bowler around which the side could be built. They also lacked the necessary sting to press home an advantage already won, with the result that many matches which looked as if they would end in a clear advantage for the school if not a win, only resulted in a very even draw. The fielding of the whole side was of a good standard, but the bowling generally

lacked variety especially in pace, and the batting was rather lacking in aggressiveness of a sound nature.

Sebright. The season started with a draw, and then the team went on to win five matches in succession. In the second half of the term, although in a good position in several games, they could not push home their advantage. This was due, very largely, to the slow nature of the batting. L. G. Bache, the captain, was one of the few who could force the pace; but he got out more than once by trying to overdo it. The early success was mostly due to good bowling; J. B. Jones kept a consistent length with his medium paced off-breaks, and C. H. Roberts varied his legbreaks cleverly with an occasional off-spinner. When one of these bowlers was off form, K. R. Mason could generally be relied on for a wicket or two—and he actually finished with the best average for the season. The fielding of the side was patchy; in one or two games it was excellent, but generally there was a lack of anticipation, and no really safe slip fielder could be found.

Sedbergh. Of the drawn matches two were very nearly victories, and two were very nearly defeats: of the inter-school matches that against Ampleforth was lost, those against Rossall and Durham were won, and that against Stonyhurst could not be played. This was very nearly a good side. It was full of cricket, but the batting in the nets was very much better than in the middle and the bowling was handicapped by the cartilage trouble of C. B. Holmes, one of last year's opening bowlers. The really disappointing feature of the year was the fielding, which fell much below the standard of recent times. The outstanding bowler of the side was A. E. W. Ayre, who also showed improved form as a left-handed bat. R. W. W. Watson took a considerable step towards being the fine player he is expected to be: he now spins the ball well, but often inaccurately, and his batting improved. The other gratifying feature of the side was the wicket-keeping of T. M. Cullingworth. Seven of the side return next year, as well as many of the 2nd XI, under the leadership of Watson,

Sevenoaks. With eight who had played in various 1st XI matches in 1938, six of them regularly, four being "caps," the prospects looked promising. But for the first half of the term the XI proved themselves somewhat unreliable. However, at its best, the side was good, and by the end of the season it looked like becoming as good an all-round eleven as the School has produced. Ward, somewhat fatalistic in his captaincy early in the term, was showing himself a really good tactician by the end of it. His own batting, too, in July reached the high expectations formed of it; and it showed character as well as technique to recover from a long "bad patch." His bowling was always good.

a splendid match against Wyggeston was just lost, and the Uppingham match was favourably drawn.

Stockport Grammar School had a disappointing season, two wins, six losses and three drawn games. This was mainly due to the failure of the four leading batsmen to reach anything like true form. W. E. Carr, at No. 6, relying on a quick eye and wrist, was the most successful batsman. The bowling of D. J. Cook and J. H. Shepherdson, the opening bowlers, were good throughout the season. The wicket-keeping of F. K. Dawson was excellent but his captaining of the team was disappointing.

Stonyhurst. There were several close and exciting finishes to matches, and these were always just in favour of the other side. Nearly all matches were played on wet and lifeless wickets but in spite of this handicap the XI showed a much improved standard of cricket. There was ever present the tendency to attack the bowling and to get runs quickly.

Stowe. Matches were won against Bradfield, Westminster, the M.C.C. and Cryptics, while the Tonbridge match resulted in a tie. All the other school matches-Haileybury, Radley and Oundle-together with the Free Foresters and Incogniti were drawn and the I.Z., Authentics and Old Stoics beat the School. P. R. H. Hastings, a first-class wicket-keeper, captained the side. Of the batsmen R. H. Marten, a left-hander, was far the most consistent and E. P. Hinking, who should have two more years in the side, showed great promise. L. G. Darling, J. P. Phillips and A. V. Farnell-Watson all played very well on occasions. M. B. Scholfield, medium right hand, and J. E. I. Hooper, slow left-hand, were the two chief bowlers. They both bowled extremely well on occasions and Scholfield's bowling in the match with Tonbridge was superb. A. V. Farnell-Watson will captain the side and E. P. Hinkling is the Hon. Sec. for 1940. P. R. H. Hastings and R. H. Marten are at Oxford, J. P. Phillips and M. B. Scholfield are at Cambridge.

Tonbridge enjoyed a most successful season, with victories over M.C.C., West Kent, Band of Brothers, Free Foresters, Sherborne, Lancing, Dulwich and Clifton, and a tie with Stowe. The only defeat was by T. C. Cobb's XI by two wickets. No fewer than five members of the XI had an average of over 30, and M. P. Rose-Price created a new school record by taking 78 wickets. P. G. C. Wood, the captain, was chosen to captain the Lord's Schools and the Public Schools v. the Army, but was unable owing to illness to play in either of these matches. Rose-Price however played in both with distinction. The fielding of the side was always a delight to watch and the throwing in far above average.

Of the XI, P. G. C. Wood and J. A. Dew have gone to Cambridge, C. L. Welford and J. L. Rampton to Oxford. Rose-Price has unfortunately returned to the Argentine, but the rest, with the exception of Pillman, should be available next year, when T. R. R. Wood will be the captain.

Taunton School had a disappointing season due chiefly to lack of stability in batting. A. P. Henderson played some good innings, and M. F. Robinson and R. B. Price proved themselves sound bats. L. J. Hobson was a very clever and most accurate spin bowler, but most of the other bowlers were inaccurate and inexperienced. Though always keen, the fielding should have been better. A. P. Henderson was an experienced and keen captain whose batting seemed to suffer on account of the cares of captaincy. Henderson will be at Pembroke, Cambridge, this term, and L. J. Hobson will be at St. Catherine's, Cambridge.

University College School. The season was the most successful the School has known for a number of years. The side reached its peak when three matches were won consecutively in the middle of the season against K.C.S., Hornsey and Incogniti; in matches with other schools the XI was undefeated throughout the season. The side scored fast, was willing to take risks and possessed above all else, team spirit.

Uppingham. The results of the season were disappointing and perhaps a little misleading. In spite of losing three of the five school matches, the XI was not a bad side, probably stronger than for the last two years. Unstable batting was once more the chief source of weakness, due, it seemed, rather to lack of concentration than to faulty technique, the number of wickets, for example, that fell to full pitches in school matches being considerable. The bowling was accurate and more varied than usual, and the fielding safe if slow. The side showed good spirit, and was well led in the field. Haileybury, Shrewsbury and Oundle defeated the school who beat Repton and had the better of a drawn game with Rugby. The Haileybury, Repton and Rugby matches all provided most exciting finishes. There were good wins against Free Foresters and the Old Boys. The new fixture against the Adastrians, who brought a strong side, had to be left unfinished because of rain. W. J. N. Carter, best all-rounder in the side and a slow left-hand bowler, will be the new captain.

Wallasey Grammar School. The XI played thirteen matches of which three were won, three lost and seven drawn. Four games had to be abandoned owing to bad weather and many of the draws were due to rain interference. Although so many games ended tamely, the cricket was interesting and there were some individual performances. R. E. Smith scored a century

against Liverpool Collegiate School and headed the batting averages with 30.25. H. W. Hall, who was outstanding in the field, and G. E. V. Rowe also batted consistently and averaged 26.5 and 21.5 respectively. A. Butler showed great promise and his 51 not out against Merchant Taylors' School, Crosby, was a fine innings. The bowlers were less successful, T. A. M. Reynolds, who won his place in the side halfway through the season, was top of the averages with 17 wickets for 10 runs each, but the mainstay of the attack was G. A. Wilson who took 35 wickets for an average of 13. The prospects for next season are good as eight of last year's colours are still at school.

Wellingborough. The season was a very satisfactory one for the school in spite of the fact that only two matches were won, four lost and five drawn. One feature of the team was the definite improvement in all departments of the game as the season progressed. The batting was stronger than the bowling, the school on each occasion exceeding the hundred mark, and then being unable to get out their opponents sufficiently cheaply to be able to force a win, though Oakham School were dismissed for 78. The trouble with the bowling was the lack of variety and another slow bowler was badly needed. The opening bowlers, G. B. Sharman and D. E. Freeman, both fast medium, were compelled to do most of the work, getting between them 53 of the 84 wickets taken. The batting, on the other hand, was sound, ample and varied. H. K. Johnson, one of the opening bats, seldom left before a good score was on the board. His batting perhaps appeared to be a little too aggressive for an opening bat but he always played within a fair margin of safety. Lloyd Price, his partner, started off the season rather indifferently, but afterwards he scored freely and helped in some useful partnerships. J. L. Scott also started off the season with several small scores until he found his form. One point was most marked; the ability for the team to bat right down to number eleven. One of the most improved bats of the season has been K. S. Smith. G. B. Sharman captained the side admirably, and showed much skill in his manipulation of the very limited bowling at his disposal. The fielding has been up to the usual high standard of former years.

Wellington had a moderate season but most of the XI were young and have another year. Westminster were beaten, the matches v. Marlborough and Bradfield were drawn, and the match v. Charterhouse was lost. Against Marlborough, Wellington were fortunate not to lose, stumps being drawn with their total at 176 for 9 in reply to the Marlborough total of 314 for 7 declared. The side were well beaten by Charterhouse by five wickets. Once

again P. B. K. Gracey was the outstanding batsman, his scores including a magnificent 130 v. Marlborough which saved the side from defeat. R. M. Hill took up wicket-keeping and showed great ability; he also played a number of very fine innings including 82 not out v. Westminster and 87 not out v. Bradfield. The best bowler was R. C. S. Renshaw and he was well backed up by P. B. K. Gracey and G. T. C. Campbell.

Weymouth. A. N. Young was the outstanding success of the side, both his bowling and batting being of a very high standard. He played several times for Dorset County. M. F. Peto was a fast bowler of more than average merit and B. G. Cangley was by far the most polished batsman in the team, he should have two more years in the team. The captain—J. A. Lemon—did not have a very successful season, but proved a real inspiration to the side, while his slip fielding was really first class. None of the side is likely to be at either University this coming season.

Westminster. F. C. Calway, the captain, who went with the English Public schoolboys on the Canadian tour, had four old colours to call on, P. Goatly (wicket-keeper), B. I. V. Greenish (an opening batsman), C. Wilkinson, and A. F. Taylor (a spin-bowler). Of the newcomers R. O. I. Borradaile was the most successful and is the captain for 1940. Owing to the digging of air-raid shelters in Vincent Square, no matches could be played at home, so that the XI never enjoyed the added confidence of playing at home. This was unfortunate as it was confidence which the team most lacked. Matches against Stowe, Sherborne, Wellington and Charterhouse were lost. Only against Radley was a victory recorded. Wilkinson and Hinge were the most consistent of the batsmen; Calway and Taylor the most successful of the bowlers. Only Borradaile and Hinge remain for the coming season.

Whitgift with an unusually young side, did not come up to early expectations, but were nevertheless unfortunate to gain only two victories. Of the remaining matches, three were drawn, and ten lost. These results were mainly due to poor batting, as the bowling was invariably above average standard. T. R. Foster, the captain and most consistent player, used his bowlers with sound judgment. Next season promises well with five old colours remaining, as well as six others who played for the team during the season.

Worcester Royal Grammar School lost five of the thirteen matches played, winning five and drawing three. One school match was lost, that against Hereford Cathedral School, by two wickets. Crypt School Gloucester, Wolverhampton, King Edward VI School Stourbridge were beaten and the matches against

Solihull and Cheltenham Grammar School were drawn. A close finish occurred in the match against Merton College Oxford, which was won in the last over. D. E. J. Corcoran the captain had the support of four old colours, J. G. J. Davies, H. Ll. Pullinger, J. H. T. McEwan and J. C. Holland, while A. S. Williams, I. E. Hale and R. T. E. Haynes had also played for the XI in 1938. The team developed into a good bowling side, McEwan (fast) and Davies (slow) being most successful. Pullinger proved to be a very consistent opening batsman and Holland did well behind the wicket.

Worksop, as expected, had a fine side and were unbeaten in school matches, defeating Denstone and St. Peter's York, and drawing with Wrekin and Repton. In club matches the best win was over the Yorkshire Gentlemen, A. L. Evans scoring a fine century, and as a result being selected for the Rest Schools v. Lord's Schools as wicket-keeper. P. E. F. Rhodes headed the bowling averages for the third season in succession with excellent figures and also headed the batting averages as a result of a hurricane 113 against St. Peter's York, scored in 55 minutes. With seven of the XI left, the school face 1940 with confidence.

Wrekin had the most successful season on record. The team were undefeated, and out of thirteen matches eight were won and five drawn. The game against Worksop was drawn, but unfortunately, owing to the weather, not a ball was bowled at Denstone. The victories over the Shropshire Gentlemen, the Staffordshire Gentlemen, Stafford, and the Old Wrekinians were all excellent performances. Denham, the captain, is to be warmly congratulated on his side which, besides himself, contained three excellent cricketers, Grace, Wilford and Smith. Denham scored two centuries and Wilford one. With Grace and Wilford still available, the prospects for 1940 are distinctly good. The batting averages show the strength of the side, and Smith once more bore the brunt of the bowling, though he had rather too much work to do.

Winchester had a successful season, winning five matches and losing only two. Thanks chiefly to a masterly innings by H. A. Pawson, and effective bowling by A. R. Taylor, Harrow were beaten by 141 runs. The side visited Eton with high hopes, but unfortunately the weather took a hand in the game, which ended in a tame draw. After a long period of fast wickets the side were all at sea on a wet wicket at Marlborough and were dismissed for 82. Even so, Marlborough were made to fight so hard for the runs that they lost seven wickets and batted for two and a half hours, in getting them. The Charterhouse match was drawn after a stylish 139 by M. A. Bankier had enabled

178 for 7 at the close. The side's chief strength lay in the ability of the whole side to make runs. Henley and Taylor who normally batted 9 and 10 had averages of 35 and 43 respectively and were a most dangerous pair against tired bowling. Pawson as a batsman was in a class by himself, but too often he was inadequately supported by the other earlier batsmen. That and the lack of a good spin bowler constituted the chief weaknesses in the side. The attack was vigorous but lacked variety. Henley, medium fast right hand with a lovely action, had some very successful days, notably against the Authentics, but he never struck his best form in school matches. Taylor, medium fast left-hand in-swinger, was dangerous with the new ball especially against inexperienced batsmen. Wilson and Parkinson could be relied upon to keep the runs down, but neither ever seemed likely to go through a side. Pawson captained the side with splendid judgment and often bowled his off-spinners to good purpose. The fielding, particularly that of Pawson, Taylor, Henley and M. A. Bankier, reaching a good standard.

Wycliffe. In spite of three early and decisive victories over the Royal Agricultural College, Crypt School and Cheltenham College II, the XI had a rather disappointing season. In a brief bad spell they lost to Monkton Combe and Hereford, but then won an amazing victory over Kingswood whom they dismissed for 28 after having scored only 73 themselves. Rain unfortunately curtailed the subsequent games. In R. Gray, who has gone up to Queen's College, Oxford, Wycliffe had a fine captain, an excellent batsman and a good bowler.

Wyggeston, with an exceptionally young team, had a successful season, winning eight matches and losing two, while two were drawn. The outstanding feature was the batting of D. J. Morris, the captain, who in the match against Oundle II scored 105, and with K. R. Eabry added 157, a record partnership for the school. It was, however, in bowling, rather than in batting, that the side excelled, and the fielding too, was generally of a high standard.

#### SCOTTISH SCHOOLS

The Edinburgh Academy improved on the poor records of 1938 and 1937. J. A. Eadie captained the side well and himself made over 500 runs in addition to fielding splendidly throughout the season. J. H. F. Morton, a left-hander, and J. B. Lyell made runs at times, but reliability was lacking. The attack, depending almost entirely on left-handers, was supported by good fielding, but lacked bite. G. C. Davidson (medium paced left-hand) is a promising bowler but lacks experience and match temperament.

In school matches Glenalmond and George Watson's were beaten, Fettes held to an unsatisfactory draw, whilst bad batting collapses led to reverses from Loretto and Merchiston Castle, D. A. Roberts will captain the 1940 side and will be assisted by G. C. Davidson, R. St. C. Cunningham and T. Walker—all bowlers. J. A. G. C. Law, a capable wicket-keeper, was selected as vice-captain, but is at present held up in India owing to the war and is unlikely to appear.

Fettes had a fairly good season, with one outstanding performance in the defeat of a strong Grange side by six wickets. In the school matches Loretto and Watson's were beaten and the matches with Merchiston and Edinburgh Academy drawn, but the side suffered an unexpectedly heavy defeat on a wet wicket at Glenalmond. The team batted down to the last man, but was a little weak in bowling, though Thom-Postlethwaite, Crawford and Murray all bowled well on occasion. W. N. L. Goldie Scot is in residence at Cambridge.

Loretto. The side had, on the whole, a very successful season; Edinburgh Academy, Watson's and Glenalmond were defeated, and Merchiston were only saved by the clock after holding an advantage on the first innings. Fettes won decisively the one-day match made necessary by heavy rain on the first day. Simpson and Rankin scored by far the greater proportion of the runs in school matches, though most of the side managed to produce useful scores now and again. The bowling honours were more equally shared; the slow bowlers, McFarlan and Watson, meeting with most success against the schools. Six members of the XI are staying on for another season; of the leavers, Simpson, Ure and McInroy have gone up to Oxford, and Hill to Cambridge.

Merchiston Castle again had a successful cricket season. The 1st XI played fourteen matches, of which six were won, and four lost. No school matches were lost: Glenalmond were beaten by five wickets, Watson's by 52 runs, and Edinburgh Academy by nine wickets; the matches with Fettes and Loretto were drawn. The batting of the side was rather variable, but the bowling was usually steady, and it is hoped that both J. Blackwood and I. Considine, the two best bowlers, will be back for another season. Much of the credit for the team's success must go to D. Yellowlees for his enthusiasm and capable captaincy; in his two years as captain he was undefeated in school matches. M. MacNaughton will be captain next season, and over half of this year's side should again be available.

Trinity College, Glenalmond, opened in promising fashion and, on the whole, the record of six matches won, seven lost and three drawn barely does justice to the team. Their failures were

often due to indifferent batting, and wet weather in June was largely responsible for this. R. S. Colquhoun was always good for runs and J. Rios proved unexpectedly effective, but P. A. McDowall rarely got going; lower down D. G. Rochford played several aggressive innings. J. Rios bowled extremely well all the season and eliminated the occasional bad ball which marred his bowling last year: while the wickets were fast D. G. Rochford bowled with real fire and determination and K. P. Walker took valuable wickets with slow leg-breaks. The ground-fielding was good, but some catches, and often crucial ones, were missed. R. S. Colquhoun's wicket-keeping, particularly to slow bowling, was excellent. In school matches the College beat Fettes and George Watson's, but lost to Merchiston, Loretto and Edinburgh Academy. J. Rios and R. S. Colquhoun played for the Scottish Schools against the M.C.C. and both put up outstanding performances. P. A. McDowall will captain the 1940 side and O. R. Arend, C. N. G. Thomson and D. A. Finlay also remain from last year.

Watson's had only a moderately successful season. Lacking in consistent bowling, the side too often found itself faced with formidable totals, and although it achieved a series of good starts, the batting was uneven and unequal to its task. The exception, however, was the success of I. J. M. Lumsden, whose selection to play against the M.C.C. was thoroughly deserved. Later in the season G. P. Barnet and S. M. Wilson took part in several useful last-wicket stands, notably against Edinburgh Academy and

Merchiston.
